## CITY COUNCIL ESTABLISHES GOALS FOR THE NEXT TWO YEARS

### INFRASTRUCTURE, TRAFFIC CALMING, OPEN SPACE PURCHASE AND RECREATION

This past January the City Council and their senior staff met to discuss and prioritize goals for the next two years. The entire day was spent discussing the merits of a number of important initiatives. By the end of the day piles of paper littered the floor, magic markers were run dry, the walls were covered with lists of issues, projects and ideas, and everyone was exhausted. However, neatly written on four "white" boards were the Council's major initiatives for the next two years. These initiatives dealt with maintenance and renewal of the infrastructure, devising and implementing a plan for curtailing Citywide speeding and parking problems, aggressively pursuing Federal, State and local funding for the purchase of open space property in the Portuguese Bend area, and completion of the Open Space Planning and Recreation & Park Master Plan. It was agreed that the four initiatives were all equal in priority. Timelines for their implementation were established and staff was directed to report on certain milestones during the coming months.

### MAINTENANCE AND RENEWAL OF INFRASTRUCTURE

Viewed as the most costly initiative was the maintenance and renewal of the City's storm drain system.

Staff is expected to have an update on the City's Master Plan, now six years old, by late March. This plan identifies both structural and hydraulic deficiencies in the City's drainage system. Concurrently, the City is investigating the condition of



the sewers throughout the City. This investigation will include video inspection of selected sewers and is expected to be completed by the end of July. By early fall, the City's Infrastructure Financing Team will present their recommendations for financing this initiative to the City Council and the Finance Advisory Committee at a public workshop.

Since the January Workshop, the Council has already approved the selection of Moore Iacofano Goltsman, Inc., a public information consultant, to advise the Infrastructure Financing Team and the City Council on the implementation of an educational program which could include such things as citizen surveys, community outreach programs, and a recommendation for funding mechanisms for maintenance and renewal of the City's sewers and storm drains.

It is anticipated that by July 2005 the Council will be able to approve a final infrastructure renewal plan.

### TRAFFIC CALMING: SPEEDING AND PARKING

Excessive speeding and the best way to remedy this problem has been the subject of several Council meetings. Residents living on Via Rivera, Basswood, and General and Trudi Streets in the Eastview area have been particularly concerned about excessive speeding and high traffic volume in their neighborhoods. While the problem on Basswood has been addressed with the installation of speed humps, given the difference in character of the streets experiencing these problems, solutions must be developed on a case-by-case basis.

The first step the Council took to address these traffic issues was to

schedule a joint work shop with the Traffic Committee in late March. With input gathered from that meeting, the Traffic Committee is expected to make recommendations to the Council by the end of June.

### PURCHASE OF THE PORTUGUESE BEND OPEN SPACE PROPERTIES

Over the past several years, the City has purchased and acquired three large pieces of open space along the coastline, starting with the 1996 purchase of the 163-acre Forrestal Nature Preserve. Funding for that property came from three sources: the L. A. County Regional Park and Open Space District, the California Wildlife Conservation Board and from the State Coastal Conservancy. That was followed in 1997 by the

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## WHAT'S HAPPENING ALONG THE RANCHO PALOS VERDES COASTLINE

### STILL PRESERVING THE BEAUTY

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes was incorporated in response to controlling the unbridled development that was occurring under County control. The County continuously granted zone changes for higher densities and little concern was given to the sensitive environment of the Peninsula. It became evident that the only way to preserve the environment was to

gain control over local zoning issues by becoming an incorporated city. In 1973 we became a city and two years later adopted a General Plan and Zoning Ordinance that imposed stricter controls on development, especially along the coastline.

Since that time, projects approved for development have been subject to the strict guidelines established by the General Plan and instead of detracting from the beauty of the coast, projects now are designed to revegetate and rehabilitate the area

with its native flora and fauna. This article is intended to update our residents on the projects proposed or currently under construction along the coast of Rancho Palos Verdes.



### OCEAN TRAILS GOLF COURSE AND RESIDENTIAL PROJECT

When completed the Ocean Trails project will consist of an 18 hole public golf course, clubhouse, maintenance facility, four affordable housing units, 75 single family residential lots, public parklands, pedestrian and bicycle trails, and native habitat preserves. Currently, Ocean Trails is working on the reconstruction of Palos Verdes Drive South in the vicinity of the project and on a number of improvements to the golf course. 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## SEWER SPILLS: WHAT TO DO, HOW TO PREVENT THEM

### COSTLY TO RESIDENTS AND TO THE CITY

Nothing can spoil a nice weekend or a quiet evening at home faster than a broken sewer line. What is a resident to do? If the break is on private property, e.g., the sewer backs-up into house, or somewhere else on the property, then the resident needs to call a plumbing service, when the sewer backs-up out on the street, then the resident should call City Hall.

### MAINTENANCE AND PREVENTION

There are a few things that a homeowner can do to reduce the risk of the sewer line backing-up. Let's start with the kitchen sink. First and foremost, don't pour fat, oil or grease (sometimes referred to as FOG) down the kitchen sink. The drain in your sink goes into the sewer pipe and FOG clogs the line. Over time it builds up and restricts the flow and causes the sewer to back-up into the house.

Another major cause of sewer spills is caused when pipes crack and release moisture into the soil. Tree roots are attracted to this moisture and eventually build up a root ball that breaks the sewer line.

The third major cause of breaking or cracking sewer lines is land movement.

When the earth shifts, lines become strained and develop cracks and or break. There is not much that can be done about land movement except to be alert for the telltale signs and odors of a sewer leak.

### CONTAMINATION TO THE BEACH

If a sewer spill gets into the street, most likely it will flow into the storm drain outlets that are located along the gutter. The City has about eleven hundred of these storm outlets and what goes into them, flows directly to the beach. That is why it is so important to catch sewer spills as quickly as possible at their point of origin.

Federal regulations impose fines in the tens of thousands of dollars on a city for sewage leaks that go unchecked. These regulations were adopted to protect the Santa Monica Bay area and the coastline of Rancho Palos Verdes is part of that bay.

### DO YOUR PART TO PREVENT SPILLS

What can you do to help prevent the next sewer overflow?

The sanitary sewer is designed to hold only three things: used water; human waste and toilet paper.

**Do Not:** Pour grease, fats and oils from cooking down the drain.

**Do Not:** Use the toilet as a wastebasket.

**Do Not:** Use the sewer as a means to dispose of food scraps.

**Do:** Collect grease in a container and dispose of it in the garbage.

**Do:** Place food scraps in a waste container or garbage bag for disposal with solid waste or start a compost pile. RPV has rebates on composting bins available to all residents, simply call 310-544-5252 for more information.

**Do:** Use a wastebasket in the bathroom to dispose of personal hygiene products. Of course, disposable diapers should not be flushed down the toilet.

The City is working with restaurants and markets to prevent sewer backups, but this is a problem that every resident needs to help reduce. Practicing these suggestions will help you avoid costly plumbing bills.

In the event of a sewer back up or overflow on public property, such as in the roadway, call Rancho Palos Verdes Public Works Department at 310 544-5252. If a problem occurs after these hours, call the Sheriff's Department at 310 539-1661.

## CITY MEETS STATE'S MANDATE

### 50% WASTE DIVERSION GOAL ACHIEVED

The City recently submitted its 2002 annual report to the State's Integrated Waste Management Board and for the first time the City reported a diversion rate greater than 50%. The City reached this state mandated 50% mark by gradually and continually improving recycling and waste reduction programs, such as the citywide green waste program started in 1998.

Another reason the City was able to cross the fifty percent mark was the effort put forth a few years ago to establish a new base year. By taking this step the City was able to erase some of the "built-in" errors that were a part of the early diversion numbers which resulted in the City not getting credit for the recycling that was in place when the diversion rates were first calculated.

The City's history of diversion reads as follows:

The City expects continued improvement in these numbers with the introduction of green waste recycling in the area previously serviced by Ivy Rubbish and with City tree trimming and road way contracts now containing a recycling clause.

The City will be offering rebates of up to \$70 to residents for the purchase of a composting bin. If you can't make this workshop, plan on attending the June 5 workshop scheduled to be held at the South Coast Botanic Garden.

## AFTER 30 YEARS IT'S GOOD BYE IVY RUBBISH

### IT'S HELLO TO UNIVERSAL WASTE SYSTEMS

After servicing the Portuguese Bend and Palos Verdes Drive South areas of the of the City faithfully for over 30 years, Bonnie and Ron Ivy have decided to retire. Known for their tailor-made service such as back-yard pickup, never complaining about weight or volume and knowing their customers' names, Ivy Rubbish has truly been a mom and pop business. While Bonnie ran the office, her husband Ron drove the truck six days a week, picking up on Thanksgiving, New Year's Day, July Fourth and Memorial Day. Vacations were unheard of and, thankfully, sick days were few and far between.

Some customers may remember that before Ron started driving the truck in 1976, it was Bonnie's father, Marvin Hemmah who drove it for twenty years. At that time the business was called Hemmah Rubbish Disposal. This past February, Bonnie and Ron decided to hang it up and take life a little easy, however, to ensure a smooth transition Ron will still be driving the truck for the next year.

This past February the City Council approved the assignment of the Ivy Rubbish contract to Universal Waste Systems, which is also a family owned business that has been servicing Los Angeles and San



Bernardino Counties for 30 years. The Ivys and the City will work closely with Universal to make this an easy transition for both the haulers and the customers.

Universal will introduce "green" waste collection to the routes starting June 2004 and to facilitate the separation of the green waste, customers will be given free green waste cans sometime during the month of May.

Some streets will have their collection day changed, but customers will be given advance notice of any service changes in their May billing. There will be no change in the rates. Customers having any questions about their service, should call Ivy Rubbish at (310) 379-1024.

## CITY COUNCIL SETS GOALS

acquisition of the 53-acre Shoreline Park from Los Angeles County, and the purchase of 98 acres in the Barkentine Canyon area in 2001. The Barkentine property cost \$3.9 million and was paid for by Measure A funds, a bond measure approved by the voters of Los Angeles County in 1996.

At the January work shop, the Council decided to continue aggressive pursuit of Federal, State and local funds for the purchase of 685 acres of privately owned property in the Portuguese Bend area for preservation as open space. It is expected that the cost of this property will be \$27 million. To pay for this purchase, the City has committed \$1 million of non-general fund monies and has set a schedule for obtaining \$1 million from Los Angeles County, \$2 million from the federal government and \$17 million from State Park bond proceeds. In addition, the Palos Verdes Land Conservancy has set out to obtain financial contributions from private local sources. No bond measures to raise the money are being proposed.

If all goes according to plan, the City should have ownership of the property by early December, which will clear the way for a Public Use Master Plan (PUMP) to be prepared. The PUMP will address issues such as public access, trailhead locations, parking, trail use, fencing, signage, fire management, minimizing impacts to adjacent neighborhoods and any other public use issues that may arise before the Portuguese Bend Nature Preserve is formally opened to the public by, hopefully, March 2005.

### OPEN SPACE, PARK AND RECREATION MASTER PLAN

The City's Parks Master Plan was written in 1989 and was in need of review. To perform that review, in

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May 2002 the City Council created the 13-member Open Space Planning and Recreation & Parks Task Force. Their charge was to investigate the City's existing resources and unmet needs, and to advise the Council on updating the Parks Master Plan, including recommendations for utilization of City parks and open space properties.



At a meeting held on January 20 the City Council considered some of the Task Force's recommendations and decided to maintain Lower Point Vicente for passive recreational use only. Additionally, the Council directed staff to investigate action plans, budgets, and timetables for the construction of up to four softball fields at locations in Rancho Palos Verdes; and, that staff should gather information necessary to support negotiations with the other Peninsula cities for softball locations on sites within their jurisdictions.

By December of this year it is expected that the City Council will approve the Master Plan and will direct staff to develop a schedule. Depending upon costs and budgetary constraints, by June 2005 the Council should be able to approve a phasing program and direct staff to proceed with design and financing plans.

the addition and relocation of golf course tees and the addition of water features approved by the City Council. Ocean Trails also plans on making some future clubhouse modifications, including the addition of a day spa and more restaurant space. Furthermore, there is also a proposal to replace some residential lots (on the west side of the project) with a driving range sometime in the future. This change will be reviewed by the City Council at a public hearing.

Ocean Trails expects that the full 18-hole golf course will open in June 2004. In the interim, while the owner completes the golf course construction, 15 holes of the golf course are open for public use, as are most of the public trails in and around the project site. Additionally, restaurants, the pro shop and the banquet facilities are currently open at the Clubhouse. Of the 75 residential lots, 36 have been approved through Final Map No. 50667 and therefore may be sold and developed. In fact, the developer has submitted plans to the City for five of these residential lots. The entire project is owned and is being developed by Donald Trump Properties. They have offices located on-site.

### LONG POINT HOTEL AND GOLF COURSE PROJECT

This project is located on the former Marineland property. In August 2002, the City Council approved the project which consists of a 400-room resort hotel (bungalows included) with a golf academy/practice facility (three golf holes). Furthermore, the project includes 50 casitas (a maximum of three keys per unit), 32 single keyed villa units, conference center, golf club house, a spa, related commercial uses, restaurants, public trails and park areas, coastal access points, 100 public parking spaces, natural open space and habitat areas. The owner has informed the City that they are currently in the process of obtaining the necessary financing to construct the project.

### OCEANFRONT RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

Oceanfront is a 79-home single-family subdivision located on the seaward side of Palos Verdes Drive West at the southerly terminus of Hawthorne Boulevard. The project was originally approved in 1992 and when completed will include 79 single-family homes on 20,000 to 30,000 square foot lots. Seventy-one acres of this site have been dedicated to the City as open space, including at least 30 acres of coastal sage scrub habitat. The project provides a loop road along the bluff, a 25-space parking lot and pedestrian and bicycle trails. The current developer, Capital Pacific Holdings (CPH), purchased the project in 1997 and construction began in 1998. Thus far, CPH has built 27 homes.

In June 2002, Warmington Homes submitted planning applications to

develop 20 new homes on vacant lots that it purchased from CPH at the southerly end of the Oceanfront project (directly abutting the Point Vicente Interpretive Center). The homes proposed by Warmington are now under construction and when completed will comply with the current development standards for Oceanfront. These homes are all single-story and generally smaller than the homes built by CPH.

### YORK LONG POINT ASSOCIATES POINT VIEW MORATORIUM EXCLUSION REQUEST

The subject property, known alternately as "Point View" or "Lower Filiorum," is located along the south-central coastline of the City at 6001 Palos Verdes Drive South. The property is approximately 94 acres in area, and is designated by the City's Land Use Policy Map and Zoning Map for single-family residential use at densities of 1 to 2 units per acre. The site is bounded by Wayfarers Chapel to the east, single-family residential neighborhoods (Portuguese Bend and Upper Abalone Cove) to the north and west, and Palos Verdes Drive South and the City's Abalone Cove Beach Park to the south. Approximately 60 acres of the site are located within the City's Landslide Moratorium Area (LMA), with the remaining 34 acres outside of the LMA and, therefore, not subject to the development restrictions imposed upon undeveloped property. The site is subject to the development standards and performance criteria established by the Urban and Natural overlay control districts, and is also adjacent to the City's proposed NCCP Preserve, with portions of the property to be dedicated to the Preserve post-development. This property is not within the City's Coastal Specific Plan district.

The owner is requesting the exclusion of the Point View property from the City's Landslide Moratorium Area. This proposal would remove up to 60 acres of the Point View property from the moratorium area and would allow York Long Point to formally submit and pursue the development of the property. At this time, York Long Point proposes developing the site with 84 single-family residences as a residential planned development. To accomplish this would require approximately 2 to 4 million cubic yards of remedial grading to remove existing landslide material from the site and approximately 1.4 million cubic yards of non-remedial grading to create streets, residential lots and common slope areas. An Environmental Impact Report (EIR) will be prepared for this project and will address the environmental impacts of both the moratorium exclusion request and the future development proposal.

## UNIVERSAL WASTE MAKES CHANGES

### FORMER IVY RUBBISH COLLECTION AREA GETS NEW SERVICES

Starting June 1 the area of the City serviced by Universal Waste Systems, formerly serviced by Ivy Rubbish, will get some new services such as green waste collection and some changes in collection days.

- Green waste and yard waste recycling will be added. Free green waste containers will be distributed to customers in May.
- Bulky item pickup will be on a call-in basis. Typically, these items will be picked up on the service day after the request is made.

- Commingled recycled (paper, newspaper, bottles, cans, glass, magazines, cardboard, used oil and used oil filters) will be collected on the first collection day of the week.

- Green waste will be collected on the second collection day of the week.
- Some customers will have new service days.

A detailed notice will be mailed out to customers in May.
