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CITY MANAGER

Advisory Board Recruitment (Special Vacancy– Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee): Staff is currently recruiting for one seat on the Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee. Please see the attached Press Release regarding the recruitment.

The Press Release has been sent to the Palos Verdes Peninsula News, Daily Breeze, and Los Angeles Times, and posted on the website, ListServe, Access Reader Board on Channel 35 and RPV TV Channel 33; as well as the City's Facebook and Nextdoor sites. Notices were posted in various locations throughout the City. The deadline for applications to be filed in the City Clerk's Office is by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, March 30, 2018. Staff has tentatively reserved the 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. time frame prior to the April 2018 meeting so that Council can conduct interviews of the applicants.

A Busy Week for Location Filming: The City saw a spike in location filming this week, with 4 productions in town during the first 7 days of the month (see table below).

As a reminder, there will be an item on the April 3rd City Council agenda regarding the City's film permit regulations and procedures.

Palos Verdes Reef Restoration Project: As reported last week, the State Lands Commission (SLC) adopted a Negative Declaration and approved an offshore lease for the Palos Verdes Reef Restoration Project on February 27th. Both the SLC agenda report and subsequent media reports suggested that the City and the California Coastal Commission (CCC)—along other agencies—were required to take additional action to approve this project (see attached Daily Breeze article). We have made an inquiry with SLC Staff about what specific approvals would be required of the City and CCC, but have not yet received a response.

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Notice of Intent to Circulate an Initiative Petition: A Notice of Intent to Circulate an Initiative Petition in the City was filed on February 27th. The proposed petition is an ordinance that would enact provisions with regards to personal safety and improved working conditions of employees of large hospitality employers in the City, which includes privately-owned and run hotels, golf courses, and amusement parks with 50 or more employees. Group efforts are being spearheaded by UNITE HERE Local 11.

The ballot title prepared by the City Attorney will be provided to the proponents to include in the petitions that will be circulated for signatures of support. The proponents will have until mid-July to circulate the petition and gather signatures.

In order for the initiative to qualify for an election, the proponents must obtain the signatures of at least 10% of the voters of the City. According to the last report by the County Elections Official, the number of registered voters in the City was 27,776. Therefore, the proponents need to gather at least 2,777 valid signatures to qualify the initiative for a special election in November 2018.


FINANCE

Year over Year Sales Tax Receipts by Major Category (3rd Quarter): Sales receipts from July through September 2017 were 2.8% below the same period in 2016. The City experienced a decline in the business and industry group and recent declines in fuel consumption impacted receipts from service stations. In addition, strong sales growth from specialty stores helped offset weak sales activity from the restaurants and hotels group. The graph below provides a comparison of the 2017 receipt amount generated in the 3rd quarter by major sales group to last year.

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PUBLIC WORKS

Maintenance Activities: Public Works Maintenance notified Southern California Edison/SCE of the power outage that occurred on Tuesday morning caused by a weathered and worn power cable which short circuited which resulted in the power pole to catch on fire. The replacement and repair took over eight-(8) hours to complete. The City's back-up generators did kick-in and provided the necessary power for City Hall Operations to continue as usual. The SCE Facility was inspected by their Quality Control Inspector and deemed repaired at 6:13PM via email.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Building & Safety Plan Check Counter Schedule is Changing: Beginning March 13, 2018, Building & Safety's over-the-counter plan check services will change to Tuesdays and Thursdays between the hours of 7:45 a.m. to 11:45 a.m. (the current schedule is Tuesdays and Fridays during the same hours). This change will reduce the wait time customers experience on Fridays.

General Plan Update Public Review Process Begins: In 2015, the City Council, based on the City Attorney's recommendation, directed Staff to update the technical studies related to traffic, air quality and noise before finalizing the updated General Plan. That task was completed several months ago and Staff is releasing the Final Draft this week. Based on the schedule below, the Planning Commission will consider the Final Draft of the General Plan document, including the updated General Plan Land Use Map, at its March 27th meeting. Their recommendation will be presented to the City Council at a special meeting scheduled for Thursday, April 26th.

The public notice, the final draft document, and map will be available to the public on the City's webpage (<http://www.rpvca.gov/356/General-Plan-Update>) this Thursday. The final draft reflects the Planning Commission's accepted version in 2015 with additional modifications made by Staff and the City Attorney shown in track changes. Below is the tentative schedule for the General Plan.

LAX Community Noise Roundtable: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is a member of the Roundtable, which was created to communicate adverse aircraft noise impacts on cities to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Citizens are invited to attend the next Roundtable meeting on Wednesday March 14, 2018 at 7 p.m. in the Clifton A. Moore Administration Building at 1 World Way, Los Angeles, CA 90045 (see attached parking directions). The Roundtable Chairman also sent a letter to the Mayor and City Council expressing frustration with the lack of engagement from the FAA and requested material and financial support for the autonomy and effectiveness of the Roundtable (see attached letter). Lastly, the Daily Breeze published an article describing the noise effect on residents around Hawthorne Airport after the redesign of the airspace for a satellite-based system in February 2017 called Metroplex (see attached).

South Bay Cities COG – Coyote Abatement Task Force Meeting: In response to the City's letter to Supervisor Hahn regarding the regional issues surrounding coyotes, on February 28, 2018, Staff and Mayor Brooks attended a Coyote Management Task Force meeting at the SBCCOG office in Torrance. Guest speakers included the administrators of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife's pilot program Wildlife Watch, Los Angeles County Agricultural Commissioner/Weights & Measures, and Los Angeles County Animal Services. Representatives from several South Bay cities were in attendance, including Manhattan Beach, Torrance, Hermosa Beach, El Segundo, Palos Verdes Estates, and Rolling Hills Estates. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the growing issues of urban coyotes in the different South Bay cities, and to discuss a possible regional approach with LA County Agencies to better assist with the South Bay's urban coyote problems. A future meeting to continue the discussion will be held in the upcoming months. Additionally, Staff is coordinating a meeting with County Officials and the Peninsula Cities for later this month to identify measures to improve services related to coyotes for Peninsula residents.

RECREATION & PARKS

Whale of a Day Rescheduled Due to Rain: The City's annual Whale of a Day celebration, which was scheduled for this Saturday, will be rescheduled to April 14 due to the likelihood of rain and inclement weather.

Hesse Park: The facilities are rented this week for seventeen indoor recreation classes, eight non-profit group rentals, two Peninsula Seniors activities, one City meeting, and one private rental.

Ladera Linda Park: The facilities at Ladera Linda are rented this week for several indoor recreation classes.

Ryan Park: The facilities are rented this week for three indoor recreation classes, one outdoor recreation class, eight sports league practices, and one private rental.

PVIC/Docents: Tuesday morning, the monthly docent board meeting was held in the Sunset Room. A nonprofit group has rented the room Tuesday evening. On Friday, Whale of a day setup will begin for the festival on Saturday.

Palos Verdes Nature Preserve February 2018 Activity Summary

Meetings:

- Monthly Preserve Management Meeting (Feb. 8th): PVPLC staff; Recreation & Parks, Community Development and Public Works Staff met to discuss maintenance and operational management projects and priorities.
- Volunteer Trail Watch Coordination Meeting (Feb. 28th): Volunteer Trail Watch leaders, City Staff and L. A. Co. Sheriff Deputies met to discuss public use and maintenance observations as well as to coordinate efforts.

Preserve/Open Space Staff Activities:

Public Contacts: the Preserve and Abalone Cove Park Staffs encountered many people while conducting trail patrols -

- Public Contacts: **2049** (hikers -- 1711; dog walkers -- 258; bike users – 71; equestrians -- 9)
- Public Use Issues: **82** (including dogs off leash -- 32; people off trail – 48; drone use -- 2)
- Public Information: **6** (sharing Preserve/interpretive information – 2; recommending a route -- 4)
- Public Safety: **23** (including patrons requesting directions -- 23).

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Maintenance & Operations: The Preserve and Abalone Cove Park Staffs removed numerous bags of litter picked up while hiking 150.9 miles of trail. Staff managed a Preserve rain closure on Feb. 27th and 28th. Their other activities in February included –

- Abalone Cove Reserve – cleaned graffiti off of a light fixture in the Annie's Stand area, replaced the vandalized No Littering sign at the base of Abalone Cove Tr., cleaned graffiti from the inside of the portable toilets along Sacred Cove View Tr. and removed a sleeping bag left nearby, delivered and returned tools for a volunteer event and cleared Annie's Stand area of rocks to create more docent parking spots
- Alta Vicente Reserve -- removed two protruding post bases and a line anchor from along Nike Trail, replaced the scratched Preserve Rules sign at the Prickly Pear Trailhead and picked up lots of litter there and removed a Mylar balloon from near Alta Vicente Trail.
- Aqua Armaga Reserve -- cut and removed an unused post near the Lunada Canyon Trailhead
- Filiorum Reserve -- cleared limbs blocking Eucalyptus Trail and removed litter, ground off the carvings on the log at the Kelvin Canyon Trail overlook and cut out a protruding pipe in Gary's Gulch Trail.
- Ocean Trails Reserve -- removed an outdated sign & post along Gnatcatcher Trail, installed a replacement stake & rope fence at two locations along Shoreline Park Trail for warning trail users of a drop off near those trail sections and picked up lots of construction debris blown over into the habitat near Gnatcatcher Trail.
- Portuguese Bend Reserve – repaired the rope fence along western Garden Trail, filled in a rut near the Burma Rd. gate, cleaned graffiti from the inside of the Burma Road portable toilets, cut and removed an unused wooden post along Peppertree Trail, trimmed vegetation blocking the trail marker at Landslide Scarp Trail and Burma Road., assisted volunteer efforts to repair Sandbox Trail, replaced a missing closure sign/barricade at the Sandbox Trailhead, painted over the unneeded Proceed at Your Own Risk sign at the Rim Trail upper trail closure to prevent patron confusion and filled in the rut at the Klondike Canyon Trailhead as well as the larger gully on Klondike Canyon Trail.
- San Ramon Reserve -- picked up litter around the upper trailheads
- Three Sisters Reserve – removed a discarded post tossed into the bushes at the McCarrell Canyon Trailhead
- Vicente Bluffs Reserve – cleaned graffiti off the portable toilet near the northern parking lot.

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Open Space Management regularly checks on closures of the Preserve Trails resulting from storm damage. The following trails are currently closed in the Portuguese Bend Reserve: Sandbox and Rim's lower portion. In the Abalone Cove Reserve, the following trails are closed: Sea Dahlia, Cave, Cliffside, Inspiration Point and Sacred Cove View.

Preserve/Open Space Management cooperates closely with the Public Works Department to discover, submit and complete work orders to repair problems and improve conditions in the Preserve. In February, Public Works responded to service requests for a new gate chain on the cyclone fence double-swing gate along PV Drive South at the Peppertree Trail access road, repairing scratched road signs at the upper turnout along PV Drive East in the San Ramon Reserve, repairing a broken landscape light fixture near the Burma Road gate, repairing a broken dewatering well pipe on the lower end of Water Tank Trail in Portuguese Bend Reserve, removing exposed wiring in Chapel View Trail in Abalone Cove Reserve and repairing the chain-gate downed post at the PV Drive South gravel lot near the Peppertree Trail access road.

The City's graffiti contractor responded to one incident of tagging that was reported by Open Space Management. Thank you Public Works and thank you to the Land Conservancy's Volunteer Trail Watch for being our eyes in the Preserve to help report maintenance issues.


Preserve Public Use:



State gives green light to artificial reef off the coast of Rancho Palos Verdes, but that doesn't mean it's a done deal

Despite vocal opposition, an artificial reef proposed off the coast of the Peninsula traversed its first hurdle — the first of 10 needed — this week.



On Tuesday, the California State Lands Commission approved an offshore lease sought by the Southern California Marine Institute. The institute is partnering with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Agency in hopes the reef will attract and support the marine flora and fauna which once populated the area before landslides buried the natural rocky reef.

The agencies are proposing to use 72,000 tons of rock from quarries on Catalina Island, dropped at various points along a 69-acre area of coastline between Bunker Point and White Point at a depth of 15 to 21 meters.

The Portuguese Bend Landslide, triggered by road construction on Palos Verdes Drive in 1956, buried the natural reef and released sediment through the 1990s, according to a commission staff report. In 1999, efforts to stabilize the landslide significantly slowed the sediment release, but waves continue to stir sediment and compound the problem.

Another landslide at Trump National Golf Club in 1999 buried additional reef habitat and prompted more sediment release, the staff report said.

Proponents need approval from nine additional agencies, including the California Coastal Commission and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Should they clinch them, construction could start as soon as May, said David Witting, a NOAA biologist and a leader on the project. However, a 2019 start date is more likely because weather, whale migration and lobster season limit the construction time frame to between May and September.

Residents and [environmentalists](#) say they are concerned construction could do more harm than good.

One big issue: The reef will be built 2 kilometers from the Palos Verdes Shelf Superfund site, an area where millions of pounds of toxic chemicals were dumped from the late 1940s to the early 1970s. Those chemicals — specifically DDTs, which were used as pesticides, and PCBs, which were used as flame retardants and insulators — have contaminated the coastline and harm fish and wildlife in the area.

Both substances were banned in the 1970s, but high concentrations of the chemicals remain in the Superfund site's soil. Environmentalists and opponents worry reef construction could stir up the toxic chemicals or encourage growth in a contaminated area.

"Wouldn't common sense tell you that you wouldn't want to restore habitat in an area that's contaminated like that?" said Rancho Palos Verdes Mayor Susan Brooks, who is opposed to the project in its current state.

But according to a staff report presented to the commission, the Superfund site is far away from and in much deeper water than the reef's proposed location. And, the report said, the amount of contaminants in the proposed project area is measured at only "ambient levels."

In addition, some reef construction — which will drop thousands of tons of rock into the sea — will somehow trigger another landslide. Witting said those fears are unfounded; the project site has no unstable subtidal landslides.

"The vibrations we're causing are very minor compared to the day-to-day activities of cars and construction on land," Witting said.

Yet another concern is that the reef is a temporary solution, that future landslides and sediment settlement will eventually bury it.

"The proposed project will do nothing to stop or redirect this downcoast flow of silt and sediment, which will likely result in any restored reef being quickly covered before any self-sustaining fishing habitat can be re-established," said [a letter](#) written to the commission from Brooks, representing the City Council.

But according to the staff report, the reef's tall size is intended to deter sediment from burying it. And wide sand channels will move sediment away with the currents. The reef's design mimics nearby natural reefs that survived the landslides, according to commission staffers.

Although the Rancho Palos Verdes City Council supports the project's aims, it does like the location of the proposed reef and has written two letters opposing it.

The funding for the project, which is expected to cost \$6.49 million, comes from the settlement between NOAA and the Montrose Chemical Corp., which was largely responsible for the toxic chemicals in the water. The [Montrose Settlements Restoration Program](#) has about \$15 million left in its coffers to spend on projects that restore natural resources to the areas damaged by the pollution.



DIRECTIONS TO VISITOR'S PARKING LOT



Westbound Century Boulevard (for origins east of the airport)



As you approach the airport, get into the far left lane on the lower level (Arrivals). As you cross the bridge over Sepulveda Blvd., you will see a small sign on the left-hand side for "Department of Airports Administration Building Visitors' Parking" directing you to veer to the left. Take the next turn off to the left to a stop sign. Veer to the right and drive to the Visitors' Parking Lot. At the wooden gate arm to the parking lot, push the button on the two-way intercom to request permission to park.

Southbound Sepulveda Boulevard (for origins north of the airport)



Head south on Sepulveda Blvd. and turn right into the airport by following the directional signs and remain on the lower level. Merge onto the main roadway and get into the far left lane. Immediately after passing the first parking structure on your left, Parking Structure 1, turn left at the first turnoff (Eastway). Make the next left and get in the number 2 lane (second from left). Continue heading east as if you were exiting the airport. After passing the Administration Building, turn left at the signal, where signs direct you to "Airport Return." Get into the right lane and proceed to the stop sign. Proceed through the stop sign to the Visitors' Parking Lot and stop at the gate. At the wooden gate arm to the parking lot, push the button on the two-way intercom to request permission to park.

Northbound Sepulveda Boulevard (for origins south of the airport)



Head north on Sepulveda Blvd. and get into the right-hand lane as you enter the Sepulveda Tunnel. Immediately upon exiting the tunnel, veer onto the LAX entrance ramp and follow the signs for the Arrivals Level (lower level). As you cross the bridge over Sepulveda Blvd., you will see a small sign on the left-hand side for "Department of Airports Administration Building Visitors' Parking" directing you to veer sharply to the left. Take that first road to a stop sign. Drive to the Visitors' Parking Lot. At the wooden gate arm to the parking lot, push the button on the two-way intercom to request permission to park.

Subject: Need for constituent cities and LA County to support the LAX Community Noise Roundtable in order to address FAA/NextGen/SoCal Metroplex noise problems afflicting tens of thousands of residents spread across the region's municipalities.

Dear Mayors, Council-members, and County Supervisors,

The LAX Community Noise Roundtable was created to be a problem-solving intermediary between the public, local governments, Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) which operates LAX, and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), which controls and directs all air traffic.

I am writing to you because the Roundtable is reaching a limit of its effectiveness, and needs your assistance to ensure we can address the growing airplane noise issues affecting tens of thousands of residents in our region. We need direct support and involvement from our constituent municipalities and Los Angeles County.

In letters I sent on January 17 and January 22 to a select group of local elected officials and the entire SoCal Congressional delegation, the LAX Community Noise Roundtable explained that the FAA has refused to constructively engage with us. These letters explained that the FAA has been violating its own rules and Federal law, and that the FAA has been much more responsive to some cities that have sued the FAA (e.g., Newport Beach) than it has been to the LAX Roundtable, which has sought cooperation rather than litigation.

In order to have any chance of resolving or improving these conditions, it will be necessary for local governments and our Federal elected officials to take an active role in ways they may not have done in the past.

This will require local governments and our U.S. Senators and Representatives to petition and persuade the FAA to make necessary adjustments.

It will also require direct support for the autonomy and effectiveness of the LAX Roundtable.

If the LAX Roundtable is to have any ability to function as an intermediary for the public and our constituent local governments, we need direct material and logistical support from local municipalities.

- **We need a local government entity or a group of them to hire on contract an independent professional aviation technical consultant, and to have that consultant advise the Roundtable.** This is the Roundtable's most important need. Access to a professional technical consultant's advice will also be essential to any cities, the county, or members of the Congressional delegation that try to engage the FAA in pursuit of solutions.
- **We need a local government entity to provide clerical support for the Roundtable, including mailing, copying, record keeping, audio and/or video recording of meetings, etc.** The Roundtable has no budget, no source of funds, and no staff. Until now, LAWA has served as the Secretary of the Roundtable and provided clerical support. But this arrangement, for a variety of reasons, is not ideal for LAWA or the Roundtable.

- **We need a local government to host the Roundtable's webpage on a municipal server,** give the site its own unique web address, and allow Roundtable leadership the ability to **make postings on the webpage.** Until now, LAWA has controlled the Roundtable webpage, giving it a LAWA address and holding the only access to post on the webpage.
- **It would be helpful if a municipality slightly East of LAX could supply us with a regular meeting room.** Up until now our meetings have been held at LAX. The airport has excellent facilities and we are grateful for LAWA's generosity, but the location is at the extreme Western edge of the Roundtable's territory and difficult for most Roundtable members to reach. On the other hand, meeting at LAWA is very convenient for LAWA staff, and LAWA is a member of the Roundtable with one seat on the Roundtable. We think a more balanced arrangement would be to hold the meetings in a slightly more central location, though not too far from LAX. Perhaps in Culver City or Inglewood or an adjacent part of LA City? We would need a municipality to furnish facilities and support.

Some of the problems the LAX Roundtable is trying to resolve are old and ongoing, but a great many are either new or dramatically intensified by the FAA's April 2017 implementation of the NextGen SoCal Metroplex arrival and departure flight procedures.

The negative impacts of these new flight procedures into and out of LAX traverse multiple municipalities in our region, stretching from coastal regions (Malibu down to Long Beach) inland across Los Angeles to the San Gabriel Valley in the East, and then circling back to LAX through Huntington Park, South LA, Inglewood, and neighboring cities.

The SoCal Metroplex covers an even larger region, encompassing airports from San Diego to Santa Barbara, and from the Coast inland to Ontario. For this reason, we have been working with Senator Feinstein's office and reaching out to the entire SoCal Congressional delegation.

The FAA and LAWA and many local governments direct the public to work through the LAX Roundtable to try to resolve noise complaints. This is proving to be impossible under current arrangements.

For the Roundtable to have any effectiveness it has become clear that we must have direct support from our constituent municipalities. Without that, we cannot continue to tell the public that the Roundtable has any prayer of being able to help improve the conditions under which many tens of thousands of area residents are living.

Has jet noise from Hawthorne airport increased in the past 6 months?

Roxanne Ferebee never paid much attention to whether aircraft were flying over the north Redondo Beach home where she and her husband have lived for 18 years.

Until six months ago, when something seemed to change.

Now, she says, the noise is unbearable at times. One plane after another 20 minutes apart in the morning, mostly from the Hawthorne Municipal Airport but sometimes from JetBlue flights coming out of Long Beach, pass overhead in what appear to be new flight patterns.

"It's a very piercing, whining sound," Ferebee said of the jets.

She said the noise is so bad she hasn't slept well in months. She doesn't go outside in the yard as much anymore, and it's having an effect on her well-being.

"I'm very disturbed by it. I'm stressed out. I'm anxious," Ferebee said. "I hear them in the shower, washing the dishes. I can't watch TV because I can hear it over the TV."

While complaints among her neighbors have not been widespread, enough residents have caught the attention of City Councilwoman Laura Emdee, who asked City Attorney Mike Webb to look into whether something could be done.

"We are trying to figure out our viable option, but it's just too early to say," Webb said.

In addition to potential legal action, Emdee said she was also speaking with the office of U.S. Rep. Ted Lieu's about remedies.

The Federal Aviation Administration sets flight path guidelines, such as not flying below 1,000 feet over residential areas. If pilots are violating those guidelines, then the city might have a case, Webb said. But if not, potential legal action could be limited.

"The federal government limits what cities can do when it comes to airports. We're trying to review all of that," Webb said.

In 2015, the city of Manhattan Beach examined a similar issue with flights passing low overhead after taking off at Los Angeles International Airport.

The flight pattern changes noted observed by Ferebee appear to coincide with the adoption of what's known as FAA Nextgen radar with SoCal Metroplex, which is essentially a GPS-guided system for directing airplanes in crowded airspace.

The automated system may be directing planes on a turnaround after taking off at Hawthorne airport, then heading northbound. That turnaround happens to be right over Ferebee's house off Manhattan Beach Boulevard.

"I'm going to hear it come over my house at about 1,600-feet altitude. That's very low and very noisy," said Ferebee, who's become an expert on tracking flight path data on apps such as Flight Radar.

Flipping through her phone, she revealed photos of dozens of flights overhead.

"Sometimes the loop is large and I can watch the plane make its turn from every window of the house," she said.

According to airport administrative analyst Guido Fernandez, air traffic at Hawthorne Municipal Airport has actually decreased in recent years after a high of 104,000 flights in 2015. In 2016, there were 92,000 flights and in 2017 there were even fewer, Fernandez said.

The airport, opened in 1942 and owned by the city of Hawthorne and leased to a private company to operate, has instituted noise-abatement methods such as altered recommended flight patterns. But once aircraft are off the ground, the airport has no control, Fernandez explained.

"Here and there we have a resident that might call, sometimes repeatedly," Fernandez said. "They are under the impression we can control the pilot and the aircraft, but we can't. It's like being out on the street to say you can't drive down this lane. It's a public right of way."

With Santa Monica airport reducing its runway length to disallow larger aircraft and other regional airports experiencing overcrowding, Ferebee fears Hawthorne airport only stands to get busier. It's already become a preferred take-off for private jets, she said.

In addition, CalAir flight school, which relocated from Torrance Municipal Airport to Hawthorne two years ago, recently said it was expanding.

"At some point they are going to fly over someone's home, but do we just turn into an 18-lane 405 Freeway over the house all of a sudden?" Ferebee asked. "I would like for them to stick with a flight path that's not disruptive to the community."
