### **Veterans Day Flag Displays**

The Recreation and Parks Department coordinated the installation of U.S. Flags around the City to honor Veterans this week. Flags were installed at several intersections and Recreation and Parks staff placed small flags along Hawthorne Blvd. at Hesse Park, Ryan Park, and Upper Point Vicente/Civic Center. The flags will be displayed all week.





## RPV Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Surprise Exercise



On November 11, 2020, Staff participated in a hybrid (in-person and virtual) EOC Surprise Exercise. This year's unannounced exercise scenario was based on a brushfire in the South West portion of the Forrestal Nature Reserve.

The exercise was held from 9:00 am to 11:00 am and was conducted with no advanced notice to City Staff to assess our readiness in the event of a real emergency. Upon the announcement of the simulated brushfire, City Staff acted fast in setting up the City's

EOC, drafting public messages, deploying resources, and mapping the reported damage area as the simulated emergency scenario unfolded. Faced with a flood of conflicting information, City Staff experienced what a developing emergency is like and exercised their roles in responding to it. This exercise helped Staff identify training, equipment, and logistical opportunities to improve the City's ability to respond in a disaster.

The City Council, Fire Chief Hale, and Lomita Station Captain Powers were informed of this exercise, and some participated in the simulated incident.

The objectives of this exercise were the following:

- 1) Demonstrate the ability of employees staffing EOC workstations and reviewing position descriptions and checklists without advance notice.
- 2) Demonstrate the use of the City's Emergency Operations Plan and EOC Section Plans.
- 3) Conduct a baseline assessment of current emergency response capabilities and readiness.
- 4) Identify recommendations for improvements to current emergency response protocols.

As in past exercises, Staff rose to the occasion and delivered an excellent performance and plans on maintaining and/or exceeding that record next year. This surprise exercise was only the first in a series of emergency preparedness trainings that the City of Rancho Palos Verdes Emergency Services Coordinator, Jesse Villalpando, will hold to enhance City Staff training to help keep the City safe in an emergency.

## Help Document the King Tides November 15-16

The California Coastal Commission is calling on the public to help photograph upcoming King Tides for the [California King Tides Project](#).

A “King Tide” is a non-scientific term used to describe very high tides caused when there is an alignment of the gravitational pull between sun, moon, and Earth. When King Tides occur during floods or storms, water levels can rise higher and have the potential to cause great damage to the coastline and coastal property.

Documenting these tides helps us preview the impacts of sea-level rise and understand how our shoreline is affected by high water today.

**The next King Tides will arrive on November 15-16.** If you're able to safely take photos at the coast during King Tides you will be contributing to an important community science effort. ## COVID-19 Cases

As of November 10, there are 325,876 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across Los Angeles County (population 10.17 million), including the South Bay, so the public should not think one location is safer than another, and everyone should be aware and practice

physical distancing. The total includes 367 cases in Rancho Palos Verdes (population 41,731), 118 in Palos Verdes Estates (population 13,190), 53 in Rolling Hills Estates (population 8,066), 12 in Rolling Hills (population 1,874), and 17 in the unincorporated areas of the Peninsula. Countywide, 7,200 people have died.

According to the Department of Public Health, 13 deaths have been reported in Rancho Palos Verdes. The City extends its deepest condolences to the families of these residents.

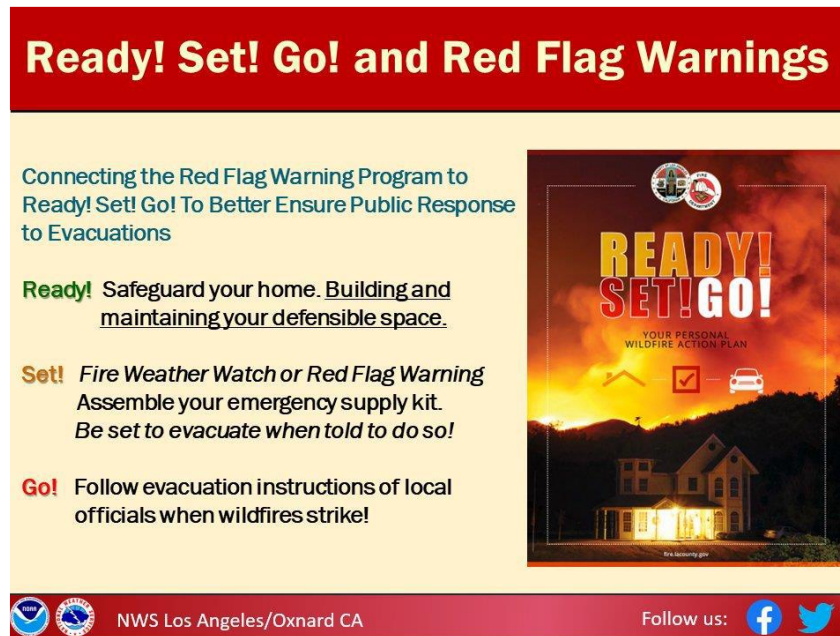
## **Emergency Preparedness**

### **Wildfire Preparedness**

With an uptick in recent brush fires across the Los Angeles County region, Peninsula residents are reminded to be on heightened alert and to be prepared for wildfire.

- If you see something, say something. Report any sign of smoke or fire immediately to your local fire department by dialing 9-1-1. If you dial 9-1-1 from your cellphone, be sure to know your location.
- Have your Ready! Set! Go! Wildfire Action Plan in place. It is critical for residents to be familiar with the Ready! Set! Go! program that provides important pre-planning and evacuation information.

## Regional Law Enforcement and Emergency Preparedness Committee

The Regional Law Enforcement Committee (RELC) and the Regional Emergency Preparedness Committee (REPC) will be convening for their quarterly meeting on Thursday, November 12, in an online meeting format. The Regional Emergency Preparedness Committee Meeting will begin at 7:30 a.m., and the Regional Law Enforcement Committee Meeting will commence after its conclusion.

The Regional Law Enforcement Committee (RELC) consists of two Council Members from the Cities of Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates who share municipal law enforcement services with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. The RELC meets quarterly to review the Sheriff's performance, make policy recommendations regarding the joint contract, review statistics for the preceding quarter concerning crime incidents, traffic enforcement, response times, false alarm rates, and the distribution of the Sheriff's patrol time throughout the region. The RELC also discusses the collaboration on the automatic license plate reader (ALPR) program.

The Peninsula Regional Emergency Preparedness Committee (REPC) consists of two Council Members from all four Peninsula Cities of Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills,



Rolling Hills Estates, and Palos Verdes Estates. The REPC meets quarterly on the same day as the RELC to discuss collaborative efforts on ensuring Peninsula-wide emergency preparedness. The objective of the REPC is to enhance emergency preparedness on the Peninsula by addressing joint preparedness efforts and response to widespread disasters affecting the greater Peninsula.

## Sixth Annual Prepared Peninsula Expo - Recording

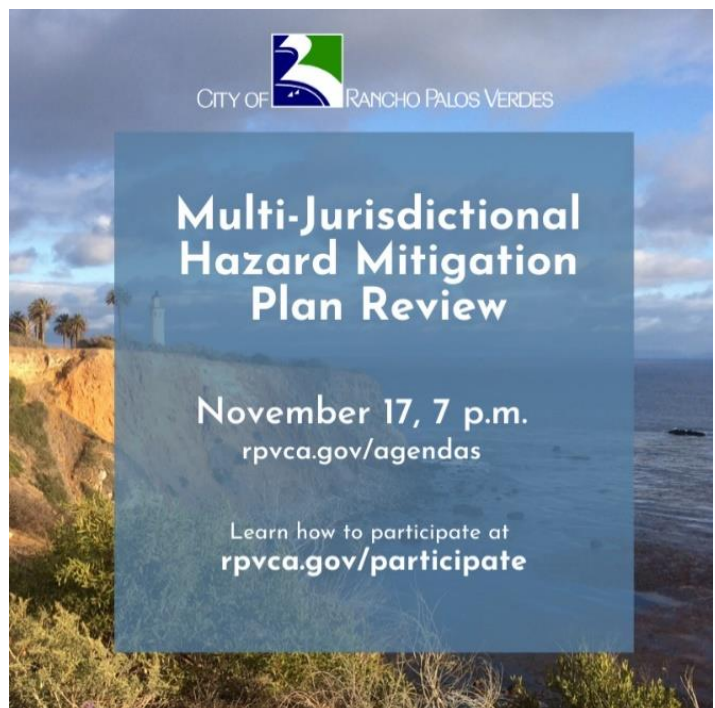
Lomita Sheriff's Station Captain, and Soraya Sutherlin, the Regional Emergency Communications Manager for Alert SouthBay.

## 2020 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan

On November 17, the Rancho Palos Verdes City Council will consider adopting the 2020 Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan.

The plan identifies hazards and ways to minimize damage by natural and human-caused disasters and ensures continuing eligibility for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funding. It is mandated by the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, also known as Public Law 106-390, which requires state and local governments to prepare mitigation plans to document their mitigation planning process and identify hazards, potential losses, mitigation needs, goals, and strategies.



The current RPV/RHE Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan was published in August 2014 and updated in January 2016. The 2020 update incorporates all federal requirements relating to local hazard mitigation plans.

The plan is designed to have the following benefits:

- Reduce loss of life and property, human suffering, economic disruption, and disaster costs.
- Prioritize hazard mitigation at the local level with increased emphasis on planning and public involvement, assessing risks, implementing loss reduction measures, and ensuring critical facilities/services survive a disaster.

- Promote education and economic incentives to form community-based partnerships and leverage non-federal resources to commit to and implement long-term hazard mitigation activities.

The November 17 City Council meeting will take place at 7 p.m. in McTaggart Hall at Fred Hesse Jr. Community Park with safety protocols to help prevent the spread of COVID-19, though virtual participation is highly encouraged. The meeting will be live-streamed on the City website and televised on RPTV Cox 33/Frontier FiOS 38.

## **Sign up for Alert SouthBay**

Alert SouthBay is a multi-jurisdictional emergency notification system used by 13 South Bay cities – including Rancho Palos Verdes -- to keep our communities informed about disasters and emergencies with uniform, expeditious alerts.

Alert SouthBay is an opt-in system using the Everbridge software application. Similar to Nixle alerts, Everbridge sends notifications via email, text message, cellular and landline phones. Users can subscribe to receive alerts from multiple South Bay cities. If you live in Rancho Palos Verdes, for example, but work in Torrance, you can subscribe to alerts from both cities.

Everbridge is the City's primary vehicle for emergency communication. Users can sign up by:

- Texting “alertsrb” to 888-777, which returns a link to register for Everbridge (for COVID-19-related alerts, text the keyword "cv19rpv")

## Family Emergency Communication Planning

Some disasters strike without any warning, and family members may not all be in the same place. Communication networks, such as mobile phones and computers, could be unreliable during disasters, and electricity could be disrupted. Planning will help ensure that all the members of your household—including children and people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs, as well as outside caregivers—know how to reach each other and where to meet up in an emergency.

Planning starts with these three easy steps:

**1) COLLECT:**

- **Household Information:** Write down phone numbers and email addresses for everyone in your household. Having this important information written down will help you reconnect with others in case you don't have your mobile device or computer with you or if the battery runs down.
- **School, Childcare, Caregiver, And Workplace Emergency Plans:** Because a disaster can strike during school or work hours, you need to know their emergency response plans and how to stay informed.
- **Out-of-Town Contact:** It is also important to identify someone outside of your community or State who can act as a central point of contact to help your household reconnect. In a disaster, it may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town because local phone lines can be jammed.
- **Emergency Meeting Places:** Decide on safe, familiar places where your family can go for protection or to reunite. Make sure these locations are accessible for household members with disabilities or access and functional needs.
  - **In your neighborhood:** This is a place in your neighborhood where your household members will meet if there is a fire or other emergency and you need to leave your home. The meeting place could be a big tree, a mailbox at the end of the driveway, or a neighbor's house.
  - **Outside of your neighborhood:** This is a place where your family will meet if a disaster happens when you're not at home and you can't get back to your home. This could be a library, community center, house of worship, or family friend's home.
  - **Outside of your town or city:** Having an out-of-town meeting place can help you reunite if a disaster happens and you cannot get home or to your out-of-neighborhood meeting place. This meeting place could be

the home of a relative or family friend. Make sure everyone knows the address of the meeting place and discuss ways you would get there.

**2) SHARE:**

- Make copies of your Family Emergency Communication Plan for each member of the household to carry in his or her wallet, backpack, or purse. Post a copy in a central place at home.
- Enter household and emergency contact information into all household members' mobile phones or devices.
- Store at least one emergency contact under the name "In Case of Emergency" or "ICE" for all mobile phones and devices.
- Create a group list on all mobile phones and devices of the people you would need to communicate with if there was an emergency or disaster.
- Make sure all household members and your out-of-town contact know how to text if they have a mobile phone or device, or know alternative ways to communicate if they are unable to text.

**3) PRACTICE:** Once you have completed your Family Emergency Communication Plan, made copies for all the members of your household, and discussed it, it's time to practice.

- Practice texting and calling. Have each person practice sending a text message or calling your out-of-town contact and sending a group text to your mobile phone group list.
- Discuss what information you should send by text. You will want to let others know you are safe and where you are.
- Talk about who will be the lead person to send out information about the designated meeting place for the household.
- Regularly have conversations with household members and friends about the plan, such as whom and how to text or call, and where to go.
- Review, update, and practice your Family Emergency Communication Plan at least once a year, or whenever any of your information changes.

## FINANCE DEPARTMENT

### FY 2020-21 First Quarter Review

On November 17, 2020, the Finance Department will present the first quarter financial review to the City Council. This staff report will contain a review of revenues, expenditures, and a look at the City's future financial status. A summary of the first quarter findings are below and the full staff report can be found on the City's website at

The FY 2020-21 Adopted Budget reflects multiple revenue sources that have been affected adversely by the economic slowdown, which was expected given the wide shutdown of hotels, retail, and restaurants and the drop in consumer demand. During the first three months of the fiscal year, the General Fund received just over \$3.8 million in revenue (13.2% of the adopted budget). Despite the uncertainty, at the end of the first quarter, the majority of revenue sources are performing as budgeted, and others resulted in favorable variances.

At the end of the first quarter, General Fund expenditures were approximately \$4.1 million or 14% of the total budget, including transfers out. Compared to the same period last year, total expenditures decreased by \$1.8 million or 31%. The end of the second quarter should provide more insight into how the pandemic will continue to impact the economy and, therefore demand for retail, restaurants, and leisure travel.



## Statewide Sales Tax Trends

### Restaurants and Hotels

FY 2020-21: Projected -15.5% decrease

FY 2021-22: Projected 20.1% growth

Restaurant spending has slowly started improving, but the Governor's Blueprint for a Safer Economy imposes capacity limits for indoor dining, with the best scenario allowing indoor dining at 50%

capacity. The CDC has released a study leading health officials to state that eating out is one of the riskiest activities for COVID. Large gatherings are still not allowed. As the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans run out, many types of restaurants are facing dire situations; the forecast assumes that 20% will not survive the restrictions. Drive-thru restaurants are a valuable asset and are performing better. The unknown timing for indoor dining and the changing weather ahead present the next obstacles for restaurants. The industry is being hit hard, and the recovery will lag far behind other industry groups.



### Food and Drugs

FY 2020-21: Projected 3.5% growth

FY 2021-22: Projected 3.0% growth

Most entities within this group remained open as essential businesses during the shelter in place orders. As such, people had to adapt to eating at home more often; this trend should continue for grocers and food sellers who have ramped up home delivery in a big way. Drug store consolidations or reductions are likely in over-saturated markets.

## Small Business Financial Assistance Plan Update

On April 8, 2020, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes implemented the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan to provide relief and promote the general welfare of the City's small business community experiencing negative financial impacts stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Small Business Financial Assistance Plan provides a one-time refund of the 2020 business license.



On June 2, 2020, the City Council received a status report on the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan. As a result of the low response, the City Council expressed a desire to increase the number of eligible small businesses by removing the limitation that a small business must have a “brick-and-mortar” location to be eligible to receive a refund.

Since the implementation on April 8:

- the City has received 22 requests for business license tax refunds
- 14 refunds totaling \$4,939 have been issued to date

## PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

### Hawthorne Boulevard Median Beautification Project Nearly Complete

Work on the Hawthorne Boulevard Median Beautification is near complete. Over the past several months, motorists and pedestrians observed the installation of variable sized visible boulders; black cobble; weed barrier (it looks like black fabric); topsoil, 7 trees and a variety of 5 gallon plants (52 total) and 1 gallon plants (1729 total).



The City has received requests for the installation of additional trees in the project area. Staff is currently assessing the budget status and cost-effectiveness of additional tree installation.

The artist's rendering below is a good representation of what the final product will look like when all the landscaping matures. If it is possible to install additional trees through this project, the project area will look even more awesome!

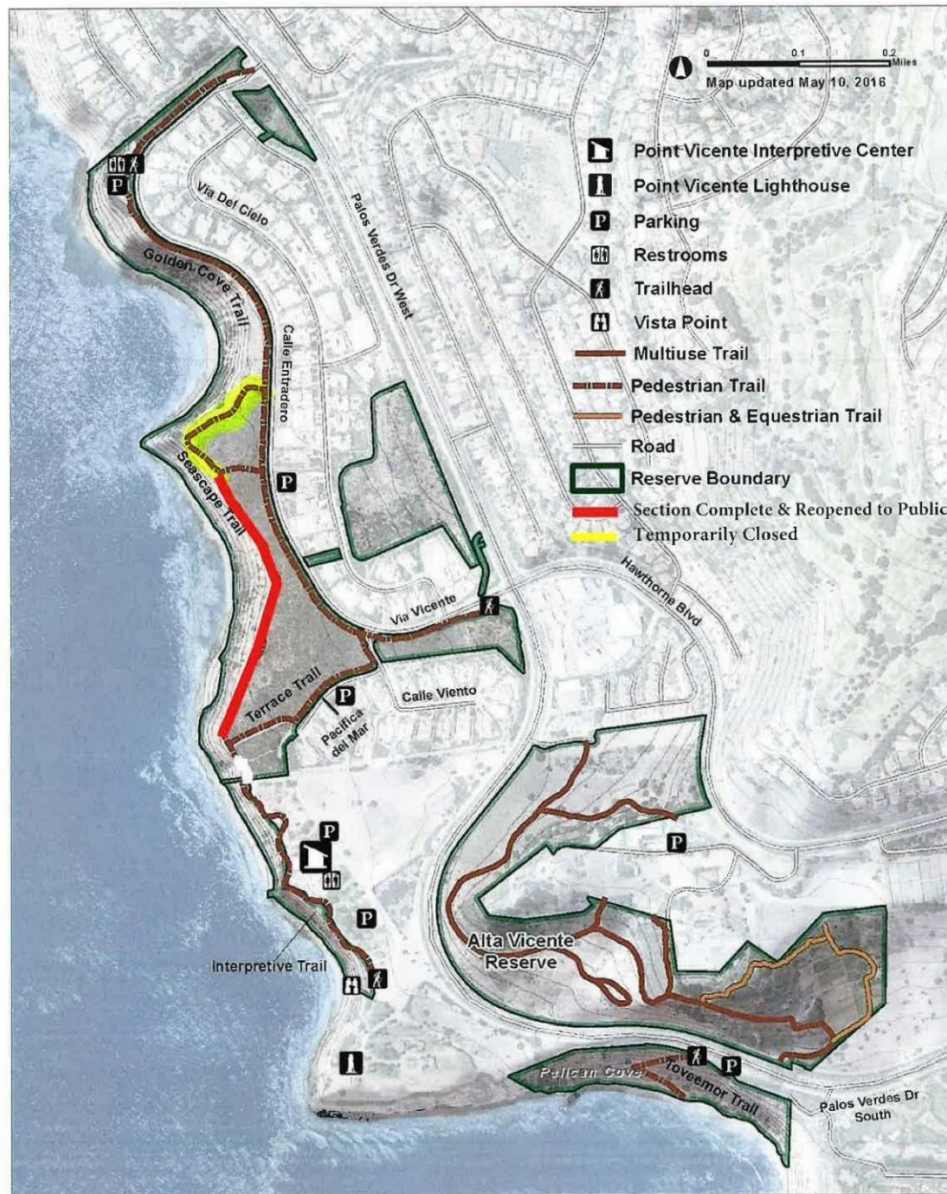


## **Coastal Bluff Fence Replacement Project**

Phase 2 of the project, which consists of replacing the old and deteriorated wooden fence with new pre-cast concrete fencing at Vicente Bluffs Reserve (see map below for location), began last week. The work is on track for completion in mid-December. A section of the trail remains closed during the work (see map below), and we apologize for any inconvenience experienced due to this temporary closure.







## Speed Radar on Palos Verdes Drive East

A speed radar is coming to Palos Verdes Drive East! Public Works is working with the Lomita Sheriff's Department to install a permanent speed radar detection unit near the intersection of Palos Verdes Drive East and Crest Road to aid in speed reduction along Palos Verdes Drive East between Crest Road and Diamonte Lane. The speed radar is scheduled to be installed by the end of the year.



## Regular Trash Collection This Week

There will be regular trash and recycling collection this week. Residents are advised to leave their carts by the curb by no later than 7 am on your regular trash collection day and remove empty carts after collection by no later than 10 pm. Empty carts should not be left on the street overnight.

If residents have any bulky items (mattress, desk, table, microwave, water heater) or electronic waste items (TV, printer, monitor) they are encouraged to contact the City's contractor, EDCO at 310-540-2977 to schedule a free (limited) pickup.

## Next Household Hazardous Waste Roundup

The next Household Hazardous Waste/Electronic Waste (HHW) event in RPV is scheduled for May 1, 2021. Until then, the Gaffey SAFE Center located at 1400 N. Gaffey Street in San Pedro continues to serve local area residents and is open every Saturday and Sunday from 9 am to 3 pm. Other periodic HHW roundups are being scheduled in the South Bay, with the next being in the City of Lomita on December 19, 2020. ## IMAC November Meeting

The Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee (IMAC) will be holding a virtual meeting on Monday, November 16, at 6 p.m. The meeting agenda will be posted on the City's website by Friday, November 13, 2020.

## Maintenance Activities

This week, Public Works continued its regularly scheduled maintenance, trash pickup, irrigation repairs, and general repairs at all City Parks and Facilities. Public Works continues to sanitize its parks' facilities and restrooms daily to help reduce COVID spread.

The Right-of-Way landscape maintenance team completed de-weeding and vegetation clearing along Crest Road from Hawthorne to Crenshaw. Crews have now begun working along Hawthorne Boulevard between Vallon Drive and Crest Road. Irrigation repairs were made at several parks and right-of-way locations, including Hesse Park, Eastview, Del Cero Park, Vanderlip Park, and Calle Entradero.

Sidewalk and pathway repairs were performed at Ryan Park, Via La Cresta, and Vallon Drive.

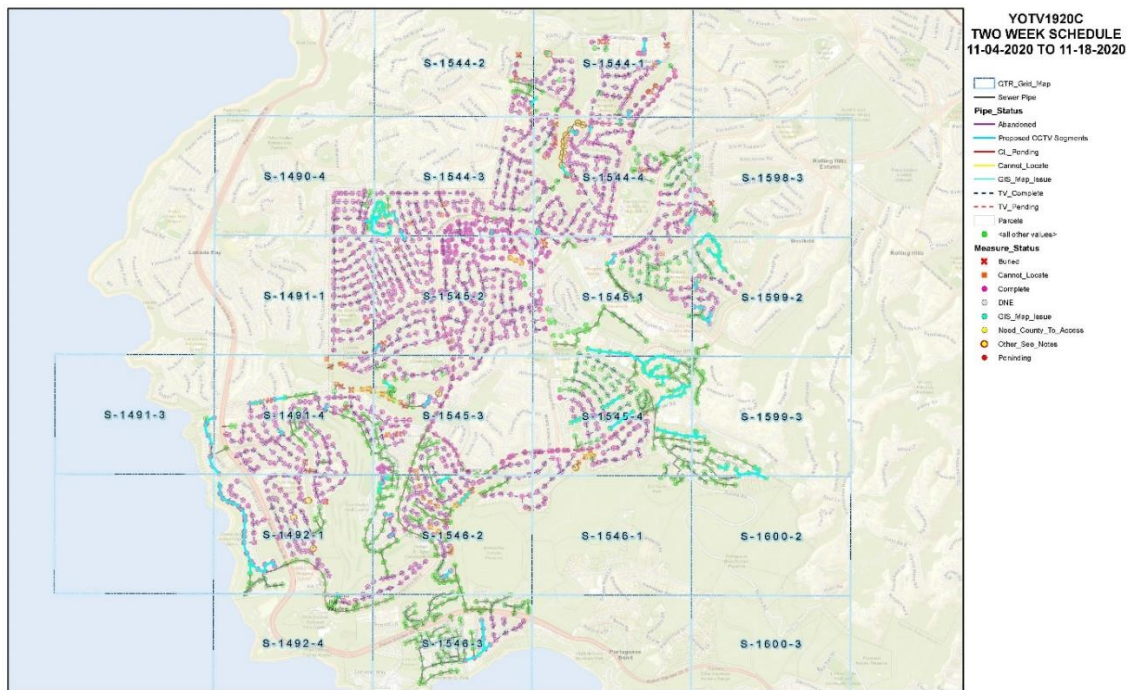
Public Works responded to a report of missing street signs on Chandeleur Drive and Daladier Drive. Replacement signs have been ordered and installation is expected in late November 2020.

On Crenshaw Boulevard near Del Cerro Park, a portion of the red zone was converted to an additional passenger loading/unloading space to help relieve traffic congestion and allow easier access to the Portuguese Bend Reserve.



Los Angeles County Public Works Sewer Division, responsible for maintaining the City's sewer system, is continuing its maintenance and inspections, concentrating on the west side of the City this fiscal year. Attached is a map of the current schedule. The map shows the areas that have been completed in pink and scheduled to be completed through the end of November 18, 2020, in green. ### Marymount Neighborhood Advisory Council (NAC) Meeting

On November 9, 2020, the Marymount NAC held its fall meeting. The NAC is comprised of members from the surrounding five homeowners associations and two at-large representatives who live within 3,000 feet of the campus. The NAC is tasked to meet once during the fall term and once during the spring term to review any campus operational and neighborhood concerns. ### Swale Maintenance Season Reminder

This month Code Enforcement Staff will be distributing city-wide letters reminding residents to maintain swales located on their properties from leaves, overgrown vegetation, and debris to prevent overflows and property damage. Appropriate maintenance includes clearance of all leaves, vegetation and any other debris or obstructions from the drain. Improperly maintained bench drains can result in property damage from slope failure, erosion, or excess storm-water runoff. The City found that after a heavy rainstorm, there are often slope erosion problems on private property that were caused by unmaintained drainage swales that overflowed, resulting in the slope being eroded or failing. It is the responsibility of property owners who have swales on their property to maintain swales so that they function properly. The letter will also include a reminder that the City's Municipal Code does not permit constructing structures within or above a drainage swale, or on a slope equal to 35% or greater. 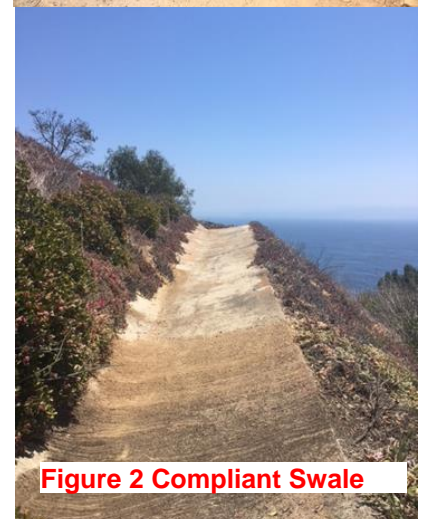


Figure 2 Compliant Swale

### Cayuse Lane Abatement Update

On October 9, 2020, the City was issued an inspection and abatement warrant by the Court of Los Angeles to clean up the property located on Cayuse Lane. Clean up was started on Tuesday, October 13, 2020, and extended until November 9, 2020. Since then, Code Enforcement staff has been monitoring and coordinating with surrounding neighbors during the abatement process.

The abatement process has been completed with exterior substandard conditions on the property, including accumulation of junk, trash, debris, and overgrown, dead vegetation, being abated. Code Enforcement Staff will continue to monitor the property



proactively and work collectively with neighboring residents to assure the health, safety, and welfare of the community. Staff will provide any future updates as necessary.

### **California Water Service Foliage Trimming Site Visit**

On November 10, Planning Division staff met at the Cal-Water (5837 Crest Road) site with Cal-Water representatives and President of the Mesa PV HOA to discuss foliage trimming on the property. Pursuant to P.C. Resolution No. 2018-01, foliage on the site is required to be trimmed on an annual basis to minimize any significant view impairments, as seen from the adjacent residential properties. Trimming is expected to occur before the end of the year and additional updates will be provided as more information becomes available.

### **November 18 LAX/Community Noise Roundtable Virtual Meeting**

The next Roundtable meeting will be virtual and is scheduled for Wednesday, November 18, 2020, between 1:30 PM – 4 PM. The meeting focuses on noise concerns caused by passenger jets arriving and departing from Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). The Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) staff will release their agenda three days before the meeting detailing how citizens can participate online and over the phone. ## RECREATION AND PARKS DEPARTMENT

### **New Guidance on Outdoor Recreation and Private Gatherings**

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health has updated its guidance on attending private group gatherings and participating in outdoor recreation activities. Public parks and outdoor spaces are ideal places to participate in small group gatherings and recreation activities. They can help reduce the spread of the virus from one person to another. When participating in a gathering or other activity, all park rules must be followed.

#### **Private Gatherings**

Small, private gatherings of persons from no more than three households are now permitted. Gatherings should be held outdoors and all attendees must wear a face covering and maintain physical distancing from those not in their household. To lower the risk of exposure to COVID-19, remember to keep gatherings short (no more than two hours), practice good hand hygiene, use single-serve disposable containers, and refrain from activities that may increase the risk of COVID-19 transmission such as singing, chanting, shouting, or physical exertion.

## **Playgrounds Now Open**

Following Governor Newsom's and the California Department of Public Health's announcement that outdoor playgrounds are permitted to open statewide, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health released Reopening Protocols for Outdoor Playgrounds on October 1, 2020. While the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health issued guidance, the decision to re-open outdoor playgrounds is made by each individual agency. City Staff worked to ensure that all playgrounds were in compliance with health guidance and safety standards and then opened playgrounds at all parks on Friday, October 9.

Unrelated to Covid-19 and in accordance with industry best practices, the City recently conducted a playground equipment safety inspection. When the safety inspection report was received, the City took action to remediate items that could be addressed immediately. Some playground equipment will require longer-term solutions to remediate. As a result, the following equipment will remain closed to the public until further notice:

- Swings for ages 5-12 years at Hesse Park, Ryan Park, Ladera Linda Park, and Eastview Park
- Select playground structure elements, including slides and climbers at Hesse Park and Ladera Linda Park.

A schedule for the remaining work is under development. The following equipment will be open to the public:

- Playground structures at Hesse Park, Ryan Park, Ladera Linda Park, and Eastview Park

- Swings for ages 4 years and under at Eastview Park

Portuguese Bend Beach Club is hosting the production of a TV drama next week with filming beginning November 16 and ending November 17. The production company rented a portion of Marymount University's parking lot for that same period. Only crew vehicles will be parked as all production vehicles will be parked at the Portuguese Bend Beach Club.

Rangers continued to receive reports of increased dog use at Rancho Palos Verdes Beach. Animals are not allowed on any beach in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes. Dogs are allowed on the trails, as long as they are on a leash no longer than 6 feet in length. The City is working with Trump National Staff to ensure adequate signage to educate and enforce the City's Municipal Code.

### Portuguese Bend Reserve:

Patrons should use caution during the construction of Burma Gate. Construction began Monday, November 9. The public will continue to enjoy access into Portuguese Bend Reserve, but patrons are encouraged to use alternative access points.

Vanderlip Trail repairs are in progress. Work began on Wednesday, November 4. Crews began to fill in and repair the ruts caused by a water main break in October. Vanderlip Trail remains closed, and a portion of Gary's Gulch Trail is also closed while crews station heavy machinery and transport aggregate and other materials to Vanderlip trail. Trail closure signage is in place in these areas.





Vicente Bluffs Reserve:

As of November 3, 2020, Phase 1 of the Vicente Bluffs Fence Project is complete. A section of Seascapes Trail is now open for the public. Construction crews are still on-site, and all “trail closed” signage will remain in place in affected areas where work is still being completed.

## Earthquake Preparedness




Earthquakes can happen at any time – day or night. You could be anywhere when the earthquake strikes. The RPV Emergency Preparedness Committee encourages all Peninsula residents to plan, prepare, and practice what you and your loved ones will do when an earthquake occurs.

- ✓ **Make an Emergency Plan:** Create a [family emergency communications plan](#) that has an out-of-state contact. Plan where to meet if you get separated.
- ✓ **Make a supply kit:** Create a [supply Kit](#) that includes enough food and water for several days, a flashlight, a fire extinguisher and a whistle.
- ✓ **Practice DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON:** Get prepared for Earthquakes before it happens by practicing DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON.

- ✓  **DROP** where you are, onto your hands and knees. This position protects you from being knocked down and also allows you to stay low and crawl to shelter if nearby.

-  **COVER** your head and neck with one arm and hand
  - Crawl underneath a nearby table or desk for shelter
  - If no shelter is nearby, crawl next to an interior wall (away from windows)
  - Stay on your knees; bend over to protect vital organs


-  **HOLD ON** until shaking stops
  - Under shelter: hold on to it with one hand; be ready to move with your shelter if it shifts
  - No shelter: hold on to your head and neck with both arms and hands.

**Protect Your Home:** Secure heavy items in your home like bookcases, refrigerators, televisions and objects that hang on walls. Store heavy and breakable objects on low shelves. Consider making improvements to your building to fix structural issues that could cause your building to collapse during an earthquake.

**If you are in a car**  
Stop in an area away from buildings, trees, overpasses, underpasses, or utility wires.

**If you are in the mountains**  
Watch alert for falling rocks and landslides.

**If you are outdoors**  
Stay outdoors


**If you are in your home**  
Stay there until the shaking stops. **DO NOT** run outside.

**If you are in bed**  
Stay there and cover your head and neck with a pillow.

**If you are in a building**  
Expect fire alarms and sprinklers to go off. Do not use elevators.

An earthquake is a sudden, rapid shaking of the earth, caused by the breaking and shifting of underground rock. Earthquakes can cause buildings to collapse and heavy items to fall, resulting in injuries and property damage.

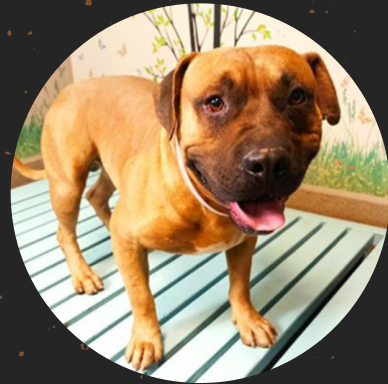

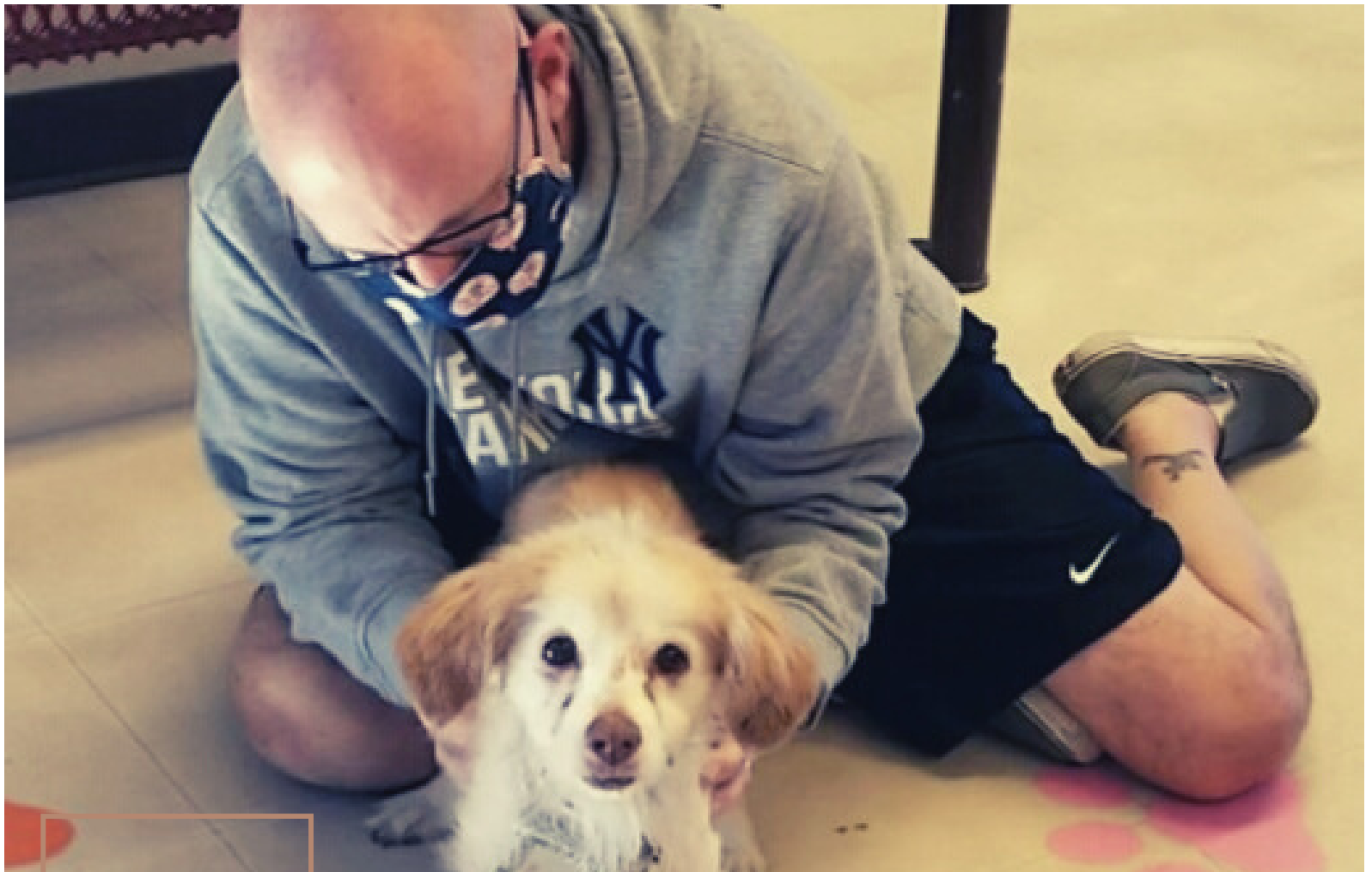
The Petco Foundation has awarded the department \$10,000 in grant funds to procure supplies to assist and prepare staff with disaster relief efforts.

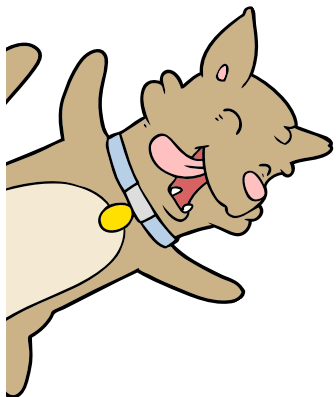
## SAM'S COUNTY ADVENTURES

On November 9, 2020, Field Sergeant Melody Emmick received a call from the DACC North County Communication Center that there was a resident who was searching for his dog. The man was transferred to Sgt. Emmick and was able to provide an animal ID number. Sgt. Emmick was able to locate the dog which was a hearing and visually impaired Sussex Spaniel. She also found that the dog had been at the Lancaster Animal Care Center since October 16, 2020.

The dog's owner stated that his 12-year old dog's name was “Sam” and that he was all the way in Orange County. He told Sgt. Emmick that Sam had been spotted on his neighbor's ring camera in October when Sam first escaped on trash day. He and his family had been desperately searching for Sam all over Orange and Riverside counties, but was eventually notified by another resident that Sam might be at the Lancaster Animal Care Center. Upon viewing a photo, he instantly recognized his dog and jumped into his car, hoping that his appointment request would go through sometime during his two hour drive.

When Sam was brought out by staff at the Lancaster ACC, it didn't take very long for Sam's sense of smell to kick in and for him to recognize his owner. Following this incredible reunification story, Sgt. Emmick provided a short yet concise message: “Never give up hope!”
