Legislation Corner: SB 9 and SB 10 Updates

On Friday, September 16, Governor Newsom signed SB 9 and SB 10. Both bills will become active on January 1, 2022.

SB 9 (Chapter 162, Statutes of 2021) will allow developers to build up to four housing units on a single parcel in residential neighborhoods traditionally zoned for single-family homes. The City Council opposed this bill.

SB 10 (Chapter 163, Statutes of 2021) will allow cities to upzone by ordinance for up to 10 units in a transit-rich corridor. The City Council opposed this bill.

The City Attorney's office, in collaboration with Staff, will be preparing a legal analysis of the potential impacts these two bills will have on the future of housing in the City. More information will be provided in the Administrative Report at that time

The Governor has until October 10 to sign or veto bills that made it to his desk. Bills that were not passed during this session may be taken up when the Legislature reconvenes on January 3, 2022.

FDA Panel Recommends Booster Shots for High-Risk Groups

On September 17, a U.S. Food and Drug Administration advisory committee recommended COVID-19 vaccine booster shots for specific groups of high-risk individuals, including people 65 and older and those at high risk of severe illness. Once the FDA and CDC approve booster doses, L.A. County will use its extensive network of over 1,300 vaccination sites to administer doses to those eligible.

L.A. County Modifies Health Officer Order Adding Vaccination Verification Requirements at Select High-Risk Settings

On September 17, the L.A. County Health Officer Order was modified to require vaccination verification or a negative test prior to entry to all mega-events and event venues by October 7; children under 12 years of age are exempt. The Health Officer

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Order also requires vaccination verification for customers and employees at indoor portions of bars, lounges, nightclubs, breweries, wineries, and distilleries.

The requirement for vaccine verification or a negative test within 72 hours prior to attending an outdoor mega-event aligns with the recently announced national strategy. It includes venues and events with more than 10,000 attendees that are ticketed and/or have controlled points of entry to a well-defined area, such as sport and music arenas and theme parks. This is similar to the requirement for vaccination verification or a negative test prior to entry at all indoor events and arenas with more than 1,000 participants; this requirement has been in place since August 18. Many mega-event venues established verification systems during the spring in response to previous capacity restrictions and Public Health will offer large venues and organizers of mega events technical assistance to assist with implementation.

The requirement for vaccine verification for customers in the indoor portions of bars, wineries, breweries, distilleries, nightclubs, and lounges and their employees applies to drinking establishments with either no restaurant permit or a low-risk restaurant permit and requires that all customers and employees have at least one dose of the vaccine by October 7 and full vaccination by November 4. These establishments primarily serve adults and already require patrons to show proof of age; and while children do not usually enter these establishments, children under 12 are exempt from these requirements. Full vaccination verification for services in the indoor portions of restaurants is strongly recommended.

In addition to those who received their first dose on September 3, this clinic is open to anyone who needs a first dose.



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- ⇒ **HAVE A PLAN:** Create a family emergency communications plan that has an out-of-state contact. Establish a family meeting place that is familiar and easy to find.
- ⇒ **KEEP SUPPLIES:** Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly.

At a minimum, your emergency supplies should include these ten essential items:

- Water for 3-10 days (1 gallon per person per day)
- Food for 3-10 days (including pet food)
- First Aid Kit and Instructions
- Flashlights (and spare batteries)
- Radio (and extra batteries)
- Medications
- Cash and important documents
- Clothing and sturdy shoes
- Tools (wrench, duct tape, fire extinguisher, sturdy gloves, whistle)
- Sanitation and hygiene supplies

- ⇒ **PRACTICE DROP, COVER, AND HOLD ON:** Get prepared for Earthquakes before it happens by practicing DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON.



DROP where you are, onto your hands and knees. This position protects you from being knocked down and also allows you to stay low and crawl to shelter if nearby.



COVER Cover your head and neck with your arms. If a sturdy table or desk is nearby, crawl underneath it for shelter. If no shelter is nearby, crawl next to an interior wall (away from windows). Stay on your knees or bent over to protect vital organs.



HOLD ON If you are under a table or desk, hold on with one hand and be ready to move with it if it moves. If seated and unable to drop to the floor, bend forward, cover your head with your arms and hold on to your neck with both hands.

National Preparedness Month - September 2021



As a parent, guardian, or other family members, you have an important role to play when it comes to protecting the children in your life and helping them be prepared in case disaster strikes. Be sure to talk to your kids about preparing for emergencies and what to do in case you are separated. EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS TIPS

Common Fire Hazards in the Home

In just two minutes, a fire can become life-threatening. In five minutes, a residence can be engulfed in flames. The causes of these fires can range from candles left burning to unattended food in the kitchen.

Knowing where and when fires are most likely to ignite can help you protect yourself, your family, and your home from tragedy.

Kitchen Fires: Most home fires start in the kitchen during cooking — usually on stovetops — not in the oven. Specifically, unattended cooking is the leading cause of kitchen fires and fire-related injuries.

These home fires are also easily preventable: Keep an eye on the stove, oven, and other appliances like toaster ovens, and move combustible items away from the stove. Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.

Portable Space Heaters: With the following safety tips and precautions, you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

- Make sure to always keep anything that gives off heat at least 3 feet away from flammable materials or items.
- Never plug more than one heating appliance into an outlet.
- Buy only heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).



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- Check to make the portable heater has a thermostat control mechanism and will switch off automatically if the heater falls over.
- Keep portable gas generators outside and away from windows to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.
- If you have a fireplace, make sure your chimney is checked and cleaned by a professional once a year. Use a metal or glass screen that is large enough to prevent escaping embers.

Electrical Safety: Electrical fires can be caused by an equipment malfunction, an overloaded circuit, or an overheated appliance such as a washer, dryer, or space heater.

Safety Tips:

- Frayed wires can cause fires. Replace all worn, old or damaged appliance cords immediately, and do not run cords under rugs or furniture.
- If an appliance has a three-prong plug, use it only in a three-slot outlet. Never force it to fit into a two-slot outlet or extension cord.
- Immediately shut off, then professionally replace light switches that are hot to the touch and lights that flicker.
- Don't overload circuits or outlets.
- Consider having additional circuits or outlets added by a qualified electrician so you don't have to use extension cords.
- Consider hiring an electrician to perform an annual checkup of your home's wiring.

Candles: The National Fire Protection Association estimates that candles cause an average of 8,200 house fires each year in the U.S. The matches and lighters used to light candles are equally dangerous if left in a place where children can reach them.

Candle Safety Tips:

- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed.
- Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets.
 - Do not place lighted candles where they can be knocked over by children, pets or anyone else.
- Never burn a candle on or near anything that can catch fire.

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- Keep burning candles away from furniture, drapes, bedding, carpets, books, paper, flammable decorations, etc.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles

Laundry rooms: Dryers are responsible for about 9 out of 10 appliance fires.

Fortunately, preventing laundry fires is simple for the most part:

- Don't overload your washer or dryer or pack items down. Instead, leave room for laundry to tumble. Follow your machine manufacturer's recommendations for capacity.
- Clean the lint screen and drum between loads to prevent buildup.
- About once a year, clean the dryer exhaust vent and ducts.
- Replace plastic venting material with flexible metal venting material.
- Ensure that your appliances are plugged into outlets with the proper voltage.



Weekly Crime Report Summaries

The Lomita Sheriff's Station provides weekly crime report summaries for the City of Rancho Palos Verdes. From September 5-11, there were eight reported crimes in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes: three grand thefts, two petty thefts, one assault, one residential burglary, and one attempted vehicle burglary.

Click it or Ticket! It's the Law

Your seat belt is crucial to surviving a crash. So make it a habit to always buckle up every trip, every time. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2019, nearly half of passenger vehicle occupants who died in crashes were unrestrained.

The consequences of not wearing, or improperly wearing, a seat belt are clear:

1. Buckling up helps keep you safe and secure inside your vehicle, whereas not buckling up can result in being totally ejected from the vehicle in a crash, which is almost always deadly.
2. Airbags are not enough to protect you; in fact, the force of an airbag can seriously injure or even kill you if you're not buckled up.
3. Improperly wearing a seat belt, such as putting the strap below your arm, puts you at risk of a crash.

Tips to Prevent Vehicle Burglaries

Take steps today to prevent thefts from your vehicle. Residents are strongly encouraged to use "Lock It or Lose It" prevention tips every day. It only takes a matter of seconds for a thief to break into your car and grab your valuable items.

Look through the windows of your vehicle. What do you see? A bag on the passenger seat? A charging cord? A garage door opener? Change in a cup holder? Take it with you or remove it from plain view and be sure to close all windows and lock doors.



Follow these tips to help prevent vehicle burglaries:

1. Remove all valuable items from your car, including purses and electronics.
2. If you must leave valuables behind, put them in your trunk or locked glove box before you reach your destination. Avoid doing so while in plain view.
3. Close all windows and lock your doors.

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4. Park in a locked garage or well-lit areas.

If you see suspicious activity, report it immediately to the Lomita Sheriff's Station at 310-539-1661. In case of emergency, call 9-1-1.

Here Are Some Key Reminders for Extension Filers

October 15 is fast approaching. That's the last day to file for most people who requested an extension on their 2020 tax return. These taxpayers can file any time on or before Friday, October 15 if they have all their required tax-related documents. They should also pay part or all their taxes since amounts owed after May 17 this year could be subject to penalties and interest.

Here are tips extension filers should remember.

- **Use IRS Free File.** Nearly everyone can e-file their tax return for free through [IRS Free File](#). The program is available on IRS.gov through October 15. E-filing is easy, safe, and the most accurate way for people to file their taxes. Filing electronically can also help taxpayers determine their [earned income tax credit](#), [child and dependent care credit](#), and [recovery rebate credit](#). If someone is eligible for a recovery rebate credit – and either didn't receive Economic Impact Payments or received less than the full amounts – they must file a 2020 tax return to claim the credit even if they don't usually file.
- **File to get a refund.** Anyone due to a refund should file as soon as possible and use [direct deposit](#) to get their tax refund electronically deposited for free into their financial account. There is no penalty for filing a late return for people who are due a refund.
- **Pay tax balance as soon as possible.** The deadline to pay 2020 income taxes was May 17, 2021. Taxpayers can [check their account](#) balance or view [payment options](#). They can pay taxes online for free from a checking or savings account with [Direct Pay](#). Those who owe taxes and can't pay their balance in full should pay as much as they can to reduce interest and penalties for late payment. This IRS has [options for people who can't pay their taxes](#), including [applying for a payment plan](#) on IRS.gov.



- **File by the deadline to avoid penalties.** Taxpayers should file by Friday, October 15, 2021, to avoid a failure-to-file penalty.
- **What taxpayers should do about a missed deadline.** Anyone who did not request an extension by this year's May 17 deadline should file and pay as soon as possible. This will stop additional interest and penalties from adding up.
- **Different deadlines for some members of the military.** Special deadline exceptions may apply for [certain military service members](#) and [eligible support personnel in combat zones](#). [MilTax online tax software](#) is available to service members and their families, regardless of income, and is offered through the Department of Defense.

New Traffic Signal at Intersection of Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East



Work continues this week for the new traffic signal project at Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East, including boring underground conduit and digging for signal pole foundations. Work will take place through the end of December from approximately 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, with regular partial eastbound and westbound bike lane closures around the intersection. Expect delays, proceed cautiously through the work zone, and follow all signs and instructions.

In addition to regularly scheduled maintenance and repairs, Public Works performed the following:

The Public Works Department is committed to continuous safety training and industry training for its staff. Below are recent training and courses completed by the Public Works Team.

- Public Works Maintenance Staff attended a training course offered by the California Joint Powers Insurance Authority on Portable Ladder Safety, Power and Hand Tools, and Preventing Back Injuries, Slips, Trips, and Falls. Training will help staff understand proper safety methods when utilizing tools. Training will also help prevent workplace injuries due to improper bending and pulling.

REMINDER- Short Term Rentals (STRs) Prohibited

In 2017, the City Council adopted regulations affirming the City's prohibition of and advertisement of STRs in the City's residential zoning districts. A STR is a rental of a dwelling unit or part of a dwelling unit to visitors where lodging is furnished for compensation for a period of less than 30 days, except as allowed by Section 17.76.140 (Bed and Breakfast Inns) of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code.



The City's Code Enforcement Division responds to code violations, including illegal STRs. The public can file a complaint in person, by phone or email and through an online submission. September 15, 2021, LAX Community Noise Roundtable Meeting Summary

At the September 15, 2021 LAX Community Noise Roundtable meeting, the following items were presented:

- The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) presented a briefing on their updated FAA Noise Complaint Portal. The purpose of the portal is to identify how the FAA can more efficiently and effectively respond to and address noise complaints in a clear, consistent, and repeatable manner that is responsive to the public. The FAA provided a handout, which summarized the FAA Noise Portal Public Process (attached). As previously noted, the FAA has complete jurisdiction of aircraft in the air. Citizens may submit their noise complaints directly to the FAA by clicking [here](#).
- The Roundtable also received a report from the LAX Metroplex/Wide Area Ad Hoc Committee, concentrating on passenger jet altitudes between Santa Monica and West Adams on the downwind arrival flightpath into the Los Angeles International Airport (LAX).
- The Roundtable voted to send a letter to the FAA supporting modification to the LADYJ Departure, which is located near the Woodland Hills area on the downwind arrival flightpath.

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- The Roundtable received an update on the LAX Fly Quieter Program, which is an education and recognition program designed to increase operator/pilot awareness of community noise concerns and score and rank operators on their performance on the downwind arrival flightpath.

The next Roundtable meeting will be virtual on November 17, 2021, at 1:30 p.m.

Gabrieleño/Tongva Native American Memorial at Abalone Cove Park: October 16 Unveiling Date

Plans are underway to unveil a memorial honoring the Gabrieleño/Tongva San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians-the “First Peoples of the Los Angeles Basin.” This project dates back to 2016 when Tom Steers first approached the City with the idea for a memorial. Tom has coordinated the funding of this project with private donations. The City is very excited to educate the public about the Gabrieleño/Tongva Native Americans and the important role they have played in the history of Southern California, specifically Rancho Palos Verdes. Gabrieleño/Tongva descendants have been closely involved in the design and artwork for the monument plaques to ensure their historical accuracy and appropriateness. The City is very appreciative of professional sculptor Geri Jimenez Gould for creating such a remarkable piece of artwork.

A monument unveiling event is scheduled for October 16 from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. Chief Anthony 'Red Blood' Morales and tribal members will participate with



blessings and songs in their regalia. Invitations were sent last week to elected officials. Additional details will be forthcoming.

Playground Equipment Surface Replacement Project

Replacement of the playground equipment surfaces at City Parks began on September 8. This project involves removing existing sand, resealing the hard surface, and the addition of engineered wood fiber at the playground equipment areas at Fred Hesse Jr. Community Park, Robert E. Ryan Community Park, and Eastview Park. Work at Hesse Park and Ryan Park began on September 8. Work at Eastview begins on September 20. Work at all three parks is expected to be finished by October 1. The contractor will provide a physical barrier between the construction zone and the other open areas of the parks. Ladera Linda Park’s playground was originally included in this project but was removed due to the Ladera Linda project scheduled for early 2022.

ParkMobile Parking App Update

On July 6, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes launched an online parking reservation system for Del Cerro Park and the popular Portuguese Bend Reserve. Visitors can now use the ParkMobile website or mobile app to reserve parking spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place, near the Rattlesnake and Burma Road Trailheads. A total of 110 reservations were made between September 13-19: 50 paid reservations, 34 resident reservations, and 26 free reservations on weekdays from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.

Staff will continue to report on total reservations and other data points each week.

The system is being implemented to manage parking and improve traffic flow in the Del Cerro Park area. Staff is working closely with ParkMobile personnel to fine-tune the system and respond to all user concerns and issues. An update on the program will be presented to the City Council on October 5.

Parking with ParkMobile

- **Update:** The ParkMobile reservation system is now in effect.
- Those with Residential Parking Permits should park in zone A and always display their parking permit on the bottom left side of the vehicle windshield. (If you are a city resident, obtain your Permit through Rancho Palos Verdes Public Works Department)
- Zone A Residential Permit holders park for free and will be given an access code that will allow for reservations in Zone A. For assistance with obtaining your code, please email preserveparking@rpvca.gov
- Residential Parking Permit holders should refrain from parking in other locations unless a reservation has been made and paid for in a different zone.
- In the event zone A permit holders encounter difficulty reserving a space, please use the website rpvca.gov/parkmobile, or call ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.
- Reservations are now \$10 per reservation block and can be paid using ParkMobile. An additional \$0.35 processing fee will apply to all paid reservations.
- ParkMobile reservations are now required for all 58 spaces on Crenshaw Boulevard south of Crest Road and Park Place.
- Reservations must be made by 11:59 p.m. the night before your visit.
- Visitors are not able to park and then reserve their spot.

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- Reservations are limited to blocks of two hours and 45 minutes from 7:00 a.m. to an hour after sunset. Shorter or longer blocks are not available at this time.
- Parking is free from 7:00 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. on weekdays.
- Two ADA parking spaces are located in Zone A and no longer require Residential Recreational Parking Permits or ParkMobile reservations. They are available on a first-come-first-served availability basis for any visitor with a valid ADA parking placard. This reduces the total number of reservable spaces from 60 to 58.
- Street parking on Crenshaw Boulevard north of Crest Road is free and does not require reservations.

Visitors can make parking reservations on a mobile web browser or by downloading the free ParkMobile app for iOS or Android devices from the App Store or Google Play. Reservations can also be made by calling ParkMobile Member Services at 866-330-7275.

Registration for fall recreation classes is now open, and activities are filling up fast! Over twenty activities are available for all ages. This week, new classes include Kids Cooking Around the World with Miss Kitchen and Cheer Dance and Motion for Kids.

Recreation Classes are independent contractor-led activities. Instructors are vetted by the City but select their course material and teaching methods. Class fees vary and are determined by the

Abalone Cove Reserve, Park and Beach

From September 13-19, the following activity was observed within the Abalone Cove Marine Protected Area:

- Number of MPA violators observed or reported but not contacted: 0
- Number of violators spoken to by OSM staff and Rangers: one rod and reel fishing, two collecting with intent to take, one collecting without intent to take
- Estimated number of animals prevented from being poached: 2
- Number of individuals deterred from poaching prior to it happening: 2

On September 18, a Coastal Clean-up took place in Abalone Cove Park/Reserve, one of several events throughout the state. Over 90 volunteers assisted in litter abatement and removing nearly 150 pounds of trash from the area. The event was organized by Los Serenos De Point Vicente Docents, Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy, Heal the Bay, and other organizations.




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On September 19, OSM staff reported a rockfall in the closed area of Altamira Canyon. This area is closed to the public, and trails were not impacted. However, the City Geologist will inspect the trail and surrounding area to analyze cliff conditions.

Park Rangers have assessed additional areas for changes in condition following the September 17 earthquake.



Agua Amarga Reserve

A 40-yard green-waste EDCO Bin will be placed at the end of Rock Park Drive in Rancho Palos Verdes from September 24-27 to collect debris for a PVPLC habitat project in the Reserve.

Forrestal Reserve/Adjacent Properties

Park Rangers continue to educate patrons on permitted and unpermitted use of the Ladera Linda fields located on PVPUSD property. All parties observed on the fields are contacted and encouraged to use Ladera Linda Park fields or hike within the Forrestal Reserve to access the trail system.

Additionally, the City has received increased reports of violations, including dogs off-leash, failure to pick up dog feces, and bicyclists on non-bike trails within the Forrestal Reserve and adjacent area. As a result, rangers have increased patrols to address these violations, educate the public, and enforce as necessary. During these focused patrols, Rangers have observed few violations inside the Reserve and have received compliments from patrons for their increased presence.

Ocean Trails Reserve

The City has received increased reports of dogs off-leash and /or on the beach at Ocean Trails Reserve. As a result, rangers have increased their presence to educate park visitors and enforce as necessary. The City is also working with Trump National Golf Club to procure and install “No Animals on the Beach” signs on trailheads, which had been previously vandalized. These signs are an important part of education and help citations hold up in court.

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
Portuguese Bend Reserve

On September 17, Open Space Management began the installation of a post and cable mechanism to deter unauthorized vehicle access onto Burma Road Trail. The City is looking into installing bollards as a more permanent solution.



On September 20, Park Rangers temporarily closed Garden Trail due to existing trail conditions. The geologist will assess the area in the near future to provide recommendations.

Park Rangers sent listerves to interested parties and updated the City's Trail Alerts page regarding the temporary closure of Garden Trail. Patrons can use Watertank, Toyon, and Peppertree Trails as alternative routes to access the trail system.





Parks and Trails Open

Beaches, parks, and trails, including the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve, are open. In accordance with the L.A. County and State of California Health Officer Orders, private, informal, outdoor gatherings outdoors are permitted. L.A. County continues to urge everyone, especially those who are not or cannot be vaccinated against COVID-19, to exercise caution and good judgment as physical distancing requirements and capacity limitations have lifted. In addition, all individuals must follow the requirements in the Guidance for the Use of Face Coverings issued by the L.A. County Department of Public Health.

When participating in gatherings or activities, all park rules must be followed, and attendance at informal gatherings cannot exceed thresholds in the Special Event Permits ordinance.

Here's What You Need to Know

COVID Positives, Close Contacts, Quarantine and Testing

PVPUSD will follow the MOST RECENT September 2021 *modified* quarantine guidelines set forth by the LA County Department of Public Health, which allow an unvaccinated student with exposure to a confirmed COVID-19 case to continue in-person instruction while in quarantine. *Students under this modified quarantine may attend class but cannot participate in extracurricular activities after school hours.*

My child tested positive for COVID-19, what should I do?

Your child must quarantine for 10 days and may return to school symptom free on Day 11. Contact your site administrator immediately with the following information:

- Date your child tested positive
- Last date your child was in school
- Any symptoms, and when symptoms began
- Any siblings at the same school
- Any extracurricular activities such as athletics, cotillion, and Kids' Corner

If my child is a close contact, does my child need to quarantine? The answer depends on whether your child is vaccinated, and was masked during exposure.

Vaccinated student exposure, MASKED or UNMASKED

Asymptomatic **vaccinated** children are not required to quarantine whether masked or unmasked during exposure, but need to test for COVID-19 and monitor for symptoms for 14 days.

Unvaccinated MASKED exposure (modified quarantine):

Your student and the positive case were masked during the entire exposure period. Children on this modified quarantine must restrict all activities outside of the classroom and should stay home after school.

Follow the timeline below if remaining asymptomatic:

- Day 0: The last date of contact with positive case.
- Day 1 or Day 2: Take a rapid antigen test at a District testing site or through your medical provider.
- Day 5 or Day 6: Take a rapid antigen test at a District testing site or through your medical provider. A negative result on Day 5/6 will allow your child to end modified quarantine on Day 7: Present the site administrator and/or Health Clerk of your test result from Day 5/6.
- Day 14: Monitoring for symptoms ends today.

Unvaccinated UNMASKED exposure (full quarantine):

Your student and case were not masked during the entire exposure period.

Follow the timeline below if remaining asymptomatic

- Day 0: The last date of contact with exposure or positive case.
- Day 1: First full day of quarantine.
- Day 3 - 5: **OPTIONAL** rapid antigen test at a District testing site or through your medical provider.
- Day 6: Rapid antigen test at a District testing site or through your medical provider. Child may return to school symptom free on Day 8 with a negative test result from Day 6.
- Present site administrator and/or Health Clerk of your child's test result from Day 6.
- Day 8: Your child may return to school if remaining asymptomatic.
- Day 14: Monitoring for symptoms ends today.

My child is an unvaccinated MASKED and/or UNMASKED close contact, but I don't want my child to take a rapid antigen test. How long should my child quarantine?

Your child must quarantine for 10 days.

Follow the timeline below

- Day 0: The last date of contact with positive case.
- Day 1: First full day of quarantine.
- Day 11: Your child may return to school today if remaining symptom free.
- Day 14: Monitoring for symptoms ends today.

My child tested positive for COVID-19 within the past three months and recovered. Does my child need to quarantine if exposed?

Your child does not need to quarantine or test for 90 days from when COVID-19 symptoms first appeared or from the first positive viral test. However, your exposed child must monitor for symptoms for 14 days from last contact with the infected person. You will need to provide your site administrator with documentation such as a doctor's note to show that your child has recovered from COVID-19 and meets this exemption.

Where can my child test?

Your child may test at Peninsula High School, Palos Verdes High School, and Miraleste Intermediate.



Noise Portal – Purpose and Goals

Purpose: to identify how the FAA can more efficiently and effectively respond to and address noise complaints in a clear, consistent and repeatable manner that is responsive to the public and applies the best use of FAA resources.



Part 1

Identify and implement improved and consistent agency-wide policy and procedures for the FAA's process to respond to noise complaints / inquiries, and



Part 2

Identify and evaluate potential actions that the FAA might take to better address the underlying issue raised by complaints, particularly regarding the implementation of NextGen procedures.



Noise Portal Process (FAA Roles & Responsibilities)



FAA Office of the Environment and Energy

Responsible for establishing and maintaining FAA's noise complaint process, the Noise Complaint/Inquiry Database and Tracking System (Noise Portal), and national aircraft noise website



FAA Regional Administrator Offices

Act as the single data collection and coordination point at the regional level for public noise complaints/inquiries and establish and maintain regional aircraft noise websites



FAA Noise Ombudsman

Addresses unresolved complaints at the Regional Administrator level



Regional Administrator Offices and Noise Ombudsman

Coordinate responses to the public with the relevant FAA Lines of Businesses and Staff Offices



FAA Community Engagement Officer

Key team members for planning, implementing and managing community engagement related to aviation noise issues in their assigned areas



FAA Noise Portal Process (Public)



1) Public reviews aircraft noise related information on FAA Regional Aircraft Noise Website

2) Public submits noise complaint/ inquiry through FAA Aircraft Noise Complaint/ Inquiry System

3) FAA Regional Administrator's Office receives incoming complaint/ inquiry and coordinates response with responsible FAA staff office

4) Regional Administrator Office responds to public through the FAA Noise Portal



5) Regional Administrator Office addresses FAA related issues and may direct the public to the airport sponsor for airport related issues

Information from incoming complaints is stored in an FAA database, and is updated automatically via the FAA Noise Portal entries. The FAA Noise Ombudsman addresses unresolved complaints at the regional level through the Noise Portal by reaching out to the FAA staff offices as needed.



FAA Policy on Addressing Aircraft Noise Complaints / Inquiries from the Public

Introduction: Addressing aircraft related noise is a shared responsibility among the FAA, airport sponsors, airlines, state and local government, and communities.

Policy: FAA seeks to efficiently and effectively respond to and address FAA related aircraft noise complaints and inquiries from the public in a clear, consistent, and repeatable manner that is responsive and applies the best use of FAA resources.

Highlights from the FAA policy include:

- Establishing and utilizing the FAA website to provide the public with up-to-date information regarding on-going projects including FAQs, public meetings and educational information on FAA noise and policy issues.
- Identifying specific information the public must include for the FAA to fully address the complaints/inquiry.
- Utilizing the FAA Noise Portal for consistent reporting and tracking of noise complaints and inquiries.
- Accepting and registering noise complaints and inquiries with the necessary information submitted through the FAA Noise Portal, by postal mail, or by voice message.
- Not accepting noise complaints or inquiries from third party automated applications or devices.
- Not responding to the same general complaint or inquiry from the same individual more than once.
- Coordinating with partnering airport sponsors to share applicable noise complaint/inquiry data.
- Providing timely responses to aircraft noise and inquiries.
- Focusing on the content of the noise complaints/inquiries FAA receives not the volume
