

Plan Ahead for the Unexpected: [Building Your Emergency Go Bag](#)

California is prone to natural disasters of all kinds including wildfires, earthquakes, extreme heat, and more recently, significant flooding. As climate change adds to the

frequency and severity of these natural disasters, it's important to take steps now to ensure you and your loved ones are ready for anything.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes wants to encourage all residents to have a go-bag ready in case of an emergency. Having a few essential items stashed away in a bag that's easily accessible will help reduce the stress caused by an emergency.

GO-BAG ESSENTIALS

There are many items you can add to a go-bag, but remember a few essentials to ensure you have what you need if you have to leave your home quickly.


- Cash
- Medication and medical devices
- Cell phone charger or battery pack
- Important documents such as birth certificate, social security card, or marriage license
- Three-day supply of food and water for each member of your family
- First aid kit
- Card or games for children
- Pet supplies
 - Food/water
 - Collar/leash
 - Carrier
 - Vaccine information
 - Toys

After building your go-bag, keep it in a place that's easy to remember and easy to grab in case you need to evacuate your home quickly. Maintain your go-bag by replacing expired items, reevaluate your needs every year, and update the bag as needed.

PLAN. PREPARE. EVACUATE – Wildfire Preparedness

In collaboration with our public safety partners, the four Peninsula cities have launched an evacuation readiness website, PVPready.gov.

This platform is designed to efficiently equip Peninsula residents and businesses with the tools necessary to evacuate during emergencies. PVPready.gov incorporates a cloud-based evacuation platform. It offers pre-established, Peninsula-wide evacuation zone maps, thus providing a comprehensive source of verified emergency information.

These zones benefit residents and aid fire, police, and other emergency service agencies in their preparedness efforts, streamlining evacuation and reducing confusion during emergencies.

As Southern California enters its peak fire season, Peninsula residents must be vigilant and proactive. It's now more important than ever to prioritize wildfire prevention and preparedness.

To help safeguard your home and prepare your family, please consider the following recommendations:

- Visit PVPready.gov to identify and memorize your zone. It's vital to #KnowYourZone before an emergency strikes. Save this information in your smartphone, write it down, and place it somewhere easily accessible, such as on your refrigerator or near your front door.
- Familiarize yourself with low-cost and no-cost measures to protect your home from wildfire using these tip sheets:

- Download the L.A. County Fire Department's "Ready! Set! Go!" Personal Wildfire Action Plan from fire.lacounty.gov/rsg. This guide will assist you in creating an effective emergency kit.
- Register for Alert SouthBay emergency notifications by texting "alerts" to 888-777, visiting alertsouthbay.com, or downloading the Everbridge app. These alerts will keep you informed during emergencies.
- In the event of an emergency, visit PVPready.gov to check if your zone is under evacuation. Remember, cell phone and internet service may be unreliable during these times, so keep a battery-operated radio handy to access news updates.

Common Fire Hazards in the Home

In just two minutes, a fire can become life-threatening. In five minutes, a residence can be engulfed in flames. The causes of these fires can range from candles left burning to unattended food in the kitchen. Knowing where and when fires are most likely to ignite can help you protect yourself, your family, and your home from tragedy.

KITCHEN FIRES: Most home fires start in the kitchen during cooking — usually on stovetops —not in the oven. Specifically, unattended cooking is the leading cause of kitchen fires and fire-related injuries.

These home fires are also easily preventable:

Keep an eye on the stove, oven, and other appliances like toaster ovens, and move combustible items away from the stove. Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.

PORTABLE SPACE HEATERS: With the following safety tips and precautions, you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

- Make sure to always keep anything that gives off heat at least 3 feet away from flammable materials or items.
- Never plug more than one heating appliance into an outlet.
- Buy only heaters evaluated by a nationally recognized laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Check that the portable heater has a thermostat control mechanism and will switch off automatically if the heater falls over.
- Keep portable gas generators outside and away from windows to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.
- If you have a fireplace, make sure your chimney is checked and cleaned by a professional once a year. Use a metal or glass screen that is large enough to prevent escaping embers.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY: Electrical fires can be caused by an equipment malfunction, an overloaded circuit, or an overheated appliance such as a washer, dryer, or space heater.

Safety Tips:

- Frayed wires can cause fires. Replace all worn, old, or damaged appliance cords immediately, and do not run cords under rugs or furniture.
- If an appliance has a three-prong plug, use it only in a three-slot outlet. Never force it to fit into a two-slot outlet or extension cord.
- Immediately shut off, then professionally replace light switches that are hot to the touch and lights that flicker.
- Don't overload circuits or outlets.
- Consider adding circuits or outlets by a qualified electrician, so you don't have to use extension cords.
- Consider hiring an electrician to perform an annual checkup of your home's wiring.

CANDLES: The National Fire Protection Association estimates that candles cause an average of 8,200 house fires each year in the U.S. The matches and lighters used to light candles are equally dangerous if left in a place where children can reach them.

Candle Safety Tips:

- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed.

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- Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.
- Keep candles out of the reach of children and pets.
 - Do not place lighted candles where children, pets, or anyone else can knock them over.
- Never burn a candle on or near anything that can catch fire.
 - Keep burning candles away from furniture, drapes, bedding, carpets, books, paper, flammable decorations, etc.
- Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame.
- Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.

LAUNDRY ROOMS: Dryers are responsible for about 9 out of 10 appliance fires.

Fortunately, preventing laundry fires is simple for the most part:

- Don't overload your washer or dryer or pack items down. Instead, leave room for laundry to tumble. Follow your machine manufacturer's recommendations for capacity.
- Clean the lint screen and drum between loads to prevent buildup.
- About once a year, clean the dryer exhaust vent and ducts.
- Replace plastic venting material with flexible metal venting material.
- Ensure that your appliances are plugged into outlets with the proper voltage.

Did you know smoke is poisonous? It kills more people in home fires than flames.




Today, our homes are filled with human-made materials like plastic and compressed particle board.

These products burn quicker and give you less time to escape.



The most common poison in smoke is carbon monoxide (CO).

CO can make you feel drowsy, and difficult to wake up and get out of your home.



Smoke is hot!

It can irritate your eyes and throat, and make it difficult for you to breathe.

This happens even if you are far from the fire.



Thick black smoke can fill your home in a few minutes and make the inside completely dark.

It can travel through hallways, doors, ductwork, and cracks and openings in a building's walls and floors.

If you see smoke, don't wait! Get out right away!



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

Consumer Price Index – August 2023

Consumer Price Index (U.S.)

On a seasonally adjusted basis, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose by 0.6% in August from the prior month, faster than the 0.2% monthly increase experienced in July. As measured by CPI, all items index (headline inflation) increased by 3.7% over the last 12 months and exceeded July's annual change of 3.2%.

The index for all items less food and energy (core inflation) rose by 0.3% in August

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following July's month-over-month increase of 0.2%. Moreover, core inflation rose by 4.3% when compared on an annualized basis. Charts 1 and 2 further illustrate the monthly and yearly percent changes in CPI for both headline and core inflation.

Chart 1. U.S. One-month Percent Change in CPI (seasonally adjusted)





Chart 2. U.S. 12-month Percent Change in CPI (not seasonally adjusted)



The index for gasoline was the largest contributor to the monthly all items increase, rising by 10.6% and accounting for over half of the increase. Also contributing to the August monthly increase was continued advancement in the shelter index, which rose


for the 40th consecutive month. Energy and food prices added to the monthly rise, growing by 5.6% and 0.2% in August, respectively.

Consumer Price Index (Los Angeles)

Prices in the Los Angeles area, as measured by CPI, increased by 0.7% in August. Additionally, prices have risen by 3.3% over the last 12 months. The latest report indicates that the August increase was also influenced by higher prices for gasoline and shelter.

Core inflation similarly advanced in August and rose by 0.5%. Over the year, this index increased by 3.5%. An overview of the annual percentage changes in CPI for both major indexes in the Los Angeles area is illustrated in Chart 3 below.


Ladera Linda Community Park Project Update

This week, the contractor continued installing metal panels and light fixtures, sealing exterior glazing for the building, and began installing door hardware. Crews also continued installing gopher wire for the lower tier turf area and irrigation system components at various locations on the site. Crews also began installing the new post and cable barrier and planting landscaping on the upper tier.

Southern California Edison crews completed installation of their infrastructure for permanent power for the facility on September 8 and September 10. The contractor began testing and running the new heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system. Subsequently, the contractor will begin work on items that require a temperature-regulated interior space, such as finish carpentry, painting, and other finish work.

Next week, the contractor will continue installing metal panels, sealing exterior glazing, installing gopher wire and irrigation system components, portions of the post and cable barrier, and planting landscaping.



SCE Utility Work Along Hawthorne Boulevard

A Southern California Edison (SCE) contractor began performing utility work on August 23 along Hawthorne Boulevard at Hesse Park. The work will include the removal and replacement of existing equipment in underground facilities. The southbound lane will be closed for the duration of this project. City Staff and SCE are working together to finish this project as quickly as possible, which is expected to continue for approximately one more week.

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
- Crews sealed cracks in the road on Admirable Drive in the Seaview neighborhood. This work was done to prevent water from entering the cracks and contributing to landslide movement. Public Works is scheduling more in-depth repairs to take place in the area in a few weeks.
- Signs were replaced, repaired, and installed in the right-of-way at the following locations:
 - Installed new traffic calming signage on Knoll View Drive.
 - Repaired LA County Fire Brush Clearance sign on Palos Verdes Drive South and Palos Verdes Drive East.
 - Installed a new 25MPH sign at Sea Cove Drive.
 - Installed new bicycle awareness signage along Palos Verdes Drive East switchbacks.
 - Installed new traffic sign and beacon light at Palos Verdes Drive East and Eastfield Drive gate entrance.
- Re-striped, refreshed, and painted curbs at the following locations:
 - Continued refreshing the curbs adjacent to Mira Catalina Elementary School.
 - Re-striped white lines at Palos Verdes Drive East and Eastfield Drive gate.
 - Installed thirty feet of new red curbing at Beechview Drive.



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



Dear Assemblymember Haney,

On behalf of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, I write to express that the City respectfully opposes Assembly Constitutional Amendment 10 (ACA 10) due to, among other things, the unintended consequences in declaring a "fundamental human right to adequate housing for everyone in California" on local jurisdictions.

While we certainly acknowledge the importance of ensuring equitable access to housing for all Californians, we have significant reservations about the implications of ACA 10 as currently outlined. The amendment's provisions and the potential effects on local governance raise concerns that we believe warrant careful consideration.

It is vital to address the issues of housing affordability and accessibility, and the City of Rancho Palos Verdes is committed to being part of productive solutions. However, there are specific elements of ACA 10 that concern us to the point of opposing the amendment:

- Determining "Adequate" Housing: The concept of determining what constitutes "adequate" housing is complex and multifaceted. Such a determination could lead to inconsistent interpretations and difficulties in implementation across diverse communities leading to cost prohibitive and time-consuming judicial arbitration that will effectively thwart the advances this amendment seeks to rectify.
- Enforcement Through Litigation: The possibility of legal action against state or local governments to enforce the right to housing may have unintended consequences. This could strain limited local and state resources and have the potential hinder a local government's ability to balance housing needs with other essential services.

- Impact on Local Government's Autonomy: The potential impact of ACA 10 on local governance and the principle of "home rule" over matters considered uniquely municipal is concerning. It is important that local jurisdictions retain the ability to tailor housing policy solutions according to their own specific needs and circumstances based on availability of services, infrastructure, and land conditions.
- Scope of Government Responsibility: While we support efforts to address housing challenges, the potential shift of responsibilities onto state and local governments may create logistical and financial challenges that could adversely affect other critical areas of public service determined by local councilmembers and civic leaders.
- Cities, especially small to mid-size cities are not in the business of constructing housing.

The City is actively engaged in addressing housing and land use issues within our community. We believe in finding comprehensive solutions that balance the right to housing with the broader context of local governance. We are committed to measures that enhance housing affordability, promote equitable housing practices, and ensure access to housing options for all residents, while maintaining local control and minimal impacts to City coffers.

Given the complexity and potential impacts of ACA 10, we respectfully request that further discussions and considerations be undertaken before the amendment proceeds. We also urge that local perspectives be taken into consideration to ensure that any amendments to the state constitution align with the diverse needs of California's communities respecting local authority as the mechanism for guiding policy implantation and ultimately land development.

Thank you for your attention to our concerns. We are ready to explore effective ways to address housing challenges while preserving local governance principles.

Dear Assemblymember Bryan,

On behalf of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, I write to express that the City respectfully opposes Assembly Bill 825, a bill that seeks to prohibit local authorities from restricting the operation of bicycles on sidewalks adjacent to highways that do not include specific types of bikeways (Class I, II, or IV). While we appreciate the intent behind this bill to promote cycling safety, it is our belief that this bill infringes upon the essential principle of local control, as exemplified by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes and many other municipalities.

AB 825 would significantly limit the ability of local authorities to make decisions that best suit their communities' unique needs and conditions. Rancho Palos Verdes, like many cities in California, consists of diverse neighborhoods and areas with varying levels of pedestrian traffic, road infrastructure, and bicycle usage. Local authorities are well-positioned to assess and adapt policies to ensure the safety and well-being of their residents.

The bill proposes several restrictions on a local authority's ability to regulate bicycle use on sidewalks, but it fails to acknowledge the importance of local context. While the bill aims to eliminate restrictions on sidewalk cycling, studies, such as the one referenced in the bill's analysis, have shown that sidewalk cycling can be unsafe for both cyclists and pedestrians, especially in areas with high pedestrian traffic.

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
It is our position that this bill does not adequately consider the potential impact on pedestrian safety, especially in hillside communities. Pedestrians should be able to walk on sidewalks without the fear of collisions with bicycles traveling at higher speeds. The bill's provisions regarding business activity districts acknowledge this issue but still raise concerns about the potential for conflicts which will arise between cyclists and pedestrians.

Local authorities should retain the discretion to determine the most suitable regulations for bicycle use on sidewalks based on their local conditions and the safety of their residents. This approach allows for flexibility and a tailored response to the specific needs of each community.

Additionally, the provision in the bill allowing local authorities to restrict the use of electric bicycles (e-bikes) is a step in the right direction. E-bikes pose unique safety concerns, and local jurisdictions should have the ability to address these concerns through local ordinances.

Finally, AB 825 undermines the principle of local control, which is crucial for ensuring that policies align with the distinct characteristics and safety considerations of individual communities. I urge you to reconsider this bill's provisions and to prioritize local authority in determining bicycle regulations that best serve the interests of the residents of Rancho Palos Verdes and other California cities.
