40TH ANNIVERSARY BUDGET UPDATE

The FY12-13 Budget provided \$40,000 for the 40th Anniversary celebration. As reported to City Council on July 2nd, with a total expenditure of \$14,153.88 for the Gala held at Terranea on May 5th (which includes the \$5,000 donation to two non-profit organizations), the budget had a \$25,846.12 balance at that time for the two remaining planned events. These include 40th Anniversary enhancements to the City's annual Fourth of July Celebration and a reception at Trump National Golf Club on September 7th.

The City's 2013 Fourth of July Celebration has its own \$25,000 budget included in the Recreation and Parks Department's Special Events Program. This total did not include additional funding for 40th Anniversary enhancements, which consisted of the following:

- 40th Anniversary Tent with historical exhibits
- 40 cent carnival ride tickets (normally \$1.00 per ticket)
- 40 cent hot dogs for children 16 and under (normally \$4.00 each)
- 40 cent popcorn for children 16 and under (normally \$2.00 each)
- Added family-friendly games, craft area and scavenger hunt

The additional enhancements were a great success! 13,250 ride tickets were sold in 2013, compared to 6,500 in 2012. 400 discounted hot dogs and 300 discounted bags of popcorn were sold to children 16 year and under. The added hour of family games drew a strong turnout and staff is already planning to incorporate similar activities into the 2014 Celebration. Finally, the 40th Anniversary tent, sponsored by Trump National Golf Club, attracted a steady stream of visitors enjoying its exhibits featuring the natural beauty and history of the City and its struggle for incorporation. The tent's craft area and scavenger hunt were especially popular with young visitors.

The expenses related to the 40th Anniversary enhancements to the Fourth of July Celebration are listed below:

Food Subsidy:	\$1,920.00
Ride Subsidy:	\$2,500.00
40 th Family Games:	\$ 630.00
40 th Tent & Misc. Expenses:	<u>\$1,182.45</u>
Subtotal:	\$6,232.45
Donation (Trump National):	<u>(\$2,000.00)</u>
Total:	\$4,232.45

Deducting the total cost of the enhancements leaves a remaining balance in the 40th Anniversary budget of \$21,613.67. The City is on target to adhere to this budget with one additional Anniversary event scheduled for the remainder of the calendar year.

KELP FOREST RESTORATION BEGINS ON PALOS VERDES SHELF

Last September, Staff reported that the Montrose Settlements Restoration Program (MSRP) Trustees had announced that the Kelp Forest Restoration project was ready to begin soon. Staff recently learned from MSRP that the restoration began in July. There are six (6) restoration sites located adjacent to Rancho Palos Verdes, extending from the boundary with the City of Palos Verdes Estates to Abalone Cove (see attached summary from MSRP website).

CONGRESSMAN WAXMAN SENDS LETTER TO DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY REGARDING RANCHO LPG FACILITY

Today, Congressman Henry Waxman announced that the attached letter had been sent to the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) regarding the Rancho LPG facility. Congressman Waxman is the Ranking Member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, and it seems clear that this letter was prompted (at least in part) by the recent letter to him from Mayor Brooks. Congressman Waxman has urged DHS Secretary Janet Napolitano to take necessary steps to protect the public from the risk of explosion at the liquefied petroleum gas storage facility owned by Rancho LPG Holdings, LLC. He notes that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and DHS have reported conflicting data about the facility's preparedness for an accident or attack, which has the potential to create considerable confusion for the surrounding communities. This comes on the heels of explosions this week at a propane gas plant in Florida, which underscored the potential dangers to local communities from facilities that store liquefied gas.

Congressman Waxman has called on the Secretary to conduct a thorough review of the Chemical Facility Anti-Terrorism Standards (CFATS) program administered by DHS. He notes that the discrepancies between the EPA and DHS findings for the Rancho LPG facility may be due to deficiencies in the CFATS program and its inability to provide reliable

indicators of a facility's security. It should also be noted that Congressman Waxman drafted a letter to President Obama this past May, calling for a Blue Ribbon Commission to examine industrial chemical facility security nationwide (a link to this letter is at



Montrose Settlements Restoration Program

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Kelp Forest Restoration Project on Palos Verdes Shelf Begins!

After 15 years of scientific monitoring, research, and planning, the Santa Monica Bay Restoration Foundation (SMBRF) with funding and technical assistance from NOAA's Montrose Settlements Restoration Program (MSRP) begins a large-scale kelp forest restoration project off the coast of California's Palos Verdes peninsula this July. SMBRF will bring kelp forests back to life in an area that has experienced a 75% loss of kelp canopy.

Nearly 100 acres of reef habitat along the Palos Verdes coast is covered by "urchin barrens," where the densities of urchins are extremely high and kelp plants are non-existent. Sea urchins are spiny marine invertebrates that live on rocky reef substrates and feed mostly on algae. When sea urchin populations are kept stable, they are an important part of a healthy kelp forest ecosystem. On the other hand, in an "urchin barren," urchin densities get very high because predators rarely feed on urchins, preferring the greater cover and higher productivity of healthy kelp forests. The urchins in barrens are also in a constant state of starvation, continually expanding the barren area by eating every newly settled kelp plant before the kelp has a chance to grow. These urchins are of no value to fishermen and urchin predators because they are undernourished, small, and often diseased.



To bring back the kelp forests, volunteer divers, commercial urchin divers, researchers, and local non-profit groups will assist SMBRF with removing urchins from the “urchin barrens” and allow for natural settlement of kelp plants. Divers’ removal of the urchins will allow for kelp plants to grow and mature which can happen quickly since the plants often grow up to two feet per day. Within a year, SMBRF expects that many of the characteristics of a mature kelp forest will return including providing suitable fish habitat for important commercial and recreational fish species. The mature kelp forest will support greater numbers of urchin predators, such as birds, fish, crabs, lobsters, octopuses, sea stars, and sea otters, which will help to maintain more sustainable levels of urchin populations in the future.



Dear Madame Secretary:

This week, explosions at a propane gas plant in Florida underscored the potential dangers to local communities from facilities that store liquefied gas. The Florida plant was relatively small, but the incident there injured workers, some critically, and forced an evacuation of the surrounding community.

In my district, there is a facility with much larger tanks that stores liquefied gas. My investigation indicates that the Department does not appear to be taking the steps necessary to protect the public from the risks of explosions. In fact, the Department is reaching conclusions that conflict with those of EPA inspectors, creating confusion and potentially delaying safety measures. I am writing to call this facility to your attention and to urge the Department to take all necessary steps to safeguard the local community.

Earlier this year, community leaders brought to my attention the liquefied petroleum gas storage facility owned by Rancho LPG Holdings LLC in San Pedro, California. Like the Blue Rhino facility that exploded in Florida, Rancho holds significant quantities of flammable gases, including propane. Unlike the Florida facility, the Rancho facility's holdings are stored in large tanks, posing a threat of a larger scale explosion than what was seen in Florida.

The community leaders in Rancho Palos Verdes are concerned about the risks Rancho poses to its neighboring residents. They told me that unexplained flaring has occurred at the site without proper notification and that mitigation measures have not been performed at the site to prevent an accident or terrorist attack. They are concerned that the tanks are simply too close to homes and schools, given the possibility of a large-scale explosion.

On March 14, 2013, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) initiated an enforcement action against Rancho for violations of legal requirements of EPA's Risk Management Program. Rancho was cited for failure to share the facility's emergency response plan with first responders who would have a role in responding to a release at the facility, failure

to assess risks in its rail storage area, and a failure to properly plan for seismic events. Essentially, EPA said that Rancho is not prepared for an earthquake or accident.

When I learned of these facts, my staff contacted the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to learn what the Department was doing to protect the community. Under the current system, federal oversight of a facility like Rancho is split between EPA, which is charged with protecting against chemical accidents, and DHS, which is charged with protecting against chemical releases that are caused by terrorist or criminal acts.

What we learned from DHS was surprising. While EPA has taken action to protect the community from deficiencies in the Rancho facility's preparedness, DHS found no significant or disqualifying problems at Rancho. An official of the Department told my staff that the facility had just undergone a "successful CFATS inspection."¹ No explanation was given as to how Rancho could be a danger to the community according to EPA but perfectly safe according to the Department of Homeland Security.

Last week, my staff reviewed the records from that inspection, and they reveal serious inadequacies in the DHS inspection at the facility. Most of the information DHS relied upon was self-reported by the facility. And when the inspectors went to the facility to conduct the inspections, their verification efforts were minimal.

For example, the DHS inspector "verified" that the facility's emergency response plan had been communicated to local emergency responders based on an interview with a senior representative of the company's management who did not work at the facility, whereas EPA found by checking with employees and local emergency responders that the facility's emergency response plan was not on file.

Similarly, the DHS inspector "verified" that employees had been trained on their roles and responsibilities in emergency situations by reviewing training records and interviewing the same senior manager, but EPA discovered by checking with the employees that they did not know what their roles and responsibilities are for emergency response.

As I hope you can understand, the DHS actions have the potential to create considerable confusion for the community. EPA says Rancho is not prepared for an accident; DHS says the company is prepared for an intentional attack. The EPA inspection appears thorough; the DHS inspection seems cursory. The EPA findings are alarming; the DHS conclusions are reassuring.

I believe the root cause of the problem may be deficiencies in the Chemical Facility Anti-Terrorism Standards (CFATS) program administered by DHS. The CFATS program has a long

record of ineffectiveness. As Rep. Bennie Thompson, the Ranking Member of the Committee on Homeland Security, and I wrote President Obama earlier this year, CFATS appears to be a “failing” program that has shown a “distressing lack of progress in securing these facilities since the program was established nearly six years ago.”² Now, this example suggests that the benchmarks for progress through the CFATS program are not reliable indicators of a facility’s security. It is troubling to think that we might never have become aware of the deficiencies in the CFATS inspection if not for EPA’s work. Significant changes to the CFATS program appear warranted.

I urge you to review the Department’s actions at Rancho and the larger CFATS program. I hope you will then take whatever steps are necessary to ensure public safety.




SAN RAMON CANYON PROJECT UPDATE

Tunneling continues for the slant drain this week as the contractor continues his effort from bluff top to the beach. Hard rock has been encountered and has slowed the advancing of the drill machine but progress is being made. The contractor has also completed installing the 29 CIDH (cast in drilled hole, described last time) piles that will form the foundation of the inlet structure. As soon as these piles are sufficiently cured, grade beams will be formed and cast on top of them. The grade beams will support the floor and walls of the inlet structure.

Excavation of the 1800 foot long trench for the intermediate section of pipe, known as the "cut and cover" section, began this week. The photo depicts a portion of the preliminary excavation which is made to lay back the edges of the trench. This allows the excavator to go deeper, if required, on the next pass. The trench varies in depth over the 1800 foot length, from about 8 feet to about 25 feet.

Delivery of pipe for the cut and cover section begins tomorrow. The pipe installation will begin right away, as soon as the trench is excavated to proper depth and bedding material can be placed and compacted. Compacted backfill over the pipe will be added as soon as the pipe has been laid.
