Tips for Living with Coyotes



Do not feed coyotes.



Haze coyotes: make loud noises, throw rocks, or spray them with a garden hose.

Report sick, injured or dead coyotes to LA County Animal Control at 310-523-9566.

If you see an aggressive or dangerous coyote, contact LA County Agricultural Commissioner, Weights and Measures at 626-575-5462.

Tips for Living with Coyotes

The City has been receiving reports of increased coyote sightings. Coyotes will generally avoid humans but are attracted to free meals in the form of pet food, compost, or trash. A coyote who finds food in one yard may learn to search for food in other yards. Use the following tips to avoid attracting coyotes and to help deter coyotes from your neighborhood:

- Do not feed coyotes: this includes removing access to food from yards, leaving pet food outside overnight, composting outside of an enclosed bin, or having fallen fruit from a fruit tree on the ground.
- Haze any coyote you see: this can help maintain a coyote's fear of humans and deter them from neighborhood spaces. The simplest method of hazing involves being loud and large; stand tall, wave your arms and yell at the coyote, approaching it as necessary until it runs away. You may need to use different tactics such as noisemakers, stomping your feet or spraying the coyote with a hose to get it to leave. In addition, you may want to carry hazing tools with you while you walk your dog. These include a whistle, squirt guns, or sticks or rocks that can be thrown towards the coyote. It is important to continue to haze the coyote until it completely leaves the area.
- Keep your dog on a leash outdoors and away from vegetation where coyotes could hide. Pick up small pets.

Fireworks are Illegal on the Peninsula

As the Fourth of July approaches, the cities on the Palos Verdes Peninsula want everyone to enjoy a safe holiday.

Fireworks are illegal and strictly prohibited on the Peninsula. Fireworks pose a significant fire danger, cause injuries, scare pets, and may trigger a response in those with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Respect your neighbors and obey the law. DO NOT light fireworks.

Filing with the CPUC on the Cal Water Cost of Capital Case

At the direction of the City Council, on June 2, the City Attorney's Office filed a protest with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), to the application of the California Water Service Company (Cal Water) for authority to establish its cost of capital for the period from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2024 (see attachments). The City objected on the grounds that the proposed rate of return is unjust, unreasonable, or discriminatory. The proposed cost of capital case would increase rates for Palos Verdes ratepayers, with average water usage and a 5/8" by 3/4" meter, by \$0.72 or 0.7%.

SB 9 to Be Heard in Assembly Local Government Committee June 9

The City Council opposed SB 9 at the City Council meeting on February 2, 2021. SB 9 would require ministerial approval of duplex housing development, lot splits, or both, in single-family residential zones. SB 9 passed the California State Senate and was ordered to the Assembly on May 26, 2021. Staff re-submitted the City's letter of opposition to the Assembly Local Government Committee, ahead of its hearing of the bill on June 9. City Staff will be presenting a status report on SB 9 and SB 10, both bills related to local land use authority which recently passed to the Assembly, at the City Council meeting on June 15 and the City Council will consider sending additional letters of opposition to the bills.

What to Expect on Tuesday, June 15, 2021

Last week, the Cal/OSHA standards board recommended relaxing physical distancing and masking requirements for fully vaccinated workers, and other adjustments to align with the June 15 reopening. If the standards are approved by the Office of Administrative Law in the next 10 calendar days, the standards are expected to go into effect no later than June 15. The revised standards include the following:

- **Face Coverings:** Fully vaccinated workers without COVID-19 symptoms do not need to wear face coverings in a room where everyone else is fully vaccinated and not showing symptoms. In rooms where everyone is not vaccinated, face coverings continue to be required for everyone regardless of vaccination status. Both fully vaccinated and unvaccinated workers without symptoms do not need

to wear face coverings outdoors except when working at “outdoor mega events” with over 10,000 attendees, which may include events or theme parks.

- **Physical Distancing:** When the revised standards take effect, employers can eliminate physical distancing and partitions/barriers for employees working indoors and at outdoor mega events if an employer provides respirators, such as N95s, to unvaccinated employees for voluntary use. After July 31, physical distancing and barriers are no longer required (except during outbreaks) provided all unvaccinated employees are offered respirators for voluntary use.
- **Exclusion from the Workplace:** Fully vaccinated workers who do not have COVID-19 symptoms no longer need to be excluded from the workplace after a close contact.
- **Special Protections for Housing and Transportation:** Special COVID-19 prevention measures that apply to employer-provided housing and transportation no longer apply if all occupants are fully vaccinated.

Employers will still be required to maintain a written COVID-19 Prevention Program with the following changes:

- Employers must review the California Department of Public Health’s Interim guidance for Ventilation, Filtration, and Air Quality in Indoor Environments.
- COVID-19 prevention training must now include information on how the vaccine is effective at preventing COVID-19 and protecting against both transmission and serious illness or death.

COVID-19 Cases

As of June 8, there are 1,245,412 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across Los Angeles County (population 10.17 million). The total includes 1,545 cases in Rancho Palos Verdes (population 42,747), 484 in Palos Verdes Estates (population 13,522), 290 in Rolling Hills Estates (population 8,113), 59 in Rolling Hills (population 1,940), and 66 in the unincorporated areas of the Peninsula (population 1,921). Countywide, 24,404 people have died.

According to the L.A. County Department of Public Health, 57 deaths have been reported in Rancho Palos Verdes. The City extends its deepest condolences to the families of these residents.

Upcoming Wildfire Risk & Resilience Webinar

On Thursday, June 10, City staff will participate in a virtual webinar on Wildfire Risk and Resilience hosted by the Institute for Local Government, the National League of Cities, and Headwaters Economics. In recent decades, wildfires have become more expensive and destructive, costing billions of dollars each year. Unfortunately, the long-term consequences of wildfire disasters are felt most acutely at the local level, with cities, counties, small businesses, and property owners bearing more than 45 percent of

recovery and restoration costs. Until recently, many communities had no way of quantifying their wildfire risk.

Thursday's webinar will include a demonstration of a new [Wildfire Risk to Communities](#) Tool as well as an in-depth discussion with local officials who will share their expertise on wildfire adaptation. This new Wildfire Risk tool is intended to assist community leaders such as elected officials, community planners, and emergency managers in understanding how wildfire risk varies across a state, region, or county and prioritize mitigation activities to reduce risk.

Staff will be participating in this webinar to learn how to best use this new Wildfire Risk tool and to hear from leaders across the country who are fostering wildfire resilience through grant opportunities, utilizing data to mitigate risk for the most vulnerable populations, and responding to and adapting to population migration from neighboring communities as a result of wildfire risk and disasters.

Emergency Alerts

Disaster can happen anytime, in any part of the country. When emergencies occur, public safety officials provide critical alerts and warnings to local communities. Through a variety of technologies, these organizations communicate critical information and occasionally order evacuations, allowing residents to take immediate action to stay safe.

There are many emergency mass notification communication tools available to residents and businesses in Los Angeles County. For example, the Emergency Alert System broadcasts emergency information directly to radio and television carriers for widespread emergency events. You may have already seen these messages, which are voice messages with text scrolling on the television screen.

The following is a summary of the different types of warning alerts available and how to receive them.

WIRELESS EMERGENCY ALERTS (WEAS):

Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEAs) are one of many ways public safety officials can quickly and effectively alert the public to serious emergencies. Wireless Emergency Alerts go directly to your cellphone and can be used to send out urgent alerts targeting certain geographic areas.

What you need to know about WEAs:

- WEAs can be sent by state and local public safety officials, the National Weather Service, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the president of the United States.
- WEAs look like text messages but are designed to get your attention with a unique sound and vibration repeated twice.
- WEAs are no more than 360 characters and include the type and time of the alert, any action you should take and the agency issuing the alert.
- WEAs are not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts, calls or data sessions that are in progress.
- You are not charged for receiving WEAs and there is no need to subscribe.

If you are not receiving Wireless Emergency Alerts here are some tips to troubleshoot your mobile device:

- Check the settings on your mobile phones and review your user manual (you may be able to find this online too).
- Some mobile service providers call these messages “Government Alerts,” or “Emergency Alert Messages.”
- All major phone providers and some smaller providers participate in WEA. Check with your wireless providers to see if they can resolve the issue.

EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM:

The Emergency Alert System (EAS) is a national public warning system that allows the president to address the American people within 10 minutes during a national emergency. The alerts are sent through broadcasters, satellite digital audio services, direct broadcast satellite providers, cable television systems and wireless cable systems.

The EAS may also be used by state and local authorities to deliver important emergency information such as weather information, imminent threats, AMBER alerts and local

incident information targeted to specific areas. The president has sole responsibility for determining when the national-level EAS will be activated.

OPT-IN NOTIFICATION SYSTEMS:

Opt-In mass notification systems can vary by region but operate similarly in what reasons people are notified. Alerts received could be about extreme weather or natural disasters, road closures, missing people, or evacuations. These alerts are managed by the local agency that set them up.

Alert Southbay: Alert SouthBay is a multi-jurisdictional emergency notification system used by 14 South Bay cities – including Rancho Palos Verdes - to keep our communities informed about disasters and emergencies with uniform, and expeditious alerts. Alert SouthBay is an opt-in alert system using the Everbridge software application. Similar to Nixle alerts, Everbridge sends notifications via email, text message, cellular and landline phones.

Alert SouthBay will act as the City's primary vehicle for emergency communication. Residents can sign up for Alert SouthBay by:

- Texting “alertsb” to 888-777, which returns a link to register for Everbridge
- Registering online at alertsouthbay.com
- Downloading the free [Everbridge app](#) on an iOS or Android device from the [App Store](#) or [Google Play](#).

Alert LA County: In Los Angeles County, the Sheriff's Department uses Alert LA County to contact residents and businesses via phone, text messages or e-mail messages in case of emergency. This system is used to send shelter-in-place instructions, evacuation, and other emergency messages. It has accessibility features for people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs.

Tips to Prevent Vehicle Burglaries

Take steps today to prevent thefts from your vehicle. Residents are strongly encouraged to use “Lock It or Lose It” prevention tips every day. It only takes a matter of seconds for a thief to break into your car and grab your valuable items.

Look through the windows of your vehicle. What do you see? A bag on the passenger seat? A charging cord? A garage door opener? Change in a cup holder? Take it with you or remove it from plain view and be sure to close all windows and lock doors.


Follow these tips to help prevent vehicle burglaries:

1. Remove all valuable items from your car including purses and electronics.
2. If you must leave valuables behind, put them in your trunk before you reach your destination. Avoid doing so while in plain view.
3. Set your alarm or anti-theft device.
4. Park in a locked garage or in well-lit areas.

If you see suspicious activity report it immediately to the Lomita Sheriff’s Station at 310-539-1661. In case of emergency, call or text 9-1-1.

Practice Your 9PM Routine

Every night at 9:00PM, the community is encouraged to lock up property, turn on lights, and bring in valuables to reduce the likelihood of falling victim to property crimes.



Lock all doors and windows, including garage doors, turn on lights or set them on a timer if you plan to be away, and avoid leaving valuables in visible areas. These actions help deter burglars and may help prevent residential burglaries.

Be aware, and if you see something suspicious, say something! The City encourages you to call the Lomita Sheriff’s Station at 310-539-1661 if you see suspicious persons or activities.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Statewide Sales Tax Trends

The Finance Department works with several outside consultants and analysts to monitor trends related to the City's revenue sources. HdL provides a quarterly look at sales tax trends by sector. Below you will find insights and projections for two sectors.

Business and Industry

FY20-21: Projected -0.4% decrease

FY21-22: Projected 6.5% growth

As the economy reopens, some sectors in the category are slowly rebounding – with improvement extending into FY 2021/22. Despite challenges brought on by the virus, agriculture and farming reported a strong 4Q20. Medical/biotech also surged last year, with purchases of medical equipment, pharmaceuticals and the return of elective and non-emergency medical procedures. Conversely, business closures plagued areas such as food service equipment, office supplies/furniture, business services, and the entertainment industry. Fulfillment center's revenue boomed with the massive shift to online sales. Recognizing much of this buying preference shift is permanent, HdL's forecast indicates moderate growth. Pandemic challenges such as absenteeism, qualified worker shortages, sanitization protocols in the Golden State are lagging compared to prior periods – even with the national manufacturing sector gaining strength. Overall, tax revenues are projected to achieve pre-pandemic levels next fiscal year. However, given its unique mix, each local jurisdiction's experience will differ according to the size and character of its specific business/industrial base.

Fuel and Service Stations

FY20-21: Projected -7.6% decrease

FY21-22: Projected 15.5% growth

While the pandemic significantly hammered this industry during the past year, most signs are pointing toward upward pressure on prices, consumption, and demand for fuel. Recently, the average cost of gas rose to the highest level since last February and is expected to exceed \$4 per gallon by mid-summer 2021. The temporary shutdown of a refinery in Texas and conflict in the Middle East have restricted supplies of oil. Oil barrel

prices are estimated to move into the low \$70 range in the summer. Jet fuel rates are the highest since January 2020. We anticipate COVID vaccines will begin to stabilize the virus, which in turn stimulates consumer confidence and the desire to travel. Based on these factors, HdL is projecting sales taxes associated with fuel and service stations to increase beginning in late first quarter 2021.

Fiscal Year 2021-22 Budget Adoption

On June 15, the City Council is hosting the second public hearing to adopting the FY 2021-22 Budget. The Citywide FY 2021-22 Budget includes total revenues of approximately \$35.1 million and total expenditures of almost \$35.8 million, excluding transfers and Improvement Authorities. The total General Fund includes revenues of approximately \$30.1 million and expenditures of \$27.4 million, excluding transfers.

Undergrounding Along Palos Verdes Drive South

Final paving of the trenched areas of Palos Verdes Drive South, from La Rotonda Drive to the city limit with San Pedro, was performed last week, and installation of pavement markings is scheduled for Tuesday of next week. One of the utility companies will be pulling new wire through the underground conduit this Wednesday, and City staff is continuing to work with the other utility companies to confirm schedules for them to remove their lines from the poles. Once all utilities are removed from the poles, which is expected to be completed by the end of June, pole removal will be scheduled.

Fuel Modification Update



Please resist the urge to visit places that members of the public may be posting on social media sites identifying where goats have been seen. Although we understand the popularity of the goats and the excitement seeing them generates, especially for children, we ask that you do not attempt to go see them or get close to where they are working. The fencing that is put up to contain them to designated

areas is electrified and we want to avoid anyone getting hurt or even shocked. Additionally, getting close to these areas, especially with pets of your own, can be stressful to the goats and the herd dogs. For these reasons and more, we do not advertise or promote the dates when they are scheduled for designated areas to the general public. We appreciate your understanding and ask for your cooperation and respect for the safety of all – including the goats.

Although far less of an attraction than the goats, humans are also utilized for designated areas as part of the City's Fuel Modification plan, and crews will also be working in designated areas in the coming weeks. We ask that you avoid approaching crews as they work due to other safety concerns.




Free Preserve Shuttle Service Pilot Program Begins the Third Month

The City's Palos Verdes Nature Preserve pilot shuttle service program has been operating for over two months. The shuttle transports Preserve visitors from the City Hall parking lot to shuttle stops at the Point Vicente Interpretive Center, Abalone Cove, and Lower Portuguese Bend Reserve. The City and Palos Verdes Peninsula Transit Authority has moved the Abalone Cove shuttle stop from the bus stop location on Palos Verdes Drive South to the former Annie's Stand area within Abalone Cove Park. It is anticipated that this change will lessen impacts to surrounding neighborhoods.




Six (6) passenger trips were taken on Friday, June 4, zero (0) on Saturday, June 5, and thirty-four (34) on Sunday, June 6. These numbers reflect the number of one-way shuttle trips so individuals who took a round trip-riding the shuttle back to City Hall were counted twice. To date, there have been 543 total passenger trips since the shuttle program started on April 9.

Ninety-seven riders completed surveys between April 9 and June 6. Thirty-five respondents were Peninsula residents and 20 were from cities neighboring the Peninsula (San Pedro, Lomita, Torrance, and Redondo Beach). A total of 40 respondents were from all other ZIP codes.



From the survey responses, the most common parking locations for visitors to the Preserve continue to be City Hall, and the Crest & Crenshaw and Del Cerro Park area, followed by Ladera Linda/Forrestal and PVIC. Twenty-four respondents indicated their usual parking location is City Hall and 18 responded Crest/Crenshaw or Del Cerro. Seven responded Ladera Linda or Forrestal and 6 PVIC.

Beginning on May 21, shuttle riders were asked how they heard about the Preserve Shuttle. Of the 25 riders who answered the question, five responded that they heard about the shuttle from the RPV website and three from electronic message boards at various locations around the City. Three respondents heard about the shuttle from unspecified other social media, and 11 riders heard by other means, mostly word of mouth or found the shuttle when they parked but did not know about it in advance.



The Preserve Shuttle stops at each location approximately every 30 minutes. The shuttle hours are from 8 a.m. – 5:30 p.m. Friday-Sunday and on holidays. Dogs and mountain bikes welcome!



On June 2, 2021, Park Rangers attended a Sheriff Department Posse Meeting to connect with members and share the roles and responsibilities of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes Park Rangers. In this meeting, rangers had an opportunity to ask questions related to and including enforcement on trails. Posse members receive over 40 hours of training from the Los Angeles County Sheriff Department and have previously assisted MRCA Rangers and Preserve Deputies in patrolling the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve.

Park Rangers participated in and completed a 2-hour Customer Service and De-escalation training. Previously, Rangers had completed a 40-hour training to learn about verbal judo, and officer safety.

On June 4, Park Rangers met with and participated in a training led by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife Game Wardens and the Los Angeles Marine Protected Area Collaborative Network Members to learn about the City's two MPAs, coordinate response in the field, and provide a platform to ask questions and share resources across agencies to protect the Abalone Cove SMCA and Point Vicente SMCA.

Through this partnership, additional signs were approved and provided to the City, specific to Abalone Cove SMCA (left). The sign includes language on “No hook and line from shore” as some take is permitted, including spearfishing and take of squid with hand-held dip nets. In comparison, the Point Vicente SMCA does not permit any take and has “No Fishing or Collecting” language (right).

Abalone Cove Reserve

From May 31 to June 6, the following Marine Protected Area (MPA) contacts, all from Abalone Cove, were made:

- Ranger/OSM contacts with MPA violators: two (2) rod and reel fishing, nine (9) collecting with intent to take, and 25 collecting for observational purposes
- Estimated number of animals prevented from being poached: 28 animals and one (1) stalk of seagrass
- Individuals deterred from poaching: two (2) fishermen, two (2) wanting to harvest from tidepools.

This week saw an increase in violations, most of which occurred during the busy Memorial Day holiday. Staff continues to encounter high numbers of people removing wildlife for observational purposes, which is something that is not allowed in any of our

MPAs because it can stress out or harm wildlife. Throughout the week, there was continued coordination between the LA Waterkeeper and staff, resulting in many violators being contacted that may have been missed without their assistance.

Additional signs were added to Cliffside Trail and Sacred Cove View Trail to remind patrons that animals, including dogs, are not permitted on City of Rancho Palos Verdes beaches, including Sacred Cove Beach.



An unauthorized spur trail has resulted in increased use from Sacred Cove Beach to Palos Verdes Drive South. Rangers have increased enforcement and installed a secondary “Area Closed” sign to lessen disturbance on the area and remind patrons to use designated trails. Unauthorized spur trails can cause compaction with repeated use, and may disturb the local seed bank, including many native plants from growing.

On Sunday, June 6, a vehicle parked in the Abalone Cove Parking Lot mistook the reverse gear for drive resulting in their vehicle getting stuck as it drove over a boulder and a log that served as a parking delineator between the trail and the parking lot. There were no injuries, both the driver and passenger were not harmed. They reported the incident to staff, who then assisted in calling for towing services.



Alta Vicente Reserve

On Sunday, June 6, Park Rangers led a 1-hour interpretive tour at Alta Vicente Reserve with 10 boy scout troops, age 6-7 years with a focus on plant and animal identification.



Forrestal Reserve

After receiving noise concerns from neighbors, Park Rangers and staff have been working to deter unauthorized use of the Palos Verdes Peninsula School District (PVPUSD)-owned fields above the Ladera Linda Community Center. The Rangers observed no individuals with dogs off-leash this weekend. One unauthorized soccer game was observed and dispersed. The School District approves and authorizes groups

on the soccer fields and has posted temporary signs to assist in the enforcement of field use and is looking into options to deter unauthorized use.



ParkMobile Parking App Project Update

Staff from Recreation and Parks and Public Works have met several times with ParkMobile and Civic Smart personnel this week to address a wide range of issues related to the upcoming installation and implementation of the online reservation-based parking program including locations of equipment and expected delivery times of the individual space sensors. Parkmobile is expediting shipping of the sensors to meet the target date of system implementation by late June or early July. During the first month of implementation, the City will require a reservation to park but will not charge the \$10 parking fee. This period will allow the City to gain valuable information and data on parking patterns and habits, and it will provide the City one month to work directly with ParkMobile on a public education campaign for the new parking system. The City will begin using both the reservation requirement and charging the parking fee in August 2021.

III. GROUND FOR OBJECTION

The City objects the Cal. Water proposed rate of return on rate base of 7.50% for the period from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2024. The proposed rate or return is unjust, unreasonable, or discriminatory. The 2021 current bill for the average customer in the LA County-Palos Verdes region is roughly \$45 more than the average bill across all Cal. Water service areas per month.

While the City acknowledges the unique circumstances in serving the City, such as the need to pump all water up the hill before being distributed to ratepayers, that result in the increased prices, the continued rate increases, result in unfair cost burden on Rancho Palos Verdes ratepayers. With a rate of return as proposed by Cal. Water, City staff are concerned that the “pass through” of the same in the form of “customer” rate increases could approach increases of as much 0.676%.

The average increase across all districts/regions is 0.653%. While these differences are relatively small, it reflects the apparently continued practice of City ratepayers paying a greater-than-their-share of the Cal Water rates, as compared to ratepayers in other Cal. Water districts.

Accordingly, the City objects to the proposed rate of return and urges the Commission to substantially reduce the same.

IV. CONCLUSION

For the foregoing reasons, City respectfully requests the Commission reject the pending Application and/or substantially reduce the rate of return being proposal by Cal. Water.
