MEASURE C: CHARTER CITY INITIATIVE

After several duly noticed public meetings (on 4/6/10, 6/29/10, 7/6/10, 8/3/10, 9/7/10 and 10/5/10), the City Council unanimously approved placing Measure C, the Charter City Initiative, on the ballot for the March 8, 2011 Special Municipal Election.

At that election, the City's voters will consider the following question:

"Shall the proposed City Charter be adopted to change the City of Rancho Palos Verdes from a general law city to a charter city?"

GENERAL LAW CITIES VERSUS CHARTER CITIES

In California, there are two types of cities: general law and charter cities. According to the League of California Cities, approximately 120 of the 480 California cities are charter cities.

The authority of a general law city is derived from the powers granted to it by the California Constitution and by the general laws adopted by the California Legislature. On the other hand, a charter city's powers are derived from the California Constitution and are not defined or limited by the state's general laws regarding local municipal affairs. Instead, with respect to municipal

affairs, a charter city's powers are defined by the city's own charter, subject to the limitations of the state and federal constitutions. A city's charter is thus a unique document that, in many ways, acts like a constitution for the city.

A charter can only be adopted, amended or repealed by a majority vote of a city's voters. A charter transfers the power to adopt legislation affecting municipal affairs from the state legislature to the city. Becoming a charter city allows voters to determine how their city government is organized and, with respect to municipal affairs, enact legislation different than that adopted by the state.

Following are the advantages commonly attributed to charter cities:

First, becoming a charter city allows for increased control over the city's own municipal affairs, including municipal finances.

Second, charter cities have expansive authority to enter into design-build contracts. The design-build process allows a city to contract with a single entity that both designs and constructs a

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LOWER HESSE PARK AND GRANDVIEW PARK IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is currently in the process of improving two City park sites: Lower Hesse Park (29301 Hawthorne Boulevard) and Grandview Park (Montemalaga Drive between Via Panorama and Grayslake Road). In November and December 2010, after a thorough public outreach

process, the City Council reviewed conceptual plans of the two parks, and directed staff to proceed with the environmental review process for the Lower Hesse Park Pacific Plan and the Grandview Park Sycamore Plan. The City Council also

LAST DAY TO REGISTER

Tuesday, February 22, 2011 is the last day to register to vote in the March 8, 2011 election. You will need to re-register if you have moved to a new address, changed your name, or changed your political party affiliation. 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VOTE BY MAIL

PERMANENT VOTE BY MAIL VOTER STATUS

Under state law, a voter may apply for permanent vote by mail status. As a permanent vote by mail voter, you will no longer have to apply to vote by mail for each future election. A ballot will automatically be mailed to you for each election in which you are eligible to vote. If you have already registered to permanently vote by mail, you should receive your vote by mail ballot for this election. As of

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SAN RAMON CANYON PROJECT STUDY REPORT UPDATE

The San Ramon Canyon / 25th Street Stabilization (a.k.a. Palos Verdes Drive East / Palos Verdes Drive South Roadway Stabilization) Project is located in the south-eastern corner of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes at its border with the City of Los Angeles. The canyon also adjoins L.A. County's Regional Friendship Park. The canyon provides a natural drainage course for neighborhoods near Palos Verdes Drive East. Landslide induced rock and soil deposits in the canyon bottom are being transported by heavy rainfall events down the canyon and are flooding the roadway, overwhelming existing drainage facilities, endangering nearby roadway integrity and threatening downstream residents.



Due to the complex nature of the problem, an extensive study was completed to produce a Project Study Report (PSR). The first draft PSR was received from the City's consultant, Harris and Associates, in October 2010. The report has been formally received by the City Council for their consideration. The report will be presented as a public workshop scheduled to occur during the March 1, 2011 City Council meeting.

the canyon, connecting with the existing system in the City of Los Angeles, immediately above 25th Street. The other takes a more direct route by tunneling from the canyon to the beach and remaining within the City limits of Rancho Palos Verdes.

Each of the alternatives were evaluated on a number of criteria, including the ability of the design to fulfill all the goals successfully; environmental impacts; cost; constructibility and the length of time it would take for approval from the various government agencies. After a thorough evaluation of all alternatives, the consultants recommended the tunnel alignment. The scheduled public workshop will allow the public to comment on the report and listen to the city council's discussion of a preferred alternative and authorization of next steps.

INTERIM DESIGNS TO STABILIZE SWITCHBACKS

Harris and Associates is working on the design of an Early Action Palos Verdes Drive East Switchback Stabilization Project to provide protection to the lower switchbacks. This design will be completed early in 2011. The interim project will only be built in the event that PVDE roadway instability becomes imminent prior to construction of the main project

INTERIM SOLUTIONS FOR FLOODING AT 25TH STREET

The City is working on a formal agreement with the City of Los Angeles to maintain the area immediately upstream of 25th Street. This involves preparing the area for incoming storms, positioning equipment on location during the storm and to immediately clean up after every major event.

THE REPORT

SOLICITATION IN RPV

Have you ever sat down for dinner with your family, only to hear a knock at your door from someone selling goods, services, or asking for a donation? Are you a member of a nonprofit organization and you want to go door-to-door seeking support? Whichever position you're in, there are important details about solicitation in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes you should know:

- Solicitors must not solicit any residences that prominently display a "Do Not Disturb/No Advertisements" sign.
- Solicitors must not "forcefully" solicit any individual who states that they do not wish to be solicited.
- Solicitors must not drop, throw, scatter, or cast any newspaper, handbill, pamphlet, circular, leaflet, or any other advertising sheet to any residential property without the express consent of the owner or occupant. All flyers or handbills must be secured to the property in such a way as to eliminate the hazards of randomly scattered litter.

- Solicitors cannot solicit before 8 a.m. or after 8 p.m., unless they are specifically invited onto the property.

Solicitors engaging in the sale of goods or services in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes are required to have a current City business license. However, nonprofit organizations, as defined by the City's Municipal Code, are not required to obtain a business license related to solicitation. To obtain a business license, please contact the Community Development Department at 310-544-5228.

READY! SET! GO! YOUR PERSONAL WILDFIRE ACTION PLAN

While the Palos Verdes Peninsula is certainly no stranger to the perils of wildland fires, in some ways we are more vulnerable than in the past. Our city has nearly reached its maximum potential build-out, bringing more homes and people closer to fire prone areas. In addition, the landscaping around our homes has had 30 to 40 years to mature, increasing the amount of combustible materials in and around our neighborhoods. Now more than ever, we need to increase our awareness of the dangers of wildland fires and take proactive steps to protect our families and property, even if we don't live immediately adjacent to any open space and canyon areas. With this goal in mind, the Los Angeles County Fire Department has created the Ready! Set! Go! Program (RSG), which provides an excellent guide to help make Rancho Palos Verdes a fire-adaptive community.

surrounding it have been prepared, homeowners must prepare their families.

This means creating a family disaster plan that includes meeting locations, communication plans and evacuation routes. The program also advocates fire extinguisher training; learning how to shut off gas, electric and water service; and assembling home emergency supplies.

When a wildland fire starts, **Set!** instructs homeowners to closely follow the progress of the fire and begin to assemble their belongings for an evacuation. There are checklists for both inside and outside of the home so residents can make final preparations ahead of an evacuation.

READY!

This first phase teaches homeowners to prepare their property well in advance of a fire. In fact, the suggestions made in this phase, if adopted widely, would be an excellent start to establishing a fire-adaptive community. The **Ready!** phase covers:

- Defensible space;
- The removal of ladder fuels (live or dead vegetation that allows a fire to climb upward from the ground);
- Fire-safe construction; and
- Fire-resistant landscaping.

SET!

The **Set!** phase of the program stresses emergency preparedness and situational awareness. Once the home itself and the property

Go!

If homeowners have followed the program to this point, their homes and families are prepared and they have done everything they reasonably can to ensure the safety of both, so why wait to evacuate? Early evacuation is a key component in RSG.

By leaving early, even before evacuation orders are given, residents ensure their safety and give firefighters the freedom to operate in neighborhoods that have been well prepared to defend against a wildland fire. Because the residents have left, eliminating the life-safety risk, firefighters can concentrate on suppression and structure protection.

public works project, rather than a city separately soliciting proposals from an architect or engineer to design the project and then to solicit bids for a contractor to construct that project. This enables faster completion of projects, eliminates redundancies, reduces risk, and saves costs and taxpayer dollars. Currently, general law cities are restricted to entering into only design-build contracts for particular projects in excess of \$1,000,000. This statutory authorization from the State Legislature will expire in 2016, unless it is renewed or extended by the Legislature. In contrast, charter cities may enter into any design-build contracts, unless restricted by their own charters or ordinances.

Third, although the California Supreme Court currently has a case before it that will determine the future of this advantage, many charter cities have historically exempted themselves from paying prevailing wages, which are required in many public works contracts of general law cities. Prevailing wages are the per diem wages set by the California Department of Industrial Relations. Prevailing wages are significantly higher than industry standard wages. It is commonly estimated that paying prevailing wage adds between 20 and 40 percent to the cost of labor on a public works project. The cost of labor varies with each individual project, but an average labor component of 40 percent of the total cost of a project would be a reasonable estimate. The City and its residents could see significant future savings on many publicly funded projects that are included in the City's Five Year Capital Improvement Plan and in the list of the City's Unfunded (future) Capital Projects. City staff have projected the savings for these two categories of future capital projects to be between \$8.1 and \$16.2 million.

Fourth, charter cities have greater flexibility when it comes to awarding contracts for public works projects. General law cities must competitively bid any public works project over \$5,000. This process can be expensive and can delay projects from moving forward, which also increases costs due to rising costs for materials. Charter cities are not required to adhere to these restrictions. General law cities also are required to select the lowest bidder on such projects, whereas charter cities may opt for a contractor that is more qualified or offers higher-quality construction. In general, charter cities have more flexibility in the area of public works than general law cities.

There are also some disadvantages commonly attributed to becoming a charter city. First, adopting a charter can be time-consuming, and there are significant costs, including conducting an election to adopt the charter, which the City Council unanimously approved when it placed the issue on the March 8th Special Municipal Election. The City Council believes that the potential cost savings for the City would outweigh the costs of conducting the election in March. Second, any subsequent Charter amendments also require elections, unlike ordinances that amend the Municipal Code, and thus they are more costly and time consuming.

Third, there is a transition period in which City staff, Councilmembers, and residents must adjust to becoming a charter city, which requires an education process. Fourth, municipal affairs could change over time due to state legislation and judicial decisions, and thus there may be some adjustments regarding a charter city's authority to legislate in the future in certain areas.

There are still areas of statewide concern that cannot be superseded by a city charter and continue to apply to a charter city. These areas include: school systems, regulation of traffic and vehicles, franchises for telephone or telegraph lines, licensing of members of a trade or profession, tort claims against a governmental entity, taxation of financial corporations such as savings banks, the Ralph M. Brown Act open meetings law, the Meyers-Milias-Brown Act regarding employee organization and collective bargaining, the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and the exercise of the power of eminent domain. If the City of Rancho Palos Verdes adopted a charter and subsequent ordinances, these and any other areas of statewide concern would not be affected by the charter and would still apply to the City.

Additionally, becoming a charter city would not change the basic structure of the City's current government or its functioning. Passing an ordinance would still require a majority vote of the City Council, which is three votes. Council meetings would still have to be noticed with an agenda advising the public of the items to be considered and be open to the public. The day-to-day operations of the City would continue as they always have, with the Council setting the City's policies, and the staff implementing those policies. Pursuant to the California Constitution, the voters' initiative and referendum powers could not be diminished.

THE PROPOSED CHARTER FOR THE CITY OF RANCHO PALOS VERDES

Like a constitution, a charter is intended to outline the basic framework for a city's governance and not specify all details. Because a city's local concerns may change over time, and charter amendments must be approved by the City's voters, detailed restrictions are often left to ordinances. This is similar in philosophy and structure to the federal Constitution, which is short and broad, and federal statutes, which are lengthy and detailed.

The City Council directed the City Attorney to prepare a simple charter, modeled after the charter adopted by the City of Buena Park. The City Council then inserted particular provisions into the Charter as a result of public input and in direct response to the recent scandal that arose in the City of Bell. The following limitations are set forth in the proposed Charter:

- The current city council/city manager form of government shall remain in place.
- The monthly salary paid by the City to council members and

This information is available online to assist you whether you are preparing plans for submittal, or you are preparing for an upcoming building inspection. A link is available which you can use to access the new California Green Building Standards Code. There are also

many other important documents and additional information available online that is specifically related to particular construction topics.

The recent green building and energy code changes will further increase the efficiency of newly constructed buildings built throughout California, and will lessen their impact on our environment. City reimbursement of council members' expenditures shall continue to be limited by the state laws that are applicable to general law cities.

- The charter states that no additional compensation shall be paid to council members for attendance at other meetings of City or City-affiliated commissions, committees, subcommittees, and boards of directors, including the Rancho Palos Verdes Redevelopment Agency and the Rancho Palos Verdes Improvement Authority.
- The charter states that the compensation provided to City staff shall continue to be approved in a transparent manner at duly noticed city council meetings.
- The charter does not permit the City to make gifts of public funds, which are donations of taxpayer dollars for non-public

purposes, because such gifts are prohibited in general law cities.

- The charter states that the City's General Plan is the paramount land use document and expressly requires that the City's Zoning Ordinance must remain consistent with the General Plan.

The City Council appointed a Charter City Committee, which includes two Councilmembers, to facilitate a public outreach program to educate residents about the issues surrounding General Law Cities versus Charter Cities.

KEEP OUR COMMUNITY BEAUTIFUL: HOW TO STORE TRASH CARTS

The City would like to remind residents of the requirements that pertain to the storage of trash carts. Specifically, trash, recycling and green waste carts cannot be placed at the curb for collection earlier than 8 a.m. on the day before collection, and must be there by no later than 7 a.m. on the day of collection in order to be picked up by the City's waste haulers. Once your containers have been emptied, they must be removed from the curb no later than 8 p.m. on the day of collection or two hours following collection, whichever is later. Additionally, carts must be stored so they are substantially screened from view from the street, except when placed at the curb for collection. HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

Need money for home repairs? You could qualify for the Home Improvement Program which is available for single-family properties located within city limits. The program provides a \$7,000 grant and/or a \$13,000 deferred interest loan (0% interest) to eligible homeowners (income qualifications apply). The owner(s) must be currently residing in the housing unit as a primary residence and must reside in the residence for the duration of the loan. Eligible rehabilitation projects for the
