PENINSULA REGIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT CRIME STATISTICS

Attached for the Council's information are pertinent excerpts from the statistics presented at the Peninsula Regional Law Enforcement Committee meeting held on May 8, 2014. The data presented is for the first quarter of 2014 (January through March).

Residential burglaries and thefts from vehicles (both locked and unlocked) decreased dramatically during the first quarter of 2014 compared with the same period in 2013. The quarter also saw a decrease in the number of Grand Theft Auto incidents compared to the prior quarter. Overall, the number of Part 1 crimes was down 30% compared to the same period last year. The Sheriff credits the decreases to several significant burglary arrests. However, even with these improvements, all community members are still being urged to "Lock It or Lose It!"

Attachments:

Part 1 Crime

Law enforcement agencies across the county use the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) system to collect and report crime statistics. Part 1 crimes consist of the eight most serious offenses including homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny theft, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Part 2 Crime

Part 2 crimes include 22 categories of offenses ranging from simple assaults to vagrancy.

Traffic Statistics

Please note that the "Traffic Enforcement Index" is a ratio of the number of hazardous traffic citations issued to the number of injury collisions. An index higher than 20 is considered to be good.

Sheriff Response Time Performance

The Sheriff's goals for response times are under 7 minutes for Emergency Calls, under 20 minutes for Immediate Calls and under 1 hour for Routine Calls.

Ambulance Response Statistics

The ambulance company's goal for response times is 90% under 9 minutes.

GROUNDBREAKING FOR THE *PONTE VISTA* PROJECT IN SAN PEDRO

On Thursday, May 8, 2014, the 676-unit *Ponte Vista* project at the former San Pedro Navy housing site held its official groundbreaking ceremony, culminating in Los Angeles City Councilman Joe Buscaino taking a backhoe to one of the dilapidated duplexes on the site (see attached *Daily Breeze* articles). Mayor Pro Tem Knight and Councilmembers Brooks, Campbell and Missetich all attended the groundbreaking festivities. Demolition and site preparation is expected to continue through the summer.

On Monday, May 12, 2014, staff from Councilman Buscaino's office addressed the Northwest San Pedro Neighborhood Council (NWSPNC) regarding the construction status of the *Ponte Vista* project. It was reported that the developer is addressing issues related to asbestos abatement, dust control and pest control during demolition and site grading activities (see attached staff notes). The developer is also encouraging nearby residents to contact Elizabeth Brazil or Sarojini Lall of the *Ponte Vista* Community Outreach Team with construction-related complaints (elizabeth@pontevista.com, slall@marathon-com.com or (310) 241-0699). The NWSPNC Board asked Councilman Buscaino's staff to provide monthly updates on construction activity and issues, and to also provide an official City of Los Angeles contact (e.g., building inspector) for reporting construction complaints. We will be asking Councilman Buscaino's staff to provide us with same information as well.

Staff will continue to provide periodic updates on the status of this project in future Weekly Administrative Reports.

CAL WATER UPDATE ON RESPONSES TO THE STATEWIDE DROUGHT

On May 9, 2014, California Water Service Company (CalWater) sent the attached letter to the City, outlining its responses to date to the current statewide drought. As the City Council may recall, Governor Brown declared a Drought Emergency in January 2014, followed by an Executive Order in April 2014 asking Californians to step up their efforts to conserve water.

CalWater indicates that it is prepared to address the drought and respond to the Governor's call to further reduce water waste and consumption. Although CalWater is empowered to impose mandatory water rationing, it does not currently anticipate that this will be necessary in the Palos Verdes District.

Beginning in 2011, CalWater implemented a variety of water conservation programs to reduce waste and consumption, including such programs as water-saving appliance/fixture rebates; automated and high-efficiency irrigation controls; and bathroom fixture replacement programs. Attached to the recent letter from CalWater is the 2013 Water Conservation Report for the Palos Verdes District.

Staff will be posting links to this information from CalWater on the City's website.








Navy housing demolition begins in San Pedro, clearing way for Ponte Vista development

Navy housing demolition begins in San Pedro, clearing way for Ponte Vista development



For several moments, the giant jaws of an excavator hovered over the roof of the vacant home on San Pedro's former Navy housing site as the watching crowd began to chant: "Ten! Nine! Eight! ..."

On the final count of "One!" Los Angeles City Councilman Joe Buscaino, manning the controls inside the machinery and wearing a hard hat, drove the claw downward onto 27479 Samuel Dupont Ave., sending crumpled beams collapsing to the ground.

And so began the demolition that will make way for 676 new, for-sale homes. It also marked the end of what was nearly a 10-year-long, sometimes rancorous debate over the proposed Ponte Vista housing development.

Following a decade of reworked plans, petitions, picket signs, traffic studies and countless community meetings, the groundbreaking ceremony under blue skies drew several dozen people who had followed the issue for years to what, finally, appeared to be a relatively noncontroversial conclusion.

"Lighting the (Vincent Thomas) bridge took 17 years," cracked Jerry Gaines of San Pedro, who co-chaired a council office task force on the issue several years ago. "This took 10. I like it when I can see things in my lifetime."

Demolition permits were issued Wednesday, and the entire process is expected to take two to three months to clear the way for the Ponte Vista development on 61.5 acres on the east side of Western Avenue across from Green Hills Memorial Park. After that, the property will be graded and then work will begin on infrastructure. The first new home is expected to go up sometime in late 2015.

"As I told (a Daily Breeze reporter) off the record — and now I'll say it on the record — 'It's about time,'" Buscaino said to applause. "Let's break ground and build some homes."

"Today's the day," said master of ceremonies John Stammreich of the Northwest San Pedro Neighborhood Council. "We're here."

But getting there wasn't easy.

"All I can say is, 'Wow,'" said Elise Swanson, the incoming president and CEO of the San Pedro Chamber of Commerce. She was on the staff of then-Councilman Janice Hahn when the original plan by developer

Bob Bisno hit her desk and later went to work for the development team.

First rolled out in 2005, the proposed stacked-home plan for the hillside overlooking the Vincent Thomas Bridge — thus the project name, which means “Bridge View” — underwent several revisions, two City Council members and a couple of developers before the downsized Ponte Vista plans were finally approved by the Los Angeles City Council on March 4, ending one of the longest-running community debates in recent memory.

Not everyone turned out for the hourlong celebration. Some critics remain concerned that even the significantly scaled-down project — from an original 2,300 homes to 676 homes — will dump too much extra traffic onto an already congested Western Avenue.

But for the most part, even those who fought the project acknowledged that the smaller size will be a better fit in the community. Those who supported it all along would have preferred a larger development, but still are happy with the smaller, final revision.

“It’s been a work in progress, but it’s been a worthwhile work in progress,” said Sandy Bradley of the San Pedro chamber.

Among developer concessions are:

- A permanent access road running from Western Avenue to Mary Star of the Sea High School to the east.
- A project labor agreement with the Building Trades Council.
- A 2.4-acre park along Western Avenue that will be open to the public.

Also included will be perimeter biking and hiking trails that will be open to the community.

Plans call for 208 single-family homes along with town houses and single- and multilevel condominiums.

Developers will plant 3,000 new trees on the property.

“It’s a very different project than what I was faced with when Bob Bisno walked into my office and wanted to build 2,300 homes,” said now Rep. Hahn, D-San Pedro, in a telephone interview Thursday from Washington, D.C. “It took a lot of years and a lot of meetings, but the same message kept coming back to me — the neighborhood just really didn’t want a dense project. ... I think this smaller project is going to be a good one for San Pedro.”

The project includes environmentally green elements, landscape upgrades to Western Avenue and traffic improvements at 16 local intersections.

Rancho Palos Verdes city officials, who also had early concerns about impacts, eventually were brought on board as well and attended Thursday’s groundbreaking. Western Avenue is the border that divides San Pedro on the east and Rancho Palos Verdes to the west.

“It’s been a long, rocky road,” Rancho Palos Verdes Councilman Jim Knight said. “It went from 2,300

down to 1,900 down to 1,300 ... and now it's down to 676. We've looked at the plans and think there's a lot of good things here. ... It's taken a long time, but I think it's settled down to a good place. It's an affirmation also that cities can work collaboratively.”

Lead investor iStar Fincancial Inc. took over Ponte Vista in 2010 and had pledged to re-evaluate plans and bring them closer in line with what the community wanted. In 2013, the developer said its final number would be 676 homes, with an absolute cap — that would require subsequent city approvals — of 700.

In the end, Buscaino said Thursday that community objections and input served to make “this a better project, a good project — the right project.”

Built in the 1960s, the San Pedro Navy homes housed hundreds of enlistees and their families through the years until the Long Beach Naval Station was closed in 1995. The last families moved out in the late 1990s.

The homes then sat vacant and fenced off for years before the property was eventually declared surplus and auctioned off by the Navy to a private developer — Bisno for \$125 million in 2005.

Steve Magee, senior vice president of iStar, said Ponte Vista is envisioned to be a community very similar to the one where Navy families lived for so many years.

“Our vision for this site is really summed up by a family feeling so safe that their kids could play (outdoors) like we all used to when we were kids,” he said.

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Planned demolition of San Pedro Navy housing site prompts memories

Soon-to-be-demolished housing recalls former Navy kids to a special time

Workers are uprooting trees and prepping boarded-up homes for demolition, making way for the Ponte Vista housing development, set to begin construction over the next few years.

Most people won't miss the current eyesore along Western Avenue, which was vacated more than 20 years ago when the Long Beach Naval Station closed. But those who grew up there will watch the takedown through a much different lens.

For them, this was once home. It's where they learned how to toss a football spiral, ride a bike and drive a car. It's where they celebrated birthdays and graduations in busy backyards with swing sets, barbecues and family pets.

It's perhaps hard to imagine looking at the place now.

But those houses and yards were once teeming with life and those who lived there can't seem to hold back the flood of emotions and memories as they watch what were once their cherished family homes so many years ago slip forever into history.

"It brings me to tears," said Benny Tadeo of San Pedro, whose military family moved into the Navy housing in the 1970s. "It's hard to drive by there."

As plans finally move forward to build a new for-sale housing development on the rolling 61.5-acre parcel, former residents who grew up in the old housing in the 1970s and 1980s are reconnecting, largely with the help of two Facebook pages for San Pedro Navy housing alumni.

The group pages have quickly come alive with posts from all over the country as former residents — now grown and raising families of their own — add old photographs and reminisce about their childhood neighborhood.

"How many people make a page about where they grew up?" posted Derrick Williams of Los Angeles. "We are so blessed to have grown up in a time and place like San Pedro Navy housing. It's amazing how special this place is to each of us and the memories we have shared. ... Though it may be gone in a few

months, it will never be taken out of our hearts and the memories will never fade.”

The Navy youngsters attended Taper Avenue Elementary, Dodson Middle and either San Pedro or Narbonne high schools and many stayed in touch through the years. Most are raising children of their own; some are grandparents.

Joe Moreau and June Clary both lived in San Pedro’s Navy homes as children from 1974-79. In 2006, they reconnected through a classmates’ reunion site and were married in 2010.

Benny Tadeo, who has a 16-year-old son, said he has such strong feelings about the place that he might even buy one of the new Ponte Vista town houses when they’re built.

“It was just a big playground,” he said.

“Someone’s father would take on the role (for other kids) whose dads were overseas,” said his twin brother, Lenny Tadeo, who lives in Tucson, Ariz. “We all played baseball together, everybody hung out and did everything together.”

The youngsters also fished off the docks near the Long Beach Naval Station on Terminal Island, sitting next to the big battleships that were then based there.

The Navy homes in San Pedro weren’t lavish. Most of them were stucco duplexes painted a khaki shade with brown trim and sliding glass windows (“I remember that because we snuck out of them a lot,” said Christine Crane Hinton, whose family moved there in the mid-1980s when she was in the sixth grade.)

But they offered plenty of indoor and outdoor space for growing families who moved frequently as parents were reassigned.

The children had yards to play in and trees to climb. The perimeter hillsides provided hours of fun as youngsters slid to the bottom on panels of cardboard.

And neighbors developed such close connections that they frequently shared meals and baby-sitting responsibilities. Everyone looked out for each other.

Ask the now-grown Navy kids what made the place so special and most point to that closeness of the families and a sense of security. An on-site mini-mart sold giant pickles, Popsicles and the grocery basics families needed. Lightly traveled private roads connecting the sprawling, self-contained neighborhood across from Green Hills Memorial Park made for prime skateboarding. A recreation center sponsored dances, and softball and baseball fields were well used after school every day.

Growing up, the kids owned the streets. Youngsters and teens would hang out until well past dark, sometimes at someone’s house, sometimes on a well-lit street corner, before the gray shore patrol vans rolled through to remind them of the 10 p.m. curfew.

The vans, said Lenny Tadeo, “drove through real slow ... they had spotlights but we’d hide from them all the time. Sometimes we’d wait until they went by and we’d jump on the back of the vans, being quiet and sitting below the window so they couldn’t see you. When they’d stop, we’d run and they’d chase us, saying they were going to tell our dads.”

Parents searching for their kids at dinner time simply set in motion the round-robin telephone calls to figure out which block they were on, telling parents there to send them on home. Many of the dads also developed whistles that were recognizable to their kids from blocks away.

“One of my fondest memories was on South John Sloat Drive (streets were named for military figures) when my friends had to go in to eat supper,” Williams said in a Facebook post. “We needed a quarterback to finish our football game; someone’s dad came out and did it, then another dad came out, then another friend and his dad joined the game. Next thing you knew we had two full teams in the middle of the street with fathers and sons mixed on the teams, fathers and sons waiting to come in on the sidelines to play, moms and daughters watching and cheering. ... I will never forget it. That was a neighborhood that looked out for each other, that was Navy housing.”

There were no cellphones and yet word of a spontaneous party, football game or other gathering spread within minutes from block to block.

“I felt like we were our own little community and the bonds we had with each other are still alive today,” said Lisa Moran Dutton, who moved into Navy housing when she was in elementary school in the 1980s and now lives in Kentucky. “I’m still friends with a lot of the friends I had then ... I’d give anything to take my kids there and tell them, ‘This is where your mom grew up.’ ”

The houses, she said, “weren’t anything fancy. But you just kind of felt safe because there were people watching out for you.”

The Tadeo brothers were 5 years old when their parents and four sisters piled into the family’s blue Pontiac and drove across country to San Pedro, where their father was stationed at the end of the Vietnam War.

“I slept on the floorboards,” Benny said. “I just remember it was miserable; I fought with my sisters all the way.”

But looking back, the next 11 years were golden, he said.

“The housing project and the military gave us a life beyond our dreams,” he said of the home at 2348 Taper Ave., one of the earlier structures to be demolished to make way for the new Mary Star of the Sea High School campus on an adjacent vacated naval property.

They lived in what was known as the “crackerjack” section of housing away from higher-ranking sailors, but, among the kids, there was little class distinction.

“We had a four-bedroom house with two baths and a backyard,” he said. “I remember every year my twin brother and I had birthday parties.”

Navy housing block parties and Fourth of July barbecues were legendary.

“Our neighbors would all come out, my dad would wave them over, people we didn’t even know,” he said.

When he was about 8 years old and was caught stealing ice cream from the mini-mart, his punishment was crushing boxes at the store for a week.

"It was our coming-of-age time," said Hinton, whose family moved into the Navy housing from a small town in Oregon when her father announced they were moving to "Hollywood." She now lives in Atlanta. "We hung out together and kept each other out of trouble."

Because military families moved so frequently, the youngsters were quick at making new friends and adapting, she said.

Coming to Los Angeles from much smaller and sometimes rural towns across the country also brought with it a chance to broaden horizons.

"Living there helped us to be very universal and global, we learned how to get along with different kinds of people," said Hinton, who remembered being awe-struck by all the palm trees and going to a Michael Jackson concert. "It was a cool time, a time of our first dance and our first kiss and our first crush."

Lenny Tadeo remembers an ethnic melting pot of friends that included Filipinos, Latinos and African-Americans. Most everyone had a story of living abroad.

"Families were always coming and going," he said. "Most of my friends were either from Guam or Hawaii, we met people from North and South Carolina, we had friends from all over. ... You knew everybody. ... Our friends were like our brothers and sisters. Nobody locked their doors, you could come and go."

It was, he said, a great childhood.

"It was amazing growing up there," he said, recalling the collective smells of the different ethnic foods in the air at dinner time. "We'd go to the little mini-mart and get a purple Shasta and a snickers bar, and you were good."

"It was a really innocent time. ... Sweet memories," Hinton said.

The Long Beach Naval Station closed on Oct. 1, 1994, ending a 52-year history that once saw the nation's biggest battleships docked there.

The Base Realignment and Closure Commission ordered the station's closure in 1991 as part of a plan to scale back the nation's military.

"Change is a fact of life, an enduring part of nature," said Navy Vice Adm. David Robinson at the emotional closing ceremony nearly 20 years ago. "Politicians promise it, beauticians sell it and, for the most part, we dread it."

The last families moved out of the housing in the early 1990s.

When Lenny Tadeo visited San Pedro's housing site several years ago, he said "it broke my heart" when he saw that there was now a parking lot where his house once stood.

As a remembrance to take home, he collected a bottle of sand from the nearby hillside where they used to play.

"It's almost surreal now, with the base gone and the Navy housing the way it is," Lenny Tadeo said.

On a recent afternoon, several of the housing community's alumni who still live nearby — Anna Corrales, Benny Tadeo, Apple Thompson and Millie Velasco — gathered to take a last look at their old homes.

The impromptu reunion had everyone pointing and reminiscing as Ponte Vista staff escorted the small group to a few of their old homes, allowing them to collect the faded address plaques to keep as mementos.

Fernandez collected the one from a friend's house.

"We were just in this little insular community. It was like one big adventure living here," Corrales said.

While so many homes and streets were recognizable, everything looked quite different — and very empty.

"It's so freaky, it looks like a ghost town," said Velasco, who now lives in Redondo Beach.

Velasco, who lived in Navy housing from 1986-92, brought her 8-year-old son and her mom, Milagros Velasco of Redondo Beach, with her for the sentimental journey back in time.

Walking up to her old house, she peered into the broken window at the kitchen that once was brimming with good aromas but now was strewn with broken pieces of drywall and trash.

Family dinners, she recalled, were always consumed together around the table at home — yours or a neighbor's. Going out to eat at the Coco's next door was a rare treat.

In her old backyard, there was the tree she used to climb. And, not far away, there was the spot where her father buried her black-and-white cat, Twinkle.

"What I'd pay to skate (board) down this street again," Benny Tadeo said wistfully.

As a crane grabbed the top of a palm tree in the distance and pulled it to the ground, Velasco watched, blinking back tears.

"It's just so sad," she said. "I almost didn't want to come here ... it's like seeing your childhood torn down."

Walking back to the Ponte Vista office at the front of the property, Velasco suddenly stopped in her tracks. She asked if she could make a quick final visit to her backyard.

"I'm going to say goodbye to my cat," she said, dashing back. She knelt near her childhood pet's burial spot for several moments before rejoining the group.

"It was the best place when we were kids," Benny Tadeo said, taking one last look around.

"It's all good," Velasco said. "Life goes on."

I. **Vacation:**

II. **Neighborhood Council Requests:**

a. **Ponte Vista:**

1. **Demolition Schedule/Update:**

1. The Ponte Vista team is in the process of meeting pre-demolition conditions that are a part of the project in order to be issued demolition permits. These include removing palm trees and fronds to ensure that they are not nesting habitats. They are also in the process of removing the roofs to ensure that there are no bats living inside. They are attempting to complete as much site prep-work as possible before demolition permits are issued.
2. The Ponte Vista team has been made aware of concerns about animals appearing in neighboring yards. Back in January, iStar, the owners of Ponte Vista, engaged a pest control company for the very purpose of proactively dealing with potential rodents and other animals, such as skunks or raccoons, which may have been present at the Ponte Vista site. They believed that their efforts then dealt with those issues. However, given this feedback, they will immediately reengage the pest control service to re-examine the site in light of the issues. We'll let you know what the suggested course of action is once we hear back from the pest control company.
3. The Ponte Vista team has also been made aware of dust concerns. The EIR outlines mitigation measures for dust abatement, including: watering, watering active grading/excavation sites thrice daily, coverage of stockpiles with tarps, limiting vehicle speed, daily cleanup of dirt carried onto paved streets, and suspension of grading/excavation during winds over 15mph. Additionally, it states that signage will be posted at the site with contact info so that people can call to report dust generation. The signs have been ordered and should be placed soon. As part of the demolition permit, inspectors have already checked for asbestos and any particles have already been removed. They double check as they go along and remove accordingly.

I am writing to provide you with a brief update on the various ways California Water Service Company (Cal Water) is responding to the current drought. As I am sure you know, Governor Brown declared a drought emergency in January. Given continued drought conditions, the Governor issued an executive order in April that asks all Californians to step up their efforts to conserve water.

Cal Water is well-prepared not only to address the drought, but also to respond to the Governor's call for additional water conservation. Following the directive of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), the independent state agency that regulates Cal Water, we added a new rule (Rule 14.1) to our tariff in order to achieve a 20-percent reduction in water use. Rule 14.1 establishes a number of prohibited uses of water (outlined in Section A), including:

- Use of water that results in runoff to gutters or streets
- Washing of vehicles without use of a shut-off nozzle
- Use of water for washing hard-surfaced areas such as driveways and sidewalks
- Use of water for filling decorative lakes or ponds
- Use of water for decorative fountains unless it utilizes a recirculation system
- Use of water for the filling of swimming pools

Although we do not currently anticipate the need, Rule 14.1 also establishes the procedures for implementing mandatory rationing in the event that the water supply situation worsens. I have enclosed a copy of the complete Rule 14.1 for your reference.

This new rule builds upon our industry-leading water conservation program. Our program is focused on educating our customers about the importance of water conservation and providing them with tools to easily manage their water use. Our conservation efforts support both our short- and long-term water supply planning. Because these robust efforts are ongoing, they lessen the extent to which we have to ramp-up our programs and outreach during droughts.

We are committed to ensuring that our customers receive timely information about the drought and the numerous water conservation programs we offer. To that end, we will once again be reaching out to our customers through multiple outlets such as bill inserts, press releases, social media updates, radio advertising, and public service announcements.

Our comprehensive, district-specific Conservation Master Plan (CMP) guides conservation program development and investment, while identifying innovative cost-effective programs to incorporate in our water-efficiency efforts. The CMP for the Palos Verdes District is available on our web site at www.calwater.com. It can be reviewed by navigating to "Conservation" and selecting "Urban Water Management Plans." The complete CMP is included as Appendix G.



GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Voluntary Conservation: If water supplies are projected to be insufficient to meet normal customer demand, and are beyond the control of the utility, the utility may elect to activate voluntary conservation using the portion of this plan set forth in Section A of this Rule:
 - a. Cal Water will first notify the Director of the Division of Water & Audits of its intent, via a letter in both hard-copy and e-mailed formats.
 - b. Cal Water will also notify its customers of the voluntary conservation measures through a bill insert or direct mailing.
2. Mandatory Rationing: If, in the opinion of the utility, more stringent water measures are required, the utility shall request Commission authorization to activate the staged mandatory rationing measures set forth in Sections B through E of this Rule.
 - a. The specific stages and conditions of mandatory rationing will be contained in a "Schedule 14.1 – Staged Mandatory Rationing" tariff.
 - b. Cal Water may propose the addition of a Schedule 14.1 tariff to its tariff book as set forth in Sections B through E of this Rule.
3. Drought Memorandum Account: All expenses incurred by Cal Water to comply with Resolution No. W-4976 (including activating Rule 14.1, adding Schedule 14.1 to its tariff book, and activating Schedule 14.1) and to pay penalties to water wholesalers that have not been considered in a General Rate Case or other proceeding, shall be recoverable by Cal Water if determined to be reasonable by the Commission. These expenses will be offset by any fines or penalties collected from customers for water use violations.
 - a. These monies shall be accumulated by the utility in a separate memorandum account for disposition as directed or authorized from time to time by the Commission.

A. CONSERVATION - NONESSENTIAL OR UNAUTHORIZED WATER USE

No customer shall use utility-supplied water for non-essential or unauthorized uses, including but not limited to the uses described below. Customers are also subject to any requirement imposed by a local governmental entity that further limits water use. Cal Water will coordinate with local governmental entities as needed to minimize conflicting requirements.

1. Excessive use of water when a utility has notified the customer in writing to repair broken or defective plumbing, sprinkler, or watering or irrigation system, and the customer has failed to effect such repairs within five business days;
2. Use of water that results in flooding or run-off in gutters or streets;
3. Washing of vehicles, including cars, trucks, buses, boats, aircraft, and trailers, except with the use of equipment, such as a positive action shut-off nozzle, that avoids wasteful use or to protect the health and safety of the public;
4. Use of water for washing driveways, patios, parking lots, tennis courts, or other hard-surfaced areas, except when necessary to protect the health and safety of the public;
5. Use of water for street cleaning with trucks, except for initial wash-down for construction purposes (if street sweeping is not feasible), or to protect the health and safety of the public;
6. Use of water for construction purposes, such as consolidation of backfill, dust control, or other uses unless no other method can be used.
7. Use of water for filling or refilling decorative lakes or ponds unless necessary to sustain aquatic life;

3. Procedure for activating Schedule 14.1: The Tier 2 advice letter requesting activation of a stage of the Schedule 14.1 tariff shall: (N)
- a. Include but not be limited to a justification for activating the particular stage of mandatory rationing, as well as the period during which the particular stage of mandatory rationing measures will be in effect.
 - b. Be accompanied by the customer notification measures detailed in Section E (Publicity), below.
4. De-activating Schedule 14.1: When Schedule 14.1 is activated and Cal Water determines that water supplies are again sufficient to meet normal demands, and mandatory rationing measures are no longer necessary, Cal Water shall seek Commission approval via a Tier 1 advice letter to de-activate the particular stage of mandatory rationing that had been authorized.

- 6. If, despite installation of such flow-restricting device pursuant to the provisions of the previous enforcement conditions, any such non-essential or unauthorized use of water shall continue, then the utility may discontinue water service to such customer. 
2013 Annual & Lifetime Water Savings

Water Demand and Local Rainfall




Cumulative Water Savings

These expenses will be offset by any fines or penalties collected from customers for water use violations.
 - a. These monies shall be accumulated by the utility in a separate memorandum account for disposition as directed or authorized from time to time by the Commission.

A. CONSERVATION - NONESSENTIAL OR UNAUTHORIZED WATER USE

No customer shall use utility-supplied water for non-essential or unauthorized uses, including but not limited to the uses described below. Customers are also subject to any requirement imposed by a local governmental entity that further limits water use. Cal Water will coordinate with local governmental entities as needed to minimize conflicting requirements.

- 1. Excessive use of water when a utility has notified the customer in writing to repair broken or defective plumbing, sprinkler, or watering or irrigation system, and the customer has failed to effect such repairs within five business days;
- 2. Use of water that results in flooding or run-off in gutters or streets;
- 3. Washing of vehicles, including cars, trucks, buses, boats, aircraft, and trailers, except with the use of equipment, such as a positive action shut-off nozzle, that avoids wasteful use or to protect the health and safety of the public;
- 4. Use of water for washing driveways, patios, parking lots, tennis courts, or other hard-surfaced areas, except when necessary to protect the health and safety of the public;
- 5. Use of water for street cleaning with trucks, except for initial wash-down for construction purposes (if street sweeping is not feasible), or to protect the health and safety of the public;
- 6. Use of water for construction purposes, such as consolidation of backfill, dust control, or other uses unless no other method can be used.

- 7. Use of water for filling or refilling decorative lakes or ponds unless necessary to sustain aquatic life; (N)

- 9. Use of water for the filling or refilling of swimming pools, except as required by a government agency; and
- 10. Service of water by any restaurant except upon the request of the patron.

B. STAGED MANDATORY RATIONING OF WATER USAGE

- 1. Adding a Schedule 14.1 tariff: Before a water wholesaler or government agency declares mandatory rationing, Cal Water may request the addition to its tariff book of a "Schedule 14.1 - Staged Mandatory Water Rationing" tariff, via a Tier 2 advice letter with full justification.
 - a. Cal Water may not activate Schedule 14.1 until it has been authorized to do so by the Commission as delegated to the Division of Water & Audits. A staged Schedule 14.1 that has been authorized by the Commission shall remain dormant until triggered by specific conditions detailed in the Schedule 14.1 tariff, and Cal Water has requested and received authorization for activating a stage by Commission.
 - b. Notice of the Tier 2 advice letter and associated public hearing (if required) shall be provided to customers through a bill insert or a direct mailing as set forth in Section E (Publicity) of this Rule.
 - c. Cal Water shall comply with all requirements of Sections 350-358 of the California Water Code.
 - d. The Tier 2 advice letter requesting the addition of a Schedule 14.1 tariff to its tariff book shall include but not be limited to:

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3. Procedure for activating Schedule 14.1: The Tier 2 advice letter requesting activation of a stage of the Schedule 14.1 tariff shall: (N)
- a. Include but not be limited to a justification for activating the particular stage of mandatory rationing, as well as the period during which the particular stage of mandatory rationing measures will be in effect.
 - b. Be accompanied by the customer notification measures detailed in Section E (Publicity), below.
4. De-activating Schedule 14.1: When Schedule 14.1 is activated and Cal Water determines that water supplies are again sufficient to meet normal demands, and mandatory rationing measures are no longer necessary, Cal Water shall seek Commission approval via a Tier 1 advice letter to de-activate the particular stage of mandatory rationing that had been authorized.
5. Fines and Penalties: Any monies collected by Cal Water through water use violation fines or penalties shall not be accounted for as income but rather booked to a Drought Memorandum Account to offset authorized expenses incurred.

C. ENFORCEMENT OF MANDATORY CONSERVATION AND RATIONING

- 1. The water use restrictions of the conservation program in Section A of this rule become mandatory when: the Schedule 14.1-Staged Mandatory Rationing tariff is triggered, Cal Water files a Tier 2 advice letter requesting activation of a particular stage, and authorization is received from the Commission as delegated to DWA.
- 2. Cal Water may, after one written warning, install a flow-restricting device on the service line of any customer observed by Cal Water personnel to be using water for any non-essential or unauthorized use as defined in Section A, above.
- 3. A flow restrictor shall not restrict water delivery by greater than 50% of normal flow and shall provide the premise with a minimum of 3 Ccf/month. The restricting device may be removed only by the utility, only after a three-day period has elapsed, and only upon payment of the appropriate removal charge as set forth in Schedule No. 14.1.
- 4. After the removal of the restricting device, if any non-essential or unauthorized use of water continues, the utility may install another flow-restricting device without written warning. The restricting device shall remain in place until water supply conditions warrant its removal and the appropriate charge for removal has been paid to the utility.
- 5. Any tampering with flow restricting device by a customer can result in fines or discontinuation of water use at Cal Water's discretion.
- 6. If, despite installation of such flow-restricting device pursuant to the provisions of the previous enforcement conditions, any such non-essential or unauthorized use of water shall continue, then the utility may discontinue water service to such customer. In such latter event, a charge as provided in Rule No. 11 shall be paid to the utility as a condition to restoration of service. (N)

7. The charge for removal of a flow-restricting device shall be in accordance with Schedule No. 14.1.

D. APPEAL PROCEDURE

1. Any customer who seeks a variance from any of the provisions of this voluntary water conservation or mandatory rationing plan shall notify the utility in writing, explaining in detail the reason for such a variation. The utility shall respond to each such request.
2. Any customer not satisfied with the utility's response may file an appeal with the Director of DWA.
3. If the customer disagrees with such disposition, the customer shall have the right to file a formal complaint with the Commission. Except as set forth in this Section, no person shall have any right or claim in law or in equity, against the utility because of, or as a result of, any matter or thing done or threatened to be done pursuant to the provisions of the voluntary water conservation or mandatory rationing plan.

E. PUBLICITY

1. Adding a Schedule 14.1 tariff: As stated under Section B.1.b and c, when Cal Water requests the addition of a Schedule 14.1 – Staged Mandatory Water Rationing tariff via a Tier 2 advice letter, it shall provide notice to customers of the Tier 2 advice letter, and of the associated public hearing, through bill inserts or direct mailing, and shall comply with all requirements of Sections 350-358 of the California Water Code (CWC), including but not limited to the following:
 - a. In order to be in compliance with both the General Order 96-B and the CWC, Cal Water shall provide notice via both newspaper and bill insert/direct mailing.
 - b. Cal Water shall file one notice for each advice letter filed that includes both notice of the filing of the Tier 2 advice letter as well as the details of the public hearing (date, time, place, etc).
 - c. The public hearing shall be held after the Cal Water files the Tier 2 advice letter, and before the Commission authorizes the addition of Schedule 14.1 to Cal Water's tariff book, except in cases of emergency water shortages approved by DWA
 - d. Cal Water shall consult with Division of Water and Audits staff prior to filing the advice letter in order to determine details of the public hearing.
2. Activating Schedule 14.1: In the event that a Schedule 14.1-Staged Mandatory Rationing Plan is triggered, and Cal Water requests activation through the filing of a Tier 2 advice letter, Cal Water shall notify its customers and provide each customer with a copy of Schedule 14.1 by means of bill insert or direct mailing. Notification shall take place prior to imposing any fines associated with this plan. If activation of Schedule 14.1 occurs one year or more since the public hearing associated with adding Schedule 14.1 to its tariffs, then Cal Water shall conduct a public hearing pursuant to California Water Code Section 351 prior to activating the mandatory rationing stage.
3. Updates during activation: During the period that a stage of Schedule 14.1 is activated, Cal Water shall provide customers with updates, in at least every other bill, regarding its water supply status and the results of customers' conservation efforts.





2013 Annual & Lifetime Water Savings

Cumulative Water Savings








