2014 LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES HOT AND PRIORITY BILLS

In past years, the League of California Cities (League) has typically issued a voluminous list of "Hot Bills" to be tracked during the current legislative session in late March or early April of each year. The League released a more focused and abbreviated list of bills it is following on April 28, 2014 (see attachment). This year, the League appears to be focusing its attention on a small number of critical bills or other legislative activities. Staff has provided updates on some of these bills previously, but we now provide a summary of legislation being tracked by the League that may affect or be of interest to the City of Rancho Palos Verdes and its residents.

League-Supported Bills:

- **HOT AB 1147 (Gomez): Massage therapy.** This bill will be amended to return local land use control back to cities and counties as well as authorize local governments to

adopt ordinances that would require massage establishments to comply with reasonable health and safety requirements, abide by hours of operation and pay appropriate business license fees.

- AB 1582 (Mullin): Redevelopment: successor agencies: Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule. Extends the existing Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS) process from once every six months to once per year. Shifting the ROPS process from every six months to once per year will save staff time by avoiding repetitive processing of non-controversial items; an annual cycle will also improve predictability for many former redevelopment agency debts that need to be repaid over several decades.
- HOT AB 1839 (Gatto): Income taxes: qualified motion pictures. Addresses the out-of-state competition facing California's film industry by extending the California Film and Television Tax Credit Program by five years, lifting the per-film budget limitation on the tax credit so that larger films will be able to qualify, and offering additional incentives for specified film and television production activities. [*The City Council has already expressed support for AB 1839*]
- AB 1963 (Atkins): Redevelopment. Removes the existing statutory deadline of January 1, 2015 for the Department of Finance to approve Long Range Property Management Plans (LRPMPs), thereby avoiding the default of having the original provisions of AB x1 26 govern the disposal of real property. Removing this statutory deadline will ensure that all successor agencies receiving a finding of completion can dispose of properties via this planning process.
- HOT AB 1970 (Gordon): California Global Warming Solution Act of 2006: Community Investment and Innovation Program. Creates the Community Investment and Innovation Program and allocate monies to local governments for grants and other financial assistance to develop and implement greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction projects.
- HOT AB 2280 (Alejo): Community Revitalization and Investment Authorities. Authorizes the creation of a new entity at the local level called a Community Revitalization Investment Authority (CRIA) that would provide a redevelopment option for the most disadvantaged and poorest areas of our state. A CRIA would be empowered to invest the property tax increment of consenting local agencies (other than schools) and other available funding to improve conditions leading to increased employment opportunities, including reducing high crime rates, repairing deteriorated and inadequate infrastructure, and developing affordable housing. Its powers and responsibilities would mirror those of former redevelopment agencies, but include new rigorous accountability standards.
- HOT SB 33 (Wolk): Infrastructure financing districts: voter approval: repeal. Provides much needed clarifications and improvements to Infrastructure Financing District (IFD) Law which will enable local agencies to use this tool for a wide variety of local infrastructure needs. California cities face many infrastructure challenges including

deteriorated streets and roads and outdated sewer and water systems. SB 33 offers a viable option to assist with the funding of these critical needs.

- **HOT SB 1129 (Steinberg): Redevelopment: successor agencies to redevelopment agencies.** Addresses several important issues affecting redevelopment dissolution. SB 1129 seeks to free-up available funding to produce quality projects with high-paying construction jobs, expedite the approval and implementation of long range property management plans enabling affected communities to complete local projects, and provide additional certainty for agencies receiving a finding of completion.
- **CO-SPONSOR/HOT SB 1262 (Correa): Medical marijuana: regulation.** Improves the regulation of medical cannabis in a matter that protects local control, addresses important public safety concerns, and enhances health and safety standards.
- **SB 1418 (DeSaulnier): Vehicle weight fees: transportation bond debt service.** Repeals the provisions of current law that transfers weight fees from the State Highway Account for transportation-related general bond service debt. All weight fee revenues would stay in the State Highway Account and allocated as follows: 44 percent directly to cities and counties for local streets and roads; and 56 percent to the State Highway Account (with a minimum of 21.43 percent dedicated to the SHOPP).

League-Opposed Bills:

- **HOT AB 194 (Campos): Open meetings: actions for violations.** Unnecessarily hinders the ability of local governments to make decisions on major projects and other matters of public importance. Seeks to use the Brown Act as a vehicle to sue to invalidate or delay actions taken by local governments.
- **AB 1522 (Gonzalez): Employment: paid sick days.** Requires employers, including cities, counties and special districts to provide one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked.
- **HOT AB 1894 (Ammiano): Medical marijuana.** Significantly curtails local land use authority by preempting city ability to appropriately regulate medical marijuana dispensaries in their jurisdictions by delegating key local use and zoning powers to the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. Authorizes an entirely new horizon of marijuana use and for-profit sales by commercial operators.
- **HOT AB 2126 (Bonta): Meyers-Milias-Brown Act: mediation.** Removes balance points in the existing collective bargaining process to provide preferential treatment, leverage and delay mechanisms to public employee organizations to the detriment of public employers and their responsibility to make responsible decisions for local taxpayers.
- **HOT AB 2188 (Muratsuchi): Solar energy: permits.** Requires cities and counties to adopt a new, costly ordinance that would essentially create a separate permitting and inspection process specifically for residential solar installations of less than 10 kilowatts.

- AB 2378 (Perea): Workers' compensation: temporary disability payments. Increases local government costs by expanding eligibility for temporary disability payments.
- HOT AB 2561 (Bradford): Personal and entrepreneurial agriculture: restrictions. Requires cities and counties to allow each land use zone eligible for growing and selling agriculture, unless the local governing body determines that growing crops for human consumption within a particular area would pose a significant public health risk.
- AB 2565 (Muratsuchi): Electric vehicles: off-street parking facilities. Requires, on or before July 1, 2015, an off-street parking facility with more than 50 parking stalls or spaces to have at least 1 percent of the parking stalls or spaces within that facility designated for the exclusive use of electric vehicles and equipped with electric charging stations.

If the City Council desires more information regarding any of these bills, Staff will be pleased to provide it, either in a future Weekly Administrative Report or as an agenda item at a future City Council meeting.

UPDATE ON LOS ANGELES REGIONAL INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (LA-RICS) AUTHORITY

On March 7, 2014, the LA-RICS Board of Directors voted to release the draft funding plan for the project. The release of the funding plan triggered a 60-day comment period for participating jurisdictions, which will end on May 6, 2014. In the meantime, Staff attended a fourth LA-RICS stakeholder meeting on April 10, 2014, to receive additional information about and provide comments on the draft funding plan.

At the April 10th meeting, Staff received updated cash flow estimates for the LA-RICS project. The cash flow estimates included with the draft funding plan released on March 7th had indicated that the City would incur no direct cost for participating in LA-RICS, since Rancho Palos Verdes is a "full contract" city. However, at the latest stakeholder meeting, we were advised that an annual administrative cost would be charged, ranging from roughly \$2,100 to \$2,900 per year over the 17-year useful life of the system. In addition, LA-RICS has been unable to provide any information about how much the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and Los Angeles County Fire Department will "pass through" to the City and its residents for our share of the annual operation and maintenance costs of the LA-RICS system.

On April 29, 2014, Staff forwarded the attached comments on the draft funding plan to LA-RICS for the consideration of its Board of Directors on May 7, 2014. In our comments, we asked the LA-RICS Board to defer taking action on the draft funding plan until the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and Los Angeles County Fire Department provide estimates of their "pass-through" costs for LA-RICS.

If the LA-RICS Board of Directors approves the draft funding plan on May 7th, the 35-day "opt out" period will begin then or shortly thereafter. Staff is preparing to present to the full City Council a summary of the pros and cons of "opting out" of LA-RICS at the City Council

meeting on June 3, 2014, which should fall within the "opt out" period (dependent upon the LA-RICS Board's action on May 7th). Staff will continue to research the City's cost to participate in LA-RICS so that the City Council will be fully informed when it is asked to consider exercising its option to "opt out."

With respect to the three (3) proposed LA-RICS antenna sites in the City (the County antenna farm on Crestridge Road and Fire Station Nos. 53 and 83), neither LA-RICS nor the County has provided any additional information regarding the proposed land use entitlement process that would apply, including what opportunities (if any) will be provided for City and/or public input regarding the LA-RICS facilities proposed for these sites. Staff will continue to seek information from LA-RICS and the County in this regard.

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2014 League Hot and Priority Bill List

April 28, 2014

The 2014 Legislative Session is in full swing and there is no shortage of bills that have caught the League's attention.

The following list reflects bills of current priority interest to the League with support or oppose positions. Bill tiles are hyperlinked to provide additional information on current bill status and find sample letters that cities can use. As the legislative session progresses, bills may be added/subtracted and positions are subject to change.

SUPPORT

[HOT AB 1147 \(Gomez\): Massage therapy.](#)

This bill will be amended to return local land use control back to cities and counties as well as authorize local governments to adopt ordinances that would require massage establishments to comply with reasonable health and safety requirements, abide by hours of operation and pay appropriate business license fees.

[AB 1439 \(Salas\): Unfair business practices: contest and sweepstakes.](#)

Prohibits the operation of a gambling themed, or simulated gambling electronic video monitor, in a business establishment that gives cash or other prizes of value. It would also authorize the California Attorney General, as well as district attorneys or city attorneys to bring civil suit to subject operators to civil penalties for violations.

[HOT AB 1521 \(Fox\): Local government finance: property tax revenue allocations: vehicle license fee adjustments.](#)

Restores funding stability to cities that annex inhabited territory, and re-establishes a foundation that supports sustainable and compact growth policies.

[AB 1582 \(Mullin\): Redevelopment: successor agencies: Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule.](#)

Extends the existing Recognized Obligation Payment Schedule (ROPS) process from once every six months

to once per year. Shifting the ROPS process from every six months to once per year will save staff time by avoiding repetitive processing of non-controversial items; an annual cycle will also improve predictability for many former redevelopment agency debts that need to be repaid over several decades.

HOT AB 1839 (Gatto): Income taxes: qualified motion pictures.

Creates the Community Investment and Innovation Program and allocate monies to local governments for grants and other financial assistance to develop and implement greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction projects.

HOT AB 2280 (Alejo): Community Revitalization and Investment Authorities.

Authorizes the creation of a new entity at the local level called a Community Revitalization Investment Authority (CRIA) that would provide a redevelopment option for the most disadvantaged and poorest areas of our state.

A CRIA would be empowered to invest the property tax increment of consenting local agencies (other than schools) and other available funding to improve conditions leading to increased employment opportunities, including reducing high crime rates, repairing deteriorated and inadequate infrastructure, and developing affordable housing. Its powers and responsibilities would mirror those of former redevelopment agencies, but include new rigorous accountability standards.

AB 2493 (Bloom): Redevelopment dissolution: housing projects: bond proceeds.

Authorizes a successor housing entity, upon meeting certain requirements, to access 2011 bond proceeds for affordable housing purposes.

HOT SB 33 (Wolk): Infrastructure financing districts: voter approval: repeal.

Provides much needed clarifications and improvements to Infrastructure Financing District (IFD) Law which will enable local agencies to use this tool for a wide variety of local infrastructure needs. California cities face many infrastructure challenges including deteriorated streets and roads and outdated sewer and water systems. SB 33 offers a viable option to assist with the funding of these critical needs.

HOT SB 69 (Roth): Local government finance: property tax revenue allocation: vehicle fee adjustments.

Restores funding stability to recently incorporated cities and cities that annexed inhabited territory, and establish a foundation to support sustainable and compact growth policies. Outlines a statutory formula that provides cities incorporated since 2004 and inhabited annexations with shares of property tax in lieu of the amount of vehicle license fee revenue they would have received in the prior 2004 VLF-property tax swap agreement.

HOT SB 1262 (Leno): Advanced mobile communications devices.

Requires any smartphone or tablet sold in California to include a technological solution that renders the essential functions of the device inoperable when stolen. This technological solution, or "kill switch," would be activated remotely by the consumer using another electronic device (another smartphone, laptop or personal computer), and would require the consumer to enter his or her unique password, chosen at the time the smartphone was purchased, to activate this feature. Government action to require technological solutions such as that proposed by this bill, by removing incentive for such theft, will be a significant deterrent that will enhance public safety.

SB 1077 (DeSaulnier): Vehicles: vehicle-miles-traveled charges.

Requires the implementation of a pilot program designed to assess specific issues related to implementing a vehicle-miles-traveled fee in California.

HOT SB 1129 (Steinberg): Redevelopment: successor agencies to redevelopment agencies.

Addresses several important issues affecting redevelopment dissolution. SB 1129 seeks to free-up available funding to produce quality projects with high-paying construction jobs, expedite the approval and implementation of long range property management plans enabling affected communities to complete local projects, and provide additional certainty for agencies receiving a finding of completion.

CO-SPONSOR/ HOT SB 1262 (Correa): Medical marijuana: regulation.

Improves the regulation of medical cannabis in a matter that protects local control, addresses important public safety concerns, and enhances health and safety standards.

SB 1418 (DeSaulnier): Vehicle weight fees: transportation bond debt service.

Repeals the provisions of current law that transfers weight fees from the State Highway Account for transportation-related general bond service debt. All weight fee revenues would stay in the State Highway Account and allocated as follows: 44percent directly to cities and counties for local streets and roads; and 56 percent to the State Highway Account (with a minimum of 21.43 percent dedicated to the SHOPP).

OPPOSE

HOT AB 194 (Campos): Open meetings: actions for violations.

Unnecessarily hinders the ability of local governments to make decisions on major projects and other matters of public importance. Seeks to use the Brown Act as a vehicle to sue to invalidate or delay actions taken by local governments.

HOT AB 1035 (John A. Pérez): Workers' compensation: firefighters and peace officers.

Dramatically increases workers' compensation costs for local governments by extending the statute of

limitations from 240 weeks to 420 weeks for presumptive death benefit claims for cancer, tuberculosis or MRSA to be filed on behalf of a firefighter or peace officer.

AB 1522 (Gonzalez): Employment: paid sick days.

Requires employers, including cities, counties and special districts to provide one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked.

HOT AB 1894 (Ammiano): Medical marijuana.

Significantly curtails local land use authority by preempting city ability to appropriately regulate medical marijuana dispensaries in their jurisdictions by delegating key local use and zoning powers to the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. Authorizes an entirely new horizon of marijuana use and for-profit sales by commercial operators.

HOT AB 2126 (Bonta): Meyers-Milias-Brown Act: mediation.

Removes balance points in the existing collective bargaining process to provide preferential treatment, leverage and delay mechanisms to public employee organizations to the detriment of public employers and their responsibility to make responsible decisions for local taxpayers.

HOT AB 2188 (Muratsuchi): Solar energy: permits.

Requires cities and counties to adopt a new, costly ordinance that would essentially create a separate permitting and inspection process specifically for residential solar installations of less than 10 kilowatts.

AB 2378 (Perea): Workers' compensation: temporary disability payments.

Increases local government costs by expanding eligibility for temporary disability payments.

HOT AB 2561 (Bradford): Personal and entrepreneurial agriculture: restrictions.

Requires cities and counties to allow each land use zone eligible for growing and selling agriculture, unless the local governing body determines that growing crops for human consumption within a particular area would pose a significant public health risk.

AB 2565 (Muratsuchi): Electric vehicles: offstreet parking facilities.

Requires, on or before July 1, 2015, an offstreet parking facility with more than 50 parking stalls or spaces to have at least 1 percent of the parking stalls or spaces within that facility designated for the exclusive use of electric vehicles and equipped with electric charging stations.

HOT AB 2715 (Hernández): District-based municipal elections.

Imposes sweeping and costly state mandates by amending the California Voting Rights Act of 2001 (CVRA) to "impose" district-based elections on all general law cities with populations more than 100,000, effective July 1, 2015.

SB 1234 (Block): Workers' compensation.

Dramatically expands eligibility for special workers' compensation benefits that are limited in current law to only certain categories of peace officers.

SB 1270 (Pavley): Surface mining operations.

Erodes local lead agency authority to regulate local mining operations, setting a dangerous precedent of the state usurping local land use authority from local governments.

SUBJECT: City of Rancho Palos Verdes' Comments on the Draft LA-RICS Funding Plan

Dear Ms. Stallworth-Tait:

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is in receipt of the draft Funding Plan approved by the Board of Directors for the Los Angeles Regional Interoperable Communications System (LA-RICS) on 7 March 2014. City Staff has also participated in all four (4) LA-RICS Stakeholder Meetings, which were held in November 2013, December 2013, January 2014 and April 2014. Based upon our review of the draft Funding Plan, we hereby offer the following comments for the consideration of the LA-RICS Board of Directors at its upcoming meeting on 7 May 2014:


1. The draft Funding Plan released on 7 March 2014 listed no annual cost to the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, which is a "full contract" city. However, at the fourth Stakeholder Meeting held on 7 April 2014, we were advised that the City of Rancho Palos Verdes would be assessed a proportional share (based upon population) of the 20-percent system administration fee. This fee would start at roughly \$2,100.00/year in FY 2015-16 and increase to roughly \$2,900.00/year by FY 2031-32. Although the amount of this fee is relatively nominal, we are concerned about the gradual imposition of additional, unforeseen fees and charges over the life of the LA-RICS system.
2. As mentioned above, Rancho Palos Verdes is a "full contract" city. LA-RICS has advised us that we should expect the City's share of the annual operation and maintenance costs of the system to be passed along under the terms of our annual contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, and through annual assessments imposed by the Los Angeles County Fire Protection District. However, at this point, neither LA-RICS nor the County public safety agencies have provided the City with any kind of estimate of what these costs will be. Furthermore, we have been provided with no assurance that the City's share of these costs will be allocated in a manner that is consistent with the weighted variables that were identified during

the Stakeholder Meeting process that led to the formulation of the draft Funding Plan. As such, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes respectfully requests that the LA-RICS Board of Directors defer taking final action on the draft Funding Plan until our City (and other "full contract" cities) have been provided with an estimate of our annual pass-through costs from the County.

3. We understand that the LA-RICS Board of Directors' approval of the draft Funding Plan will begin a 35-day "opt out" period for participating jurisdictions. We believe that it would be unreasonable for our City Council to be expected to take any action regarding the City's continued participation in LA-RICS without being provided with some kind of estimate of the City's true cost of participation in the system. For this reason, we are asking the Board to defer taking action on the Draft Funding Plan until these cost estimates are provided. In addition, we are concerned that, even if the City of Rancho Palos Verdes elects to "opt out" of LA-RICS, as a "full contract" city we will continue to bear the financial burden of supporting the system for as long as the County continues to participate in the system.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes appreciates the LA-RICS Board of Directors' consideration of our comments and concerns regarding the draft Funding Plan. **SUNNYSIDE RIDGE SEGMENT TRAIL IMPROVEMENT BRIEFING AT THE
SUNNYSIDE COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING**

On Wednesday April 23 at 7:30 p.m. staff from the Public Works Department met with the Sunnyside Community Association to speak about the proposed trail improvement project and invite the homeowners to participate and give their input during the design development phase of the project.

The neighborhood residents who attended the meeting had questions and concerns about the City's trail system and specifically the proposed project at Sunnyside Ridge Road. The majority of the group asked about the impact of the trail usage by equestrians and maintenance and security during after-hours. A homeowner adjacent to the entrance part of the trail had concerns about the impact of the retaining wall height proposed at the property line of his front yard (which is at a lower level from the proposed trail surface). One member of the community spoke in favor of the project. The Sunnyside Community Association decided to pursue these issues with the Community Development Department.

Sunnyside Ridge Segment Trail

According to the City's Conceptual Trails Plan, the Sunnyside Ridge Segment Trail (A-28) is a point-to-point trail for equestrians and pedestrians which provides a connection between Sunnyside Ridge Road and Palos Verdes Drive East. On November 27, 1984, the City Council adopted the City's Trails Network Plan. On January 22, 1990, the City Council adopted the Conceptual Trails Plan (CTP). The CTP was revised on May 21, 1991, September 16, 1991 and October 26, 1991.

Grant

In March 2014, the L.A. County 4th Supervisorial District approved the City's application for Sunnyside Ridge Segment Trail in the amount of \$300,000 (the maximum available). The project concept cost estimate is \$465,000 and the City's local match of the cost will be up to \$165,000.

Tentative Schedule

The preliminary schedule noted below is contingent on budget authorization by the City Council.

- Budget authorization (including grant and City matching funds): May 20, 2014 City Council meeting.
- Request for proposals; select & award Contract to design consultant: June - September 2014
- Design development with Sunnyside Ridge community, equestrian community and other interested parties: October - November 2014
- Construction Plans and Specifications: December: 2014 - April 2015
- Bidding and award of construction contract: May - July 2015
- Construction: August - November 2015
- Notice of Completion December 2015

The estimated duration to complete the project is 18 months. The Grant's construction completion deadline is on December 31, 2016

SAN RAMON PROJECT UPDATE

The State Department of Finance auditor finished his visit last week and is expected to issue a report letter to the City in the coming weeks. He stated that the letter would likely indicate “no findings”, meaning the administration of the grant has been done according to the agreement. His verbal report is only tentative pending review by his department but staff is confident that he left satisfied that things were in order.

The project continues to move forward in the filed with the application of shotcrete to the erected reinforcing steel cages that will form the walls of the inlet structure. The photos depicts the steel and temporary wood forms in place. The completion of the inlet structure projected for later this month will finalize the drainage way from the canyon to the ocean, meaning that all future runoff will be routed around the vulnerable canyon walls adjacent to the switchbacks and Tarapaca landslide.



ALTAMIRA STORM DRAIN - PROJECT STUDY REPORT

In response to questions raised at the April 29, 2014 City Council Meeting, Staff prepared the following to detail what is expected to be accomplished during the Project Study Report phase of the Altamira Storm Drain Project design process. A Project Study Report (PSR) is prepared at the front end of the project development process, before final environmental evaluation and detailed design are completed. As an engineering document, the PSR is written to provide stakeholders, decisions-makers, and “next-phase” project team members with a broad understanding of the deficiency and the proposed project. The PSR informs the reader of the key issues and assumptions regarding the commitments on the scope, schedule, and estimated cost of all aspects of the project. The PSR must provide a sound basis for commitment of future funding.

The PSR for the Altamira Storm Drain Project is expected to include an introduction and background of previous work performed toward the development of solutions that were previously explored including any reasons for acceptance or rejection of those solution. Coordination with the community will be a key component of the project, so several community meetings are anticipated. Developing conceptual (non-engineered) alternatives (solutions) and determining the Initial Environmental Studies required for each conceptual solution is a requirement. Identifying the appropriate environmental resource agencies that will be involved and estimating the required review time and time required to issue permits will be part of the PSR. When the alternatives have been identified, a geotechnical report identifying current conditions within the drainage path will be needed. Right of Way requirements will be identified and the associated cost estimates for acquiring Right of Way will be developed. To aid the City Council in ultimately selecting a preferred design alternative, a scope of work for each alternative will be developed.

Finally, the PSR will be useful in perusing funding that may become available at the County, State and/or Federal levels. Additionally, the PSR is the roadmap that the community can expect to follow when the Design phase of the project begins.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL EARTH DAY ASSEMBLIES COMPLETED

In celebration of Earth Day, Waste Management, the PVPUSD's contracted hauler, and staff conducted classroom landfill related presentations at various elementary schools. A total of twelve 2nd and 3rd grade classes (~300 students) participated in fun and educational landfill related presentations. See PV Patch article attached. Public Works appreciates the schools teachers and principals for their continued interest in recycling.

SHREDDING EVENT VERY POPULAR

EDCO and the City's paper shredding event on Saturday, April 26, 2014 was a huge success. Cars were lined up as early as 8:15 am. Due to the large number of cars waiting in line, shredding began at 8:30 am instead of the original 9 am start time. A total of 20,800 Lbs. (10.40 tons) of paper was collected and shredded by three certified large shredding trucks "on site". A total of 540 vehicles were served. The electronic waste collection generated an estimated 5,500 Lbs. In addition, approximately 150 vehicles took advantage of the free mulch provided by EDCO, over 40,000 Lbs. (20 tons) were distributed. The temporary traffic control plan helped direct the cars entering and exiting City Hall and Hawthorne Boulevard. Staff and EDCO received numerous compliments from attendees about the efficiency of the event and the need for having such an event. Due to the popularity of the shredding events, Staff and EDCO management will start planning ahead and advertising the next (Fall) event. Staff will also investigate the possibility of moving the shredding trucks to the overflow parking to accommodate larger groups. Staff thanks EDCO for providing another useful and free service to the City residents.
