UPDATE ON LOS ANGELES REGIONAL INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (LA-RICS) AUTHORITY


On March 24, 2015, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors was scheduled to consider the approval of several site license agreements for LTE (wireless broadband) and LMR (land mobile radio) sites on County property (see attached Board Staff report). Among these sites was the County "antenna farm" on Crestridge Road in Rancho Palos Verdes and Fire Station No. 56 on Crest Road West in Rolling Hills. However, at the Board meeting, the Los Angeles County Firefighters Local 1014 and residents from all around the County voiced their displeasure about LA-RICS' proposals to install antenna monopoles at County fire stations (see attached Los Angeles *Times* articles). The *Times* reports that the Board agreed to halt work on antenna sites that had generated public criticism; to seek a time extension for the Federal grant funds for the LTE component of the system; and to explore other options to build and pay for the LA-RICS system. The Board asked to receive a follow-up report at its meeting on April 7, 2015.

With respect to LA-RICS' proposed installations in Rancho Palos Verdes, we have received no updates regarding the status of the County building permit for the LTE site at Fire Station No. 83 in Miraleste Plaza, which was apparently "flagged" by the FAA. We still await the release of the Draft EIR for the three (3) proposed LMR sites in the City, including the proposal for the Coast Guard property at Upper Point Vicente. On the April 7th City Council agenda, Mayor Knight has asked for a letter of opposition to the Upper Point Vicente LMR site to be reviewed and approved by the City Council.

**FY12-13 & FY13-14 RESIDENTIAL STREETS REHABILITATION PROJECT,

Concrete repair work is also beginning in Area 9 this week. The asphalt concrete grindings will be hauled and stored for future City use at the City Hall City Maintenance Yard, as well as the upper parking lot at the Ladera Linda Community Center. Therefore, some trucking activity at these two City facilities should be expected over the next few weeks. TRUMP NATIONAL GOLF COURSE WATERFALL REMOVAL PROJECT

As you may recall, in February 2015, Staff notified the City Council that a Grading Permit was granted to remove three separate waterfalls (hole nos. 1, 17 and near 4) on the Trump National Golf Course. Subsequently, the Trump organization submitted for plan check review and now they are a couple weeks away from obtaining a permit. Given the time constraint to accommodate the 33rd PGA Grand Slam of Golf tournament in October, Staff intends to allow their contractor to move equipment (e.g. tractors etc.) on the site some time prior to permit issuance in preparation of the work. Staff will update the Council once a permit is issued and continue to provide progress updates.

PLANNING DIVISION MONTHLY ACTIVITY REPORT

Docents, volunteers, and junior docents are busy preparing for this Saturday's Whale of a Day celebration. The docents are an integral part of the Point Vicente Interpretive Center and its role in educating the public about the natural and cultural history of the Peninsula.

American Cetacean Society/LA Chapter – Gray Whale Census Update

The ACS/LA *Gray Whale Census and Behavior Project* is one of the longest-running citizen science programs of its kind in the world, incorporating conservation and education through research. Started in 1979, this unique, shore-based study of the marine mammals that ply the waters of the Palos Verdes Peninsula is staffed by teams of trained ACS members and the local community. Data from the *Gray Whale Census and Behavior Project* is integrated into an online educational resource for the global study of wildlife migration and seasonal change, and ACS/LA shares data with the National Marine Fisheries Service, the federal agency responsible for conducting the official gray whale census and generating gray whale population estimates from this data. The primary census station is at the Point Vicente Interpretive Center, where the water depth abruptly drops off close to shore. Experienced volunteers identify and record marine mammals and their behaviors, with a focus on Eastern Pacific gray whales.

A new hurdle for L.A. County emergency-radio effort: cell tower fears

After the 9/11 terrorist attacks, local governments began talking about a new emergency communications plan that would connect every cop and firefighter in Los Angeles County on one system.

But to the dismay of many, the radio network is still not a reality. For the last six years, officials have weathered delays caused by technological hurdles, contracting issues and shifting requirements from the federal government.

As a Sept. 30 deadline looms for completing a major part of the work, new issues are threatening to undermine the effort.

Groups of firefighters and residents are planning to pack Tuesday's L.A. County Board of Supervisors meeting to protest the placement of giant cell towers needed to connect the agencies. Some cities have dropped out of the project, arguing they don't need the network and don't want to pay the costs.

Backers are now trying to get the radio system on track.

"Public safety is No. 1 here, and I would hate to see this fall apart," said Supervisor Don Knabe, who from the early days embraced the project, as did his board colleagues, public safety officials and most of the county's 88 cities. "I hope we can do a better job of outreach and move forward."

But if the project loses too many cities and can't build an adequate number of towers, he said, "the whole system could very well go away.... It would not be affordable or workable."

Supervisors on Tuesday will be asked to authorize negotiations for more cell towers and will get an update on the project, known as the Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System, or LA-RICS.

After 9/11, the federal government urged authorities in large metropolitan areas to build emergency communications systems that would allow separate agencies to work together quickly and efficiently, and it offered grants to help pay for them. The LA-RICS Authority decided to build two separate public-safety communications systems — a Long-Term Evolution for transmitting

data and a Land Mobile Radio to allow first responders in a disaster to talk with one another.

The authority received a \$154-million grant to pay for 80% of the Long-Term Evolution data building costs, with the rest coming from the local participants. The radio part, now in the planning phase, is anticipated to cost about \$250 million, with federal grants expected to pay for most of it; completion is projected for 2018. It would replace the roughly 40 radio systems now operated by public-safety agencies throughout the county and allow them to easily switch to new frequencies set to be available in 2021.

If the data system isn't completed by the end of September, local officials will have to return any unspent federal money. To help keep to its schedule, the authority decided to build its cell towers on publicly owned sites, including county fire stations, and got them exempted from state environmental review requirements.

But the firefighter union contended that the towers' radio frequency emissions would pose health hazards to them and neighboring residents. And community activists got angry when they saw the towers — some with monopoles as high as 70 feet — going up without notice. Some cities refused to allow the towers, reducing their planned numbers from 232 to 177.

County officials say the firefighters' health concerns are groundless, noting that the emissions are well below Federal Communications Commission standards and less than what are given off by cordless phones and baby monitors. They have cited research by a widely respected expert and statements from such organizations as the American Cancer Society.

The union cites other research and has enlisted neighbors via social media and mailers to fill out protest cards to send to the county Hall of Administration.

"We told them the supervisors are the only ones who can stop this thing," said Lew Currier, a director of the Los Angeles County Firefighters Local 1014.

Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich recently ordered a halt to tower construction at a Saugus fire station until neighbors can have their questions answered.

"While a reliable communications platform ... is vital to preserve life and property during times of natural or made-made disasters," Antonovich said in statement, "our employees and residents need to be assured that there are no health risks, and adequate notification should be made on planned cell towers."

Supervisor Hilda Solis said she takes firefighters' and residents' health concerns "very seriously," and Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas questioned why "some of these issues were not anticipated, if not resolved."

Besides objections to the towers, officials must grapple with the consequences of 12 cities dropping out of the project, with others possibly following suit before a Nov. 23 "opt out" deadline. Some have operating cost concerns or are participating in another communications system.

Reggie Harrison, director of disaster preparedness and emergency communications for Long Beach, said city officials balked at the estimated \$1.3 million they would be assessed annually. (Costs are based on a city's population and geographic size.)

"We're extremely supportive of RICS, and if those numbers change, we could very well find ourselves back at the table," Harrison said, adding that the city has decided it can make do with its current communications system in the meantime.

Patrick J. Mallon, executive director of the LA-RICS Authority, believes it can address the cities' cost concerns by coming up with a new pricing formula. He is hoping to calm neighbors' worries over aesthetics and property values by making towers look like trees or hiding them in fire station structures used to dry hoses, for example.

Even so, the authority "will be hard-pressed" to meet the fall deadline, Mallon said.

**REQUEST FOR DELEGATED AUTHORITY TO THE INTERIM CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER
TO NEGOTIATE AND EXECUTE SITE ACCESS AGREEMENTS WITH
LOS ANGELES REGIONAL INTEROPERABLE
COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM AUTHORITY
(ALL DISTRICTS)
(3 VOTES)**

SUBJECT

This recommendation is a request for delegated authority to the Interim Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to execute in substantially similar form to those attached, Site Access Agreements with the Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System Authority (LA-RICS Authority) for the construction, installation, operation, and maintenance of the Public Safety Broadband Network (PSBN) (also known as the Long-Term Evolution System [LTE]) and the Land Mobile Radio System (LMR).

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

1. With respect to the Public Safety Broadband Network (PSBN) System, find that the approval and execution of Site Access Agreements for those sites identified in Long-Term Evolution (LTE) System Sites, with the Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System (LA-RICS) Authority to allow for all work to occur at the PSBN System Site(s) identified in the LTE System Sites, as covered by the Site Access Agreements, are exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21080.25, the statutory CEQA exemption adopted specifically for the LA-RICS project for the reasons stated in this letter and as noted in the LA-RICS Authority's record of the project, the relevant portion of which is hereby incorporated by reference. To the extent any leased circuit work that may occur outside of the PSBN System Site(s)

is needed to provide connectivity to the site(s), such work is categorically exempt under CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Sections 15301, 15303, and 15304 for the reasons stated in this letter and as noted in the LA-RICS Authority's record of the project, the relevant portion of which is hereby incorporated by reference.

2. With respect to the Land Mobile Radio (LMR) System, find that the approval and execution of Site Access Agreements for those sites identified in the LMR System Sites, with the LA-RICS Authority to allow for all work to occur at the LMR site(s) that are identified in the LMR System Sites, as covered by the Site Access Agreements, are exempt from review under CEQA pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 21080.25, the statutory CEQA exemption adopted specifically for the LA-RICS project for the reasons stated in this letter and as noted in the LA-RICS Authority's record of the project, the relevant portion of which is hereby incorporated by reference. To the extent any leased circuit work that may occur outside of the LMR System Site(s) is needed to provide connectivity to the site(s), such work is categorically exempt under CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Sections 15301, 15303, and 15304 for the reasons stated in this letter and as noted in the LA-RICS Authority's record of the project, the relevant portion of which is hereby incorporated by reference.

3. Delegate authority to the Interim Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to execute, in substantially similar form as those LTE System Site Access Agreement County-owned Sites, LMR System Site Access Agreement County-owned Sites, Site Access Agreements for the construction, installation, operation, and maintenance of the LTE and LMR Systems at County-owned, County-leased, and County Fire Protection District-owned sites as set forth herein and subject to future additions and deletions of sites.

IT IS FURTHER RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD ACTING AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CONSOLIDATED FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT:

4. Acting as the governing body of the Consolidated Fire Protection District, delegate authority to the Interim Chief Executive Officer, or her designee, to execute, in substantially similar form as those LTE System Site Access Agreement County-owned Sites, LMR System Site Access Agreement County-owned Sites, Site Access Agreements for the construction, installation, operation, and maintenance of the LTE and LMR systems at County Consolidated Fire Protection District-owned sites as set forth herein and subject to future additions and deletions of sites. Delegate authority to the Interim Chief Executive Office, or her designee, to execute any related documentation and take any other actions necessary for execution and administration of such Site Access Agreements.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

The purpose of the recommended action is to allow the Interim Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to execute gratis, non-exclusive Site Access Agreements (Agreements) for an unlimited period at existing County-owned and Fire District sites and for a period up to 10 years at County-leased sites. The Master Licenses at the County-leased sites may need to be renewed and extended for a longer period to coincide with the Agreements.

With respect to the PSBN System, on July 15, 2014, the Board approved recommendations delegating authority to the CEO for up to 117 LTE Agreements. Thereafter, the CEO executed 91 Agreements in August 2014. Subsequent to the July 15, 2014 action, 8 additional LTE sites that were not part of the 91 Site Access Agreements have been identified for use in the PSBN as additional backhaul sites. Those 8 LTE sites are included in the recommended action and are identified in Attachment A. The work at the LTE sites includes either construction of a maximum 70

foot monopole with outdoor cabinets or co-locating equipment on existing towers.

In addition, there are currently 23 LMR sites on County-owned, County-leased, or Fire District property that were determined by the LA-RICS Authority to qualify for the CEQA Exemption contained in Public Resources Code Section 21080.25. Those 23 LMR sites are included in the recommended action. The work at the LMR sites include either installation of antennas and microwave dishes on roofs or co-located monopoles, construction of a maximum 70 foot monopole with outdoor cabinets, or construction of a 180 foot lattice tower.

CEO-Real Estate Division (CEO/RED) will work collaboratively with all of the impacted County departments to ensure final site layouts of the LTE and LMR system are approved by the impacted County departments prior to any construction or installation of equipment. The currently proposed County-owned, County-leased, and Fire District sites are outlined in Attachments A (LTE sites) and B (LMR sites), respectively.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

The proposed Agreements support the Countywide Strategic Plan Goal of Operational Effectiveness/Fiscal Sustainability (Goal 1) that directs we maximize the effectiveness of processes, structure, operations, and strong fiscal management to support timely delivery of customer-oriented and efficient public services. Upon entering into the proposed Agreements, the LA-RICS Authority will be in a position to develop a modern public safety communication system that will maximize the effectiveness of processes, structure, and operations to support the timely delivery of customer-oriented and efficient public services, particularly in the areas of public safety.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

The granting of non-exclusive access to LA-RICS will be on a gratis basis; however, the master leases for certain of the County-leased sites will need to be renewed in 2015 to provide a longer term with new annual rental amounts not to exceed approximately \$60,000 per leased site. It should be noted that those master lease extensions will also provide continuing access for County uses which exist at those sites.

FACTS AND PROVISIONS/LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

LA-RICS was formed in 2009 as a Joint Powers Authority with originally 86 members comprised of independent cities, the County, and other public agencies throughout Los Angeles County. The County is a member of the LA-RICS Authority. The mission of the LA-RICS Authority is to engage in a region-wide cooperative effort to plan and establish a wide-area interoperable public safety communications network known as LA-RICS. When commissioned, LA-RICS will provide first and secondary responders with the technology to coordinate, in real time, their response in day-to-day operations, and most importantly, during emergencies. LA-RICS is made up of two independent systems, the PSBN (also known as LTE) and the LMR Systems.

The proposed Agreements are necessary to license certain real property owned or leased by the County to the LA-RICS Authority for use as a LTE and/or LMR communications site. LA-RICS will construct, own, operate, and maintain the LTE and LMR Systems. The LTE System is made up of broadband wireless network technology and will provide day-to-day data communication service for individual public safety agencies, provide emergency responders with high-speed access to life-saving multimedia information, and support the National Public Safety Broadband Initiative. The LTE System will provide a secure 4G data network to provide high-speed video and data access that is

exclusive to public safety response.

The LMR System will be hybrid, integrated, regional, public safety wireless communication, P25 digital, trunked system operating in both the UHF (470 MHz to 512 MHz) and 700 MHz spectrums. The LMR System will provide public safety first responders real time mission critical voice and data communications to support day-to-day, mutual aid, task force, and provide immediate and coordinated assistance in times of emergency, thereby minimizing the loss of life and property within the greater Los Angeles region. The purpose of this hybrid system is to provide a logical path for LA-RICS Authority to operate full public safety grade communications for its members (of which the County is a member) on both spectrums and allow for a gradual migration that transitions off of UHF T-Band spectrum by 2023 as currently required by federal legislation, H.R. 3630.

The proposed Agreement(s) have been prepared and negotiated by the CEO/RED, LA-RICS, and several impacted County departments. Each Agreement will be executed in a form substantially similar to Attachments C and D (County-owned Sites), and Attachments E and F (County-leased Sites). As the applicable site specific configurations and designs are completed by LA-RICS, the Agreements for that specific location will be submitted to the CEO for execution. The Agreements will stipulate that LA-RICS' responsibilities include utility payments, maintenance obligations or reimbursements, as well as certain insurance and indemnity requirements.

The LA-RICS Outreach Team, consisting of specialists with experience in telecommunications, engineering, site acquisition, and public safety personnel met with LA-RICS Authority member agencies to present the overall project in detail. These meetings were coordinated to include City Managers, Public Safety Directors, local police/fire department leaders, and Planning and Community Development Directors.

ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION

Approval and execution of the Agreements for both the LMR and the PSBN (LTE) Systems, and all work at the PSBN (LTE) and LMR site(s) covered by the SAAs, are statutorily exempt from review under CEQA. Public Resources Code Section 21080.25, the statutory CEQA exemption adopted specifically for the LA-RICS, exempts these activities as long as they meet certain criteria set forth in the exemption. The PSBN (LTE) and LMR site(s) covered by the attached Agreements meet all of these criteria. This determination is based upon substantial evidence in the record that shows each of the following, as required by the exemption:

- (a) The site(s) is publicly owned and already contain antenna support structures and/or a police, sheriff, or fire station, or other public facility that transmits or receives public safety radio signals.
- (b) Construction and implementation at the project site(s) would not have a substantial adverse impact on wetlands, riparian areas, or habitat of significant value, and would not harm any species protected by the federal Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. Sec. 1531 et seq.), the Native Plant Protection Act (Chapter 10 (commencing with Section 1900) of the Fish and Game Code), or the California Endangered Species Act (Chapter 1.5 (commencing with Section 2050) of Division 3 of the Fish and Game Code), or the habitat of those species.
- (c) Construction and implementation at the site(s) would not have a substantial adverse impact on historical resources pursuant to Section 21084.1.
- (d) Operation at the project site(s) would not exceed the maximum permissible exposure standards

established by the Federal Communications Commission, as set forth in Sections 1.1307 and 1.1310 of Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

(e) Any new LTE antenna support structures would comply with applicable state and federal height restrictions, and any height restrictions mandated by an applicable comprehensive land use plan adopted by an airport land use commission. The new monopoles shall not exceed 70 feet in height without appurtenances and attachments.

(f) Each new central system switch is located within an existing enclosed structure at a publicly owned project site, or is housed at an existing private communications facility.

(g) None of the sites are located on a school or sacred cultural site.

To connect the PSBN (LTE) and LMR site(s) to network nodes or aggregation points applicable to each system, it may be necessary to conduct some leased circuit work on and around the site (if detailed project design work determines that microwave or other options for connection are unavailable). Leased circuit work, if needed, may consist of simply activating existing fiber infrastructure or implementing aerial drops with no physical environmental impact or, to the extent physical disturbance is required, minor trenching within existing road right-of-way. To the extent some leased circuit work may need to occur outside of the LTE and LMR site(s) to allow connectivity between sites and the core network for the LTE and LMR Systems, such work is categorically exempt under CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines sections 15301, 15303, and 15304 since the work would involve minor alteration of existing facilities, mechanical equipment, and location of new small facilities, as well as, minor alteration in the condition of land within the public right-of-way, and is therefore, within certain classes of projects that have been determined not to have a significant environmental effect. There would be negligible to no expansion of use associated with this activity since the fiber for the leased circuit lines are dedicated to providing this type of connectivity. Further, leased circuit work would not include the removal of healthy, mature scenic trees, nor would it be located in a particularly sensitive environment, and there are no cumulative impacts, unusual circumstances, or other limiting factors that would make the categorical exemption inapplicable based on project records.

As the CEQA Lead Agency, the LA-RICS Authority has determined that all of the PSBN (LTE) sites, including those covered by the Agreements, meet all of the criteria listed above. The Authority has also determined that a number of the LMR sites, including those covered by the Agreements and as identified in Attachment B, meet all of the criteria listed above. This determination is supported by substantial evidence in the custody of the Authority, which is incorporated in relevant part into the record of proceedings of the County for the Agreements. Any other LMR site that does not meet the criteria listed above will be evaluated in an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) being prepared by the Authority. To the extent such sites are on County-owned, or County-leased, or Fire District property, they would require the Agreements in the future. However, construction and implementation of LMR infrastructure at the CEQA-exempt sites, including those covered by the Agreements, does not commit or compel the Authority to construct any additional LMR facilities or infrastructure.

Upon the approval of the recommended actions, a Notice of Exemption for the LMR and LTE Systems site(s) covered by the Agreements will be filed with the Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk, pursuant to Section 15062 of the State CEQA Guidelines.


IMPACT ON CURRENT SERVICES (OR PROJECTS)

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Protests prompt L.A. County board to slow work on emergency radio plan

Faced with protests from scores of firefighters and residents from across Los Angeles County, the Board of Supervisors on Tuesday decided to slow down work on a long-awaited, comprehensive emergency communications system.

Supervisors had been scheduled to instruct county officials to negotiate site agreements for more of the cell towers needed for the Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System.

Officials face a Sept. 30 deadline to complete a key part of the project or forfeit a chunk of the \$154 million that the federal government is contributing to its construction.

Instead, to the cheers of protesters who flocked to the board hearing room, supervisors unanimously agreed to halt work on the cell towers that have drawn objections, seek a deadline extension and explore other ways to build and pay for the system.

In the motion, written by Supervisor Michael D. Antonovich, the board also ordered system officials to host community meetings to address concerns about safety, costs, aesthetics and property values.

Supervisors want an update in two weeks.

While acknowledging that building a system that lets police and firefighters to talk to each other during emergencies "is important and universally supported," Antonovich said officials owe "greater transparency and inclusion in this project" to employees and residents.

One Agoura resident told supervisors during an emotion-packed public hearing on the project that residents hadn't received any word of plans to build a 70-foot cell tower at the nearby county fire station.

"We all woke up one morning and there it was," said Jere Berkley. "We want our due process!"

Many speakers raised concerns about the towers' radio frequency emissions.

An 85-year-old Palos Verdes Peninsula resident with a pacemaker said his doctor told him to avoid getting near cell towers. Then he saw one rise at the county fire station across the street from his home.

County experts said the towers' radio waves are well within federal safety limits and give off far less than a cellphone or a baby monitor.

But the county firefighters union, which has enlisted neighbors in its fight against the towers, said the standards are outdated, and representatives produced statements from other experts raising concerns about repeated exposure to tower emissions.

Conceived in the wake of the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, when rescue efforts were hampered because police and firefighters could not communicate with each other, local officials have spent years developing a two-part radio and data public safety system.

Once completed, it would be the largest such emergency communications system in the nation.

It would cover 88 cities and the unincorporated area of the county -- scattered across some 4,000 square miles -- and provide integrated communications for more than 50 law enforcement agencies and 31 fire departments, as well as to emergency medical services, transportation and education agencies.

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Developers await grading permits for 646-home Ponte Vista development in San Pedro

After the flurry of demolition last year, all's quiet on the 61.5-acre home of the Ponte Vista housing development, where construction equipment now sits mostly idle.

The holdup for now is clearing the way to get all the grading permits in place for the ambitious project, said Eric Shabsis, a

spokesman for the development on the east side of Western Avenue in San Pedro.

"Because of the paperwork that had to be filed on a project of this magnitude, they've had to consistently go back and forth," Shabsis said, explaining that many questions and answers had to be vetted between the city and developers. "So it's just the normal course of business."

But work on the project, he stressed, has not stopped.

"Behind the scenes, work continues," he said. "Just because you're not seeing dirt move doesn't mean work isn't being done."

Grading is expected to start later this year.

"The anticipation is that permits will be issued prior to the end of the second quarter (by July) of this year," Shabsis said. "... This is a big project."

A year ago, developers anticipated that grading would begin in the fall of 2014, followed by the installation of water and sewer lines. Construction of the internal road system will come next.

Surveyors continue to do work on the former Navy housing property, the object of a decadelong community tug-of-war over the number of housing units that ultimately would be allowed.

The developer, iStar Financial Inc., began demolition of the existing abandoned Navy homes at 27501 John Montgomery Drive last May.

"iStar is still moving full steam ahead to get this thing done, or at least get to the point where they can start marketing the project to home builders," Shabsis said.

No home builders have been tapped yet to construct the units, which, as approved by the Los Angeles City Council in March 2014, will include single-family houses, town houses and condominiums. Although the site was approved for 676 units, developers said the housing market will largely determine both numbers and types of housing products. Marketing surveys indicated that single-family homes would draw the most interest, developers said in August. They also will bring the biggest selling prices.

Although dramatically downsized from its original 2005 vision of 2,300 stacked homes in a mixed-use, urban development, Ponte Vista is still eyed by many residents as a project that will further clog the already-congested traffic on Western Avenue, the development's only entrance.

Among the concessions made by developers for final city approvals last year were providing a permanent access road for Mary Star of the Sea High School (the temporary road has remained closed throughout the 2014-15 school year due to demolition and grading plans) and providing a 2.4-acre park along Western Avenue and biking/hiking trails around the site perimeter that will all be open to the public.

As approved, plans called for 208 single-family homes, along with the higher density housing.

While the development eventually could bear a different name, no decision has been made on whether to keep or scrap the familiar Ponte Vista moniker, Shabsis said.

The first homes built are expected to be single-family products and tracts.
