

Reminder: Parking Fees in Effect for Crenshaw Boulevard Near Portuguese Bend Reserve

Last week, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes implemented parking fees for Crenshaw Boulevard near the Portuguese Bend Reserve. Parking is \$10 per block of two hours and 45 minutes for 43 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road (Zones C-F), plus a 35-cent transaction fee. Shorter or longer blocks of time are not available at this time. There are no required reservations or fees for parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road.



Additionally, parking enforcement personnel are now issuing \$110 citations for violations. Vehicles parked on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road without a reservation or parked beyond their reservation time will be towed.

Visitors can pay when making their required reservation on the ParkMobile website or mobile app. Reserve your spot as early as three days in advance and until 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.

Parking reservations remain free for all spaces south of Crest Road from 7 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays. Parking also remains free for Residential Recreational Parking Permit holders on Park Place (Zone A), though reservations are still required.

Visitors can make parking reservations using the ParkMobile [mobile web browser](#) or by downloading the free ParkMobile app for iOS or Android devices from the [App Store](#) or [Google Play](#). Reservations can also be made by calling ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.

Parking reservations are no longer required for two ADA spaces on Park Place adjacent to Del Cerro Park and the Portuguese Bend Reserve. If both ADA spaces are unavailable, those with ADA placards displayed must use ParkMobile to reserve another parking spot.

Distracted Driving is Dangerous Driving

Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention from driving, including talking on the phone or texting, fiddling with the stereo or navigation system, eating and drinking, or talking to people in your vehicle.

Taking your eyes off the road for 5 seconds at 55mph is like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed. You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving has your full attention. Any non-driving activity you engage in is a potential distraction and increases your risk of crashing.

Turn Down the Stereo

Focusing on music or changing the radio station or playlist takes concentration away from driving. If you must adjust music or your navigation system, pull over to a safe location and park your car. Avoid taking your hands off the wheel and your eyes off the road.

- Adjust your vehicle's controls (radio, playlist, volume, climate controls, seat, etc.) before you begin to drive.
- Take advantage of normal stops to adjust controls.
- Ask your passenger to adjust the radio, climate control, navigation system, etc., for you.



Check your volume before driving, and be sure to always play music at a level that is not distracting. In California, it is illegal to wear headphones or earplugs in both ears when driving a vehicle or riding a bicycle.

Request for Measure H Project Funding Submitted

On Monday, August 9, the City submitted a project proposal to the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG), requesting Measure H Innovation Funds to enhance the City's homelessness response, to hire a consultant to create the City's Plan to Prevent and Combat Homelessness.

Measure H Innovation Funds are allocated by the County to councils of governments to facilitate a regional approach in preventing and combatting homelessness in the County. The SBCCOG released a call for projects in its jurisdiction in June 2021. Notification of results is expected in September.

California Redistricting Commission Public Hearing August 12

The California Citizens' Redistricting Commission is soliciting public testimony to help guide the redistricting process. City Staff will be providing comments on behalf of the City during the Redistricting Commission meeting for Los Angeles County on August 12.

How to Download Your Digital COVID-19 Vaccination Record

Everyone who is vaccinated in California can now request a digital COVID-19 Vaccination Record. Visit myvaccinerecord.cdph.ca.gov to request your record. Be sure to use the email or cell phone number you used when you received your vaccine. It takes less than a minute to complete the request, and your record is sent by email or text within seconds. You can take a screenshot of your record or print it out. It also includes a QR code that makes your digital COVID vaccination record readable by a QR scanner.

In addition to the California Department of Public Health COVID-19 vaccination digital record, several other kinds of digital records are being used in LA County. The type depends on the record-keeping system used by the provider who administered the vaccine. Most systems require the person being vaccinated to give an email address and/or cell phone number when they make an appointment or get vaccinated.



The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health partnered with Healthvana (healthvana.com) in December of 2020 to provide digital vaccination records. These are available to residents of LA County who have received at least one dose of vaccine (regardless of where they were vaccinated) and anyone who has received at least one dose in LA County (regardless of where they live). If you received a vaccine at one of these locations, you should receive an email from vaccine@Healthvana.com and/or a

text message from Healthvana with a secure link (most text messages will display as 37586). When you click the link in the email or text, you will be asked to enter your first name, last name, and date of birth to confirm your identity. You can then view your digital vaccination record. You also have the option to download it to a digital wallet (Apple Wallet for iPhones and Google Pay for Android devices). If you don't get the email or text within one month of being vaccinated, visit the healthvana.com webpage and select "contact" in the menu to request your record.

FEMA Nationwide Emergency Alert Test

Today at 11:20 a.m. PDT, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in coordination with the Federal Communications Commission, conducted a nationwide test of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA).

FEMA regularly tests the public alert and warning systems to assess the operational readiness of the supporting infrastructure. The purpose of today's test was to assess the effectiveness of the [Emergency Alert System](#) (EAS) to receive and convey a national message via radio and television and of the [Wireless Emergency Alert](#) (WEA) infrastructure to deliver a test message to mobile phones.



Wireless Emergency Alerts and the EAS can be used by state and local officials to deliver emergency information like weather alerts, imminent threats, AMBER alerts and local incident notifications. This system ensures that public safety officials can quickly send life-saving messages successfully.

Disasters Can Happen at Any Moment - Are You Prepared?

Disasters can happen in California at any moment.

Living in a state with the potential for wildfires, earthquakes, mudslides, flooding, tsunamis, and more, it is important to consider which disaster could potentially affect your area. Making a plan and preparing before a disaster will help protect you and your loved ones during these times.

There are many considerations to keep in mind when preparing for a disaster. Following the safety steps below will help prepare your family, household members, and friends for any disaster.

HAVE A PLAN: A good place to begin emergency preparedness is by writing a Family Emergency Plan. Your Plan should include every member of your household including pets.

- Your family may not be together if a disaster strikes, so it is important to talk to your friends and family about how you will communicate before, during, and after a disaster.
- Be sure to establish a family meeting place that's familiar and easy to find.

KEEP SUPPLIES: A Disaster Supply Kit is any pre-assembled group of items that will improve the health and safety of your family during a disaster. Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home.

At a minimum, your emergency supplies should include these 10 essential items:

- Water for 3-10 days (1 gallon per person per day)
- Food for 3-10 days (including pet food)
- First Aid Kit and Instructions
- Flashlights (and extra batteries)
- Radio (and extra batteries)
- Medications (prescription and non-prescription)
- Cash and important documents (small bills and coins, birth certificates, tax returns, deeds, titles, insurance papers, medical cards)
- Clothing and sturdy shoes
- Tools (wrench, duct tape, fire extinguisher, sturdy gloves, whistle)
- Sanitation and hygiene supplies

BE INFORMED: It is important to Know what disasters and hazards could affect your area, how to get emergency alerts, and where you would go if you and your family need to evacuate. Make sure your family has a plan and practices it often.

- Learn about natural hazards that may affect the City by reading our recently adopted and FEMA approved [Local Hazard Mitigation Plan](#).
- Have your Ready! Set! Go! Wildfire Action Plan in place.** It is critical for residents to be familiar with the Ready! Set! Go! program that provides important preplanning and evacuation information. To download the Ready! Set! Go! Wildfire Action Plan and view informational how-to videos, visit fire.lacounty.gov/rsg

Protecting Important Records During an Emergency

Most disasters happen in the blink of an eye. That is why it is important to take appropriate measures before they happen to ensure your family is fully prepared. One of those steps is ensuring you protect your important documents.

In the event of a disaster, such as a flood or fire, immediately evacuating your home is sometimes necessary. There may not be time to grab valuable possessions like documents, which, unfortunately, could be destroyed in the disaster. However, once the immediate danger passes, having your financial and medical records and important contact information will be crucial to help you start the recovery process quickly.



Emergency Alerts

Disaster can happen anytime, in any part of the country. When emergencies occur, public safety officials provide critical alerts and warnings to local communities. Through a variety of technologies, these organizations communicate critical information and occasionally order evacuations, allowing residents to take immediate action to stay safe.

There are many emergency mass notification communication tools available to residents and businesses in Los Angeles County. For example, the Emergency Alert System broadcasts emergency information directly to radio and television carriers for widespread emergency events. You may have already seen these messages, which are voice messages with text scrolling on the television screen.

This following is a summary of the different types of warning alerts available and how to receive them.

WIRELESS EMERGENCY ALERTS (WEAS):

Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEAs) are one of many ways public safety officials can quickly and effectively alert the public to serious emergencies. Wireless Emergency Alerts go directly to your cellphone and can be used to send out urgent alerts targeting certain geographic areas.

What you need to know about WEAs:

- WEAs can be sent by state and local public safety officials, the National Weather Service, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and the President of the United States.
- WEAs look like text messages but are designed to get your attention with a unique sound and vibration repeated twice.
- WEAs are no more than 360 characters and include the type and time of the alert, any action you should take and the agency issuing the alert.
- WEAs are not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts, calls or data sessions that are in progress.
- You are not charged for receiving WEAs and there is no need to subscribe.

If you are not receiving Wireless Emergency Alerts here are some tips to troubleshoot your mobile device:

- Check the settings on your mobile phones and review your user manual (you may be able to find this online too).
- Some mobile service providers call these messages “Government Alerts,” or “Emergency Alert Messages.”
- All major phone providers and some smaller providers participate in WEA. Check with your wireless providers to see if they can resolve the issue.

EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM:

The Emergency Alert System (EAS) is a national public warning system that allows the president to address the American people within 10 minutes during a national emergency. The alerts are sent through broadcasters, satellite digital audio services, direct broadcast satellite providers, cable television systems and wireless cable systems.

The EAS may also be used by state and local authorities to deliver important emergency information such as weather information, imminent threats, AMBER alerts and local incident information targeted to specific areas. The president has sole responsibility for determining when the national-level EAS will be activated.

OPT-IN NOTIFICATION SYSTEMS:

Opt-In mass notification systems can vary by region but operate similarly in what reasons people are notified. Alerts received could be about extreme weather or natural disasters, road closures, missing people, or evacuations. These alerts are managed by the local agency that set them up.

Alert Southbay: Alert SouthBay is a multi-jurisdictional emergency notification system used by 14 South Bay cities – including Rancho Palos Verdes - to keep our communities informed about disasters and emergencies with uniform and expeditious alerts. Alert SouthBay is an opt-in alert system using the Everbridge software application. Similar to Nixle alerts, Everbridge sends notifications via email, text message, cellular and landline phones.

Alert SouthBay will act as the City's primary vehicle for emergency communication. Residents can sign up for Alert SouthBay by:

- Texting “alertsb” to 888-777, which returns a link to register for Everbridge
- Registering online at alertsouthbay.com
- Downloading the free [Everbridge app](#) on an iOS or Android device from the [App Store](#) or [Google Play](#).

Alert LA County: In Los Angeles County, the Sheriff's Department uses Alert LA County to contact residents and businesses via phone, text messages or e-mail messages in case of emergency. This system is used to send shelter-in-place instructions, evacuation, and other emergency messages. It has accessibility features for people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs.




Follow these tips to help prevent vehicle burglaries:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Fiscal Year 2021-22 Budget in Brief Brochure

The Fiscal Year 2021-22 Budget in Brief Brochure is now available on the City's website. The Budget in Brief provides an abridged overview of the FY 2021-22 budget in a concise and easy to read format. CITY PERSONNEL

The City's operating departments are City Administration, Community Development, Finance, Public Works, and Recreation & Parks. For FY 2021-22, there are a total of 73 approved full-time positions, 70 of which are funded. Additionally, the City employs part-time staff that are equivalent to 27 full-time positions, the majority of which work in the Recreation & Parks Department. The remaining City services, including public safety, are provided by contracted outside agencies and vendors.

BUDGET PROCESS

The City's budget process began in February with the City Council Goals Workshop. During this workshop the City Council reviewed the progress of the goals set during FY 2020-21. Additionally, the City Council established the framework for the FY 2021-22 goals and priorities for the upcoming budget.

The Goals Workshop is followed by two Budget Workshops which document the budget assumptions based on midyear figures. The General Fund Budget Workshop was held on March 30th and the CIP Budget Workshop was conducted on April 12th. Prior to this meeting Staff reported all assumptions, projects, and programs to the City Council's appointed Committees - Finance Advisory Committee (FAC), Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee (IMAC), and the Planning Commission (PC).

Staff then presented the Preliminary Budget to the City Council on May 18th. In this meeting Staff confirmed that the Preliminary Budget presented is in accordance with City Council Policy No. 45, Balanced Operating Budget, which ensures a structurally balanced budget, where recurring revenues are greater than or equal to recurring expenditures, is adopted.

After completing the City Council Goals Workshop in February, two Budget Workshops in March and April, and the review of the Preliminary Budget in May, the City Council was then presented with the FY 2021-22 Budget during a public hearing held on June 1st. The Budget Public Hearing contained a comprehensive report that documented the forthcoming year's budget. Additionally, this report highlighted a summary of the FY 2020-21 General Fund Balance and the FY 2021-22 Budget Assumptions for the General Fund, Capital Infrastructure Project Fund, Special Revenue Funds, and Equipment Replacement Fund. On June 15th the City Council continued the public hearing and adopted the budget for FY 2021-22.

Statewide Sales Tax Trends

The Finance Department works with several outside consultants and analysts to monitor trends related to the City's revenue sources. HdL provides a quarterly look at sales tax trends by sector. Below you will find insights and projections for two sectors.

General Consumer Goods

FY20-21: Projected 6.0% growth

FY21-22: Projected 8.3% growth

Core retail sales in the first quarter of 2021 demonstrated California consumers are willing to spend. Tax receipts rebounded with more than a 10% increase from the same period in 2020 when COVID-19 tangibly impacted physical stores along with consumer's ability to purchase goods. For perspective, while the rebound exceeded expectations, revenues remained 2% below pre-pandemic levels (1Q19). The third round of fiscal stimulus lifted spending on taxable goods in the last month of the first quarter, but impacts are expected throughout 2021. A large concentration of spending remains at discount department stores and other well-known chains, but scars remain from the volume of struggling and closed small businesses which is still visible in many sectors and communities. Anchored to an 'open for business' economy, robust consumer spending along with recent fiscal stimulus drives our forecast for general consumer goods spending beyond pre-pandemic levels by fiscal year 2021/22. As the service sectors also rally, growth should stabilize as consumers shift spending back towards experiences after more than a year of above-average durable goods consumption.

Autos/Transportation

FY20-21: Projected 14.5% growth

FY21-22: Projected 2.9% growth

This major industry group experienced a classical V-shaped recovery in the aftermath of the COVID-19 recession. New car sales dropped 68% or more at many dealers around the State in the initial weeks after the State's pandemic shutdown order in March 2020. Sales have since steadily rebounded and are now 13% higher than the same period in 2019, a year before the crisis began. Limited supply has been overwhelmed by strong demand. Consumers are treating themselves to more expensive models, with new cars reported to be 8% more costly this year. The California New Car Dealer's Association reports that Porsche, Mercedes and Tesla have been the most sought-after brands in 2021. S&P Global and other research firms are forecasting continued growth in the 15% range for the remainder of the year before sales begin to flatten out in 2022.







League of California Cities - Roundtable Discussion on Street Vending

Topics also discussed included management tools for street vending and the effect of street vending on the public right-of-way. Many cities including Rancho Palos Verdes expressed concerns with the unintended consequences resulting from the passing of SB 946 and are requesting that amendments to the bill be considered.

ParkMobile Parking App Update

On July 6, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes launched an online parking reservation system for Del Cerro Park and the popular Portuguese Bend Reserve. Visitors can now use the ParkMobile website or mobile app to reserve parking spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place, near the Rattlesnake and Burma Road Trailheads. A total of 171 reservations were made between August 2-August 8: 70 paid reservations, 43 resident reservations, and 58 free reservations on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.

Staff will continue to report on total reservations and other data points each week.

The system is being implemented to manage parking and improve traffic flow in the Del Cerro Park area. Staff is working closely with ParkMobile personnel to fine-tune the system and respond to all user concerns and issues. An update on the program will be presented to the City Council on October 5.

Parking with ParkMobile

- **Update:** Starting the week of August 2, reservations were no longer free of charge. Reservations are now \$10 per reservation block and can be paid using ParkMobile. An additional \$0.35 processing fee will apply to all paid reservations.
- ParkMobile reservations are now required for all 58 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place.
- Reservations must be made by 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.
- Visitors are not able to park and then reserve their spot.
- Reservations are limited to blocks of two hours and 45 minutes from 7 a.m. to an hour after sunset. Shorter or longer blocks are not available at this time.
- Parking is free from 7 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays.

- Fifteen spaces on Park Place adjacent to Del Cerro Park remain available to those who hold a Residential Recreational Parking Permit at this time. Permit holders will need to reserve these spaces (in Zone A) using ParkMobile.
- The two ADA parking spaces on Park Place no longer require Residential Recreational Parking Permits or ParkMobile reservations. They are available on a first come-first served availability basis for any visitor with a valid ADA parking placard. This reduces the total number of reservable spaces from 60 to 58.
- Street parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road is free and does not require reservations.



Filiorum Reserve

OSM staff continues to monitor tree carvings throughout the Preserve, particularly on cacti pads and Eucalyptus trees. Carving on trees is illegal, and it affects the tree outer layer of bark, which, similar to our skin, acts as a protective layer to keep bacteria and pests out. Carving on trees makes the trees susceptible to diseases and pests. OSM staff will apply a non-toxic protective coating to create a barrier and cover up any carvings left on the trees.

Forrestal Reserve

During this reporting period, Rangers continue to educate patrons on permitted and approved use of Ladera Linda fields located on PVPUSD property. In total, Rangers contacted four soccer players and three visitors with dogs off-leash during this week. Patrons were advised to use the field at Ladera Linda Park for casual soccer play or to use existing trails within the Forrestal Reserve to access the trail system.



Several “No E-bikes or Pedal Assisted Bikes Allowed” signs were recently stolen from trailheads throughout the Nature Preserve since their initial installation in May 2021. Over the past two weeks, staff reinstalled signs at major trailheads to remind visitors regarding the prohibition on the use of e-bikes in the Nature Preserve.

Ocean Trails Reserve

As a result of a landslide within Ocean Trails Reserve, trail closures include the Coastal Switchback Trail and adjacent beach area. In addition, the nearby bridge along Catalina Trail and Lakeview Trail is also closed due to land movement. Geologists continue to inspect this area weekly to monitor additional movement and provide recommendations to staff for trail reroutes when deemed safe.

Portuguese Bend Reserve

Vehicles are advised to use caution and abide by posted speed limits. A post was damaged at an access point by lower Portuguese Bend Reserve and Forrestal Reserve trails. Temporary barriers are in place to deter unauthorized access. Vehicles accessing and parked in this area will be cited.



Cal Water crews completed work on the Burma Road Trail to repair piping that had been damaged by landslide movement and was in need of repairs.
