CITY MANAGER

- AB 306 (Hadley): AB 306, which would allow the children of active military families to attend school in their district of choice, was scheduled for a third reading in the full Senate on July 14th. The bill has been amended in the Senate to more simply state that a "school district of residence" cannot prohibit the transfer of a pupil who is a child of an active military duty parent to a school in any school district, if the school district to which the parents of the pupil applies approves the application for transfer (see attachment). Staff will provide future updates on the status of this bill.
- Recruitments: Staff launched the recruitment for Deputy City Manager today. Application packets must be received by 4:00 p.m. on Friday, August 14, 2015. Staff will be launching a recruiting process for Assistant Civil Engineer, and continues the recruitments for Recreation Leaders and Recreation Specialists. - 2015 Leadership Academy: The City's first session will be held tomorrow night! Staff thanks the community for the outpouring of interest in the program and looks forward to an educational and informative series of learning experiences for all participants.

FINANCE

- Recent News from CalPERS: CalPERS has just reported a preliminary one year investment performance of 2.4 percent for Fiscal Year 2014-15.

Over the past three and five years, the Fund has earned returns of 10.9 and 10.7 percent, respectively. Both of these longer term performance figures exceed the Fund's assumed investment return of 7.5 percent, and are more appropriate indicators of the overall health of the investment portfolio. Importantly, the three- and five-year returns exceeded the policy benchmarks.

Real estate in particular remained a bright spot, with strong outperformance versus its benchmark. For a more detailed explanation of the returns by asset class, please view the press release on the CalPERS website.

CalPERS assets at the end of the fiscal year stood at more than \$301 billion. Just as a reference point, in 2013 CalPERS portfolio had rebounded to \$261.7 billion erasing the \$97 billion loss during the recession.

PUBLIC WORKS

- 4th of July PW Booths: Public Works had an Environmental, Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee and Traffic Safety Committee booths at the event. Various handouts regarding water conservation, recycling, and general Public Works activities, and giveaway items were distributed to more than 300 visitors of the booths.



- Composting Workshop: The next composting workshop is scheduled for Saturday September 12th from 9:30 am to 11 am at Hesse Park's Fireside Room.
- Maintenance: Repaired broken de-watering well drain line in Portuguese Bend. Made temporary repairs to leaking above ground sewer line near 26 Narcissa. Awaiting delivery of new line, estimated delivery date is 13 July. Removed large tree limb from Montemalaga Dr. near Basswood. Provided support for Fourth of July event. Repaired leaking faucet at Hesse Park. Installed 4 new analogue towel dispensers in the restrooms at Hesse Park. Remediated graffiti in Altamira Canyon.
- Public Works Encroachment Permit Report: The Public Works Department is responsible for control of work performed within the City Public "Rights of Way". An Encroachment Permit is required to insure that any applicant working in our streets or parkways is properly licensed, insured and in compliance with the NPDES requirements. - Senior Administrative Analyst: Continued creating new Purchase Orders for Public Works services and supplies for the new fiscal year (66 new PO's initiated so far).

- Senior Administrative Analyst: Continued processing and approving Public Works vendor invoices for payment against FY 14-15 and FY 15-16 (approximately 350 invoices processed so far in the month of July 2015).
- City Hall Overflow Parking: A dust palliative was applied at the City of RPV City Hall overflow parking lot on July 14, 2015. This was a one (1) day process and cars and trucks are allowed to drive and park on the lot without delay. The palliative used was a non-toxic and environmentally friendly product.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

- SoCal Metroplex: The FAA extended the public comment period for its Draft Environmental Assessment (DEA) of the SoCal Metroplex project to September 8, 2015, to allow for a full 90 day comment period. The project is a comprehensive proposal to improve the flow of air traffic into and out of Southern California by making airspace safer and more efficient. The DEA is available online at the link below. In reviewing the DEA, no significant noise impacts will occur to all affected areas from San Bernardino to San Diego Counties as a result of implementation of the proposal. The area over the Peninsula is expected to have no change in noise levels as a result of the project as there are no direct flight paths over the City. As a result, Staff does not plan to comment on the DEA.

- Graffiti and Debris Cleanup at 2902 Vista Del Mar: In response to recent reports from the public that a vacant lot located on Vista Del Mar has been the site of increased late night loitering and graffiti, Code Enforcement Staff was able to get an agent for the private property owner to clean up the property last week by removing graffiti, trash and abandoned furniture. Staff is now working with the agent to fence the property. In addition, the Sheriff has been asked to frequent deputy patrols of the area.
- Swan Thai Restaurant: A small fire occurred at the restaurant located in the Golden

Cove Center on July 8th causing some minor damage to the exterior wall adjacent to the kitchen. Building & Safety Staff was notified by the Fire Department and an inspection was conducted that same day. Staff worked with their representatives to promptly issue a building permit on July 10th. Repair work was started and Staff performed progress inspections on Saturday July 11th and Monday July 13th. Building & Safety inspection approval to reopen was granted as the interior repairs were completed on the 10th. Approval to reopen was granted by the L.A. County Health Department on the 13th and the establishment has now reopened for business.

- Trump National Waterfall Removal Project: As reported last week, the Coastal Commission recently notified Trump National to cease all work on the waterfall removal project currently underway because no Coastal Development Permit application has been obtained by Trump National. According to Trump National, the waterfalls have been completely removed and only the grading and habitat replacement needs to occur. City Staff let Trump National know that if needed, City Staff would be happy to meet with Coastal Commission Staff to demonstrate how Trump National addressed all of the City and Wildlife Agency concerns with regards to any potential adverse impacts to habitat.
- Website Update: The View Restoration Division section of the City's website was updated to reflect the recent adoption of a temporary moratorium on the acceptance and processing of City Tree Review Permits. Staff will continually update this section of the website in order to provide the public with the most up-to-date information related to the City Tree Review Permit process.
- Zone 1 Code Amendment: Staff met with Robert Crumby, the President of the Portuguese Bend HOA, to discuss a proposed Code Amendment to create a Moratorium Exception category to allow one single-family residence on the each of the two lots located within Zone 1 only. Staff previously met with Jim York, property owner of one of the lots, who noted that he does not anticipate taking advantage of the proposed exception category at this time. Staff is currently preparing the necessary CEQA analysis and anticipates bringing the code amendment to the City Council in fall of 2015.
- Highridge Condominium Senior Housing Project: The applicant has submitted all of the necessary information to deem their application complete for approval of a Final Tract Map to be considered before the City Council. The Final Map, and associated Affordable Housing Agreement, will be on the Consent Calendar of the August 4, 2015 City Council Agenda.
- Palos Verdes Half Marathon, 5k and 10k: On July 14, 2015, an application package for the annual Palos Verdes Half Marathon, 5k and 10k was submitted to the City. The Half Marathon, 5k and 10k is proposed to occur on Saturday November 14, 2015 along Palos Verdes Drive South and West. In the coming weeks, Planning Staff will be working with the event organizer, Mountain Sports International and coordinating with other City Departments to do the usual preparation for the event.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 306, as amended, Hadley. Public schools: attendance alternatives: children of military personnel.

Existing law requires each person between 6 and 18 years of age, not otherwise exempt, to attend the public full-time day school in the district in which their parent or guardian is a resident. Existing law provides for attendance alternatives, authorizes the governing board of any school district to accept interdistrict transfers, and prescribes procedures for the acceptance and approval of applications for interdistrict transfers. Existing law further authorizes a school district of choice, as defined, to give priority of attendance to children of military personnel.

~~This bill would authorize a parent of a pupil enrolled in a school district of residence, as defined, to submit an application for the pupil~~

~~to attend a school in another school district if the parent with whom the pupil resides is on active military duty, as defined. The bill would require that an application requesting such a transfer be submitted to the chosen school district before January 1 preceding the school year for which a pupil is requesting the transfer, except as provided, and would specify that the application may request enrollment of the pupil in a specific school or program within the school district. The bill would require a school district to establish a time period for resident pupil enrollment, in order to provide priority enrollment opportunities for pupils residing in the school district, and, after that time period has concluded, if space is available at a school in the school district, to consider and approve transfer applications submitted pursuant to those provisions, in accordance with specified priorities. The bill would require a school district that receives such an application for a transfer to allow the pupil to enroll in the school district in the school year immediately following the approval of his or her application. The bill would authorize a school district to adopt specific, written standards for the acceptance of applicants pursuant to those provisions. By imposing new duties on school districts with regard to the review and acceptance of requests for alternative school attendance by children of military personnel, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program: *prohibit a school district of residence from prohibiting the transfer of a pupil who is a child of an active military duty parent to a school in any school district, if the school district to which the parents of the pupil applies approves the application for transfer.*~~
