CITY MANAGER

Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and Social Host Ordinance Proposal: On January 23, 2018 the Board of Supervisors heard a proposal that would enact a Social Host Ordinance to the three peninsula unincorporated areas as a one year pilot program. The ordinance will deter underage drinking and recreational cannabis usage at house parties by imposing fines on any adult responsible for the property or household at which underage drinking and cannabis consumption occurs, to the three peninsula unincorporated areas as a one year pilot program. The Board voted 4-0 for passage with Supervisor Kuehl abstaining. Los Angeles County Office of Cannabis Management and Proposed Policies: The Office of Cannabis Management (OCM) is a unit within the LA County Chief Executive Office and coordinates the implementation of the County's cannabis policies and regulations. The OCM submitted a letter to the Board of Supervisors to provide recommendations regarding the regulation of commercial medical and adult-use cannabis in unincorporated areas. "Trakit" Permitting, Planning, Code Enforcement and Business License System Implementation: On December 6, 2016, the City Council approved an agreement to purchase the "Trakit" Permitting, Planning, Code Enforcement, and Business Licensing system. Staff from all departments worked collaboratively for over a year, and the system went live Tuesday, January 23rd. Trakit replaced the aging Tidemark system, the Naviline Business License system, and various paper-based systems used throughout the City.

The Trakit system has features that will prepare the City for the future, including full integration into the City's GIS system, an online portal that will eventually allow the public to view and process permits and projects online, and the ability to process Electronic Plan Reviews. Trakit will integrate with a planned online reporting system that includes a comprehensive reporting app for all City services on computers or mobile phones. In addition, Trakit will integrate with the documents being scanned for the Address and Geology File Digitizing Project, eventually creating a semi-paperless process. The City will announce each of these new features as they become available.

Upgrade to City Hall Data Circuit: The ever increasing number of public facing and cloud related services has begun to stress the City's current residential grade Fiber Optic Service (FIOS) circuit, having led to a major outage to the financial system in December. For that reason, and to insure the City is prepared for future enhancements, the primary circuit at City Hall is being upgraded to a commercial grade Tier 1 fiber circuit. The new commercial solution provides for a variety of benefits including:

- Active 24 hour per day monitoring of the status of the circuit, troubleshooting and repair prior to City initiating a trouble ticket

- Dedicated and direct porting to the provider head end and the internet rather than shared internet access
- Direct routing of packets to appropriate core networks minimizing latency and TCP requests
- Increase in speed and the number of IP addresses to accommodate planned enhancements
- Improved customer support, including first call access to level 2 and 3 network engineers
- Access to a wide variety of cloud, backup and redundancy capabilities

This important upgrade to our primary voice and data circuit will increase the cost of telephone and data circuits by approximately \$530 per month.

DTSC Approves Final PEA for Ladera Linda Fields Site: On Friday, January 19th, the City was notified that the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) had completed its review of public comments on the Draft Preliminary Endangerment Assessment (PEA) for the school district's Ladera Linda Fields site. DTSC has now issued the Final PEA, and has confirmed its determination that the site "does not pose a significant risk to human health and the environment under any land use," and that "no further action is required with respect to additional investigation or remediation of hazardous substances at the site." Senate Bill No. 902: As the City Council will recall, a letter in support for Senate Bill No. 786 (SB 786), dealing with residential substance abuse treatment facilities, was approved by the City Council on January 16th. On January 17th, the attached article appeared in the Daily Breeze regarding proposed Senate Bill No. 902 (SB 902), which is also intended to deal with these facilities. Staff will continue to monitor SB 902.

Hearing for Federal Offshore Drilling Program: As reported in the January 10th Weekly Administrative Report, the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) released its draft proposed program to initiate new lease sales for offshore oil and gas drilling on January 4th. The draft program proposes to two (2) new lease sales within the Southern California Planning Area. The draft proposed program is available for review on-line at <https://www.boem.gov/NP-Draft-Proposed-Program-2019-2024>. A series of public meetings to solicit input on the program are being held around the country, with a meeting currently scheduled in Sacramento on Thursday, February 8th (click [here](#) for a list of meeting locations). Staff will continue to monitor this proposal.

Coastal Commission Hearing regarding Clearwater Program: As the City Council may recall, the Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts propose to construct a new sewer outfall tunnel between the Joint Water Pollution Control Plant (JWPCP) in Carson and the existing sewer outfalls located offshore from Royal Palms Beach in San Pedro (i.e., the so-called "Clearwater Program"). The new tunnel will provide redundancy for and allow the

inspection and repair of two (2) existing sewer outfall tunnels that currently pass hundreds of feet below the Eastview area of the City. On January 22nd, the City received the attached notice from the California Coastal Commission that the Commission will be conducting a public hearing on the portion of the project within its jurisdiction on Friday, February 9th. FINANCE

2018-19 Budget Workshop: The City will host its annual budget workshop for the City Council and public sometime in April where the General Fund will be presented. General Fund items to be discussed include the FY17-18 estimated year-end revenues and expenditures, fund balance, and proposed FY18-19 budget numbers. The City Council will provide direction to Staff at this meeting on revenue and expenditure assumptions, as well as personnel and policy recommendations to develop the City's FY18-19 preliminary budget. The preliminary budget is scheduled to be presented to Council in May.

PUBLIC WORKS

Residential Street Rehabilitation Project for Area 2 and 6: The City's slurry contractor, American Asphalt South has completed warranty slurry seal treatment to various streets in last year's residential street program areas. Striping will be complete by the end of January.

PVDS Slurry Seal Treatment: A much needed slurry seal treatment was applied to PVDS between Forrestal Drive and the eastern city limit. Striping will be complete by 2/2. Traffic impacts and waits of 5-10 minutes either direction are expected. Motorists are encouraged to take alternate routes if possible.

Storm Drain Deficiency Improvement Project: Construction is on schedule and expected to be complete at the Montemalaga Drive/Grandview Park by the end of the month. Demobilization work and restoration at the park will follow.

Maintenance: Maintenance Staff/Crewmembers in conjunction with Contract Service Providers completed the replacement of street name signs at Calle Entradero and Calle Viento as well as the new fencing for Windport and Locklenna.





COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

LA County Animal Control's New Barking Dog Complaint Procedures: City Staff recently met with a L.A. County Animal Control representative to discuss, among other things, barking dog complaints and the County's response procedures. Staff was informed that the County began implementing a new streamlined process as of December 1, 2017. Attached is a summary that outlines L.A. County's previous and new procedures regarding barking dog complaints (see attached).

Peninsula Cities Coyote Staff Meeting: Code Enforcement Staff recently met with Staff from Palos Verdes Estates and Rolling Hills Estates to discuss Peninsula-wide coyote issues. At this meeting, Palos Verdes Estates reported that its Police Department has recently trained some volunteer members, as well as field staff and interested residents, on how to raise public awareness on coyote issues, how to better protect their residents' property and pets, and effective hazing techniques. The cities of Rancho Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills Estates reported they are planning to hold a joint community workshop in March 2018 to solicit volunteers to help both cities launch a new comprehensive training program to raise public awareness on how to coexist with coyotes.

A New Chase Bank on Western Avenue is Approved: On January 23, 2018, the Planning Commission adopted P.C. Resolution 2018-04, approving a Conditional Use Permit, Variance, Grading Permit, Site Plan Review, and Master Sign Program to allow the demolition of the existing vacant Coco's restaurant building to accommodate the construction of a new 4,131 square foot Chase Bank building at 28300 S. Western Avenue. As part of the approval, the Commission added a condition requiring the parking lot landscape planter along the Western Avenue driveway to be redesigned to create an integrated parking lot. Staff will be working with the Applicant and adjacent property owners in the upcoming weeks to comply with this condition.

Green Hills Quarterly Newsletter: Green Hills issued the first 2018 Quarterly Newsletter that will be mailed out to the Peninsula Verde and Rolling Riviera HOA residents. This newsletter includes park rules, date of events, decoration pick-up schedules, and other miscellaneous updates (see attached).

Hesse Park View Restoration Plan: On April 12, 2017, a View Restoration Plan was agreed upon by the Pacific View Homeowners Association, Verde Ridge Road residents, and the Recreation and Parks Department to trim or remove over 100 view impairing trees within and surrounding Hesse Park in four phases. Phase one, consisting of the trimming of pine trees on Locklenna Lane, was completed in April 2017. Phases two and three, consisting of extensive tree trimming and tree removal throughout Hesse Park, was completed in September 2017. Phase four consists of extensive trimming of approximately 25 Pine trees. The Phase four trimming is tentatively scheduled to begin the week of February 5, 2018, when pine tree trimming is most suitable.

LAX/Community Noise Roundtable Update: At the January 10, 2018 meeting, the Roundtable mailed a letter to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) describing their disappointment with FAA's non-responsiveness and requesting re-engagement with the committee to address public concerns (see attached). This letter was also provided to various senators and congressmen.




Bill aims to plug holes in addiction treatment industry

SACRAMENTO – Outraged by reports of “patient brokering” and neighborhood turmoil, Sen. Pat Bates introduced legislation Wednesday to start addressing dangerous and deadly practices in California’s poorly-regulated addiction treatment industry.

“For more than 20 years, several bipartisan efforts to address the challenges surrounding the state’s drug rehab history have gone nowhere due to opposition from vested interests,” said Bates, R-Laguna Niguel.

“While I’m under no illusion that pursuing greater oversight will be any easier this year, doing nothing is not acceptable for constituents who have contacted me on this issue. [The Southern California News Group’s thorough 2017 investigation](#) into the industry makes it clear that reforms are needed.”

SCNG’s probe found that as opioid addiction has soared, unscrupulous rehab operators have rushed in to take advantage of mandatory mental health treatment coverage required by the Affordable Care Act. Broke and homeless heroin addicts are worth hundreds of thousands of dollars each in the form of insurance payments, and many are bought, sold and exploited in an underworld rife with kickbacks, drug use and fraud that can end in death.

Addicts around the country are enticed to California with offers of free travel, rent, cigarettes and even manicures, often landing in centers that would not be allowed to open elsewhere. California’s hands-off approach to regulating the industry makes it easy for almost anyone to open a treatment center and charge insurance companies hundreds of thousands of dollars per client, without being required to show evidence that their treatment helps rather than harms. The concentration of facilities is so dense the Los Angeles basin has been dubbed the “Rehab Riviera.”

“Creating substantive and positive change in the drug rehab industry will take time,” Bates said in the statement. “But as a former social worker who once worked in some of our state’s most economically deprived neighborhoods, I take inspiration from Winston Churchill’s mantra of ‘Never, never, never give up.’ And as long as I’m around, I won’t. Stay tuned.”

[The bill, SB 902](#) is still a work-in-progress, she said, with language to be crafted with the help of those involved. She wants to improve patient well-being and increase public safety of neighborhoods hosting rehabs and sober living homes, she said, and aims to stop the industry’s bad actors, not those with strong records of helping people.

In 2016, the Senate Health Committee rejected her SB 1283 that would have allowed a city or county to craft health and safety standards specifically for sober living homes.

In November, a bipartisan group of the U.S. House of Representatives' Energy and Commerce Committee asked California and five other states for information on allegations of patient brokering.


The parents of several young adults who have died in treatment centers have called on Gov. Jerry Brown to lead on this issue. Brown's office declined to comment on Bates' push for action.

"Our office does not typically weigh in on pending legislation," said deputy press secretary Ali Bay by email. "If that changes in this case, I'll let you know."

Sen. John Moorlach, R-Costa Mesa, represents an area that's home to one of the densest concentrations of rehabs in the state.

"I will be as supportive as I can be," said Moorlach. "As with any industry, there are bad players. And they're the ones that need to be addressed."

L.A. COUNTY ANIMAL CONTROL BARKING DOG COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

Previous Procedures

For comparative purposes, the following outlines the steps the County implemented up until December 1, 2017 regarding barking dog complaints:

Step 1:

- Complaint reported to Animal Control.
- A letter would then be mailed to the dog owner notifying them of the complaint and measures to resolve the situation.
- No site visit would occur by Animal Control.

Step 2:

- If the problem persisted, the complaining party would update Animal Control, in writing, that the barking is continuing.
- Animal Control would then dispatch an officer to the dog owner's address to make contact with the owner, check the condition of the dog, and serve the owner with a Notice to Abate.

Step 3:

- Should the problem persist, mediation would be provided to resolve the complaint.
- If mediation was unsuccessful, Animal Control would provide the complaining party with a public nuisance petition requiring at least six signatures from individuals willing to testify at any proceeding the District Attorney's office feels is appropriate.
- The signed petition is forwarded to the District Attorney's office for consideration. The decision regarding the appropriate next steps would solely be up to the District Attorney.

New Procedures

As of December 1, 2017, the following new streamlined barking dog complaint procedures are now being implemented by Animal Control:

Step 1:

- Compliant filed.

- Animal Control will send an affidavit to the complaining party to document in writing the alleged complaint.
- A letter is sent to the dog owner regarding the barking nuisance.
- Animal Control will contact the complaining party 2 weeks after the letter is sent to determine if the barking has been abated.

Step 2:

- If the barking continues, Animal Control goes to the site, assesses the situation, and issues a Nuisance Warning, which states the barking must be abated within 10 days or a citation will be issued.
- The dog owner has 10 days to correct the problem or a citation is issued.

Step 3:

- After the 10 days, if the barking persists, a citation is issued. The fine begins at approximately \$300 and increases based on frequency of occurrences. A second citation can be issued after 10 days.






Installation of Lawn Crypts - Area 5 (Arroyo Vista)

Dear Mr. Elwell and Mr. Roberts,

At our meeting on January 10, 2018, the LAX Community Noise Roundtable (RT) discussed several disturbing and startling developments that have transpired since our last meeting in November.

In past years, the LAX RT has had a constructive and productive relationship with the FAA. We have tried to tell the public and our constituent cities and counties about the potential for that relationship to help solve problems stemming from Metroplex/NextGen implementation. And we have, until now, maintained that the public and our constituent government entities can best solve problems by working through the LAX RT to engage with the FAA to develop solutions.

But the events of the past year and, especially, the developments since November 2017 make those positions untenable.

Since August 2017, the FAA has openly and repeatedly refused to answer our questions or engage with us about proposed new IFPs that were open to public comment. The FAA also openly and repeatedly refuses to answer questions and engage in a dialogue with us about FAA Air Traffic Control not abiding by FAA mandated Minimum Altitudes in a large majority of North Arrival flights (STAR HUULL, IRNMN, and RYDRR). And the reason the FAA gives – confidential court ordered mediation in a lawsuit with Culver City – does not hold water.

The facts have long contradicted the FAA's claim that it cannot talk to us about anything because of the Culver City lawsuit being in mediation. The new IFPs were obviously unrelated to the lawsuit and mediation. The developments of the last two months include the final approval of the first of these new IFPs, proving once and for all that it was unrelated to the lawsuit and mediation effort. Worse, the developments of the past two months undermine the FAA's insistence that the public and local governments should work to solve problems with the FAA through airport roundtables. Indeed, the developments of the past two months are galling.

Those developments include:

- The LAX RT received FAA Acting Vice President Jodi S. McCarthy's letter of November 13, 2017, in which she refused to respond to our questions and concerns about the substantial majority of flights on North Downwind Arrival procedures (STAR HUULL, IRNMN, RYDRR) that fail to meet FAA required Minimum Altitude at Waypoint DAHJR

(approximately at Jefferson Blvd & Redondo Blvd in the City of Los Angeles). Ms. McCarthy asserted court ordered confidential mediation with Culver City as the reason why the FAA could not respond.

- We experienced an improvement in flight altitudes at DAHJR in November, which was audible to residents and demonstrated that improvement is possible.
- And then a severe deterioration of flight altitudes at DAHJR in December, in which the percentage of flights under the FAA Minimum Altitude of 6,000 feet rose to 71% and the percentage of flights with very low altitudes below 5,000 hit an unfortunate record high.
- Effective December 7, 2017, the FAA published SADDE 8, with the documents posted on the FAA IFP Information Gateway on December 20, 2017. This is significant because SADDE 8 was one of the proposed new IFPs about which the FAA refused to answer questions or discuss with us, even though it had been open to public comment and thus subject to FAA rules and Federal law requiring the sharing of information with the public to enable informed comment.
- Last, on January 10, 2018, we learned from reporting in the Los Angeles Times that the City of Newport Beach had reached settlement terms in its lawsuit against the FAA.

While the FAA has refused to even talk with us about new IFPs open for public comment and about ways to rectify the high failure rate for altitudes at DAHJR, we see that the City of Newport Beach succeeded through a lawsuit in negotiating a major revamp of a complex SID procedure for departures from John Wayne Airport.

This new curving SID at John Wayne Airport is a much bigger and more complex change than anything we have tried to discuss with the FAA in relation to LAX North Arrivals.

In the Los Angeles Times report on the successful negotiations between the City of Newport Beach and the FAA, this statement by the City Manager, Dave Kiff, caught our attention: “The FAA really did work with us on this, and I think not only were our goals accomplished but we established a new positive relationship with the FAA that I hope will help us going forward.”

We wish we could say that the “FAA really [does] work with us,” but we cannot.

The FAA’s final approval and publication of STAR SADDE 8 demonstrates conclusively that it has nothing to do with mediation in the Culver City lawsuit. The mediation has not (yet) produced a settlement and the lawsuit is still active, yet the FAA designed SADDE 8, opened it to public comment in August/September 2017, and now has approved it. SADDE 8 is definitively unrelated to the mediation with Culver City, yet the FAA has refused to answer our questions about it based on the spurious claim of court ordered confidentiality.

This kind of refusal to provide information to the public during approval processes violates FAA rules and Federal law. Several lawsuits, including the suits filed by Phoenix and Newport Beach, raised similar issues.

The final approval of a new rule or regulation opens a window for timely filing of challenges in court. The LAX RT does not have the capacity to file lawsuits, nor can we offer legal advice to our constituent members or the public.

But we do have an obligation to tell our constituent members and the public that there is a clear contrast between the FAA's steadfast refusal to enter into dialogue with us and its apparent constructive dialogue with Newport Beach.

We have an obligation to tell our constituent members and the public that the FAA's stated reasons for refusing to respond to us constructively do not hold water. We have an obligation to tell them that the FAA seems to us to have been violating its own rules and Federal law (as documented in our prior correspondence). And we have an obligation to tell them that the FAA is playing a bait and switch by telling us all that it insists all concerns and proposals come to it via the LAX RT and then refusing to respond to the RT, refusing to brief the RT, and refusing to work with the RT to find viable solutions.

We have been patient as well as persistent. We continued to try to be a bridge to the FAA for our constituent communities. When members of the public and representatives of some municipalities jumped quickly to the conclusion that lawsuits are the only answer, the LAX RT tried to take a different path and explain that alternative processes of cooperation with the FAA were possible and likely to be more productive.

We can no longer do that, and are hereby so advising the public and our constituent members so that they do not mistakenly think that we can get any cooperation or dialogue from the FAA

This saddens us. It is not good for the public or public service. We wish it were otherwise, but it cannot be otherwise unless and until the FAA comes to work with us to resolve and correct substantive and procedural problems, like making most flights adhere to FAA prescribed Minimum Altitudes, making modest increases in Minimum Altitudes where possible, and generally engaging with the LAX RT in productive ways as opposed to refusing to share information that the law and FAA rules mandates must or should be shared.

We would prefer a positive and productive response from the FAA on these issues so that we can move forward, working together. Meanwhile, we cannot pretend that there is any process in place for addressing problems related to the implementation of NextGen, and we cannot pretend that this is right.
