## SPOTLIGHT ON MARY BRADLEY, HUMAN RESOURCES MANAGER



Mary Bradley began her tenure as Human Resources Manager in May 2016 after previously filling the same position for the Cities of Lakewood and Bell Gardens. Mary has also held HR positions at Culver City and the City of Los Angeles and once worked for National Geographic Interactive. Mary recently took some time to answer some questions about her experience and the role of Human Resources in Rancho Palos Verdes.

### What first led you to a career in City Government?

I took a clerical job in HR at the Housing Authority for the City of Los Angeles (HACLA). Initially, I only intended working there for a year or two, max. Within 3 months I got promoted out of the clerical job and into a professional one where I was exposed to public sector HR...and I was fascinated! I just couldn't get enough of it. Before I knew it, 6 years had gone by and I started to think that maybe I had found my calling. But it wasn't until I left HACLA to work for the City of Culver City that I knew public sector HR and City government was where I wanted to be.

### Tell us about your past work and educational experiences, and how they prepared you for your current position as RPV HR Manager.

My educational background includes a Bachelor's degree in Management and a Master's degree in Business Administration from Pepperdine University. I possess 18 years of public sector HR experience, 12 years of which include HR management experience. I've had the pleasure of working for 4 different public agencies prior to coming to RPV (City of Lakewood, City of Bell Gardens, City of Culver City, and the Housing Authority of the City of Los Angeles).

### What are some of the main functions and responsibilities of an HR Manager?

These can vary depending on the size of the organization as well as the size of the HR department. Since RPV is a small organization, the functions of the HR Manager span all areas of HR. I'm responsible for managing the City's Human Resources operations including recruitment and selection, classification and compensation, benefit & leave administration, employee relations, labor relations, professional development and management training, organizational development, employee health and safety, and risk management and worker's compensation programs.

### What qualities should an effective HR Manager possess?

An effective HR Manager should have a strong technical background in a wide range of personnel matters, good listening skills, flexibility, integrity, innovation, and last but not least, he/she should be compassionate, treating others with respect, dignity and maturity.

### Are there any HR-related changes or improvements you would like to see implemented or considered in RPV?

I'm excited to say that we are on our way to moving from a paper application process to an on-line application system that is much more user-friendly. In the next couple of months, we will be going live with NeoGov, a system that gives applicants the ability to apply online, check the status of their application at any time of day or night, and schedule their testing or interview date/time (if they're invited to the examination process).

### Looking forward, what are the most significant City personnel challenges you anticipate?

Staffing. Attracting and retaining a well-qualified workforce is always key, but more so when you have retirements on the horizon and an organization that is in the process of reinventing itself, seeking to become better and more efficient in so many areas. I have every confidence in our ability to meet these challenges head on and successfully.

### What would you like the residents of RPV to know about you?

Before entering public service I was an active member of the California Junior Chamber of Commerce (Jaycees), and was very active in the Torrance Chapter, holding several leadership roles including State Director.


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## CIVIC CENTER SURVEY SAYS!




Residents mailed back almost 2,300 surveys, an impressive 17% return rate. Thanks to all the residents who took the time out of their busy lives to fill out this important document. When asked if they favored or opposed redeveloping the Civic Center, 41% of respondents strongly favored redevelopment and 33% somewhat favored for a total favorable score of 74%.

## PALOS VERDES NATURE PRESERVE RAIN CLOSURES



Recent rains helped alleviate drought stress and have been great for plant life, but can be tough on trails. Did you know that the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve (Preserve) closes during rain, and also for a period of time afterward, for public safety and to prevent trail erosion and habitat damage? The Preserve is a 1,400-acre natural area dedicated to the protection of native habitat and wildlife and also contains popular public trails. The Preserve is co-managed by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes and the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy.

The Preserve, along with many other open space and natural areas in the region, closes periodically after rain to allow the trails to dry. Using trails too soon after rain can cause long-lasting damage to both the trails and the surrounding habitat. The surrounding habitat is damaged when trail users avoid mud or puddles on the trail by stepping or riding off trail. This both damages habitat and protected species and results in trail widening. Also, many trails and Preserve areas become unsafe for use when they are wet.

The City typically closes all Preserve properties for 48 hours after a rain. However, closures are based on amount of rainfall and trail conditions and could be in effect for a shorter or longer period of time. The Recreation and Parks Open Space Management staff inspects several trails each morning after a rain to determine if trails are safe and dry enough for use. All trail updates and rain closures are posted at [trailalerts.rpvca.gov](http://trailalerts.rpvca.gov). 

## RPV'S ARTERIAL FENCES AND WALLS

While driving or walking along the City's 120 miles of arterial streets, you may have wondered who the abutting fences and walls belong to and who is responsible for their maintenance. Hopefully you have better things to think about, but the majority of the fences and walls abutting the City's arterial streets were constructed at the time the adjoining neighborhood tract was developed. These arterial fences and walls are for the most part located on private property and do not belong to the City. Because these fences and walls are on private property, it is also the property owner's responsibility to make sure they are maintained in a safe and good condition.

Neglecting the physical and aesthetic condition of these fences and walls can cause a public safety concern which is not permitted per the Municipal Code. Within the coming weeks, the City will be contacting property owners asking them to repair or remove arterial fences or walls that are in disrepair. ## CONSTRUCTING A RETAINING WALL... WHAT CITY APPROVALS ARE NEEDED?

Walls are very much a topic of discussion these days, but it may be news to you that the construction of a retaining wall in Rancho Palos Verdes requires City permits from either the Planning or Building and Safety Divisions (or both).



It is recommended that you contact the Community Development Department to obtain information specific to your proposal before you begin construction.

## SHORT-TERM RENTALS A NO-NO

ADVERTISING OR OPERATING SHORT-TERM RENTALS PROHIBITED

On December 20, 2016, the City Council affirmed that short-term rentals, defined as residential rentals of 30 days or fewer, is a prohibited use within the City's Single-Family and Multi-Family Residential zoning districts. That same evening the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 592U, which codified a prohibition on advertising of short term rentals. This Ordinance states that no property owner or tenant shall post, publish, circulate, broadcast or maintain any advertisement of a short-term rental in any of the City's Single-Family or Multi-Family residential districts. Therefore, all short-term rentals and advertisements of short-term rentals in any of the City's Single-Family or Multi-Family zoning districts must cease.



Violators of the rental or advertisement prohibition are subject to an Administrative Citation in the amount of \$2,500 for the first violation, \$5,000 for the second violation, and \$7,500 for the third and subsequent violations. Each day of operation or advertising of a short-term rental constitutes a new violation.

Among the recurring comments noted in the City's recent Civic Center Master Plan Survey was the need for senior citizens services and activities. ## CRIME CORNER



### 2016 CRIME REPORT



In 2015, the City experienced a rise in Part I crimes, with the most notable being residential burglaries. The City responded by adding two additional patrol deputies in 2015 and a Surveillance and Apprehension Team Detective in 2016. In addition, the City implemented a comprehensive Public Safety Strategic Plan, including partnering with our three neighboring Peninsula cities to add an extensive array of Automated License Plate Recognition (ALPR) cameras. We're happy to say that RPV has

witnessed a decline in Part I crimes, including a 50% drop in the residential burglary rate from 184 in 2015 to 92 in 2016. Part II crime rates also fell by 11%, while the arrest rate increased by 15%. One area of serious concern in the 2016 crime report is the 41% increase in thefts from unlocked vehicles. The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department reminds all residents to do their part to help prevent these crimes. Residents are asked to follow these easy tips to avoid becoming a victim:

- ALWAYS lock your car doors.
- NEVER leave any valuable items inside your car. If you must leave them in your car, try to put them in the trunk where they are out of sight.
- Park in locked garages if at all possible.
- DO NOT leave garage remotes in vehicles.

Together, we can prevent crime!

## COMING TO TERMS (WITH NEW COUNCIL TERMS)



City of Rancho Palos Verdes City local elections have traditionally taken place in odd years, while statewide general elections occur in even years. This has led to lower voter turnout in local elections due to the lack of high-profile races such as Governor or U.S. Senator. Senate Bill 415 addressed that issue by mandating that local municipal elections coincide with general election campaigns beginning in 2020.

The City Council had a few different ways to achieve this, such as lengthening or shortening their current terms, or future terms. In the interest of transparency, the City Council opted to shorten upcoming Council terms from the long-established four years to three years in order to sync up with even-numbered election years.

City Council members elected in November 2017 will serve through 2020. Those elected in 2019 will serve through 2022. Beginning in 2020 and going forward, all Council Members will again be elected for four-year terms.

## FREE DOCUMENT SHREDDING & E-WASTE COLLECTION & MULCH GIVEAWAY EVENT

Tax Season is over! If you have personal and sensitive documents that you want confidentially shredded, come on Saturday, April 22, 2017, to RPV Civic Center (City Hall), 30940 Hawthorne Blvd., from 8 am to 11 am. Certified shredding trucks will securely shred all your documents on-site at the event.

Additionally, bring your unwanted electronics such as TVs, computer monitors, CPUs, printers, fax machines, VCRs, DVD players, and answering machines. EDCO will collect them.

No household hazardous waste (HHW) material (e.g. no paint, no fluorescent light bulbs, etc.) will be accepted.

Love Gardening? Free mulch will be available to residents while supplies last. This is a self-service and self-haul event. Please bring your own trashcans or sturdy yard bags, gloves and a shovel. Limit of 3 cans/bag per vehicle. If you plan to haul your compost in an open truck or trailer, please remember to bring a tarp to cover your material.

## RPV CITY COUNCIL IN ACTION!

DECEMBER, 2016 AND JANUARY, FEBRUARY, 2017

### December 6

#### Selection of Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem

Mayor Pro Tem Brian Campbell was elected as Mayor and Councilmember Jerry Duhovic was elected as Mayor Pro Tem. Councilmember Ken Dyda was thanked for his year of service as Mayor and presented with an oversized ceremonial gavel.

#### Council updated on Palos Verdes Nature Preserve Operations

The Council received a report on Preserve Operations and Enforcement from Recreation & Parks Open Space Management Staff and Lomita Sheriff Deputies.

### December 20

#### Short-Term Rentals

Council affirmed the prohibition of short-term rentals in areas zoned single-family residential and prohibited the advertisement of short-term rentals.

#### New City Software System

Contract approved with SunGard, Inc. to provide a software system to replace and enhance the City's permitting, planning, code enforcement, Business License and Cashiering systems.

#### Neighborhood Public Safety Monitoring Program

Approved Automatic License Plate Recognition (ALPR) cameras for Eastview neighborhoods along Western Avenue and authorized Staff to proceed with the Grant Program for Homeowner Association Safety Improvements.

### January 17

#### Appointments of Council Members to the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve Subcommittee

The Council appointed Councilmembers Ken Dyda and Anthony Misetich to serve on the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve Subcommittee. Council also heard an update on additional communication improvements between the City Council and the PVPLC Board of Directors.

### February 7

#### 2016 Crime report
