A new series of exhibits will cast a light as bright as the iconic Point Vicente lighthouse on the fascinating history and culture of the Palos Verdes Peninsula.


Scheduled to open to the public by the end of the year, this new exhibit will utilize timeless photos and precious artifacts to make the rich story of the Palos Verdes Peninsula's heritage come alive. Exhibit focus areas include the Spanish Rancho era, Japanese farming history, and Palos Verdes during World War II. Highlights include brands, cowhides and skulls which evoke the rich history of cattle trading during the Rancho period of Jose Sepulveda, and an authentic plow and a photo display of the famous Japanese "Forty Families," war-time memorabilia, and much more.

Los Serenos de Point Vicente Docents Joe Cocke, Bob Barry, Pete Foley, Sil Quirarte, Penny Ridout,

Marcia Booth and Bill Leighton, along with Museum/Docent Coordinator Diana McIntyre, Betty Riedman and PVIC Manager Holly Starr continue to work diligently on the PVIC Exhibit/Design Committee to put the finishing touches on this compelling new exhibit. The Ishibashi Family, who has farmed the Peninsula for generations, generously donated many of the exhibit's photographs.

The general public is welcome to tour the exhibit when it opens as part of the overall PVIC experience. Additionally, the historical/cultural materials will complement fourth grade education standards. Over 800 fourth grade students from Palos Verdes schools are expected to visit this new exhibit annually.

So, by all means, enjoy the beautiful ocean views and watch the majestic migration of the gray whale on your next visit to PVIC. But while you're



there, take a moment, step inside and be transported to a time far

removed from i-phones and Twitter. It'll be a trip worth taking.

## COYOTES IN OUR MIDST



Have you noticed a new, furry neighbor lurking around your neighborhood? This summer, the City has received reports of coyotes spotted in the canyons, hanging around near trails, and even walking down the middle of the street. Coyote sightings are not new in the City, as coyotes have been a part of the community since before its development. Coyotes are now found in every state except Hawaii. But why does it seem that more coyotes were seen over the past summer?

Coyotes mate once a year during January and February and will give birth to their pups from March through May. With that, the need for adults to feed their pups becomes important in the late spring and throughout the summer, thereby increasing their activity level during this time of the year.


Typically, as fall approaches, coyote sightings will taper off as the pups

## WHO LET THE DOGS IN?

### RANCHO CANINOS DOG PARK OPENS

Life won't be quite as "ruff" for man's four-legged best friends with the recent opening of Rancho Caninos Dog Park at Point Vicente Park/Civic Center. Located at 30940 Hawthorne Boulevard, Rancho Caninos is over 1/2 acre in size, and has separate areas for large and small dogs. The dog park also contains seating and shaded areas for pet parents, as well as a wood chip surface for dogs to play on and a watering station for a cool drink afterwards. Parking is available near the dog park, and within the larger park site.



The park logo and name are inspired by the area's use as a cattle ranch in the 1830's, known as Rancho de los Palos Verdes, which now encompasses the modern day City of Rancho Palos Verdes. The distinctive "swinging heart" logo is based on the design of the ranch's original cattle brand. Permission for the City to use the logo was generously provided by the family of Dave "Cisco" Ruth, who served on RPV's first City Council.

Several cities on the Peninsula, including Rancho Palos Verdes, are

pursuing a larger regional dog park at the former Palos Verdes Landfill site, owned by Los Angeles County and located in Rolling Hills Estates.

But because it will likely be at least a year or two before the County will be in a position to consider a regional dog park at that site, the RPV City Council chose to create Rancho Caninos as a temporary solution to meet a local need.

The park is open during normal park operating hours - one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset. Rancho Caninos will be unstaffed and rules are posted. Park users are encouraged to spread use out over weekends and weekdays to prevent over crowding, as this will likely be a popular facility! The City is excited about this recreational opportunity and encourages park users to contact the Recreation and Parks Department with their experiences and thoughts about the park at 310-544-5260 or parks@rpv.com.



## LIGHTS! CAMERA! RANCHO PALOS VERDES!



The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is ready for its close-up as it welcomes feature film, student film, television, commercial, and professional video and still photography production to the community. The Rancho Palos Verdes area has been the locale for films ranging from "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World" to "Pirates of the Caribbean." While far removed from the glitter and grunge of Hollywood, Rancho Palos Verdes offers a wide variety of attractive and versatile locations for film production, including:

- Abalone Cove Shoreline Park
- Trump National Golf Club
- Terranea Resort
- Wayfarers Chapel

In 2011, the City issued Film Permits for 33 productions in Rancho Palos Verdes for a total of 64 shooting days, collecting more than \$50,000

in permit and business license revenue. Oliver Stone's drama "Savages" and episodes of "The Mentalist" and "90210" were among the 2011 productions.

Film Permits are required for filming activity on both public and private property in Rancho Palos Verdes (with very limited exceptions). The City's regulations regarding filming activity are contained in Chapter 9.16 of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code.

Film Permits are issued by the City Manager's Office, in coordination with other City departments, the Los Angeles County Fire Department and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Application forms and other information to assist in preparing for a production in Rancho Palos Verdes are available on the City's website. ## BE CERTAIN IN AN EMERGENCY

JOIN PVPCERT TODAY AND BE A PART OF PERSONAL AND COMMUNITY EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS!

As we witnessed recently during Hurricane Sandy, the number and scope of incidents can overwhelm conventional emergency services during a disaster. The Palos Verdes Peninsula Community Emergency Response Team (PVP CERT) program provides basic training in disaster preparedness necessary to help you help your family, your neighborhood, and your community in case of a disaster.

PVP CERT trains ordinary citizens to deal with emergency and disaster situations where people may initially be on their own and their actions can make a difference. While people will respond to others in need without the training, one goal of the PVP CERT program is to help them do so effectively and efficiently without placing themselves in unnecessary danger. PVP CERT trains citizens to:

- Shut off utilities and put out small fires
- Reduce mortality by learning how to open airways, control bleeding, and treat for shock
- Provide basic medical aid
- Search for and rescue victims safely
- Organize themselves and spontaneous volunteers effectively
- Collect disaster intelligence to



support first responder efforts. The approved PVP CERT Course is 20 hours total and is provided at no charge to our communities

through grants from the Department of Homeland Security, the State of California, and Los Angeles County. In order to complete CERT Certification, students must complete the entire 20 hour course. You may make up missed classes during other CERT Courses anywhere in L.A. County, based on availability. Visit the L.A. The Peninsula Emergency Response Team was developed in the aftermath of the Northridge earthquake which vividly demonstrated the importance of civilian volunteers. As a result, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, in cooperation with Palos Verdes Peninsula cities, developed PVP CERT with the intent of giving volunteers a higher level of basic skills in firefighting, search and rescue, and emergency preparedness.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes launched the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve Ranger Hotline in June 2012. The Hotline is available 24 hours per day/seven days per week, and the City has received 116 calls since it was implemented. Some of the more common calls are reports of dogs off-leash, misuse of trails, poaching and disturbing wildlife, and requests for Preserve information from the Rangers.

The City thanks Hotline callers and encourages Preserve users to continue to report misuse or to obtain information about the Preserve. Hotline callers are

connected to a live operator, who immediately forwards concerns to a Ranger, or other appropriate agencies, such as the California Department of Fish and Game or the Lomita Sheriff's Station. Callers requesting a call back will be contacted by a Ranger.

While the Ranger Hotline is a service to Preserve users, it is also a crucial tool for the City to determine the frequency and types of activities taking place in the Nature Preserve. Please call the Hotline if you witness misuse in the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve. We look forward to hearing from you!

become independent and the coyotes are not as active. It is interesting that coyotes apparently stabilize their populations as they will only have as many pups as their territory can support with food and water. In addition, any voids in a pack will be filled by transient coyotes.

So now that we know coyotes are here, how are we going to learn to live with them? Coyotes will generally avoid humans and are natural predators of mice, rats, squirrels, gophers and other small animals. However the presence of a free meal in the form of pet food, compost, or trash can lure coyotes into yards. A coyote who finds food in one yard may learn to search for food in other yards. Deliberately feeding coyotes is a mistake and against the law in Rancho Palos Verdes! Coyotes that are intentionally or unintentionally fed can become habituated, which can lead to bolder behavior when coyotes lose their fear of people. Coyotes may not make a distinction between their "natural" prey and the family cat or small dog. Without the lure of food, coyote visits will be brief and rare.

Here are a few suggestions you and your neighbors can follow to help avoid conflicts with coyotes and help keep them in their natural habitat areas:

- Don't leave small pets or children outside unattended.
- Don't leave pet food outside overnight.

- Remove sources of water.
- Make sure your fences are six feet high with no gaps at ground level – coyotes are good diggers.
- Put bird feeders away at night to avoid attracting rodents and other coyote prey.
- Remove fallen fruit from the ground.
- If you compost, use enclosed bins and never compost meat or fish scraps.
- Install motion-sensitive lighting around the house.
- Trim ground-level shrubbery to reduce hiding places.
- Talk to your neighbors to make sure they're following the same procedures.

If you encounter a sick, lethargic, injured, or dead coyote the Los Angeles County Animal Control will respond to pick up the animal. They can be reached at 310-523-9566. If you have any questions or concerns, or if you feel there is a coyote in your neighborhood that is dangerous or has shown aggressive behavior, please call the City's Code Enforcement Division at 310-544-5228. # TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

## TIME TO RENEW BUSINESS LICENSES

In the words of '70s Canadian rock band Bachman Turner Overdrive, Rancho Palos Verdes is taking care of business every day. You may be surprised to know that while Rancho Palos Verdes is primarily a bedroom community, the City has over 1,900 currently licensed businesses. Part of taking care of business includes maintaining an up-to-date business license.

All business activity performed within the City of Rancho Palos Verdes requires the business owner to pay the City's business license tax. This includes any business activity occurring within a residential area (such as a home office). Additionally, any service providers such as contractors, gardeners, or handymen, whether based in the City or not, are also required to be licensed with the City.

Towards the middle of December, the City staff will mail the 2013 business license renewal applications to all currently licensed businesses within the City. This application should be completed and returned with payment of the license fee to City Hall by January 31, 2013. Subsequent to processing these renewal applications, a 2013 Business Tax Certificate will be mailed to all businesses that have paid their license fee. Penalties

will be assessed on any license applications received on or after February 1, 2013.

**Is it hard to fill out a business license application?** Not at all. The form is simple, takes only a couple of minutes to complete, and it can be done in either low or high tech fashion. You can file online by going to the City's website at [www.palosverdes.com/rpv](http://www.palosverdes.com/rpv), use the pull-down menu to click on the Finance and Information Technology Department and scroll down to business licenses. Then simply follow the step by step instructions. The full web address for business license applications is <http://www.palosverdes.com/rpv/finance/index.cfm#businesslicense>. You can also complete your license application in person at City Hall inside the Community Development Department.

## MEDIAN BEAUTIFICATION

This winter, the City will begin significant landscape improvements within the center medians along Palos Verdes Drive West. The project extends from the median across from Saint Paul's Lutheran Church north to the City limits at Palos Verdes Estates.

The improvements will include low-flow irrigation, drought-tolerant plant material, median nose stone treatment and a walking trail. The project budget is approximately \$500,000 and will be funded by recycling rebate funds.

**January 2013:** There is no service on Tuesday, January 1st, New Year's Day. Collection for Tuesday through Friday routes will be delayed by one day. No delay for the Monday route.

Leave all containers at the curb no later than 7:00 a.m. on collection day, and remove empty containers by no later than 8:00 p.m. on collection day.  
**Empty carts should not be left on the street overnight.**

## CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

The City recycles Christmas trees as part of its regular green waste recycling program. No special arrangements are needed. Simply leave your Christmas tree (remove the base, ornaments, tinsel and garland) at the curb on your regular collection day between December 26th and January 15th. No need

to cut the tree into smaller pieces (unless it is over 7 feet tall). Flocked trees are acceptable.

If you live in a multi-family complex, ask your Management Company or HOA about the designated drop-off location (it is usually in the garage area or by the recycling bins).

## FREE HOLIDAY EXCESS TRASH COLLECTION

EDCO and UWS offer free excess trash collection for three weeks during the December holidays (December 26th to January 15th). During that time, in addition to your weekly trash placed in the gray cart, you may also temporarily place excess trash in your old standard-size cans and/or in plastic bags, etc. No loose material will be accepted. As for empty gift and cardboard boxes, flatten them and place them in or next to your blue recycling cart(s) for collection. Don't forget to recycle your shipping and gift

boxes, and place your gift-wrap paper in the blue cart.

**BULKY ITEM & E-WASTE COLLECTION:**

Additionally, EDCO and UWS offer customers' free (limited) collection of bulky and electronics items such as a sofa, TV, computer, mattress, desk, etc. Call EDCO at 310-540-2977 or UWS at 800-631-7016 to arrange for a collection schedule. If your item could be re-used, please contact a charitable organization first.
