The City Council's selection of Ara to lead our organization is a testament to his long service to the City, its residents and his coworkers.


Ara is out of the office for the rest of this week at (appropriately) a city manager's conference in Northern California, but please reach out to congratulate him next week!

SB 50 Update: On January 30, Senator Scott Wiener's housing bill, Senate Bill No. 50, was defeated in the State Senate, falling short of the 21 votes needed to advance to the State Assembly (see attachments). The bill aimed to boost the state's housing supply with dense, tall, multi-family projects in "job-rich" and "transit-rich" areas, Senator Ben Allen was among the "no" votes last week. Rancho Palos Verdes was one of many cities across the state that expressed opposition to the legislation. The City raised concerns with the bill's problematic provisions concerning density and building height, its reliance on proximity to bus routes, its lack of affordability requirements, and lack of clarity over provisions regarding Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zones.

It should be noted that Senator Wiener still has time to introduce another version of the legislation by the February 21 deadline for bills to be introduced in the remainder of the session. In a statement following the vote, Senator Wiener said he remains "fully committed to advancing a strong housing production bill this year. Stay tuned."

Staff will continue monitoring this legislation.

Update on 2019 Novel Coronavirus: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is receiving regular updates from the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health regarding the circumstances around the 2019 Novel Coronavirus. The City has a [website spotlight](#) for the latest information along with reminders for good public health hygiene, and has shared this information to residents through Nextdoor.

As of February 5, there are a total of eleven confirmed cases across the US and only one confirmed case of the coronavirus in Los Angeles County. The individual is a non-resident who presented themselves at the Los Angeles International Airport upon arrival from Wuhan City, China, was screened, isolated and taken to a hospital for medical treatment. There is no immediate threat to the general public and no special precautions are required. Residents, workers, and visitors are encouraged to engage in regular activities, not excluding anyone based on race, country of origin, or recent travel, and to practice good public health hygiene, especially as it is the height of the flu season. Ring Security Camera Incentive Program and Live Event: The City has scheduled a fourth and final opportunity for RPV residents to purchase Ring security devices at a promotional discount. The City is partnering with Ring and providing a total discount of \$100 on select Ring devices for first-time buyers. A live event will kick off the incentive program, and the date is set for Saturday, February 22 from 12:30 PM to 3:30 PM at Fred Hesse, Jr. Community Park. The event will allow residents to see Ring devices that are available for question with Ring staff present for questions and answers. South Bay High-Speed Internet Ring Project: The Public Works Department has received an encroachment permit application to connect City Hall to the planned South Bay high-speed Internet ring (not to be confused with Ring security devices discussed above). A high speed capacity broadband network will allow the South Bay cities to embrace the digital economy, smart city initiatives, integrated utilities and next-generation economic development. Construction is set to start sometime this spring and, according to SBCCOG, if everything goes according to the planned schedule, the ring should be completed by the end of June. When the project is completed and the contract signed, RPV City Hall will be connected to an ultra-fast Internet circuit and be able to utilize a 1Gb/s speed for a below-market price of \$1,000/month. The fiber ring construction costs of \$4.4 million are fully covered by Measure M funds approved in late 2019.

March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary Election – How and Where to Vote:

Voting by Mail in Los Angeles County

All registered voters in Los Angeles County have the option to vote by mail. Vote by Mail (VBM) ballots for the March 3, 2020 election can be requested and are being mailed now. If your ballot is postmarked by Election Day and received within three (3) days by our Department we will process, verify and count that ballot (California Senate Bill 29).

How to Return your Ballot

Voters have several options on how to return their ballot:

- By mail, remember no postage is necessary
- In person at any Vote by Mail drop box location
- At any Vote Center in L.A. County

You can click on the red pins and zoom in/out by scrolling for greater/lesser detail. If you type a street address in the “Search” field, a drop down menu will appear which allows you to select a preference. Click on your preferred selection, and the next screen will display the 3 closest sites in text above the map and in visual form (green pins) in the map itself.

There will be over 200 VBM drop off sites throughout the County. In addition, voters will now have access to 24-Hour Drop Boxes at participating locations across the County. These drop off sites are in addition to the vote centers.

Vote Centers in L.A. County

Voters in Los Angeles County will now have 11 consecutive days to vote in-person at any Vote Center countywide. It should be noted that some centers open for 11 days while others for 4 days before Election Day. Vote Centers for the March 3, 2020, election will be open from February 22, 2020 to March 3, 2020.

The Los Angeles County Registrar Recorder/County Clerk (RRCC) will be mailing a booklet to all USPS residential patrons in the County (separate from the Official Sample Ballot) that will contain all vote center locations. Additionally, the RRCC is mailing a 1 pager to all registered voters with VSAP information and a voter’s nearest vote center locations. The booklet and flyer will be out around St. Valentine’s Day.

PUBLIC WORKS

Rifle Range Interpretive Panel (at PVIC): Illegible no more! The Rifle Range Interpretive Panel on the Interpretive Center Trail at PVIC has been replaced. The new panel will allow hikers to read and learn about the area's history of when the U.S. Army used the 26-acre site as a rifle range for target practice, known as "Nike Site LA-55-Point Vicente Rifle Range" from the 1950s until 1974.

Construction Bid Openings: Public Works attended a workshop in San Pedro on Tuesday February 4, 2020 for the Metro NextGen Bus Plan. Metro is modifying its bus system in accordance with its vision 2028 goal of achieving a fast, frequent, reliable and accessible service for its customers. To that end, Rancho Palos Verdes has a line that may be modified from its current service route, truncating service at Hawthorne and Silver Spur. Staff asked Metro Planner Scott Green if this change was “chiseled in stone”. Mr. Green replied “if the Palos Verdes Transit Authority cannot manage filling in the area that is being considered for deletion with its service, it is likely that Metro would not abandon the route entirely.” A summary of the presentation that was provided is attached, and several workshops are planned through April of this year. If you are curious about this process, more information is available at metro.net/nextgen.

Sign Replacement Project: A project to replace many of the advisory and warning signs in the City is underway. The City’s contractor, Hardy and Harper, is in the process of removing and replacing 495 signs and up to 193 sign posts. The project started on January 3, 2020 and currently approximately 400 signs and 50 posts have been replaced. The project is approximately 60% complete with 100% completion of the installation and inspection of all signs associated with this project anticipated in the spring.



Roadway Work on Residential Streets Continues: Some of the roadways in areas 3 & 4 of the City are having a surface treatment called “Slurry Seal” applied this month. The process includes two asphalt based coats of material which are applied to the roadways on different dates. If your street is among the highlighted on the attached maps you can expect to be notified of the date the surface treatment will be applied.

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South Bay Cities Council of Governments Transportation Committee Meeting: The February SBCCOG Transportation committee meeting will be held at the Redondo Beach Main Library, on Monday, February 10, 2020, at 10:30 am. Public Works staff will be attending this meeting. This committee meets once a month to discuss South Bay Transportation projects and their funding. At the February meeting, the committee will be discussing SBCCOG Transportation update covering January 2020, Transportation Working Group updates, Annual Performance Evaluation Report, Evaluation criteria, matching share formula for Measure R SBHP and Measure M MSP fund, Metro Next Gen Transit Study update, and three-month look ahead for Measure R / Measure M Highway Programs.

Western Avenue Congestion Improvement Project is an active project funded by Measure R SBHP fund which is coordinated by SBCCOG. This project is at the planning phase, and there is \$90,000 Measure R funding allocated for this phase of the project. The total funds requested to complete the project is \$3,330,000.

Storm Water Quality News: The City's storm water quality consultant has provided an updated short newsletter to update the City on relevant storm water regulatory issues. (See attached)

Maintenance Activities: This week Public Works (PW) maintenance continues its regularly scheduled maintenance in City parks, medians, and beaches. PW continues to trim medians and right-of-way along Palos Verdes Drive South (PVDS).

In the parks, PW completed trimming of large trees along the Hesse Park entrance. Irrigation technicians inspected controllers and made several sprinkler repairs at Point Vicente Interpretive Center (PVIC), PVDS median, Ladera Linda, Eastview, and Calle Entradero trailhead.

In the right of way, PW repaired and replaced several damaged signs on Hawthorne Blvd., Oceanaire Dr., Seacrest Dr., Via Bramante, Via Lorenzo, Homeworth Dr., and Palos Verdes Drive East. PW also made repairs to sidewalk deviations by grinding or ramping areas on Crownview Dr. and Homeworth Dr.

Lastly, the PW Department continues to respond to emergency calls during regular business hours and after hours. PW responded to several tree-related emergencies during high wind conditions this past week. PW cleared trees and branches from the following neighborhood streets of Whitestone Rd., Crest Rd., Bandra Pl., and Crenshaw Blvd.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) Appeals Workshop: On February 2, 2020, the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) hosted a workshop to discuss the RHNA appeals process. The workshop provided an overview of the draft appeal process and

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outlined the factors that will be considered as the bases of an appeal, which include local planning factors such as, but not limited to, lack of sewer services and the protection of land for open spaces purposes. The draft appeal process will be presented to the SCAG RHNA subcommittee for review and approval. The appeal process is tentatively set to begin in early April. Cal Water Compliance Review: On January 28, 2020, the Planning Commission conducted a compliance review of Conditional Use Permit No. 172 for the Cal Water property located at 5837 Crest Road. The purpose of the compliance review was to ensure the effectiveness of modified Conditions of Approval, which were amended on February 26, 2019 as part of the Planning Commission's first annual compliance review. The Planning Commission also adopted P.C. Resolution No. 2020-01, which modified additional Conditions of Approval related to an updated reservoir lawn plan; a modified annual trimming plan; and to allow the Director of Community Development to require subsequent compliance reviews on an as-needed basis. The Planning Commission's action includes a 15-day appeal period, which will end at 5:30pm on Wednesday February 12th.

Peafowl Program Update: The City's Peafowl Program is now closed for the season. According to the City's trapper, a total of 63 Peafowls were trapped and relocated for the 2019 trapping period. The birds were trapped in the following neighborhoods:

- Vista Grande- 34
- Sunnyside Ridge/Palos Verdes Drive East- 16
- Crestridge- 9
- Portuguese Bend- 1
- Monaco- 3

A peafowl population census will be conducted in the coming weeks, and Staff will report the findings to the City Council at an upcoming meeting to determine whether trapping should resume for 2020.

2020 US Census Roundtable Discussion: On February 3, 2020, the Acting City Manager and Staff attended a meeting organized by Congressman Ted Lieu to participate in discussions related to the 2020 Census (see photograph below). The session provided an update on the 2020 Census and further clarification on, among other things, data protection, the questionnaire, the Census timeline, and the impacts of each count. As the outcome of the Census will determine the allocation of federal funds and congressional representation, representatives in the meeting stressed the importance of ensuring achieving a complete and accurate count. It should be noted that each count affects the allocation of approximately \$2,000 per year in federal funds for the next 10 years. Considering the long-term effects of each count, participation in the 2020 Census is highly encouraged. Planning Division Monthly Activity Report: Attached is the Planning Division's Monthly Activity Report for January 2020. As indicated in the report, the Division received 40 new applications and rendered decisions on 24 applications for the month of January 2020.

Building and Safety Division Monthly Activity: Attached is the Building and Safety Division's Monthly Activity Report for January 2020 reporting on: 1) A summary of the new cases received broken down by application type; 2) The number of permits issued; 3) The amount of fees collected; 4) The number of inspections performed and; 5) The number of new plan checks submitted. As indicated in the report, the Division issued 165 permits and performed a total of 547 inspections for the month of January 2020.

View Restoration Division Monthly Activity: Attached is the View Restoration Division's Monthly Activity Report for January 2020 and year-to-date information on: 1) New view cases; 2) Pre-application meetings; and 3) Cases resolved by mediation. The Division received 9 new cases in the month of January 2020.

Code Enforcement Division Monthly Activity: Attached is the Code Enforcement Division's Monthly Activity Report for January 2020 reporting on: 1) Violations by category 2) Number of closed cases by violation with median processing times; and 3) Illegal sign abatement. As indicated in the report, the Division conducted 60 field inspections and brought 30 cases to closure for the Month of January 2020.

RECREATION & PARKS

Announcement of New Promoted Staff Member: The Recreation and Parks Department is excited to announce we have hired our fourth ranger: Taylor Fox. The City's new ranger program, approved by City Council in June 2019, is now fully staffed. All four rangers have PC 832 certifications, which covers citations, public safety, and law enforcement training. Rangers come from various enforcement and land management backgrounds and are undergoing additional training in tactical communication, de-escalation techniques, interpretation, and land management policies. They are currently shadowing existing Preserve Deputies and Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority Rangers.



Taylor Fox has been with the City of RPV since 2017 as a Recreation Specialist overseeing Abalone Cove and working with Open Space Management. He has been a vital staff member overseeing other staff and a variety of projects, enforcing Preserve rules, coordinating with LA County Lifeguards, and protecting the natural resources in the City's Nature Preserve.

Eastview Park: Dogs and their families are invited to the Smoochy Poochy Party on Saturday, February 8 from 1-3 p.m. Local pet businesses and non-profits will be giving away samples of products. Services to be provided are free micro-chipping, activities, photo booths, and activities and games for children.

Hesse Park: The facilities are rented this week for fifteen indoor recreation classes, seven non-profit group rentals, four Peninsula Seniors activities, one city meeting, and one private rental. On Wednesday, February 12th, Hesse Park will host the monthly Little Critter Afternoon Tales in McTaggart Hall from 1:30pm-2:30pm. The event is co-sponsored by the Palos Verdes Library District and is free to the public.



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Ladera Linda Park: The facilities are rented this week for one indoor recreation class, one contract class, and one non-profit rental. Flutterby Story Time was held on Tuesday, January 28, from 11 a.m.-12 p.m. It was the first Flutterby Story Time of the new year, and participants were excited for story time and visiting the Butterfly Garden.

Ryan Park: The facility is rented for nine indoor recreation classes. Progress continued to be made on the mural. Dana Torrey, Recreation Leader at Ryan Park, will be teaching an art class to children on Saturday, February 8.

PALOS VERDES NATURE PRESERVE JANUARY 2020 ACTIVITY SUMMARY:

Meetings:

- Monthly Preserve Management Meeting (Jan. 9th): PVPLC staff; Recreation & Parks, Community Development and Public Works Staffs met to discuss maintenance and operational management projects and priorities.
- Volunteer Trail Watch Coordination Meeting (Jan. 22nd): Volunteer Trail Watch leaders and City Staff met to discuss public use and maintenance observations as well as to coordinate efforts.

Preserve/Open Space Staff Activities:

Public Contacts: The Preserve & Abalone Cove Park Staffs assisted by other Recreation & Park Staff set up an information booth at Del Cerro Park on January 1st. The booth had 1,912 visitors with 128 patrons filling out surveys. Staff encountered many people while conducting trail patrols in January –

- Public Contacts: **4,242** (hikers – 3,762; dog walkers -- 370; bike users – 105; equestrians - 5)
- Public Use Issues: **189** (dog issues including off leash -- 37; people off trail – 138; drone use – 4; smoking – 1; other --9)
- Sharing Preserve/Interpretive Information: **103**
- Public Safety: **4** (patrons having health problems – 1; patrons given drinking water – 3).

Maintenance & Operations: The Preserve & Abalone Cove Park Staffs filled up many bags of litter picked up while hiking **201** miles of trail in January. Other activities included –

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- Abalone Cove Park – cleaned graffiti from the back of a Gorge-1 sign and cleaned graffiti from #8 picnic table & from a bench near the parking lot
- Abalone Cove Reserve – fastened brush to the top of Cave Tr. to reinforce the closure, filled in key areas of the rut on Portuguese Pt. Loop Tr. making it safer for vehicles, cleaned 2 graffiti spots & 1 sign sticker from Chapel View Tr. and installed 14 *No Access* signs on the bluff top fence on Portuguese Pt. Loop Tr.
- Alta Vicente Reserve – removed a truckload of palm fronds from N. Spur Tr., picked up lots of trash exposed by the acacia removal at North Spur Tr. while removing a concrete base for an unneeded trail marker there and removed the yucca piles near the City Hall parking lot
- Aqua Armaga Reserve -- picked up trash reported to be by the monument sign at the Posey Way entry while removing discarded roof tiles left there
- Filiorum Reserve – covered a spur trail off of lower Gary's Gulch Tr., applied gel to cover carvings on the trees along Eucalyptus Tr. while also removing a picture frame left there, unplugged the drainpipe at the Gary's Gulch Tr. creek and trimmed overhanging vegetation blocking a sign along Zote's Cutacross Tr.
- Forrestal Reserve – painted over graffiti on a step at the Cristo que Viento Trailhead
- Ocean Trails Reserve -- installed warning delineators around a big hole in Sagebrush Walk Tr. while cleaning 5 graffiti spots along the fence there and retrieved a trash can lid left on the beach below Southshore Coastal Tr.
- Parks, Beaches & Open Space – filled in two large holes in the access path from PV Dr. South to the Peppertree Trailhead and delivered & retrieved equipment loaned to Hesse Park
- Portuguese Bend Reserve – filled in erosion holes near the Klondike Canyon Trailhead, lifted the temporary mud closure on Peppertree Tr., finished installing the stake & rope fence near the Burma Rd. gate, trimmed the peppertree hedge near Burma Rd. gate & hauled away the limbs, trimmed the avocado tree blocking views of the monument sign at the Burma Rd. Trailhead, removed the large piles of yucca tree trimmings at the Burma Rd. gate, picked up trash exposed from the acacia trimming along upper Burma Rd., painted over graffiti on the black drain pipe along the middle section of Peppertree Tr., filled in a 2x2' hole at the Burma Rd. & Water Tank Tr. junction and sanded down tree carvings along Kelvin Canyon Tr.
- San Ramon Reserve -- cleaned the area around the middle turnout along PV Dr. East of reported trash & broken glass while painting over guardrail graffiti there twice and removed anti-freeze containers that spilled onto the middle turnout along PV Dr. East while properly disposing of it at a San Pedro recycle center
- Vicente Bluffs Reserve -- painted over graffiti on the road guardrail west of the Pelican Cove restrooms
- Vista del Norte Reserve -- picked up trash at the Vista del Norte upper Trailhead.

Open Space Management regularly checks on closures of the Preserve Trails resulting from storm damage. The lower portion of Rim Tr. is currently closed in the Portuguese Bend Reserve. In the Abalone Cove Reserve, the following trails are close: Sea Dahlia, Cave and Sacred Cove View (west).

Preserve/Open Space Management cooperates closely with the Public Works Department to discover, submit and complete work orders to repair problems and improve conditions in the Preserve. In January, there was 1 service request submitted to Public Works Department to replace a broken lock on the portable toilet on Olmsted Tr. In January, the City's graffiti contractor responded to 1 incident of tagging that was reported by Open Space Management. Thank you Public Works and thank you to the Land Conservancy's Volunteer Trail Watch for being our eyes in the Preserve to help report maintenance issues.

California bill to dramatically increase home building fails for the third year in a row

SACRAMENTO — After more than two years of debate, five major revisions and two tense days of counting votes, a high-profile legislative effort to dramatically increase home building across

California is officially dead.

Senate Bill 50 was an effort to undo California's decades-long reliance on single-family housing and suburban sprawl stretching inland by spurring a development boom near transit and job centers. But arguments that the legislation would help reduce the housing shortage at the root of the state's affordability problems and reduce greenhouse gas emissions from cars met resistance from those who believed the measure took too much power away from local governments and failed to sufficiently address low-income housing needs.

And this week, for the third year in a row, California state senators rejected the measure.

"The supply side of housing production is important. We've got to do it," Sen. Maria Elena Durazo (D-Los Angeles) said during debate on Wednesday. "But then I say, 'What about affordable housing?'"

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SB 50 fell three votes short of passage in the state Senate Wednesday. The following morning, bill author Sen. Scott Wiener (D-San Francisco) brought the measure back up for another try. But despite an attempt by supporters to drum up more backing on the Senate floor, the final vote count remained the same.

The decision comes as a blow to Gov. Gavin Newsom and Senate President Pro Tem Toni Atkins (D-San Diego), who had argued that lawmakers needed to take action to dramatically increase California's housing supply. After the final vote, Atkins made a commitment to pass major housing legislation in 2020.

"I feel compelled to say — and I think you all know this — this is not the end of the story," Atkins told her colleagues on the Senate floor. "I want to personally commit to each and every one of you, to the people of California, that a housing production bill to help alleviate our housing crisis will happen this year."

In a statement following the decision, Newsom echoed Atkins' promise.

"California's housing affordability crisis demands our state pass a historic housing production bill," the governor said.

But future efforts are certain to face the same tangled politics that ensnared SB 50 over the past two years.

The legislation would have allowed for the construction of [mid-rise apartment complexes near transit and job centers](#) and [fourplexes in most single-family neighborhoods](#) throughout the state. Wiener [introduced the first iteration of the bill](#) in 2018, contending that the state needed to force local governments to allow more housing to help control the cost of living. He said development near mass transit would make it easier for Californians to drive less, something state environmental officials have said is [essential for meeting climate change goals](#).

But that bill died in its first committee hearing [amid deep opposition from advocates representing low-income communities](#) who were worried that increased housing production could fuel gentrification.

Last year, Wiener made numerous changes to the bill aimed at addressing those concerns. The measure required housing projects larger than 10 units to contribute funding or space for low-income housing and prohibits developers from demolishing homes on properties where tenants have lived for at least the prior seven years. The senator gained support from several powerful groups representing labor, environmental, developer, business and real estate interests. But the bill

[was held without a vote in a committee last spring](#) after concerns from [suburban homeowner activists about changes to their communities](#).

Earlier this month, Wiener [announced he was trying again](#), changing the bill so that local governments would have two years to develop alternative development blueprints before the rules in SB 50 would take effect. Because the bill was held in a Senate committee last year, SB 50 faced a legislative deadline of the end of this month to advance out of the full Senate.

On the Senate floor Wednesday, Wiener argued that his colleagues should allow him to continue discussions over the issue, which he said required a response commensurate with the breadth of the state's housing problems.

"SB 50 will help plant the seeds so that in the future our kids and our grandkids don't have to have the same pain that people are experiencing today," Wiener said.

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But the changes made this month didn't persuade lawmakers. Support for and opposition to SB 50 didn't fall neatly along partisan or ideological lines. Nearly half of the 29 Democrats in the Senate voted against the bill or abstained from voting. Three out of 10 Republicans voted in favor. But there was a clear divide between lawmakers from the Los Angeles area, the state's most populous region, and those from other parts of California.

Last week, [a coalition of groups representing low-income communities announced their opposition to the bill](#), including Alliance for Community Transit-Los Angeles, an organization [behind a plan to increase density near transit in the city](#) and one that Wiener had been courting for nearly 18 months. And one by one, Democratic state senators from the Los Angeles area [began telling their constituents](#) they were opposed.

Ultimately, nine L.A.-area senators voted no or abstained on SB 50, and only one voted yes. Like Durazo, some L.A. legislators cited concerns about gentrification and displacement. Others, including Sen. Bob Hertzberg (D-Van Nuys), said the bill wrongfully targeted local government officials and single-family homeowners in its attempt to help remedy the state's housing problems.

“There may be some merit to this notion in limited circumstances, [but] this sweeping generalization both oversimplifies the problem and unnecessarily demeans people who have done nothing more than make homes for themselves, raise a family and play by the rules,” Hertzberg said.

The failure of the bill will hinder Newsom’s efforts to speed housing production in the state. On the campaign trail, the governor [pledged to increase annual home building nearly fivefold](#) to levels unseen since at least the mid-1950s. The governor [has not yet put forward a plan](#) to increase development to the scale he promised.

Newsom never endorsed SB 50, but made some efforts to persuade lawmakers to keep the measure moving forward. When SB 50 was held last year, Newsom said he was “disappointed” that the bill had not advanced and said he was going to get more involved in discussions about the legislation.

In mid-January, top aides to Newsom met with Wiener and suggested amendments to SB 50 that the lawmaker declined to accept, according to multiple sources in the Capitol. Wiener declined to comment on his discussions with the governor’s office.

After Wiener’s bill came up a handful of votes short on Wednesday, representatives of the governor’s office attempted to persuade two Democratic senators to vote for the legislation. But Sen. Bill Dodd (D-Napa) left the meeting and voted against it, saying that legislators still had time this year to introduce an alternative measure. Sen. Tom Umberg (D-Santa Ana) abstained from casting a vote. He said he supported higher-density development around train stations, but worried about how the bill would encourage growth in single-family neighborhoods away from transit.

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“The challenge here,” Umberg said, “is that I do support the concept.”



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

Residential Street Rehabilitation



Residential Street Rehabilitation



WATERSHED UPDATE: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes January 2020

MS4 PERMIT LITIGATION

In the 2015 lawsuit filed by two cities challenging the current 2012 MS4 Permit, the lower courts ruled that the Regional Board did not take economic impacts into consideration and therefore exceeded the requirements of the federal Clean Water Act. The courts removed all numeric limits from the 2012 MS4 Permit. However, the Regional Board appealed that decision, and the Court of Appeal subsequently issued a temporary suspension of that stay pending further briefing; the 2012 MS4 Permit will remain in effect unless and until the Court of Appeal orders otherwise. A ruling is not anticipated to be made until late Spring 2020.

PROPOSED STATE BOARD ORDER

Around the time that the cities filed the 2015 lawsuit challenging the 2012 MS4 Permit, several NGOs also challenged the 2012 MS4 Permit on the grounds that it was not stringent enough. As a result of that challenge, the State Water Resources Control Board (State Board) in Sacramento conducted a thorough review of nine Watershed Management Programs (WMPs) and one Enhanced Watershed Management Program (EWMP) previously approved by the Los Angeles Regional Board. The State Board issued a proposed 125-page Order finding the (E)WMPs to be insufficient. If adopted, this Order would require the statewide implementation of significant changes in Watershed Management Programs (both EWMPs and WMPs).

- Although the State Board singled out three watersheds (LLAR, LSGR, and LARUR2) for detailed discussion, it is clear throughout the document that this is a guideline for Regional Boards throughout the state to follow as they move to a watershed-based approach. Specifically, for all permittees under the LA County MS4 Permit, all comments apply to all WMPs and EWMPs. Of note, three permittees will have their “deemed compliance” revoked.
- Any reference to funding contingencies would have to be removed. In other words, not having funding would no longer be an excuse for not constructing regional projects. However, funding limitations would still be grounds for extensions.
- Within six months of this Order being adopted, Permittees would have to demonstrate that they have met past milestones. If past milestones cannot be met, Permittees would lose their “deemed compliance.”
- A much more robust watershed modeling effort would be required.

If adopted, this Order would also require the Executive Officer of the Regional Board to report to the State Board on the progress of the Regional Board and WMGs in complying with the Order on an annual basis.

ANNUAL REPORT

The City’s NPDES MS4 Annual Report for the fiscal year (July 2018 – June 2019) was submitted to the Regional Board by the December deadline. The submittal was in two parts covering: (1) the City’s stormwater pollution prevention practices and projects, and (2) the cumulative efforts of the Watershed Management Group (WMG).

NEXT MS4 PERMIT

The Regional Board is currently developing the next MS4 Permit with the intent to have a single permit covering Ventura County, Los Angeles County, and the City of Long Beach. Regional Board staff released a proposed working version, which, for Los Angeles County cities, is not significantly different from the current 2012 MS4 Permit. A workshop was subsequently held on January 7, 2020. The specifics of the proposed MS4 Permit were not discussed at the workshop; instead, the workshop focused on high level concerns such as:

- Making annual reporting less cumbersome
- Keeping the WMPs and EWMPs as the primary mechanism of implementation (the Regional Board declined to discuss the recent State Board Order regarding WMPs and EWMPs)
- Recognizing Measure W (Safe Clean Water Program) funding and schedules
- Extending near-term TMDL deadlines
- Potentially adjusting compliance standards as scientific studies are completed
- Resolving the MS4 Permit litigation regarding numerical limits
- Potentially eliminating some current monitoring requirements as data shows that certain pollutants are not likely to be problematic
- Addressing the NGOs' argument that water quality standards need to be enforced

A majority of the Regional Board members were present and follow-up workshops were requested.

SAFE CLEAN WATER PROGRAM

The Measure W (Safe, Clean Water Program) parcel tax, which exempts schools and municipal facilities, was levied on property tax bills beginning in October 2019. The tax will be used to fund stormwater programs and projects, with the funds being allocated to regional programs/municipal programs/administration in a 50/40/10 arrangement. Steering committees have been established to allocate funds for regional projects, and applications for the first round of regional project funding have been submitted. The draft agreement to transfer funds to the City is anticipated to be available in February 2020, and the City should anticipate receiving funds in Spring 2020.

SENATE BILL NO. 205

Senate Bill No. 205 was approved by the Governor on October 2, 2019. This legislation requires the City to determine SIC Code and IGP/NPDES Permit applicability prior to issuing or renewing any business license with an application submitted on and after January 1, 2020. The City will also be required to transfer that information to the State Board upon request.

POINT-OF-PURCHASE (POP) OUTREACH

From October 2019 – December 2019, the City distributed educational stormwater pollution prevention materials to POP businesses. These businesses (which include applicable auto shops, hardware and home improvement stores, lawn and gardening centers, and pet stores) sell what are considered to be common contributors to stormwater pollution. The program encourages store owners to display and distribute materials that offer resources for proper management of stormwater pollutants to customers.
