## STORM DRAIN REPAIR PROGRAM – A PROGRESS UPDATE

### HIGH PRIORITY PROJECTS MOVING FORWARD



#### CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

The City's storm drain system collects and carries storm water runoff to the ocean. The system includes drainage pipes, inlets, outlets and natural drainage courses. Maintaining the system in good condition helps keep the ocean clean, minimizes property damage, bluff erosion, mud flows and traffic problems due to floods and sinkholes. The City and its residents paid a heavy price when the winter storms in 2005 resulted in more than \$12 million in property damage claims against the City.

#### WHY WE HAVE A PROBLEM

When Rancho Palos Verdes incorporated in 1973, we inherited approximately 200 corrugated metal storm drain pipe systems. Most of the City's storm drain system was installed over 50 years ago – before most of our homes were even built! The storm drain infrastructure was designed and constructed with the expectation of large, rural lots. Instead, the City was developed with residential neighborhoods with beautiful homes, but on smaller, more suburban-sized lots.

Approximately 90 corrugated metal pipes run under the roadways that serve as major traffic arteries. Based upon video inspections that have been performed over the last several years, about 80% of the

metal pipes are worn out to the point where the bottoms are severely compromised or missing altogether (see photo above). According to Ron Dragoo, Senior Engineer for the City, "Each time we poke a camera into a storm drain, we find something that needs immediate repair".

The City's Water Quality and Flood Protection program was created following a vote of the property owners in 2005 to establish a dedicated annual storm drain fee that raised about \$1.2 million during FY06-07. The funding derived from this program, along with the contribution of General fund reserves the City has saved up over the last few years, have jump started the needed repairs.

#### WHAT WE'VE ACCOMPLISHED SO FAR

Due to their age, many of the City's corrugated metal drainage pipes

have rusted completely through the bottom. Since the storm drain repair program began, the City has already spent about \$1.6 million to complete about 40 storm drain lining projects throughout the City. Lining the metal drainage pipes by injecting a polymer material seals the ruptured sections of the drainage pipe, stops soil erosion and reduces the likelihood of a catastrophic pipe failure that could result in property damage. The polymer storm drain lining process allows the City to repair failed drain pipes without trenching, especially across busy streets. The City recently avoided closing Hawthorne and Palos Verdes Drive while repairing storm drains using the lining process. In most every storm drain lining project, the cost is significantly less than trenching, removing and replacing failed storm drains.

The Public Works Department has also recently received a grant funded by through Proposition 50 to install 89 storm water filtration devices in the City. The devices were installed on storm drain curb inlets that drain directly into the Santa Monica Bay. Their purpose is to prevent trash from entering the storm drains, minimizing the pollution that would normally end up in our canyons and on local beaches. The entire \$320,000 cost of construction and oversight was paid for by the grant.

#### MAJOR DRAINAGE PROJECTS ON THE HORIZON

The winter storms of 2005 damaged a number of properties with mud and debris flows in the Lower Abalone Cove neighborhood (Barkentine Road/Sea Cove Drive) and particularly along the coastal bluff edge. During the storm, the McCarrell Canyon inlet was overwhelmed with debris and storm water flow. The City Council recently decided to transfer approximately \$3 million of General fund reserves to the program during FY07-08, and staff has already started the design for a permanent solution for storm water runoff through McCarrell Canyon that will improve drainage through the Lower Abalone Cove and Palos Verdes Bay Club neighborhoods and out to the ocean. The project is expected to begin construction in early 2008.

Construction of the \$1.8 million Sunnyside Ridge project adjacent to Palos Verdes Drive East is scheduled to begin this summer. The yellow marks across Palos Verdes Drive East on the photograph (on page 4) show the locations of storm drain repair projects included in the Sunnyside Ridge project. When completed, the storm drain improvements will

## NEW TRASH COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Beginning on June 4th, approximately 50% of Waste Management's customers will have a change in their trash and recycling collection days. Under the current schedule, there are trucks on the

streets and containers at the curb throughout the City four days a week. The City Council approved Waste Management's request to modify its truck routes and collection schedule in order to

improve overall operational efficiency and minimize impacts on our neighborhoods.

Under the new plan, routes and collection days will be consolidated based on two large geographic areas. Using Crenshaw Boulevard as the dividing line, the City will be split into two areas: West of Crenshaw and East of Crenshaw. All of the Westside homes would be serviced only on Monday/Thursday, and all of the Eastside homes will be serviced only on Tuesday/Friday. This re-

## ASK ABIGAIL!



The Department of Planning, Building and Code Enforcement has a Planning Technician available to assist the public in person or on the phone with general planning questions during regular business hours. Here's a sample of the kind of questions Planning Technician Abigail Harwell answers for the public on a daily basis.

### Dear Abigail:

I just bought a house in the Miraleste area of the City and I want to do a small addition. Having the original building plans would be a big help, but the seller did not have a copy of them. Does the Planning Department keep copies of plans for homes?

### Dear Mystified:

You're in luck! Although the City generally does not have original house plans in its files, the Palos Verdes Homes Association (also known as the Art Jury) does have original plans for homes in the Miraleste area of Rancho Palos Verdes. The Homes Association's office is located at 320 Palos Verdes Drive West in Palos Verdes Estates, and its phone number is (310) 373-6721. Welcome to the City!

### Dear Abigail:

I'd like to put up a fence or wall in my front yard to keep the neighborhood animals and kids off my new lawn. What's the maximum height for a fence or wall that I can build without a permit?

### Dear Fence:

In most neighborhoods, the City limits the height of freestanding walls, fences and hedges in the front yard to three-and-a-half feet, which requires no Planning or

Building permits. However, if your wall retains soil or a slope, it may still need a building permit, even if it complies with the 3-1/2-foot height limit. It's best to check with both the Planning and Building & Safety Divisions before building any fence or wall to determine what (if any) permits are required. My son's Boy Scout troop will be having a fundraising car wash and they'd like to put up signs to advertise it. I see banners put up at intersections all over the Peninsula for different groups. Are permits required for these banners? If so, how do I get one for my son's troop and how many can I put up in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes?

### Dear Scout's Honor:

The City issues free permits to non-commercial organizations for temporary special event signs. The only authorized location for these signs is at the northeast corner of Hawthorne Boulevard and Silver Spur Road, across the street from Peninsula High School. Sign space may be reserved on a first-come, first-served basis no more than 90 days in advance of the event advertised by the sign, and signs may be posted for a maximum of 30 days. There are only 4 sign "slots" at the City's authorized location, and they tend to book up quickly. Stop by our offices to check about sign slot availability on a specific date—and good luck with your fundraiser!

## BE PREPARED FOR THE NEXT EMERGENCY

### IT'S NEVER TOO LATE TO LEARN SOMETHING NEW...

First aid, CPR, fire suppression, public utility hazards, and search and rescue are some training topics provided by the Los Angeles County Fire and Sheriff Department through the CERT Program at no cost to residents.

CERT stands for Community Emergency Response Team, a national program designed to engage citizens to become self-reliant before, during and immediately after an emergency or disaster incident.

In the last few years, the Palos Verdes Peninsula CERT program has trained over 300 people. PVP CERT offers a realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations

where citizens may be initially on their own and their actions can make a difference.

PVPCert's Goals are to:

- Prepare you, your family and your home to survive a disaster;
- Prepare you to assist your family and others in times of a disaster; and
- Prepare volunteer teams of Peninsula residents to support emergency personnel in a disaster scenario.

### SAFE WATER TIP:

The preferred way to purify water is to fully boil water for 1 minute, then cool before drinking. An alternative is to use pure chlorine bleach. Add 1/2 teaspoon or 16 drops for every 1-gallon of water. Stir, then let stand for 30 minutes before drinking.

## SENIOR CITIZEN DISCOUNT APPLICATION PROCESS ON TRASH BILLS

Waste Management and Universal Waste Systems have been offering senior citizen (65 years and older) customers a 10% discount on their trash bills. In the coming months, there will be some important changes to this program. The discount has to be applied for on an annual basis and a new application/certification form and process needs to be completed. All customers currently considered seniors, should have received a letter and the new application form from your hauler. Please complete the application form and provide the needed documents and application; otherwise you may not continue to receive the discount. The items required are:

1. a new annual application/certification form
2. Proof of property ownership
3. Proof of "primary" resident and being head of household
4. proof of age (65 years and older)
5. having no outstanding/past due balances

## MEDICAL SHARPS/NEEDLE DISPOSAL



Medical sharps are used in many homes to administer medications, such as allergy shots and insulin, and to monitor physical states such as blood sugar levels. It is illegal for medical sharps, such as disposable hypodermic syringes and lancets to be thrown in trash or recycling containers.

The Gaffey SAFE Center, located at 1400 N. Gaffey Street (across the railroad tracks, off of Capital Drive, opposite the DMV office) in San Pedro accepts sharps (in addition to household hazardous waste and electronics waste), free of charge. Items are accepted every Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Place the sharps in special secure containers to avoid accidental "sticks" while handling. The improper disposal of used needles, lancets, and medical sharps can injure children, home health care providers, sanitation workers and pets through accidental "sticks". Needles can be contaminated with hepatitis, or other communicable infections. For more information

Additionally, Waste Management offers RPV customers a convenient, easy and safe way to dispose sharps through its Sharps Disposal, by mail, program. This program is not free. Containers are available in various sizes ranging from 1 quart to 2 gallons and the fee varies with the container size. A container will be mailed to you in a government approved exterior shipping box with instructions for use. Used sharps are placed inside the container for safe storage and once full, the container is closed, bagged and sealed inside its original packaging. Residents return the postage pre-paid box to their mail carrier or nearest post office. ## WHAT'S NEW AT THE POINT VICENTE INTERPRETIVE CENTER?

It's hard to believe that the expanded Point Vicente Interpretive Center has been open for almost a year. More than 25,000 visitors of all ages and from countries around the world have toured the new museum, which is almost four times larger than the original Center. With the recent addition of 20 new members, the museum's Los Serenos docents are always on hand to share information about local history, geology, habitat, and the gray whale's majestic annual migration.

PVIC's Sunset Room has proven to be very popular as a rental site for private celebrations. Dozens of weddings have already taken place in the nearby amphitheater which boasts incredible ocean and Catalina Island views. From their terrace perch on the Interpretive Center's oceanside patio, volunteers with the


