**FIRST LOS ANGELES (LA) COUNTY OPERATIONAL AREA (OA) FUNCTIONAL
“COMMUNICATIONS ONLY” EXERCISE**

On October 22nd, from approximately 9 AM to 3 PM, the City participated in the communications based LA County OA 2014 Functional Exercise. The exercise was based on a catastrophic earthquake along the San Andreas Fault affecting the entire LA County OA equally. Several types of communications systems were tested that include: 1) The Countywide Integrated Radio System (CWIRS) used by cities to contact the LA County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and vice versa; 2) City EOC amateur radio operator(s) transmitting to a Disaster Communications System (DCS) operator in a different jurisdiction; and 3) situation information sent via messenger to a designated LA Sheriff’s Department (LASD) Contact Sheriff’s Station. Participating cities were prompted with instructions at the beginning of the exercise via CWIRS and then proceeded to test the communications equipment of their choice by delivering Situation Reports and Resource Requests to the LA County EOC. The City successfully tested all three methods of communication and ended participation in the exercise by about 3 PM. All in all, from what we understand from LA County OA staff, city participation in the exercise was better than anticipated and the exercise was labeled success.

**EBOLA INFORMATION AND READINESS COURTESY OF THE LOS ANGELES

CONTROL AND PREVENTION**

Ebola, previously known as Ebola hemorrhagic fever, is a rare and deadly disease caused by infection with one of the Ebola virus strains. Ebola can cause disease in humans and nonhuman primates (monkeys, gorillas, and chimpanzees). The natural reservoir host of Ebola virus remains unknown. However, on the basis of evidence and the nature of similar viruses, researchers believe that the virus is animal-borne and that bats are the most likely reservoir. Four of the five virus strains occur in an animal host native to Africa.

SYMPTOMS OF EBOLA INCLUDE:

- Fever
- Severe headache
- Muscle pain
- Weakness
- Diarrhea
- Vomiting
- Abdominal (stomach) pain
- Unexplained hemorrhage (bleeding or bruising)

Symptoms may appear anywhere from 2 to 21 days after exposure to Ebola, but the average is 8 to 10 days.

Recovery from Ebola depends on good supportive clinical care and the patient's immune response. People who recover from Ebola infection develop antibodies that last for at least 10 years.

PREVENTION

There is no FDA-approved vaccine available for Ebola.

If you travel to or are in an area affected by an Ebola outbreak, make sure to do the following:

- Practice careful hygiene. For example, wash your hands with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer and avoid contact with blood and body fluids.
- Do not handle items that may have come in contact with an infected person's blood or body fluids (such as clothes, bedding, needles, and medical equipment).
- Avoid funeral or burial rituals that require handling the body of someone who has died from Ebola.
- Avoid contact with bats and nonhuman primates or blood, fluids, and raw meat prepared from these animals.
- Avoid hospitals in West Africa where Ebola patients are being treated. The U.S. embassy or consulate is often able to provide advice on facilities.
- After you return, monitor your health for 21 days and seek medical care immediately if you develop symptoms of Ebola.

LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES 2014 LEGISLATIVE SCORECARD

On October 23, 2014, the League of California Cities released its 2014 "scorecard" for legislative voting records on sixteen (16) significant pieces of State legislation (see attachment). As you may recall from last year, the League evaluated fourteen (14) pieces of legislation. In this year's scorecard, legislators' votes have been tabulated for groups of five (5) economic development bills, two (2) redevelopment bills and nine (9) local control bills to arrive at a final weighted-average score.

The closer a legislator's weighted-average score is to one hundred percent (100%) on the League scorecard, the more closely that legislator voted in agreement with the League's position during the 2014 session. The City of Rancho Palos Verdes' State legislative delegation includes State Senator Ted Lieu, representing the 28th State Senate district; and State Assembly Member Al Muratsuchi, representing the 66th State Assembly District. A brief summary of our legislative delegation's League-calculated scores is provided in the table below.

In releasing the 2014 scorecard, the League offered several comments and caveats on interpreting the voting records that were analyzed:

- 1) The most powerful tool legislators have is their votes, and they should be held accountable for them with certain caveats. Legislators that score well should be thanked for their efforts and attention to city issues. Yet the challenge with vote records is that a sampling of legislative floor votes does not always provide the full story. For example, the League lobbied on many bills that are not on this list. Some bills were stopped in committees; others were amended to remove concerns. A legislator may have helped on a budget issue or in committee or in behind-the-scenes efforts to secure a helpful amendment or broker a compromise. A legislator may have sponsored legislation or voted on other measures important to their city not reflected in this listing. The League has highlighted other actions by providing special recognitions.
- 2) The bills on this list are a representative sample of some of the major bills of importance to the League. Still, keep the relative importance of these bills and how they affect your community in mind. For some cities a vote to address redevelopment dissolution or on legislation that restores or removes aspects of local control may outweigh the importance of other bills on the list. There also may be bills important to your city that are not on this list.
- 3) Protecting local control and revenue in the legislature usually means opposing or seeking amendments on bills backed by powerful interests. Thus "No" votes and

abstentions on bills the League is supposed to provide significant benefit and often carry more weight.

- 4) Democrats authored all of the bills on this list. A simple majority can pass the budget, and the Democrats have a numerical majority that controls the flow of legislation on all committees. Few Republican-authored bills make it through the process. All bills on the list only required a majority vote. Democrats have 28 out of 40 seats in the Senate and 55 out of 80 seats in the Assembly. This means that the Democrat majority can pass bills without needing Republican votes. It also means that not all Democrats need to vote for bills.
- 5) In several instances a vote in only one house is reflected because the measure was either stopped by that vote on the floor, amendments were secured prior to the floor vote in the second house, or the bill passed the floor of one house but did not make it to a floor vote in the second house.

UPDATE ON LOS ANGELES REGIONAL INTEROPERABLE COMMUNICATIONS SYSTEM (LA-RICS) AUTHORITY

On October 23, 2014, Staff attended the Joint City Manager's Meeting of the California Contract Cities Association (CCCA) and the Los Angeles Chapter of the League of California Cities (League) for a presentation regarding LA-RICS (see attached meeting handout). Los Angeles County CEO William T Fujioka provided an update for meeting attendees. He reiterated that, with the extension of the "opt out" period to November 2015, participating jurisdictions would not be assessed any direct costs for the LA-RICS system until after that date. He also noted that the LTE (i.e., wireless broadband) component of the LA-RICS had recently received a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), and that the LA-RICS is expected to begin construction of LTE sites on County-owned properties beginning in November 2014. The deadline by which the entire LTE component of the LA-RICS system is to be constructed and operational is September 2015.

Locally, LA-RICS conducted geotechnical investigations for the proposed LTE site at Fire Station No. 83 in Miraleste Plaza on October 17, 2014. The proposed 70-foot-tall combination monopole/hose-drying rack at this location will not require permits from the City. However, LA-RICS is expected to apply for a Coastal Permit for the proposed 70-foot-tall monopole or "monopine" for the LTE site at Fire Station No. 53 on Palos Verdes Drive South, which will require City approval, appealable to both the Planning Commission and City Council. However, since Fire Station No. 53 is located in a non-appealable portion of the City's coastal zone, this Coastal Permit will not be appealable to or by the California Coastal Commission.

Re: League 2014 Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

Please find enclosed a copy of the League of California Cities vote record report on key city bills for the 2014 legislative session. In 2014, the League focused on sponsoring and supporting legislation to help develop new community and economic development tools and funding options for city services. These efforts include addressing issues with redevelopment dissolution, economic development and infrastructure development.

The League also sponsored proactive legislation to improve the regulatory framework for medical marijuana and restore local authority over massage establishments. Several helpful bills made it through the process and were signed into law, while other proposals for new tools and resources stalled or were vetoed by the Governor. On other fronts, it was another busy year for defending local control on measures that unduly restricted local authority and flexibility or increased costs on financially struggling cities, some of which were vetoed by the Governor.

The League compiled the final floor actions on 16 bills in the Assembly and 15 bills in the Senate. These bills have been organized into subgroups focusing on economic development, redevelopment and local control. The votes for each subgroup are reflected then combined into a final percentage. The League also provided special thanks and recognition in the report for a number of members who provided critical assistance to the League during the legislative year. Members receiving such recognition are identified by a "SP.REC" sign next to the final vote percentage.

We appreciate that many legislators score well in the attached vote records. Thank you for your support on city issues. Some of this, no doubt, reflects the state's improved fiscal condition, providing everyone the opportunity to move forward rather than debating cuts to vital state or local programs and services. It also reflects that legislators carried many bills this year helpful to cities or worked to address local concerns with amendments on more contentious legislation. Finally, we also hope this result reflects an improved, more collaborative, working relationship developing between legislators and city officials.

City officials are by nature problem solvers more interested in improving their respective communities than rehashing the past. They want to move forward with economic development and infrastructure projects and grow jobs, and to continue to improve our environment and quality of life. Given that many cities are still facing significant fiscal difficulty they also appreciate it when their legislators remain sensitive to the diversity of local communities and understand the importance of retaining flexibility and authority to address local issues.

City leaders and the League welcome a continued dialogue with you in 2015 about how we can better collaborate to serve the people of California and our cities. We look forward to working in partnership to move California, its cities and residents forward.

2014 League Legislative Vote Records on Key City Bills

The 2014 Legislative Session was highlighted by continuing improvement in state budget conditions and legislative leadership on a number of important state and local priorities. Cap and trade revenues were dispersed for the first time, and funds were allocated for infrastructure, affordable housing and repayment of a decade-old debt for local mandates.

After three years of post-redevelopment stalemate, the Governor put a tax increment proposal on the table for local infrastructure and economic development, legislators advanced other tax increment and tax credit proposals to spur urban revitalization and attract and retain jobs, and a bi-partisan agreement was forged on a water bond. In many respects, it was a legislative session of exceptional progress.

The League supported several measures that would address various aspects of redevelopment dissolution, including a proposal to authorize a new tax increment financing option for disadvantaged communities and other bills to expand and improve local infrastructure. Consistent with its mission, the League also opposed measures that would have unduly restricted local authority and flexibility or increased costs on financially struggling cities.

For this report the League compiled the final floor actions on 16 bills in the Assembly and 15 bills in the Senate of significant importance to cities. These bills have been assigned to economic development, redevelopment or local control categories. Votes consistent with the League's position are marked with a "+" sign, and those in conflict with the League's position are marked with a "-" sign. Abstentions, which can be important, are reflected with either a "NV+" or "NV-" sign. Absences are noted with an "ABS" sign. While all votes are reflected, several members were assigned an incomplete "INC" for their total score because they were absent for five listed votes due to illness or other reasons. Three Senators were assigned "N/A" because they were suspended and not eligible to vote on the measures.

In the following section, the League also thanks and recognizes a number of members who authored important bills or provided other critical assistance to the League during the legislative year. Members receiving such recognition are identified by a "SP.REC" sign next to the final vote percentage on the vote record report.

Special Legislative Thanks and Recognitions (In Alphabetical Order)

In the Assembly:

- *Assembly Member Katcho Achadjian* deserves special thanks for his consistent and strong support for local government both through his leadership as Chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee, as well as his excellent floor voting record on League priority bills.
- *Assembly Member Luis Alejo* deserves thanks for his continued partnership with the League through his authorship of AB 2280, a bill supported by a diverse coalition of stakeholders that would restore redevelopment authority for disadvantaged

communities. While the Governor vetoed the measure, he left the door open to return with the bill next year drafted outside of the parameters of former redevelopment law.

- **Assembly Speaker Toni Atkins** has continued to demonstrate her support for local government by authoring and obtaining the Governor's signature on two helpful redevelopment dissolution clean up bills, AB 471 and AB 1963. She was also instrumental in securing \$100 million for affordable housing programs in the state budget and working to obtain significant improvements supported by the League to the Governor's Enhanced Infrastructure Financing District proposal that was placed into SB 628 (Beall) at the end of session.
- **Assembly Member Richard Bloom** deserves thanks for his extensive efforts with AB 2493 to permit local agencies to access bond proceeds issued by former redevelopment agencies in 2011. Regrettably, the Governor vetoed the measure. Mr. Bloom was also helpful in crafting workable provisions associated with cap and trade fund allocations.
- **Assembly Member Susan Bonilla** deserves special thanks from the League for her hard work to return local land use authority over massage establishments via the passage and Governor's signature of AB 1147. Also deserving special thanks are **Assembly Members Jimmy Gomez** and **Chris Holden**, who served as joint authors of the bill and provided key leadership throughout a two-year process to assist with the passage of this important measure.
- **Assembly Member Ken Cooley**, former First Vice President of the League, is appreciated for his authorship on AB 2577, co-sponsored by the League, which would increase local reimbursements from Medi-Cal for ambulance services. While the bill was vetoed, a path appears open to revisiting timing issues in the bill next year. The League also appreciates his 'no' votes on both HR 29 and SB 556.
- **Assembly Member Richard Gordon** was helpful in his work on the Assembly Local Government Committee and efforts to advance legislation on both cap and trade and housing elements.
- **Assembly Member Marc Levine** merits the League's thanks for his continued work as Vice-Chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee to reject proposals harmful to local control and secure the support of his colleagues on the committee for amendments that address local concerns with pending proposals.
- **Assembly Member Bonnie Lowenthal** is thanked for her efforts to assist the League and other stakeholders to secure workable provisions associated with transportation funding in cap and trade fund allocations.
- **Assembly Member Jose Medina** is thanked for his leadership on economic development issues, including authorship of AB 1399 to create a California New Markets Tax Credit. While the bill was vetoed, there may be opportunities to revisit the matter within the context of the budget next year.
- **Assembly Member Melissa Melendez** and **Assembly Member Marie Waldron** are also recognized for their thoughtful work as members of the Assembly Local Government Committee.
- **Assembly Member Kevin Mullin** deserves recognition for his strong floor voting record on city issues, as well as his authorship of AB 1582 to assist local agencies with redevelopment dissolution issues.
- **Assembly Member Kristin Olsen** deserves recognition for her staunch support for local control demonstrated by her floor votes throughout the year.

- *Assembly Member Anthony Rendon* merits the League's appreciation for his leadership on addressing the storm water issue in the approved water bond as well as carrying AB 2403 to codify a recent court decision helpful to local agencies.
- *Assembly Member Sebastian Ridley-Thomas* is recognized for his efforts to develop expertise on the local control issues with respect to the regulation of medical marijuana.

In the Senate:

- *Senator Lou Correa* is thanked for his tenacious leadership and efforts to craft a workable regulatory structure for medical marijuana in his SB 1262, co-sponsored by the League and California Police Chiefs Association. Moving this legislation was a major effort; while it passed the Senate, it failed to reach the Assembly floor. Still, it served to change the nature of the policy discussion in the Capitol and gave legislators alternatives to rival legislation, AB 1894, which lacked sufficient protections for local authority and failed passage on the Assembly floor. For his efforts, Senator Correa was recognized as the League's Legislator of the Year.
- *Senator Mark DeSaulnier* is thanked for his leadership on various transportation issues, including his SB 1077 and his attempt to restore truck weight fees as a source of transportation funding. Also appreciated is his assistance with securing helpful amendments on AB 2145 (Bradford).
- *Senator Cathleen Galgiani* is thanked for her strong floor voting record on city issues.
- *Senator Jerry Hill* is appreciated for his attempt to improve the CEQA process by carrying League-supported amendments to limit document dumping in his SB 1451.
- *Senate Republican Leader Bob Huff, Senator Tom Berryhill, Senator Anthony Cannella, and Senator Andy Vidak* are thanked for their strong floor voting records on city issues.
- *Senate Pro Tem Darrell Steinberg* is thanked for his leadership in setting an initial framework for cap and trade allocations that was beneficial for cities and authorship of SB 1129 to provide helpful clean up to redevelopment dissolution statutes. While the bill was vetoed, the Governor expressed a willingness to work with legislators on clean up next year.
- *Senator Lois Wolk* is appreciated for her contributions to the effort to make Infrastructure Financing District law into a useful tool. She is also thanked for her authorship of a tax increment financing mechanism to assist with city annexations of disadvantaged unincorporated communities in SB 614, as well as efforts to secure helpful amendments to SB 1203 (Jackson) and AB 2145 (Bradford).

Some Comments and Cautions on Vote Records for City Officials and Others

- 1) The most powerful tool legislators have is their votes, and they should be held accountable for them with certain caveats. Legislators that score well should be thanked for their efforts and attention to city issues. Yet the challenge with vote records is that a sampling of legislative floor votes does not always provide the full story. For example, the League lobbied on many bills that are not on this list. Some bills were stopped in committees; others were amended to remove concerns. A legislator may have helped on

a budget issue or in committee or in behind-the-scenes efforts to secure a helpful amendment or broker a compromise. A legislator may have sponsored legislation or voted on other measures important to their city not reflected in this listing. The League has highlighted other actions by providing special recognitions;

- 2) The bills on this list are a representative sample of some of the major bills of importance to the League. Still, keep the relative importance of these bills and how they affect your community in mind. For some cities a vote to address redevelopment dissolution or on legislation that restores or removes aspects of local control may outweigh the importance of other bills on the list. There also may be bills important to your city that are not on this list;
- 3) Protecting local control and revenue in the legislature usually means opposing or seeking amendments on bills backed by powerful interests. Thus “No” votes and abstentions on bills the League is opposed to provide significant benefit and often carry more weight;
- 4) Democrats author all of the bills on this list. A simple majority can pass the budget, and the Democrats have a numerical majority that controls the flow of legislation on all committees. Few Republican-authored bills make it through the process. All bills on the list only required a majority vote. Democrats have 28 out of 40 seats in the Senate and 55 out of 80 seats in the Assembly. This means that the Democrat majority can pass bills without needing Republican votes. It also means that not all Democrats need to vote for bills; and
- 5) In several instances a vote in only one house is reflected because the measure was either stopped by that vote on the floor, amendments were secured prior to the floor vote in the second house, or the bill passed the floor of one house but did not make it to a floor vote in the second house.

Ways to Use This Document:

- Have a conversation with your legislator about the 2014 Session, and include the vote record as part of that conversation. If your legislator has a good record, thank them. Consider passing a resolution of commendation. They deserve it.
- If your legislator’s vote record is weak, ask them why. Members often try to find ways of helping while avoiding bucking leadership or a powerful sponsor. Ask your legislator what else you should take into account.
- Evaluate the conversation. Is there a reliable commitment for a continued or *improved* level of responsiveness to their city’s issues?
- For elected city officials that provide legislative endorsements, consider whether or not the legislator merits your support. With the top-two primary, these endorsements are more valuable than ever.

Legislation Included on League 2014 Vote Record

Economic Development

AB 1399 (Medina): California New Markets Tax Credit.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure creates a California New Markets Tax Credit program allocating up to \$200 million over seven years in tax credits to attract private capital as well as federal matching funds to spur investment and create jobs in low-income communities throughout California. Vetoed by Governor.

AB 1839 (Gatto): California Film and TV Tax Credit.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure extends the California Film Commission incentive program by five years, lifts the per-film budget tax credit limitation so that larger films may qualify, and offers new incentives to specific film and television production activities. Signed by Governor.

AB 1999 (Atkins): Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure authorizes up to a 25 percent state income tax credit on expenses associated with the rehabilitation of certified historic structures, subject to an aggregate cap of \$50 million annually. Vetoed by Governor.

AB 2280 (Alejo): Community Revitalization and Investment Authorities.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure authorizes the creation of a new entity at the local level called a Community Revitalization Investment Authority (CRIA) that would provide a narrowed redevelopment option for the most disadvantaged, rural and poorest areas of our state. Vetoed by Governor.

SB 628 (Beall): Enhanced Infrastructure Financing Districts.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure creates an alternative to existing Infrastructure Finance District (IFD) law called "Enhanced Infrastructure Finance District Law (EIFD)" that can be used by local agencies to develop infrastructure funded by tax increment revenue subject to conditions that are less cumbersome than the requirements of existing IFD law. Signed by Governor.

Redevelopment

AB 2493 (Bloom): Redevelopment Dissolution: 2011 Bond Proceeds.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure authorizes access to redevelopment bond proceeds issued in 2011 for infrastructure and housing projects that were in the planning stages before redevelopment dissolution. Vetoed by Governor.

SB 1129 (Steinberg): Redevelopment Dissolution Clean-Up.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure contains numerous helpful clean-up and clarifications of redevelopment dissolution law which would expedite the dissolution process and avoid future disputes. Provisions in the measure include clarifying the method of calculating interest rates on the repayment of former loans, expediting approval and implementation of long-range property management plans, and providing additional certainty for agencies receiving a finding of completion. Vetoed by Governor.

Local Control

HR 29 (Gomez): Outsourcing Public Services and Assets.

League Position: Oppose (Assembly Floor Vote)

This resolution states the Assembly opposes the outsourcing of public services and assets. This measure fails to reflect the long-standing existence of contract cities providing public services via contract and the reality that many local agencies contract with various public, non-profit and private service providers for delivery of quality, reliable and cost-effective services to their residents. Approved by the Assembly.

AB 1147 (Bonilla): Massage Therapy: Restoration of Local Authority.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure revises and recasts current law pertaining to massage therapy under SB 731 (Oropeza, Statutes of 2008) and gives tools to local governments to address establishments that are masquerading as massage businesses while engaging in human trafficking and prostitution. Signed by Governor.

AB 1521 (Fox): Annexations: Property Tax Adjustments.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure restores funding stability via property tax shares to cities that annexed inhabited territory since 2004 and re-establishes a foundation that supports future annexations on inhabited areas consistent with sustainable and compact growth policies. Vetoed by Governor.

AB 1894 (Ammiano): Medical marijuana.

League Position: Oppose (Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure curtails local land use authority by preempting city ability to appropriately regulate medical marijuana dispensaries in their jurisdictions by delegating key local land use and zoning powers to the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. This measure was refused passage on the Assembly floor.

AB 2052 (Gonzalez): Workers' Compensation: Expansion of Presumptions.

League Position: Oppose (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure increases city employer costs by expanding the listing of peace officers that qualify for various workers compensation presumptions. Vetoed by Governor.

AB 2126 (Bonta): Collective Bargaining: Mediation and Fact-Finding.

League Position: Oppose (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure allows any issue within the scope of representation to be submitted for PERB fact-finding and requires PERB to select mediators if one is not agreed to within five days. This measure would impose significant costs on local agencies and remove balance points in the existing collective bargaining process by creating leverage and delay mechanisms to the detriment of public employers and their obligation to make responsible decisions for local taxpayers. Vetoed by Governor.

AB 2188 (Muratsuchi): Solar Energy: Local Ordinances and Permit Processing.

League Position: Oppose (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure requires cities and counties to adopt a new ordinance that would create a separate permitting and inspection process specifically for residential solar installations of less than 10 kilowatts. The League's concern was for the impact of this requirement on financially struggling cities where the demand for solar is limited because their residents cannot afford solar and with the introduction of tiered levels of public service associated with a specific product. Signed by Governor.

SB 69 (Roth): Incorporation: Property Tax Adjustments.

League Position: Support (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure restores fiscal stability and funding via property tax to four recently incorporated cities that were severely affected by state sweep of remaining city VLF in 2011. Vetoed by Governor.

SB 556 (Padilla): Badges for Contractors Providing Local Health and Safety Services

League Position: Oppose (Senate and Assembly Floor Vote)

This measure creates costly uniform, vehicle, and badge requirements for local agencies providing health and public safety services through contracted employees. Signed by Governor.

SB 1262 (Correa): Medical Marijuana: Local Regulation.

League Position: Support (Senate Floor Vote)

This measure improves the regulation of medical cannabis in a manner that protects local control, addresses important public safety concerns, and enhances health and safety standards. The bill establishes minimum security requirements for dispensaries, protects jurisdictions that have banned dispensaries and provides that state licensing is dependent upon local permitting approval. This measure was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee and did not reach the Assembly Floor.





AUDIT COMMITTEE MEETING – ANONYMOUS FRAUD, WASTE AND ABUSE HOTLINE

As directed by the City Council on October 21st, the Audit (sub-committee) Committee of the City Council met with staff, the City Attorney and Mark Meyerhoff of Liebert, Cassidy & Whitmore, the City's Hotline advisor on Monday, October 27th. The meeting allowed both members of the Audit Committee to further discuss the scope, work flow process and other concerns regarding the proposed Anonymous Fraud, Waste, and Abuse Hotline with the City's advisor and Staff.

Staff informed the Audit Committee that the proposed Hotline Policy was designed to direct the majority of Hotline reports to an independent third-party expert to serve as the Case Manager; thereby, protecting the integrity of the proposed case management workflow and ensuring independence. *Example: Hotline Report asserting a fraud (e.g. improper payments or loans, kickbacks) or accounting irregularities would be forwarded directly to an independent third-party CPA with municipal expertise to serve as the Case Manager.*

There was also considerable discussion about the possible expansion of the use of the proposed Hotline to provide the opportunity for the public to report concerns beyond fraud, waste and abuse (i.e. public safety concerns, barking dog complaints). During the discussion, the City's expert advisor, Mark Meyerhoff, recommended that the use of the Anonymous Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline not be expanded to include other customer service reports. Staff suggested that the education process that would be conducted with introduction of the proposed Hotline would direct the public and the Hotline Administrator to use of the City's "Non-Emergency Customer Service Requests" portal, residing on the City's website, as well as other customer service processes to report their concerns. The City Council may wish for Staff to research other customer service reporting systems.

The functionality of the City's existing "Non-Emergency Requests" portal, residing on the City's website, was discussed, including future enhancements with the future website replacement and the possible addition of a phone-based customer service center for making reports that are beyond the scope of the proposed Anonymous, Fraud, waste and Abuse Hotline. In addition, the Audit Committee proposed that the City increase public

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awareness of the Non-Emergency Requests website portal, delineate its purpose and use versus that of the Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline, and modify the portal name to Non-Emergency Customer Service Requests. Staff has already made the changes to the City's website. Staff expects to present the proposed Hotline Policy and a recommendation to the City Council at its meeting on November 4, 2014.

STATUS OF BANKING TRANSITION

As part of the banking services transition from Bank of America, nearly all banking activity has moved to Bank of the West. As reported on June 18, 2014 in the Weekly Administrative Report, the Bank of America account will likely remain open during an extended transition period due to the following outstanding items.

1. Three outstanding checks totaling \$39,253 that were written in June 2014 from the Bank of America account. If the checks are not cashed within six months of issuance, Staff will stop payment and re-issue the checks from the Bank of the West account.
2. Credit card receipts in the Community Development Department. If the City Council approves the Tyler Munis software contract on November 18th, as part of system implementation, Staff anticipates there will be preferred credit-card processors that work best with the new system. With migration to a new credit-card processor, the Bank of America account will no longer receive the credit-card receipts from the Community Development department.
3. The City's purchasing-card program is currently with Bank of America. Until this program is moved to Bank of the West, Staff expects to keep a deposit of at least \$200,000 at Bank of America to offset the purchasing-card credit available with the bank. As the Senior Accountant position is vacant, Finance Staff has its hands full with preparing for the fiscal year-end audit, the financial statements, and the anticipated upcoming system implementation; and expects to tackle the purchasing-card program towards the end of calendar-year 2015.

As of September 30th, the Bank of America balance was reduced to \$505,690. As of October 20th, the Bank of America balance was reduced to less than \$300,000. Staff expects to maintain a balance of \$200,000 to \$300,000 through much of calendar-year 2015; until a new system is implemented and the purchasing-card program is transferred to Bank of the West.

RECENT LOS ANGELES TIMES PENSION ARTICLE

The public debate over public pensions continues. On October 23rd, the Los Angeles Times published an article titled "99 ways to boost pensions in California – at public cost" (see attached). The California Public Employee Retirement System (CalPERS) published a same-day response (also attached). The Los Angeles Times article covered a recent CalPERS Board action to adopt a list of compensation items that are pensionable for new employees hired after California pension reform law became effective.

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

As Staff has noted previously, much of the pension debate centers around benefits provided to public safety employees (police and fire), which the City does not have. Staff reviewed the list of pensionable compensation items adopted by CalPERS in August and found only a few that are received by employees of RPV on a limited basis for inconsequential amounts.

These are not new pensionable items, but merely CalPERS determination of 99 possible compensation events that have been determined to be pensionable after pension reform. The list may be reviewed in its entirety at the following link on the CalPERS website:

Directing traffic is part of a police officer's job, and in the city of Fountain Valley, keeping cars moving comes with a \$145 monthly bonus — and a bigger pension.

Fountain Valley officers can also pump up their pensions by working with police dogs or mentoring schoolchildren. Those who stay in shape get as much as \$195 more each month.

All these perks boost officers' salaries and add thousands of dollars to taxpayer-funded pensions for years to come.

The California Public Employees' Retirement System made these higher pensions possible. The nation's biggest public pension fund voted in August to adopt a list of 99 bonuses, ensuring that

newly hired California public workers would receive the same pension sweeteners as veteran employees.

The long-term cost of pensions calculated with bonuses is billions of dollars more than with base pay only. But the exact price tag remains a mystery. The labor-dominated CalPERS board voted without estimating the potential tab.

The vote raised alarms on Wall Street, where analysts have warned about the skyrocketing costs. With \$300 billion in investments, CalPERS estimates it still needs an additional \$100 billion from taxpayers to deliver on its promised pensions to 1.7 million public workers and retirees. That amount would be enough to operate the 23-campus California State University system for 16 years.

Gov. Jerry Brown, who pushed through a 2012 law to stop workers from using questionable perks to unjustly inflate their retirement pay, wants the action reversed. He vowed to take a personal role in the fight and has asked two state agencies to scrutinize whether the 99 pension sweeteners are legal and appropriate.

All new state employees, as well as those at most cities, counties and other local agencies across California, will now benefit from the list.

Among the beneficiaries are librarians who help the public find books, secretaries who take dictation, groundskeepers who repair sprinklers and school workers who supervise recess.

"Ninety-nine, are you kidding me?" said Dave Elder, former chair of the Assembly's public employees committee. "It's almost impossible to police."

CalPERS repeatedly told The Times it didn't know how much the bonuses were adding to the cost of worker pensions even though cities submit detailed pay and bonus information that is used to calculate retirement pay.

Even a small bump in salary can cause a public agency's pension costs to soar. An increase of \$7,850 to a \$100,000 salary can amount to an additional \$118,000 in retirement if the employee lived to 80, according to an analysis by the San Diego Taxpayers Assn., a watchdog group that scrutinizes city finances.

Fitch, a Wall Street rating firm that weighs in on the financial health of governments, warned that the pension fund's vote would burden cash-strapped cities.

"Cities and taxpayers will undeniably face higher costs," said Fitch analyst Stephen Walsh. "Pensions are taking a bigger share of the pie, leaving less money for core services."

Governments sent CalPERS more than \$8 billion last year, an amount that has quadrupled in the last 10 years.

And the cost will continue to rise. Long Beach expects its payments to CalPERS to increase 87%, or \$35 million, in the next six years. Finding that money will be "very painful," its staff recently told the City Council.

Sacramento had been expecting pension costs to rise by millions of dollars when CalPERS asked cities to start paying even more because retirees are living longer. Leyne Milstein, the city's finance director, estimated the newest jump adds up to an additional \$12 million annually — the equivalent of 34 police officers, 30 firefighters and 38 other employees.

At The Times' request, CalPERS analyzed salary and bonus costs for Fountain Valley — one of hundreds of cities and public agencies that award pension-boosting bonuses to workers.

CalPERS found the Fountain Valley perks could hike a worker's gross pay as much as 17%. About half the city's workforce received the extra pay that will also increase their pensions, most of them police and fire employees.

Fountain Valley taxpayers are spending between \$147,000 and \$179,000 in total compensation, pension and other benefits for each full-time officer on its force, according to city documents. Sergeants, lieutenants, two captains and the chief receive more.

Detective Henry Hsu, president of the Fountain Valley Police Officers' Assn., defended the bonuses, which he said "are intended to help officers become better officers."

The money compensates officers for extra hours or hazards they take on in the special assignments, he said.

Fountain Valley City Manager Bob Hall said that most of the premiums are fixed monthly sums, unlike those at many other cities where they are a percentage of base pay — causing them to rise in value with every salary increase.

"We've tried to manage the cost as best we can," Hall said.

CalPERS executives said they don't understand the anger caused by the board's vote. The action simply clarifies the 2012 reform law, which was designed to stem rising pension costs, said Brad Pacheco, a spokesman for the agency.

CalPERS always assumed that new employees would continue to benefit from bonuses just as those hired earlier did, Pacheco said. The reform law is still estimated to save taxpayers \$42 billion to \$55 billion over the next 30 years, he said.

"It's far-stretched to say this is a rollback of reform," Pacheco said. "We implement the law as it was written, not how others wish it were written."

Some public pension funds that operate independently from CalPERS disagreed with its interpretation. Fund officials in Stanislaus and Contra Costa counties decided not to include bonuses when calculating pensions for new employees.

"Our board came to the conclusion that base pay is what the Legislature and the governor had intended," said Rick Santos, executive director of the Stanislaus County Employees' Retirement Assn.

Over the years, unions have secured better retirement packages through negotiations with public agencies and by expanding their influence inside CalPERS.

In an extraordinary show of union power, workers persuaded voters in 1992 to amend the state constitution, requiring the pension board to place more emphasis on providing benefits to workers and less on the cost to taxpayers.

In 1993, CalPERS successfully sponsored a bill that gave it the authority to determine what bonuses could be counted toward pensions. That same year, CalPERS created a list spelling out dozens of possible pension sweeteners.

Since then, those bonuses have been used to boost pensions. The 2012 reform law was silent about whether new employees would get them too.

Seven people on the 13-seat board are union members or were elected by government workers who receive benefits from CalPERS. All but one of them voted to add the bonus list into the 2012 reform law.

Union-backed board members weren't the only ones who voted for the bonuses. State Treasurer Bill Lockyer and state Controller John Chiang both complained about the pension boosters but said they had little choice but to approve them.

"Many of the items on this premium pay list are absolutely objectionable," said Tom Dresslar, a spokesman for Lockyer. But frustration, he said, "needs to be directed to the proper place, which is the public agencies that negotiated the perks through collective bargaining agreements."

George Diehr was the only board member elected by workers who voted against the bonuses. A recently retired Cal State San Marcos professor, Diehr said many of the perks seemed silly and archaic.


One thing is clear: Pension costs will keep rising.

San Jose Mayor Chuck Reed, who is fighting to transform the state's public pension program, said CalPERS is continuing to "work against any kind of reform."

"They've set out on a course to protect the existing system and level of benefits," Reed said. "Meanwhile, costs are going up, the problem has not gone away, and it keeps getting worse."

LA Times One-Sided Perspective Falls Short

Today the Los Angeles Times wrote a one-sided story about complex pension issues and got it wrong. The Times' bias starts and ends with its insistence that "The 2012 reform law was silent about whether new employees would get (additional pay compensations) too." Nothing could be further from the truth. The Public Employee Pension Reform Act (PEPRA) is not "silent" but instead it explicitly states the handful of compensation items that should be excluded from new employees' pensions (e.g., bonuses, uniform allowances, car allowances, etc.). Beyond those exclusions explicitly mentioned in the statute, PEPRA did not clarify which other pay items to include or exclude from new employees' pensions - which is why reasonable people and pension systems can have various perspectives on how to interpret and implement the sweeping new pension reform law.

CalPERS staff has fully cooperated to answer all of the Times' questions, explain the facts, provide a balanced perspective, and point out flaws in some of the data the Times was using. The Times fails to mention: that CalPERS is working with employers and stakeholders to review the list of compensation items to see if any of the items are no longer used or are obsolete; that CalPERS actually supported the 1993 legislation so it would be able to restrict which pay items could be counted towards pensions; that the 1993 legislation included strong anti-spiking provisions which CalPERS also supported (a prohibition on Final Settlement Pay counting towards pensions); that CalPERS did a cost analysis on the entire PEPRA bill (which is where the \$42-55B savings estimate came from); and that, in fact, the employers have not previously been submitting "detailed pay and bonus information" due to previous technology restraints, but instead had often been submitting all such employee pay in lump sum categories without itemizing the different pay items like they now are required to do for new employees.

The Times used a news article to continually editorialize by referring to these pay items as "bonuses," "perks," and "sweeteners" – almost as if they didn't read the new PEPRA statute, which explicitly prohibits "bonuses." We urge the LA Times to present a more balanced perspective on this important issue.

STORM DRAIN VIDEO INSPECTION AND CLEANING PROJECT

The Storm Drain Video Inspection and Cleaning Project is continuing on schedule to be completed December 2014. The project began four months ago with the intent of cleaning and inspecting all of the City’s storm drain lines. Prior to lining a storm drain, the pipe must be carefully cleaned and video inspected to determine the condition of the pipe along with its length and diameter; this will also help to identify the extent of work/repairs needed prior to the lining process. This information is critical in determining the overall condition of all the storm drain lines in the City. The project goal is to inspect all City storm drain lines this year. This will enable staff to identify a complete list of storm drain lines that need to be lined, develop a comprehensive scope of work and identify the needed budget for upcoming lining projects.



PV DRIVE SOUTH ROADWAY REPAIRS IN THE LANDSLIDE AREA

The roadway through the landslide is continuing to move and repairs are in process. This week several area are being repaired through a process called “skin patching”. Depressions, uplifted areas and stretched asphalt areas are leveled through this process without grinding or digging out the existing asphalt. Repairs are able to be completed quickly and the resulting road surface is smoother and safer for all users of this roadway.
