





## RPV TURNS 50 YEARS YOUNG IN SEPTEMBER 2023!



## BEST WESTERN



Western Avenue is the only corridor in the region that connects the mountains (at Griffith Park) to the sea (at White's Point). This vital stretch of roadway traverses multiple neighborhoods and communities in the region, successively adopting each neighborhood's identity and character along its meandering route. Western Avenue is the City of Rancho Palos Verdes' major commercial corridor and serves as an economic engine, with its mix of small businesses, commercial chains, office space, and dining opportunities.

Improving the quality and driver experience along Western Avenue has been a top priority for City officials. The rebranding of the Western Avenue commercial corridor is a multi-component effort to enhance and beautify

### LADERA LINDA COMMUNITY PARK—THE END IS IN SIGHT

#### KEEP CALM AND CARRY ON (With CONSTRUCTION)



Winston Churchill famously once said "Now this is not the end. It is not even the beginning of the end. But it is, perhaps, the end of the beginning."

Now constructing Ladera Linda Community Park is not the same as winning World War II (although it has taken longer). That said, the beginning of this lengthy and important community project is well in the past, while the end is drawing closer week by week and month by month.

Reaching that end takes a lot of work. As of March, crews were hard at work on the building framing and roofing. Progress was being made on an accessible ramp, stairs, grading, parking lot curbs, electrical and plumbing and HVAC systems, and much more.

Even a notorious curmudgeon like Churchill might smile and give a V for Victory sign at the progress being made on a park that will feature a brand spanking new building, walking paths, paddle tennis and basketball courts, a naturalistic playground, and grass fields.

The end of the end is forecast for September.

### CRIME CORNER



lock it • light it • hide it

- **Lock It:** Lock all doors and windows, including side gates and garage doors. Always lock your vehicle when not attended.
- **Light It:** Turn on exterior lights or set them on a timer so your home looks occupied. Park in well-lit areas.
- **Hide It:** Remove valuables from plain view. If you cannot take your valuables with you when you leave your vehicle, lock them in your trunk or locked glovebox before you reach your destination.

Some other quick tips: get to know your neighbors and be on the lookout for suspicious activity, join Neighborhood Watch, and let trusted neighbors know when you will be out of town so they can be on the lookout for prowlers.

### CRIME STATISTICS

In 2022, there were 343 crimes reported in RPV through the Sheriff's Station's weekly crime report, a decrease from 400 in 2021. Crimes reported include assault, burglary, grand theft, petty theft, and robbery.




## WHERE THERE'S A BILL, THERE'S A WAY

the streetscape, improve traffic flow and develop the regulatory framework to encourage economic and redevelopment opportunities in the area. Current beautification measures along Western Avenue include City-branding banners and updated entry monument signs that are expected to be installed by the first half of 2023. Long-term beautification efforts include refreshing the overall landscaping scheme and installing low-profile lighting, street furniture, and similar items.

These longer-term beautification improvements are currently in the conceptual design phase, with community outreach efforts planned later in 2023. Construction is tentatively planned to begin in 2024. A traffic study which will identify measures to improve traffic flow is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2023. Potential improvements to traffic flow may include signal synchronization, additional turn lanes, and access management. The types of measures that will be implemented will dictate the construction schedule with updates to be provided as information becomes available. The City's proposed Mixed-Use Overlay District aims to create greater flexibility in providing a mix of new housing units in commercial areas that can accommodate various income levels and further the City's goal of pursuing economic development along the City's commercial corridors.

## What motivated you to come work in RPV?

Although I live only 15 miles away from RPV, the Peninsula in general has been a mysterious place to me. As I looked further into the area, I was excited to find that within an intimate city setting, there are numerous exciting projects, such as the development of a new civic center, landslide remediation, and Western Avenue beautification that I would love to be part of.

## What qualities should an effective PW Deputy Director possess?

The PW Deputy Director is a challenging position with lots of responsibilities spanning a wide breadth of technical disciplines and with competing priorities. Aside from being knowledgeable in the numerous areas of responsibilities and being able to work with experts in many different fields with different backgrounds, the most important quality is to be able to consider the needs and wants of the community when delivering public works programs and projects.

## Tell us about your prior work experience including your time in Long Beach.

I have been working in the engineering/construction industry for the last 22 years. During that time, I have worked in both the private and public sectors as a civil design engineer, construction manager, general contractor, program manager, and assistant city engineer. I have always enjoyed the opportunities I was given to experience the engineering/construction process.

Most recently at the Port of Long Beach, I was able to work on the construction of the new Long Beach Civic Center and the demolition of the old Gerald Desmond Bridge. In working on these projects, I learned to appreciate the dedication and expertise required from a diverse team that is needed to build infrastructure that has a lasting community impact.

## What are the biggest future Public Works challenges you see facing Rancho Palos Verdes?

The biggest challenge facing the department is staffing. As seen in both private and public sectors

across almost all industries, technical staff that could be a good fit for the department is difficult to find. The high level of vacancies we are currently experiencing is impacting the projects we can deliver. In the near future, I expect staffing to remain challenging, but in the meantime, our talented team will continue to do our best to deliver quality projects and meet demands to the best of our ability.

RPV is at different stages on a number of high priority projects including the Civic Center, Portuguese Bend Landslide, Ladera Linda Community Center, and Western Avenue. How do you effectively juggle multiple high-level projects?

It is important to maintain constant communication with the various project teams, and to identify and address challenges as quickly as possible. It is my responsibility to make sure that the appropriate level of resource and support is provided to the project teams to maintain momentum in bringing these projects to completion. I believe one of the main keys to successful delivery of these projects is to make sure decisions are being made promptly, and to provide the space and opportunity for the talented team of City staff and consultants to deliver these projects in the best ways possible.

## How are you enjoying the job so far?

Three months in and I am enjoying the job very much. The City of RPV has a very strong team of staff who welcomed me from my first day. I am quickly feeling like I belong as part of the City team.

# WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE BUT STILL A DROUGHT I THINK (OH, IT IS!)



## The Cal Water Difference

Lots of rain in 2023 but Cal Water knows that that doesn't mean the drought is over. Cal Water and its customers continue to lead the way on water conservation efforts. As of January 2023, Cal Water's customers reduced their water use for nine months in a row. **More than half of Cal Water's service areas surpassed 15% in reductions as compared to November 2020.**

The service areas that surpassed the 15% mark include:

- Bakersfield, saving 16.8%
- Bear Gulch, saving 28.9%
- Kern River Valley, saving 16.9%
- King City, saving 18.6%
- Livermore, saving 22.4%
- Los Altos, saving 32.9%
- Marysville, saving 17.2%
- Bayshore, saving 15.4%
- Oroville, saving 25.4%
- Palos Verdes, saving 16.8%
- Selma, saving 19.0%
- Westlake, saving 36.8%
- Willows, saving 23.3%

While they're hoping for plenty of rain over the coming months, Cal Water is planning for continued dry conditions into the new year by promoting indoor water saving tips to help customers continue to conserve during the winter months.

## FIRE AWAY

Concerned about wildfire? You need to plan ahead. Create and maintain a defensible space around your home to increase your home's chance of surviving a wildfire. This space is needed to slow the spread of wildfire and to help protect your home from catching fire-either from direct flame contact or radiant heat.

Your defensible space falls into three zones. Zone 1 extends 30 feet out from buildings, structures, decks, etc. Remove dead or dying vegetation, regularly trim trees, and create a separation between trees, shrubs, and items that could catch fire. Zone 2 extends to 100 feet from buildings and other structures. Zone 3 extends to 200 feet from the structure. Properties with hillside vegetation must conduct annual brush clearance maintenance for dead, hazardous overgrowth vegetation within 200 feet of structures. The spacing between grass, shrubs, and trees is crucial to reduce the spread of wildfires.

Brush fires continues to be a threat to life and properties within the High Fire Hazard Severity Zone. Property owners in high-risk wildlife zones are expected to maintain their properties free of hazardous or nuisance vegetation year-round, and properties shall have brush cleared by June 1, when LA County Fire begins inspections. Owners found to be non-compliant will be assessed fines, and clearance costs performed by the County will be assessed to the parcel's property tax bill.

If property is found to be non-compliant, City staff will strive to gain voluntary compliance by working diligently with property owners. A re-inspection of the property will occur after the 30-day compliance time-frame. If a violation continues with no corrective action taken, owners can be subject to an administrative citation.

The safety of your home can be significantly increased with proper brush clearance, advanced planning and preparation. So please get your property ready for the summer by performing preventive fire maintenance. **May:** No service on Memorial Day - Monday, May 29, 2023. Services for all routes (Monday through Friday) will be delayed by one day.

**June:** No Changes.

**Regulations for Hours for Trash Cart/Can Placement:** The City's Municipal Code (Section 8.20.330) has regulations on when trash, recycling and green waste carts can be left at the curb for collection. Carts can be placed at the curb after 4 pm the day before collection day and empty carts must be removed no later than 10 p.m. on collection day. **Empty carts cannot be left on the street overnight.** Containers have to be stored on the side or back of the property, at a location that is substantially screened from view. Please help keep your neighborhood attractive and aesthetically pleasing.



**BACKYARD SERVICE:** EDCO provides backyard service to customers at an additional monthly charge. If you have temporary or permanent physical or medical limitations or travel frequently, call EDCO and inquire about this service.

## COVID-19 UPDATE

### FREE COVID-19 HOME TESTS AVAILABLE FOR PICKUP

Free at-home COVID-19 rapid antigen tests are now available for pickup to RPV residents at two City parks.

Two test kits (each containing two tests) per household are available for pickup at the front desks at Hesse Park and Ryan Park from 9 am to 5 pm daily. **Proof of RPV residency, such as an ID or utility bill, is required.**

These iHealth COVID-19 Antigen Rapid Test kits were provided to the City for distribution by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH). Please note that while the tests have a July 2022 expiration date, both the DPH and the California Department of Public Health have endorsed the emergency use of COVID-19 home antigen tests beyond their expiration date until further notice.

Hesse Park is located at 29301 Hawthorne Boulevard and Ryan Park is located at 30359 Hawthorne Blvd.
