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CITY MANAGER

Los Angeles County Safe, Clean Water Initiative: On July 10th, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors was reportedly scheduled to consider placing the “Los Angeles County Safe, Clean Water Initiative” on the upcoming November 6th ballot (the item did not yet appear on the Board’s July 10th agenda at the time that this report was completed). Some members of the City Council may recall previously opposing the County’s proposed “Clean Beaches, Clean Water” initiative in 2012, which also sought to address funding for the treatment and capture of stormwater runoff. The proposed ballot measure would enact a Los Angeles County Flood Control District parcel tax of \$0.025 per square foot of impermeable area. Click [here](#) to review the draft ordinance. PUBLIC WORKS

Conestoga Trail Connection Project: Staff and the Engineer of Record conducted a meeting at the City Hall Community Room on Tuesday, June 26th to discuss the proposed improvements to the existing Conestoga trail between Sunnyside Ridge trail and Rolling Hills Estates. Some of the items discussed include the proposed construction of a multi-use trail, the scope of the work, and renderings of the project. Residents raised concerns over the project limits and connectivity of the proposed trail. These concerns were collected and will be discussed with the design engineer to make the necessary changes.

Maintenance Activities: The maintenance crew had a successful 4th of July celebration set-up and execution. Public announcement boards were also set up to help spread the word against illegal fireworks and Beach Access in RPV. Many visitors came out to enjoy the fun, games, and food.

During this last massive heat wave and winds, the maintenance crew sprang into action and removed broken branches and trees that were blocking public rights of way.

4th of July IMAC/TSC Information Booth: Public Works set up an information booth for the Infrastructure Management Advisory (IMAC) and Traffic Safety (TSC) Committees at the July 4th Celebration. Environmental information, such as stormwater pollution prevention, household hazardous waste, used oil recycling, and waste diversion were available and provided to visitors. Additionally, age appropriate quizzes related to the City’s infrastructure and traffic safety were provided with prizes given to participants. Public Works thanks Vice Chair Vanderlip, and Members Vargas, Ott and Liu for their time and assistance.





AB 939 Solid Waste Annual Report Preparation: Staff is working closely with the Los Angeles Regional Agency (LARA) on finalizing the draft for the annual AB 939, Solid Waste Diversion Report. The annual report, representing 18 member cities, is due to CalRecycle on August 1, 2018.

SEED Awards Seeking Applications: Staff is promoting the 2018 SEED awards, which targets South Bay groups, individuals and organizations promoting environmental excellence, sustainability and stewardship. The application deadline is July 31, 2018. Prior local Palos Verdes area SEED award winners include Terranea and PV Library District. Canceled IMAC Meetings: The Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee (IMAC) meetings of July 12, 2018 and August 9, 2018 have been canceled. The next regular scheduled meeting is set for Monday, September 17 at 6:00 P.M. in the Community Room at the Civic Center/City Hall. Meeting cancellation notices have been sent.

EDCO's Annual Invoices: EDCO mailed their July/Annual invoices last week. It includes a rate sheet for their services and available discounts, the quarterly Environmental Times promoting food waste diversion, recycling and reuse through donations, the Recyclers of Month drawing card, and an auto protection/public safety flier.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Nancy Road Residents Partake in the Coyote Wildlife Watch Program: Earlier this month, the City received a coyote-related pet attack report from residents on Nancy Road. The City's Code Enforcement Officers, who implement the City's Coyote Management Plan and Coyote Wildlife Watch Program, immediately responded and began discussions with the residents. As a result, a neighborhood field assessment occurred over two days on July 10th and 11th. In

addition to the City's Code Enforcement Officers, representatives from the Department of Agricultural Commissioner Weights & Measures and the Miraleste Parks District, met with 8 residents from the general area of Nancy Rd. to raise awareness on deterrent measures to keep coyotes out of their neighborhood and in the canyons. The residents were provided with the City's Coyote Management Plan, Keep Me Wild brochure, and Home & Yard Checklist for Wildlife (see attached handouts). The Code Enforcement Officers conducted yard audits with residents to identify potential coyote attractants, such as fallen fruit, overgrown brush, rear yard fencing, and coyote scat. Discussions also ensued with the Miraleste Parks District to abate dead, hazardous overgrown brush, and to coordinate weekly field assessments of the area surrounding the Miraleste Trail in search of potential coyote dens and other possible health/safety attractants (see attached map). The City learned through this neighborhood meeting how little the residents knew of the available City resources and information on coyotes, including the Coyote Management Plan which is available on the City's website. The City will continue to proactively meet with residents to raise awareness on this subject matter.

Planning Commission-Approved Grading Permit at Green Hills is Appealed: On June 26, 2018, the Planning Commission conducted an appeal hearing, filed by the Appellant Sharon Loveys, of the Director-approved Major Grading Permit allowing for 424yd³ of balanced grading to accommodate the installation of vaults associated with earth interments, 3' tall walls, and benches in the unimproved portion of Alta Vista Gardens (Area 2) at Green Hills Memorial Park. After considering all evidence introduced in the record, the Planning Commission denied the appeal thereby upholding the Director's decision. On July 10th, Sharon Loveys filed a timely appeal, requesting that the City Council overturn the Planning Commission's decision. The appeal letter, P.C. The appeal hearing is tentatively scheduled for the August 7, 2018 City Council meeting. A future public notice will be issued announcing the meeting date.

July 11th LAX Community Noise Roundtable Meeting: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is part of the LAX Community Noise Roundtable, which was created to mitigate adverse jet and turbo propeller noise impacts on cities by communicating citizen concerns to the Federal Aviation Administration (F.A.A.). Citizens are invited to attend the next Roundtable meeting on Wednesday, July 11, 2018. The meeting time and location has changed to 6:30 p.m. at the City of Culver City Transportation Department Training Room, 2nd floor at 4343 Duquesne Avenue (at the northwest corner of Duquesne Avenue and Jefferson Boulevard). Attached is the meeting agenda (see attachment).

Community Outreach Event on the Proposed Hydrogen Fuel Pump at the Shell Gas Station on Hawthorne Blvd.: On Monday July 9th, the Applicant (Air Products) in collaboration with the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development and California Energy Commission, held a community outreach event at Hesse Park to inform the community of their proposed project at the Shell gas station located at 28103 Hawthorne Blvd (see attached handouts including the PowerPoint presentation). The proposed project is a request to install a hydrogen fuel pump with above ground equipment at the rear of the property. The community outreach flyer was mailed to residents within 500' of the Shell station two weeks ago. Only 2 members of the public attended the meeting, who happen to live outside the 500' project radius and heard about the event from the City's post on Nextdoor. The Applicant is conducting public

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outreach prior to a formal public hearing to inform the community of the benefits and safety standards associated with hydrogen fuel. The proposed project will be considered by the Planning Commission at a future duly noticed public hearing.

29619 Western Avenue Undergoes a Facelift: The City is excited to report that the property owner of the shopping center located at 29619 Western Avenue, home of H. Salt Fish & Chips, Maria's Custom Draperies, Casual Cutters, and Total Fitness Chiropractic, recently submitted plans to remodel the existing building. According to the plans, the exterior will be upgraded with new paint, signs, and lighting. Additionally, one of the vacant units was recently leased to Harbor Property Management, who will be relocating this summer from San Pedro to its new home in our City. Another unit remains vacant, but the property owner is hopeful that the exterior renovations, in combination with the existing and new tenants, will result in a lease to a new commercial/retail tenant.

Residential Construction Commences at 48 Cinnamon Lane: In December 2017, planning entitlements were issued to Andrea Joannou based on the Council-approved Settlement Agreement and Exception Category U of RPVMC Section 15.20.040. On March 20, 2018, a building permit was issued allowing for the construction of a manufactured residence and detached garage on the vacant lot and construction commenced earlier this month.

Los Angeles Unified School District Increases School Fee: The Los Angeles Unified School District's (LAUSD) Board of Education recently approved a fee increase based on a School Fee Justification Study that allows the LAUSD to levy fees authorized by the State Allocation Board (SAB). The LAUSD has increased the school fees for residential construction from \$3.48 to \$3.79 per square foot, commercial/industrial construction from \$.056 to \$0.61 per square foot, self-storage structures from \$0.27 to \$0.28 per square foot, and parking structures from \$0.37 to \$0.39 per square foot. The new fees went into effect on July 9, 2018 and will only apply to those properties located off Western Avenue that are within the LAUSD boundary.

SolSmart Grant Opportunity: Earlier this year, Staff reported on the City's coordination with the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG) on the submittal of a grant application for the SolSmart program. SolSmart is a program through the U.S. Department of Energy that provides solar-technical support to local jurisdictions which seek to further implement solar strategies identified in their Emission Reduction Action Plans (ERAP) or Climate Action Plans (CAP). The grant provides a SolSmart Advisor to assist the City in no-cost, hands-on technical assistance in streamlining municipal processes to promote solar access and readiness, and communicate solar finance options for residential or commercial property owners. Last week, the City was notified that its joint-application was selected to participate in the SolSmart grant program. Staff will continue to report on the next steps in the grant process, as they become available, including any possible code amendments to codify a streamlined process.

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PVIC/Docents: The docents held an educational session on Tuesday. The Sunset Room and outdoor amphitheater is rented for a reception and ceremony on Friday and Saturday. On Sunday the Native Plant Garden at PVIC will host its monthly volunteer event.

Eastview Park: The 1st Annual Eastview 4th of July Dog Event was a huge success! 200-300 people came to the event. Sixteen local businesses volunteered their time and donated numerous giveaway items. Visitors enjoyed spending the 4th of July with their furry family members and donated about 100 lbs. of dog food and some dog toys to the local shelter. The City could not have done this event without the help of the volunteers!



Hesse Park: The facilities are rented this week for twelve indoor recreation classes, six non-profit group rentals, three Peninsula Seniors activities, one REACH meeting, three outdoor sports camps, and two private rentals.

Shakespeare by the Sea Wrap-up: Around 600 people attended the annual Shakespeare by the Sea performance of *The Merry Wives of Windsor*. The event was held on the upper field at Hesse Park last Sunday, July 8th. Many attendees enjoyed a picnic dinner and fun family games before the performance.



The Governor's office of Business and Economic Development, California Energy Commission and Air Products held a community outreach event at Hesse Park on July 9th, 2018 to provide information about the Shell station on Hawthorne, which was selected by the California Energy Commission to add hydrogen fueling infrastructure as part of the Alternative and Renewable Fuel Technology Program.

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Little Critter Afternoon Tales, a monthly enrichment program coordinated with the PV Library District, will be held on July 11th in McTaggart Hall at 1:30pm.

Ladera Linda Park: The facilities are rented this week for two recreation classes and two non-profit rentals.

Ryan Park: The facilities are rented this week for five indoor recreation classes, eight outdoor recreation classes and one private rental.

REACH: On Sunday, REACH attended the Shakespeare event at Hesse Park. There was also a week-long camp for developmentally disabled youth ages 5-12 at Ladera Linda.

Volunteer Program: Sixteen volunteers assisted staff with the City Hall 4th of July celebration and eight volunteers helped put on a fun dog parade at Eastview Park. Palos Verdes Nature Preserve June 2018 Activity Summary

Meetings:

- Monthly Preserve Management Meeting (June 7th): PVPLC staff; Recreation & Parks, Community Development and Public Works Staffs met to discuss maintenance and operational management projects and priorities. Volunteer Trail Watch Coordination Meeting (June 27th):

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- Volunteer Trail Watch leaders, City Staff and L. A. Co. Sheriff Deputies met to discuss public use and maintenance observations as well as to coordinate efforts.

Open Space Staff Activities:

Public Contacts: The Preserve and Recreation & Parks Staff operated an Information Booth at Burma Road on June 10th. The number of patrons visiting the booths totaled 149. Water bottles were given out to 15 thirsty people and 35 surveys were filled in by patrons. Open Space Staff encountered many people while conducting trail patrols in June –

- Public Contacts: **3,066** (hikers – 2,676; dog walkers -- 274; bike users – 109; equestrians -- 7)
- Public Use Issues: **235** (dogs off leash -- 35; people off trail – 146; smoking – 49; drone -- 5)
- Public Information: **73** (sharing Preserve/interpretive information – 48; recommending a route -- 25)
- Public Safety: **50** (patrons requesting directions – 48; patrons having health issues or given water --2).

Maintenance & Operations: Open Space Staff removed numerous bags of litter picked up while hiking 233.46 miles of trail. Their activities in June included –

- Abalone Cove Reserve – cleaned graffiti off sign at Inspiration Point, cleaned up excessive litter near the Sacred Cove View Trailhead, removed exposed cable lying across Chapel View Tr., covered 3 spots of graffiti on concrete blocks below lifeguard tower, assisted volunteer event in Abalone Cove Park, cut protruding rebar from beach, cleaned 3 spots of graffiti on Beach School Tr., closed 6 spur trails found along Sacred Cove View Tr. & one on Olmsted Tr., secured vandalized trail closures on Inspiration Point Loop & Sea Dahlia Trails and removed a large metallic bracket on a downed utility pole below the western lifeguard tower
- Filiorum Reserve – Open Space Management coordinated with resident trail expert Kurt Loheit and the Long Beach Conservation Corps on a volunteer project to repair Zotes Cutacross Tr. Under Mr. Loheit's training and leadership, LBCC dedicated 96 hours to repairing the trail for usability and safety. Thank you Kurt Loheit and the LBCC!



- Forrestal Reserve – covered trash can graffiti on Forrestal Dr. and removed protruding steel post & base from Pirate Tr.
- Ocean Trails Reserve – covered 5 spots of graffiti along Sagebrush Walk Tr., picked up litter at La Rotonda Dr. parking lot and towed into position to cut & remove a vandalized bench left at the edge of Coastal Switchback Trailhead

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- Portuguese Bend Reserve – painted over the graffiti on standpipe off Conqueror Tr., removed construction debris from Ishibashi Farm Tr., trimmed overgrowth along Peppertree Tr., dug up a protruding post in Vanderlip Tr., installed new signage on Burma Rd. gate, cut & removed fence gates discarded into the habitat adjacent to Burma Rd. at the Rolling Hills border, cleaned graffiti off Preserve Rules sign at Ishibashi Farm Trailhead, cleaned graffiti from inside portable toilet on Burma Rd., delivered rocks to Klondike Canyon / Conqueror Trails junction while gluing them together to complete the repair of the vandalized delineation, grinded graffiti from a rock in Vanderlip Tr., removed discarded pipes along Ishibashi Farm Tr., restored the downed segments of the stake & rope fence along the Eagle’s Nest restoration area and cleaned graffiti from traffic barrels at Toyon Trailhead
- San Ramon Reserve – picked up lots of reported litter from the PV Dr. East turnouts and picked up lots of trash from the Marymount Trailhead
- Vicente Bluffs Reserve -- retrieved a downed metallic fence rail tossed into the habitat along Seascape Tr., dug up & cut discarded steel cable and retrieved a piece of pipe left over the bluff fence on the north end of Seascape Tr., picked up reported litter over the bluff fence at the south end of Seascape Tr. while trimming overgrown vegetation encroaching onto a bench at the northern end of the trail, sprayed over trash can graffiti at the Terrace Trailhead, led a Pelican Cove beach volunteer clean-up, painted over graffiti in the portable toilet near the parking lot, assisted Deputies in removing camp junk from the beach below Vicente Bluffs and cleaned up lots of reported litter in the parking lot area
- Vista del Norte Reserve -- picked up trash including a pallet left at the top of Vista del Norte Tr.



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
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Preserve/Open Space Management cooperates closely with the Public Works Department to discover, submit and complete work orders to repair problems and improve conditions in the Preserve. In June, Public Works responded to 7 service requests for replacing a vandalized restroom mirror at Pelican Cove, replacing a broken sprinkler valve box lid near the restrooms at Pelican Cove, repairing a downed wooden fence railing along Terrace Trail, stocking supplies of Walk Your Bike Zone and Trail Ends Here signs, repairing the unstable step on the staircase to the beach from the western lifeguard tower at Abalone Cove and servicing the portable toilets at Abalone Cove.


The City's graffiti contractor responded to 4 incidents of tagging that was reported by Open Space Management. Thank you Public Works and thank you to the Land Conservancy's Volunteer Trail Watch for being our eyes in the Preserve to help report maintenance issues.

Preserve Public Use:

Trail Counter Data - Portuguese Bend Reserve: June 1st through June 30, 2018, there were **8,534** hikers & mountain bikers that entered through the Burma Road gate. The following graph shows a weekly patron-entry count at the Burma Road gate for this period with purple representing hikers and pink for mountain bikers.



Trail Counter Data - Filiorum Reserve: The next graph shows June 2018 patron weekly entries for Rattlesnake Trail. Blue bars represent hikers and purple is for mountain bikers. There were **3,042** total patron entries via the Rattlesnake Trailhead in June.

Wild animals are in trouble, and the problem is people who are careless with food and garbage.

Coyotes play an important role in the ecosystem, helping to keep rodent populations under control. They are by nature fearful of humans.

If coyotes are given access to human food and garbage, their behavior changes. They lose caution and fear. They may cause property damage. They might threaten human safety. They might be killed.

Relocating a problem coyote is not an option because it only moves the problem to someone else's neighborhood.

Help prevent deadly conflicts for these beautiful wild animals.

"Coyote country" precautions

- Never feed or attempt to tame coyotes. The result may be deadly conflicts with pets or livestock, or serious injuries to small children.
- Do not leave small children or pets outside unattended.
- Install motion-sensitive lighting around the house.
- Trim ground-level shrubbery to reduce hiding places.
- Be aware that coyotes are more active in the spring, when feeding and protecting their young.
- If followed by a coyote, make loud noises. If this fails, throw rocks in the animal's direction.
- If a coyote attacks a person, immediately contact the nearest Department of Fish and Game or law enforcement office. After normal business hours, call 911.

Stash Your Food and Trash

Coyote-Proof Containers

Use garbage cans that have a locking mechanism on the lid. Use a rope or elastic cord to secure the can to a fence or other solid object so that it cannot be tipped over.



New Laws

Feeding coyotes is illegal in some communities. Many local ordinances make wildlife feeding punishable by fines and require that wildlife-proof garbage containers be installed.

Stash Your Food and Trash

Allowing coyotes access to human food and garbage is reckless and deadly.

Coyotes primarily hunt rodents and rabbits for food, but will take advantage of whatever is available, including garbage, pet food, and domestic animals.

- Put garbage in tightly closed containers that cannot be tipped over.
- Remove sources of water, especially in dry climates.
- Bring pets in at night, and do not leave pet food outside.
- Put away bird feeders at night to avoid attracting rodents and other coyote prey.
- Provide secure enclosures for rabbits, poultry, etc.
- Pick up fallen fruit and cover compost piles.
- Ask your neighbors to follow these tips.





HOME & YARD CHECKLIST FOR WILDLIFE

Complete the checklist to identify areas on your property that may need improvements to reduce wildlife, such as coyotes, opossums, skunks, raccoons, etc. on your property and in your neighborhood; improve any condition for which you check the box. Eliminate attractants on your property in order to minimize conflicts with wildlife. Share this information with your friends and neighbors because minimizing conflicts is most effective when the entire neighborhood works together.

Hydrogen Fuel Coming to Local Gas Station



The existing Shell branded retail gasoline station located at 28103 Hawthorne Boulevard was selected by the California Energy Commission to add hydrogen fueling infrastructure as part of the Alternative and Renewable Fuel Technology Program. This creates a tremendous opportunity for citizens in Rancho Palos Verdes to operate hydrogen fuel cell powered vehicles, which are classified as zero emission vehicles (ZEVs). Many car manufacturers are developing or producing hydrogen fuel cell powered ZEVs for the California market (Toyota, Honda, Hyundai, General Motors, Nissan, and Mercedes-Benz), with the Toyota Mirai reportedly leading in sales (3,500 units sold as of June 1, 2018).

Hydrogen fuel cell powered vehicles are electric vehicles, which generate and store electrical energy via hydrogen instead of a battery. Fueling with a vehicle with hydrogen is fast and provides superior range. Both characteristics are like the experience most drivers are accustomed to with gasoline. The only tailpipe

emission generated by a hydrogen fuel cell vehicle is a mist of water. When hydrogen gas is sourced in a renewable manner, hydrogen fuel cell powered cars can operate as a fully renewable means of passenger transportation.

The introduction of hydrogen fuel at this Rancho Palos Verdes location will add to the growing network of hydrogen fueling stations being placed throughout California. The fueling infrastructure and fueling is expected to be available in 2019. Currently there are over 25 fueling stations of the same general design already operating and fueling vehicles today in California.

The Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development, California Energy Commission and Air Products will be holding a community outreach event to provide information about the station.




Hydrogen Station Development

Gaseous hydrogen

Hydrogen is a colorless, odorless, tasteless, highly flammable gas. It is also the lightest-weight gas. Since hydrogen is noncorrosive, special materials of construction are not normally required. Vessels and piping must be selected and designed to withstand the pressure and temperatures involved and comply with applicable codes and regulations.

Table 1 shows physical properties of gaseous hydrogen. As indicated by the specific gravity, hydrogen gas is much less dense than air and can disperse rapidly or accumulate in the upper sections of enclosed spaces.

Flammability

The wide flammability range, 4% to 75% in air, and the small amount of energy required for ignition necessitate special handling to prevent the inadvertent mixing of hydrogen with air. Sources of ignition, such as sparks from electrical equipment, static electricity, open flames, or extremely hot objects, should be eliminated.

Hydrogen and air mixtures within the flammable range can explode and may burn with an almost invisible flame.

Manufacture

Hydrogen is produced primarily by the steam reforming of natural gas.

The steam reforming process produces syngas, which is a mixture of hydrogen and carbon monoxide. The product stream is separated into its components, and the hydrogen is dried, purified, and compressed into cylinders, pipelines, or tubes for transportation.

Uses

Hydrogen is used in manufacturing processes for producing petroleum, steel, chemicals, foods and electronics. Refineries use hydrogen to produce cleaner burning gasoline and low sulfur diesel fuel, helping to reduce air pollution.

In the metallurgical industry, hydrogen is used to reduce metal oxides and prevent oxidation when heat-treating certain metals and alloys. It is also used as a fuel in alternative energy vehicles and may be used when welding and cutting metals. Hydrogen is also used by semiconductor manufacturers, primarily to form reducing atmospheres, and it is used in the chemical industry to synthesize ammonia and methanol.

Health

Hydrogen gas is odorless and nontoxic but may induce suffocation by diluting the concentration of oxygen in air below levels necessary to support life.

The amount of hydrogen gas necessary to produce oxygen-deficient atmospheres is well within the flammable range, making fire and explosion the primary hazards associated with hydrogen and air atmospheres.

Containers

Gaseous hydrogen may be supplied in cylinders or in tubes that are designed and manufactured according to applicable codes and specifications for the pressures and temperatures involved. The pressure rating and internal volume of a container determines the quantity of hydrogen it can hold. Cylinders may be used individually or can be manifolded together to allow for a larger gas storage volume.

Tubes are mounted on truck-trailer chassis or in ISO frames for transportation and are referred to as tube trailers or tube modules, respectively. Stationary tube (also called hydril tube) modules store large quantities of hydrogen at customer locations.

A bulk gaseous hydrogen customer storage system commonly consists of 3 to 18 tubes with total capacities up to 150,000 standard cubic feet (>4,250 m³) of hydrogen. Stationary storage tubes have individual valves and safety devices and are manifolded together so the customer can withdraw product from a single tube or multiple tubes. Customer storage systems are commonly filled to 2,400 psig (165 bar).

Portable and stationary gaseous hydrogen fueling systems with service pressures up to 7,500 psig (500 bar) are also in use.

Specifications

In the United States, cylinders and mobile tubes are manufactured according to Department of Transportation (DOT)-3A or DOT-3AA specifications. Cylinders and mobile tubes are hydrostatically tested upon manufacture and tested periodically thereafter at 5/3 times the service pressure as specified by DOT regulations. Hydrogen may be stored in ASME coded and stamped, National Board registered high-pressure gas storage tubes as part of a stationary installation. These tubes are hydrostatically tested by the manufacturer but, unlike cylinders and mobile tubes, they do not require periodic hydrostatic testing.

Valves

Brass pressure seal or o-ring seal valves are typically used on cylinders and tube trailers. The standard hydrogen cylinder valve outlet connection in North America is the CGA 350 for pressures up to 3,000 psig. Different connections are used for hydrogen in other locations based on national or regional standards. Further information on valves and valve outlet connections is provided in Air Products' Safetygram 23, "Cylinder Valves," and Safetygram 31, "Cylinder Valve Outlet Connections."

Pressure relief devices

Pressure Relief Devices (PRDs) are employed to reduce the likelihood of container failure in fire situations. These devices take the form of frangible disks, fusible metal plugs or pressure relief valves.

In North America and Asia, pressure relief devices are commonly integral parts of the cylinder valves and are installed on both ends of portable and stationary tubes. In Europe, PRDs are not commonly used on gaseous hydrogen cylinders or on portable or stationary bulk containers.

For further information on PRDs, consult Safetygram 15, "Cylinder Pressure-Relief Devices."

Shipment: hydrogen

Compliance with applicable Dangerous Goods regulations is required for all shipments by motor freight, rail, air and water. These regulations describe the marking, labeling, placarding, and shipping papers required. International shipments by air must comply with International Air Transport Association/International Civil Air Organization (IATA/ICAO) Dangerous Goods regulations. Final acceptance for air transport is at the discretion of the airline. International shipments by water must comply with International Maritime Organization (IMO) regulations.

Safety considerations

The hazards associated with handling gaseous hydrogen are fire, explosion, and pressure. Although hydrogen tends to dissipate quickly, its minimum ignition energy is extremely low, allowing relatively easy ignition of hydrogen mixtures in the flammable range. Hydrogen is easily ignited by open flames, electrical sparks and static electricity. Hydrogen may detonate and ignite when rapidly vented into the air. Hydrogen burns with an almost invisible flame, and severe burns may result from unknowingly walking into a hydrogen fire. The fire and explosion hazards can be controlled by appropriate design and operating procedures. Preventing the formation of combustible fuel-oxidant mixtures and removing potential sources of ignition (electric spark, static electricity, open flames, etc.) in areas where the hydrogen will be used are essential. Adequate ventilation will help reduce the possible formation of flammable mixtures in the event of a hydrogen leak.

Hydrogen's autoignition temperature (AIT) is 1040°F (560°C). The AIT is the minimum temperature required to initiate self-sustained combustion. The relatively high autoignition temperature makes ignition of a hydrogen/air mixture unlikely from heat alone without an additional ignition source.

Purging

To prevent the formation of flammable mixtures, gaseous hydrogen systems must be purged of hydrogen before opening the system to the atmosphere, and purged of air, oxygen, or other oxidizers prior to admitting hydrogen to the systems. If the piping systems are extensive or complicated, multiple purging and evacuation cycles may be required for optimum results. Purging can be done using system evacuation, inert gas pressuring-depressuring cycles (cycle purging), flowing inert gas through the equipment or combinations of these methods. System configuration considerations, including total volume, inclusion of piping "dead ends," and availability of evacuation capability, should all be taken into account when selecting the purging methods to be used.

Before opening a hydrogen-filled system to the air, the hydrogen concentration should be reduced to well below the lower flammable concentration (4%). The hydrogen concentration should be reduced to well less than 25% of the lower flammable concentration (below 1% actual).

Before introducing hydrogen into systems that were open to air, the oxygen concentration in the system should be reduced to less than 1% (well below the minimum oxygen concentration needed for hydrogen ignition). Additional purging will often be needed to meet higher-purity application requirements.

Cylinder handling and use

Compressed gas cylinders must be stored properly, handled correctly, and used with the appropriate equipment to reduce the risk of incidents and injuries. Safetygram 10, "Storage, Handling and Use of Compressed Gas Cylinders," describes good practices. CGA's publication P-1, "Safe Handling of Compressed Gases in Cylinders," also provides safe handling guidance.

Be aware that refilling and shipping a compressed gas cylinder without consent of the owner is not allowed.

Gaseous hydrogen siting recommendations

General

- Air Products can provide site-specific location recommendations for bulk gaseous hydrogen installations.
- The system should be located so it is readily accessible to delivery equipment and to authorized personnel.
- It is preferable to locate all bulk gaseous hydrogen systems outdoors. Total storage capacity of an indoor hydrogen system should be limited as much as possible and should not exceed 3,000 ft³ (85 m³) of hydrogen without additional engineering safety analysis.
- Systems must be located above ground.
- Systems should not be located beneath electric power lines.
- Systems should not be located close to flammable liquid or other flammable gas piping.
- It is advisable to locate the system on ground higher than flammable liquid storage or liquid oxygen storage. Where it is necessary to locate the system on ground that is lower than adjacent flammable liquid storage or liquid oxygen storage, suitable protective means (such as diking, diversion curbs, or grading) should be employed. For hydrogen storage requirements, see the latest edition of NFPA 55 "Compressed Gases and Cryogenic Fluids Code"* or equivalent local codes.

- Electrical equipment within 15 feet (4 meters) shall be in accordance with Article 501 of the National Electrical Code for Class 1, Division 2, Group B locations or in compliance with alternate codes where used.
- Gaseous hydrogen storage vessels and associated piping must be electrically bonded and grounded.
- If protective walls or roofs are provided, they should be constructed of noncombustible materials. If the enclosing sides adjoin each other, the area should be properly vented.
- The area within 15 feet (4 meters) of any hydrogen container should be kept free of dry vegetation and combustible material.
- Adequate lighting shall be provided for nighttime transfer operations where appropriate.
- The hydrogen storage location should be permanently placarded: "Hydrogen – Flammable Gas – No Smoking – No Open Flames," or equivalent.

Indoor storage systems

- Provide adequate ventilation, particularly near roof areas where hydrogen might collect. Forced ventilation may be necessary in some applications.
- All vents should be piped to the exterior of the building and must be installed in accordance with local regulations.
- The atmosphere in areas where hydrogen gas may collect should be monitored with portable or continuous flammable gas air monitors calibrated for hydrogen.
- Where large quantities of hydrogen can be released indoors, provide an explosion-venting surface or vents, taking care to vent a pressure wave to areas where people or other equipment will not become involved. Explosion vents may not be required where small quantities of hydrogen are involved.
- Electrical equipment must conform to electrical codes in any area classified as hazardous (where elevated hydrogen gas concentrations can exist).
- Building materials should be noncombustible.
- Hydrogen storage inside a building should not be near oxidants or other combustible materials storage.

Personal protective equipment

Flame retardant protective clothing should be worn where possibility of fire exists. Safety glasses, safety shoes, and sturdy work gloves should be worn when handling cylinders.

Emergency response

Only trained and qualified emergency personnel should respond to emergencies. For emergencies, a fire-resistant suit and gloves should be worn. Supplied air respirators or self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) is also recommended to reduce possible fire or heat injury to the face and airway. Responders must NOT enter or work in areas with hydrogen concentrations in the flammable range or where flammable/explosive atmospheres may be formed.

Firefighting

Hydrogen is easily ignited by open flames, electrical sparks, and static electricity. Hydrogen may detonate and ignite when rapidly vented into the air. It will burn with an almost invisible flame. Most hydrogen fires have the flame characteristic of a torch or jet and originate at the point where the hydrogen is discharging. If a leak is suspected in any part of a system, a hydrogen flame can be detected by cautiously approaching with an outstretched broom, lifting it up and down.

The most effective way to fight a hydrogen fire is to shut off the flow of gas. If the fire is extinguished without stopping the flow of gas, an explosive mixture may form, creating a more serious hazard than the fire itself should reignition occur.

The usual firefighting practice is to prevent the fire from spreading and let it burn until the hydrogen is consumed or can be closed off. An adequate water supply should be available to keep surrounding equipment cool in the event of a hydrogen fire. The local fire department should be advised of the nature of the products handled and made aware of the appropriate methods for combating hydrogen fires.
