## CITY'S GENERAL PLAN TO GET A THOROUGH UPDATE

### PLAN ADOPTED IN 1975 GETS REVIEW

The City is currently engaged in updating its General Plan that was adopted in 1975. This Plan is a masterpiece of visionary planning that has served the City well over the past 28 years, however certain portions of it are now outdated.

Included in the General Plan is a list of 28 Goals and 190 policies that were generated by a "grass-roots" organization of over 200 City



residents. These residents formed thirteen committees to look at different elements of the Plan that included land use, recreation and parks, safety and fiscal policy and offered their ideas to guide the future of the City. Most of those goals and policies are still applicable and only a few may need to be modified or even deleted; some new ones may be added.

The first step in updating the General Plan was the formation of a 15-member steering committee by



the City Council. The purpose of the Steering Committee is to focus on the existing goals and policies of the General Plan and to determine if they are in need of revision. At the end of this review, the Steering Committee will report back to the City Council on what goals and policies need to be eliminated, revised or maintained; whether any new ones should be proposed, and

what technical areas of the General Plan need updating.

This General Plan Steering Committee has been meeting once a month for the last year and this past November they decided to break down into sub-committees to review specific areas of the General Plan (Habitat/Open Space, Fiscal, Safety, Land Use/Sensory, Recreational, and Infrastructure). The formation of these subcommittees was done in hopes of



accelerating this entire review process. Hopefully the work can get done in approximately one year as opposed to the estimated three to four years without using the subcommittee approach. Each of these subcommittees will report to the full Steering Committee for final review and approval.

Below is the schedule for all future Steering Committee and sub-committee meetings. All of these meetings will be held at the Hesse Park Community Building, 29301 Hawthorne Boulevard, Rancho Palos Verdes and will start at 7:00 p.m.



Interested parties are invited to submit written comments and to attend and give testimony at any of these meetings. If there is a change in any of the meeting dates, a notice will be published in the Palos Verdes Peninsula News and will be posted on the City's website [www.palosverdes.com/rpv](http://www.palosverdes.com/rpv). ## DOING BUSINESS IN THE CITY?

### TIME TO RENEW BUSINESS LICENSES

All business activity performed within the City of Rancho Palos Verdes requires the owner to obtain a business license from the City. This includes any occupation activity being conducted in a residential area (i.e. a home office for any type of income-producing activity). Additionally, any service providers such as contractors, gardeners, or handymen, whether based in the

City or not, are also required to be licensed.

Applications for the 2004 business license renewal were mailed out last month to all currently licensed businesses within the City. This application should be completed and returned with payment of the license fee by January 31, 2004. Upon receipt of a renewed application, a 2004 Business Tax Certificate will be mailed to all respondees. Penalties will be assessed on any license applications received on or after February 1, 2004.

## CITY COUNCIL ADOPTS PARKING AND STORAGE REGULATIONS

### NEW RULES AFFECT RVs AND OTHER VEHICLES

Last year in response to complaints from residents, the City Council directed the Planning Commission to examine placing additional restrictions on the parking of oversized RVs on private property and on public streets. Both the Commission and the City Council heard extensive testimony from RV owners, residents and a representative of the Good Sam Club on the options being considered. This past August, after several public hearings, the City Council adopted an ordinance regulating the parking and storage of recreational vehicles on private property. The new ordinance allows residents to continue to park or store RVs and other vehicles on private property, but with some additional restrictions:

RVs and other vehicles may be parked and stored on private property provided the vehicle is parked on a paved surface and does not overhang onto the sidewalk or landscaping.

If the vehicle is parked on a direct access driveway, it must be parked essentially perpendicular to the street of access.

If the vehicle is parked in the front yard or on any other portion of a property that is visible from the public right-of-way, the vehicle must be in a reasonably maintained condition or covered.

One RV or other vehicle may be parked and stored on an

While they last, the City is giving away one free compact fluorescent light bulb per household. Taking advantage of this energy saving program is easy:

- Visit City Hall during regular business hours.
- Bring in your Southern California Edison account number.
- Sign a "South Bay Energy Commitment" card that shows your intention to start saving energy at home.
- Replace a traditional bulb with the CFL and start saving energy and money.

In addition to the free CFL, residents will receive a free room-by-room survey pamphlet filled with tips on how to reduce energy costs. Visit

## UNTIL YOUR DOG LEARNS HOW TO DO THIS...



PLEASE PICK UP AFTER YOUR PET

Dog droppings contain harmful bacteria and nitrates, and when they get washed down into the ocean they can pose serious health problems to marine life as well as humans. According to a survey conducted by the Environmental Protection Agency, two to three days of droppings from 100 dogs would contribute enough bacteria to temporarily close a bay to swimming and shell fishing. Canine fecal matter that comes into contact with rain or urban runoff is often carried to the ocean where it can cause a myriad of problems including illness in swimmers, surfers and beach goers, reduce the oxygen content of the water and increase the growth of algae.

If dog droppings are left out during a rainstorm, the runoff can carry this waste to the ocean. The problem also exists when it isn't raining. Over-watering and other activities, such as car washing, causes excess water to overflow into the street. As the water makes its way down the gutter into the storm drain, it picks up anything in its path and carries it into the storm drain system and out to the ocean.

Is this problem preventable? Yes. People need to pick up after their pet. A survey conducted in Chesapeake Bay found that only 62% of people pick up after their pet.

Rancho Palos Verdes, like most other cities, has an ordinance (RPV MC 6.04.010) requiring pet owners to pick up their pet's waste. Some city parks have plastic bags for park patrons to use for their pet waste. There are many doggie scoopers that are available for purchase or simply carry gloves and a plastic bag to clean up. In your own backyard, make sure that animal waste cannot escape and travel into the storm drain system.

## A PRIMER ON YOUR PROPERTY TAX BILL

### WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

Since property tax bills were due to be paid in early December, the most recent statement may still be in the "to be filed" stack on your desk. To a non-bureaucrat, interpreting this bill can be daunting. For instance, what does WB MWD Stdbby Chg mean? Or, if you're a resident of the Eastview area of the City, you might be wondering whether the amount dedicated under "unified school" goes to the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District or the L. A. Unified School District.

### DETAIL OF TAXES DUE

**General Tax Levy – All Agencies:** This is the first item that appears under the "Detail of Taxes Due" column and the amount represents one percent of the taxable value of your property. About six percent of that one percent is returned to the City and that money goes into the General Revenue fund. Total annual revenue to the City from property taxes is about \$4 million and makes up about one-third of the City's budget.

### VOTED INDEBTEDNESS

Charges in this column are the result of "measures" that were approved by the voters. These measures are either state, county or local and result in the issuance of bonds that pay for improvements or repairs to infrastructure such as storm drain and sewer systems. These bonds can take as long as twenty to thirty years to pay off.

**County** – This money pays for bonds that financed a County detention facility.

**Metropolitan Water District (Metro Water Dist.)** – This portion of your taxes repays voter-approved general obligation bonds which financed the construction of facilities that provide water to So. California, including the MWD's Colorado River Aqueduct and the State Water Project.

**Los Angeles County Flood Control (Flood Control)** – This charge results from a bond measure approved by the voters at a special election in 1979 and pays for a specific storm drain project.

**Palos Verdes Library District (Palos Verdes Lib)** – In 1991 voters in the Palos Verdes Library District approved a \$16 million bond measure to pay for expansion and improvements for the Library District.

**Community College:** The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is within the Los Angeles Community College District, and in June 2003 the voters in the College District approved Measure B. Revenue from the bonds issued under that measure is being used to finance or refinance furnishings and equipment for all modernization for specific campuses, including Los Angeles Harbor Community College.

**Unified Schools:** With the exception of the Eastview area of the City, the funds collected in this assessment, pay for the operation of schools in the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District.

For residents who live in the Eastview area, the funds collected under "Unified Schools" are distributed to the Los Angeles Unified School District.

### DIRECT ASSESSMENTS

These assessments pay for services that benefit real property. For instance, in November 1996, a County measure entitled "The Safe Neighborhood Parks Act" sought funding for neighborhood and regional parks and recreation areas. The voters approved that measure and, as a result, the City received funding for the improvements that were made to Lower Hesse Park in the late 1990s and for the expansion of the Pt. Vicente Interpretive Center.

**Landscaping & Lighting District (Land/Light Dist.)** This is a City assessment and pays for the on-going operation, maintenance and servicing of median landscaping, street trees, street lighting and traffic signals.

**County Sanitation District (SANITATION #5 or #30)** The City is part of the County Sanitation Districts that serve the wastewater and solid waste management needs of Los Angeles County. This agency operates and maintains the large trunk sewer lines that are linked to local sewers and laterals and treatment plants that process sewage.

**Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District (PVPUSD Parcel Tx)** – This is a School District parcel tax that was approved by the voters in June 2003. Funds collected from this tax are used by the School District to reduce the impact of state budget cuts. This tax is not imposed on property in the Eastview area of the City.

**L. A. County Flood Control (Flood Control)** – These funds pay for the maintenance and operation of the flood control system in the entire County.

**Los Angeles County Parks District (COUNTY PARKS DIST)** – This County Parks District was approved by the voters in 1992 and 1996 and the taxes collected were used to finance several park improvement projects throughout the County. Funds from this District have been used by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes to purchase the Barkentine Canyon Property, to pay for the expansion of the Point Vicente Interpretive Center and also paid for part of the purchase of the Forrester Nature Preserve.

**Los Angeles County Consolidated Sewer Maintenance** – These monies are used to partially maintain the local sewer system serving this area.

**West Basin Municipal Water District Standby Charge (WB MWD STDBY CHG)** – This charge pays the annual revenue bond debt for building a treatment facility and distribution system for recycled water.

**Trauma/Emerg. Srv.** – This charge pays for the continued operation of emergency services at County hospitals such as Harbor General. Voters in Los Angeles County approved this tax under Measure B in November 2002.

**Los Angeles County West Mosquito Abatement District (LA WEST MOSQ AB)** – Serving the western portion of Los Angeles County, this district makes policy concerning the eradication of vectors such as mosquitos, rats and the Africanized honey bee.

**Los Angeles County Fire Department (LA CO FIRE DEPT)** – Approved by the voters in 1997, this money is used to support the Fire Department in providing emergency paramedic rescue, fire fighting, search and rescue and hazardous materials and disaster response.

**Special Districts** – Rancho Palos Verdes has several "special districts" such as the Abalone Cove Landslide Abatement District and the Klondike Canyon Hazard Abatement District. Residents in those two areas are assessed certain amounts which finance land stabilization efforts.

There is also the Miraleste Park and Recreation District which assesses residents of the Miraleste area to maintain certain parkway landscaping. Likewise with the Ridgecrest Park and Recreation District which assesses its residents also for landscaping and lighting.

undeveloped property if certain provisions are met.

Parked or stored vehicles may not be occupied or used for sleeping; however, temporary guest permits may be obtained from the City.

No changes were made to the City's current street parking regulations.

The City regulates street parking of RVs pursuant to the California Vehicle Code, which allows the L.A. County Sheriff to remove any vehicle left parked or standing for a period of 72 consecutive hours or more. The Sheriff's Department enforces this code on a complaint basis and issues the vehicle a "red tag" that warns the owner of the potential for issuance of a citation.

To file a complaint about a street parking violation, contact the Lomita Sheriff's station at (310) 539-1661, or you may file a street parking complaint through the City's Code Enforcement Office at (310) 544-5228, or via e-mail to jann@rpv.com. and it will be forwarded to the Sheriff's Department on your behalf.

The effectiveness of the new ordinance will be reviewed by the Planning Commission and City Council after six months of implementation. Furthermore, the City's Traffic Committee will address the issue of street parking of oversized vehicles to ascertain whether citywide restrictions are necessary. Their findings will be sent to the Planning Commission sometime early next spring.

To help determine the effectiveness of this ordinance and assist the Traffic Committee in its review, the City will be chronicling complaints regarding private property and street parking violations. Therefore, if you have questions about the City's parking regulations, wish to obtain a temporary guest permit for the use of an RV on private property, or if you want to file a complaint regarding the parking or storage of an RV or other vehicle on private property, contact the City's Senior Code Enforcement Officer, Jan Neth, at 310-544-5228 or jann@rpv.com.

# NEARLY A CENTURY OF FARMING ON THE PALOS VERDES PENINSULA

## LEGACY OF THE JAPANESE FARMERS

The history of the Palos Verdes Peninsula would not be complete without recognition of the Japanese farmers who raised garden crops along the Peninsula's coastal slopes

for years. Japanese farmers overcame poor growing seasons, the Great Depression, landslides, and World War II internment camps to farm Peninsula soil for more than seven decades. They have had a significant impact on the Peninsula and have been an important part of the fabric of the Peninsula's community.

Among the earliest Japanese settlers in the Southland were a few who gathered and sold abalone at White Point in 1887. Later, Harry Philips, a ranch manager of the Bixby Ranch, persuaded these Japanese immigrants to rent land for \$10 and cultivate vegetables on the ranch that was previously owned by the Sepulveda family. The loam soil and frost free temperature of the rural Palos Verdes Peninsula were perfect for growing sun-ripened produce and garden delights, including sweet peas, sugar beets, cabbage, and a profusion of flowers.

Tomizo Ishibashi, a Japanese national, was one of these early immigrants to farm on the Peninsula. Starting in 1910, he and his brother grew vegetables in the moist, temperate climate of Portuguese Bend, using only rainwater that they transported by wagon from a nearby Indian well.

Eventually, forty-two Japanese families formed an agricultural cooperative that was led by Hideo Takenaga and headquartered in San Pedro. They worked nearly 2,000 leased acres of the Peninsula which at that time was called San Pedro Hill. Since they were prohibited from owning land, these families leased land from the Vanderlip Corporation to dry farm, which depended mostly on rainfall and the

moisture from the ocean to grow string beans, tomatoes, and cucumbers. They sold their vegetables at several stands that dotted the Peninsula from San Pedro to the middle of what is now Palos Verdes Estates and drew loyal customers from all over the Los Angeles area.

Several months after the invasion of Pearl Harbor, all Japanese and Japanese-American families were forced to leave their homes on the Hill. First the families were evacuated to an internment camp in Strathmore, California and then they were divided between camps in Utah and Arizona. In 1949, Tomizo's son, James Katsumi ("Kat") Ishibashi, along with six other Japanese-American farmers returned to the Peninsula to re-lease the land and start again from scratch.

Ishibashi farmed a number of plots, planting ruby-red strawberries, string beans, tomatoes, carrots, peppers, iris, daffodils, and a variety



of daisies. His wife, Annie, sold these flowers and vegetables at the white-washed stand that became known as "Annie's Stand." This stand was one of the original vegetable stands built by the Vanderlip Corporation for the farmers to sell their fresh-picked goods directly to the public.

Formerly a thriving farming area, the scenic Palos Verdes Peninsula has experienced significant growth over the years along with a dramatic drop in its farmlands. One of the last two farming families in the area, the Ishibashi family, has relinquished its most recent lease of eight acres of land on what is now Ocean Trails and Long Point land. Mr. James Hatano, who grows baby's breath on a piece of property at Lower Point Vicente, is the last of the legacy of Japanese farmers to farm coastal Rancho Palos Verdes.

## CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING
