**CHANGES IN LOCAL LEGISLATIVE DELEGATION**

As a result of yesterday's election, there will be some re-shuffling and new faces in the City's legislative delegation at the State and Federal levels:

- 28<sup>th</sup> District State Senator **Ted Lieu** will replace outgoing 33<sup>rd</sup> U.S. Congressional District Representative Henry Waxman;
- **Ben Allen** will be the senator for the renumbered 26<sup>th</sup> State Senate District seat vacated by Ted Lieu; and,
- **David Hadley** appears to have narrowly defeated incumbent 66<sup>th</sup> District State Assembly Member Al Muratsuchi.

## **PROPOSITION P NARROWLY DEFEATED**

As Staff last reported in the September 24<sup>th</sup> Weekly Administrative Report, the County Board of Supervisors authorized the placement of Proposition P on yesterday's ballot. Proposition P was intended to replace the original 1992 approval of Proposition A (\$540 million), which funded the acquisition, restoration or rehabilitation of real property for parks and park safety, senior recreation facilities, gang prevention, beaches, recreation, community or cultural facilities, trails, wildlife habitats, or natural lands, and maintenance and servicing of those projects. Several recent park, open space and trail projects in the City have been funded by Proposition A proceeds. The original Proposition A authorization "sunsets" in June 2015.

Proposition P was approved yesterday by a 62%-to-38% margin, but this did not meet the two-thirds majority approval required for its passage. Proposition P would have imposed a flat, \$23-per-parcel countywide tax to provide an estimated \$54 million in annual funding over a period of thirty (30) years. Twenty percent (20%) of the taxes collected in the City under Proposition P would have been returned to the City to fund park and open space projects (estimated to total roughly \$70,000/year), with an additional five percent (5%) of the countywide total potentially available through competitive grants.

Although the original 1992 authorization of Proposition A will expire next year, the amended Proposition A (approved by County voters in 1996 for an additional \$319 million in funding) remains in effect until June 2020. Staff will continue to monitor and report to the City Council on any future proposals to extend or replace Proposition A.

## **PRELIMINARY ELECTION RESULTS FOR LOCAL REVENUE MEASURES**

Yesterday's election included 286 local measures seeking approval for taxes or bonds in California. Michael Coleman, Principal Fiscal Policy Advisor to the League of California Cities, has published "Local Revenue Measure Results November 2014", based upon preliminary ballot results. The 18-page document provides a thorough analysis, and has been attached to this weekly report for informational purposes only.

## **ANONYMOUS FRAUD, WASTE AND ABUSE HOTLINE**

At its regular meeting last night, the City Council adopted a new City Council Policy that will lead to the establishment of an Anonymous Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline. The hotline will enable the public to report concerns about fraud, waste and abuse via a toll-free call center or web-based reporting system. Reports can be made anonymously, or not, as the complainant desires.

The hotline will not be used for normal customer service reports like fallen trees, potholes and graffiti. Staff will return to the City Council with a follow-up report about proposed improvements for customer service reporting and tracking.

Staff expects to return before the City Council in December with a proposed Professional Services Agreement with NAVEX Global, the hotline administrator selected by the City Council, and with a FY14-15 budget adjustment for the additional cost of the hotline. Staff will also present a proposed revision of the City Council Policy for the Audit Committee to include its new role to monitor the implementation and on-going operation of the hotline to ensure its working.

The development of the Policy was the result of a collaborative effort between the Mayor, Council Members Campbell and Misetich, who serve on the Audit Committee of the City Council, Mark Meyerhoff of Liebert, Cassidy, Whitmore, who assisted the team as a legal expert, Carol Lynch, Carolynn Petru, Sean Robinson, Rosalee Wood, Allan Kaufman and myself. The success of the hotline will likely be dependent upon comprehensive public outreach of its purpose and use to the public, especially our residents, as well as Council members committee/commission members, vendors, volunteers and employees.

# Local Revenue Measure Results


## November 2014

The November 4, 2014 California gubernatorial election included over 400 local measures including 268 seeking approval for taxes or bonds. K-12 schools districts and community colleges sought a total of \$11.775 billion in 113 separate authorizations for bonds to construct facilities, acquire equipment and make repairs and upgrades. There were just eight measures to increase or extend school parcel taxes.

Among the 147 non-school local revenue measures were four measures asking for a total of \$555.5 million in bonds, including a \$500 million transportation bond measure in San Francisco. There were 32 city, county and special district parcel taxes requiring two-thirds voter approval, including two library measures, three street/road improvement measures, four parks and open space measures, sixteen fire, emergency medical response measures and five police/fire measures.

Fifty-five proposals sought to extend or increase local sales taxes, ranging from the renewal of a 1/10 percent tax for the Fresno Zoo to one percent increases proposed in 15 cities. Fourteen of the 55 sales tax measures earmark the tax proceeds for a particular purpose, making them special taxes requiring 2/3 voter approval under Proposition 13.


### Proposed Local Revenue Measures November 2014

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### Overall Passage Rates


Based on election night counts with 100% of all precincts reported but many ballots yet to be counted, 185 of the 268 measures passed.


The proportion of passing school measures is mirroring historic passage rates. Preliminary counts indicate 89 of the 113 school bonds are passing with five or more others that may pass when final tallies are in but are now short of the 55% but too close to call. All of the eight school parcel tax measures passed.

School Tax & Bond Measures November 2014




The passage of local non-school tax and bond measures is also closely mirroring historic rates of passage. Two out of three general vote tax measures passed. And almost half of two-thirds vote special taxes and bonds passed.





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**Utility User Taxes**

Voters in 16 cities considered measures to increase or expand utility user taxes. All were majority vote general taxes except Coalinga which still garnered the lowest “yes” percentage. Eleven passed and San Jacinto is close. Eight of the measures “modernized” the UUT to cover wireless phones and billing practices including seven that reduced the rate and one maintained the same rate. All but Santa Rosa passed. There were eight proposals for new or increased UUTs. Four passed.

**Business License Taxes**

There were eight business license tax measures, including two proposals to tax sugared beverages, a new idea among local measures in California. A proposal to increase local taxes on “businesses engaged in the manufacture, piping, refining, storage and wholesale distribution of petroleum products” failed in Rialto. Berkeley voters passed the first local sugared beverage tax in California. But the San Francisco measure was a special tax with the proceeds earmarked for nutrition and health programs. It garnered 54% yes votes, short of the two-thirds needed to pass.



**CONDITION OF CALIFORNIA LOCAL STREETS AND ROADS**

The biennial California Statewide Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment has been released. (See attached) This report is a collaboration between the California State Association of Counties, the League of California Cities, and the State's Regional Transportation Planning agencies. We are pleased that the report rates Rancho Palos Verdes roads as 82 or in "Good" condition, which is the best rating on the pavement condition index. This indicates that the City's efforts on regular maintenance and upkeep of our roads are paying off. Unfortunately, the report indicates that in general California's local street and road conditions continue to decline. This could be because many jurisdictions do not have the same level of financial commitment and community support for maintaining their streets as our City.

**Dangerous Condition of California's Local Streets and Roads Puts California Drivers at Risk, Poses Threat to Vehicle Safety**

*New Study Reveals that Close to \$7.3 Billion Needed Annually to Make Streets and Roads Fully Safe*

**Sacramento** — The biennial California Statewide Local Streets and Roads Needs Assessment is being released today and the results are alarming. The condition of the system that makes up more than 80 percent of California's roadways is on the path to failure. The biennial survey confirms pavement conditions are declining and finds that existing funding levels are insufficient to properly fix and/or maintain streets, roads, bridges, sidewalks, storm drains and traffic signs. Deferring this crucial work, the report predicts, will likely double the cost of repairs in the future, and impedes efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and other air pollutants.

The report is a collaboration between the California State Association of Counties, the League of California Cities and the state's regional transportation planning agencies. Produced every other year since 2008, the 2014 report surveyed California's 58 counties and 482 cities and captured data from more than 99 percent of the state's local streets and roads. It is being released on the heels of the TRIP Report in September, which found that a mere 25 percent of California's major urban roads and highways are in good condition.

California's local street and road conditions continue to decline, moving closer to the edge of a cliff. The Needs Assessment uses a scale of zero (failed) to 100 (excellent) to rate pavement condition. Conditions have deteriorated since the first survey six years ago when the statewide average was 68. Today it's dropped to 66, which falls into the at risk category. Of California's 58 counties, an alarming 54 have streets and roads that are either at risk or ranked in poor condition. In 10 years, it is projected that 25 percent of local streets and roads will be ranked poor.

The financial numbers behind this report are startling. In the next 10 years it is estimated that the local system will have a \$78.3 billion funding shortfall. Existing funding for California's local streets and roads is just \$1.7 billion annually but \$3.3 billion is needed just to maintain the current statewide average rating of 66. However it would take \$7.3 billion annually to bring the

state's local streets and roads into a safe and reliable condition. These figures do not take into account the \$31 billion needed in the next decade for curb ramps, sidewalks, storm drains, street lights and signals. Further, there is a funding shortfall of \$1.3 billion to maintain the safety and integrity of California's 11,863 local bridges.


Matt Cate, California State Associations of Counties executive director, said reduced funding has led to a backlog of deferred maintenance. "The state gas tax is only worth half of its value compared to when it was last increased in 1994. While revenues are decreasing, cities and counties are doing more with less, reducing greenhouse gas emissions and building sustainable communities, both of which rely on a functioning local transportation network. It is no wonder that funding is woefully inadequate. It's time to get serious about a more stable funding source for local streets, roads and bridges so we can begin to catch up on a backlog of work that should have been completed long ago."

League of California Cities Executive Director Chris McKenzie called the report a reminder of how every trip begins on a local street or road. "Our local streets and roads serve as the backbone of California's entire transportation system. The continual deterioration of this system not only threatens the safety of all Californians but also our economy. We need to invest in our streets and roads and ensure California's high quality of living, spark new innovation and promote sustainability for the future.

#### **PEAFOUL CENSUS UPDATE**

In June 2014, Staff asked Chino-based Pest Management Services to conduct a two-day census of peafowl in the City. The June 2014 census focused on five specific neighborhoods. The results of the June 2014 census revealed an overall 23% decrease in peafowl numbers from 2011-2012 (the time of the previous census). As a result, Staff reported to the City Council that it did not propose any City-sponsored trapping at that time but would follow-up with another 2-day census in October (the time frame recommended by Animal Pest Management Services) so as to reassess the need for trapping.

The follow-up fall peafowl census was recently completed. On October 20th & 21st, 2014 Animal Pest Management Services conducted a focused peafowl census in five Rancho Palos Verdes neighborhoods: Portuguese Bend, Vista Grande, Crestridge, Sunnyside Ridge, and Grandview. These are the same areas surveyed in 2011-12 with the exception of the Grandview neighborhood which was added to the June 2014 census due to an increase in the number of reports/complaints received by staff from that neighborhood.

Attached is the October 2014 Animal Pest Management Services Report (see attachment). The June 2014 2-day results and the October 2014 2-day results are being reported as an average for comparison purposes since the previous years involved 4-day census results. The table below provides a breakdown on the peafowl counts for each of the five studied neighborhoods.

The October 2014 census results reveal a slight increase in peafowl in the City from 2012 to 2014 but a substantial increase between June and October of this year. According to Animal Pest Management Services, the large increase between June and October can be attributed to a large procreation that occurred in early summer coupled with the drought which is likely forcing more peafowl into neighborhoods to search for a water source. They emphasized that they used the same scientific approach as in their previous censuses.

As a result of the most recent survey results, Staff intends to present an item to the City Council at its upcoming November 18<sup>th</sup> meeting recommending that the City Council consider City sponsored peafowl trapping in targeted neighborhoods.

**PLANNING DIVISION MONTHLY ACTIVITY REPORT**

Attached is the Planning Division's Monthly Activity Report for October 2014. **RE: Peafowl Census Monitoring – October 2014**

Dear Mr. Waters:

Animal Pest Management Services, Inc. performed a two (2) day peafowl census on October 20 and 21, 2014 in designated areas in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, specifically Crestridge, Grandview, Portuguese Bend, Sunnyside Ridge and Vista Grande.

The census was performed in the early morning hours at sunrise. The peafowl were counted as they roosted in the trees, on top of roofs and along the street. In order to avoid duplicate counting of the peafowl, as soon as they left their original roosting location the counting stopped. The peafowl were observed roosting in the pine trees, sitting on roofs, walking along the streets and foraging on the lawns.

In each area of the city, there were streets that showed concentrated populations of peafowl. The streets listed below in the tables represent the streets where peafowl were counted. The areas of highest concentrations were observed in these areas: Portuguese Bend (throughout), Sunnyside Ridge (Sunnyside Ridge Road), Crestridge (Middlecrest), and Vista Grande (Trailriders Drive).




