

Public Comments on Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Portuguese Bend Landslide Mitigation Project Due - April 14

On February 9, the City released a Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for the proposed Portuguese Bend Landslide Remediation Project. The project aims to slow a continuously moving landslide that has significantly damaged homes, utilities, and infrastructure over the past seven decades.

More than 900 residents in the vicinity of the project received a letter, the Corrected Notice of Public Hearing and Notice of Availability of Draft Environmental Impact Report for the Portuguese Bend Landslide

Remediation Project. The letter included the project background and where interested persons can view the DEIR.

Governor Newsom Eases Drought Restrictions

Last week, Governor Newsom rolled back some drought emergency provisions that are no longer needed due to current water conditions while maintaining other measures that support regions and communities still facing water supply challenges and that continue building up long-term water resilience. Amid climate-driven weather whiplash, the state has taken action to boost water supplies through groundwater recharge, stormwater capture, reservoir storage, and more.

While recent storms have helped ease drought impacts, regions and communities across the state continue to experience water supply shortages, especially communities that rely on groundwater supplies that have been severely depleted in recent years. Last week's order is responsive to current conditions while preserving smart water measures:

- Ends the voluntary 15% water conservation target while continuing to encourage Californians make conservation a way of life;
- Ends the requirement that local water agencies implement level 2 of their drought contingency plans;
- Maintains the ban on wasteful water uses, such as watering ornamental grass on commercial properties;
- Preserves all current emergency orders focused on groundwater supply, where the effects of the multi-year drought continue to be devastating;

- Maintains orders focused on specific watersheds that have not benefited as much from recent rains, including the Klamath River and Colorado River basins, which both remain in drought;
- Retains a state of emergency for all 58 counties to allow drought response and recovery efforts to continue.



Fire Hazard Severity Zone Map Changes Webinar

On March 27, Staff participated in a Fire Hazard Severity Zone Map Changes Webinar hosted by Cal Cities (see attachments). This webinar provided a platform to connect with Cal FIRE, the California Department of Insurance, and other city officials to gain insight into the anticipated changes to the state's fire hazard zones. This webinar specifically covered the reclassification of areas into different severity levels in both the Fire Hazard Severity Zone State Responsibility Area (SRA) Map and the soon-to-be-released Local Responsibility Area (LRA) Map, which is expected to have a significant impact on local land use policies and wildfire management. The session was comprehensive and detailed the methodology behind the maps and their potential effects on future insurance costs, fire mitigation efforts, planning, and zoning. Overall, it

California Tsunami Preparedness Week

2023's California Tsunami Preparedness Week is March 25 – 31! As part of California's Tsunami Preparedness Week, the City encourages beachgoers, visitors, and residents who live near the City's coastline to practice tsunami awareness by accessing life-saving preparedness information to support California's Tsunami Preparedness Week - a statewide campaign.

Everyone who lives, works, or plays near the coastline, should know how to protect themselves from a tsunami. Tsunamis are large ocean waves generated by major local or distant earthquakes or major landslides in the ocean. Ocean waves, ranging from several feet or much larger, can strike the coast with devastating force. Tsunamis can occur here in Southern California and impact the Peninsula and surrounding cities.

Tsunami Hazard Area maps available on the [state's tsunami website](#) illustrate how a tsunami could impact our coastline using new data and modeling developed over the past ten years, using lessons learned from the 2011 Tōhoku region event coupled with new tsunami hazard information and mapping tools. Easy-to-use [interactive web applications](#) now reflect that some areas of our coastline may have a higher tsunami hazard than previously represented in prior hazard maps.

Tsunamis can be catastrophic in the short and long-term, affecting millions of people over wide geographical areas up to thousands of miles away from the source. Any member of the public can take these immediate preparedness steps to keep themselves, their families, and loved ones safe in the event of a tsunami:

- Take a “tsunami walk” with your family, friends, and loved ones; [get to know your zone](#) and be alert when at work, home, or playing near the ocean.

Common Fire Hazards in the Home

Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as one or two minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Unfortunately, many fires start in the house and can potentially be deadly for you or your family. Your entire household must know what to do in the event of a personal home fire so everyone can safely remove themselves from the house as quickly and efficiently as possible.

In just two minutes, a fire can become life-threatening. In five minutes, a residence can be engulfed in flames. The causes of these fires can range from

candles left burning to unattended food in the kitchen. Knowing where and when fires are most likely to ignite can help you protect yourself, your family, and your home from tragedy.

Kitchen fires: Unattended cooking is the leading cause of kitchen fires and fire-related injuries. Keep an eye on the stove, oven, and other appliances like toaster ovens, and move combustible items away from the stove. Stay in the kitchen when frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period, turn off the stove.

- **Portable space heaters:** Keep anything that gives off heat at least 3 feet away from flammable materials or items. Never plug more than one heating appliance into an outlet. Buy only heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL). Check to make sure the portable heater has a thermostat control mechanism and will switch off automatically if the heater falls over. Keep portable gas generators outside and away from windows to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.
- **Electrical safety:** Replace all worn, old, or damaged appliance cords immediately, and do not run cords under rugs or furniture. If an appliance has a three-prong plug, use it only in a three-slot outlet. Never force it to fit into a two-slot outlet or extension cord. Immediately shut off, then professionally replace light switches that are hot to the touch and lights that flicker. Don't overload circuits or outlets.
- **Candles:** Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid using candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep. Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets. Do not place lighted candles where children, pets, or anyone else can knock them over. Never burn a candle on or near anything that can catch fire. Keep burning candles away from furniture, drapes, bedding, carpets, books, paper, flammable decorations, etc. Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface. Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame. Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container. Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage.
- **Laundry rooms:** Don't overload your washer or dryer or pack items down. Instead, leave room for laundry to tumble. Follow your machine manufacturer's recommendations for capacity. Clean the lint screen and drum between loads to prevent buildup. About once a year, clean the dryer exhaust vent and ducts.

Replace plastic venting material with flexible metal venting material. Ensure that your appliances are plugged into outlets with the proper voltage.



Apply Today for a Security Camera Grant!

The City is pleased to announce that the Public Safety Reimbursement Program is once again accepting applications! The program provides a partial reimbursement to individuals and neighborhoods for a public safety purchase such as a security camera. Individuals are eligible to apply for a 50% reimbursement up to \$100, awarded based on a random draw, for external security cameras such as doorbell cameras. Neighborhoods are eligible to apply for a 50% reimbursement up to \$2,000, awarded based on a rubric, for neighborhood entrance/exit security cameras.

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department has a volunteer program for members of the community who seek to maintain a high quality of life in the area they live in. Volunteers have an opportunity to learn about law enforcement and, with their community service, help improve law enforcement services.

In the Volunteers on Patrol (VOP) program, trained volunteers work in volunteer vehicles in a volunteer uniform, assisting in the field as additional eyes and ears in the community and reporting suspicious activities to the Sheriff's Station.

Ladera Linda Community Park Project Update



This week, they are expected to continue work from last week and resume work on the accessibility ramp stepped terrace, and parking lot drains, if the weather allows.

As rain is forecast this week, site access through the lower gate is expected to be extended. Adjacent neighbors have been notified.




established services within ten days of it being reported.

 - On Palos Verdes Drive South from the border with San Pedro to the border with Palos Verdes Estates.






Public Right of Way/Roadway Repairs

- Crews continued to repair damaged signage throughout the city.




- Crews filled in several potholes on Palos Verdes Drive South near the border with San Pedro.







- **Zone 0 - Ember Resistant Zone**
Removal of any flammable materials within 5 feet of any structure. This is a new requirement imposed by AB 3074. **(Enforcement of this requirement will begin in 2024. Informational only for 2023).**
- **Zone 1 – Lean, Clean and Green Zone**
Removal of flammable vegetation within 50 feet of any structure.
- **Zone 2 – Reduce Fuel Zone**
Remaining vegetation for the next 150 feet, for a total of 200 feet, shall be limbed up and include removal of dead wood.
- Specimen native trees and shrubs are permitted, provided they are spaced to not allow transmission of fire to a structure.
- Access roads must maintain 10 feet of brush clearance on each side and shall maintain adequate vertical clearance.
- Fire hydrants shall maintain clearance of 3 feet.

ANNUAL BRUSH CLEARANCE REQUIREMENTS

INSPECTION TIMELINE

Your local fire station will begin inspections on June 1, 2023. If hazardous fire conditions exist on your property at the time of inspection, You will have 30 days to make the necessary corrections.

INSPECTION FEE

An Inspection Fee of \$100.00 will be assessed on all declared hazardous properties whether or not they are cleared by the property owner. Inspection fees will be assessed annually and applied to your November property Tax Bill.

Brush Clearance Annual Notice FAQs

Residents of the Palos Verdes Peninsula have recently received a Defensible Space Annual Notice (formerly known as the Brush Clearance Annual Notice) from the Los Angeles County Fire Department (LACoFD). Some homeowners are receiving this notice for the first time due to updated mapping software. Consequently, the Peninsula Cities received resident inquiries seeking clarification. In collaboration with the (LACoFD), the four cities of the Palos Verdes Peninsula are providing this Brush Clearance Annual Notice FAQ's with additional information and clarification regarding the current requirements for brush clearance.

Why Did I Receive this Notice?

- The Palos Verdes Peninsula is primarily located within a state-designated Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone (VHFHSZ).
- State law (California Public Resources Code 4291) requires single-family dwellings within the VHFHSZ to maintain defensible space around these structures at all times.
- The LACoFD conducts defensible space inspections on residential single-family dwellings annually.

What is a Fire Hazard Severity Zone?

- CAL FIRE is required by law to map significant fire hazard areas based on fuels, terrain, local weather, and other factors.
- These designations, known as Fire Hazard Severity Zones (FHSZ), mandate how people construct buildings and protect property to reduce the risk of wildfires.
- The Palos Verdes Peninsula is almost entirely designated as a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone (VHFHSZ).

Why is this the First Time I Am Receiving this Notice?

- The LACoFD has recently updated its mapping software using a geospatial database to create its Defensible Space Inspection Program that is significantly more accurate.
- The updated mapping system has resulted in numerous new properties subject to the brush clearance requirement for the very first time

When will My Property be Inspected?

- Your local fire station will begin inspections on June 1, 2023.

Is There a Fee for the Inspection?

- Yes, an inspection fee has always been assessed on properties subject to the required brush clearance. However, in December of 2021, the Board of Supervisors approved increasing the inspection fee over the next 3 years at the following rate (2021 - \$50.00, 2022 - \$100.00, and 2023 - \$151.00).
- The Fee will be assessed in November as part of your property tax bill.



How will I know if I passed the Brush Clearance Inspection?

- An Inspection Report identifying compliance or non-compliance will be left on your door.

Do I Have to be Home for the Brush Clearance Inspection?

- No, your local fire station will attempt to complete the inspection through only unlocked and open access.
- If your gate is locked or your property inaccessible, a notice will be left at your day on who to call to schedule an inspection appointment.

If found to be Non-Compliant, how much time will I have to make corrections?

- Owners have a minimum of 30 days to complete corrections.

Can I Call Someone if I Need Clarity on Requirements?

- Inquiries should be directed to the Brush Clearance Unit at (626) 969-2375.

What Is Assembly Bill 38 (AB 38)?

- Assembly Bill 38 (AB-38), commonly referred to as Real Estate Inspections, took effect on July 1, 2021. AB-38 requires that during escrow the seller of a property in the VHFHSZ submit documentation of a compliant defensible space inspection prior to closing. Homes that received their annual brush inspection within six months of closing can use that inspection, if compliant, to satisfy this requirement

What Is Assembly Bill 3074 (AB 3074)?

- State Assembly Bill 3074 (AB-3074) establishes a new brush clearance zone called “Zone 0”, which is a 5 foot Ember Resistant Zone that requires removal of all flammable materials within 5 feet of any structure.
- **Zone 0 requirements will not be enforced until 2024, the LACoFD will be using this year's inspections to educate property owners on what they need to do to become compliant with next year's Zone 0 requirements.**

BRUSH CLEARANCE REQUIREMENTS

It is a property owner's responsibility to properly and timely clear vegetation around all structures. A fire safe landscape creates a defensible space to help protect against approaching wildfires and flying embers which could save your home and personal belongings.

WHAT ARE YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

- Establish a 5-foot Ember Resistant Zone around all structures. Eliminate all vegetation and materials that could be ignited by embers from a wildfire. **This is a new requirement imposed by the State of California via AB 3074. Enforcement of this requirement will begin in 2024. Informational only for 2023.**
- In the VHFHSZ, a defensible space is considered 200 feet around all structures, based on the following zones:
 - Within the first 5 feet of any structure (Zone 0), removal of all vegetation;
 - Within the next 50 feet of any structure, removal of flammable vegetation is required. Native and ornamental vegetation known to be flammable, including but not limited to Acacia, Cedar, Cypress, Eucalyptus, Juniper, Pine, and Pampas Grass. Ornamental grasses and ground cover should be maintained at no higher than 3 inches;
 - Within the next 150 feet (or up to the property line), remaining vegetation is required to be thinned
 - Remaining vegetation for the next 150 feet (or up to property line) around any structure is required to be cleared, trimmed, thinned, limbed up removing flammable vegetation and dead wood;
 - The total defensible space should measures a total of 200 feet from any structure (or up to the property line);
 - Specimen native trees and shrubs are permitted, provided they are spaced to not allow transmission of fire to a structure; and,
 - It is recommended that specimen shall be spaced a minimum of 15 feet or 3 times diameter from other specimens, structures or surrounding native brush.
- Access road shall be maintained with a minimum of 10 feet of brush clearance on each side. Fire access roads shall have an unobstructed vertical clearance to the sky. Trees overhanging fire access road shall be maintained to provide adequate vertical clearance.
- Fire hydrants shall maintain clearance of 3 feet.
- All trees and shrubs shall be maintained free of deadwood and litter.
 - Shrubs shall be trimmed up from the ground 1/3 of their height.
 - Trees shall be trimmed up to a minimum of 6 feet or 1/3 their height up to 40 feet.



How are the Zones Determined

- Developed using a science-based model that assigns a hazard score based on the factors that influence fire likelihood and fire behavior.
- Factors:
 - ✓ Fire history
 - ✓ Vegetation
 - ✓ Topography
 - ✓ Climate
 - ✓ Ember production and movement













- ☐ Width of moderate, high and very high bands in urban based on ember load, urban tree cover and slope
- ☐ All unclassed SRA → Moderate



Fire Hazard Severity Zones (FHSZ)

- ☐ CAL FIRE has been working on the update of the FHSZ maps for some time.
 - ✓ Public Comment began on the new regulation December 16, 2022
 - ✓ Public Hearings in each County with SRA completed February 3, 2023
 - ✓ Public Comment ends April 4, 2023
- ☐ The State Responsibility Area (SRA) will be complete first then the Local Responsibility Areas (LRA) later this year.



LRA Adoption Process

- Will be completed County by County including all Local Jurisdictions within each County
- 60-day notice prior to start of local review process
 - Initial meeting to describe process
 - Set training dates
- 60-day local review
- FRAP review of comments
- Final recommendation submitted to governing body






- ❑ City / County has 30 days to set public comment and 120 to adopt through ordinance
- ❑ A local agency may, at its discretion, include areas within the jurisdiction of the local agency, not identified as very high fire hazard severity zones by the State Fire Marshal, as very high fire hazard severity zones.
- ❑ The local agency shall transmit a copy of the adopted ordinance to the State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection within 30 days of adoption

- Cleared vegetation and debris from under decks
- Removal of combustible sheds and other outbuildings from the immediate surroundings of the home, to at least a distance of 30 feet
- Defensible space compliance (including trimming trees, removal of brush and debris from yard, and compliance with state law and local ordinances)

3 Working together as a community



- A community should have clearly defined boundary and a local risk assessment in consultation with the local fire district or state fire agency; an identified evacuation route, cleared of vegetative overgrowth, and evacuation plan contingencies; clear funding sources to implement community mitigation activities and meet clear risk reduction goals; and integrated and up-to-date local planning documents pertinent to community wildfire risk.
- Current examples include Fire Risk Reduction Communities designated by the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection and Firewise USA communities in good standing.

Safer from Wildfires is an interagency partnership between Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara and the emergency response and readiness agencies in Governor Gavin Newsom's administration to protect lives, homes, and businesses by reducing wildfire risk.

With California experiencing devastating, climate change intensified wildfires, homes and businesses need insurance they can rely on. Commissioner Lara is using every tool available to improve insurance for our communities. Drawing on the direct experience of first responders and the latest research on wildfires, the partnership created a consistent approach to reducing risk with a list of achievable and effective actions to help make homes and businesses safer from wildfires. The ultimate goal is protecting consumers by reducing wildfire risk in their communities, making insurance available and affordable for all Californians.

This "ground up" approach for wildfire resilience has three layers of protection — for the structure, the immediate surroundings, and the community — to prevent wildfires from catching and spreading to other homes and businesses in the neighborhood.

- Debris pile space compliance (including trimming trees, removal of brush and debris from yard, and compliance with state law and local ordinances)

3 Working together as a community



- The Partnership recognizes the benefit of community-wide mitigation plans where the community has a clearly defined boundary, a local assessment in consultation with the local fire district or state fire agency, and clear funding sources to implement community mitigation activities that meet risk reduction goals.
- Current examples include Fire Risk Reduction Communities designated by the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection and Firewise USA communities in good standing.
