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
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


### Find a Vote Center (Peninsula Locations to Open September 11)

Vote centers are open and ready for voting in Los Angeles County in the September 14 California Recall Election. More than 100 locations throughout the county are open daily from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Additional vote centers, including two locations on the Peninsula (Ridgecrest Intermediate School and First Baptist Church of Palos Verdes), will be open starting September 11. **Please note that Hesse Park and RPV City Hall are NOT vote center locations.**



## Legislation Corner: Legislature Nears Close of Session

The 2021 Legislative Session is approaching the deadline for the Legislature to pass bills for the Governor's consideration and signature/veto on September 10. The Governor will have until October 10 to sign or veto bills.


So far this week, two bills the City Council has taken a position on have passed to the Governor's desk, in addition to SB 9 (Atkins) and SB 10 (Wiener) that passed to the Governor last week; AJR 2 (O'Donnell) and SB 556 (Dodd).



AJR 2 would request that the US Congress and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) take all measures necessary to prevent damage to California's citizens, wildlife, and natural resources by the dichloro-diphenyl-trichloroethane (DDT) waste dumped in the waters near Santa Catalina Island. The City Council supported this bill on April 6, 2021, and a letter requesting the Governor's signature on the bill will be issued.

SB 556 would require cities to make street light and traffic signal poles available to telecommunications providers for installation of cellular service equipment. The City Council opposed this bill on April 6, 2021, and a letter requesting the Governor's veto of the bill will be issued.

## **Public Health Continues Monitoring COVID-19 Variants**

The Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health) continues to track variant cases in Los Angeles County. While the most dominant circulating variant in L.A. County continues to be the highly transmissible Delta variant, a variant of concern, the Mu variant, a variant of interest, is being closely monitored. To date, Public Health has identified 167 Mu variants in L.A. County; these specimens were sequenced between June 19 and August 21, with the majority of Mu specimens sequenced in July.

Mu was first identified in Colombia in January 2021 and has since been reported in 39 countries. The World Health Organization labeled variant Mu, lineage B.1.621, as a variant of interest on August 30. The Mu variant is found to have key mutations linked to greater transmissibility and the potential to evade antibodies. More studies are needed to determine whether Mu variant is more contagious, deadly, or resistant to vaccine and treatments than other COVID-19 strains.

**WEEK 2 SEPTEMBER 5-11: [BUILD A KIT](#)**



This week's tip will help you [#PrepareToProtect](#) yourself and your family by ensuring you have the supplies you need in the event of an emergency. Prepare yourself and your family for disasters by gathering supplies for everyone in your home that will last for several days after a disaster. Remember to take into account each person's or pet's specific needs in case you need to evacuate quickly. Update your kits and supplies in accordance with the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. By putting together your emergency kit and having it ready to go, you will be prepared with the items you may need to survive in the event of an emergency.

**At a minimum, your emergency supplies should include these 10 essential items:**

- ☐ Water for 3-10 days (1 gallon per person per day)
- ☐ Food for 3-10 days (including pet food)
- ☐ First Aid Kit and Instructions
- ☐ Flashlights (and extra batteries)
- ☐ Radio (and extra batteries)
- ☐ Medications (prescription and non-prescription)
- ☐ Cash and important documents (small bills and coins, birth certificates, tax returns, deeds, titles, insurance papers, medical cards)
- ☐ Clothing and sturdy shoes
- ☐ Tools (wrench, duct tape, fire extinguisher, sturdy gloves, whistle)
- ☐ Sanitation and hygiene supplies

**Kit Storage Locations:** Since you never know where you will be during an emergency, be sure to prepare supplies for your home, place of employment, and automobiles.

- ☐ **At Home:** Keep this kit in a designated place and have it ready in case you have to leave your home quickly. Make sure all family members know where the kit is kept.
- ☐ **At Work:** Be prepared to shelter at work for at least 24 hours. Your work kit should include food, water, and other necessities like medicines, as well as comfortable walking shoes, stored in a “grab and go” case.
- ☐ **In your Car:** In case you are stranded, keep a kit of emergency supplies in your car.

West Basin Municipal Water District will host a free online fire escape workshop on Wednesday, September 15, 2021, at 6:00 p.m. to teach residents how to use landscaping and irrigation techniques to protect their homes from wildfires. Douglas Kent, MS, MLA, a subject-matter expert who has spent nearly three decades assisting in the development of fire-protected communities, will be presenting at the September 15 event and educate attendees on effective Firescaping, which combines landscaping techniques and native plants with smart irrigation systems to help protect your home, conserve

water, and lower your water bill. In addition, participants will learn how to identify high-risk landscapes, which plants and building materials help minimize damage, and how to reduce your home's fire risk and ensure firefighter accessibility. Because fire season has been extended to the entire year in California, homeowners must take every precaution to protect their homes and properties from wildfire.

## Disasters Don't Plan Ahead - You Can

Disaster can happen at any time, often with little to no warning. The widespread devastation caused by a catastrophic disaster has the potential to cut you off from the rest of the world for several days. Following a disaster, emergency rescuers will arrive on the scene as soon as possible to assist you, but it may take some time for them to reach you. The time to start thinking about what to do in an emergency is before it happens. By following some simple guidelines, you can help prepare your family, neighborhood, business, or school to be better prepared and self-sufficient after the next disaster.

- ⇒ **HAVE A PLAN:** A good place to begin emergency preparedness is by writing a Family Emergency Plan. Your Plan should include every member of your household, including pets.
- If a disaster strikes, your family may not be together, so it is important to talk to your friends and family about how you will communicate before, during, and after a disaster.
  - Be sure to establish a family meeting place that's familiar and easy to find.

- ⇒ [KEEP SUPPLIES](#): A Disaster Supply Kit is any pre-assembled group of items that will improve the health and safety of your family during a disaster. Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Download an emergency supply list at [ready.gov/kit](https://ready.gov/kit) to get started on your kit. [#BeReady](#) [#BuildAKit](#)
  
- ⇒ [BE INFORMED](#): It is important to know what disasters and hazards could affect your area, how to get emergency alerts, and where you would go if you and your family need to evacuate. Make sure your family has a plan and practices it often.
  - Learn about natural hazards that may affect the City by reading our recently adopted and FEMA approved [Local Hazard Mitigation Plan](#).
  - **Register for emergency notifications from Alert SouthBay**: Alert Southbay is the City's primary vehicle for emergency communications. Users can Sign up for Alert SouthBay emergency alerts by texting "alertsb" to 888-777
  - Be sure to stay connected and get updates from the City by following RPV on [Nextdoor](#), [Facebook](#), [Twitter](#), and [Instagram](#).

## How to Help After a Disaster

The impact of natural disasters like earthquake and wildfires can be felt for weeks, months, and even years after disaster strikes. After a disaster, people often come together to help. To make the most of your contributions, here are some general guidelines on helping others after a disaster.

**Cash Donations:** Financial contributions to a recognized disaster relief organization are the fastest, and the most efficient way of helping those impacted by disaster.

- Allow voluntary organizations to fund response and recovery efforts, obtain goods and services locally, and provide direct financial assistance to disaster survivors to meet their own needs.
- Make a financial contribution to the voluntary organization of your choice.
- If you need help in determining who to give to, the National Voluntary Organization Active in Disaster website has a list of [recognized disaster relief organizations](#) that are active in disaster work.
  - o When the public supports these voluntary organizations with financial contributions, it helps ensure a steady flow of important services to the people in need after a disaster.

**Volunteering:** Before a disaster strikes, Volunteer with a non-profit organization to be trained before the next event to find meaningful volunteer opportunities following a disaster.

- Don't self-deploy to disaster areas.
  - Volunteer with trusted organizations operating in the affected area who know best where volunteers are needed and ensure appropriate volunteer safety, training, and housing.
- There are many organizations and faith-based groups in your community that have active disaster programs and need volunteers.

**Donating Goods:** Donate in-kind goods that are specifically requested or needed by recognized organizations.

- Unsolicited goods that are not needed, such as used clothing, miscellaneous household items, and mixed or perishable foodstuff, require helping agencies to redirect valuable resources away from providing services to sort, package, transport, warehouse, and distribute items that may not meet the needs of disaster survivors.
- Critical needs change rapidly. Confirm with trusted organizations what items are needed BEFORE collecting.

**Be Patient:** Recovery lasts a lot longer than the media attention. There will be volunteer needs for many months, often many years, after the disaster — especially when the community enters the long-term recovery period. Your help is often needed long after a disaster.



## Weekly Crime Report Summaries

The Lomita Sheriff's Station provides weekly crime report summaries for the City of Rancho Palos Verdes. From August 22-28, there were eighteen reported crimes in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes: eight vehicle burglaries, three residential burglaries, three assaults, two grand thefts, one petty theft, and one robbery.

The City thanks Deputy Agostino, and all of the Deputies at Lomita Station, for their incredible work in serving our community.




### **Practice Your 9 p.m. Routine**

Every night at 9 p.m., the community is encouraged to lock up property, turn on lights, and bring in valuables to reduce the likelihood of falling victim to property crimes.

Lock all doors and windows, including garage doors, turn on lights or set them on a timer if you plan to be away, and avoid leaving valuables in visible areas. These actions help deter burglars and may help prevent residential burglaries.

Be aware, and if you see something suspicious, say something! The City encourages you to call the Lomita Sheriff's Station at 310-539-1661 if you see suspicious persons or activities.



## Click it or Ticket! It's the Law

Your seat belt is crucial to surviving in a crash. Make it a habit to always buckle up every trip, every time. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2019, nearly half of passenger vehicle occupants who died in crashes were unrestrained.

The consequences of not wearing, or improperly wearing, a seat belt are clear:

1. Buckling up helps keep you safe and secure inside your vehicle, whereas not buckling up can result in being totally ejected from the vehicle in a crash, which is almost always deadly.
2. Air bags are not enough to protect you; in fact, the force of an air bag can seriously injure or even kill you if you're not buckled up.
3. Improperly wearing a seat belt, such as putting the strap below your arm, puts you at risk in a crash.

## Tips to Prevent Vehicle Burglaries

Take steps today to prevent thefts from your vehicle. Residents are strongly encouraged to use “Lock It or Lose It” prevention tips every day. It only takes a matter of seconds for a thief to break into your car and grab your valuable items.

Look through the windows of your vehicle. What do you see? A bag on the passenger seat? A charging cord? A garage door opener? Change in a cup holder? Take it with you or remove it from plain view and be sure to close all windows and lock doors.

Follow these tips to help prevent vehicle burglaries:

1. Remove all valuable items from your car including purses and electronics.
2. If you must leave valuables behind, put them in your trunk or locked glovebox before you reach your destination. Avoid doing so while in plain view.
3. Close all windows and lock your doors.
4. Park in a locked garage or well-lit areas.


### **Undergrounding Along Palos Verdes Drive South**

The remaining overhead cables in the undergrounding district along Palos Verdes Drive South, from La Rotonda Drive to the eastern City limit, were removed on September 7.

The next step in the project is for utility companies to remove their poles. Staff is working with those companies to confirm the schedule for pole removal. As a reminder, three of the poles will remain. Staff is investigating if a City camera on one of the poles can be relocated to reduce the number of remaining poles from three to two.

### **New Traffic Signal at Intersection of Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East**

Work began this week for site preparation, including confirming utility locations, and to begin digging for signal pole foundations for the new traffic signal at Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East. Work will take place over the next three months from approximately 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday to Friday, with regular partial eastbound and westbound bike lane closures in the area of the intersection. Expect delays, proceed cautiously through the work zone, and follow all signs and instructions.



## Next Paper/Document Shredding Event

The next paper/document shredding event is scheduled for Saturday, October 23, from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. at City Hall/Civic Center in the overflow parking lot. More details on this event will be provided in the coming weeks.



## Prepare for the Citywide Brush Clearing

The autumn season brush-clearing event begins on Saturday, October 2, and will continue for four consecutive Saturdays. Each week a different area of RPV is serviced. The goal of the event is to assist homeowners dispose (free of charge) excess brush, shrubs, hedges, tree branches, and bushes to comply with the Los Angeles County Fire Department's fire safety guidelines. This is a great opportunity to help prevent local brush fires! In addition to regularly scheduled maintenance and repairs, Public Works performed the following:



- Public Works continues daily cleaning and sanitizing parks facilities and restrooms to reduce the spread of COVID.
- This week, multiple leaks were found and repaired to the Lower Hesse Park irrigation system. Rodents and wildlife are attracted to the water in such low-pressure systems and cause damage when they search for water. Large ruts, caused by the leaks, were also filled.



### Street Median and Public Right-of-Way Landscape Maintenance

- On Western Avenue, Public Works continued its planting and beautification efforts by repairing planters and preparing soil from Green Hills Drive to Peninsula Verde Drive. Preparing the soil is critical for newly installed plants to develop healthy rooting and growth. To date, six of nine damaged planters on Western Avenue have been repaired.



- Landscape crews completed de-weeding and trimming along Palos Verdes Drive South from the 25<sup>th</sup> Street border with San Pedro to Terranea Way. The team will continue along Palos Verdes Drive South to Palos Verdes Drive West, and then to the Palos Verdes Estates border. Single lane closures will occur on the eastbound direction on September 8, and the westbound direction on September 9, between Point Vicente Interpretive Center and Hawthorne Boulevard. Expected hours of closures are 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. on both days.



- Twenty-Two** cases of graffiti were reported and removed this week.
- The RPV graffiti reporting app can be downloaded for Android and Apple devices under the name of "**RPV Clean.**" Residents can help keep RPV look great by using this app.



### Public Right of Way/Roadway Repairs

- This week, Public Works installed a mobile speed feedback radar trailer on Miraleste Drive between Palos Verdes Drive East and Via Colinita to help reduce speeding in that area. Other mobile radar trailers can be found at Verde Ridge Road, La Rotonda Drive, and Hawthorne Boulevard.





### Emergency Response items

- Last week, Public Works responded to two separate reports of a large branch in the right of way. Public Works responded immediately and removed both branches within hours of them being reported. Fallen branch locations include the intersection of Palos Verdes Drive East and Crest Road and 4224 Miraleste Drive.





### **Public Works Training**


The Public Works Department is committed to continuous safety training and industry training for its staff. Below is a recent training completed by the Public Works team.

### LAX Airfield and Terminal Modernization Project - LAX Specific Plan Compliance and Board of Airport Commissioners Special Meeting

The Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) has prepared an Executive Director's Report (EDR) pursuant to Section 7 of the Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) Specific Plan Ordinance No. 176,345, which is available [here](#). The EDR includes a summary of the LAX Airfield and Terminal Modernization Project (ATMP) and the Environmental Impact Report (EIR), which the City of Rancho Palos Verdes previously commented. The Executive Director is recommending to LAWA's Board of Airport Commissioners approval of the ATMP and is also recommending that the Board find that the project has been assessed to be in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). A plan overview of the project is provided below:




The Board of Airport Commissioners is scheduled to consider approval of the EDR and certification of the EIR at a Special Meeting to be held on Tuesday, September 14, 2021, at 10 a.m. LAWA will post the meeting agenda on its website: <https://www.lawa.org/lawa-governance/lawa-view-boac-meetings>. Staff will attend the meeting and provide an update as more information becomes available.

## Fuel Modification Plan Review

In areas served by the Los Angeles County Fire Department (LAFD), which includes the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, all new construction, remodeling 50% or greater, construction of certain outbuildings and accessory structures over 120 square feet, parcel splits and subdivision/developments within areas designated as Fire Hazard Severity Zones will require a Fuel Modification Plan approval. LAFD's Fuel Modification Unit is responsible for processing, reviewing, and approving these plans. The process of approval consists of reviewing aspects such as:

- Structure location
- Type of construction
- Topography and slope
- Arrangement of vegetation
- Site settings

A site inspection for occupancy will be conducted upon completion of landscape installation.



The objective through this approval plan process is to create defensible space necessary for effective fire protection of homes in the Fire Hazard Severity Zones. ## **Gabrieleño/Tongva Native American Memorial at Abalone Cove Park: October 16 Unveiling Date**

Plans are underway to unveil a new memorial honoring the Gabrieleño/Tongva San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians-the “First Peoples of the Los Angeles Basin.” This project dates back to 2016 when Tom Steers first approached the City with the idea for a memorial. Tom has coordinated the funding of this project with private donations. The City is very excited to educate the public about the Gabrieleño/Tongva Native Americans and the important role they have played in the history of Southern California, specifically Rancho Palos Verdes. Gabrieleño/Tongva descendants have been closely involved in the design and artwork for the monument plaques to ensure their historical accuracy and appropriateness. The City is very appreciative of professional sculptor Geri Jimenez Gould for creating such a remarkable piece of artwork.

A monument unveiling event is scheduled for October 16 from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. Chief Anthony 'Red Blood' Morales and tribal members will participate with blessings and songs in their regalia. Additional details will be forthcoming.



## **City Council Selects Parking Beyond Forrestal Drive Gate Option for Forrestal Reserve Parking**

On September 7, the City Council considered six Forrestal Reserve parking options. Due to the pending construction of the Ladera Linda Park and Community Center Project (tentatively scheduled for early spring 2022 and expected to last 15 months), each option was evaluated on a short-term basis (during construction) and a long-term basis (post-construction). The following are the six options the City Council considered:

1. Forrestal Reserve parking on-site at the Ladera Linda Park and Community Center
2. Forrestal Reserve and Portuguese Bend parking at the Gateway Park location

3. Forrestal Reserve parking beyond the existing Forrestal gate
4. Maintain and regulate existing on-street parking along Forrestal Drive near Palos Verdes Drive South (PVDS) intersection
5. Expand on-street parking by removing red curbing along Forrestal Drive
6. Explore pocket parking lots (5-7 spaces each) adjacent to other trailheads

The City Council chose Option 3: Forrestal Reserve parking beyond the existing Forrestal Drive gate. Council approved the installation of a single automated gate with pedestrian access control and electronic monitoring. The City Council directed Staff to install the gate before park project construction begins and to shift its location to encompass the Pirate Trail trailhead. The plan will be assessed at a later date to gauge its effectiveness and to determine if any modifications are needed.

## **National Forests in California Closed September 1-17**

All national forests are closed in California, effective September 1 through at least September 17, due to wildfire risk and limited resources for firefighting throughout the state. Open Space Management and Park Ranger Staff are aware and will be monitoring to see if these closures lead to an observable increase in usage in the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve and open space areas. ## **Playground Equipment Surface Replacement Project**

Replacement of the playground equipment surfaces at City Parks began on September 8. This project involves the removal of existing sand, resealing of the hard surface, and the addition of engineered wood fiber at the playground equipment areas at Fred Hesse Jr. Community Park, Robert E. Ryan Community Park, and Eastview Park. Work at Hesse Park and Ryan Park is scheduled to begin on September 8 and end September 20. Work at Eastview is scheduled to begin on September 20 and end on September 24. The contractor will provide a physical barrier between the construction zone and the other open areas of the parks. Ladera Linda Park's playground was originally included in this project but was removed due to the Ladera Linda project scheduled for early 2022.

## 2020 Preserve Annual Report

At the September 7 City Council Meeting, the City Council received and filed the 2020 Palos Verdes Nature Preserve Annual Report, which is part of mandatory reporting required by the City's Natural Communities Conservation Plan/Habitat Conservation Plan (NCCP/HCP). The purpose of the report is to evaluate the implementation of the NCCP/HCP in the preceding year and to evaluate the progress made reaching the NCCP/HCP conservation goals. ## ParkMobile Parking App Update

On July 6, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes launched an online parking reservation system for Del Cerro Park and the popular Portuguese Bend Reserve. Visitors can now use the ParkMobile website or mobile app to reserve parking spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place, near the Rattlesnake and Burma Road Trailheads. A total of 117 reservations were made between August 30-September 5: 50 paid reservations, 41 resident reservations, and 26 free reservations on weekdays from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.

Staff will continue to report on total reservations and other data points each week.

The system is being implemented to manage parking and improve traffic flow in the Del Cerro Park area. Staff is working closely with ParkMobile personnel to fine-tune the system and respond to all user concerns and issues. An update on the program will be presented to the City Council on October 5.

## Parking with ParkMobile

- **Update:** The ParkMobile reservation system is now in effect.
- Those with Residential Parking Permits should park in zone A and always display their parking permit on the bottom left side of the vehicle windshield. (If you are a city resident, obtain your Permit through Rancho Palos Verdes Public Works Department)
- Zone A Residential Permit holders park for free and will be given an access code that will allow for reservations in Zone A. For assistance with obtaining your code, please email [preserveparking@rpvca.gov](mailto:preserveparking@rpvca.gov)

- Residential Parking Permit holders should refrain from parking in other locations unless a reservation has been made and paid for in a different zone.
- In the event zone A permit holders encounter difficulty reserving a space, please use the website [rpvca.gov/parkmobile](http://rpvca.gov/parkmobile), or call ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.
- Reservations are now \$10 per reservation block and can be paid using ParkMobile. An additional \$0.35 processing fee will apply to all paid reservations.
- ParkMobile reservations are now required for all 58 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place.
- Reservations must be made by 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.
- Visitors are not able to park and then reserve their spot.
- Reservations are limited to blocks of two hours and 45 minutes from 7:00 a.m. to an hour after sunset. Shorter or longer blocks are not available at this time.
- Parking is free from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays.
- Two ADA parking spaces are located in Zone A, and no longer require Residential Recreational Parking Permits or ParkMobile reservations. They are available on a first-come-first-served availability basis for any visitor with a valid ADA parking placard. This reduces the total number of reservable spaces from 60 to 58.
- Street parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road is free and does not require reservations.

Visitors can make parking reservations on a mobile web browser or by downloading the free ParkMobile app for iOS or Android devices from the App Store or Google Play. Reservations can also be made by calling ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.


## Abalone Cove Reserve, Park and Beach

From August 30-September 5, Staff observed a decrease in poaching activity within the Abalone Cove Marine Protected Area. No contacts were made over the holiday weekend.

## Forrestal Reserve/Adjacent Properties

During this reporting period, Park Rangers continued to educate patrons on permitted and approved use of Ladera Linda fields located on PVPUSD property. All parties observed on the field are contacted and encouraged to use Ladera Linda Park fields or hike within the Forrestal Reserve to access the trail system.

## Portuguese Bend Reserve



Effective September 1 through October 31, new Burma Road Gate hours are in effect, with a closing time of 7 p.m. Patrons are still able to hike up until an hour after sunset within the Reserve. Plan accordingly and take plenty of water!

Throughout the holiday weekend, Open Space Management received several calls and assisted patrons exhibiting early symptoms of heat exhaustion and heat stress. Park Rangers transported two patrons and two dogs experiencing heat stress and contacted two hikers experiencing heat-related issues who refused transport. One dog owner requested an Uber for pickup near Palos Verdes Drive South when their dog was experiencing heat exhaustion symptoms; he declined an offer from the rangers to transport him. The patrons were provided water bottles. Avoid hiking during the hottest part of the day and take plenty of water for all hikers (including your dog!).

There has been recent land movement within the Portuguese Bend Reserve. City Staff is working with the City Geologist to monitor and report changes. Please be mindful of cones and A-frames closing areas when hiking.



On September 4, Open Space Management Staff worked with a future Eagle Scout to conduct his final project to replace existing carsonite signage with 4-sided posts to improve wayfinding. The project included the installation of five 4-sided posts along 3-way and 4-way trail junctions in Lower Portuguese Bend Reserve.



## Vicente Bluffs Reserve

On September 6, City Staff reported several instances of graffiti on the restroom at Pelican Cove and interpretive signage. A report was submitted to GPC for removal. Before the end of the day, the graffiti was removed. City Staff continues to monitor for any instances of graffiti and respond appropriately to ensure it is removed and any signs or structures damaged are replaced or repaired.



On September 6, the Los Angeles County Fire Department and Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department assisted a hiker who had been exhibiting heat exhaustion and heat stress symptoms. The individual was on an unauthorized trail within a closed area on a steep section of Vicente Bluffs cliffs. The individual was safely escorted out and given medical attention.





## **Parks and Trails Open**

Beaches, parks, and trails, including the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve, are open. In accordance with the L.A. County and State of California Health Officer Orders, private, informal, outdoor gatherings outdoors are permitted. L.A. County continues to urge everyone, especially those who are not or cannot be vaccinated against COVID-19, to exercise caution and good judgment as physical distancing requirements and capacity limitations have lifted. In addition, all individuals must follow the requirements in the Guidance for the Use of Face Coverings issued by the L.A. County Department of Public Health.

When participating in gatherings or activities, all park rules must be followed, and attendance at informal gatherings cannot exceed thresholds in the Special Event Permits ordinance.

**SUBJECT: Comments to the Draft Environmental Impact Report for the LAX Airfield & Terminal Modernization Project**

Dear Ms. Quintanilla,

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR). The City of Rancho Palos Verdes, herein the City, is a quiet coastal town on the Palos Verdes Peninsula, approximately 11 miles south of the Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), but near eastbound aircraft pathways departing from LAX. In review of the DEIR for the LAX Airfield & Terminal Modernization Project (ATMP), the City wishes to express the primary concern that the ATMP will result in an increase in aircraft noise pollution caused by eastbound passenger jets overflying the airspace above the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

As you may know, this community and the rest of the Palos Verdes Peninsula has a long history of expressing concerns to Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regarding noise impacts associated with departing passenger aircraft from LAX. The City is an active participant on the LAX Roundtable and has made exhaustive requests to the FAA to curb passenger jet aircrafts being vectored by FAA air traffic controllers (ATC) over the Peninsula. Despite these repeated requests to simply adhere to the approved flight paths, the Peninsula continues to suffer from noisy passenger jet overflights originating from LAX.

**General Comments**

1. In general, the City is concerned that the ATMP will induce more passenger flights departing from LAX, thus, increasing the likelihood that air traffic controllers will "cut the corner" and improperly and against FAA procedures (OSHNN8), vector additional aircraft at low altitudes over the Palos Verdes Peninsula's airspace. This has been, and continues to be an issue, additional flight will only exacerbate the issue and increase its likelihood.
2. The City also shares the concerns that have been expressed in separate correspondence by partner cities and the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG). We share the concern that LAWA needs to prioritize efforts to disperse

air traffic to their other regional airports. Without a coordinated plan to disperse infrastructure improvements to other local airports, LAX is guaranteed to see an accelerated growth of air traffic activity. This increase in air traffic activity will inevitably result in noisy air traffic near and over the Peninsula, increased traffic congestion, additional local air pollution concentrations and other negative unintended consequences.

### **Specific Comments**

1. In reference to Section 2.3.1.2, the City questions the DEIR's projected air traffic passenger growth data, since the LAWA's study was done prior to the outset of the COVID-19 pandemic. LAWA should reconsider the projected growth in light of changes to pandemic-induced passenger travel behavior and reconsider the projected growth at other airports and those airports' ability to handle the projected growth.
2. In reference to Section 4.4, the City encourages LAWA to consider expanding the scope of study for greenhouse gas emissions based on projected aircraft departures from LAX under known aircraft dispersal patterns. Specifically, air pollutants should be studied, which are emitted from passenger jets vectored over the Palos Verdes Peninsula. The toxic air contaminants of concern should be studied over exposed populations based on the quantity and altitudes of passenger jet with Peninsula overflights. LAWA should consider a range of mitigation measures available to lessen passenger jet air pollution over Peninsula residents, including effective communication with TRACON air traffic controllers to vector passenger jets over the ocean east of the HOLTZ waypoint.
3. Specific to Section 4.7.1 of the DEIR and only specific to the construction phase of the project, the City is concerned that the proposed improvements to Runway 6L-24R will cause significant aircraft departure delays and disruptions. Disrupted and inefficient aircraft movement on the ground has the potential of causing FAA departure controllers to rush departures, resulting in congested air traffic between LAX and the Peninsula. We have witnessed that congested air traffic increases the likelihood of vectoring aircraft from the published offshore flight path (OSHNN8) towards the Peninsula because of the FAA's requirement to maintain aircraft separation for safety purposes or because of the pressure placed on air traffic controllers to make up time for departure delays. In addition, given the projected length of the proposed runway construction from 2021 to 2025 and due to the length of runway closures occurring in 4.5-month duration periods, the City is especially concerned that these runway closures may result in disturbing aircraft noise impacts to the community for lengthy periods of time.
4. Section 4.7.1.5.1.1 of the DEIR does not adequately address the foreseen airspace congestion impacts attributed to temporary airfield construction described above nor does the DEIR adequately address or provide mitigation measures for aircraft noise impacts to communities, such as the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, outside of LAWA's Noise Exposure Map. Although the City is not adjacent to LAX, where the Noise Exposure Map illustrates elevated noise disturbances, the City considers

itself a noise-sensitive community due to the low ambient noise levels enjoyed by its visitors and residents.

5. In reference to Section 4.8 of the DEIR, the City, along with the SBCCOG, believes that the DEIR does not adequately evaluate impacts to motorists coming from the South Bay. Although CEQA may not require it, LAWA should not use the Vehicle Miles Traveled standard to avoid responsibility for the increased congestion on the critical thoroughfares that will directly result from this large airport expansion. The City encourages LAWA to work with stakeholders such as the SBCCOG, LA Metro, Caltrans, and surrounding cities who have been working together to identify freeway improvements and can do so again to address off site roadway mitigation improvements necessitated by this project. Even though LAWA may have restrictions by the FAA on paying for these off-facility improvements, the impacts to these facilities occur, nonetheless. For example, it may prove beneficial for LAWA to work with other implementing agencies to address the Century Boulevard exit on the northbound I-405 to allow motorists to head west on Century Boulevard without the need for a traffic signal.
6. In reference to Section 4.8.3.2.1 of the DEIR, the City supports LAWA's proposal to eliminate permanent access from Sepulveda Boulevard to Terminal 9. However, we share the same traffic concerns as that of the SBCCOG about opening the new Terminal 9 before the aerial roadway system is complete. We also believe that temporary access from Sepulveda Boulevard is unwise. There will already be access to Terminal 9 via Century Boulevard and the new Jet Way street, which are not dependent on the construction of the aerial roadway and they should alleviate the need for temporary access from Sepulveda Boulevard, particularly given the burden it will cause on the traffic traveling through the tunnel. We urge you to commit to eliminating any access from Sepulveda Boulevard at any time to Terminal 9. Temporary access is costly and unsafe as you have already recognized by eliminating the permanent access from Sepulveda Boulevard. If a third means of access to Terminal 9 is deemed necessary, then we would ask that you delay the opening of Terminal 9 until the aerial roadway system is completed.


The City supports the concept of continued evolution and a more efficient, modernized LAX. However, it is difficult to support the ATMP without first addressing some of the current vexing issues, such as FAA improper routing of low flying aircraft, local air space congestion, and environmental sustainability. We must have confidence that LAWA is effectively communicating aircraft noise concerns to the FAA and the two agencies are working together to solve this ongoing issue. The City expects LAWA to champion the concerns of those communities affected by aircraft noise pollution and use their resources to influence the FAA, particularly the FAA's air traffic controllers, to adopt more enforceable, reliable, meaningful and measurable aircraft noise mitigation measures than those described in DEIR.

We appreciate your attention to the City's concerns as LAWA finalizes the environmental review. We hope the provided comments, as well as those comments from affected communities, will translate into implementing amicable measures that will mitigate project related impacts to those affected communities, including the City of Rancho Palos Verdes.
