March 17, 2020 Virtual City Council Meeting Follow-up

In light of the recent orders regarding the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, a decision was made to conduct the March 17 regular City Council meeting via a video teleconference (virtual meeting). In preparation for this first-ever virtual City Council meeting, the City Staff worked with Councilmembers to conduct a series of tests and a mock-up meeting. This dry run was critical to the successful outcome of the meeting and enabled the Staff to identify several possible issues that we were able to address before the scheduled meeting started and allow all participants to get comfortable with the “virtual meeting” concept.

On the day of the meeting, the plan was to have the meeting broadcast live via City’s Website and on local cable channels, but due to Granicus streaming service problems, the online stream was often stopping and buffering. It is our understanding that the difficulties with Granicus was due to a high volume of users by other government agencies along the West Coast. The local cable channel broadcast took place live with no reported issues. The public was able to participate and submit comments in real time by emailing the City Council and City Clerk using the cc@rpvca.gov email address during the meeting or by physically stopping by the Council Chambers and using the computer set up there with video and voice chat enabled. There were no comments submitted via email during the meeting, but one speaker did address the City Council remotely from Hesse Park. From a technical and procedural standpoint, the meeting was a success, with several important lessons learned and possible improvements for future instances. Staff will ensure that future videos, such as the PSA aired at the Council meeting, are loaded on the designated computer transmitting audio. Staff anticipates that the City Council meetings, as well as other City meetings, such as the Planning Commission and Finance Advisory Committee, will conduct their meetings in April using a similar virtual format.

COVID-19 Community Updates: In light of the fast evolving situation with COVID-19, daily community updates are being pushed out to listserv subscribers, and posted on the City’s various social media platforms. Below is the community update for March 18.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes continues to monitor the spread of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in Los Angeles County and would like to share the following updates with the community:

The Latest

As of March 18, there are 190 known cases of novel coronavirus across Los Angeles County, so everyone should be aware and practice social distancing. One person has died. Although there are currently no confirmed cases in the City, the public should not think one location is safer than another.

It's important to note that the total number of confirmed cases that the Department of Public Health shares every day **reflects a moment in time and may not include cases confirmed by commercial labs that have not yet been shared with the Department of Public Health.** A commercial lab may share a positive result with a physician before the health department.

Palos Verdes Golf Club Update

On March 17, the *Daily Breeze* reported that the Palos Verdes Golf Club confirmed that two of its members have tested positive for COVID-19. **The entire facility (including the clubhouse, golf course, and practice areas) is closed through March 31.**

Sheriff's Department Update

On March 17, Los Angeles County Sheriff Alex Villanueva held a telebriefing for contract cities. Below is a list of items that were discussed, as well as notes from Captain James Powers on the Lomita Station's status regarding COVID-19:

- No station personnel have tested positive for the virus.
- Patrol efforts are being increased.
- The department has added additional detectives to supplement Lomita station-wide patrol efforts. Some may be paired up with regular field personnel and are already in the field. They are focusing on high visibility, especially at grocery stores and other places where the public congregates. The purpose is to keep the peace and be available to the community.
- Captain Powers is reaching out to identify and any homebound older adults or persons with special needs to conduct patrol checks and identify needs.
- The Lomita Station is in continual contact with its department resources to develop plans to mitigate potential problems and to reach out to the community.

Senior Support

Please consider checking on your older neighbors or those with underlying health conditions. There are ways to let people know you care while keeping a safe distance (e.g., a phone call, a text, a note under their door to make sure they have everything they need). Self-isolation doesn't need to mean loneliness. Lomita Sheriff's Station deputies are available to provide a "welfare check" for seniors. Residents are encouraged to call the station's non-emergency number at 310-539-1661 if they are aware of seniors who are at risk or may need attention. We are all in this together.

Pavilions in the Peninsula Shopping Center is now offering "Senior Only" shopping hours Monday-Friday from 7 a.m. – 8 a.m.

Financial Resources for Residents Impacted by COVID-19

- **If you have had your hours cut, been furloughed, or laid off:**
 - If your employer has reduced your hours or shut down operations due to COVID-19, you can file for unemployment insurance. If you are expecting to return to your job after the dust settles, you do not have to be actively seeking new work during the outbreak. But you must be "able and available to work" to get these benefits, which generally range from \$40-\$450 per week for up to six months.

- **If you are currently sick with the coronavirus or have been exposed:**
 - Individuals who are unable to work due to having or being exposed to COVID-19 (certified by a medical professional) can file a Disability Insurance (DI) claim.
 - Disability Insurance provides short-term benefit payments to eligible workers who have full or partial loss of wages due to a non-work-related illness, injury, or pregnancy. Benefit amounts are approximately 60-70 percent of wages (depending on income) and range from \$50 - \$1,300 a week.

- **If you are caring for someone else who is sick:**
 - Californians who are unable to work because they are caring for an ill or quarantined family member with COVID-19 (certified by a medical professional) can file a Paid Family Leave (PFL) claim.

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- Paid Family Leave provides up to six weeks of benefit payments to eligible workers who have a full or partial loss of wages because they need time off work to care for a seriously ill family member or to bond with a new child. Benefit amounts are approximately 60-70 percent of wages (depending on income) and range from \$50-\$1,300 a week.

Protecting Your City from Wildfire Conference: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes continues preparing for and becoming more resilient against wildfires. The City participated in the Protecting Your City from Wildfire Conference on March 11-12, 2020 in San Diego. The Conference included discussions, seminars, and panels surrounding planning, coordinating, and investing for civic resilience to better equip our city with the tools, knowledge, and infrastructure needs to deal with wildfires and public safety power shutoffs. Those in

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attendance included wildfire affected cities throughout California, multiple fire safe councils, fire departments, California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL Fire), California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, U.S Small Business Administration, California Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development, insurance groups, industries involved in fire hardening and defensible space, and other cities around the State.

Among the many topics of discussion, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes received valuable information to further strengthen and develop mitigation efforts. These insights will assist City Staff and appropriate City committees, such as the Emergency Preparedness Committee, in planning and preparing for wildfires. Information includes fuel and vegetation modification, preparing plans and City protocols, communication with other public agencies, emergency notification systems (such as Alert SouthBay), home hardening and defensible space, United States Small Business Administration Loans, California Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development, and related fire hardening and insurance legislation.

FINANCE

PUBLIC WORKS

ALPR Cameras: The installation of the Automatic License Plate Recognition (ALPR) Cameras (Phase 1) along Western Avenue is progressing. The first streetlight poles and ALPR camera attachments have been installed at certain locations. The City and SCE are working to get these sites powered.

Arrival of Fuel Modification Goats Delayed: Due to issues related to COVID-19, the arrival of goats for fuel modification has been postponed by approximately 10 days at this time and may be delayed further. City staff is in communication with the vendor and are working to ensure that Fuel Modification remains a priority and is addressed as quickly as possible. Additionally, the Meet-the-Goats annual event scheduled for March has been canceled at this time.

New Date for EDCO Re-Route of Two Gated Areas: EDCO has requested the City to change the collection day of two gated areas, the Portuguese Bend landslide, and the Portuguese Bend Club areas. Their new trash collection days would move from Thursday to Friday of every week. EDCO anticipates the change to take place Friday, May 1, 2020 instead of previously anticipated April 3, 2020. EDCO has been servicing that area diligently since 2015. Prior to that, another hauler serviced that area. When EDCO assumed the route, they aimed at minimal distribution to services. As a result, they retained the rates, service days, and the manual backyard collection with smaller trucks. The collection date change would result in less trucks on the road on Thursdays, earlier route completion, and providing better service. There will be no other impact to the services or rates and residents will continue to receive their manual backyard collection. Staff has notified the two HOA contacts of this impending change. EDCO will send a post card in mid-April, followed by a cart/can hanger the week prior to change. Maintenance Activities: This week Public Works maintenance continues its regularly scheduled maintenance in City parks, medians and beaches by removing trash, debris, and tending to landscape throughout the City and Parks. The landscape crews also completed work along Hawthorne Blvd. from Silver Spur Rd. northern City limit blowing out and cleaning catch basins. Work along PVDE from Conestoga Dr. to Horseshoe Ln. also began this week. The median crew work along Silver Spur Rd. and applied pre-emergent to control weeds along PVDS from City limit 25th St. to Forrestal Dr. Teams also started working along PVDW right-of-way from Hawthorne Blvd. to the City limit. Several park irrigation systems were repaired that included, PVIC, Calle Entradero Butterfly Walkway, Ryan Park, and Ladera Linda.

With the recent round of storms, PW has been busy clearing branches from the right-of-ways and roadways. Tree branches were removed along Palos Verdes Drive East, Miraleste Dr., Via Colinita, and Ravenspur Dr. PW also continues to provide sandbags and sand for RPV residents at City Hall to help shore up residential property.

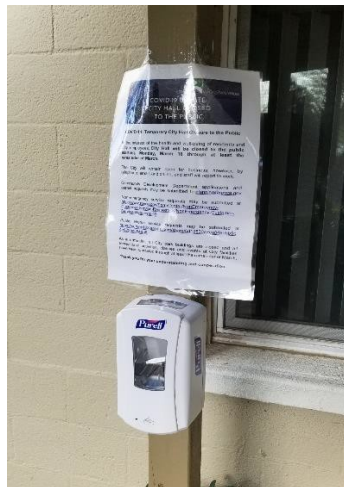
Lastly, the PW Department continues to respond to emergency calls during regular business hours and after hours. In light of the recent health concerns, your Public Works Department has been hard at work minimizing the community's and City employees exposure to virus. PW in the recent days has increased the frequency and stepped up cleanings and sanitation of public restrooms and facilities. PW is not just utilizing cleaners and disinfectants but also

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steam cleaning and high water pressure cleaning methods to kill hard surface bacteria. The Public Works Department has also installed temporary handwashing stations at every city facility that utilizes soap and water to allow visitors to sanitize their hands easily without having to go indoors. PW, along with the rest of the City of RPV staff and employees, continue to work hard to address and help contain emergency issues at hand.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

2020 Peafowl Census: Pursuant to the City's Peafowl Management Plan, each year the City is required to conduct a census survey to assess the current peafowl population trends in the City, and based on past census reports, determine whether trapping should resume. This year's peafowl census survey began on March 15, 2020 and is being conducted by Wildlife Services. The census is being conducted based on two types of observations, which include counting roosting peafowl in trees at sunrise, and using a systematic grid pattern during the late afternoon to evening hours. Staff anticipates that the census survey will be completed by the end of the month. The results of the census count, when available, will be reported to the City Council.

Addressing Abandoned Properties Training: On March 12, 2020, Code Enforcement Staff attended an informative roundtable discussion and training in the City of Eastvale, titled, "Tackling Abandoned Properties with Missing or Deceased Owners." The topics covered in the training included, an understanding of the different types of receivership and the best approaches to find absent or deceased property owners. The training also provided information on the legal procedures and requirements for the appointment of a receiver and an overview of the duties of a receiver. Staff will utilize the information collected at the training to help address associated abandoned property issues within the City.

Las Candalistas' Spring Fundraiser at the Point View Property Canceled: On March 5, 2020, the Director of Community Development issued a notice informing the public of a Special Use Permit request to allow Las Candalistas to host their annual Spring Fundraiser on Thursday, April 23 on the Point View property located at 6001 Palos Verdes Drive South. On March 17, 2020, the Planning Division received a notice from representatives of Las Candalistas, which informed Staff that the event was being postponed as a result of recent regulations set forth by federal, state and local authorities to combat the spread of the coronavirus (COVID-19). Tentatively, the event has been rescheduled to May 28 and a new public notice will be issued when the rescheduled date has been confirmed.

LAX Community Noise Roundtable March 11 2020 Meeting Summary: At this month's meeting, the Roundtable Facilitator presented a summary of 11 proposed federal bills to Roundtable members (Attached). These proposed bills are designed to provide additional reporting on environmental impacts, increasing community involvement and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) transparency. The Roundtable will be monitoring these bills as they move through the legislative process. The Roundtable was also given an update on the City of Los Angeles' lawsuit against the FAA. This lawsuit involves the dispute concerning noisy arrival flights to LAX over the communities of Mid-City, West Adams and Central Los Angeles. On February 26, 2020, the L.A. City Attorney filed a motion requesting the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals to grant the City's case and suspend the existing flight path over the aforementioned communities until the FAA completes an environmental review. The motion asks the Court to make a decision now instead of waiting months for all the parties to submit their full merit briefings. If the motion is denied, the L.A. City Attorney is still able to proceed and both parties would then submit their full merits briefing to the Court at a later date. Staff will continue to monitor this case as it continues through the legal process. Lastly, the Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) staff provided an update on over-ocean operations, which are

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normal, noise-reduction flight operations that occur over the ocean between midnight to 6:30 a.m. The City of Rancho Palos Verdes (RPV) is not affected by this operation because the passenger jet flightpath departing southbound from LAX remains on an established route that takes it offshore to east and northeast destinations.

Routinely, LAWA staff provides the City of RPV with statistical updates on vectored passenger jet Peninsula overflights. The attached chart is the update period from January 1, 2020 to February 29, 2020, showing a decrease of 109 passenger jet Peninsula overflights since their last reporting period in December 2019. March 24th Planning Commission Meeting Canceled: Based upon the most-recent direction and recommendations from county, state and federal officials regarding COVID-19, the March 24th Planning Commission meeting has been canceled (Attached). RECREATION & PARKS

Closure of Park Buildings and Cancellation of Recreation Classes: Effective Saturday, March 14, 2020, the following will be implemented for the remainder of March:

- Hesse, Ryan, Ladera Linda, PVIC closed their doors to the public. All programs and events have been cancelled through the end of March. Renters have the option of receiving a refund or changing their date of event to the future. The gates and parking lots to all the facilities remain open as usual. Closure information has been posted on the doors and kiosks.
- Abalone Cove will assume usual operations.
- Those facilities with outdoor restrooms remain open. DPW increased the frequency of cleaning visits to those facilities.
- Dog parks at City Hall and Eastview remain open.
- All volunteer events, outdoor programming, and special events in the month of March have been cancelled. Other future events will be discussed and reassessed next week.
- City Hall reception staff remain on site to answer inquiries from the public and direct them to the appropriate Departments.

As it pertains to staffing, with facilities not serving the public, DRP has reduced staff presence, but there is still a staffing presence at these facilities.

Situation Summary:	The City of Rancho Palos Verdes continues to monitor the spread of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in Los Angeles County. The City has activated its Emergency Operations Center at Level 3, the lowest level of activation, in order to maintain continuous communication with government agencies, the City Council, and the community.
Significant Events:	▪ March 13 - the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District confirmed that a parent of students at Silver Spur Elementary School and Valmonte Early Learning Academy reported testing positive for COVID-19, but stated the case has not been confirmed by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, nor the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. ▪ March 14 - the City activated its Emergency Operations Center at Level 3, the lowest level of activation remotely staffed by Ara Mihranian, Kit Fox & Jesse Villalpando. ▪ March 15 - all City park buildings are closed and all recreational activities, classes and events at City facilities have been canceled through at least the remainder of March. ▪ March 16 - Board, Committee and Commission meetings have been canceled for the remainder of March ▪ March 16 - Los Angeles countywide directive ordering all bars, clubs, theaters, entertainment centers, and fitness centers to be closed until further notice. BACKGROUND:

The disease caused by novel coronavirus, currently designated COVID-19, was first detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province in China in December 2019. Since then, on January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared COVID-19 a public health emergency of international concern. On January 31, 2020, United States Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared this global outbreak a public health emergency for the United States. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced on February 25, 2020, that community spread of COVID-19 is likely to occur in the United States.

The State of California proclaimed a State of Emergency on March 4, 2020. On that same day, the County of Los Angeles declared a Local Health Emergency. On March

12, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-25-20, declaring that state and local public health officials may, as they deem necessary in the interest of public health, issue guidance limiting or recommending limitations upon attendance at public assemblies, conferences, or other mass events, which could cause the cancellation of such gatherings through no fault or responsibility of the parties involved, thereby constituting a *force majeure*. On March 13, 2020, President Trump declared a National State of Emergency.

As of March 15, 2020, the WHO reported that, to date, there were 153,648 confirmed cases of COVID-19, 5,746 of which resulted in death, across 146 countries. On March 15, 2020, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) reported that, to date, California has 247 confirmed cases of COVID-19, five of which have resulted in death. CDPH also reported that approximately 11,400 Californians who returned to the United States after travel are self-monitoring. The CDC anticipates that widespread transmission of COVID-19 in the United States will occur.

As of the preparation of this report, there is one suspected or presumptive (but not yet confirmed) case of COVID-19 on the Palos Verdes Peninsula. The City's proposed actions will provide the City additional powers to coordinate local efforts and identify and procure resources needed to effectively address the emergency as needed. COVID-19 is a serious public health threat as it is highly contagious and may be spread by asymptomatic individuals.

Much is unknown about the nature of the virus such as the exact modes of transmission, the factors facilitating human-to-human transmission, the extent of asymptomatic viral shedding, mutations, basic reproduction number, and the case fatality rate. Experts disagree about the incubation period and appropriate quarantine period. Additionally, there is currently no vaccine to prevent COVID-19 or specific antiviral treatment that has been found to be effective.

What is known at this time is that the virus is spread between people primarily via respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Symptoms of the virus include fever, cough, and shortness of breath, and infected individuals have experienced a range of outcomes, from mild sickness to severe illness. Based on experience with other coronaviruses that cause severe respiratory illness, the CDC currently believes that symptoms appear two to 14 days after exposure. While the vast majority of individuals (approximately 87 to 98 percent) will have mild to no symptoms, or will eventually recover if they do become significantly ill, a small portion of those infected—about two to three percent—will become severely ill, and may result in death.

Due to the risk to the health, safety and welfare of residents of Rancho Palos Verdes from COVID-19, Staff is requesting the City Council declare the existence of a local emergency pursuant to the Government Code section 8630, and Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code Chapter 2.24.

DISCUSSION:

Government Code §8558 defines a local emergency as “the duly proclaimed existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the territorial limits of a county, city and county, or city, caused by conditions such as air pollution, fire, flood, storm, **epidemic** (emphasis added), riot, drought, ... or other conditions, other than conditions resulting from a labor controversy, which are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of that political subdivision and require the combined forces of other political subdivisions to combat.” (Emphasis added.) Section 2.60.20 of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code (RPVMC) defines “Emergency” in a substantively similar manner.

Under Government Code §8630, the City Council can proclaim the existence of a local emergency. Under RPVMC §2.24.060, the City Manager as the Director of Emergency Services, may request the City Council to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of a local emergency if the City Council is in session, or to issue such proclamation if the City Council is not in session. On March 14, 2020, the City Manager activated the City’s emergency operations center (EOC) at Level 3, the lowest level of activation.

Once the existence of a local emergency is proclaimed, neighboring jurisdictions and the State have the power to provide mutual aid to address the emergency conditions. Staff understands that most of our neighboring Peninsula cities have already or intend to declare local emergencies. Pursuant to Government Code §8630, once proclaimed, the City Council is required to review the need for continuing the local emergency at least every 60 days until the local emergency is terminated, and must proclaim the termination of the local emergency at the earliest possible date that conditions warrant. Currently, the Governor’s March 4, 2020, declaration of a State of Emergency waived the 60-day review requirements.

The proclamation recommended in this agenda report will enable the City to more effectively respond to the potential outbreak, put in place a framework that supports the continuity of essential public safety services, seek and utilize mutual aid, potentially obtain reimbursement for expenses incurred to address the pandemic, and ensure the City has all available tools at its disposal to keep the community safe.

ALTERNATIVES:

In addition to the Staff recommendation, the following alternative action is available for the City Council’s consideration:

1. Los Angeles County has already declared the existence of a County-wide Local Emergency. The City Council could if it wished, pursuant to Government Code §8630, simply operate under the County’s declaration of emergency. However, a City declaration of emergency increases the likelihood of federal or state reimbursement of expenditures incurred to mitigate the emergency.

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
RANCHO PALOS VERDES, DECLARING AND
PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY IN RESPONSE TO
COVID-19**

WHEREAS, in December, 2019, an outbreak of respiratory illness due to a novel coronavirus (COVID-19) was first identified in Wuhan City, Hubei, Province, China; and,

WHEREAS, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) considers COVID-19 to be a very serious public health threat with outcomes ranging from very mild (including some with no reported symptoms) to severe, including illness resulting in death; and,

WHEREAS, according to the CDC, there is no vaccine to prevent COVID-19 and there is no specific antiviral treatment recommended for COVID-19 at this time; and,

WHEREAS, on January 30, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern over the global spread of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19); and,

WHEREAS, on January 31, 2020, Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a Public Health Emergency for the United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to COVID-19; and,

WHEREAS, the California Department of Public Health has activated its Medical and Health Coordination Center, and the Office of Emergency Services recently activated the State Operations Center to provide support and guide actions to preserve public health; and,

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom declared a State of Emergency for the State of California; and,

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the County of Los Angeles declared a Local Health Emergency in response to increased spread of COVID-19; and,

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the WHO characterized COVID-19 as a "pandemic"; and,

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-25-20 regarding COVID-19; and,

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, President Trump declared a National State of Emergency in response to increased spread of COVID-19; and,

WHEREAS, there is one suspected (but as-yet-unconfirmed) case of COVID-19 on the Palos Verdes Peninsula, COVID-19 is easily transmissible from person to person and, as of March 15, 2020, has spread globally to over 146 countries and territories, has infected more than 153,000 individuals and killed more than 5,700 individuals per the WHO; and,

WHEREAS, it is imperative to prepare for and respond to suspected or confirmed COVID-19 cases within the City, and to prepare to respond to an increasing number or individuals who may require medical care; and,

WHEREAS, strict compliance with certain Municipal Code and other City regulations would prevent, hinder, or delay appropriate actions to prevent and mitigate the effects of the COVID-19, which issue cannot be timely addressed absent a declaration of emergency; and,

WHEREAS, per Government Code §8630 a declaration of a local emergency shall not remain in effect for a period in excess of seven days unless it has been ratified by the City Council; and,

WHEREAS, Section 2.24.050 of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code appoints the City Manager as Director of Emergency Services, and empowers the Director request the City Council to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of a local emergency if the City Council is in session, or to issue such proclamation if the City Council is not in session; and,

WHEREAS, on March 14, 2020, the City Manager activated the City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at Level 3, the lowest level of activation; and,

WHEREAS, out of an abundance of caution to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community, the Director of Emergency Services requested the City Council to proclaim a local emergency due to the public health threat caused by COVID-19.

WHEREAS, during the existence of the local emergency, and along with all State and County first response resources, all City first response resources, vehicles, and services shall be given first priority from shopkeepers and businesses located within the City, including, but not limited to, water, fuel and gasoline

NOW, THEREFORE, THE RANCHO PALOS VERDES CITY COUNCIL HEREBY RESOLVES, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property have arisen within the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, caused by the effects of COVID-19.

SECTION 2. The aforementioned conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation of the existence of a local emergency by the City, as the

means to resolve the conditions of extreme peril will probably exceed the capability of the City.

SECTION 3. The City Council does hereby declare and proclaim the existence of a local emergency.

SECTION 4. During the existence of such local emergency, the powers, functions, and duties of the City Manager as Director of Emergency Services and the Disaster Council of this City shall be those prescribed by State Law, Chapter 2.24 of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code, and ordinances and resolutions of this City, and approved plans of the City in order to mitigate the effects of the local emergency.

SECTION 5. In addition to the powers, functions, and duties already prescribed above, the Council desires to make clear the powers, functions, and duties include:

(a) As necessary for the public health, life, and property, entering into contracts to arrange for the procurement of materials, goods, and services needed to assist in preparing for, containing, responding to, mitigating the effects of, and recovering from the spread of COVID-19.

(b) Applicable provisions of the Government Code and the Public Contract Code, including but not limited to travel, advertising, and competitive bidding requirements, as well as any City procurement or related policy, are suspended to the extent reasonably necessary to address the effects of COVID-19.

(c) The Emergency Services Director is expressly authorized to assist with any lawful order, including the enforcement of an order of quarantine or curfew, as well as ordering potentially ill City employees to leave the workplace, authorizing certain City employees to work remotely, taking steps to limit non-essential contact by City employees, etc., to address the effects of COVID-19.

(d) The Emergency Services Director is expressly authorized at his or her discretion to invoke force majeure clause on any City agreements or obligations, to the extent reasonably necessary to address the effects of COVID-19.”

SECTION 6. The local emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until its termination is proclaimed by the City Council.

SECTION 7. The Government Code § 8630 requirement that the Council review of the need for continuing the local emergency at least once every 60 days until the City Council terminates the local emergency has been waived for the duration of the statewide emergency declared by Governor Newsom. In the event this declaration of local emergency extends for more than the duration of the statewide emergency declared for COVID-19, City Staff are directed to thereafter return this item for Council review of the need for continuing the local emergency at least once every 60 days until the City Council terminates the local emergency.

SECTION 9. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution.

H.R.5105 Responsive Employees Support Productive Educated Congressional Talk Act (RESPECT)

- *“To require the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to respond to requests for information from Members of Congress, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representatives Harley Rouda (D-CA-48), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), and Judy Chu (D-CA-27)
- Would require:
 - FAA staff to answer questions submitted in writing by Members of Congress relating to flight procedures, or other data affecting their district within 90 days including:
 - Any data that are appropriate to provide to people from airports, airlines, procedure proponents, aviation roundtables, and non-FAA staff
 - Appropriate requests via Freedom of Information Act (FOIA)
 - FAA staff to appear at meetings or town halls with a Member of Congress with 30 days notice and under same conditions as aviation roundtable appearances
- If enacted, the FAA Administrator must inform Member of Congress if data are not sent, or if FAA staff do not attend meetings; and provide justification
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Direct – requires FAA to respond to roundtables



H.R.5106 Restore Everyone's Sleep Tonight (REST)

- *“To amend title 49, United States Code, to allow airports to impose an access restriction for certain hours, to assess certain penalties against air carriers or aircraft operators, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representatives Harley Rouda (D-CA-48), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), Brad Sherman (D-CA-30), and Judy Chu (D-CA-27)
- Would allow airports to voluntarily impose curfews under specific circumstances, at any time between 10 pm and 7 am, and permit penalties for curfew violations
 - Exceptions for emergencies, public safety, and other circumstances
 - Notes:
 - 1-Penalties themselves are loosely defined: *“...shall set a base level for a noise deterrence penalty, at an amount sufficient to deter future violations of the access restriction imposed under subsection a.”*
 - 2-Penalties could be increased based on noise monitoring at an airport
- Would amend or supersede:
 - The Airport Noise Control Act (ANCA) of 1990
 - The Notice and Approval of Airport Noise and Access Restrictions under Title 14 of the Code of Federal Regulations Part 161
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Direct – allows airports, such as LAX, to impose access restriction/curfew



H.R.5107 Serious Noise Reduction Efforts Act (SNORE)

- *“To amend title 49, United States Code, to establish a program at San Francisco International Airport for purposes of soundproofing residential buildings in surrounding communities.”*
 - No support from Los Angeles Metropolitan Area Representatives
- Would expand the amount of funds available to San Francisco International Airport (SFO) for sound insulation projects that are beyond the current 65 DNL contour
- Would establish a program at SFO to sound insulate 200+ homes per year in noise affected communities
 - Would include any area where 10 or more measurements of ≥ 75 dB are taken in the window of 10pm-7am within a single city/community in 2 consecutive or nonconsecutive months of a given year resulting from SFO operations
- The airport would need to submit plan as a condition to get access to the funds
- If SFO did not noise mitigate 200+ facilities, they would be penalized and owe noise affected communities for this discrepancy if they had accepted the funds
- Potential effect at LAX
 - None – as written, the proposed legislation is specific to SFO



H.R.5108 Southbound HUSSH & NIITE Help Households (SHHH)

- *“To require the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to continue processing the proposed SFO NIITE Departure Southbound Transition and the OAK HUSSH Departure Southbound Transition, and for other purposes.”*
 - No support from Los Angeles Metropolitan Area Representatives
- Would support formally initiating and continuing the standard processing of the proposed San Francisco International Airport (SFO) NIITE Departure Southbound Transition and the Oakland International Airport (OAK) HUSSH Departure Southbound Transition
- FAA would provide staffing and support to SFO Roundtable, would not prohibit them from formally initiating the procedures, would let Roundtable representatives participate in relevant PBN committees, and would require FAA to follow standard PBN process without adding onerous requirements or withholding permissions
- FAA administrator would submit to relevant congressional committees reports on the following deadlines
 - 60 days after the enactment of this act if NIITE and HUSSH have not been entered into IFP Gateway
 - After entry of the proposed procedures into IFP Gateway:
 - 90 days- if NIITE and HUSSH have not completed Order JO7100.41 Phase One Preliminary Activities
 - 180 days- if they have not completed Order JO7100.41 Phase Two Design Activities
 - 2 years- if they have not been fully implemented by publication and use of the Southbound Transitions
- FAA to provide formal support to SFO; Doesn't mention specific support to OAK, but like H.R. 5110 (APPRISE), would permit technical representatives from roundtables to participate in committees on procedure development
- Potential effect at LAX
 - None – as written, the proposed legislation is specific to SFO and OAK



H.R.5109 - Fairness in Airspace Includes Residents Act (F-AIR)

- *“To amend title 49, United States Code, to expand the priorities of the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration in developing plans and policy for the use of the navigable airspace.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representative Harley Rouda (D-CA-48), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), and Judy Chu (D-CA-27)
- This bill would be an amendment and reprioritization of the FAA’s mission statement
 - Safety would remain the first priority
 - Secondary priorities would put noise and health impacts (and other environmental concerns) on an equal footing as efficiency
- Provisions also would direct the FAA to develop expanded plans and policies for use of airspace
 - *“No later than 12 months of enactment, the administrator would review FAA policies, procedures, and regulations to ensure they reflect the updated mission.”*
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Indirect – relates to national policy on assigning priorities when modifying airspace



H.R.5110 All Participating in Process Reaching Informed Solutions for Everyone (APPRISE)

- *“To direct the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to ensure representatives of aviation roundtables may participate in the NextGen performance-based navigation implementation process of the Federal Aviation Administration, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representative Harley Rouda (D-CA-48), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), and Judy Chu (D-CA-27)
- Would require the FAA to include an aviation roundtable technical representative in the procedure design process for procedures affecting their communities (within 5 miles of the jurisdictional area of the roundtable)
 - To ensure community knowledge and input is represented in the design process
- Roundtable technical representatives would participate on the same terms and conditions as representatives from airports, airlines, and procedure proponents
- Timeline if enacted:
 - No later than 180 days after enactment of this bill, FAA administrator would need to submit a report demonstrating progress made in meeting the bill’s requirements
- Technical representative is not defined, so it could be a consultant hired on the Roundtables behalf or direct member of the roundtable membership
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Direct – requires the FAA to allow roundtables participation in the implementation process



H.R.5111 Notify Officials To Inform Fully and Impel Educated Decisions Act (NOTIFIED)

- *“To require the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to notify the public of proposed new Performance Based Navigation Implementation Process flight procedures, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representatives Harley Rouda (D-CA-48), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), and Judy Chu (D-CA-27)
- Regarding new and modified flight paths proposed through FAA’s Performance Based Navigation process
- The FAA would have to notify all relevant Local/State/Federal representatives and Aviation Roundtables within 5 miles of the flight path for changes to airspace under 18,000 ft.
 - Notification would be made within 30 days of entry of the procedure on the FAA Performance Based Navigation IFP Gateway
- Notification process would include:
 - Procedures being proposed/changed
 - The new flight path displayed geographically with shifts
 - Altitudes
 - Appropriate contact information for discussing the change.
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Direct – requires the FAA to notify roundtables



H.R.5112 Low-frequency Energetic Acoustics and Vibrations Exasperate (LEAVE)

- *“To establish that no Federal statute is intended to preempt a cause of action against an airport maintained in any State small claims or superior court by any individual or city within 5 miles of an airport when an action is brought for noise or nuisance caused by ground-based noise in violation of a State statute as specified, and for other purposes.”*
 - No support from Los Angeles Metropolitan Area Representatives
- As an airplane leaves from an airport, its takeoff generates significant amounts of ground-based low-frequency noise and vibration impacting residents in the vicinity
 - Airborne flight noise is well defined, but not so for low-frequency noise and vibration caused by airplane on the runway for take-off
- The bill would lead to the establishment of standards and remedies related to ground-based noise (GBN)
- Would also allow states to study GBN and subsequently take action against airports shown to have exceeded standards and have caused substantial negative community impact and devaluation of property values
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Unclear – as written it is uncertain whether a uniform standard for airports would be established



H.R.976 / S.2506 Air Traffic Noise and Pollution Expert Consensus Act of 2019 (ATNPEC)

- *“To direct the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to enter into appropriate arrangements with the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine to provide for a report on the health impacts of air traffic noise and pollution, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representatives Julia Brownley (D-CA-26), Judy Chu (D-CA-27), Brad Sherman (D-CA-30), Grace F. Napolitano (D-CA-32), Ted Lieu (D-CA-33), Raul Ruiz (D-CA-36), Karen Bass (D-CA-37), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), Alan S. Lowenthal (D-CA-47), Harley Rouda (D-CA-48), and Mike Levin (D-CA-49)
- Currently identical legislation language submitted in The House (H.R. 976), and Senate (S.2506)
- Would commission the Administrator of the FAA to work with the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine to draft a report summarizing the current consensus/state of science surrounding the health impacts of air traffic noise and pollution
 - The FAA would convene a panel of experts no later than 30 days of enactment
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Indirect – results would report state of science of health effects

H.R.2351 Protecting Airport Communities from Particle Emissions Act (PACPE)

- *“To direct the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to conduct a study relating to ultrafine particles, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representatives Ted Lieu (D-CA-33), and Karen Bass (D-CA-37)
- Would commission the Administrator of the FAA to work with the National Academy of Sciences to summarize literature and studies on ultrafine particles(UFPs), focused specifically on large hub commercial airports
- Specifically would look into:
 - Characteristics, sources, and distributions of UFPs
 - Resulting potential health impacts and exposure burdens
 - More sustainable aviation fuels are affecting UFPs
 - Information gaps in UFP pollution exposure and mitigation effectiveness
- A report on the study would be submitted no later than 2 years after funding and contractual agreements have been set up between the FAA and NAS
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Direct – specifically includes “the Southern California Metroplex”



H.R.5874 Decrease Noise Levels Act (DNLA)

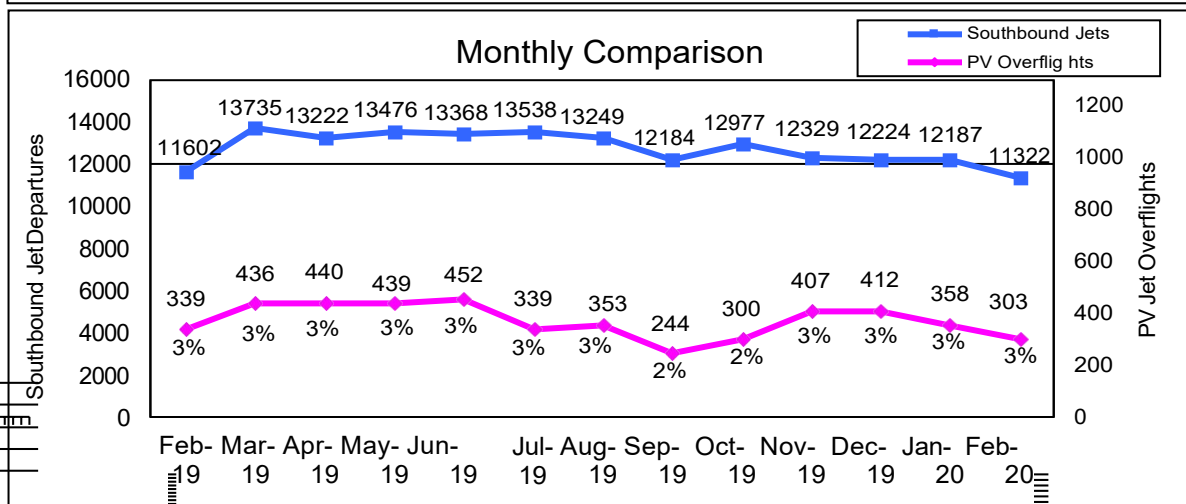
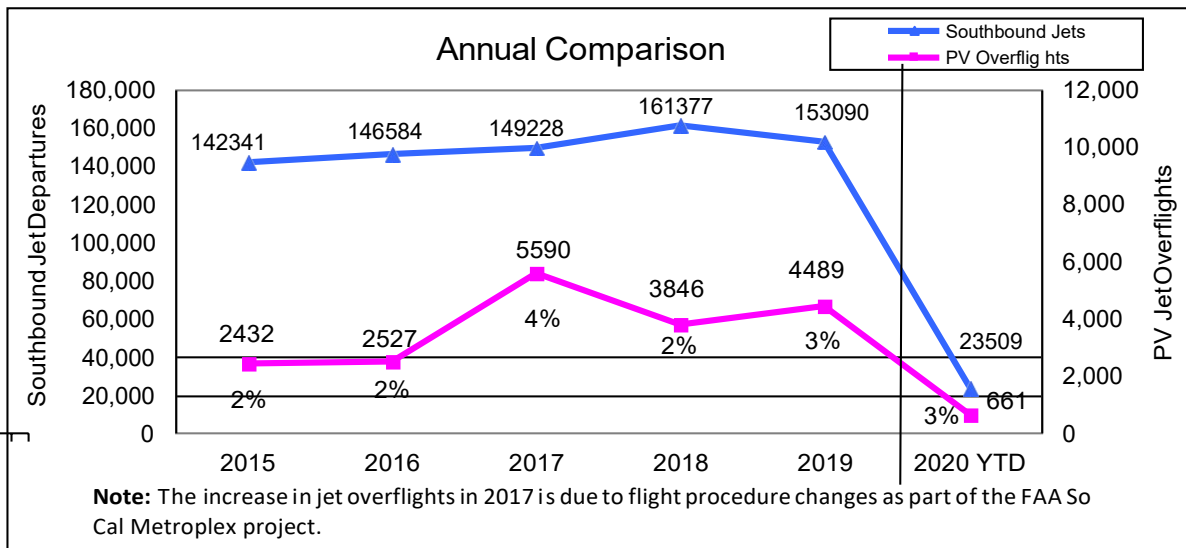
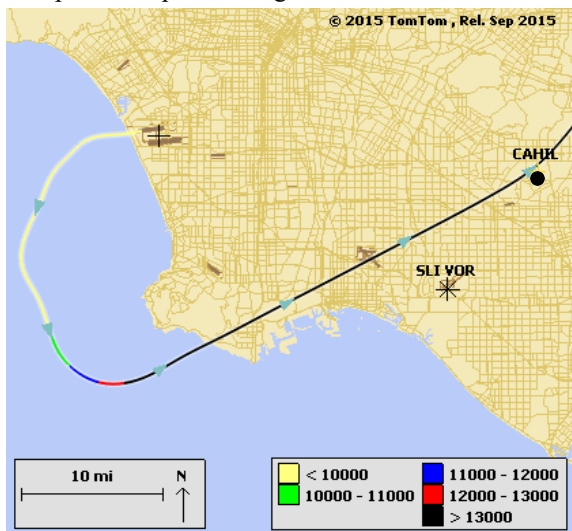
- *“To require the Administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration to amend regulations concerning the day-night average sound level, and for other purposes.”*
 - Co-sponsored by Representatives Julia Brownley (D-CA-26), Judy Chu (D-CA-27), Adam B. Schiff (D-CA-28), Brad Sherman (D-CA-30), Norma K. Torres (D-CA-35), Maxine Waters (D-CA-43), and Harley Rouda (D-CA-48).
- Would require the Administrator of the FAA to amend the Airport Noise Compatibility Planning, under Title 14 of the Code of Federal Regulations Part 150, to decrease the threshold for the Day-Night Average Sound Level (DNL) to constitute significant noise from 65 to 60, and adjust relative ranges of DNL accordingly
- Would require outreach to communities that would also include the results of the evaluation of alternative metrics to the current DNL standard under section 188 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2018.
- A report from the FAA would be due 365 days after enactment outlining a strategy to reduce the maximum DNL in all residential areas to 55 over the 10 years following date of enactment of the act
- Potential effect at LAX
 - Direct – reduces the threshold for compatible land use from 65 to 60 and then 55 DNL for all airports



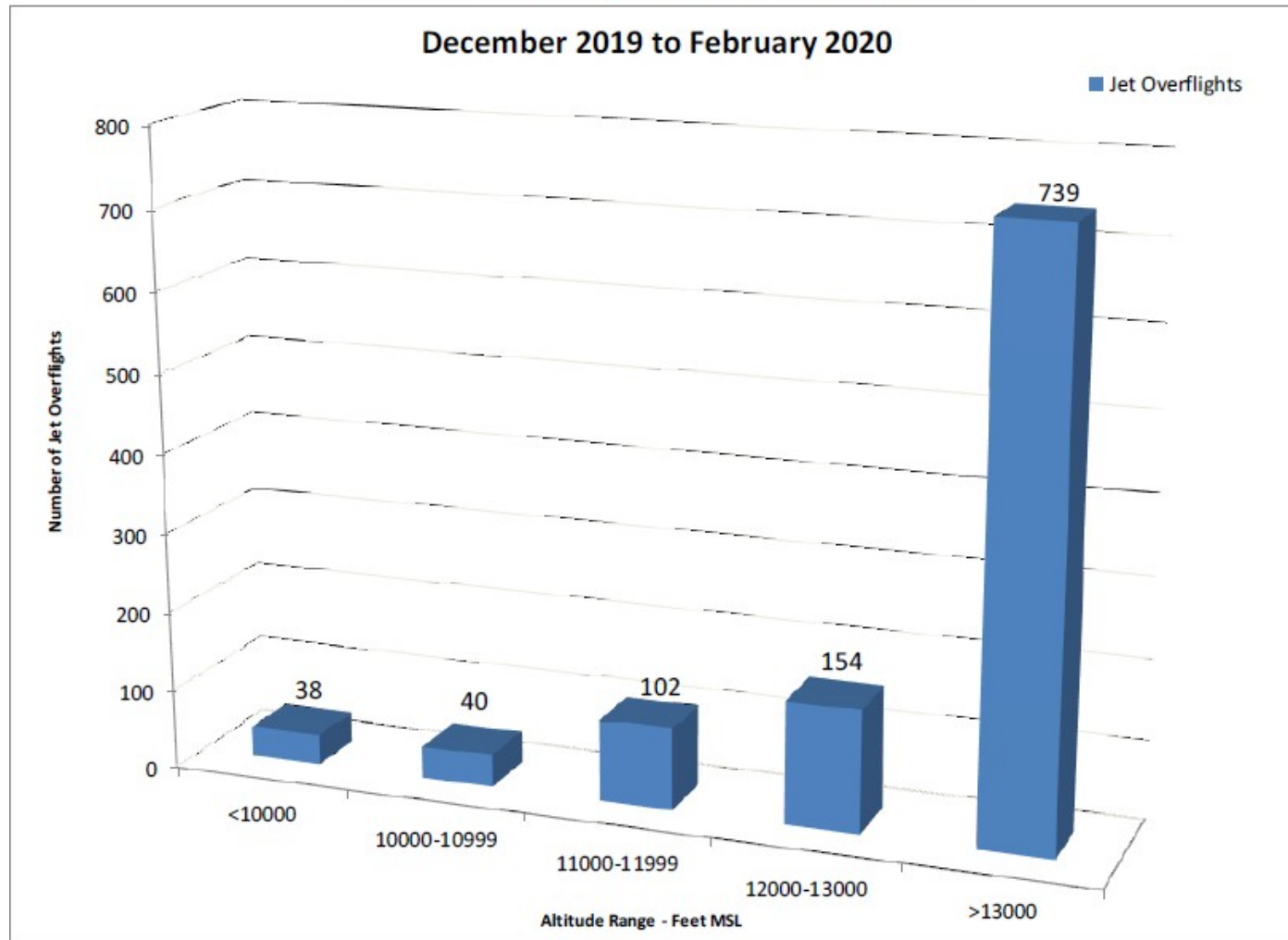
Palos Verdes Peninsula – Jet Overflights
