
New Flags Highlight City's 50th Anniversary






Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Training

Beat the Heat - Extreme Heat Tips

There is hot, and then there is HOT! Extreme heat is a period of high heat and humidity with temperatures above 90 degrees for at least two to three days. In extreme heat, your body works extra hard to maintain a normal temperature, which can lead to death. Extreme heat is responsible for the highest number of annual deaths among all weather-related hazards.

When experiencing hot temperatures, it's important to remember to: Stay Cool, Stay Hydrated, and Stay Informed.

STAY COOL:

Stay Cool Indoors:

- Stay in an air-conditioned place as much as possible.
- If your home does not have air conditioning, go to a shopping mall or public library—even a few hours spent in air conditioning can help your body stay cooler when you go back into the heat.
- Keep in mind:* Electric fans may provide comfort, but when the temperature is in the high 90s, they will not prevent heat-related illness. Taking a cool shower or bath or moving to an air-conditioned place is a much better way to cool off.

Schedule Outdoor Activities Carefully:

- Try to limit your outdoor activity to when it's coolest, like morning and evening hours. Rest often in shady areas so that your body has a chance to recover.

Pace Yourself:

- Cut down on exercise during the heat. If you're not accustomed to working or exercising in a hot environment, start slowly and pick up the pace gradually.
- If exertion in the heat makes your heart pound and leaves you gasping for breath, STOP all activity. Get into a cool area or the shade, and rest, especially if you become lightheaded, confused, weak, or faint.

Do Not Leave Children in Cars:

- Cars can quickly heat up to dangerous temperatures, even with a window cracked open. While anyone left in a parked car is at risk, children are especially at risk of getting a heat stroke or dying. When traveling with children, remember to do the following:
 - Never leave infants, children, or pets in a parked car, even if the windows are cracked open.
 - To remind yourself that a child is in the car, keep a stuffed animal in the car seat. When the child is buckled in, place the stuffed animal in the front with the driver.
 - When leaving your car, check to be sure everyone is out of the car. Do not overlook any children who have fallen asleep in the car.

STAY HYDRATED:

Drink Plenty of Fluids:

- Drink more fluids, regardless of how active you are. Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.
- **Warning:** If your doctor limits the amount you drink or has you on water pills, ask how much you should drink while the weather is hot.
- **Stay away from very sugary or alcoholic drinks**—these actually cause you to lose more body fluid. Also, avoid very cold drinks because they can cause stomach cramps.

Replace Salt and Minerals:

- Heavy sweating removes salt and minerals from the body that need to be replaced. A sports drink can replace the salt and minerals you lose in sweat.

- If you are on a low-salt diet, have diabetes, high blood pressure, or other chronic conditions, talk with your doctor before drinking a sports beverage or taking salt tablets.

Keep Your Pets Hydrated:

- Provide plenty of fresh water for your pets, and leave the water in a shady area.

STAY INFORMED:

Know the Signs:

- Learn the signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses and how to treat them:
 - **Heat Cramps**
 - **Signs:** Muscle pains or spasms in the stomach, arms, or legs
 - **Actions:** Go to a cooler location. Remove excess clothing. Take sips of cool sports drinks with salt and sugar. Get medical help if cramps last more than an hour.
 - **Heat Exhaustion**
 - **Signs:** Heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, fainting, nausea, and vomiting.
 - **Actions:** Stop physical activity, move to an air-conditioned place, and lie down. Loosen or remove clothing. Take a cool bath. Take sips of cool sports drinks with salt and sugar. Get medical help if symptoms get worse or last more than an hour.
 - **Heat Stroke**
 - **Signs:** Extremely high body temperature (above 103 degrees) taken orally, red, hot and dry skin with no sweat, Rapid, strong pulse, dizziness, confusion, or unconsciousness
 - **Actions:** Call 9-1-1 or get the person to a hospital immediately. Cool down with whatever methods are available until medical help arrives.

Monitor Those at High Risk:

- Although anyone at any time can suffer from heat-related illness, some people are at greater risk than others:
 - Infants and young children
 - People 65 years of age or older
 - People who are overweight
 - People who overexert during work or exercise

- People who are physically ill, especially with heart disease or high blood pressure, or who take certain medications, such as for depression, insomnia, or poor circulation.

Family Emergency Communication Planning

Having a plan is one of the most important steps you can take in disaster preparedness. Make sure your family has a plan in case of an emergency. Before an emergency happens, sit down together and decide how you will contact each other, where you will go, and what you will do in an emergency. Knowing what to do and how to do it can help you and/or your family manage disasters with less worry, fear, and uncertainty.

The information below will help you fill out your Family Emergency Plan on the next page.

COLLECT IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Write down phone numbers and email addresses for everyone in your household. Having this important information written down will help you reconnect with others in case you don't have your mobile device or computer with you or if the battery runs down.

IDENTIFY An OUT-OF-TOWN CONTACT

Identify someone outside your community who can act as a central point of contact to help your household reconnect. In a disaster, it may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town because local phone lines can be jammed. Learn their phone number and know when to call them. Tell your contact where you are so your family can find you right away.

ESTABLISH FAMILY MEETING PLACES

Decide on safe, familiar places where your family can go for protection or to reunite. Make sure these locations are accessible for household members with disabilities or access and functional needs. If you have pets or service animals, think about animal-friendly locations. Identify the following places:

- **In your neighborhood:** This is a place in your neighborhood where your household members will meet if there is a fire or other emergency and you need to leave your home. The meeting place could be a big tree, a mailbox at the end of the driveway, or a neighbor's house.
- **Outside of your neighborhood:** This is a place where your family will meet if a disaster happens when you're not at home, and you can't get back to your home. This could be a library, community center, house of worship, or family friend's home.
- **Outside of your town or city:** Having an out-of-town meeting place can help you reunite if a disaster happens and you cannot get home or to your out-of-neighborhood meeting place, or your family is not together, and your community is instructed to evacuate the area. This meeting place could be the home of a relative or family friend. Make sure everyone knows the address of the meeting place and discuss ways you would get there.

SHARE YOUR PLAN

Make sure everyone carries a copy in their backpack, purse, or wallet. You should also post a copy in a central location in your home, such as your refrigerator or family bulletin board.

PRACTICE YOUR PLAN

Once you have completed your Family Emergency Communication Plan, and made copies for all the members of your household, it's time to practice.

Here are some ideas for practicing your plan:

- Practice texting and calling: Have each person practice sending a text message or calling your out-of-town contact.
- Practice gathering all household members at your neighborhood emergency meeting places: Talk about how each person would get to the identified out-of-neighborhood and out-of-town meeting places. Discuss all modes of transportation, such as public transportation, for all family members, including people with disabilities and others with access and functional needs.
- Review, update, and practice your Family Emergency Communication Plan at least once a year or whenever any of your information changes.





Quarterly Home Sales History – 2nd Quarter 2023

Despite elevated interest rates, housing demand has continued to outpace the number of homes available for sale. As observed in the quarter ending June 30, 2023, buyers opted to gradually adapt to current housing market conditions, which led to an overall rise in sales activity. The statewide median home price exceeded \$800,000 in June for the third straight month and rose by 0.3% compared to May. However, the median price fell by roughly 2.4% when compared to June 2022.

Tight housing supply and more high-end homes being sold relative to prior months has attributed toward the upward pressure on prices. The downward trend in home prices appears to be stabilizing, but additional changes are expected in the coming months as



interest rates are likely to remain elevated during the third quarter of 2023.

In the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, the median sales price for detached single-family homes experienced an increase of 14.9% and ended the second quarter at \$1.85 million. This increase comes after three consecutive quarters of price declines. Average home prices also ticked upward in June, ending the period at just over \$2 million. A 35.8% rise in the number of homes sold boosted activity over this period and drove both median and average sales prices upward. The table and chart below highlight quarterly changes between 2020 and 2023.

Repairs to the Landslide Area

Work on Palos Verdes Drive South to repair the asphalt roadway surface in the landslide area continues this week. This work will address repairs needed at this time in the “Ski Jump” area and near Wayfarers Chapel. Roadway inspection will continue on a regular basis to identify any additional repairs that may become necessary.



Traffic control will be in place. Therefore, expect delays when driving in this area. Please slow down, drive cautiously, and obey all signs and instructions when driving through the work zones.

Ladera Linda Community Park Project Update

Last week, construction crews continued installing exterior tiles and the aluminum framing for the building’s exterior glazing system and began installing exterior metal paneling. Crews completed installing the parking lot and pathway lights, placed gravel for the maintenance driveway, and continued installing the irrigation systems and decomposed granite pathways.

This week, crews will continue installing the building’s exterior glazing system and exterior tiles, painting the interior, installing ceiling grids, and will polish the concrete floors. Crews are also scheduled to start surfacing the basketball court.



As of January 1, 2019, the use of gas-powered blowers in single-family residential neighborhoods is prohibited in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes. Only standard electric- and battery-powered blowers - such as handheld, corded, and cordless equipment, are allowed to be operated throughout single-family residential zones in the City. Pursuant to Section 8.16 (Weed and Debris Blowers) of the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code, the operation of such devices is permitted Monday through Friday from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Saturday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm and prohibited on Sundays and legal holidays.




