## SPOTLIGHT ON DAN LANDON, IT MANAGER



### How did you originally get involved in the Information Technology field?

I became a defacto "company geek" in the 90's because I liked the way technology could help business processes. In 2000, I went through Microsoft System Administration training and started volunteering for a school district, setting up computer labs, installing new software and helping in the schools. A Technician job opened up and I started getting paid for what I love to do! I have worked in school districts, a wastewater treatment center and have 7 years of City IT experience.

### After a few months on the job, what's your impression of working in RPV?

I have found everyone helpful and friendly. I love that staff are close and really embrace the "do more with less attitude."

### What IT improvements and enhancements would you like to see in the next couple of years?

The City has been working on a major technology upgrade over the last few years and I plan to keep up that momentum. We have goals adopted by the City Council that drive the strategic direction of technology, and we are working hard to implement the systems and software that will help make staff more productive, setting up systems for residents that make dealing with the City easier, and seamlessly adding solutions that promote transparency in government operations.


## SAN RAMON CANYON PROJECT RIBBON CUTTING

Under cloudy skies that seemed to gather right on cue, the San Ramon Canyon storm drain was formally opened on October 15th, on the first official day of the rainy season. At a ceremony held atop the project's inlet structure, participants marked the formal commissioning of the City's largest ever infrastructure project. After some opening remarks recounting the project's highlights and thanking those involved, the Mayor and Councilmembers led the group to the inlet of the pipe for a ribbon cutting and the ceremonial "first flows," which were delivered by buckets specially decorated for the occasion.



There were about forty guests present including RPV residents, residents of PV Shores Mobile Home Park in San Pedro, the design and construction teams and City employees. The grant manager from the California Department of Water Resources, the agency that has reimbursed the City for 50% of the costs incurred on the project, was also present from Sacramento for the occasion.

The total cost of the project was estimated to be \$18.9 million when the grant application was made three years ago. This included design and engineering, environmental work, a project to relocate a jeopardized sewer line running along the canyon edge, project management and construction of the main 54-inch drain. The construction bid price for the primary drain and ancillary work was \$15.14 million and the contract items were actually completed for less than that. This savings allowed for additional work to be done to improve drainage along the switchbacks, to rehabilitate the roadway pavement on PVDE from PVDS to Vista



Del Mar and to repair a portion of the lining of the McCarrell Canyon pipe. This re-lining work should be completed by year's end. Overall, the City was able to do much more than it planned to do, completing needed and related projects with grant assistance.

## PARKS MASTER PLAN UPDATE UNDERWAY

At its July 29, 2014 meeting, the City Council directed staff to complete an update of the City's 1989 Parks Master Plan. This update is intended to provide a comprehensive strategy for addressing the future use of the City's parks, recreation and open space resources.

The update will seek to consolidate plans that currently exist for a number of major park sites, while being consistent and in compliance with the City's General Plan and other guiding documents.

The update includes a robust public outreach component, the cornerstone of which is a series of community workshops which began in November.

## ABALONE COVE SHORELINE PARK RE-OPENS!



After being closed for the summer, a new and improved Abalone Cove Shoreline Park had a Grand Re-Opening on Saturday, October 25th. Attendees at this festive event, which was a joint effort by the City and the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy, enjoyed child-friendly crafts and activities, food trucks, kite demonstrations, nature walks, docent-led interpretive sessions, native plant workshops, and perfect weather.

The main attraction though was Abalone Cove itself. Using a mix of City funds and \$332,000 from a California State Parks Land and Water Conservation Fund competitive grant, the beloved and much-visited site had a thorough makeover. Improvements included new trails, picnic areas, viewing nodes with telescopes, interpretive

panels, a shade structure, native plant landscaping, and discovery zones. The restroom, staff building and parking lot were significantly improved as well, and an automated pay system was installed for the parking lot.

The Abalone Cove Park Improvement Project's design was aided by a focus group consisting of representatives from the City Council, Abalone Cove neighbors, former Public Use Master Plan (PUMP) Committee, Los Serenos de Point Vicente, PVP Land Conservancy, the PV Library District, the PVP School District, Terranea Resort, and MRCA Park Rangers.

## UTILITY USER TAX - REFUND COMING SOON



The City has collected a utility user tax (UUT) of 3% on water, electricity, gas, and telecommunications services since 1993. The City's voters subsequently ratified the UUT to comply with California Proposition 62 (required voter approval for general and special taxes). In 2006, the Internal Revenue Service determined that the Federal Excise Tax did not apply to most telephone billing plans and the City Council modified the UUT chapter of the City's Municipal Code to remove the reference to the Federal Excise Tax. Subsequent litigation has claimed that changes to the UUT (such as the one made by the City in 2006) also require voter approval.

Recently, the City Council suspended collection of the 3% utility user tax on telecommunications services. During the last months of 2014,

residents will notice that the UUT will no longer be included in their landline and wireless telephone service bills. Staff expects telecommunications companies will likely complete the transition by December 2014.

The City's Municipal Code provides for a one-year limit on claims for UUT tax refunds. The City is developing an easy-to-use process for resident taxpayers to receive a refund of UUT paid since August of last year through the date when the telephone service providers stop collecting UUT. Look for a notice in your mailbox soon that provides instructions for obtaining your refund. Additional information on the UUT refund claim process will also be available on the City's website.

## GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS: TIME TO RENEW YOUR ANNUAL BUSINESS LICENSE

All business activity performed within the City requires the business owner to pay a business license tax. This includes any business activity occurring within a residential area (such as a home office). Additionally, any service providers such as contractors, gardeners, or handymen, whether based in the City or not, are also required to be licensed if they provide services within the City.

Towards the middle of December, City staff will mail 2015 business license renewal applications to all currently licensed businesses. This application should be completed and returned with payment of the license tax to City Hall by January 31, 2015. Upon receiving a completed renewal application and license tax, a 2015 Business Tax Certificate will be mailed to the business. Penalties will be assessed on any license application received on or after February 1, 2015.

### HOW DO I COMPLETE A BUSINESS LICENSE APPLICATION?

The application is simple, takes only minutes to complete, and can be completed in one of two ways:

1. You can file on-line by going to the City's website and clicking on the Finance Department, and scroll down to business licenses. Then, simply follow the step by step instructions. Municipalities have a complicated IT environment. The challenge is planning for technologies tomorrow that have not been developed as we replace outdated systems today and to do it at a price point that makes sense. ### WATER CONSERVATION IN ACTION: YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

Due to severely dry conditions, Governor Brown has declared a drought emergency for California requesting all residents to reduce water usage by at least 20 percent. On July 15, 2014, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) adopted new water conservation regulations for all of California with restrictions on certain outdoor use of potable water.

#### New State water restrictions include prohibitions on:

1. Watering outdoor landscapes in a manner that causes runoff such that water flows onto adjacent streets, non-irrigated areas, private and public walkways or driveways, parking lots, or structures
2. Washing a motor vehicle, except where the hose is fitted with a shut-off nozzle
3. Washing down driveways and sidewalks
4. Operating a fountain or other decorative water feature, except where the water is part of a recirculating system

The regulations also require all water retailers to implement outdoor watering restrictions in their service areas. To comply with these regulations, the Los Angeles County Waterworks Districts have restricted outdoor water use to three days per week during the summer and two days per week during the winter.

### "NO BURN" DAYS

The South Coast Air Quality Management District will issue "No Burn Alerts" for residential fireplaces and outdoor fire pits and wood stoves when stagnant weather raises fine particulate pollution to unhealthy levels. Alerts will be issued only during winter months, from November 1st through the end of February. Residents can subscribe to these alerts at <http://aqmd.enviroflash.info>.

## CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

The City recycles Christmas trees as part of its regular green waste recycling program. No special arrangements are needed. Simply leave your Christmas tree at the curb on your regular collection day between December 26 and January 15. Remove the base, ornaments, tinsel and garland first. No need to cut the tree into smaller pieces (unless it is over 7 feet tall). Flocked trees are acceptable.

If you live in a multi-family complex, ask your Management Company or HOA about the designated drop-off location. This location is typically in the garage area or by the recycling bins.




# HOLIDAY TRASH COLLECTION SCHEDULE

**December 2014:** There is no service on Thursday, December 25, Christmas Day. Collection for Thursday and Friday routes will be delayed by one day. No delay for the Monday through Wednesday routes.

Leave all containers at the curb no later than 7:00 a.m. on collection day.



**January 2015:** There is no service on Thursday, January 1, New Year's Day. Collection for Thursday and Friday routes will be delayed by one day. No delay for the Monday through Wednesday routes.

**In accordance with the City's Municipal Code, remove all empty containers no later than 10:00 p.m. on collection day. Empty carts should not be left on the street overnight. HELP KEEP OUR CITY STREETS BEAUTIFUL!**

**Feb. & March 2015:** No changes to normal trash collection schedule

## DECEMBER FREE HOLIDAY EXCESS TRASH COLLECTION

EDCO and UWS offer free excess trash collection for three weeks during the December holiday season (December 26th to January 15th). During that time, in addition to your weekly trash placed in the gray cart, you may temporarily place excess trash in your old standard-size cans and/or in plastic bags. No loose material will be accepted. Don't forget to recycle your shipping and gift boxes, and place your gift-wrap paper in the blue cart. As for empty gift and cardboard boxes, flatten and place them in or next to your blue recycling cart(s) for collection.

### BULKY ITEM, E-WASTE & USED OIL/FILTER COLLECTION



EDCO and UWS offer customers free (limited) collection of bulky and electronic items such as sofas, TVs, computers, mattresses, desks, etc. Used oil and used oil filters are also collected on a weekly basis. Please call your hauler to arrange for a free pickup. Items left at the curb without a prior call will not be picked up. If your item is in good shape and could be re-used, please contact a charitable organization first.



**BACKYARD SERVICE:** EDCO and UWS provide backyard service to customers at an additional monthly charge. If you have physical constraints, travel out of town frequently, or have a disability, call your hauler and ask about this service.
