

The content from the former Facebook page has been retained, but the new page will be focused upon providing general information about City events and activities to the public. Staff also intends for the page to be a place to share information from other public agencies and news outlets about topics of interest and relevance to City residents. UPDATE ON LOS ANGELES REGIONAL INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM AUTHORITY

In March 2009, the City Council executed a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) authorizing the City's membership in the Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System (LA-RICS) Authority. LA-RICS was established to engage in a region-wide cooperative effort to plan and establish a wide-area interoperable public safety communications network. When commissioned, the system will provide first responders with the technology to communicate, in real time, to coordinate their response during times of emergency. The system is expected to include a network of Land Mobile Radio (LMR) sites (i.e., voice) and Public Safety Broadband Network-Long Term Evolution (LTE) sites (i.e., data). The system assumes the need to install a 70-foot-tall monopole (or equivalent) at each LMR or LTE site. LA-RICS has identified proposed sites in the City, one of which would be located at City Hall. Staff last reported to the City Council on LA-RICS in the Weekly Administrative Report of December 4, 2013.

In November 2013, Staff attended the first stakeholder meeting for the LA-RICS project, the purpose of which was to solicit input from participating jurisdictions regarding the variables to be considered in developing a funding plan for LA-RICS. At a second stakeholder meeting in December 2013, participating jurisdictions were asked for input regarding the weighting scheme for the highest-scoring variables identified at the first stakeholder meeting. At the third and final stakeholder meeting held on January 23, 2014, LA-RICS presented the first draft of the participating jurisdictions' cost shares (see attached handouts). Unfortunately, as a contract city, it is currently unclear how much the City's participation in LA-RICS will cost since these costs presumably will be passed along to the City through the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's annual contract and the Los Angeles County Consolidated Fire Protection District's annual property tax assessment. Staff is in contact with the Sheriff's Contract Law Bureau in an effort to quantify the City's estimated annual cost share for LA-RICS.

On January 3, 2014, the Community Development Department (CDD) was contacted by a sub-consultant working on the LA-RICS project regarding the Planning entitlement processes necessary for three (3) sites in the City: City Hall at Point Vicente Park; the County "antenna farm" on Crestridge Road behind Congregation Ner Tamid; and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) radome site on Crest Road at the top of San Pedro Hill (it is unclear if previously-proposed LA-RICS sites at Fire Station Nos. 53 (Palos Verdes Drive South) and 83 (Miraleste Plaza) are still proposed). CDD Staff identified a number of issues of concern with these three (3) locations, and relayed them back to LA-RICS' sub-consultant on January 23, 2014 (see attachment).

Within the first quarter of 2014, Staff anticipates that the City Council may be asked to take action on at least two (2) issues related to the LA-RICS project:

- The LA-RICS Board of Directors is expected to take action to approve the project's funding plan in February 2014. Under the terms of the JPA, this action will begin a 45-day period during which participating jurisdictions will have the opportunity to "opt out" of LA-RICS. As mentioned above, it is not yet clear what the cost of the City's

participation in LA-RICS is expected to be. Staff will continue to research these costs so that the City Council will be fully informed when it is asked to consider exercising its "opt out" option.

- If LA-RICS continues to pursue a site a City Hall, it will be necessary for the City Council to approve a commercial site license for the use of City property. This would presumably occur after LA-RICS obtains the necessary Planning entitlements for this site. It is also possible that LA-RICS will request waivers of Planning application fees for City Hall and any other site(s) in the City. The City Council would be asked to consider any such fee waiver requests as well.

Staff is currently arranging a meeting with the Upper Point Vicente/Civic Center Master Plan Subcommittee (Mayor Duhovic and Councilman Knight) for a preliminary discussion of the potential impacts that the LA-RICS project may have upon the City Hall site.

PVPUSD ACCEPTS \$80,000 GIFT FOR PVPHS SWIMMING POOL PROJECT

As the City Council will recall, the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District (PVPUSD) was approved last November for the City's use of the Peninsula High School pool and Miraleste Intermediate School gym for City recreational programming. The MOU was a condition placed upon the City's pledge to donate \$80,000 to the "PVPHS Pool Campaign" in March 2011. A check was sent to the District just before Christmas, and on January 27, 2014, Staff received the attached letter from PVPUSD Superintendent Walker Williams, thanking the City for its donation.

In a related matter, Recreation & Parks Staff recently met with the District and discussed logistics, communication protocols and timing for the use of the school facilities. Recreation & Parks Staff is also in discussions with program providers for uses at both the gym and the pool. Potential programs include open gym, futsal soccer, clinics, swim classes and special events. The City's use of the gym will tentatively begin in March 2014, with pool programs beginning shortly thereafter.

Proposed Funding Plan: HOW WE GOT HERE

The proposed Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System (LA-RICS) is a modern, integrated wireless voice and data communication system designed and built to serve law enforcement, fire service, and health service professionals throughout Los Angeles County. The new system will provide day-to-day communications within agencies and allow seamless interagency communications for responding to routine, emergency, and catastrophic events. LA-RICS was formed in 2009 under an interagency Joint Powers Authority (JPA), which consists of representatives from cities, municipalities, public safety agencies, and other public agencies in the region.

Recognizing the importance of member participation in the development of an equitable funding plan, LA-RICS conducted three rounds of stakeholder meetings between November 2013 and January 2014. This handout provides information on work completed, including background research, outcomes of the first two meetings, and the intended outcome of Stakeholder Meeting #3.

Background Research

Preliminary research was conducted in October and November 2013. This included identifying and studying similar interoperable communication systems and conducting a JPA member-wide survey intended to better understand current communication systems and needs. Sixty-five members responded to the survey. However, some respondents were un-

able to provide all of the information requested, creating gaps in the data received. Results of the research and survey are summarized in the Cost Allocation Working Paper, which can be found on the LA-RICS website (www.la-rics.org).


Stakeholder Meeting #1

JPA Stakeholder Meeting #1 was hosted in November 2013. The meeting provided attendees with information regarding the proposed funding plan and presented the survey results. In addition, participants were given a list of possible variables that could be considered when allocating members' LA-RICS annual operating costs. In a small group exercise, participants identified their preferred variables.

Attendees were divided into smaller groups, and the following themes resulted from the small group discussions:

- **Cost:** Member agencies need to know the cost of the system before they can make a commitment.
- **Coverage:** Some members are happy with the coverage they have, and others require more technical information on system capabilities to determine if they want to participate in LA-RICS.
- **Control:** Some jurisdictions are concerned about losing local control or the ability to make the decisions that are best for their community.
- **Compatibility:** Member agencies are uncertain about the compatibility of the LA-RICS system with their current infrastructure and radio systems/units.

LA-RICS Proposed Funding Plan


Stakeholder Meeting #2

JPA Stakeholder Meeting #2 was held in December 2013. Preferred variables, identified in the first set of meetings, were presented. Members were asked to identify a weight for each preferred variable. Weightings were recorded on a scale of 0 to 100, with all four variables totaling 100. By weighting the variables, participants were indicating how influential each variable should be in determining cost allocation. Based on this exercise, the following charts present the percentage of each variable that will be used in determining cost allocation.

LMR Variable Weights	
Total actual radios in inventory	5%
Monthly average radios in use	35%
Annual call volume dispatch	40%
Member residential population	20%
Total	100%

LTE Variable Weights*	
High-speed data units	20%
Average daily data use	60%
Member residential population	20%
Total	100%

*"Maximum Data Available" was removed as a variable due to challenges collecting information for each JPA member.



In addition to the weighting, important themes emerged from the discussion surrounding the exercise, including:

- A desire to have cost reflect usage.
- Concerns about how variables would be measured accurately.
- The need for policy and technical questions to be answered prior to any commitment by JPA members.
- The recommendation that the funding plan be split between capital costs and operation and maintenance costs.



Stakeholder Meeting #3

Stakeholder Meeting #3 will build on the first two stakeholder meetings by summarizing and presenting the information collected from the prior meetings and indicates how this information has been used to develop a fair and equitable Funding Plan. The meeting also allows for review of LMR and LTE cost assumptions, cost factors, and proposed member cost shares.

Next Steps

Based on input provided during the third stakeholder meeting, and additional data provided by JPA members, the final funding plan will be prepared and made available in February.

Jurisdiction Variable Data

Proposed member cost shares are based on the survey results and information collected to date. If your jurisdiction has not yet provided this information, or has revisions to the information included in the proposed funding plan, **JPA Member jurisdictional data will be collected until Thursday, January 30, 2014.**

SUBJECT: LA-RICS LAND MOBILE RADIO

Dear Mr. Bacho:

Thank you for submitting project descriptions for the proposed LA-RICS LMRs in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes. After conducting a preliminary review of the proposals, Staff has the following comments:

30940 Hawthorne Blvd (City Hall)

- This proposal is identical to what was initially submitted by Mr. Steve Howard in November 2013. Mr. Kit Fox (City's Senior Administrative Analyst) emailed Mr. Howard with a number of concerns and questions at that time. A copy of this email is enclosed for your review. Once the City concerns are addressed and the antenna is considered a 'public utility', approval of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) by the City's Planning Commission (PC) will be necessary to allow the proposal.

3860 Crest (San Pedro Hill)

- This is federal property and the City has no land use or zoning authorization over the site.

5741 Crestridge

- The proposed antenna lattice tower and equipment are proposed within an area zoned Open Space Hazard (OH). The City's Municipal Code does not allow commercial antennas within an OH zoning district. However, if the proposed lattice tower is considered a 'public utility', said tower could be allowed through approval of a CUP by the City's PC. Notwithstanding the approval of said antenna could be problematic given the potential visual impact of the proposed 195' tall tower (including antennas on top) from the residential properties located to the South/Southeast. Lastly, it appears that this proposal qualifies for the limited statutory exemption from CEQA.

After reviewing our comments, should you decide to pursue the proposals at 30940 Hawthorne or 5741 Crestridge, then please submit a completed Conditional Use Permit (CUP) application (attached), three copies of the plans, photo simulations, 500' radius maps/labels (instructions enclosed), and a fee of \$2,626 per site. As described below, this fee may be waived by the City Council upon request. Also, for both the City Hall and Crestridge antennas, please submit

information that substantiate these proposals as being a public utilities. Additionally, the CUP application for the City Hall antenna must obtain the City Manager's signature prior to submittal to the Planning Division. Please coordinate with Mr. Kit Fox on this matter (kitf@rpv.com / 310-544-5207).

As noted above, the City has a fee waiver process that you may be eligible for. Fee waivers can only be accepted after the original application fee has been paid. If a fee waiver is granted, a refund of the application fee will be processed. The City Council may, in its discretion, grant a fee waiver if it finds:

1. The applicant or the beneficiary of the use or activity proposed by the applicant is a nonprofit corporation registered within the state of California;
2. The use or activity proposed or the activities of the beneficiary of the use or activity proposed are charitable, educational or otherwise provide a substantial benefit to the public; or
3. The applicant has demonstrated a financial hardship, as determined by the City Council, on a case by case basis.

If you desire to request a fee waiver for either or both applications, then along with the application submittal, please submit a separate letter indicating why you believe that the fee waiver request meets one or more of these findings.

Hi Steve:

I've had a chance to review these plans, and have routed them around to my colleagues in other departments here at City Hall. We have a number of concerns and questions, including (but not limited to) those which are summarized below.

- It appears that this proposal qualifies for the limited statutory exemption from CEQA for the LA-RICS project. Furthermore, this proposal does not meet the definition of a "commercial antenna" under the City's Municipal Code, which typically would exempt it from the requirement for a conditional use permit (CUP). However, it may meet the definition of a "public utility structure," which would require the approval of a CUP. In addition, we are greatly concerned about the aesthetic impacts of the addition another tall antenna structure to the City Hall campus, particularly with respect to views overlooking the site from nearby homes. The City will want LA-RICS to agree to conduct visual impact analyses, including (but not limited to) the use of a temporary mock-up of the proposed tower. In addition, it does not appear that a new monopole at the proposal location would comply with property line setbacks and screening requirements that we typically apply to similar antenna installations. It would be the City's strong preference for these antennae to be co-located with an existing antennae structure on the City Hall campus, utilizing "stealth" technology and camouflaging that is commonly seen with similar commercial antenna installations. Such requirements are likely to be required by the City as terms of any future CUP or lease agreement.
- The location selected by your consultant appears to be problematic due to geotechnical issues and the presence of underground utilities. It is located near the top of a steep descending slope. In addition, the City recently undertook a major waterline repairs in this area, which is the reason for the existing asphalt paving. We do not believe that this location is suitable for any kind of new antenna installation or other construction.
- Please note that the city's name is "Rancho Palos Verdes," which should be corrected throughout the plans.
- The City is currently re-negotiating leases for several commercial wireless carriers on the existing monopole at City Hall. We want to be sure that the LA-RICS antennae do not interfere with the operations of any of these existing carriers. Can we be assured that this will be the case? If so, how?
- As we have discussed previously, the City prefers to connect the LA-RICS facility to the City's existing back-up generator, rather than including another generator on the campus. However, this proposed monopole is not located near the existing generator. Would this pose problems for LA-RICS? What are the power needs of the LA-RICS equipment?

- In the long-term, the City may be reconfiguring and/or replacing existing buildings and structures on the City Hall campus, including the existing monopole. We are concerned that this proposed location may be too close to the existing 2-story building and could interfere with future redevelopment plans.
- As we have discussed previously, the City would be interested in exploring the co-location of LA-RICS facilities with the City's existing emergency communications antenna tower, which is located in another part of the City Hall campus. However, the operators of our emergency antennae have concerns about interference with their operations. Although the plans you provided were marked "confidential," we would like to explore the possibility of sharing them with our emergency communications staff to determine if co-location is technically feasible.
- The City will want to discuss the terms of the ownership of the monopole (i.e., either by the City or by LA-RICS) as a part of the future site license discussions.
- The City would like the opportunity to review preliminary plans for the other 3 proposed LA-RICS installations in the City to determine if they are subject to City regulation at any level.

If you think it would be useful, I would also be happy to speak with the folks from Motorola about these matters at some point in the near future. I'll be out of the office the rest of this week but back next Monday, November 18th.



Restrictions on fishing in marine sanctuaries appear to be working

The sanctuaries in Southern California coastal waters were created to curb steep declines in fish and other sea creatures.

Two years after the creation of marine sanctuaries in more than 350 square miles of Southern California coastal waters, state wildlife officials and environmental groups say the restrictions on fishing are largely being obeyed. advertisement

"All of the dire predictions of the collapse of the commercial and sport-fishing industries just aren't happening," said California Fish and Game Commission President Michael Sutton. "In general, people are respecting the boundaries."

The reserves, known as Marine Protected Areas, bar or limit fishing in 50 zones spanning 15% of state waters from Santa Barbara County to the Mexican border. They took effect in the state's busiest region in 2012, with some favored fishing spots remaining open and others placed almost entirely off-limits to promote marine life conservation.

Recreational fishermen who fought their lost access have suffered a series of defeats in court. After spending more than \$1.3 million on legal challenges, the United Anglers of Southern California say they are running out of money and are close to giving up.

"We're still fighting, but we're probably going to end up losing," said John Riordan, the group's treasurer.

Under the 1999 Marine Life Protection Act, California created a statewide network of marine sanctuaries in an attempt to curb steep declines in fish and other sea creatures. Wildlife officials relied on scientific advisors and fierce negotiations between fishing and conservation groups to design the chain of coastal sanctuaries in four segments, with the last along the state's rugged North Coast taking effect at the end of 2012.

Compliance, so far, has been high.

Wardens last year issued about 145 citations for violations of Southern California's marine protected areas — a fraction of the roughly 4,000 tickets issued for various violations across the eight-county district encompassing the sanctuaries, said Dan Sforza, an assistant chief of enforcement for the state Department of Fish and Wildlife.

The high compliance level is consistent with findings by environmental groups conducting boat-, land- and airplane-based surveys of activity in the marine sanctuaries through a program called MPA Watch.

At first, some shore anglers with rods and reels were fishing within marine sanctuaries off the Palos Verdes Peninsula and Point Dume, according to a report by environmental group Heal the Bay. But the violations dropped to nearly zero by last summer, the report said.

If the sanctuaries work as designed, ultimately there will be more fish to catch, experts say.

Over time, the reserves should help depleted species like rockfish and spiny lobster bounce back, giving them space to grow bigger and more abundant. Marine life could spread beyond the protected zones in a "spillover effect," making more fish available to anglers.

"We'd like to see that effect, but it remains to be seen" said Riordan, of the United Anglers, a recreational fisherman based in Dana Point Harbor.

Indeed, scientists monitoring in and around the protected zones are only beginning research that will stretch over many years. For now, universities, government agencies and nonprofits are taking inventories of spiny lobsters, fish, seabirds, giant kelp and other marine life that will become the benchmark for the sanctuaries' progress. The benchmarks must be evaluated every five years under the 1999 law and could be adjusted if they are not working as intended.

To see what Southern California's protected areas might look like in a few decades, scientists cite Point Lobos State Marine Reserve, a spectacular rocky reef area off Carmel that has been under state protection since the 1970s.

"You see a lot of the things you would expect: more biodiversity and a lot of bigger fish," said Steve Wertz, an environmental scientist for the state Department of Fish and Wildlife. Among them are commercially valuable species such as rockfish, an important predator.

Point Lobos' waters were incorporated into California's first segment of marine sanctuaries on the Central Coast in 2007. Six years later, other marine reserves in that area are showing recovery too.

In kelp forests inside Central Coast sanctuaries, other fish such as cabezon and lingcod are also more abundant. On protected rocky shorelines, endangered black abalone have grown in number and size, according to the California Ocean Science Trust, an Oakland-based nonprofit that oversees monitoring of California's marine protected areas.

Sutton, the Fish and Game Commission president, hopes marine reserves will someday be as embraced as national parks and wildlife refuges. "I suspect that these protected areas will become just as accepted in the ocean as they are on land," he said.

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
