CHIEF LEGISLATIVE ANALYST'S REPORT ON RANCHO LPG FACILITY

On February 19, 2013, the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) of the City of Los Angeles released the attached report regarding the Rancho LPG facility in San Pedro. The report was prepared in response to motions passed by the Public Safety Committee of the Los Angeles City Council, following its special meeting regarding liquid bulk storage facilities in June 2012.

The CLA report identifies two (2) recommended actions regarding the safety of the Rancho LPG facility:

1. Instruct the Fire Department to develop potential options for a community outreach effort and preparedness exercise with City departments and stakeholders in the San Pedro area, including the facility operator, local Neighborhood Councils, homeowner groups, and other community based organizations.
2. Instruct the Fire Department and Department of Building and Safety, with the assistance of the Chief Legislative Analyst, to report back with a list of inspections conducted by non-City agencies at liquid bulk storage facilities that would benefit City agencies by receiving automatic notification of inspection deficiencies.



Safety Regulations and Precautions at Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) Facilities

Summary

On June 27, 2012, the Public Safety Committee held a special off-site meeting in San Pedro to consider two motions:

- Motion (Perry—Krekorian) which instructed the Fire Department, Emergency Management Department, Department of Building and Safety, and City Attorney to report on the safety issues raised by San Pedro residents regarding the Amerigas/Rancho LPG storage tank facility at 2110 North Gaffey Street in San Pedro. (Council File 11-1813)
- Motion (Buscaino—Perry—Englander) which moved that the Public Safety Committee hold a special meeting in the Harbor Area and request the pertinent regulatory and enforcement agencies at the local, state, and federal level to provide a presentation regarding the permitting and safety requirements for liquid bulk storage facilities. (Council File 11-1813-S1)

At the Committee meeting, there were several agencies represented which have some level of oversight at facilities such as the Rancho LPG facility. Los Angeles City Departments represented at the meeting were the Fire Department (LAFD); Department of Building and Safety (LADBS); Police Department (LAPD); Emergency Management Department; City Attorney; Planning Department; Bureau of Sanitation; and Port of Los Angeles. Non-City agencies represented at the meeting were the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA); United States Defense Logistics Agency; United States Department of Labor, Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA); California Department of Industrial Relations, Division of Occupational Safety and Health (Cal/OSHA); and the South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD).

The aforementioned agencies each presented an overview of their oversight roles at the facility, including the types and frequency of inspections at the facility, and other safety measures and precautions required by law. After presentations and testimony from the various agencies, and

additional questions and comments from Committee members, a public comment period was provided for members of the community to address the Committee on this issue.

At the conclusion of the Public Safety Committee meeting, this Office was instructed to convene meetings and work with various City departments to identify recommendations to improve safety and hazard mitigation measures of liquid bulk storage (LBS) facilities, including Rancho LPG. The Committee also directed this Office to compile a list of similar facilities in the Harbor area. LAFD has compiled a list of facilities which will be transmitted separately from this report.

Recommendations

1. Instruct the Fire Department to develop potential options for a community outreach effort and preparedness exercise with City departments and stakeholders in the San Pedro area, including the facility operator, local Neighborhood Councils, homeowner groups, and other community based organizations.
2. Instruct the Fire Department and Department of Building and Safety, with the assistance of the Chief Legislative Analyst, to report back with a list of inspections conducted by non-City agencies at liquid bulk storage facilities that would benefit City agencies by receiving automatic notification of inspection deficiencies.

Background

The facility at 2110 North Gaffey Street in San Pedro is operated by Rancho LPG on privately-owned land. The site has two storage tanks of refrigerated butane with 12.6 million gallons of capacity, approximately 110 feet in height and 175 feet in diameter. Additionally, there are smaller horizontal tanks that store butane and propane, each with a capacity of 60,000 gallons. The storage of liquid chemicals and other sensitive materials has been referred to as liquid bulk storage (LBS). More specifically, butane and propane are both types of *liquefied* petroleum gas (LPG).

The Rancho LPG facility has been at this site since its construction in 1978. There has been extensive research and analysis conducted in the past relative to the site and its permitted uses. Further background information on these topics is available in reports issued in 2005 and 2006 from the Offices of the Chief Legislative Analyst and City Administrative Officer, City Planning Department and Port of Los Angeles (Council File 04-1645).

The two largest tanks on site store liquid butane. Prior scientific reviews of the facility have described the nature of butane as an LPG substance, as follows:

Butane at room temperature and pressure is a gas, and butane is liquefied in order to decrease its volume to make it easier to store and ship. There are multiple approaches to storing butane as a liquid. One approach is to store butane in a high pressure vessel which exerts adequate pressure on the butane to maintain it in liquid form at room

temperature. Another approach is to refrigerate the butane to keep the temperature below its normal boiling point. Since the refrigeration, not the pressure, maintains the butane as a liquid, the butane liquid can be stored in a low pressure vessel.

To mitigate the impacts of a storage breach, using refrigeration is more advantageous since the storage vessel pressure is much lower, resulting in a lower discharge of liquid. With refrigerated butane, lesser amounts of butane will flash into vapor as it reaches a warmer ground surface temperature, which results in more butane remaining as a liquid in the containment pool. The consequences of using refrigeration are less than using higher pressure because the rate at which butane vapor is produced will be less, resulting in a smaller vapor cloud than with tanks that have higher pressure.

At the Rancho LPG facility, a containment basin exists a short distance from the storage vessels to collect and contain any liquid that is discharged during an emergency situation. Liquid butane that leaks out of the storage vessel is drained into the containment basin away from the storage vessels. Prior reviews of the facility have indicated that the containment basin is important for mitigating the risk of the storage tanks being directly exposed to a fire, in the event that any leaked butane catches on fire. In addition, the containment basin reduces the surface area of a potential pool of leaked butane, which lessens the evaporation rate of the butane under such a scenario.

Responsibilities of City Departments

Following the Public Safety Committee meeting, this Office worked in conjunction with the Offices of Councilmember Buscaino and Councilmember Perry to develop specific questions directed to City departments regarding safety oversight at Rancho LPG and LBS facilities. This Office received information and/or held follow-up meetings with the following City Departments: LAFD, LADBS, LAPD, Emergency Management, Port of Los Angeles, City Attorney, and Planning Department.

From a safety standpoint, the main City agencies responsible for oversight at LBS facilities are LAFD and LADBS. LAFD, as a Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA), is responsible for regulatory oversight pursuant to the Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) and applicable state requirements (described further below). Similarly, LADBS performs inspections pursuant to LAMC regulations and inspections required by state law. The LAPD, Hazardous Materials Division, is responsible for assisting LAFD in the event of an emergency incident at the facility which is deemed to be suspicious or criminal in nature.

LAFD's CUPA Section oversees the following regulations: Hazardous Materials Disclosure and Business Plan; Underground Storage Tank Program; Aboveground Petroleum Storage Act (APSA) Program; Aboveground Storage Tank Spill Prevention Control and Countermeasure (SPCC) Plan; Hazardous Waste Generator Program; and California Accidental Release Prevention (CalARP) Program.

At LBS facilities such as Rancho LPG, LAFD performs inspections pursuant to the City's Fire Code (contained in the LAMC) and two of the CUPA programs mandated by State law: CalARP and APSA. These regulations cover inspections associated with facility access, location of tanks, fire protection systems, fire hydrants containment areas, gas/liquid monitoring, inventory and separation of process/stored substances, emergency planning, and facility security. While the Rancho LPG facility is the primary focus of this review, LAFD has indicated that 49 other facilities in the City of Los Angeles are also subject to these regulations.

LADBS performs inspections required by the State of California Title 8 Pressure Vessel Safety Code and the City of Los Angeles Pressure Vessel Code (LAMC Article 7, Chapter IX). Inspections pursuant to the City's LAMC requirements occur on an annual basis. Inspections conducted by State of California inspectors occur once every three to five years; however, since LADBS inspectors are authorized ("cross-deputized") by the State, LADBS inspectors also perform the State-required inspections on an annual basis. Relative to the two largest tanks at the Rancho facility, which are maintained at an operating pressure of approximately 1.5 pounds per square inch (psi), LADBS indicated that Pressure Vessel inspection requirements only apply to storage tanks with operating pressure greater than 15 psi.

Emergency Plans and Safety Considerations

The CalARP Program covers "Regulated Substances" such as flammable gases, and toxic gases and liquids. CalARP regulations are designed to prevent releases and accidents for the protection of public safety. CalARP regulations require a facility operator to conduct hazard assessment and hazard analysis studies, and submit a Risk Management Plan (RMP) to the LAFD and EPA. The operator is required to implement all applicable elements of the prevention program. LAFD reviews all submitted RMPs for completeness, technical accuracy, and the appropriate level of detail. LAFD inspects every stationary source of Regulated Substances registered pursuant to CalARP at least once every three years to determine compliance with the regulations.

CalARP regulations also require the facility operator to have an emergency plan which is made available to LAFD CUPA and other inspection agencies. The emergency plan must be reviewed and/or updated every three years, and any changes to the plan require notification to LAFD. The emergency plan requires certification of periodic training of individual plan components, including the date, types of training, and personnel involved. Separate from the facility operator's emergency plan, LAFD has indicated that its training program includes preparing for, and responding to, accidents at LBS facilities and other facilities with sensitive materials. For emergencies requiring an evacuation, LAFD and LAPD work in coordination using established policies and procedures.

Safety Improvements

Relative to potential safety improvements, there are two initiatives that have been identified in consultation with the City's primary safety inspection agencies, LAFD and LADBS. One

initiative focuses on conducting an emergency exercise to further enhance the preparedness efforts of City first responders and to better engage community stakeholders. A second initiative would explore the specific levels of coordination between City and non-City inspection agencies to determine the feasibility and benefits of automatic cross-notification of inspections by these agencies.

LAFD has indicated that an initiative to engage community stakeholders through a preparedness exercise would be beneficial to the issue of ensuring adequate safety precautions at facilities such as the Rancho LPG facility. Such an effort would increase the awareness of safety regulations, and could potentially lead to the identification of new protocols or requirements to strengthen existing regulations. Additionally, community stakeholders and residents may have more direct insight of the protocols used by both first responder agencies and the facility operator, in the event of a real emergency situation on site. In the past, LAFD has conducted similar efforts to increase awareness of why safety regulations are in effect and how they are used to protect the public.

In addition, since there are several agencies and jurisdictions involved in regulating and inspecting LBS facilities, cross-coordination among agencies is crucial to ensure that facility operators are consistently in compliance with all applicable laws. LAFD and LADBS have indicated that not all inspections conducted by non-City agencies are subject to automatic notification to City agencies in the event corrective orders have been issued or deficiencies identified. A process that provides more timely notification may enable City agencies to better observe the ongoing compliance of facilities with all applicable laws. Similarly, enabling summary information of regulatory compliance to be posted online may be beneficial to all concerned stakeholders.

Given the variety and technical nature of the inspections performed on site, it is recommended that LAFD and LADBS be instructed to report back with a list of these inspections performed by non-City agencies and determine which inspections should be subject to automatic notification. If there are inspection types that would benefit City agencies by receiving automatic notification in the event of a deficiency, it may be appropriate to pursue changes to the applicable laws and regulations that govern these inspections. However, it should be noted that the City of Los Angeles can only make changes to laws under its jurisdiction; separate efforts would also need to be pursued at the state and federal level.



STORM DRAIN LINING PROJECT UPDATE

The City's contractor is beginning work this week on repairs to a large diameter storm drain that passes under Palos Verdes Drive East in the vicinity of Miraleste Intermediate School. Staff has coordinated the site work with Cal Water and the School District. The storm drain will be accessed through existing inlets, outlets and manholes so no excavation and no significant traffic interruptions are expected along PVDE. Material is being stored adjacent to the project site and occasional deliveries may require only brief interruption of traffic, which will be performed outside of the high use periods when school is beginning or letting out.

The project involves a relatively new technology that rehabilitates the structural integrity of large diameter pipes by application of fiberglass reinforced concrete to the interior of the pipes. The material is sprayed radially (or spincast) from a device inside the pipe that is drawn through the pipe at a computer controlled rate of speed. This precise control allows material to be added as a specified and uniform thickness. Once applied the material cures enough to be ready for use within 24 hours. The project should be completed in 4 to 6 weeks, depending on weather conditions.



CONSTRUCTION UPDATE ON PHASE I OF THE FY11-12 RESIDENTIAL STREETS IMPROVEMENT PROJECT, AREAS 3 AND 5

Construction work continues this week on concrete repairs along Elkridge Dr, Longhill Dr, and Delacroix Rd in preparation for the final street resurfacing. Many shallow utility lines have been encountered during the work in this area over the past few weeks and the contractor has been working closely with the utility companies to correct any broken lines and restore service to the residents as quickly as possible. 

Marymount College – Neighborhood Advisory Committee Spring 2013 Term Meeting

Condition No. 138 of the College's CUP established a Neighborhood Advisory Committee comprised of members from the surrounding five homeowners associations and two at-large representatives who live within 3,000 feet of the campus. The NAC is tasked to meet once during the fall term and once during the spring term, to review any campus operational and neighborhood concerns. The NAC meeting for the spring 2013 term was held on February 12, 2013 at the Marymount College campus and followed an agenda (attached) prepared by City Staff based on input from Committee representatives. The meeting was facilitated by Ara Mihranian and was attended by the following individuals:

- Lois Karp, Mediterrania HOA (substituting for George Zugsmith)

- Marc Harris, San Ramon HOA
- Jim Gordon, At-large City Representative (substituting for Lois Karp)
- Terri Glidden, At-large College Representative
- Dr. Brophy, Marymount College

After brief opening remarks, Dr. Brophy updated the Committee on the current construction activities related to the expanded parking lot. He indicated that at this time, construction is on schedule with most of the work having occurred thus far around the parking areas adjacent to the Administration Building and the former Preschool building. He added that grading for the expanded parking lot is scheduled to occur by the end of the week. Ara added that there was a delay in commencing with the project grading because the site had to be irrigated for approximately 6 weeks. The Committee was asked to contact Jim Reeves at Marymount College with any comments or complaints related to construction or to contact Ara at City Hall.

With regards to student parking, it was reported that if construction continues at its current rate and the weather continues to cooperate, the expanded parking lot should be

completed by the end of April. Once the expanded parking lot is completed and signed off by the City, per the Conditions of Approval, the College will have to close the temporary parking lot and restore the site to its original condition. Dr. Brophy indicated that the College would seek City approvals to allow the temporary parking lot to remain in its current condition until the athletic field is constructed to avoid additional costs involved in restoring the site. Ara responded that the Conditions of Approval for the Temporary Parking Lot are quite specific when it comes to restoring the site. As for street parking, the College was commended for its recent efforts in ensuring that student street parking is eliminated. Dr. Brophy informed the Committee that College has mobilized its campus security at the driveway entrance, updated its website, posted street signs, handed out flyers, and made the temporary parking lot available to students without a parking permit. He indicated that the College is incurring significant costs to implement these measures to curtail student street parking and will be asking the City to proceed with red-curbing the street adjacent to the Campus. Ara informed the Committee that at the December 18, 2012 City Council meeting, the Council directed Staff to explore establishing parking restrictions adjacent to the campus. He added that red curbing is probably not the preferred solution, but rather some form of timed parking restriction. Ara indicated that this matter will be reviewed by the Traffic Safety Commission with a recommendation forwarded to the City Council for its consideration. The public will have an opportunity to provide input on this matter.

Dr. Brophy informed the Committee that the College submitted an application to amend its Conditional Use Permit (CUP) in October of 2012 to reconfigure the athletic field approved by the City Council in 2010 and to increase the construction phasing schedule from 8 years to 20 years (with actual construction not to exceed a total of 3 years). He added that revised application materials were submitted to the City in January which no longer includes the request to increase the phasing schedule. However, he then indicated that the College would be submitting a separate CUP application later this year to amend the construction phasing schedule. Ara informed the Committee that the proposed athletic field reconfiguration would no longer be flanked by tennis courts, would be larger in size, would be located closer to the roadway and that excavated earth of approximately 17,000 cubic yards would be exported to an off-site location because the excavated earth will no longer be deposited elsewhere on the project site as envisioned in the 2010 approved plan.

Dr. Brophy indicated that with the expanded parking lot being constructed in the current location of the athletic field, the College hopes to begin construction on the new athletic field in May in order to be available for the fall 2013 term. Ara responded that prior to commencing construction on the new athletic field, the City Council will have to consider the CUP application and associated environmental documents at a duly noticed public hearing.

Dr. Brophy informed the Committee that the student enrollment numbers for the spring 2013 term will be reported to the City within the coming week. He also mentioned that at this time, the College is uncertain as to where the graduation ceremony will held this year,

but that it will still occur somewhere on campus.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Ara encouraged the Committee representatives to contact the College directly if questions or issues should arise during the school year. Ara requested that each HOA representative disseminate the information gleaned from the meeting to the members of their respective HOA members. The next NAC meeting is tentatively scheduled for mid-September (a final date will be set late summer).

Action Items from January 10, 2013 Meeting

- **Finalize PUMP document for agency review (RPV and PVPLC)** – The Council is tentatively scheduled to adopt the PUMP document at its March 19th meeting. City and PVPLC Staff will review the Wildlife Agencies comments before the end of the month with the intent to have the document available for public review the first week of March.
- **Port-o-potty mapping (Emilio)** – Emilio is to provide Joel with the information so that it can be added as a layer on the City's GIS.
- **Sanitation district habitat impact at Alta Vicente and follow-up with Sanitation (Joel)** – Joel recapped the meeting that occurred with the sanitation district representative. Beginning next year, the Sanitation District will service the sewer lines in September and will coordinate with the City and PVPLC.
- **Peppertree area easement follow-up (Ara)** – Ara meet with the property owners to discuss acquiring permission to traverse their property for public Preserve trail purposes. The meeting went well and will follow-up with a draft agreement for their review.
- **San Ramon bike jump removal (Emilio)** – Emilio, with assistance from Ara, installed signs notifying trail users who have erected jumps that the jumps will be removed by the City if not removed in advance of the date specified in the notice. The removal will occur the second week in February.
- **Unauthorized Trail Connection between Fire Station and Rim Trails (Ara)** – Ara reported that a letter was sent to an individual who is connected to the party suspected to be creating the unauthorized trail requesting that all unauthorized work stop immediately to avoid any further impact to the natural habitat. The City is meeting with representatives from the City of Rolling Hills to discuss the possibility in reopening the closed trail.

PVPLC Topics

- **Ongoing trail project update:**
 - **Coastal trail connector with PV Drive (Smuggler's Cove)** – The PVPLC's Volunteer Trail Crew is scheduled to construct this trail.
- **Narcissa Fire Update (Danielle)** – It was reported that the PVPLC is waiting for comments from the Wildlife Agencies before finalizing the report.
- **Forrestal Reserve Fence Stumps (Danielle)** – It was reported that the fence stumps were removed by the trail crew.
- **Forrestal Reserve Fence Removal** - The trail crew would like to remove fencing along the Mariposa trail over the next several weeks. The PVPLC will coordinate with Emilio to have the debris hauled off site.
- **Agua Amarga Reserve Encroachments (Danielle)** – Danielle and Joel will schedule a site visit in the next weeks to inspect the identified encroachments.
- **2012 PVPLC Annual Report** – The Annual Report is expected to be delivered to the City in March for Council review later this year.

City Manager Topics

- **2009 Edison litigation status update (RPV)** – No new information to report. The tentative court date is July 15, 2013.
- **Edison Pole inventory** – Matt is scheduling a site visit with Marvin Jackmon (SCE) and interested parties to discuss potential safety measures in the Preserve including conducting a pole inventory.
- **Cathy Nichols trail: sign vandalism follow-up** - Carolynn and Ara will follow-up with Cathy Nichols and the Sheriff on the reported City Trail Sign Vandalism.

Public Works Topics

- **San Ramon Stabilization Project** - It was reported that bid opening is scheduled for January 24th and construction is tentatively scheduled to begin in Spring.
- **Vicente Bluffs Reserve Trail Drainage Issues (Bindu)** – The drainage repair work is scheduled to begin within a few days. Ara will update the City's website and will issue a list-message announcing the project and the potential for intermittent trail closure.
- **GIS overlays:**

- **Dewatering wells (Public works)** - this item was continued until funding can be identified to cover the associated costs.
- **Bollard removal at PVIC (Emilio)** – It was report that the bollards north of the amphitheater will be removed after Whale-of-a-day on March 2, 2013.

- **March 19, 2013 City Council Meeting** - Staff will be taking a follow-up item to the City Council, tentatively scheduled for March 19th, for its approval of the Final PUMP Document along with the following report on possible tools to minimize trail user conflicts in the Preserve:

 - Advisory committee
 - Trail markers
 - Yield signs
 - Warning bells
 - Increased enforcement and stricter fines
- **NCCP/IA (Joel)** – The City and the PVPLC continue to review the comments received from the Wildlife Agencies.
- **Conservation Easement Update** - The City attorney is reviewing the recent changes proposed by the Department of Fish and Game. Joel is to follow-up with Carol.
- **Malaga' and Windport Canyon Purchase Agreement update** – Joel reported that the appraiser will be sending over the appraisals for these two properties within the next few weeks and will then follow-up with the WCB.
- **Off-road Vehicles in the Preserve** – The City received information that off-road vehicles were entering the Preserve at the upper end of the Fire Station Trail. Emilio will install ground barriers to prevent vehicles or motorcycles from entering the Preserve, similar to the barriers installed along PVDS.
- **Abalone Cove Park Improvement Grant** - Ara reported that Melendrez is preparing design and construction plans. He added that the Focus Group will reconvene on February 25th at PVIC to review the conceptual plan submitted with the grant application and to provide the City and Melendrez with input on the furnishings to be used.
- **California Coastal Trail Update** - The Council at its January 15th meeting reviewed an updated scope of work and directed Staff to issue a new bid. Staff is waiting approvals from the State on the City's Labor Compliance Program.
- **City wide Park Signage Inventory Update (Planning)** - Ara reported that the team continues to meet regularly and is gearing up to install new Preserve Rules signs based on input from the PVPLC.
- **GIS overlays:**
 - **Archaeology site (planning)** - Joel provided the City's GIS team with information needed to create the GIS layer and will follow-up with the status. He will also provide the City's GIS team with information for creating an overlay on Preserve amenities as described in the PUMP Document
- **Water Department habitat impact at Portuguese Bend follow-up** – Joel will send a letter to the Water Department regarding the habitat impacts.
- **Ocean Front Estates (Vicente Bluffs Reserve) Landscaping Proposal** – Ara informed the team that the HOA is looking at installing some new landscaping but it doesn't appear to be in the on-site Preserve or wildlife corridors. Ara will coordinate with Emilio and the HOA.

Recreation and Parks Topics

- **Park Ranger Update** - Ranger Johnson provided the team with an update on some recent incidents and areas of increased concern, including motorcycles entering Portuguese Bend Reserve from Rolling Hills and off-road trucks attempting to enter Portuguese Bend Reserve from the Peppertree area. Ranger Johnson reported locations where trail use signs need improvement to clarify rules to users, help Rangers issue citations, and help citations stand up in court: Rim Trail (traveling up), Peppertree area, intersection of Toyon and Garden Trails, San Ramon Reserve, and the intersection of Flying Mane and Basalt Trails. She also mentioned that Ishibashi Farm Trail may benefit from extra signage, since some areas of the trail are open to mountain bikes, and others are not. This may be confusing to users.
- **Night Hikes Update** – The next night hike is scheduled for February 23rd and will be led by the rangers.
- **Hike handout** - An update hike scheduled will be emailed to the team.
- **Junior Ranger Program** - An update was provided at the team meeting regarding the schedule for 2013, and that the last event involved 35 participants.
