February 7, 2023, City Council Meeting Highlights

Last night, the City Council voted to send a letter to state officials asking they investigate the statewide spike of natural gas prices.

The Council also approved a community survey that will be issued soon to seek public input on homelessness response in the City and took several actions related to concerns about noise from passenger jets taking off from LAX under two new flight paths proposed by the FAA. The City will send a letter to the FAA requesting the paths be revised and bring this issue to the attention of other coastal South Bay cities.

City to Issue Homelessness Plan Survey

Last year, the City was awarded a grant from the South Bay Cities Council of Governments to develop a Homelessness Plan. This plan seeks to address homelessness in the City, including ways the City can better connect unhoused residents to county services. Last night, the City Council authorized the issuance of a community survey to incorporate public input into the City's Homelessness Plan. The link for the survey will be released soon. The Homelessness Plan is tentatively scheduled to come before the City Council for consideration of adoption on April 18.

Councilmember Seo Tours Hatano Farm

Last week, Staff took Councilmember Seo on a tour of Hatano Farm, which is located at the Civic Center on a hillside above Palos Verdes Drive South.

Councilmember Seo is a new member of the City Council Subcommittee that has been working on developing future plans for the Hatano Farm, which was recently designated a California Point of Historical Interest and listed on the


California Register of Historical Resources. Established in 1953 and operated as a commercial farm until August 2022, Hatano Farm is the last vestige of the tradition of Japanese American truck farming that once dominated the Palos Verdes Peninsula.



In the coming weeks, the Council is scheduled to consider an agreement with the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy to manage a native plant farm on the site.

Sick? Take Care of Yourself This Winter

If you find yourself sick this winter, there are resources to manage both COVID-19 and influenza (flu). What feels mild at first, can become severe, so it is better to test early and speak with a health professional right away.

To be effective, Paxlovid for COVID needs to be started within 5 days of symptom onset and Tamiflu, which is used to treat influenza or flu, should be started within two days of your first symptoms.



If you test positive for COVID and don't have a provider, you can get therapeutics through L.A. County Department of Public Health telehealth services at 1-833-540-0473 seven days a week from 8 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Fire Hazard Severity Zone Map Roundtable Discussion

On February 15, Staff will participate in a Fire Hazard Severity Zone Map Roundtable hosted by Cal Cities. This is an opportunity to connect with cities regarding local impacts from Cal Fire's updated Fire Hazard Severity Zone State Responsibility Area Map. Cal Fire also released new information about the [data input](#) relied upon for the maps.

The Local Responsibility Area map will be updated this spring using similar data and methodology. Both maps will impact local land use policies and wildfire management, as certain areas have been recategorized into different severity levels.

Some topics currently planned to be covered include:

1. State Responsibility Area Map
2. Insurance Impacts
3. Future Planning
4. Local Fire Mitigation Efforts

The public comment period now totals 110 days and closes on April 4, 2023. Information about how to submit public comment is available on [Cal Fire's website](#). Staff will continue to monitor this issue.

FREE COVID-19 Home Tests Available for Pickup

Did you know that free at-home COVID-19 rapid antigen tests are available for pickup at two City parks?

Two test kits (each containing two tests) per household are available for pickup at the front desks at Hesse Park and Ryan Park from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. **Proof of RPV residency, such as an ID or utility bill, is required.**


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These iHealth COVID-19 Antigen Rapid Test kits were provided to the City for distribution by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH). Please note that while the tests have a July 2022 expiration date, both the DPH and the California Department of Public Health have endorsed the emergency use of COVID-19 home antigen tests beyond their expiration date until further notice. Are You Ready for the Next Big One?

Recently, Turkey and Syria were hit by a massive earthquake, reminding us of the importance of being prepared. While we can't control when or where an earthquake will occur, there are steps we can take to protect ourselves and our loved ones.

Be Prepared for an Earthquake Before It Happens:

- ✓ [Have a family communication plan.](#)
- ✓ [Make a disaster supply kit.](#)

Staying Safe During an Earthquake:

Drop, Cover, and Hold On. Drop to your hands and knees. Cover your head and neck with your arms. Hold on to any sturdy furniture until the shaking stops. Crawl only if you can reach better cover without going through an area with more debris.

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DROP! Wherever you are, drop down to your hands and knees and hold onto something sturdy. If you are using a wheelchair or walker with a seat, make sure your wheels are locked and remain seated until the shaking stops.



COVER! Cover your head and neck with your arms. If a sturdy table or desk is nearby, crawl underneath it for shelter. If no shelter is nearby, crawl next to an interior wall (away from windows). Stay on your knees or bent over to protect vital organs.



HOLD ON! If you are under a table or desk, hold on with one hand and be ready to move with it if it moves. If seated and unable to drop to the floor, bend forward, cover your head with your arms and hold on to your neck with both hands.

- **IF YOU ARE INDOORS:** Stay there do not run outside or inside your home since debris may fall and injure you. If able to do so, **DROP, COVER and HOLD ON**.
- **IF YOU ARE IN BED:** Stay in bed and turn face down and cover your head and neck with a pillow.
- **IF YOU ARE IN A VEHICLE:** Pullover and stop in a safe area away from buildings, trees, overpasses, underpasses, or utility wires. Make sure to set the parking brake so that the vehicle does not move during the shaking. Stay inside your vehicle until the shaking subsides.
- **IF YOU ARE OUTDOORS:** Move away from wires, buildings, and anything else that could fall and hurt you, but only if you can safely do so. Otherwise, stay where you are and **DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON** if able to do so.

Staying Safe After an Earthquake:

- Expect aftershocks to follow the largest shock of an earthquake sequence.
- Check yourself for injury.
- If in a damaged building, go outside and quickly move away from the building.
- Do not enter damaged buildings.
- If you are trapped, send a text or bang on a pipe or wall. Cover your mouth for protection and instead of shouting, use a whistle.

- If you are in an area that may experience tsunamis, go inland or to higher ground immediately after the shaking stops.
- Save phone calls for emergencies.
- Once safe, monitor local news reports via radio, television, social media, and cell phone text alerts for emergency information and instructions.



Disasters Don't Plan Ahead - You Can

Disaster can happen at any time, often with little to no warning. The time to start thinking about what to do in an emergency is before it happens. By following some simple guidelines, you can help prepare your family, neighborhood, business, or school to be better prepared and self-sufficient after the next disaster.

MAKE A PLAN:

Making a Family Emergency Plan is a good place to start when preparing for an emergency. Because your family may not be together when a disaster strikes, it is critical to plan communication strategies with your friends and family before, during, and after a disaster. Your plan should include every member of your household, including pets, and should take into account the specific needs of your household. Fill out a [family emergency plan](#) or use it as a guide to create your own plan today.

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Create a plan by discussing the following questions with your family, friends, or household to kick-start your emergency preparedness:

- What is my shelter plan?
- What is my evacuation route?
- What is my family/household communication plan?
- Do I need to update my emergency preparedness Disaster Supply Kit?

BUILD A KIT

A disaster supply kit is any pre-assembled group of items that will improve the health and safety of your family during a disaster. Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home.

At a minimum, your emergency supplies should include these 10 essential items:

- Water for 3-10 days (1 gallon per person per day)
- Food for 3-10 days (including pet food)
- First aid kit and instructions
- Flashlights (and extra batteries)
- Radio (and extra batteries)
- Medications (prescription and non-prescription)
- Cash and important documents (small bills and coins, birth certificates, tax returns, deeds, titles, insurance papers, medical cards)
- Clothing and sturdy shoes
- Tools (wrench, duct tape, fire extinguisher, sturdy gloves, whistle)
- Sanitation and hygiene supplies

BE INFORMED:

It is important to know what disasters and hazards could affect your area, how to get emergency alerts, and where you would go if you and your family need to evacuate. Make sure your family has a plan and practices it often.

- **Register for emergency notifications from Alert SouthBay:** Alert SouthBay is the City's primary vehicle for emergency communications. Users can sign up for Alert SouthBay emergency alerts by texting "alertsrb" to 888-777.

EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS



With Southern California deeply seated in "earthquake country," the Los Angeles County Fire Department urges you and your family to always be prepared.

Here are a few tips on how to stay safe and prepared for the aftermath of a major earthquake.

If an Earthquake Hits...

Drop, Cover and Hold. No matter where you are, take cover under a sturdy desk, table or other furniture, and hold on to it until the shaking stops. Avoid danger spots near windows, hanging objects, mirrors, or tall furniture. Conduct earthquake drills every six months with your family.

Keep Your Hallway Clear. It is one of the safest places to be during an earthquake.

Learn How to Shut Off Utilities. Locate and learn how to shut off valves for water, gas, and electricity.

Prepare to Be Self-Sufficient. In a major disaster, emergency personnel will be inundated and may not be available to you for at least 72 hours or longer. Keep a supply of water, food, medications, and clothing on hand.

Keep an Earthquake Supply Kit. Put together an earthquake supply kit with essentials, such as blankets, first aid kit, fire extinguisher, extra cash and change, portable radio, and other supplies for cooking, sanitation and comfort.

Drop, Cover and Hold



Drop down onto your hands and knees. This position protects you from falling but still allows you to move, if necessary.



Cover your head and neck under a sturdy desk or table.



Hold on to your shelter until the shaking stops. Be prepared to move along with your shelter, if the shaking shifts it around.



After the Shaking...

Be prepared for aftershocks.

Check for injuries and give first aid to those who are injured.

Check for fires and hazards.

Wear closed-toe shoes, if near debris.

Check for damaged utilities.

» Do not turn off gas unless you see or smell a leak.

» Do not use candles or matches as they may ignite a fire.

Turn on a portable or car radio for emergency bulletins and instructions/information.

Do not use cell phones or landlines unless it is for a medical, fire or public safety emergency.

Clean up spilled medicine, flammable liquids, bleaches, and chemicals.

Check house, roof, and chimney, if it is safe to do so.

Carefully open closets and cupboards as objects have probably shifted.

Do not use your vehicle, except for an emergency. Keep streets clear for emergency vehicles.

Do not touch or go near downed power lines.

Stay out of damaged buildings until they have been deemed safe.

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Apply Today for a Security Camera Grant!

The City is pleased to announce that the Public Safety Reimbursement Program is once again accepting applications! The program provides a partial reimbursement to individuals and neighborhoods for a public safety purchase such as a security camera.

Individuals are eligible to apply for a 50% reimbursement up to \$100, awarded based on a random draw, for external security cameras such as doorbell cameras. Neighborhoods are eligible to apply for a 50% reimbursement up to \$2,000, awarded based on a rubric, for neighborhood entrance/exit security cameras.

Interested in Volunteering with the Sheriff's Department?

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department has a volunteer program for members of the community who seek to maintain a high quality of life in the area they live in. Volunteers have an opportunity to learn about law enforcement and with their community service, help improve law enforcement services.

In the Volunteers on Patrol (VOP) program, trained volunteers work in volunteer vehicles in a volunteer uniform, assisting in the field as additional eyes and ears in the community, reporting suspicious activities to the Sheriff's Station.

Help Prevent Catalytic Converter Theft

From January 1-28, there were 15 catalytic converters reported stolen in Rancho Palos Verdes. Catalytic converters contain valuable metals and are relatively easy to steal, taking 30 seconds to a few minutes to remove. Vehicles like SUVs and trucks are particularly susceptible as they tend to be higher off the ground, making it easier for thieves to access, and hybrid vehicles are targeted because they tend to contain higher quantities of precious metals.

How can catalytic converter theft be prevented?

If you can, park your car in a locked garage. Otherwise, park in well-lit areas and consider installing a security camera. Be aware that catalytic converter theft also occurs in public parking lots and garages.

Consider getting your vehicle identification number etched onto your catalytic converter, so it is more likely to be returned to you if it is recovered. You can also paint your converter with brightly colored, high-temperature paint that may act as a deterrent. There are also anti-theft devices that will require more time to remove the catalytic converter.

What do I do if my catalytic converter has been stolen?

Report it to the Sheriff's Station at 310-539-1661. Then, visit a licensed Smog Check station to have a replacement installed.

Monthly Financial Report – December 2022

The City's monthly financial report for December 2022 is now available. This report provides an overview of revenues and expenditures and includes access to the OpenGov financial data portal. General Fund Overview

Year-to-date as of December 2022, General Fund revenues and expenditures have outpaced the previous fiscal year. Total revenues of \$18 million rose \$2.5 million, or 16%, over December 2021. Similarly, \$17 million in expenditures reflect an increase of \$3.5 million, or 25%, when compared on an annual basis. Through December, revenues exceeded expenditures by approximately \$1 million. Additional details and data are included for review in the Monthly Financial Report linked above.

Ladera Linda Community Park Project Update

Last week, the trench at the bottom of the main driveway was backfilled, and crews have resumed use of the main gate, with lower gate use exceptions for large trucks and equipment (which include advanced notice to neighbors).

Last week, crews continued work on the building framing, electrical, plumbing, and HVAC systems, and began installing drywall. They completed the fence on the slope adjacent to Forrestal Drive, waterproofed the retaining walls for the ADA access ramp, formed the stepped terrace walls and parking lot curbs, installed underground storm drains on the low tier, and installed exterior sheathing at the maintenance building.

This week they will continue work on the building, site grading, parking lot curbs, the stepped terrace, and ADA access ramp.



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Crews continue to work toward a solution to the timing problems with the parking lot light mockup. Once new dates for the mockup are determined, neighboring residents will be notified through their respective homeowners association representatives and in a future City Manager's Weekly Administrative Report.

Draft Environmental Impact Report for Portuguese Bend Landslide Mitigation Project to be Released This Week

In accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) the City is preparing an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the proposed Portuguese Bend Landslide Mitigation Project, and the Draft EIR will be released this week.

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The proposed project involves a series of recommended mitigation measures for the landslide, which began moving in 1956 and has resulted in significant infrastructure damage to homes, utilities, and roadways.

The Draft EIR will be released February 9, 2023 for public comment. Written comments will be received until 4:30 p.m. on April 14, 2023. Written comments may be submitted to:





This Week, Public Works responded to several emergencies at the following locations:


- Due to the recent storm, maintenance responded to flooding in the cul-de-sac of Peacock Ridge Road.

No Construction on President's Day



City Council Opposes Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Proposed LAX Departure Schedules

On February 7, the Rancho Palos Verdes City Council held a regular meeting, which included a staff report and presentation related to the City's participation in the Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) Community Noise Roundtable. The report and presentation also highlighted troubling news about the FAA proposal to implement two new departure procedures (flight paths) named STHBY and KYLOW. As a result, the City Council received and filed a status report on the City's participation in the LAX Community Noise Roundtable and authorized the Mayor to sign a letter (attached) to the FAA opposing its proposal to implement the two new departure procedures in order to safeguard the City of Rancho Palos Verdes airspace from further passenger jet overflights. Additionally, the City Council requested a letter (attached) be sent to Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) staff thanking them for alerting the City about the FAA's proposal.

Public Comment Period for Altamira Canyon Creek Restoration Project Ends February 24

As a reminder, the 30-day public comment period related to the environmental review of the Altamira Canyon Creek Restoration Project ends on February 24. On January 25, 2023, the Community Development Department issued a Notice of Intent (NOI) to adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for a proposed project to restore a portion of the Altamira Canyon Creek, as highlighted in the attached vicinity map. The NOI included an Initial Study (IS)/MND that evaluates the potential environmental impacts of the proposed project. Dear Mr. Amend:

On February 7, 2023, the Rancho Palos Verdes City Council held a regular meeting that included a City staff report on the City's participation in the LAX Community Noise Roundtable and the FAA's latest proposal to implement two new departure procedures titled STHBY and KYLOW from LAX. These departure procedures, due to their proximity to the Palos Verdes Peninsula, pose a threat to the nighttime tranquility this community currently enjoys and is thereby vehemently opposed by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes.

This City Council, and the community it represents, are also dismayed by the lack of notification from the FAA about the proposal. These concerns have already been expressed to you by the Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) staff in their letter to the FAA dated December 12, 2022 (see attachment). We echo their comments and as such, the City Council requests the following items be considered:

1. That the FAA revise the two new proposed departure procedures named STHBY and KYLOW to ensure that passenger jets are prohibited from initiating turns prior to the shoreline.
2. That the FAA use the existing waypoint PEVEE, which is farther away from the Peninsula than the new waypoint STHBY, which is approximately half a mile closer to the Peninsula.
3. That the FAA place a specific notation, "For use only when nighttime noise abatement procedures are in effect," for new departure procedures.

It is disheartening that your proposal lacks community outreach and that there has been a complete disregard for the many years it took to develop the existing noise abatement procedures with Roundtable communities. Should the FAA decide to implement its new

Upon review of the proposed flight procedures, LAWA is very concerned that these departure operations will not be consistent with the LAX No Turn Before Shoreline policy, will result in more departures flying closer to coastline communities in the South Bay and Palos Verdes Peninsula, and will be used at times other than when Over-Ocean noise abatement configurations are in effect. If FAA cannot specifically resolve the items of concern, then LAWA will not support the implementation of these proposed procedures as currently designed.

LAWA is also very concerned that this information was not shared with potentially affected communities earlier in the process, and that airport staff were not invited to participate in any working groups that were convened to discuss the proposed procedures.
