It's important to acknowledge and celebrate our graduates' hard work and accomplishments, and these banners serve as a great reminder to be proud of their achievements.



May 21, 2024, City Council Meeting Highlights

Highlights from the May 21 City Council meeting:

- The Council approved measures to improve traffic flow on Western Avenue. These include upgrading 13 key traffic signals with synchronization technology, modifying traffic signal phasing, adding turn lanes, extending turn pockets, and prohibiting left turns when exiting two shopping center driveways.
- The City has received \$1.3 million in Metro grant funding for design and environmental



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review for the project and anticipates being awarded another \$3 million for construction.

- A final project design is expected to be completed in March 2025 and construction could begin in September 2025 and last for one year.
- City staff will continue working with Caltrans to determine if flashing yellow arrows are justified for northbound Western Avenue at Peninsula Verde Drive and for Western Avenue at West Park Western Drive.
- The Council also supported 14 bills moving through the state Legislature aimed at modifying measures related to theft, shoplifting, repeated offenses for associated crimes, and penalty enhancements.

Disaster Assistance Now Available

On May 17, the U.S. Small Business Administration announced that disaster assistance is now available to California businesses and residents affected by recent severe winter storms, tornadoes, flooding, landslides and mudslides (see attached press release). **A Virtual Disaster Loan Outreach Center is now open.** The deadline to apply for property damage is July 16, 2024. The deadline to apply for economic injury is Feb. 18, 2025.

SBA Offers Disaster Assistance to California Businesses and Residents Affected by the Severe Winter Storms, Tornadoes, Flooding, Landslides and Mudslides

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Low-interest federal disaster loans are available to California businesses and residents affected by the severe winter storms, tornadoes, flooding, landslides and mudslides that occurred Jan. 31 – Feb. 9, announced [Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman](#) of the U.S. Small Business Administration. SBA acted under its own authority to declare a disaster in response to a request SBA received from Gov. Gavin Newsom's authorized representative, Director Nancy Ward of the California Office of Emergency Services, on May 16.

The SBA Rural disaster declaration makes SBA assistance available to both rural and non-rural areas of Butte, Los Angeles and Santa Cruz counties.

“SBA’s mission-driven team stands ready to help California’s small businesses and residents impacted by the severe winter storms, tornadoes, flooding, landslides and mudslides,” said Administrator Guzman. “We’re committed to providing federal disaster loans swiftly and efficiently, with a customer-centric approach to help businesses and communities recover and rebuild.”

“Low-interest federal disaster loans are available to businesses of all sizes, most private nonprofit organizations, homeowners and renters whose property was damaged or destroyed by this disaster,” said [Francisco Sánchez Jr.](#), associate administrator for the Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience at the Small Business Administration.

“Beginning Monday, May 20, SBA customer service representatives will be available at the Virtual Disaster Loan Outreach Center to answer questions about SBA’s disaster loan program, explain the application process and help each business owner complete their

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application," Sánchez continued. The virtual center will be open on the days and times indicated below. No appointment is necessary.

Businesses of all sizes and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. SBA can also lend additional funds to businesses and homeowners to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize damage from occurring in the future.

For small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

Disaster loans up to \$500,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for up to \$100,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property, including personal vehicles.

Interest rates can be as low as 4 percent for businesses, 3.25 percent for private nonprofit organizations and 2.688 percent for homeowners and renters with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition.

Interest does not begin to accrue until 12 months from the date of the first disaster loan disbursement. SBA disaster loan repayment begins 12 months from the date of the first disbursement.

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assistance. For people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability, please dial 7-1-1 to access telecommunications relay services.

The deadline to apply for property damage is July 16, 2024. The deadline to apply for economic injury is Feb. 18, 2025.

Wildfire Preparedness Tips

As we head into fire season and recognize Wildfire Awareness Month, it is important that residents are in compliance with brush clearance requirements set by the county by the upcoming June 1 deadline.

Everyone should also Know Your Zone and get to know the Peninsula's evacuation readiness platform at PVReady.gov. Find your zone, write it down, and keep it somewhere that's easy to find in an emergency. During an emergency, such as a wildfire or flood, the website will show which zones are under evacuation the moment an order is issued by authorities.

WILDFIRE PREPAREDNESS TIPS

With an uptick in recent brush fires across the State and Los Angeles County region, Peninsula residents are reminded to be on heightened alert and to be prepared for wildfire. Download the Ready! Set! Go! Wildfire Action Plan (Fire.lacounty.gov/rsg/) for tips on how to protect your family and safeguard your home in case of a wildfire.



READY

Create and maintain defensible space and harden your home against flying embers.

- Trees touching/overhanging structure: Remove limbs within five feet of any structure, and within 10' from any chimney outlet.
- Vines and climbing plants: Remove from all structures.
- Hedges and screens between homes: Reduce and maintain to height of no greater than 8'.
- Large shrubs under windows: Maintain 12" separation under windows.
- Ground cover: Maintain at 18" maximum height.
- Dead vegetation: Remove all dead material within 100' of structures.

Now that you have done everything you can to protect your home, it's time to prepare your family. Your Wildfire Action Plan must be prepared with all members of your household well in advance of a wildfire. Once you finish your plan, practice it regularly with your family, and post it in a safe and accessible place for quick implementation.

Slow Down, RPV



Pool Safely This Summer: Take the Pledge

As summer approaches, the National Safety Council (NSC) and the Consumer Product Safety Commission urge everyone to prioritize water safety and help reduce child drownings in pools and spas. The Pool Safely campaign emphasizes five simple steps to ensure safety in and around water. Take the Pool Safely Pledge today and receive a free Pool Safely Toolkit.

According to the CDC, drowning is the leading cause of death for children aged 1 to 4 and the second leading cause of death for children aged 5-14. Here are some key facts:

- Most drowning incidents for children under 15 occur in residential locations.
- Boys under 15 die from drowning at twice the rate of girls.
- Emergency departments treat about 6,400 pool and spa injuries in children under 15 every year.

Teens and Young Adults Often Overlook Water Safety

Drowning remains the second leading cause of preventable death for individuals aged 5 to 15. In 2021, NSC research found that 423 people aged 5 to 24 drowned.



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To stay safe while swimming, remember these tips:

- Only swim if you know how; swim lessons are available for all ages at nearby aquatic facilities and private lessons in your home are vital if you have a pool.
- Never swim alone. This is especially important for young children and older adults.
- Learn CPR and rescue techniques.
- Match the body of water to your skill level; swimming in pools is different from lakes or rivers.
- If caught in a current, stay calm and float with it or swim parallel to the shore until free.
- Swim in areas supervised by lifeguards.
- Avoid pushing or jumping on others.
- Don't dive in unfamiliar areas.
- Never swim after consuming alcohol; it is involved in about half of all male teen drownings.



Escaping Rip Currents

1. If caught in a rip current, remain calm. **DO NOT PANIC!**
2. If the water is shallow (waist deep or less), stand and walk back to the beach. Do not swim.
3. If the water is deep, swim PARALLEL to the shore. Do not swim directly back to the beach. The current will be too strong.
4. If you cannot swim out of the rip current, remain calm, but draw attention to yourself by waving and shouting for help.
5. When you have floated beyond the surf, into the head of the rip current, the conditions will be much easier. Exit the rip current by swimming parallel to the shore for a distance and then swimming back to the beach.

Avoid Distractions to Prevent Tragedies

Despite constant reminders, drownings still occur. Always stay present and aware with your children. Here are some essential water safety precautions:

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- Never leave your child alone near water; if you must leave, take your child with you.
- Enroll your child in age-appropriate swim lessons, but remember that lessons do not make them "drown-proof."
- Lifeguards are not babysitters; keep your eyes on your child.
- Don't let children play around drains and suction fittings.
- Never consume alcohol when operating a boat and ensure everyone wears U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets.
- Don't underestimate water's power; even rivers and lakes can have dangerous undertows.
- Always have a first aid kit and emergency contacts handy.
- Get trained in CPR.
- If a child is missing, check the water first.

Every pool, beach, and sunny day offers the chance for new, fun summer experiences. All you need to add is your undivided attention to ensure these experiences are safe. For more helpful information on preventing water tragedies visit

Consumer Price Index – April 2024

In April, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose by 0.3% over the month, down slightly compared to the 0.4% rise in March. Once again, the rise in April was mainly driven by increases in shelter and gasoline prices, accounting for 70% of the monthly increase. Over the past year, the all items index rose by 3.4%, down a tick from the annual increase in March of 3.5%.

Excluding food and energy (core CPI), the index rose by 0.3% in April after rising by 0.4% in each of the two preceding months. Items such as shelter, motor vehicle insurance, medical care, apparel, and personal care faced price increases once again, contributing to the monthly rise. Over the past 12 months, core CPI rose by 3.6%.

Chart 1. One-month percent change in CPI (U.S) –Apr. 2023 – Apr. 2024






Chart 2. 12-month percent change in CPI (U.S)



Consumer Price Index – Los Angeles Area

In April, prices in the Los Angeles area increased by 0.6% over the month, driven primarily by higher prices for shelter and gasoline. Over the past 12 months, the CPI rose by 3.9%, with food prices up by 3.3% and energy prices by 6.4% year over year. After removing food and energy, core CPI rose by 3.8% over the year, down from the annual rate of 4.3% measured in March.

Palos Verdes Drive South Repairs in the Landslide Area


Roadway repairs continue on Palos Verdes Drive South in the landslide area this week. Work is occurring from approximately 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Western Avenue Traffic Flow Improvements

During the May 21, City Council meeting, staff presented the Traffic Safety Committee's (TSC) recommendations and results of a comprehensive traffic study for the Western Avenue Corridor from West 25th Street to Palos Verdes Drive North. Staff presented recommendations for improvements to traffic signal timing, turn lanes, access to developments, and safety. The recommendations are subject to approval from Caltrans (which owns and operates Western Avenue).



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The City Council unanimously approved the TSC and traffic study recommendations, which will be used in the development of construction plans, specifications, and estimates for permitting through Caltrans, construction bidding and ultimate project construction.



National Public Works Week May 19 - 25

“Advancing Quality of Life for All” is the theme for the 2024 National Public Works Week. The American Public Works Association (APWA) has defined public works as a “combination of physical assets, management practices, policies, and personnel necessary for the government to provide and sustain structures and services essential to the welfare and acceptable quality of life for its citizens.” The City of Rancho Palos Verdes, its residents, and stakeholders work together to create a community for the benefit of all.

The Public Works Department is responsible for the planning, engineering, constructing, operating, and maintaining the City’s transportation network, storm water system, sanitary sewer system, facilities, and landslide remediation. Additionally, Public Works is responsible for solid waste management, fuel modification, public street beautification and tree maintenance, and environmental sustainability programs. Public Works also provides permitting and inspection services for activities in the public right-of-way. Finally, the department coordinates utility services provided by other agencies and companies including gas, electricity, and water. More specifically, Public Works is responsible for the following (approximately):

- Transportation Network

The Goats are Here for Fuel Modification Season

Goats are back to perform the important job of helping reduce fire loads and protecting homes. Although we understand many people enjoy seeing the goats, please refrain from going to see them out of respect for residents living near where the goats work.

A temporary electrified fence is used to contain the goats while they are working, and attempting to approach them puts you as well as the goats at risk. Please avoid attempting to take selfies/pictures or touch the goats, especially if you have dogs or other pets with you. This will prevent stress and/or injury to you and the goats.



In addition to the goats, you may see crews from Stay Green performing brush clearance in various areas of the City as part of the City's 2024 fuel modification program.



Cowbird Trapping Program in Palos Verdes Nature Preserve

As the Habitat Manager for the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve (Preserve), the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy (Land Conservancy) conducts comprehensive triannual surveys of the sensitive species covered under the City's Natural Communities Conservation Plan/Habitat Conservation Plan (NCCP/HCP), including the California gnatcatcher, cactus wren, Palos Verdes blue butterfly, and El Segundo blue butterfly. During 2024 surveying, the Land Conservancy detected the presence of cowbirds for the first time in the Alta Vicente and Vicente Bluffs Reserves. Cowbirds are a parasitic invasive bird species that predate on songbirds, including the sensitive bird species in the Preserve, by laying their eggs in songbird nests. Per the NCCP/HCP (Section 7.4.2), if cowbirds are detected in the Preserve, the Land Conservancy initiates coordination with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and California Department of Fish and Wildlife to determine the level of threat to sensitive species and develop an appropriate trapping program. It has been determined that a significant threat to sensitive bird species, including the California gnatcatcher, exists, and a cowbird trapping program will begin as early as May 27.



The public may see large cages approximately 5x5x5 feet large within the Alta Vicente and Vicente Bluffs Reserves containing brown cowbirds. Please contact the Open Space Management Division at 310-544-5353 or trails@rpvca.gov for additional information.

The Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy handed out crafts and provided information about trails, events, and volunteer opportunities. Kids loved the live animal exhibit showcasing local raptors and reptiles.



Hesse Park Back in Play

The playgrounds at Hesse Park have fully reopened to the public. Repairs and improvements to the structures and surfacing were completed last week, ensuring the playgrounds comply with current safety standards. Once the work was completed, staff inspected and cleaned the structures and surrounding areas and welcomed children back on Saturday.

Close to 550 people gathered to interact with the goats, feed them alfalfa, and watch Bernie the Bordie Collie provide herding demonstrations. The goats play a vital role in helping with brush clearance in Rancho Palos Verdes. Crowd favorites this year included two Great Pyrenees puppies who will be raised to help protect the herd from predators and Buckaroo, a stubborn goat who kept trying to make a break for it! While

this event may not be the City's largest, it is always a memorable time for the whole family — no ifs, ands, or head-butts about it.



On May 18, Staff performed tread repair on a section of Abalone Cove Trail impacted by land movement.

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
Filiorum Reserve



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


On May 18, Park Rangers removed graffiti from the backside of a sign.

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SBA Offers Disaster Assistance to California Businesses and Residents Affected by the Severe Winter Storms, Tornadoes, Flooding, Landslides and Mudslides

SACRAMENTO, Calif. – Low-interest federal disaster loans are available to California businesses and residents affected by the severe winter storms, tornadoes, flooding, landslides and mudslides that occurred Jan. 31 – Feb. 9, announced [Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman](#) of the U.S. Small Business Administration. SBA acted under its own authority to declare a disaster in response to a request SBA received from Gov. Gavin Newsom's authorized representative, Director Nancy Ward of the California Office of Emergency Services, on May 16.

The SBA Rural disaster declaration makes SBA assistance available to both rural and non-rural areas of Butte, Los Angeles and Santa Cruz counties.

“SBA’s mission-driven team stands ready to help California’s small businesses and residents impacted by the severe winter storms, tornadoes, flooding, landslides and mudslides,” said Administrator Guzman. “We’re committed to providing federal disaster loans swiftly and efficiently, with a customer-centric approach to help businesses and communities recover and rebuild.”

“Low-interest federal disaster loans are available to businesses of all sizes, most private nonprofit organizations, homeowners and renters whose property was damaged or destroyed by this disaster,” said [Francisco Sánchez Jr.](#), associate administrator for the Office of Disaster Recovery and Resilience at the Small Business Administration. “Beginning Monday, May 20, SBA customer service representatives will be available at the Virtual Disaster Loan Outreach Center to answer questions about SBA’s disaster loan program, explain the application process and help each business owner complete their application,” Sánchez continued. The virtual center will be open on the days and times indicated below. No appointment is necessary.

Businesses of all sizes and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business

assets. SBA can also lend additional funds to businesses and homeowners to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize damage from occurring in the future.

For small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the business suffered any property damage.

Disaster loans up to \$500,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for up to \$100,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property, including personal vehicles.

Interest rates can be as low as 4 percent for businesses, 3.25 percent for private nonprofit organizations and 2.688 percent for homeowners and renters with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition.

Interest does not begin to accrue until 12 months from the date of the first disaster loan disbursement. SBA disaster loan repayment begins 12 months from the date of the first disbursement.

Applicants may apply online and receive additional disaster assistance information at SBA.gov/disaster. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov for more information on SBA disaster assistance. For people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability, please dial 7-1-1 to access telecommunications relay services.

The deadline to apply for property damage is July 16, 2024. The deadline to apply for economic injury is Feb. 18, 2025.

SUBJECT: Notice of Support (if amended) for AB 2943

Dear Assemblymember Zbur:

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports, if amended, AB 2943 which would make several changes to retail theft, organized retail theft, and shoplifting.

Specifically, AB 2943 would make the following changes to statute:

- Create a new crime and penalty for retail theft including shoplifting, theft or burglary, for those that are repeat offenders.
- Provide charges that may be filed in multiple jurisdictions.
- Allow for the aggregation of certain offenses.
- Increase the terms of probation from 1 year to 2 years.
- Clarify the ability for police to arrest without witnessing the crime.
- Extend the sunset date on the organized retail theft statute until 2031

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is in support of many of the provision in AB 2943, however, the City Council requests the following clarifications in order for the measure to be as comprehensive as possible:

- Include provisions in the aggregation section which currently provides for a common scheme or plan to be used to also reference the rule set forth in People v Bailey and cases related to multiple thefts. As currently written, this section does not adequately address the case law and therefore could result in the inability for prosecutors to aggregate multiple offenses.
- Add an amendment to the ability to the arrest section to include the ability for police to use unsworn statements taken from one or more persons when these statements


demonstrate probable cause to believe that the person to be arrested committed the violation.

- Clarify that the successful completion of probation should be determined by the probation-supervising court.

Dear Members of the Legislature:

A top priority in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes is keeping our community safe and addressing the issue of crime. Our City is pleased that both houses of the Legislature have made this issue a priority in 2024. As such, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes would like to identify a few bills that we believe will help to address the critical issue of organized retail theft.

As you may know, retail theft continues to be a problem in nearly all California communities. For example, commercial burglary is at the highest rate since 2008. In fact, according to the Public Policy Institute of California, commercial burglary increased statewide since 2020, especially in larger counties with an increase of 13% among 14 of the 15 largest counties. To address rising theft, city officials need additional tools to reduce crime and improve the safety of their neighborhoods.

There are reforms needed to ensure that both apprehension rates of offenders improve and that those apprehended for more serious theft offenses meet meaningful consequences. Specifically, there are several bills that would address these necessary reforms through increasing the certainty and severity of apprehension for retail theft offenses. Therefore, we


- AB 1960 (Soria) Sentencing Enhancements: Property Loss (As Introduced on 1/29/2024)
- AB 1990 (Carrillo) Criminal Procedure: Arrests: Shoplifting (As Amended on 4/16/2024)
- AB 2814 (Low) Crimes: Unlawful Entry: Intent to Commit Package Theft (As Introduced on 2/15/2024)
- AB 3209 (Berman) Crimes: Theft: Retail Theft Restraining Orders (As Amended on 4/1/2024)
- SB 1242 (Min) Crimes: Fires (As Amended on 3/19/2024)

These bills propose several methods of increasing enforcement tools on the front end of our criminal justice system and increasing the penalties on the back end. These methods range from increasing ongoing funding of local and statewide enforcement programs, improving law enforcements' powers and arrest authority, creating new offenses, and adding sentencing enhancements for felonious offenses of retail theft.

While these individual bills are important to continuing to make progress on retail theft, these bills are only one part of a comprehensive solution that needs to include prevention, enforcement, and supervision. Addressing enforcement tools and increased penalties are some of the methods that can help solve this growing problem, however additional changes are needed in order to make our communities safer.

For these reasons, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports AB 1960 (Soria), AB 1990 (Carrillo), AB 2814 (Low), AB 3209 (Berman), and SB 1242 (Min).

A top priority in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes is keeping our community safe and addressing the issue of crime. Our City is pleased that both houses of the Legislature have made this issue a priority in 2024. As such, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes would like to identify a few bills that we believe will help to address the critical issue of organized retail theft.

As you may know, retail theft continues to be a problem in nearly all California communities. For example, commercial burglary is at the highest rate since 2008. In fact, according to the Public Policy Institute of California, commercial burglary increased statewide since 2020, especially in larger counties with an increase of 13% among 14 of the 15 largest counties. To address rising theft, city officials need additional tools to reduce crime and improve the safety of their neighborhoods.

It has become common for offenders to try to avoid higher charges, such as grand theft, by stealing small amounts of items they know are under \$950 across several retail businesses. Current law provides that multiple thefts can be aggregated to one charge if these incidents can be proven to be "one intention, one general impulse, and one plan." Unfortunately, this law is limited in scope and Cal Cities strongly believes it needs strengthening.

Improved aggregation laws for multiple incidents of theft will not be helpful without active prosecution of cases across several jurisdictions. Expanding coordination and abilities of

District Attorneys to work together to prosecute theft offenses that occur in several counties will ensure offenders are held accountable. Therefore, we support the following bills:

- AB 1779 (Irwin) Theft: Jurisdiction (As Amended on 4/25/2024)
- AB 1794 (McCarty) Crimes: Larceny (As Amended on 4/11/2024)

These bills propose several methods of ensuring and clarifying the process of multi-jurisdictional prosecution as well as aggregation of multiple theft incidents with several victims.

For these reasons, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports both AB 1779 (Irwin) and AB 1794 (McCarty).

A top priority in the City of Rancho Palos Verdes is keeping our community safe and addressing the issue of crime. Our City is pleased that both houses of the Legislature have made this issue a priority in 2024. As such, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes would like to identify a few bills that we believe will help to address the critical issue of organized retail theft.

As you may know, retail theft continues to be a problem in nearly all California communities. For example, commercial burglary is at the highest rate since 2008. In fact, according to the Public Policy Institute of California, commercial burglary increased statewide since 2020, especially in larger counties with an increase of 13% among 14 of the 15 largest counties. To address rising theft, city officials need additional tools to reduce crime and improve the safety of their neighborhoods.

The rising rate of theft offenses such as commercial burglary necessitate viable resale operations of those stolen goods such as fencing location or the use of online third-party marketplaces. Reducing the ease with which stolen items can be resold through these secondary operations is a critical step in providing any comprehensive solution to the issue of retail theft. SB 301 (Skinner, 2023) attempted to address this issue by requiring reporting by high-volume third-party sellers utilizing online marketplaces. However, there were some


gaps noted in this legislation and the federal legislation that still need to be addressed. Therefore, we support the following bills:

- AB 1845 (Alanis) Crimes: Grant Program for Identifying, Apprehending, and Prosecuting Resale of Stolen Property (As Amended on 2/21/2024)
- SB 1144 (Skinner) Marketplaces: Online Marketplaces (As Amended on 4/4/2024)
- SB 1381 (McGuire) Property Crimes: Regional Property Crimes Task Force (As Amended on 3/20/2024)
- SB 1416 (Newman) Sentencing Enhancements: Sale, Exchange, or Return of Stolen Property (As Amended on 4/16/2024)

These bills propose several methods of addressing resale of stolen property and fencing locations that facilitate this illegal sale of stolen property. These methods range from providing funding and task forces for law enforcement to identify and crack down on these fencing operations, to creating sentencing enhancements for individuals convicted of selling property acquired through theft.

For these reasons, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports AB 1845 (Alanis), SB 1144 (Skinner), SB 1381 (McGuire), and SB 1416 (Newman).

SUBJECT: Notice of Support for AB 1772

Dear Assemblymember Ramos:

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports AB 1772 (Ramos), which would require the Department of Justice to conduct a study to determine the number of misdemeanor convictions for theft offenses when property was taken from a retail business during the COVID-19 state of emergency.

As you may know, retail theft continues to be a problem in nearly all California communities. For example, commercial burglaries is at the highest rate since 2008. In fact, according to the PPIC, commercial burglary increased statewide since 2020, especially in larger counties. Rising theft is impacting every corner of California, and city officials need additional tools to reduce crime and improve the safety of their neighborhoods.

This bill would require the Department of Justice on January 1, 2026 to report to the Legislature the number of misdemeanor convictions for retail theft during the Governor's declared state of emergency during the COVID-19 pandemic. This would allow the Legislature to identify the rate of convictions misdemeanor retail theft offenses during a time related to a surge of theft rates.

While AB 1772 (Ramos) is important to continuing to make progress on retail theft, this bill is only one part of a comprehensive solution that needs to include prevention, enforcement, and supervision. Identifying the rate of theft in comparison to the rate of conviction is just one of the methods that can help solve this growing problem and make our communities Safer.

For these reasons, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes supports AB 1772 (Ramos).







Pursuant to GC 54957.95: (a)(1) In addition to authority exercised pursuant to Sections 54954.3 and 54957.9, the presiding member of the legislative body conducting a meeting or their designee may remove, or cause the removal of, an individual for disrupting the meeting. (2) Prior to removing an individual, the presiding member or their designee shall warn the individual that their behavior is disrupting the meeting and that their failure to cease their behavior may result in their removal. The presiding member or their designee may then remove the individual if they do not promptly cease their disruptive behavior. This paragraph does not apply to any behavior described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (b)(1) means engaging in behavior during a meeting of a legislative body that actually disrupts, disturbs, impedes, or renders infeasible the orderly conduct of the meeting and includes, but is not limited to, one of the following: (A) A failure to comply with reasonable and lawful regulations adopted by a legislative body pursuant to Section 54954.3 or any other law. (B) Engaging in behavior that constitutes use of force or a true threat of force.(2) “True threat of force” means a threat that has sufficient indicia of intent and seriousness, that a reasonable observer would perceive it to be an actual threat to use force by the person making the threat.

Time Estimates:

The time noted next to an agenda item is only an estimate of the amount of time that will be spent during the meeting on that particular item. Accordingly, these estimates should not be relied on in determining when a matter will be heard, especially since agenda items are often re-ordered during a meeting and may be discussed at any time.

Continuation of Meeting:
