### It's Census Push Week!

It's Census Push Week! Make sure you fill out your 2020 Census. Your response will help our communities receive the funding they need!

As of July 27, **Rancho Palos Verdes has a self-response rate of 75.7%**, above state and national averages, but behind our goal of 100% participation. The U.S. Census Bureau has extended the official deadline to participate in the census to **October 31** in response to the evolving COVID-19 crisis. If you haven't already done so, complete your census form now:

- **Online:** L.A. County 2020 Census website at [census.lacounty.gov](https://census.lacounty.gov), which offers county-specific information in 16 languages; or the U.S. 2020 Census website at [my2020census.gov](https://my2020census.gov), which offers general information in 59 languages, including in-language guides
- **By phone,** at [844-330-2020](tel:844-330-2020).
- **By mail,** if you receive a paper form.

Remember, completing the census is private. Responses are protected by federal law, specifically Title 13 of the United States Code. They cannot be shared with any other government agencies or other entities, including your landlord. For more information, visit [census.lacounty.gov](https://census.lacounty.gov)

### **Census Takers Coming to your Neighborhood**

Starting in August, census takers will visit homes that have not yet responded to the 2020 Census. If you respond online or by phone today, a census taker is less likely to have to visit your home to collect your response.

### **What to expect**

- Census takers will wear face coverings and follow public health guidelines when they visit your home.
- Census takers are hired from your area, and their goal is to help you and everyone in your home be counted in the 2020 Census. If the census taker who visits your home does not speak your language, you may request a return visit from a census taker who does speak your language.
- If no one is home when the census taker visits, they will leave a notice of their visit with information about how to respond online, by phone or by mail.

### **How can you verify that someone is an authorized Census Taker?**

- Check to make sure they have a valid ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark and expiration date.
- Census workers may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.


Dear Residents,

We're reaching out to provide you with an update on California Water Service's (Cal Water) Palos Verdes Peninsula Water Reliability Project as it relates to upcoming paving on Palos Verdes Drive North, Rolling Hills Road, and Montecillo Drive.

**As early as this Friday, July 31, for approximately one day**, crews will remove the steel plates and conduct final paving in the following areas:


### **Intersection of Palos Verdes Drive North and Crenshaw Boulevard**

- Work hours are from 9 a.m to 7 p.m.
- Traffic control will be in place and southbound traffic will be temporarily reduced to one lane, but vehicles will be able to travel in each direction at all times. **Please expect delays** while work takes place and use alternate routes, where possible.



### **Rolling Hills Road (between Lariat Lane and Rolling Hills Road (private road))**

- Work hours are from 9 a.m to 7 p.m.
- While paving is underway, southbound traffic will be temporarily diverted to the northbound lane, but vehicles will be able to travel in each direction at all times. **Flaggers will be present** to facilitate traffic and assist residents accessing Lariat Lane and Rolling Hills Road (private road). **Please expect delays** while work takes place and use alternate routes, where possible.



### Palos Verdes Drive North (between Dapplegray Lane and PV Drive East)

- Work hours are from 9 a.m to 7 p.m.
- During work hours, **eastbound and westbound traffic will be open but limited to one lane in each direction**; with lanes reopening after work is complete. **Please expect delays** while work takes place and use alternate routes, where possible





**Montecillo Drive (between Palos Verdes Drive North and Encanto Drive)**

- Work hours are from 7 a.m to 5 p.m.
- As paving takes place, there will be a temporary, intermittent closure of the northbound lane with traffic diverted to the southbound lane, but residents will have access to Montecillo Drive at all times.



For the safety of crew members and residents, we kindly ask that you continue to slow down while driving in construction zones.

## **Board of Supervisors Approves Charter Amendment for November Ballot**

On July 28, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors voted 4-1, with Supervisor Kathryn Barger dissenting, to move forward with placing a charter amendment on the November 3 ballot that would earmark 10% of the county's unrestricted general fund dollars — estimated at about \$360 million — for a variety of social programs for underserved communities and alternatives to incarceration. Law enforcement agencies would be prohibited from using these funds. The set-aside would be phased in by June 30, 2024. Last week, the City sent a letter to the board cautioning the county to conduct adequate planning and analysis and to solicit community input when crafting the measure. The California Contract Cities Association and the South Bay Cities Council of Governments also sent letters to the board raising concerns with the proposed charter amendment (see attachments). The measure would need a majority of voter approval to pass. Staff will continue to monitor this issue.

## **Palos Verdes Reef Restoration Project Update**

Last week, the [Orange County Register reported](#) that work finished early on Southern California Edison's Wheeler North Reef project in San Clemente. This work was completed using the same barge used in May and June for the Palos Verdes Reef Restoration Project just off the coast of Rancho Palos Verdes near Trump National Golf Club. According to California Coastal Commission staff, the barge is scheduled to return to the City in late August to complete the remaining half of the reef.

As a reminder, this project by the Southern California Marine Institute involves dropping tens of thousands of tons of quarry rock into the ocean to build 18 reef modules on the seafloor to restore fishing resources that were destroyed by decades of chemical dumping off the coast.

## COVID-19 Cases

As of July 28, there are 178,642 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across Los Angeles County (population 10.17 million), including the South Bay, so the public should not think one location is safer than another and everyone should be aware and practice physical distancing. The total includes 216 cases in Rancho Palos Verdes (population 41,731), 70 in Palos Verdes Estates (population 13,190), 31 in Rolling Hills Estates (population 8,066), five in Rolling Hills (population 1,874), and six in the unincorporated areas of the Peninsula. Countywide, 4,426 people have died.

According to the Department of Public Health, 12 deaths have been reported in Rancho Palos Verdes. The City extends its deepest condolences to the families of these residents.


## Wildfire Preparedness Webinar

Today, Staff attended the fourth in a series of webinars on wildfire preparedness hosted by the League of California Cities. City of San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection District former fire chief Augie Ghio and City of Santa Clarita Management Analyst Rebecca Widdison discussed best practices on running Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs) including, communication tips, how to cross train new and existing staff, securing mutual aid, and addressing new challenges that may arise due to the pandemic. During a wildfire, EOCs are an essential part of commanding and responding to emergencies. Staff will continue to attend these webinars.

## **Rancho Palos Verdes Welcomes Sakura City, Japan as its First Sister City**

Since 2001, more than 300 students from two middle schools in Sakura City have traveled to Rancho Palos Verdes to attend Miraleste Intermediate School, enabling students from both cities to attain a robust cultural understanding and appreciation of both countries. To ensure that the program continues to strengthen cultural bonds and foster many enduring and deep friendships, the City Council discussed and agreed to proceed

with pursuing a sister city relationship with Sakura City. On August 4, 2020, the City Council will officially recognize Sakura City, Japan, as a “sister city” to Rancho Palos Verdes. Join the “virtual” ceremonial signing event via RPVtv or online (RPVCA.GOV) at 7:00 p.m. during the regularly scheduled City Council meeting.



## **Civic Center Advisory Committee Meeting Update**

The Civic Center Advisory Committee held its monthly meeting on Thursday, July 23. Staff presented an overview of the July 7 Biannual Report to City Council and the July 21 City Council Goals review. Staff informed the Committee that the draft Request for Proposals (RFP) for Civic Center Master Plan Project Architectural & Design Services, which was approved by the Committee at its June meeting, had been forwarded to the Ad Hoc City Council RFP and Contracts Subcommittee for its review. That review process, along with a subsequent review by the City Attorney, is expected to take approximately 45 days. There was a general discussion regarding the importance of budget parameters. City Manager Mihranian noted that Staff spoke to Larry Kosmont of Kosmont Transaction Services (KTS) for advice on establishing a project budgetary range. KTS is currently contracted to provide the City with potential financing options for the Civic Center project. The Committee reviewed the revised project schedule and directed Staff to look at adding the following components to the timeline:

- a) Outreach to public safety agencies and other partners; and
- b) The public outreach process.

The Committee directed staff to come back in August with a detailed description of the RFP review and evaluation process.

## Emergency Preparedness



### Emergency Alerts

When emergencies strike, public safety officials use timely and reliable systems to alert you. This following describe different warning alerts available and how to receive them.

### Wireless Emergency Alerts

Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEAs) are one of many ways public safety officials can quickly and effectively alert the public to serious emergencies. They are sent through the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS), which integrates the nation's alert and warning systems, technologies, and infrastructure.

#### What you need to know about WEAs:

- WEAs can be sent by state and local public safety officials, the National Weather Service, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the president of the United States.
- WEAs can be issued for three alert categories: imminent threat, AMBER alerts and presidential.
- WEAs look like text messages, but are designed to get your attention with a unique sound and vibration repeated twice.
- WEAs are no more than 90 characters and include the type and time of the alert, any action you should take and the agency issuing the alert.

- WEAs are not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts, calls or data sessions that are in progress.
- Mobile users are not charged for receiving WEAs and there is no need to subscribe.
- To make sure your device is WEA-capable check with your service provider.

### **Emergency Alert System**

- The Emergency Alert System (EAS) is a national public warning system that allows the president to address the American people within 10 minutes during a national emergency. The alerts are sent through broadcasters, satellite digital audio services, direct broadcast satellite providers, cable television systems and wireless cable systems.
- The EAS may also be used by state and local authorities to deliver important emergency information such as weather information, imminent threats, AMBER alerts and local incident information targeted to specific areas.
- The president has sole responsibility for determining when the national-level EAS will be activated. FEMA is responsible for national-level EAS tests and exercises.
- The EAS is also used when all other means of alerting the public are unavailable.

### **Emergency Alerts from Alert Southbay**

Alert SouthBay is a multi-jurisdictional notification system managed by a board comprised of 13 South Bay cities that was established to keep communities informed about disasters and major emergencies with uniform, expeditious alerts. The 13 participating cities include Inglewood, El Segundo, Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, Palos Verdes Estates, Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills Estates, Rolling Hills, Torrance, Gardena, Hawthorne, and Lomita.



The Alert Southbay notification system gives Police, Fire, Emergency Management, and specific contract cities, the ability to deliver critical notifications to our community. The *Alert SouthBay* notification system replaces all existing notification systems, including NIXLE.

Alert Southbay is an opt-in service that users can sign up for and subscribe to receive alerts. Users can register by:

- Texting “alertsrb” to 888-777, which returns a link to register for Everbridge **for COVID-19-related alerts, text the keyword "cv19rpv"**)
- Downloading the free Everbridge app on an iOS or Android device from the App Store or Google Play
- Registering online at <https://alertsouthbay.com/>, where residents will have the option to sign up for alerts from multiple jurisdictions.

## **Safety Tips and Precautions**

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is dedicated to the safety and well-being of its residents and community members. The City encourages residents to participate in neighborhood safety and remain vigilant in protecting personal property. There are many ways individuals can reduce the chance of becoming a victim and to contribute to community safety. Please see below for crime prevention tips for you and your loved ones:

### **Tips to Avoid Vehicle Burglaries:**

- Always lock your vehicles whenever not in use
- Close and lock all windows
- Keep your valuables, such as your purse, wallet, or bag, with you or secure them out of sight and stored away
- Do not display items of value in your vehicle: place them in your trunk or keep them covered
- Remove valuables, packages, garage openers, mail, or other devices from sight

### **Tips to Prevent Residential Burglaries:**

- Lock all windows and doors, including backyard, side, and garage doors
- Keep all curtains closed at night or when no one is home
- If you are away and you are capable, leave house lights on or set them to turn on at intervals
- Set up a security camera system with video and audio
- Notify trusted neighbors if you will be away for an extended period of time

If you see something, say something! We encourage you to call the Lomita Sheriff's Station at 310-539-1661 if you see any suspicious persons or activities.

Please note: Please be aware that many of the burglaries that have occurred are carried out because of unlocked or open entryways such as doors, windows, or garages. Please be sure to check that these entryways are closed and locked, and valuables are stored and out of sight.

## Vacation Security Camera Loaner

The City encourages the use of video/audio recording devices with security footage capabilities as an additional measure of home protection. For RPV residents who may be away from home for an extended period, the City offers a Vacation Security Camera Loaner program. ## Flock Safety Cameras Pilot Program Update:

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes has been working with the Oceanfront Estates HOA to pilot an additional neighborhood security camera program with a new vendor, Flock Safety. This pilot program introduces five Flock Safety solar-powered ALPR cameras, which will operate concurrently with existing ALPR cameras. The cameras are officially operational and are now providing added security and video footage.

The meetings include the Lomita Sheriff's Station, Los Angeles County Fire

Department, and other utility companies as it relates to public safety and emergency preparedness.

# FINANCE DEPARTMENT

## Second Quarter Home Sale Value Trends

For Los Angeles County, sales volume fell 40% to 60% lower compared with April 2019. The median sale prices seem to be holding steady from the prior months and do not appear to have taken any significant negative turns in May. Since some of the April sales were likely initiated around the time (or shortly after the time) of the Stay at Home Order, it was a relief to see May sales volume about equal to, or better, than April in many areas. While reductions in the number of sales are concerning, the data is better than anticipated, and the stable median prices mean that sales are continuing to add value.



In some more affordable markets throughout Los Angeles County, the sales volume was only off 20% to 30%. This is presumably due to affordability and low-interest rates. Conversely, the areas with higher median prices are experiencing more of a slowdown in terms of the number of sales as well as larger reductions to current medians.

For the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, there were 37 and 30 full value single-family residential home sales during the months of April and May, respectively. When compared to 2019, this is a reduction from 46 in April and 57 in May. This is only a small snapshot of the events unfolding that will continue into the fall and winter.

## Don't Forget, Social Security Benefits May Be Taxable!

Taxpayers receiving Social Security benefits may have to pay federal income tax on a portion of those benefits.

Social Security benefits include monthly retirement, survivor, and disability benefits. They don't include supplemental security income payments, which aren't taxable.

The portion of taxable benefits depends on the taxpayer's income and filing status.

To find out if their benefits are taxable, taxpayers **should**:

- Take one-half of the Social Security money they collected during the year and add it to their other income. Other income includes pensions, wages, interest, dividends and capital gains.
  - If they are single and that total comes to more than \$25,000, then part of their Social Security benefits may be taxable.
  - If they are married filing jointly, they should take half of their Social Security, plus half of their spouse's Social Security, and add that to all their combined income. If that total is more than \$32,000, then part of their Social Security may be taxable.



**Fifty percent of a taxpayer's benefits may be taxable if they are:**

- Filing single, single, head of household or qualifying widow or widower with \$25,000 to \$34,000 income.
- Married filing separately and lived apart from their spouse for all of 2019 with \$25,000 to \$34,000 income.
- Married filing jointly with \$32,000 to \$44,000 income.

**Up to 85% of a taxpayer's benefits may be taxable if they are:**

- Filing single, head of household or qualifying widow or widower with more than \$34,000 income.
- Married filing jointly with more than \$44,000 income.
- Married filing separately and lived apart from their spouse for all of 2019 with more than \$34,000 income.
- Married filing separately and lived with their spouse at any time during 2019.

## **Small Business Financial Assistance Plan Update**

On April 8, 2020, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes implemented the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan to provide relief and promote the general welfare of the City's small business community experiencing negative financial impacts stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Small Business Financial Assistance Plan provides a one-time refund of the 2020 business license.

On June 2, 2020, the City Council received a status report on the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan. As a result of the low response, the City Council expressed a desire to increase the number of eligible small businesses by removing the limitation that a small business must have a "brick-and-mortar" location to be eligible to receive a refund.

Since the implementation on April 8:

- the City has received 20 requests for business license tax refunds
- 6 of the 20 requests were not eligible for the program
- 13 refunds totaling \$4,313 have been issued to date

## PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

### **Certified Playground Safety Inspections**

Certified playground safety inspectors have begun inspecting the play areas and playground equipment of Hesse Park, Ryan Park, Ladera Linda, and Eastview Park. Inspections should be completed by the end of the month.

### **Assembly Bill 2959 (AB 2959), (Calderon)- Solid Waste: Byproducts from Processing of Food or Beverages**

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force (Task Force) supports Assembly Bill 2959 (AB 2959), as amended on July 1, 2020. If enacted, the proposed legislation would reauthorize local governments to exercise the authority to determine, among other things, whether solid waste handling services are provided using a nonexclusive, partially exclusive, or wholly exclusive franchise, contract, license, permit, or otherwise if those by-products originate from a supermarket, grocer, restaurant, or other retail food establishments excluding byproducts that originate from a winegrower or brandy manufacturer.

The Task Force supports the proposed legislation because it would clarify that Public Resource Code 40059.4 is limited in application and only applies to certain by-products from agricultural and industrial sources that have historically not entered the municipal waste stream. This will ensure that restaurants and grocery stores, for example, are not considered “industrial sources” and somehow excluded from exclusive local agency franchise agreements.

### **Annual Report for Used Oil Payment Program (OPP) Grant**

Staff submitted the annual Used Oil Annual Report for Used Oil Payment Program (OPP) Grant to CalRecycle. The City annually receives \$11,000 from the State for used motor oil and used oil filter recycling activities. The City uses these grant funds towards public education and outreach of residents, including placing ads in the two local newspapers,

Daily Breeze and Peninsula News, informing residents of EDCO’s curbside on-call used oil and filter recycling collection.

### Article Submitted for Inside Solid Waste Magazine

Staff submitted an article to ‘Inside Solid Waste Magazine’ to highlight the City’s recent and successful citywide brush clearing event. A total of 41.21 tons of excess brush was collected during 5-consecutive Saturdays from mid-April to mid-May to help property owners safeguard their backyards and canyon properties from a potential brush fire.

### Restoration of the “Tide Pool Life” Interpretive Panel

One of the interpretive panels (Tide Pool Life) at Abalone Cove had seen better days and needed replacement. It was replaced this week with a new laminated print and new plexiglass.

### Updated Field Sight Distance Analysis at 28160 Palos Verdes Drive East

A field sight distance analysis is scheduled by Staff to be performed by the City’s Traffic Engineer (Willdan Engineering) in response to the proposed house at 28160 Palos Verdes Drive East. The City Staff, property owner of the lot and his traffic engineer will also be in attendance. The field sight distance analysis was performed initially on June 23, 2020. However, the existing foliage at the site may have impeded the site distance

measurements. Consequently, City Staff will finish removing this foliage this week, and the updated analysis will be performed next week. Vehicular traffic will be intermittently stopped in both directions by the Lomita Sheriff Department while the measurements are being taken. In addition, some of the members of the Traffic Safety Committee have shown interest and may attend this event.

## **ALPR Camera Update**

The Automatic License Plate Recognition (ALPR) Cameras for Phase 2 have been powered and calibrated at all twelve existing street light poles. This completes both phases of the ALPR camera installations at 17 different sites along Western Avenue Corridor.

## **Maintenance Activities**

This week, Public Works continued its regularly scheduled maintenance, trash pickup, and general repairs at all City parks and facilities. Irrigation repairs were made on Calle Entradero and at Ryan Park, Eastview Park, Hesse Park, and PVIC. Roadway brush clearance in the right-of-way and landscape maintenance also continues.

Right-of-Way and median landscaping teams continued clearing the right-of-way along Palos Verdes Drive East from the northern City limit to Palos Verdes Drive South.

The median team also finished working along Palos Verdes Drive South and are now working along Crest Road. The center median along Palos Verdes Drive South from the eastern City limit to Schooner Drive has also been de-weeded and trimmed.

In the right-of-way, Public Works made repairs to sidewalk deviations on Avenida Aprenda, Abbottswood Drive, Trotwood Avenue, and Crest Road. The Public Works grinds and repairs any sidewalk deviation that is more than half-inch in size and makes it as flush as possible. On Whitley Collins Drive, Public Works reinstalled the painted stop bar and the stop sign at this location. On Highridge Raod, the red curb was refreshed. And finally, at the Point Vicente Interpretive Center parking lot, Public Works installed a speed bump to help reduce speeding and improve pedestrian safety.



The Public Works Department responded to the following emergency requests:

- Removed a hornet's nest at Abalone Cove located below tide pool interpretive panel.
- Completed emergency sidewalk repairs on Trailriders Drive after large deviations were reported within an hour
- Addressed 10 graffiti removal cases this week
- Responded and removed a broken tree limb on Via Paloma.

## **New Temporary Special Use Permit for City Businesses**

The Community Development Department has developed a new Temporary Special Use Permit (TSUP) to assist local businesses with the opportunity to provide limited outdoor operations during the COVID-19 Pandemic. A TSUP will allow for outdoor operations on sidewalks and parking lots for:

- Restaurants;
- Fitness centers;
- Hair salons and barbershops; and
- Personal care services, such as nail salons, massage, and tattoo parlors

A TSUP will be processed administratively without a filing fee, public notification, or appeal process that is typically required for a standard Special Use Permit. For a complete list of operational requirements and permit limitations, please see the attached TSUP application. ## **Geological Investigation Permit (GIP) Issued for the Plumtree Parcel**

On July 24, 2020, the Planning Division issued a GIP (Case No. GRADE2020-00002) for the vacant Plumtree Parcel (APN: 7581-023-037), which is identified in the aerial photograph below:



A GIP is required for all investigative trenching, boring and/or grading performed mechanically or by hand. The Applicant is proposing to conduct testing over three test sites during the months of July and August. ## RECREATION AND PARKS DEPARTMENT

### Poaching at RPV Beaches

Over the past three months, OSM staff has observed and received multiple reports from the public regarding poaching and illegal fishing in the City. These incidents, while not new, have increased during the COVID-19 pandemic, after the reopening of its beaches and Nature Preserve in May. Other beaches are seeing similar activity, as documented in the recent Daily Breeze and Peninsula News articles.

OSM staff, including Rangers, have working with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Marine Protected Areas Collaborative Team in Los Angeles to monitor the use and health of our tide pools. Since June 28, OSM has spoken to 84 groups, provided education about alternative legal fishing locations outside of the Marine Protected Area (MPA) zone, and received verbal compliance. Additionally, during these interactions, the staff has observed and deterred the take of 930 organisms, including but not limited to snails, sea urchins, mussels, crabs, and starfish from highest frequency to lowest frequency of observed take.

The majority of poaching observed has occurred in the MPA below Abalone Cove Reserve, and the beach below Vanderlip Park. Additional reports were in areas outside of the MPA zone, including the beaches below Ocean Trails Reserve and Vicente Bluffs Reserve. These beaches allow for some take with restrictions and a fishing license.

The City is collaborating with agencies to educate the public on no-take within the MPA area with signage. OSM staff is working with the Director of the MPA Collaborative to identify locations for signage to deter and educate patrons on the collection, removal, and fishing of organisms to address this increase in poaching activity. Five signs have been provided for Pelican Cove, and more will be provided for Abalone Cove Beach in the near future. Rangers are also working with the City Attorney to put measures in place that will allow Rangers to cite for fishing without a license and taking animals from the MPA areas.



### **Paragliding in Ocean Trails Reserve**

Rangers are currently encountering issues with paragliders at Ocean Trails Reserve. Per the Preserve Public Use Master Plan (PUMP) and the RPV Municipal Code, it is illegal to take off or land while paragliding on City property. This use had been explored in depth during the PUMP process, and City Council, with general public support, decided to continue to prohibit it. The paragliders at Ocean Trails Reserve are a nuisance to neighbors, who are reporting the issue to Rangers. Not only does this group illegally take off from City property, but they also trespass through private neighbors' property nearby, vandalize public closures in the area, cut and trample native vegetation in their take-off area, and engage in their activity off-trail. Rangers will be working with neighbors, and the Volunteer Trail Watch to establish paragliding use patterns and teaming up with the LA County Sheriff's Department to address these violations. Additionally, Rangers will work with the City Attorney's Office to serve notice to any businesses operating illegally.

### **Parking Solutions near Del Cerro Park and Portuguese Bend Reserve**

The City is continuing to implement measures to reduce traffic congestion and its adverse impacts to neighbors in the Del Cerro Park/Portuguese Bend Reserve area. For the weekend of July 11, Public Works and Recreation and Parks staff placed signs in the area recommending the public park down Crenshaw Blvd., away from the residential neighborhood. For the weekend of July 18, staff increased the signage and added language recommending the public park and hike at the Alta Vicente Reserve, which is located adjacent to the Civic Center and has ample parking and trails. Based on Staff observations, these efforts did not result in an immediate noticeable reduction in traffic

congestion near Portuguese Bend Reserve, nor an increase in use at Alta Vicente Reserve, but will take more time to fully realize the results.

In advance of the weekend of July 25, the City distributed a message through social media recommending hikers visit the Alta Vicente Reserve, and listed its benefits, such as ample parking, restrooms, socially distanced picnic areas, dog park, and proximity to many other trails and the Pt. Vicente Lighthouse. Rangers noticed a minor increase in public use at Alta Vicente Reserve this past weekend and will continue to monitor. Rangers are working to take ownership of all official Google Preserve listings to post accurate information. The staff is 60% complete with this effort and will provide more details soon.

#### **Abalone Cove Reserve:**

This site remains extremely popular and parking is at a premium. The parking lot reaches capacity at approximately 120 cars. The parking lot was closed (due to having reached) approximately 14 times over the weekend. Rangers observed and cited several vehicles illegally parked adjacent to the Fire Station and in the area. A resident was thankful and explained that one of the cited vehicles was parked on his private property.

Rangers responded to a call about an injured baby raccoon. They arranged for Los Angeles County Animal Control to retrieve the animal. OSM staff provided first aid to two individuals, and one individual who was stung while in the ocean received first aid from the lifeguard.

Rangers received multiple reports regarding poaching activity at Abalone Cove tide pools. Rangers spoke to eighteen individuals regarding MPA status and the no-take status of the tide pools. At least 50 mussels and 20 sea urchins were returned to the tide pools during these interactions. Rangers also provided interpretive information on MPAs to a visiting family with a young child.



**Vicente Bluffs:**

Rangers received reports of patrons illegally over the fence in the closed area and they are monitoring this activity. On Friday, July 24, the Fire Department rescued a woman who had injured her ankle after illegally climbing over the fence and proceeding down the steep unauthorized trail to the beach below.

**Forrestal Reserve:**

Rangers asked a group of teenagers to leave the PVPUSD soccer fields, after the group had set up an area with tables, chairs and pieces of wood. Rangers also stopped an illegal film shoot. Film shoot participants parked illegally on Forrestal Drive.

**Portuguese Bend Reserve:**

Traffic and use remained heavy, and LA County Sheriff’s Deputies were present to cite vehicles on Park Place. Rangers deterred a group from entering with Mylar balloons.

**Ocean Trails Reserve:**

Rangers responded to multiple reports of paragliders in the Reserve. Paragliders were seen landing close to patrons on the beach and adjacent to the trails.


**Alta Vicente Reserve:**

Rangers monitored Alta Vicente trails, and noticed a very slight increase in use, possibly due to signage around the City and social media posts over the weekend. Rangers will continue to assess activity levels.

In accordance with the County of Los Angeles, due to the continued COVID-19 pandemic, all Recreation and Parks August events will be canceled. This includes two of our summer favorites; Movies in the Park, which was scheduled for August 15 at Hesse Park, and the annual Concert in the Park. ## Abundance of Bunnies

On July 29, The Daily Breeze reported on RPV residents rescuing abandoned rabbits at Hesse Park. On July 15, Hesse Park staff and the Recreation and Parks Department were made aware that domestic rabbits had been released into Lower Hesse Park. Recreation and Park staff worked with LA County Animal Care and Control to help secure the rabbits and posted signs around Lower Hesse Park stating abandonment of animals is prohibited. With the help of local residents and community members, there was a search for the abandoned rabbits and some were found and fostered. Thank you to the RPV community for your help!

**RE: Items 2 and 3 pertaining to a call for Special Election on November 3, 2020 of the proposed County Charter Amendment shifting budget priorities to revitalize under-resourced and low-income communities**

Dear Chair Barger and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

I am writing on behalf of the California Contract Cities Association (CCCA) to express our concern regarding the process in which the Board will vote to place a charter amendment on the November 3, 2020 ballot.

This hastily proposed charter amendment circumvents long established processes and does not provide the public and cities with an opportunity to weigh-in on acceptable alternative programs and services, nor does it allow the public and County staff to properly assess unintended consequences the amendment would have on the County’s budget and public safety for more than 10 million Angelenos.

Agencies, such as the Sheriff’s Department, District Attorney, and the Los Angeles Superior Court depend on the County’s funding. Simply placing the budget before voters without evaluating the full impact could result in serious consequences to our justice system and the safety of our residents. Further, it would hamper the current and future Board’s ability to exercise its full authority of the budget as it has met during the COVID-19 pandemic.

During this time in our nation’s history, we are all asked to meet the moment and help transform our justice system through meaningful investments in our communities. This call to action is grounded in the systemic problems that exist in our justice system and requires thoughtful deliberation from all stakeholders. The proposed county charter amendment would direct at least 10 percent of locally generated unrestricted revenues to support reinvestment and alternatives to incarceration. While the County has taken bold steps to transform our justice system, the instantaneous nature of the charter amendment’s introduction raises serious concerns for CCCA’s members.

For these reasons, CCCA strongly urges the Board to reconsider placing the charter amendment on the November 3, 2020 ballot and seek thoughtful input from all stakeholders, as it has been the tradition of the Board for many years. It is imperative



**RE: Reimagining L.A. County: Shifting Budget Priorities to Revitalize Under-resourced and Low-income Communities – Notice of OPPOSITION**

Dear Supervisor Barger:

On behalf of the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG), I am writing to express our opposition to the motion being considered by the Board of Supervisors that would put a Charter Amendment on the November ballot to permanently designate minimum funding levels for social service programs. Although well-intended, if approved, this amendment could cause major issues of concern for not only unincorporated Los Angeles County, but all 88 cities within the County as well.

Mental health, affordable housing, job development, youth programs, and similar social service programs have been severely underfunded for decades and deserve additional funding, particularly as leaders throughout the nation consider budget priorities during the COVID-19 pandemic. However, the SBCCOG believes it is the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors to determine budget priorities that reflect and fund policies that respond to the needs of the 10 million residents of the County. Budgeting via a ballot initiative like this amendment will tie the hands of future Supervisors as they try to respond to the needs of residents. If this Amendment proves to be problematic, it would take another initiative to change it. It is impossible to predict what the County’s funding priorities need to be in the future and it would be irresponsible to lock in spending priorities today. The Board of Supervisors can enact the same budget priorities as the proposed Charter Amendment via the annual budget process without inhibiting the ability to respond to future needs.

Additionally, major reductions in budgets for public safety should be discussed with city leaders because many contract with the LA County Sheriff’s Department for services and also rely on mutual aid between police departments during emergencies. This Amendment could have considerable impacts on public safety and repercussions should be identified and reviewed.

The SBCCOG is also concerned with the last-minute approach by the Board of Supervisors on incredibly impactful ballot propositions such as this. When these issues are made public just prior

to ballot submission deadlines, proper vetting of the issue is difficult. Voters as well as city leaders throughout the County deserve adequate notice to allow for discussion and input on potential ballot measures, particularly funding amendments such as this. LA County voters have shown in recent elections that they are hesitant to approve last-minute measures such as Measure FD earlier this year.

### GOOSENECK BARNACLES

They live up to 20 years. They sit atop a trunk and use their featherlike legs to comb through the water for food.

### CALIFORNIA MUSSEL

A mussel must filter through two liters an hour (the amount of a large soda bottle) of water to survive.

### STRIPED SHORE CRAB

To escape enemies, crabs can shed their legs or claws.

### SEA URCHIN

Five toothlike plates, called "Aristotle's lantern," surround an urchin's mouth on the bottom of its shell.

### ORANGE BAT STAR

When they meet another bat star, they have been known to "fight" by pushing and laying an arm over the other.

### OCHRE STAR

The ochre sea star is easy to spot by the white spines on their back. They are more tolerant to air and can withstand up to eight hours exposed during low tides.

### SEA ANEMONES

They have sticky tentacles covered with poison used to capture prey. Clownfish are covered in a mucous coating that protects them from the poisons.

# TIDE POOL LIFE

**CRABS** are the garbage collectors of the sea. They are scavengers that collect leftover dead plants and animals, cleaning the ecosystem around them.

The **SEA ANEMONE** may look like a plant, but they are really animals that eat fish and other living organisms. They paralyze passing prey using their poisonous tentacles, then push them into their mouth.

**SEA URCHINS** are light sensitive animals. When shadows pass over the urchin, it assumes it is being preyed on and moves its spines to point at the shadow.

**SEA STARS** are commonly known as star fish. However, they are not fish since they do not have gills, fins or scales. They belong to a group of marine animals called echinoderms, which can regenerate arms if threatened by a predator. It can take a year for that arm to grow back.

**ABALONE COVE IS AN ECOLOGICAL RESERVE**, which aims to protect the life living inside it. Disturbing or taking any animal life is prohibited. Please respect the environment so that future visitors may enjoy it as well!

## **TEMPORARY SPECIAL USE PERMIT**

The City recognizes that businesses are faced with accommodating social distancing and limited services due to COVID-19 public health orders and closures. During this public health emergency, indoor capacity was effectively eliminated within the current physical indoor footprint of a business. To address this capacity issue, the City may issue Temporary Special Use Permits (TSUPs) to utilize sidewalks, privately-owned parking areas and outdoor spaces of a business' site to appropriately provide services while accommodating emergency orders related to social distancing and restricted indoor activities. TSUPs will be made available for businesses under modified emergency orders in compliance with the City's Special Use Permit process established in the City's Zoning Code. This application package includes a TSUP submittal checklist, application and a listing of operation requirements and limitations associated with the TSUP.

### **SUBMITTAL CHECKLIST**

2. Four copies of Site Plan - An 8.5" x 11" site plan showing the following:
  - All buildings and structures on the site.
  - Off-street parking spaces, driving aisles, and driveways.
  - The location and dimensions of the temporary use.
  - Such other data as may be required to demonstrate that the project meets the criteria. Examples include but are not limited to:
    - Furniture & Equipment plan – demonstrating that the TSUP would not be to increase the total number of tables/patrons, but rather to provide an outdoor footprint to accommodate existing capacity
    - Lighting plan
    - Portable heaters
    - Show minimum 4' wide ADA accessible pedestrian path of travel from restaurant, outdoor dining areas, sidewalks and parking areas.
3. Alcohol Beverage Control Approval (if alcohol is served outdoors)
4. COVID19 Re-Opening Form (The Appendix related to your business may be found on the LA County Department of Public Health website at <http://publichealth.lacounty.gov/media/Coronavirus/> under the "What You Should Know" section. Click the "Health Officer Order" tab and scroll down to find the Appendix related to the type of business)

## OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS AND LIMITATIONS

- Outdoor dining areas shall be limited to serving and consumption of food and nonalcoholic beverages, unless authorized otherwise by Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) with the issuance of COVID-19 Temporary Catering Authorization.
- Uses that generate excessive noise such as amplified music are not permitted in the outdoor area.
- A clear passage area on walkways, plazas or parking areas, free of all obstructions, shall be maintained at all times to avoid hazardous conditions for pedestrians.
- Under no circumstances shall a path of travel be less than four (4) feet wide.
- Outdoor dining, fitness and personal care service areas shall be fully accessible for persons with physical disabilities and provide safe passing conditions. Throughout the term of this temporary program, it shall be the business owner's responsibility to comply with all federal, state, and local laws, including but not limited to Americans with Disability Act.
- The outdoor dining, fitness and personal care service area must be located directly adjacent to the establishment.
- Any modification to the approved site plan requires submittal of a modified site plan to the Community Development Departments for review
- The only permitted furniture within the temporary outdoor service area are tables, chairs, and properly anchored umbrellas, unless specifically approved by the city. Tents, portable heaters or other structures requiring a separate permit are not permitted unless specifically approved by the City.
- The operation and use of the outdoor dining area must comply with all applicable State and local health orders including directives from CAL/OSHA.
- A copy of this permit must be kept on site at all times.
- The outdoor service area shall not operate beyond the operating hours of the establishment.
- No other uses are permitted within the temporary outdoor dining, fitness, and personal service areas; including, but not limited to, live entertainment and dancing.
- Outdoor dining, fitness and personal service areas may not encroach into drive aisles.
- Outdoor dining, fitness and personal service areas should not be placed on the site in an area that requires employees and patrons to cross active drive aisles to access the establishment.
- Furnishings shall not restrict motor vehicle sight lines.
- The encroaching furnishings shall not impede entry to the building and must not preclude applicable emergency exit requirements.
- All fences and/or enclosures should be of durable material, fire safe, structurally sound, aesthetically pleasing, and shall be easily removable and cannot exceed 3 feet in height.
- Fences and furnishing must be maintained in good condition and placed/secured in such a way so as not to impede public safety. Permanently affixed furnishings and fencing are not permitted.
- All Fire Department regulations and standards concerning exterior lighting, tents, portable heaters and power shall be met.
- Fire Department approval and permits shall be obtained for LPG heaters and open flames, including candles
- Term of Permit: This Temporary Special Use Permit is valid for a period not to exceed 60 days from full execution by the City, unless extended in writing by the City; or 15 days from the date that the restrictions pertaining to restaurant operations contained within State and Local Health Orders, as amended, are lifted, whichever occurs sooner
- Termination: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes reserves the right to terminate or temporarily suspend this permit at any time, for any reason, including but not limited to noncompliance with the terms and conditions of the permit, or the use threatens the public health, safety, and welfare, such as storm events, crowds in excess of permitted capacity, construction, and modifications to the Statewide Declaration of Public Health Emergency.



### ANIMAL OUTCOMES IN FISCAL YEAR 2019-20

On June 30, 2020, during the midst of so many changes, the County of Los Angeles Fiscal Year came to an end. Data from this past year shows that we have had **30,828** animals either adopted, rescued, reunited with their owners or, in the case of wildlife, returned to their habitats. Of the 30,000 plus animals, 17,328 were dogs and 11,721 were cats.

Each of these individual pets found their way home thanks to our dedicated staff and volunteers, our foster families, our adoption partners, and through our collaboration with our animal-loving communities. We are thankful to each person who opened their homes to welcome these companions.

As we move into the 2020-21 Fiscal Year, we recognize the challenges our communities face. On the following pages we describe how we are doing business differently to respond to these many challenges and to continue to enhance the safety of our communities for both pets and people.

## GOT KITTENS?



### KITTEN SEASON BEGINS

Kitten season is a seasonal increase in kittens being born in the community. In Southern California, this typically starts early spring and lasts into Fall/Winter. Kitten season can vary in length depending on your local climate. Milder climates like ours have a very long kitten season!

During this time of year, we always see a great surge in the number of underaged kittens that are brought to our care centers. This volume of animals far exceeds the number of foster care providers available to care for them. Underaged kittens are fragile and typically do not thrive in a shelter environment. In order to reduce the number of kittens we take in, we have initiated an educational campaign (*Got Kittens?*) to help people better understand which kittens need our help and which may not.

DACC has requested that residents who find healthy adult cats allow them to remain where they are as they may be a cat cared for by someone in the community or a neighbor's outdoor pet cat. For kittens, we are requesting that residents observe first to see whether the mother is nearby or hiding. We recommend that residents wait 4-6 hours and watch for the mother to return. Kittens have the best chance at survival when raised by their mother cat.

If the mother does not return or the kittens are in need of care, we are partnering with the community to have them foster the kittens until they are old enough to be adopted.

You can also help community cats by bringing them to a local vet to have them spayed or neutered. This not only helps curtail stray cat populations, but also provides direct health benefits to the animal being spayed/neutered.
