DANGEROUS FIRE SEASON PREDICTED THIS YEAR

It was a banner winter season this year for plant growth on the Palos Verdes Peninsula. For a few brief months, the hillsides were a verdant green awash with wildflowers, including towering yellow mustard bobbing in the wind. However, all of this bounty has dried up and turned to a golden brown, leaving plenty of fuel behind to burn. With the long hot days of summer just around the corner, Los Angeles County fire officials warn that this year's fire season could be one of the most severe on record.



Officials are predicting that this year's fire season will be even worse than last year, when wildfires burned more than 500,000 acres and destroyed at least 1,500 homes throughout Southern California. Many Rancho Palos Verdes residents watched in horror in May 2007 as a brush fire raged across Catalina Island and fire personnel used the City's coastal area to deploy their water-dropping helicopters to fight the conflagration. And certainly, residents living in the Island View and Del Cerro neighborhoods won't soon forget the close call they had in July 2005 when fire fighters were able to subdue a wildfire that burned to the top of the ridge

from Altamira Canyon, just stopping short of many homes.

Many homeowners have already received notices from the County about clearing brush from their properties to reduce the fire hazard and make their homes safer. It's a good idea for every resident to take a look at his or her property and take the following actions:

- Maintain around and adjacent to the dwelling or structure a firebreak made by removing and clearing away, for a distance of not less than 30 feet on each side thereof or to the property line, whichever is nearer, all flammable vegetation or other combustible

growth. This requirement does not apply to single specimens of trees, ornamental shrubbery, or similar plants that are used as ground cover, if they do not form a means of rapidly transmitting fire from the native growth to any dwelling or structure.

- Maintain around and adjacent to the occupied dwelling or occupied structure additional fire protection or firebreaks made by removing all brush, flammable vegetation, or combustible growth that is located from 30 feet to 100 feet from the occupied dwelling or occupied structure or to the property line, whichever is nearer, as may be

required by the local agency if the local agency finds that, because of extra hazardous conditions, a firebreak of only 30 feet around the occupied dwelling or occupied structure is not sufficient to provide reasonable fire safety. Grass and other vegetation located more than 30 feet from the dwelling or structure and less than 18 inches in height above the ground may be maintained where necessary to stabilize the soil and prevent erosion.

- Remove that portion of any tree that extends within 10 feet of the outlet of any chimney or stovepipe.
- Maintain any tree adjacent to, or overhanging, any building free of dead or dying wood.
- Maintain the roof of any structure free of leaves, needles, or other dead vegetative growth.

In preparation for the coming fire season, the Los Angeles County Fire Department held its annual interagency wildland fire training exercise at Ladera Linda Community Center in Rancho Palos Verdes in

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PVIC WINS COUNTY AWARD



On May 13, 2008, the Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space District awarded the City of Rancho Palos Verdes' Point Vicente Interpretive Center with the Spring 2008 Achievement Award. Los Angeles County Supervisor Don Knabe presented Mayor Douglas Stern, Councilmember Steve Wolowicz, Los Serenos Docent President Henry Ott, and Recreation and Parks Senior Analyst Matt Waters with a commemorative plaque at the May 13 Award Ceremony in Downtown Los Angeles.

The Los Angeles County Regional Park and Open Space Program recognizes outstanding and innovative District-funded projects. PVIC was recognized for innovative excellence in the area of design, as the District praised its bold architecture, ideal location boasting 180-degree views of the Pacific Ocean, and its successful integration of the natural environment into its landscaping. The original PVIC building opened to the public in 1984 with a grant from the Open Space District. With other public and private funding, the Center expanded to its present size of nearly 10,000 square feet, and re-opened to the public in July 2006. THE ERA OF "RABBIT-EARS" IS COMING TO AN END

BE PREPARED FOR THE UPCOMING DIGITAL TELEVISION TRANSITION

On February 17, 2009, analog television transmissions will be discontinued across the nation. This federally-mandated transition will free up airwave spectrum for the government to create a national public safety frequency. The difference between analog and digital transmission is that analog uses radio frequency waves to transmit images and is susceptible to interference, while digital transmission uses computer code in the form of ones and zeros to transmit higher quality pictures and sound without interference.

According to a Government Accountability Office survey, only about 21 million U.S. households, or 19%, do not currently make use of digital transmission by subscribing to cable or satellite services. To determine the type of transmission you receive, check labels and manuals to see if your television

set has a digital tuner inside; labels for integrated digital tuners, receivers, HDTV (high-definition television), ATSC and DTV indicate your set is already set for digital television. If you are not able to determine what kind of TV you have, check with the manufacturer or an electronics retailer.

Some options available to persons with analog television transmission include an upgrade to a digital television set, subscription to cable or satellite service, or purchase of a digital converter box for about \$50-\$70. The federal government has set aside \$990 million to provide households a maximum of two \$40 coupons (each) to ease any financial hardship created by the need to purchase converter boxes.

DANGEROUS FIRE SEASON

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May 2008. NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH AND EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

IT'S ALL IN THE NETWORK

While the primary objective of Neighborhood Watch is to reduce crime, it has also developed a communications network that fosters cooperation and the sharing of information among its membership that naturally lends itself to emergency preparedness. By using the same network, it can also play a big role in emergency preparedness. Past experience shows us that the City is vulnerable to natural disasters, such as brush fires, landslides, flooding and earthquakes. Additionally, the City is located between Los Angeles International Airport and the Ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach, as well as five oil refineries, which could be considered terrorist targets.

Neighborhood Watch members know their neighbors, know if they are on vacation, know if they are disabled, and know the layout of their houses. After the Northridge earthquake, The Los Angeles Times reported that areas with Neighborhood Watch reacted much better than those areas without such organization. Their established communications network and post earthquake medical and assessment activities were a great help to fire and law enforcement personnel when they arrived on the scene.

USING THE NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH TEMPLATE

The Emergency Preparedness program is patterned after the current Neighborhood Watch network system that has existed in the City since 1991 and is under the direction of Volunteer Coordinator Gail Lorenzen. Individual blocks and areas throughout the City have

been setting up emergency plans with guidance from the Los Angeles County Sheriff's and Fire Departments. Neighbors hold a short meeting that covers such matters as pre-designating a neighborhood assembly area to organizing individual response teams with specific duties.

Residents fill out a Household Disaster Preparedness Survey that is used to inventory the skills and resources of each person in a participating block and identify residents with special needs or problems that may arise during an emergency. The information is also used to set up a communications network, and if phone service is down, residents will know where their nearest amateur radio and emergency personnel are located. This can be an easy job if it is a shared effort. The U.S. Department of Justice and the National Sheriff's Association awarded the City's Neighborhood Watch Program the national award for the most exemplary neighborhood watch group in the United States.

VOLUNTARY MEMBERSHIP

Like Neighborhood Watch, membership in Emergency Preparedness is voluntary. However, before you decide that you are too busy, too tired or just plain disinterested, think about the possible consequences of not joining. Participation greatly enhances your community's response to a disaster. Whether your neighborhood is already active in Neighborhood Watch and would like to expand their program to include Emergency Preparedness, or if you are interested in starting

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aircraft, courtesy of the Western Museum of Flying, that kids can climb inside and explore. People who want to see what's shaking can check out the "Quake Cottage," an earthquake simulator sponsored by the City's Emergency Preparedness Committee. (Probably shouldn't try that one right after a chili dog.) Also available is a sixty-foot giant slide, sure to thrill even the most experienced ride aficionado.

Visitors who want to test their skills or appetite capacity can enter the always-popular pie eating and hula-hoop contests. There are a number of age categories in both contests and prizes for the top contestants. Even if you don't win, hey, you do get a free pie! Waters added, "These contests are some of my favorite parts of the day. Seeing the kids, and some adults, try to wolf down a whole pie or keep a hoop going for minutes on end while hopping on one foot just never gets old." Both contests take place in front of the stage. Waters also recommends making time for the Jim Gamble puppet show. PROTECT YOURSELF-H.E.L.P. OFFERS TEN TERRIFIC TIPS

The following article is re-printed with permission from H.E.L.P. (Healthcare and Elder Law Programs Corporation), a local non-profit education and counseling center for older adults and families on elder care, law, finances and consumer protection.

We've gathered 10 tips for protecting yourself and your privacy from those nasty folks trying to grab your savings.

1. DO NOT CALL REGISTRY

Avoid telemarketers by signing up with the National Do Not Call Registry, run by the Federal Trade Commission. You can register cell phones and home phones (but not business lines) by calling toll free (888) 382-1222 or going to donotcall.gov. Once you register, telemarketers have 31 days to stop calling. Your registration will last for at least five years. A free service.

2. SCREEN OUT TELEMARKETERS

Buy an inexpensive answering machine and use it to screen you from telemarketers. Let your friends know about the machine – and that they should leave you a message. You can pick up when you hear their voices.

3. GET UNLISTED AT GOOGLE

Find out if your name and address are publicly available by entering your phone number in the Google.com search box. Use the format xxx-xxx-xxxx to enter the number. It's easy to remove your listing.

4. SKIP YOUR MAILBOX FOR OUTGOING MAIL

The bad guys actually go out and steal mail, looking for outgoing checks which they can alter and for personal identity information. Give outgoing mail to your carrier, put it in a locked mailbox or take it to the post office.

5. OPT OUT

Incoming credit card and insurance offers (another identity theft risk) can be stopped by signing up at optoutprescreen.com. You can sign up for five years online. For a lifetime term, print out a form letter, sign and mail it. Or sign up by calling toll free (888) 567-8688. A free service.

6. AVOID JUNK MAIL

Sign up with the Mail Preference Service and be excluded from mailings of Direct Marketing Association members. See dmaconsumers.org/offmailinglist.html to sign up or get more information. \$1 charge per address.

7. A FREE CREDIT REPORT EVERY FOUR MONTHS

By law, you can obtain a free credit report annually from each of the three large credit bureaus. Monitor your reports to spot unauthorized activity and find and correct errors, and maybe even improve your credit score. Ask for a report, from a different bureau, every four months. See the free official government-authorized annualcreditreport.com website or call toll free (877) 322-8228. Note: You will need to provide your Social Security Number. Avoid online look-alikes, which are loaded with fees.

8. FREEZE YOUR CREDIT FILES

Placing a "security freeze" on your credit data makes it unavailable to lenders and others. Freezes make most sense for people who do not expect to apply for a loan or other new credit. Freezing and unfreezing your files costs money (\$10 for each bureau to freeze, for example). For more information see privacy.ca.gov/sheets/cis10/securityfreeze.htm.

9. WATCH OUT FOR LIGHTWEIGHT CREDENTIALS

A week at summer camp is more work than obtaining some lofty-sounding "credentials." Recently, The New York Times highlighted "Certified Senior Advisor," "Certified Retirement Financial Advisor," "Registered Financial Gerontologist" and "Certified Retirement Counselor" among titles that can be earned in just a few days and detailed how these titles have proliferated. Why obtain such a credential? To sell more easily to seniors! See help4srs.org/ seniortruth for more on this.

10. SHRED IT AND FORGET IT

"Dumpster-divers" dig through trash to find personal information. They use (or sell) the information for stealing identities and credit. So use a shredder (cross-cut or confetti) on all paperwork that contains personal information before you discard it.
