

REMINDER Housing Element Update – City Council/Planning Commission Study Session to be Conducted on August 24

As a reminder, on August 24, the City Council and Planning Commission will conduct a joint Study Session on the City's 2021-2029 Housing Element Update. Topics will include:

- Housing Element overview
- Presentation from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) regarding housing element law and the requirements for the 6th Cycle Housing Element Update
- Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) Plan prepared by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG)
- Developing regulations to accommodate the City's RHNA allocation in all income categories
- City Council and Planning Commission input on up-zoning, accessory dwelling units (ADUs), streamlined permit processing, etc. to accommodate more housing.



The hybrid in-person/virtual meeting will take place at 7 p.m. in McTaggart Hall at Fred Hesse Jr. Community Park and via Zoom with a very limited number of in-person attendees and COVID-19 safety protocols in place. **Virtual participation is highly encouraged.** The meeting will be live-streamed on the City website and televised on RPVtv Cox 35/Frontier FiOS 39. Bubbles Whale Statue Restoration Project

Bubbles, the pilot whale, a beloved part of South Bay marine history, may once again jump for joy at the Point Vicente Interpretive Center!

City Council took action to relaunch the effort to restore and display Bubbles, which was always the City's goal when we acquired the statue over 30 years ago.

Recently, Mayor Alegria was interviewed by CBS in front of the Bubbles statue, which has been in storage for over 30 years, and viewers got an up-close look at its current state of disrepair.



The Bubbles statue restoration effort getting picked up by CBS speaks to the nostalgia across Southern California for Marineland. In the interview, the Mayor highlighted the fact that Bubbles was an icon and a rich part of our City's history, and how putting the statue back on display will serve as a source of inspiration and education for the community and provide a tangible link to the past for current and future generations. It's always been the City's intent to bring back Bubbles and we are thrilled to have some Bubbles enthusiasts in the community, including Jon Sansom, Suzanne Seymour and other volunteers, who have re-energized the effort to make this vision a reality.

The City Council has decided on placing Bubbles outside the entry sign of the Point Vicente Interpretive Center, and we hope this project will be completed in a year or two. The next steps are to get updated designs and cost estimates, and of course, secure

funding. Mr. Sansom took the lead on creating a GoFundMe page aiming to raise \$300,000 in donations for the restoration project. The funds will be donated to the City specifically for the project. DDT Update

Last week, the [Daily Breeze reported](#) that a team of scientists conducting a deep-water mission off the coast of Catalina Island were able to collect sediment samples near barrels on the seafloor for DDT testing, but due limited resources, no funding is available to study the samples for the presence of DDT.

With an underwater robot, the team of scientists from UC San Diego's Scripps Institution of Oceanography and the United States Geological Survey collected sediment and biological samples around six barrels to understand potential ecological effects of the dump site and to determine the levels of DDT present in the ecosystem after more than 50 years, according to a [press release](#). The site had been surveyed previously by scientists from UC Santa Barbara and Scripps on [previous expeditions](#).

The issue of historic chemical dumping off the coast of the Peninsula has come under renewed focus due to the recently rediscovered barrel dumping site on the seafloor near Catalina Island. The City has been actively engaged on this issue and has advocated for local, state and federal officials and agencies to make it possible to assess the true extent of contamination off the coast. Staff will continue to monitor this issue.

City Council Goals and Action Plan Updates

On March 17, 2020, the City Council agreed to change the annual goal-setting process from a calendar year basis (January 1 to December 31) to a fiscal year basis (July 1 to June 30). The City Council also agreed to receive quarterly updates rather than monthly as a “receive and file” item on the Regular portion of the City Council agenda (rather than the Study Session). Earlier this year, the City Council agreed to align the adoption of the goals with the budget to ensure funding of the goals.



Staff will present Fiscal Year 2021-2022 first-quarter update on September 21.

Voters can drop off their vote-by-mail ballots for the September 14 election at the drop box near the flagpole outside City Hall, which is located at 30940 Hawthorne Boulevard.



Before you drop off your vote-by-mail ballot, make sure to:

- ✓ Place your voted ballot card(s) inside the official return envelope
- ✓ Securely seal the official return envelope
- ✓ Sign and date the back of the official return envelope

Ballots will be securely collected by Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk staff members daily.

Distracted Driving is Dangerous Driving


Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention from driving, including talking on the phone or texting, fiddling with the stereo or navigation system, eating and drinking, or talking to people in your vehicle.

Taking your eyes off the road for 5 seconds at 55mph is like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed. You cannot drive safely unless the task of driving has your full attention. Any non-driving activity you engage in is a potential distraction and increases your risk of crashing.

Don't Eat and Drive

If you are eating in your vehicle while driving, you are focusing on your food and not on your driving.

Not only are you eating or drinking, but you are opening packages, unwrapping and re-wrapping food, reaching, leaning, spilling, wiping, and cleaning yourself or your vehicle. This is a lot of distractions for one driver on one trip. You are safer when you stop to eat or drink.



Legislation Corner: SB 9 Amended and Will be Heard on August 19

The California Legislature resumed its session on August 16. Please see attachments to view the City's legislation matrix, which has updated positions of all bills the City is monitoring.

SB 9 (Atkins), which would allow developers to build up to four housing units on a single parcel in residential neighborhoods traditionally zoned for single-family homes, was amended on August 16 to include the following:

- Requires applicants to sign an affidavit stating they intend to occupy one of the housing units as their principal residence for a minimum of three years.
- Allows local agencies to deny a proposed housing development project if the building official makes a written finding that the proposed project would have a specific, adverse impact upon public health and safety or the physical environment for which there is no method to satisfactorily mitigate or avoid the impact.

West Harbor Amphitheater Update

Earlier this week, Staff learned that the Port of Los Angeles is moving forward with an environmental assessment that was put on hold by the pandemic for a proposed 6,200-seat amphitheater planned for West Harbor, the future, 42-acre development on the site of the former Ports O' Call Village in San Pedro. According to the Port of Los Angeles, the supplemental environmental impact report (EIR) is expected to be released for public review in 60-90 days. Community concerns have been expressed regarding the size of the amphitheater located on the southern tip of the site, near the Southern Pacific Slip, and its potential impacts to surrounding neighborhoods. Port of Los Angeles staff previously indicated that the stage and speakers would face southeast toward the ocean and that the amphitheater would be operated seasonally in the spring and summer months, similar to the Greek Theatre in Los Angeles, with weekend-focused programming (Thursday-Sunday). Staff will continue to monitor this issue in future Border Issues Status Reports.



U.S. Announces Plans for Booster Shots

Today, federal health officials announced they have developed a plan to begin offering COVID-19 vaccine booster shots this fall, pending final FDA evaluation of third doses of the Pfizer and Moderna mRNA vaccines and formal recommendations from CDC's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). Third Dose of Pfizer or Moderna Vaccine Available for Certain Immunocompromised Residents

Following the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) approval of an additional dose of the Pfizer and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines for immunocompromised people, Los Angeles County is now administering third doses to those who qualify.

The FDA has amended the Emergency Use Authorization for these vaccines to allow for a third dose which can be administered at least 28 days following the second dose of the vaccine.

VACCINATE LA COUNTY

HOW DO I KNOW IF I AM ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE A THIRD DOSE?

You are eligible for a third dose if you are:

- Receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood;
- Received an organ transplant and am taking medicine to suppress my immune system;
- Received a stem cell transplant within the last 2 years or am taking medicine to suppress the immune system;
- Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (such as DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome);
- Advanced or untreated HIV infection;
- Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that suppress my immune response

Ideally individuals should be vaccinated with the same vaccine they received for the first and second dose, but if that is not possible, receiving a third dose with another mRNA vaccine is acceptable.

Although the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines work very well in the majority of individuals, there is evidence that individuals who are severely immunocompromised are not fully protected after receiving two doses and this small, vulnerable group may benefit from a third dose. Certain medical conditions or the treatments used for specific conditions may prevent the immune system from responding adequately to two doses of the vaccine and therefore require an additional dose to provide adequate protection from COVID-19. Individuals who qualify for a third dose include organ transplant recipients, people undergoing cancer treatment, people with advanced or untreated HIV and those on certain immunosuppressive medications.

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health encourages individuals who qualify for a third dose to speak to their healthcare provider to confirm their eligibility and get vaccinated. Third doses of the vaccines are accessible through vaccination sites that currently offer Pfizer or Moderna vaccines. Eligible individuals can provide a self-attestation that they have a qualifying medical condition at these sites.

A follow-up dose is not currently recommended for those who have received a single dose of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine. The FDA is still evaluating data on the effectiveness of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine in immunocompromised individuals. COVID-19 vaccine booster doses are also not recommended for the general public at this time.

L.A. County Health Officer Order Modified to Require Masking at Outdoor Mega Events

On August 17, the L.A. County Health Officer Order was modified to require universal masking at outdoor mega events regardless of COVID-19 vaccination status. Masks are required to be worn by everyone at all times except when actively eating or drinking at these events. Outdoor mega events are outdoor events with crowds greater than 10,000 attendees and include music or food festivals, car shows, large endurance events, marathons, parades, sporting events and concerts.

As the highly infectious Delta variant continues to spread, wearing masks regardless of vaccination status indoors and in crowded settings, including at outdoor mega events, reduces the risk of being infected with and transmitting COVID-19. According to the L.A. County Department of Public Health, emerging data affirms that fully vaccinated people are well protected from severe infections with Delta variants. Although fully vaccinated people are less likely to become infected than unvaccinated people are, they can become infected and transmit infection to others.

MASKS REQUIRED AT OUTDOOR MEGA EVENTS

At any large outdoor events, including music or food festivals, car shows, marathons, parades, and sporting events with over 10,000 people:

- Masks are required at all times except when actively eating or drinking.
- It is recommended that event operators verify vaccination status or a negative COVID-19 test for all attendees.

Cox Communications Update

On August 17, 2021, representatives from Cox Communications' government affairs division addressed the City Council in response to a flood of inquiries from residents experiencing connectivity issues. The presentation included an update on Cox Communications' progress since their previous appearance at the October 2020 city council meeting in terms of service enhancements and resolving resident customer service complaints (see attachments).

The purpose of this presentation was to express the community's concerns with Cox's internet speed and reliability services and to identify measures to improve those services. At this meeting, among other topics discussed, it was agreed that City Staff will continue to coordinate with Cox Communications to identify ways to improve services for Peninsula residents, and look at partnership opportunities to expand broad band in light of federal funding opportunities.

To ensure the safety of your family and loved ones during an emergency, the City's Emergency Preparedness Committee continues to send residents monthly email messages with emergency preparedness information and educational materials. Emergency Supply Kits

After a whole community emergency or disaster, the general services we take for granted, such as running water, refrigeration, and telephones, may be unavailable. Experts recommend that you should be prepared for at least three days.

The RPV Emergency Preparedness Committee is offering the following lists of items that will help you put together your emergency kits. Most of the items are inexpensive and easy to find and any of them could save your life.

Your basic emergency kit should include:

Water (one gallon per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation)	A copy of important documents & phone numbers.
Food (at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food)	Personal hygiene items
Battery-powered or hand crank radio	Pet supplies
Flashlight	Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
First aid kit	Manual can opener
Extra batteries	Cash (in small bills)
Whistle (to signal for help)	Local maps
Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)	Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery
	Warm clothes & sturdy shoes
	Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children

Kit Storage Locations:

Since you do not know where you will be when an emergency occurs, prepare supplies for home, work, and cars.

- **Home:** Keep this kit in a designated place and have it ready in case you have to leave your home quickly. Make sure all family members know where the kit is kept.
- **Work:** Be prepared to shelter at work for at least 24 hours. Your work kit should include food, water, and other necessities like medicines, as well as comfortable walking shoes, stored in a "grab and go" case.
- **Car:** In case you are stranded, keep a kit of emergency supplies in your car.

Thunderstorms & Lightning Safety

Thunderstorms last an average of 30 minutes and can cause dangerous lightning, large hail, flash flooding, and strong winds. They often develop quickly, and with little warning, it is important to learn the danger signs and plan ahead. Lightning is a leading cause of injury and death from weather-related hazards. Although

most lightning victims survive, people struck by lightning often report various long-term, debilitating symptoms.

Thunderstorms are dangerous storms that include lightning and can:

- Include powerful winds over 50 MPH;
- Create hail; and
- Cause [flash flooding](#) and [tornadoes](#).

Understanding Severe Weather Alerts: The National Weather Service issues a number of Watches, Warnings, and other products to alert the public about severe weather events.

Be prepared for severe weather by educating yourself on the differences between a **Severe Thunderstorm Watch** and **Severe Thunderstorm Warning**.

- **Severe Thunderstorm Watch: Be Prepared!** Severe thunderstorms are possible in and near the watch area. Stay informed and be ready to act if a severe thunderstorm warning is issued. The watch area is typically large, covering numerous counties or even states.
- **Severe Thunderstorm Warning: Take Action!** Severe weather has been reported by spotters or indicated by radar. Warnings indicate imminent danger to life and property. Take shelter in a substantial building. Warnings typically encompass a much smaller area (around the size of a city or small county) that may be impacted by a large hail or damaging wind identified by an NWS forecaster on radar or by a trained spotter/law enforcement who is watching the storm.

How to Stay Safe BEFORE a Thunderstorm Threatens:

PREPARE NOW: In advance of any storm, be sure your property is secure. Make a list of items outside your home you will need to tie down or put away so that they don't blow away or fly through a window.

- Be Weather-Ready:** Check the forecast regularly to see if you're at risk for severe weather. Listen to local news or an NOAA Weather Radio to stay informed about severe thunderstorm watches and warnings.
- Prepare Your Home:** Keep trees and branches trimmed near your house. If you have time before severe weather hits, secure loose objects, close windows and doors, and move any valuable objects inside or under a sturdy structure.

- Make a Kit:** Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly. Update your kits and supplies based on recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control.
- Create a Communications Plan:** Have a family plan that includes an emergency meeting place and related information. Additional information for creating a communications plan is available at: <http://ready.gov/make-a-plan>
- Practice Your Plan:** Conduct a family severe thunderstorm drill regularly so everyone knows what to do if a damaging wind or large hail is approaching. Make sure all members of your family know to go there when severe thunderstorm warnings are issued.

How to Stay Safe DURING a Thunderstorm:

- Stay Weather Ready:** Continue to listen to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio to stay updated about severe thunderstorm watches and warnings.
- When thunder roars, go indoors:** Immediately go inside a sturdy building when severe thunderstorms are approaching and move to an interior room or basement. Take your pets with you if time allows. Take shelter in your car if you are not near a sturdy building. If possible, drive to a nearby sturdy building. Otherwise, move your car to a location where it is less likely to be hit by falling trees or power lines.
- In a vehicle:** Being in a vehicle during severe thunderstorms is safer than being outside; if caught in a vehicle during a severe thunderstorm safely exit the roadway and park if possible. Stay in the vehicle and turn on the emergency flashers until the heavy rain ends. Avoid touching metal or other surfaces that conduct electricity in and outside the vehicle.
- Turn Around. Don't Drown!:** Just six inches of fast-moving water can knock you down, and one foot of moving water can sweep your vehicle away. Each year, more deaths occur due to flooding than from any other thunderstorm related hazard. People underestimate the force and power of water. Many of the deaths occur in cars swept downstream. It is NEVER safe to drive or walk into flood waters.

How to Stay Safe AFTER a Thunderstorm:

- Stay Informed:** Continue listening to local news or a NOAA Weather Radio to stay updated about severe thunderstorm watches and warnings. More severe thunderstorms could be headed your way.
- Contact Your Family and Loved Ones:** Let your family and close friends know that you're okay so they can help spread the word. Text messages or social media are more reliable forms of communication than phone calls.
- Assess the Damage:** After you are sure the severe weather threat has ended, check your property for damages. When walking through storm damage, wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, and sturdy shoes. Contact local authorities if you see power lines down.
- Help Your Neighbor:** If you come across people that are injured and you are properly trained, if needed, provide first aid to victims until emergency response team members arrive.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Statewide Sales Tax Trends

The Finance Department works with several outside consultants and analysts to monitor trends related to the City's revenue sources. HdL provides a quarterly look at sales tax trends by sector. Below you will find insights and projections for two sectors.

Business/Industry

FY20-21: Projected 12.8% growth

FY21-22: Projected 11.9% growth

Many of the business types captured in this segment are rallying including agriculture and farm equipment and energy/utilities. As the segment's largest business type, fulfillment center's taxes boomed from increased online sales. Additionally, a large taxpayer altered its business structure effective 1Q21, which resulted in a sizeable portion of revenues from the statewide pools shifting to agencies with fulfillment centers. Medical/Biotech also surged, with the acquisition of medical equipment, pharmaceuticals, and the return of elective and non-emergency medical procedures. Conversely, business closures plagued areas such as food service equipment, office supplies/furniture, business services, government/social organizations, and entertainment. Finally, California industry lags compared to prior periods as it faces challenges such as raw materials and qualified worker shortages. Overall, this group should perform beyond pre-pandemic levels, however, given its unique mix, each jurisdiction's experience will differ according to the size and character of its specific business/industrial base.

State and County Pools

FY20-21: Projected 23.5% growth

FY21-22: Projected 7.3% growth

Again, consumer behavior was anchored to online shopping as the preferred alternative to making multiple trips to various retail establishments. Since early 2020, companies accelerated efforts to make e-commerce shopping easier, especially as they offered flexible payment and delivery options. Recent studies show customers value convenience more now than prior to the pandemic. Many experts note e-commerce

behaviors that accelerated over the past year are here to stay; thus, the forecast shows steady improvement through the next fiscal year. Projections are lessened to some extent as HdL monitored changes in a taxpayer's business structure that required portions of what were use tax pool revenues being remitted to local agencies with in-state fulfillment centers beginning in the first quarter of 2021. This change is reflected in the growth percentages noted herein.



Undergrounding Along Palos Verdes Drive South

This week, crews continue to remove some overhead cables along Palos Verdes Drive South, from La Rotonda Drive into San Pedro, and install replacement cables underground. Subsequently, the remaining overhead cable lines will be undergrounded, and then pole removal will be scheduled. 



Gabrieleño/Tongva Native American Memorial at Abalone Cove Park

On August 17, staff from Recreation and Parks and Public Works met with project organizer Tom Steers and a contractor from Wellington Signs at Abalone Cove Park for a pre-construction walkthrough to finalize the installation schedule for the new memorial honoring the Gabrieleño/Tongva Native Americans—the “First Peoples of the Los Angeles Basin”. This project dates back to 2016 when Tom Steers first approached the City with the idea for a memorial. Tom has coordinated the funding of this project with private donations. The City is very excited to be able to educate the public about the Gabrieleño/Tongva Native Americans and the important role they have played in the history of Southern California, and specifically Rancho Palos Verdes. Gabrieleño/Tongva descendants have been closely involved in the design and artwork for the monument plaques to ensure their historical accuracy and appropriateness. The City is very appreciative of professional sculptor Geri Jimenez Gould for creating such a remarkable piece of artwork. Construction is set to begin next week and should be complete by the end of August. A ribbon-cutting ceremony is tentatively scheduled for October—additional details forthcoming.

2020 Preserve Annual Report

The 2020 Annual Report for the Rancho Palos Verdes Natural Communities Conservation Plan/Habitat Conservation Plan (NCCP/HCP) is scheduled for the September 7, 2021, City Council Meeting. The Annual Report was released for early review on August 15. This report was sent out through the Preserve listserv group and can be found on the City's Preserve webpage, under the NCCP/HCP PUMP menu item. It is linked below:

The Annual Report fulfills annual submittal requirements by the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy and the City of Rancho Palos Verdes for the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve. It serves to evaluate the implementation of the NCCP/HCP during the preceding year and the adequacy of the overall progress being made toward reaching the conservation goals of the NCCP/HCP. Annual submittal requirements are:

- Gains/losses to habitat within the plan Area
- A list of all covered activities performed and project review process
- Impacts of public uses and recommendations, if necessary, for minimizing impacts to the Preserve
- A summary of night-time use of the Preserve
- All contributions toward the preservation of habitat lands
- Description of the management of invasive plant species

- Documentation of the habitat restoration efforts to enhance and restore native plant communities and the results of biological monitoring
- Annual evaluation of management activities, enforcement activities, funding needs, and ability to accomplish resource management goals
- A separate fiscal report prepared jointly by the City and PVPLC
- A summary of clerical changes made to the plan, including corrections to maps or exhibits, and changes made to the survey monitoring, or reporting protocols

Additionally, this report details stewardship activities, research, funding, enforcement reports, trail counter data, and community involvement in the Preserve during the period January 1 through December 31, 2020.

City Council Amends Municipal Code and Bail Schedule Regarding Preserve, Parks, and Open Space

At the August 17, 2021, City Council Meeting, the City Council took action to make five key changes to the City's Municipal Code and Bail Schedule related to regulations and fines within the City's Preserve, Parks, and open space areas.

These changes include:

1. Renaming the title of Chapter 12.16 to include the word "Preserve." This Chapter now reads, "Streets, Parks, Preserve, and Recreational Facilities."
2. Repealing and replacing Section 12.16.010 (Protection of Flora Fauna and Public Buildings and structures) to include a new provision that would allow the City to recover costs from violators to restore damage to City property.
3. Repealing and replacing Section 12.16.020 (Motorized Vehicles) to clarify that e-bikes are prohibited in City Preserve, parks, and open space areas.
4. Adding Section 12.16.170 (Commercial Services and Industrial Activities Prohibited in Parks, Preserve, and Recreational Areas) to prohibit commercial services and industrial activities in the Preserve, parks, and open space areas.
5. Updating the bail schedule to assign fines to seven pre-existing violations, and the new Section 12.16.170.

These changes will be re-introduced at the September 7, 2021 City Council meeting. This meeting will include the City Attorney's opinion on a proposed change to RPVMC 12.16.045 regarding paragliding regulations which was discussed at the August 17 meeting. The proposed change was to prohibit paragliding over public property.

ParkMobile Parking App Update

On July 6, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes launched an online parking reservation system for Del Cerro Park and the popular Portuguese Bend Reserve. Visitors can now use the ParkMobile website or mobile app to reserve parking spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place, near the Rattlesnake and Burma Road Trailheads. A total of 131 reservations were made between August 9-August 15: 37 paid reservations, 51 resident reservations, and 43 free reservations on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.

Staff will continue to report on total reservations and other data points each week.

The system is being implemented to manage parking and improve traffic flow in the Del Cerro Park area. Staff is working closely with ParkMobile personnel to fine-tune the system and respond to all user concerns and issues. An update on the program will be presented to the City Council on October 5.

Parking with ParkMobile

- **Update:** Starting the week of August 2, reservations were no longer free of charge. Reservations are now \$10 per reservation block and can be paid using ParkMobile. An additional \$0.35 processing fee will apply to all paid reservations.
- ParkMobile reservations are now required for all 58 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place.
- Reservations must be made by 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.
- Visitors are not able to park and then reserve their spot.
- Reservations are limited to blocks of two hours and 45 minutes from 7 a.m. to an hour after sunset. Shorter or longer blocks are not available at this time.
- Parking is free from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays.
- Fifteen spaces on Park Place adjacent to Del Cerro Park remain available to those who hold a Residential Recreational Parking Permit at this time. Permit holders will need to reserve these spaces (in Zone A) using ParkMobile.
- The two ADA parking spaces on Park Place no longer require Residential Recreational Parking Permits or ParkMobile reservations. They are available on a

first-come-first served availability basis for any visitor with a valid ADA parking placard. This reduces the total number of reservable spaces from 60 to 58.

- Street parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road is free and does not require reservations.

Visitors can make parking reservations on a mobile web browser or by downloading the free ParkMobile app for iOS or Android devices from the App Store or Google Play. Reservations can also be made by calling ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.

Abalone Cove Reserve

From August 9 to August 15, staff did not observe any poaching activity in the City's Marine Protected Areas. Staff will continue to monitor.

Forrestal Reserve/Adjacent Properties

During this reporting period, Rangers continue to educate patrons on permitted and approved use of Ladera Linda fields located on PVPUSD property. No unauthorized activity was observed. Patrons on the fields are advised to use the field at Ladera Linda Park for casual soccer play or to use existing trails within the Forrestal Reserve to access the trail system.

Ocean Trails Reserve

As a result of a landslide within Ocean Trails Reserve, trail closures include the Coastal Switchback Trail and adjacent beach area. In addition, the nearby bridge along Catalina Trail and Lakeview Trail is also closed due to land movement. Geologists continue to inspect this area weekly to monitor additional movement and will be providing recommendations to staff for trail reroutes.



Portuguese Bend Reserve


Volunteers found two discarded “No E-bikes or Pedal Assisted Bikes Allowed” signs as well as a section of the burned carpet by Lundquist Overlook. No evidence of fire damage was found in the immediate area.

Cal Water continued to repair damage caused to the Preserve by a fire hydrant discharge on Burrell Lane and Crenshaw Boulevard on July 17. Repair work includes the use of a backhoe to fill in and level the grade dip on Burma Road Trail and the clearance of sediment buildup in an 8-inch pipe along Gary’s Gulch Trail.

When participating in gatherings or activities, all park rules must be followed, and attendance at informal gatherings cannot exceed thresholds in the Special Event Permits ordinance.

Dear Commissioners:

The Cities of Rancho Palos Verdes, Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates are located on the Palos Verdes Peninsula in Los Angeles County. The Peninsula is currently represented by the 33rd U.S. Congressional District, the 26th State Senate District, and the 66th State Assembly District. However, the goals we have for redistricting are stated below.

The Peninsula cities share one school district, one library district, one local transit authority, one land conservancy, and frequently work together on areas of mutual interest such as emergency preparedness and public safety. The cities of Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills, and Rolling Hills Estates additionally share a regional contract with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department for law enforcement, and the four cities contract with the Los Angeles County Fire Department.

The Peninsula cities are intimately tied to the coastal cities and communities of the South Bay region, including, but not limited to, Torrance, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, and El Segundo, many of which are within the jurisdiction of the California Coastal Commission. We share with our northerly South Bay neighbors a dependence upon a common transportation network for access to the rest of the Los Angeles region, and share many economic and cultural factors.

We are primarily residential communities and share a common affinity and appreciation of the unique physical and cultural environment afforded by our location along the coast. Many of the prominent regional community organizations serve the area extending northward from the Peninsula toward Los Angeles International Airport (LAX). The Peninsula cities are an integral part of the South Bay, as evidenced by our active participation in the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG).

Following the 2010 Census, the cities were realigned with the northern coastal cities and communities of the South Bay – located generally west of the I-110 and I-405 freeways and south of LAX. We have appreciated the common representation these districts have provided and would request that the Peninsula cities continue to be districted together and with the South Bay.


