



LATEST OPEN SPACE ACQUISITION COMPLETES PALOS VERDES NATURE PRESERVE

After nearly 10 years of attempting to acquire one of the largest remaining parcels of privately owned open space in the City, on December 27, 2009, the City took title to the 191-acre Upper Filiorum property, thus completing the 1,400-acre Palos Verdes Nature Preserve. Working in partnership with the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy (PVPLC), the City purchased the property for \$6.5 million from York Long Point Associates. The majority of funding for the acquisition came from a \$5.5 million grant from the State Coastal Conservancy from a voter approved open space bond. The remainder of the funds came from the City of RPV (\$600,000) and community contributions made to the PVPLC (\$400,000). The Upper Filiorum parcel will serve as a vital



link in the core portion of the overall Preserve by connecting 950 acres of contiguous open space.

Similar to the rest of the Preserve, the property will be open to the public for passive recreational use and will be managed by the PVPLC on behalf of the City. In the coming months, the City will be working with the PVPLC to finalize a trail plan for the property and install trail signage. In the meantime, the public can access the existing trails on the property as the old "no trespassing" signs and barrier

fencing have been removed, thus finally allowing contiguous trail access from the City's Three Sisters Property on the West to the City's Forrestal Property on the East.



PARK RANGERS AT THE PALOS VERDES NATURE PRESERVE

In December 2009, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes initiated a pilot program for park ranger services within the City's 1,400-acre Palos Verdes Nature Preserve (Preserve) by establishing a contract with the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA). The City's Preserve is part of the State's

Natural Communities Conservation Plan (NCCP) created in 1991 to protect natural wildlife diversity while allowing for compatible development and growth. The Preserve is comprised of ten separate reserves, all within the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, most of which boast beautiful ocean views and contain protected habitat and wildlife such as coastal sage scrub, the Palos Verdes blue butterfly, the coastal cactus wren, and the California gnatcatcher. The Preserve is open to the public, and contains a vast array of recreational trails that accommodate hikers, bicyclists, and equestrians.



Within the last year, the City has transitioned from land acquisition to habitat restoration and public recreation within the Preserve. In April 2008, the City Council adopted the Preserve Trails Plan, outlining trail routes and trail uses within

2010 CENSUS "IT'S SAFE, IT'S EASY AND IT'S IMPORTANT"

In the United States, every 10 years, the population is counted. Census data is used to determine political representation and the distribution of more than \$300 billion every year. The money helps to fund new schools, emergency services, transportation needs, and other community needs. Residents throughout Rancho Palos Verdes are encouraged to complete and return the short-form questionnaire that will soon be mailed to all addresses throughout the City. For those who did not receive the questionnaire in the mail, forms will be available at select public sites.

THE CENSUS IN A SNAPSHOT

- **What:** The census is a count of everyone residing in the United States.
- **Who:** All U.S. residents must be counted – both citizens and non-citizens.
- **When:** You will be receiving your questionnaire in March 2010 either by U.S. mail or hand delivery. Some people in remote areas will be counted in person.
- **Why:** The U.S. Constitution requires a national census once

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT NEW ONE STOP PERMIT CENTER OPENS

For decades, residents who have come into City Hall seeking permits to make improvements to their property have had to obtain their planning approvals and building permits in one building and pay for their permits in another building. Furthermore, if their home improvement project required a dumpster or other minor work in the City's street right-of-way, applicants would have to obtain

that permit from a different City department. In January of this year, the City unveiled its new One Stop Permit Center which consolidated all of these services in one place in the Community Development Department (formally known as the Department of Planning, Building and Code Enforcement).

the Preserve (hiking, bicycling, equestrian, or a combination of these uses). With the adoption of the Preserve Trails Plan and the increased public use of the Preserve, the City chose to provide park ranger services as a means to protect the Preserve's unique habitat and enforce the City's open space rules and regulations.

The MRCA Park Rangers patrol the Preserve throughout the week, providing assistance as well as public education on the surrounding environment. They also enforce the City's parkland rules, as set forth in the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code, such as proper trail use, dogs on leashes, and park hours. The MRCA Rangers are experienced California Peace Officers with the authority to issue citations and

make arrests, and are also Wildland Firefighters that carry firefighting equipment in the vehicles they use to patrol the Preserve.

The Park Rangers work closely with the City's Recreation and Parks Department staff to identify areas of concern and submit regular status reports on their findings and activities within the Preserve, including the number of visitor contacts made, potential hazards, and citations issued. The Park Rangers are an invaluable resource as they keep the City informed about the activities occurring within the Preserve. The Rangers have been exceptional in enforcing activity restrictions in the Preserve area damaged by the August 2009 fire to allow re-growth in the burn areas. The Rangers have also been helpful in surveying and reporting trail damage caused by the recent heavy winter storms. Based on the overwhelming support from the community and the success of this pilot program, the City is exploring the possible expansion of MRCA Park Ranger services within the Preserve in the future. United States Census 2010

every 10 years to count the population and determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives.

- **How:** Households should complete and mail back their questionnaires upon receipt. Households that do not respond may receive a replacement questionnaire in early April. Identifiable census takers will visit households that do not return questionnaires to take a count in person.

2010 CENSUS QUESTIONNAIRE: EASY, IMPORTANT AND SAFE

- With only 10 questions, the 2010 Census questionnaire takes approximately 10 minutes to complete. Households are asked to provide key demographic information, including: whether a housing unit is rented or owned; the address of the residence; and the names, genders, ages and races of others living in the household.
- By law, the Census Bureau cannot share an individual's responses with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement entities.

2010 CENSUS KEY DATES

February - March 2010

- Census questionnaires are mailed or delivered to households

March - April 2010

- Be Counted program is implemented. Census questionnaires are available at select public sites for individuals who did not receive one by mail

May - July 2010

- Identifiable Census takers visit households that did not return a questionnaire by mail

To create the One Stop Permit Center, the City's cashing services have been moved from the main receptionist area to the Community Development Department building. In addition, the public counter area has been expanded to accommodate more customers at the counter and in the lobby area and is designed to be ADA accessible. Along with these physical changes, the Community Development Department Staff now issues dumpster permits, mailbox permits and curb core permits, permits which were formerly issued by the City's Public Works Department.

As a result of this change, residents or contractors who come into City Hall for home improvement projects can now obtain all of their permits in one place. In addition, residents seeking to renew their home occupation permits/business licenses to work out of their home can do so at the One Stop Permit Center. CALIFORNIA'S NEW GREEN BUILDING STANDARDS CODE

The California Building Standards Commission (CBCS) has recently published the draft edition of the California Green Building Standards Code. The intent of the new code is to greatly increase water and energy efficiency standards, lower the use of volatile organic compounds (VOC's) in building materials, and increase the percentages of construction waste that must be diverted from landfills.

The California Green Building Standards Code, now known by its acronym, CALGreen, is the first-in-the-nation mandatory green building standards code. Compliance is currently voluntary, but mandatory compliance is proposed to take effect on January 1, 2011. Once a building passes the inspection process, the property can then be labeled as CALGreen compliant. At this time the new code will apply to new construction only.

The CALGreen Building Standards Code was specifically designed to reduce the impact on the environment of all buildings in the state. To achieve this, a minimum mandatory set of standards has been established that will apply to all buildings - schools, hospitals, residential occupancies, as well as commercial facilities. The ultimate goal is to provide a uniform and consistent code that can be used in coordination with all other California building codes.

Among the new requirements under CALGreen, every new building in California will have to reduce water consumption by 20 percent, divert 50 percent of construction waste from landfills and install low VOC materials. Separate indoor and outdoor water meters for nonresidential buildings and moisture-sensing irrigation systems for large landscape

projects will also be required. There will be mandatory inspections of energy systems, such as furnaces and air conditioners for non-residential buildings over 10,000 square feet. According to the California Air Resources Board, the mandatory provisions will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 3,000,000 metric tons by 2020.

The draft edition of the 2010 California Green Building Standards code is currently available for viewing at the California Building Standards Commission website at www.bsc.ca.gov.



No service on Monday, September 6th, Labor Day. All routes will be delayed by one day.
