LIVING WITH COYOTES



Coyotes are found throughout the Palos Verdes Peninsula and are part of the natural ecosystem. However, problems occur when people begin feeding coyotes, either deliberately or inadvertently. Coyotes will quickly lose their natural fear of people and become bold, even aggressive. There is much residents can do to reduce conflicts with coyotes by ensuring they remain cautious of humans.

Coyotes mate once a year during January and February and will give birth to their pups from March through May. With that, the need for adults to feed their pups becomes important in the late spring and throughout the summer, thereby increasing their activity level during this time of the year. Typically, as fall approaches, coyote sightings will taper off as the pups become independent and the coyotes are not as active. It is interesting to note that it appears coyotes will stabilize their populations as they will only have as many pups as their territory can support in food and water. In

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SAN RAMON CANYON PROJECT NEARS COMPLETION

The San Ramon Canyon Project is progressing towards final completion with the construction of the inlet structure, which is the last critical element of the new storm drain system. The inlet structure, which directs storm flows from the streambed into the pipe, is built on 60-foot concrete piles that were installed last autumn. The walls of the structure are made with "shotcrete," which is applied to a built-in-place reinforcing steel cage using a high pressure hose. The exposed surface is finished using hand tools by talented craftsmen. Unlike the outlet structure, the inlet will be finished with a smooth surface in order to improve hydraulic efficiency.

The inlet structure is built around the upper end of the 54-inch pipe that was installed after the tunnel was built. The 2,000 feet of pipe that was installed completed the drainage path from the canyon to the ocean. Inside the tunnel, the pipe was surrounded by an expanding grout to lock it in place and fill the space between the outside of the pipe and the inside of the tunnel.

The remaining scheduled work is ancillary to the storm drain system. A maintenance access road to the inlet will be built from the upper loop of the Palos Verdes Drive East (PVDE) switchbacks. Access to the concrete road will be controlled with a locked gate located just off PVDE. Landscapers continue their work to install native vegetation in the disturbed areas, by both planting and hydroseed. They are also installing temporary irrigation lines that are necessary for the



vegetation to be established over the dry summer months.

Below Palos Verdes Drive South (PVDS), the contractor is rebuilding the hillside that had been excavated for the launch pit used in the upper tunneling operation. A maintenance access will be built from PVDS down its steep hillside south to allow City vehicles to reach manholes along the length of the pipe that runs through the utility easement in Shoreline Park.

The project continues to run under budget, thanks to value engineering change orders agreed upon last summer and continual strong

construction management efforts by the City's team. Because the project is running below budget, the grant award from the state may not be fully used. Staff is preparing a grant amendment request to allow other related storm drain work along PVDE to be included in the project scope. If the request is granted, a project that was already programed as part of the Water Quality and Flood Protection Program could become eligible for grant reimbursement. The City has received a total of four reimbursement checks from the State totaling over \$6.1 million.

INFRASTRUCTURE: PLANNING FOR THE CITY'S FUTURE

One of the City's primary responsibilities is maintaining the infrastructure in Rancho Palos Verdes. City infrastructure includes roadways, storm drains (pipes and

channels that carry water runoff to the ocean), sanitary sewers, and park facilities. This is best accomplished by placing all infrastructure on a systematic

schedule. For example, all roadways in the City are assessed every 7 years to determine what work needs to be performed to keep them in good condition.

Infrastructure maintenance requires funding. In some cases, outside funding is available. The City receives special taxes passed through from Los Angeles County to maintain our arterial roadways such as Hawthorne Blvd. and Palos Verdes Drive South. Outside funding is only a small fraction of the solution. In other cases, internal dedicated funding is available. The City collects a storm drain user fee from many local property owners to maintain our storm drain system. The storm drain program has been a big success, as much of the system has been cleaned and documented, and many repairs have been made. However, the storm drain user fee sunsets in 2016, and that resource

MORE PARKING FOR RPV'S OLDEST PARK

RYAN PARK SOUTHERN ENTRANCE REALIGNMENT & PARKING LOT EXPANSION PROJECT

Construction for this project is scheduled to begin this June and is expected to be completed by October 2014. Improvements include widening and realignment of the southern entrance driveway to enhance safety for drivers who use the ADA parking spaces, as well as easier access for maintenance trucks and emergency vehicles. This project will also add 32 parking spaces to the upper parking lot to address the on-site parking space shortage during park events.

The upper and lower parking lots will also be connected by a new driveway, which will improve ingress and egress to Hawthorne Blvd.

Throughout construction, the park will be open during regular park hours; however access and parking spaces will be limited. Special construction activities will require closure of the park for a few days and the community will be notified in advance of these dates.

NEW CONSTRUCTION HOURS IN EFFECT

In recognition of residents' concerns related to existing construction hours, the City Council recently adopted Ordinance No. 555, reducing the City's allowed construction hours to the following:

Monday through Friday ~ 7:00 am to 6:00 pm

Saturday ~ 9:00 am to 5:00 pm

Sunday and Holidays ~ No construction allowed unless a Special Construction Permit is obtained

The new hours of construction apply to all projects, with exceptions for any projects that were approved with the City's previous construction hours. Emergency work and typical residential activities, such as lawn mowing, gardening (without the use of weed and debris blowers), and minor home repair/maintenance are exempt from the City's construction hour rules.

OPEN LABOR NEGOTIATIONS

The City places a high value on the importance of governmental transparency. Towards that end, the City Council adopted the Open Public Employee Negotiations ("OPEN") Ordinance on May 6, 2014. The Ordinance, which goes into effect on June 7, 2014, requires transparent negotiations between the City and any employee labor organization. The City is currently in negotiations with the Rancho Palos Verdes Employees Association, which represents all full-time, non-management staff members.

Modeled in part after ordinances previously adopted by the Cities of Beverly Hills and Costa Mesa, the OPEN Ordinance is intended to increase transparency through the following provisions:

- A fiscal impact analysis by the City's Department of Finance of all written proposals, made either by the City or the labor organization, which would then be reviewed by an independent certified public accountant.
- The City's lead negotiator will not be a City employee.
- Written "meet and confer" proposals that have been



rejected by either side and are no longer being considered will be posted on the City's website along with their corresponding fiscal analyses.

- A decision to adopt or amend a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with a labor organization will be placed on two City Council meeting agendas at least two weeks apart and cannot be adopted on the consent calendar.
- Any proposed MOU or subsequent amendment will be posted on the City's website at least seventy-two hours in advance of the City Council meeting at which it will be considered.

will disappear unless the fee is extended by the voters.

Outside and dedicated funding sources are not enough. About one-fifth of the City's General Fund also contributes to maintaining infrastructure. The General Fund accounts for all the general taxes and other revenues received by the City that can be used for any service (public safety, land use management, recreation, etc.).

The City has an excellent track record of balanced budgets and living within our means. However, the continual funding of infrastructure maintenance is an annual

challenge. To improve our efficiency and make the best use of our limited resources, the City has proposed development of an Infrastructure Management Plan. The Plan is a systematic approach that will help identify and manage our long-term needs. The City's infrastructure belongs to its residents, and we want to ensure the residents have a sustainable system that meets their needs in perpetuity. In addition, any voids in a pack will be filled by transient coyotes.

Coyotes will generally avoid humans and are natural predators of mice, rats, squirrels, gophers and other small animals. However the presence of a free meal in the form of pet food, compost, or trash may lure coyotes into yards. A coyote who finds food in one yard may learn to search for food in other yards. In addition, deliberately feeding coyotes is a mistake and against the law! Coyotes that are intentionally or unintentionally fed can become habituated, which can lead to bolder behavior when coyotes lose their fear of people. Coyotes may not make a distinction between their "natural" prey and the family cat or small dog. Without the lure of food, coyote visits will be brief and rare.

Here are a few suggestions you and your neighbors can follow to help avoid conflicts with coyotes and help keep them in their natural habitat areas:

- Don't leave small pets or children outside unattended.
- Don't leave pet food outside overnight.
- Remove sources of water.
- Make sure your fences are six feet high with no gaps at ground level – coyotes are good diggers.
- Put bird feeders away at night to avoid attracting rodents and other coyote prey.
- Remove fallen fruit from the ground.
- If you compost, use enclosed bins and never compost meat or fish scraps.
- Install motion-sensitive lighting around the house.
- Trim ground-level shrubbery to reduce hiding places.
- Talk to your neighbors to make sure they're following the same procedures.

What do you do when you begin to notice a coyote making an appearance in or near your yard?

Most agencies recommend something called "hazing." Hazing is a method that makes use of deterrents to move an animal out of an area or discourage an undesirable behavior or activity. Hazing can help maintain a coyote's fear of humans and deter them from neighborhood spaces. Using a variety of different hazing tools is important as coyotes can habituate to individual items, sounds and actions. The Humane Society explains the simplest method of hazing involves being loud and large; stand tall, wave your arms and yell at the coyote, approaching him if necessary, until he runs away. If a coyote has not been hazed before he may not immediately run away when you yell at him. If this happens, you may need to walk towards him and increase the intensity of your hazing. It is important to continue to haze the coyote until he completely leaves the area. You may need to use different tactics such as noise makers, stomping your feet or spraying the coyote with a hose to get him to leave. In addition, you may want to carry hazing tools with you while you walk your dog. These include a whistle, squirt guns, or sticks or rocks that can be thrown towards the coyote. STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

WHY DO WE SWEEP THE STREETS?

Street Sweeping removes trash and debris from the streets and gutters, which prevents those materials from entering the storm drains and then the ocean.

The City's residential streets are divided into different areas and each area is swept once per month.

Sweeping is typically scheduled either a day or two after, or several days before trash collection days when the streets are devoid of any trash or recycling carts. Sweeping hours are from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Arterial streets are swept twice a month (weekly on Western Avenue) and sweeping is conducted at night

between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. when the streets are typically empty of traffic or parked cars, and optimum results can be achieved.

HOW TO GET THE MOST OUT OF YOUR STREET SWEEPING

- Keep streets free and clear of anything that may obstruct the street sweeper such as vehicles, trash cans, basketball hoops, etc.
- Know your area's sweeping day and notify your neighborhood via email, neighborhood newsletter or word of mouth.

WHAT HAPPENS TO ALL YOUR GREEN WASTE?

Do you know what happens to all the green waste that residents leave at the curb for collection? In 2013, EDCO collected over 11,000 tons of green (yard) waste from RPV homes – including grass, brush, flowers, plants, leaves, and tree trimmings placed by residents in the green carts or in tied bundles at the curb. Green waste accounts for over 35% of total residential waste collected in the City. Our green waste is processed into mulch and compost for beneficial land use in Southern California. Remember, please leave green waste in the green carts, bundle and tie tree trimmings, and take advantage of the bi-annual brush clearing events. Make sure your recyclable and reusable green waste stays out of the landfill!

RECYCLERS OF THE MONTH: In your July EDCO or UWS billing you will find the "Recyclers of the Month" entry card. If you recycle your yard waste in the green container(s) and/or your paper, newspaper, cans, bottles, and glass in the blue recycling container(s), fill out the entry card and mail it in. At each City Council meeting two lucky verified recyclers will each win a check for \$250! If you pay online, please use the online link and follow instructions. This is another way the City thanks RPV residents for recycling.

July: There is no service on Friday, July 4th, Independence Day. Friday collection will be moved to Saturday. There will be no changes to the Monday-Thursday collection schedules.

August: No changes.

Trash Can Hours: As of January 3, 2014, trash, recycling and green waste carts cannot be placed at the curb for collection earlier than 4:00 p.m. on the day before the scheduled collection and empty carts must be removed from the curb no later than 10:00 p.m. on the day of collection. Do not leave empty carts on the street overnight.

BULKY ITEM COLLECTION

EDCO and UWS offer customers free (limited) curbside collection of bulky and electronics items such as mattresses, sofas, water heaters, tables, TVs, computers, DVD players, desks, etc. Call EDCO or UWS to arrange for a collection date. Remember, if your item could be re-used, please contact a charitable organization first.

DISCOUNTS AVAILABLE TO EDCO AND UWS CUSTOMERS: EDCO and UWS offer various discounts to customers. Customers 65 and older are eligible for a 10% senior citizen discount. If you pay for trash services a year in advance (discount available only with the July-September invoice) you are eligible for

a 5% annual pre-payment discount. Low-income customers may qualify for 5% discount (same household income criteria as CARE). These discounts are not exclusive and may be combined.
