September 19, 2023, City Council Meeting Highlights

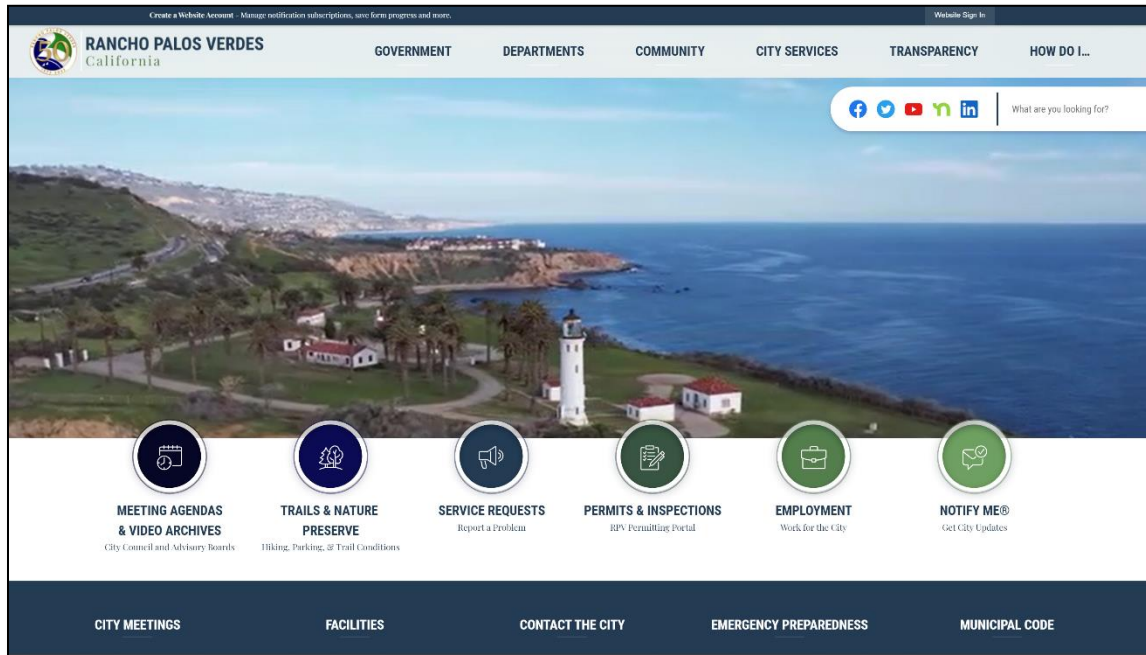
Highlights from the September 19 City Council meeting:

Representatives from Cal Water and SoCalGas gave updates on their response to recent accelerated land movement in the Portuguese Bend Landslide area, including enhanced pipeline monitoring and infrastructure upgrades. After residents of the Seaview and Portuguese Bend Beach Club neighborhoods expressed their concerns about the land movement, the Council voted to have City staff explore how

declaring a local emergency could impact the City's response. A report will be provided at the October 3 City Council meeting. City staff will also conduct a working group meeting with various stakeholders. The utilities will provide another update to the Council in the coming months.

Upcoming Overnight Closures of the Vincent Thomas Bridge

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) is planning nighttime closures of the Vincent Thomas Bridge over a three-week period beginning as soon as October 2.

Each night, the bridge, located on State Route 47 (SR 47), will close in one or both directions between 8 p.m. and reopen by 6 a.m. the following morning. Weekend closures are not anticipated.

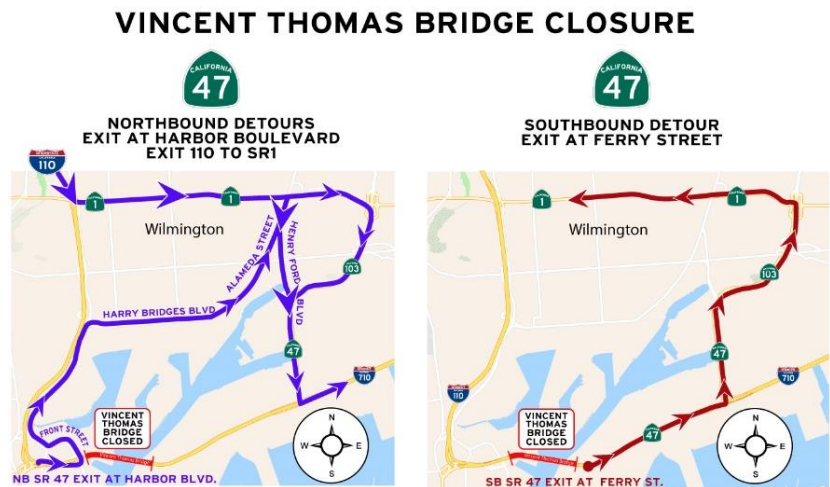
The closures will allow crews to safely install cable safety upgrades.

Motorists traveling southbound on SR 47 should take exit 1B to Ferry Street, turn left to take the on-ramp to northbound SR 47, continue onto northbound SR 103, take the exit for northbound SR 1 (Pacific Coast Highway), and then travel on SR 1 to the Interstate 110 (I-110) interchange.

Motorists traveling on northbound SR 47 should follow one of the following detour routes:

- From southbound I-110 exit at SR 1 (Exit 4), turn left on SR 1, and take either Harry Bridges Boulevard or SR 103 to SR 47.
- From northbound SR 47 Exit at Harbor Boulevard (Exit 1C), turn left to go northbound on Harbor Boulevard, turn right on Pacific Avenue, turn right on Harry Bridges Boulevard, which turns into Alameda Street, and then continue to SR 47.
- From southbound Harbor Boulevard, take the northbound I-110 on-ramp, then exit at SR 1 (Exit 4), turn right on SR 1, and take either Harry Bridges Boulevard or SR 103 to SR 47.

Please see the attached detour routes for more information. Motorists are advised to avoid the area and seek an alternate route if possible.



Construction schedules are subject to change due to weather or other unforeseen circumstances. Please visit the [Caltrans Quickmap](#) for the latest road conditions and closures.

Klondike and Abalone Cove Landslide Remediation Project Federal Funding Request

Last week, the City submitted a request under the [Water Resources Development Act \(WRDA\)](#) Community Project Funding (CPF) through Senator Feinstein and Senator Padilla’s office seeking federal funding to help cover costs related to Landslide remediation of both Klondike Canyon and Abalone Canyon. The WRDA is a federal legislation that provides funding and direction for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers civil works projects and activities. Our submission aims to leverage potential funds from this act to address the pressing landside issues in our community (see attachments for additional information).

In the request, Staff noted that the project will bring geological stability to an area of California where the land movement has caused significant infrastructure damage to homes, utilities, and roadways, costing the taxpayers of RPV hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

The proposed project consists of surface fracture infilling, surface water improvements, groundwater mitigation improvements, and post-construction monitoring and maintenance.

Minimizing the landslide movement will enable the construction of a conventional roadway with improved connectivity. It will also bring stability to the pressurized sewer pipes and reduce the risk of road failure and of raw pressurized sewage spilling into the Pacific Ocean, preventing a potential environmental or public safety disaster. The project is an investment that will greatly reduce maintenance costs to taxpayers for the asphalt roadway and pressurized sewer pipe.

Staff will continue to monitor this issue.



Legislation Corner

The Rancho Palos Verdes City Council reviews bills pending in Congress and the California Legislature and takes positions on priority issues that impact the City's

effective operation, promote City interests, and protect local authority. The 2022-2023 session came to a close as of September 14, and the governor has until October 14 to sign bills into law. Most bills will take effect on January 1, 2024 unless they have an urgency clause then, they will take effect upon the signature of the governor.

Legislative Activity

At the September 19, 2023, City Council Meeting, there was one legislative position letter on the consent calendar, which was ratified by the City Council regarding AB 825 Bicycles on Sidewalks.

Plan Ahead for the Unexpected: [Building Your Emergency Go Bag](#)

California is prone to natural disasters of all kinds including wildfires, earthquakes, extreme heat, and more recently, significant flooding. As climate change adds to the frequency and severity of these natural disasters, it's important to take steps now to ensure you and your loved ones are ready for anything.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes wants to encourage all residents to have a go-bag ready in case of an emergency. Having a few essential items stashed away in a bag that's easily accessible will help reduce the stress caused by an emergency.

GO-BAG ESSENTIALS

There are many items you can add to a go-bag, but remember a few essentials to ensure you have what you need if you have to leave your home quickly.

- Cash
- Medication and medical devices
- Cell phone charger or battery pack
- Important documents such as birth certificate, social security card, or marriage license
- Three-day supply of food and water for each member of your family
- First aid kit

- Card or games for children
- Pet supplies
 - Food/water
 - Collar/leash
 - Carrier
 - Vaccine information
 - Toys

After building your go-bag, keep it in a place that's easy to remember and easy to grab in case you need to evacuate your home quickly. Maintain your go-bag by replacing expired items, reevaluate your needs every year, and update the bag as needed.

Strong Wind Safety Tips

High winds can occur any time of year, and the City of Rancho Palos Verdes wants all residents to be aware, prepare and stay safe.

The National Weather Service (NWS) issues a high wind warning when sustained winds of 40 mph or greater or gusts of 58 mph or greater are expected. They alert the public about these events and issue red flag warnings, indicating conditions of elevated wind speeds that raise the risk of wildfires. Look for [watches, warnings, and advisories for California](#).

High wind events can be caused by a variety of factors, including thunderstorms, hurricanes, and tornadoes, as well as simple changes in atmospheric pressure. In California, where extreme weather events are common, wind can be a silent instigator of disasters.

Wind's Role in Disasters:

High winds are not just strong gusts of air; they can act as a catalyst, setting in motion a series of events that lead to disasters. Here's why wind is a serious risk factor:

- **Wildfire Spread:** When strong winds meet dry vegetation, they can carry embers for miles, igniting new fires in their path and rapidly expanding existing ones. This wind-driven wildfire phenomenon has been responsible for some of California's most destructive blazes.
- **Power Outages:** Windstorms can damage power lines and utility infrastructure, leading to widespread power outages. These outages can disrupt communication, healthcare, transportation, and daily life, especially when they coincide with other emergencies.
- **Structural Damage:** High winds can wreak havoc on buildings and structures, causing roof damage, shattering windows, and even toppling trees onto homes and vehicles. The structural damage can lead to injuries and property loss.
- **Transportation Disruptions:** Wind gusts can create hazardous conditions on the road, making it difficult for vehicles to maintain control. This can lead to accidents and road closures, further complicating evacuation efforts during emergencies.
- **Debris Propagation:** High winds can turn everyday objects, such as outdoor furniture, debris, and vegetation, into projectiles. These flying objects pose a significant threat to both people and property.

Dangerous wind speeds can directly impact your home, vehicles, or person.

During a high wind event:

- Take cover next to a building or under a shelter.
- Stay clear of roadways and train tracks, a gust may blow you into danger.
- Use handrails when available on outdoor walkways.
- Avoid elevated areas such as roofs.
- Watch for flying debris, as street signs and tree limbs may become loose during strong winds.

If near downed power lines:

- Never go near downed power lines since high voltage wires may still be active despite being downed.

- Avoid anything that may be touching downed power lines, including tree branches and vehicles.
- Report downed power lines to your local utility emergency center and the police.

Driving during a high wind event:

- Keep both hands on the wheel and slow down to a safe driving speed.
- Stay a safe distance away from other vehicles as strong gusts may blow others into adjacent lanes.
- Turn on your headlights if needed in case of blowing dust, sand, snow, or rain.
- Be cautious of strong winds suddenly moving your car.
- Stay clear of high-profile vehicles or when towing a trailer, as these are more likely to be affected by high winds.
- Watch for debris that may suddenly blow onto the roadway.
- If the winds are severe enough to prevent safe driving, pull over and park away from any trees, power lines, or other tall obstacles that may fall onto your car.

Wind patterns can shift rapidly and unexpectedly, making it challenging for residents and emergency services to anticipate its course accurately. This unpredictability increases the urgency of preparedness and safety measures. By understanding the role wind plays in these scenarios, individuals and communities can better prepare and take proactive steps to mitigate its impact.



Say Hello To Fall Safety Tips

During the fall season, there are unique safety considerations to keep in mind:

1. **Leaves and Debris Removal:** Regularly remove fallen leaves, branches, and other debris from walkways and driveways to prevent slipping and tripping hazards.
2. **Gutter Maintenance:** Clean gutters to prevent clogs that can lead to water damage and ice formation in colder climates.
3. **Outdoor Lighting:** With shorter days and longer nights, ensure outdoor lighting is in good working order to illuminate pathways and prevent accidents in the dark.
4. **Fire Safety:** If you use a fireplace or wood-burning stove, have it inspected and cleaned before use to prevent chimney fires. Also, store firewood away from the home to avoid pests and moisture issues.
5. **Heating System Inspection:** Before cold weather sets in, have your heating system serviced to ensure its functioning safely and efficiently.
6. **Rain Gear:** Keep rain gear, such as umbrellas and waterproof jackets, handy to stay dry during unexpected showers.
7. **Slip-Resistant Footwear:** As wet leaves can create slippery surfaces, wear shoes with good traction.



8. Fall Allergies: Be mindful of seasonal allergies, as fall can bring pollen and mold spores. Keep allergy medications on hand if needed.

9. Driving Safety: Be cautious of wet leaves on the road, which can be as slippery as ice. Slow down and increase following distances in wet and slippery conditions.

10. School Zone Awareness: If you have children, be aware of school zones and the increase in foot traffic as kids go back to school.

14. Home Security: As it gets darker earlier, consider enhancing home security with motion-activated lighting and alarms.

Bank of the West Joins BMO Financial Group

On February 1, 2023, BMO Financial Group (BMO) completed its planned acquisition of Bank of the West (BOW). The acquisition adds nearly 1.8 million customers to BMO and extends its banking presence with 500 additional branches and offices. Effective September 2023, following months of planning and coordination, the City's BOW business bank account has officially transferred to BMO.

IRS Reminder to Storm Victims

The Internal Revenue Service reminded individuals and businesses in most of California that their 2022 federal income tax returns and tax payments are due on Oct. 16, 2023. The normal due date of April 18 was postponed for many residents of the affected states following the wake of natural disasters earlier this year.

What areas qualify for the Oct. 16 deadline?

Fifty-five of California's 58 counties—except Lassen, Modoc, and Shasta counties - qualified for the extension. IRS relief is based on three different FEMA disaster declarations covering various jurisdictions and event time frames.

What returns and payments qualify for the Oct. 16 deadline?

Eligible returns and payments include but are not limited to:

- 2022 individual income tax returns and payments are normally due on April 18.
- For eligible taxpayers, 2022 contributions to IRAs and health savings accounts.
- Quarterly estimated tax payments normally due on April 18, June 15, and September. 15.
- Quarterly payroll and excise tax returns are normally due on May 1 and July 31.
- Calendar-year 2022 returns filed by tax-exempt organizations are normally due May 15.

Other returns, payments, and time-sensitive tax-related actions also qualify for the extra time. See the [IRS disaster relief page](#) for more details.

Ladera Linda Community Park Project Update

Last week, Southern California Edison established new permanent power for the site, and the contractor began testing installed lights and electrical outlets in the building. Construction crews continued installing metal panels and sealing exterior glazing for the building. Crews also continued installing gopher wire for the lower tier turf area, irrigation system components at various locations, the new post and cable barriers, and planting landscaping along the ocean side of the property.

Next week, the contractor will continue installing metal panels, sealing exterior glazing, placing gopher wire and irrigation system components, installing post and cable barrier, planting landscaping, and placing concrete at the gate to the lower tier. Crews will also begin running the heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems; testing and programming the lighting control systems, and installing interior building finishes.

Urban Lot Split and Two Single Family Residences at 2443 Daladier Drive

On September 14, 2023, the Director of Community Development approved an Urban Lot Split to create two new lots of 12,375 ft² and 17,020 ft² from an existing 29,395 ft² lot located at 2443 Daladier Drive. The City's Urban Lot Split process is described in Ranch Palos Verdes Municipal Code Chapter 16.40, which was created pursuant to Senate Bill 9, which went into effect on January 1, 2022. This bill created a streamlined process to allow a single-family lot to be split, subject to certain requirements and conditions of approval. The public notices for the proposed single-family residences were published and mailed to properties within a 500-foot radius of the project on August 24, 2023. Comments were received in response to the public notice, and Staff is currently working on the staff reports for both proposed residences. Revised Housing Element

On August 11, 2022, the City Council adopted the 6th Cycle Housing Element and subsequently submitted the document to the State's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). On October 14, 2022, HCD informed the City's Planning Division that although the City's adopted Housing Element addressed many of the statutory requirements, additional revisions were requested to ensure compliance with state housing element law. Based on this determination, the Housing Element process for the 6th planning cycle is not yet completed. Staff are working closely with

HCD staff as part of informal meetings to discuss proposed revisions to the document. Staff are in the process of preparing a revised element for HCD resubmittal. Upon receiving input from HCD, staff will present the revised Housing Element to as part of a public hearing. Staff is aiming to have this effort completed within the next few months.

Additionally, the City is required to complete the re-zoning efforts, including associated environmental review for the properties identified for higher density pursuant to the City's Regional Housing Needs Allocation number of 647 housing units. Ultimately, the proposed re-zoning will be presented to the Planning Commission and City Council as part of public hearings. Once the re-zoning efforts are completed, the 6th Cycle Housing Element can be considered by HCD for certification. 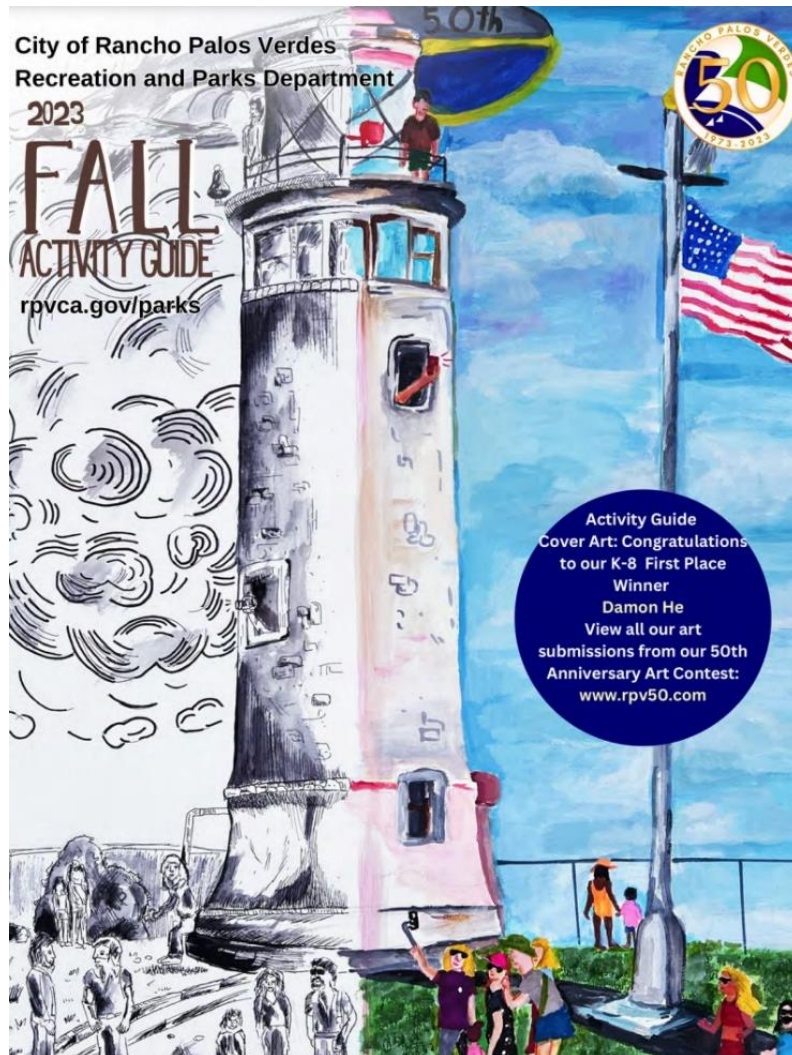
Portuguese Bend Nursery School is 70 Years Young

Abalone Cove Reserve:

On September 16, Christopher Kinoshita from Troop 378 completed his Eagle Project at Abalone Cove. The project included the installation of one-hundred feet of wooden fencing along the perimeter of the parking lot.



On September 17, Staff removed one instance of graffiti on a power pole.

On September 19, Staff identified a fissure that ran parallel to the Inspiration Point Loop Trail. The deepest section measured 4 feet in depth, with an estimated length of 25 feet along the trail. Staff will consult with the City's geologist to assess impacts and determine recommendations for repairs.



Filiorum Reserve:

On September 13, Staff removed graffiti from a sign located on Rattlesnake Trail.

On September 13, Park Rangers received a report of improper disposal of green waste and the creation of an unauthorized trail near McBride Trail. Park Rangers are working with Code Enforcement to address this issue.

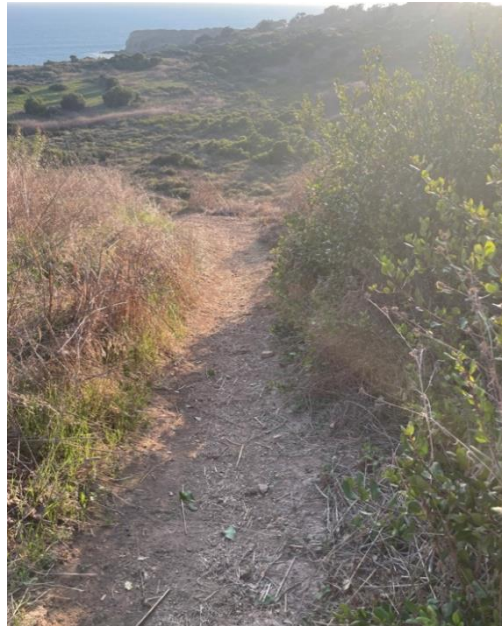

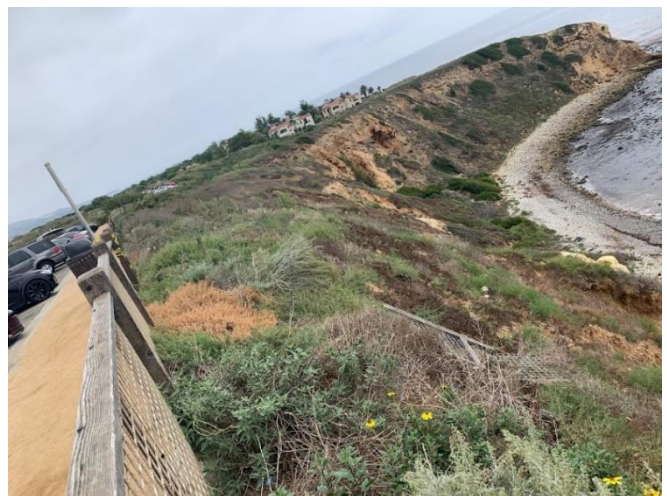

Background

The Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) is legislation that authorizes the programs, studies, and projects of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' (Corps) Civil Works program. It is traditionally enacted every two years. In general, projects and studies fall within one or more of the Corps' primary mission areas: navigation, aquatic ecosystem restoration, flood and coastal storm risk management. The Corps also carries out other important programs and activities pertaining to recreation, hydropower, environmental infrastructure, emergency management, and water supply. Many of the studies and projects are cost-shared with non-federal partners. WRDA also serves as a legislative tool for implementing policy changes within the Corps' Civil Works program.

Process

As stated in the dear colleague, Member requests for WRDA 2024 must be submitted through an online database accessible at: www.epw.senate.gov/waterrequests2024.

An individual form must be completed and submitted for each request. Each Member must also submit a signed letter on Senate letterhead that lists all of their requests. This letter must be submitted to the Committee via attachment to at least one of the Member's requests. Please complete all information in the form, including attaching any relevant reports, correspondence, or other documentation that supports the request. Members are not required to submit draft legislative language with their requests. Members' offices may choose to reach out to their Corps District(s) to discuss studies, projects, programs, or activities of interest that may be the subject of a request.

After the **submission deadline of 6:00 p.m. on Friday, October 6, 2023**, the Committee will initiate a review of all Member requests and may ask a Member's office for clarifications or additional information about the Member's requests. The Committee will engage with the Corps on technical and drafting assistance as necessary.

Scope of Requests

WRDA 2022 and other recent WRDAs included a number of important policy provisions that the Corps is still working to implement. To allow for full implementation of the prior legislation, the Committee anticipates that WRDA 2024 will focus on authorizing new or modifying existing studies and projects, as well as making needed technical changes to prior provisions in order to reflect the intent of Congress.

In general, authorization of a construction project requires both the necessary documentation from the Corps, such as a completed Chief's Report or Director of Civil Works Report, and the relevant congressional support of the project. Conditional authorizations for construction projects are ineligible for inclusion in the bill.

Dear Assemblymember Bryan,

On behalf of the City of Rancho Palos Verdes, I write to express that the City respectfully opposes Assembly Bill 825, a bill that seeks to prohibit local authorities from restricting the operation of bicycles on sidewalks adjacent to highways that do not include specific types of bikeways (Class I, II, or IV). While we appreciate the intent behind this bill to promote cycling safety, it is our belief that this bill infringes upon the essential principle of local control, as exemplified by the City of Rancho Palos Verdes and many other municipalities.

AB 825 would significantly limit the ability of local authorities to make decisions that best suit their communities' unique needs and conditions. Rancho Palos Verdes, like many cities in California, consists of diverse neighborhoods and areas with varying levels of pedestrian traffic, road infrastructure, and bicycle usage. Local authorities are well-positioned to assess and adapt policies to ensure the safety and well-being of their residents.

The bill proposes several restrictions on a local authority's ability to regulate bicycle use on sidewalks, but it fails to acknowledge the importance of local context. While the bill aims to eliminate restrictions on sidewalk cycling, studies, such as the one referenced in the bill's analysis, have shown that sidewalk cycling can be unsafe for both cyclists and pedestrians, especially in areas with high pedestrian traffic.


It is our position that this bill does not adequately consider the potential impact on pedestrian safety, especially in hillside communities. Pedestrians should be able to walk on sidewalks without the fear of collisions with bicycles traveling at higher speeds. The bill's provisions regarding business activity districts acknowledge this issue but still raise concerns about the potential for conflicts which will arise between cyclists and pedestrians.

Local authorities should retain the discretion to determine the most suitable regulations for bicycle use on sidewalks based on their local conditions and the safety of their residents. This approach allows for flexibility and a tailored response to the specific needs of each community.

Additionally, the provision in the bill allowing local authorities to restrict the use of electric bicycles (e-bikes) is a step in the right direction. E-bikes pose unique safety concerns, and local jurisdictions should have the ability to address these concerns through local ordinances.

Finally, AB 825 undermines the principle of local control, which is crucial for ensuring that policies align with the distinct characteristics and safety considerations of individual communities. I urge you to reconsider this bill's provisions and to prioritize local authority in determining bicycle regulations that best serve the interests of the residents of Rancho Palos Verdes and other California cities.

Public Correspondence:

We highly encourage written materials regarding Planning Commission Agenda items be submitted no later than 4:00 P.M. the Monday prior to a Planning Commission meeting to allow the Planning Commission Members ample time to review and consider the issues raised prior to making decisions at the Planning Commission meeting. Please keep in mind that it is difficult for Planning Commission Members to carefully review materials submitted after that deadline or at the meeting. Written materials, including emails, submitted to the city are public records and may be posted on the City's website. Accordingly, you may wish to omit personal information from your written materials or oral presentation as it may become part of the public record regarding an agenda item. In addition, City meetings may be televised and may be accessed through the City's website at www.rpvca.gov/agendas.

Public Participation:

Participants must speak from the podium using the lectern microphone; comments are to be directed to the Planning Commission and not to the staff or the public; repetition should be avoided; and reading a submission that has been copied or contained in the agenda will be discouraged. Virtual participation is also offered please visit www.rpvca.gov/participate.

Public Comments:

The Planning Commission may limit the public input on any item based on the number of people requesting to speak, the length of the agenda, or the business of the Planning Commission.

Conduct at the Planning Commission Meeting:

Pursuant to GC 54957.95: (a)(1) In addition to authority exercised pursuant to Sections 54954.3 and 54957.9, the presiding member of the legislative body conducting a meeting or their designee may remove, or cause the removal of, an individual for disrupting the meeting. (2) Prior to removing an individual, the presiding member or their designee shall warn the individual that their behavior is disrupting the meeting and that their failure to cease their behavior may result in their removal. The presiding member or their designee may then remove the individual if they do not promptly cease their disruptive behavior. This paragraph does not apply to any behavior described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (b)(1) means engaging in behavior during a meeting of a legislative body that actually disrupts, disturbs, impedes, or renders infeasible the orderly conduct of the meeting and includes, but is not limited to, one of the following: (A) A failure to comply with reasonable and lawful regulations adopted by a legislative body pursuant to Section 54954.3 or any other law. (B) Engaging in behavior that constitutes use of force or a true threat of force. (2) "True threat of force" means a threat that has sufficient indicia of intent and seriousness, that a reasonable observer would perceive it to be an actual threat to use force by the person making the threat.

Time Estimates:

The time noted next to an agenda item is only an estimate of the amount of time that will be spent during the meeting on that particular item. Accordingly, these estimates should not be relied on in determining when a matter will be heard, especially since agenda items are often re-ordered during a meeting and may be discussed at any time.

Continuation of Meeting:

The Planning Commission will adjourn its meetings on or before 11:00 p.m. and will not consider new business items after 10:15 p.m., unless a majority of the Planning Commission members who are present affirmatively vote either to extend the meeting after 11:00 p.m. or to consider new business after 10:15 p.m. If the meeting ends before all items listed on the agenda are completed, any unfinished business will be continued to the next succeeding day that is not a holiday, at a location to be determined.

Closed Session:

Please be advised that, pursuant to the Ralph M. Brown Act, "a person may not disclose confidential information that has been acquired by being present in a Closed Session . . . to a person not entitled to receive it, unless the legislative body authorizes disclosure of that confidential information." (Gov. Code § 54963(a).) "[C]onfidential information' means a communication made in a Closed Session that is specifically related to the basis for the legislative body of a local agency to meet lawfully in Closed Session . . ." (Gov. Code § 54963(a).) Please be further advised that any "violation of [Government Code § 54963] may be addressed by the use of such remedies as are currently available by law, including, but not limited to: (1) injunctive relief to prevent the disclosure of confidential information prohibited by this section; (2) disciplinary action against an [public or city official] who has willfully disclosed confidential information in violation of this section; (3) referral of a member of a legislative body who has willfully disclosed confidential information in violation of this section to a grand jury." (Gov. Code § 54963(c).)
