LANDSLIDE MOVEMENT UPDATE



The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is dealing with an unprecedented crisis. Accelerated movement in our complex of ancient landslides fueled by heavy rainy seasons continues to cause significant damage to homes, utilities, roadways, trails, and open space areas. Over the summer, many residents in the landslide area lost gas and/or electricity service. The Rancho Palos Verdes City Council issued local emergency declarations on October 3, 2023 and on August 6, 2024. Governor Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency in the City on September 3, 2024. The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is urgently responding to the landslide emergency to support impacted residents and implement measures to slow the movement as soon as possible. APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE FOR HOME STABILIZATION PROJECTS IN LANDSLIDE AREA

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes has established regulations and procedures to help homeowners in the landslide area stabilize and level their houses.

Temporary solutions include placing homes on cargo structures and other leveling systems, such as I-beams, installing alternative foundation systems, and using temporary modular housing and storage while repairs are made.

Permit applications for these projects are now available on the City website at rpvc.gov/building. Fees are being waived during the emergency.

Evacuation WARNING vs. Evacuation ORDER
What's the difference?

Evacuation Warning: If you receive an evacuation warning, this means you need to start preparing to leave. If you have animals, children, or need additional time evacuating, this is the time to leave.

Evacuation Order: If you receive an evacuation order, this means you need to leave **immediately**. Emergency responders have determined there is an imminent life safety risk and you need to evacuate.

Always remember, you don't have to wait to evacuate. If you feel unsafe, LEAVE.

SPOTLIGHT ON CATHERINE JUN DEPUTY CITY MANAGER

Catherine Jun recently began her tenure as RPV's Deputy City Manager after serving in a similar capacity with the City of Huntington Beach. Catherine recently took some time to answer questions about herself and her background.

Welcome to Rancho Palos Verdes. What led you to a career in city government?

When I was an analyst at LA County Public Health, I worked with a city to implement a smoke-free parks ordinance. During that time, I saw

SAKURA CITY AND RANCHO PALOS VERDES: SISTER CITIES

To understand what may lie ahead after the Sakura blossoms fall, it is important to look back. Four seasons of Sakura or cherry blossoms have bloomed and blown in the wind since 2020, the year the City of Rancho Palos Verdes forged a bond with Sakura City, Japan by officially becoming sister cities. This partnership began with a student exchange program at Miraleste Intermediate School, where students from Sakura City visited Rancho Palos Verdes to learn about life on the Peninsula. These visits germinated into introductions between the two city governments, ultimately blossoming into a sister city partnership.

Despite the challenges of COVID in 2020, both cities were determined to mark this special occasion. They utilized virtual technology to hold a live dual City Council meeting to make the union official.

The word Sakura derives from the word saku which means to bloom or to smile and laugh. Both meanings were present in the years that followed as the cities continued to celebrate their growing friendship with joy-filled annual events. In 2021 and 2022 virtual celebrations featuring live dance performances, musical acts, and videos.

The dream of celebrating in person finally came true in 2023, when members of the Sakura City Council visited Rancho Palos Verdes. This visit not only marked the Sister Cities' third anniversary but also celebrated the 50th anniversary of Rancho Palos Verdes. The exchange of gifts continued, but the true highlight was the opportunity to connect on a deeper level, discovering common interests such as a love for the ocean and admiration for the star Japanese baseball player Shohei Ohtani.

For the fourth anniversary in 2024, both cities marked the occasion virtually during a City Council meeting.

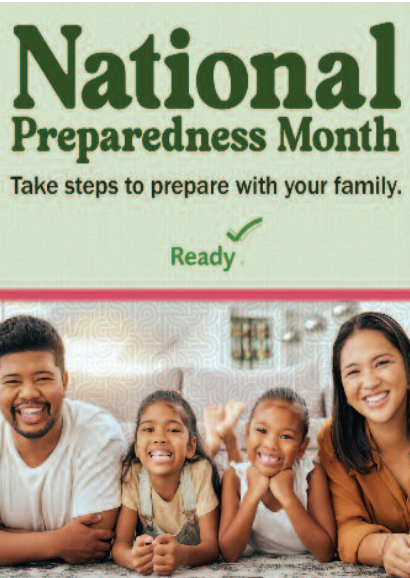

September is National Preparedness Month and a great time to take steps to prepare your household for emergencies. Follow the five steps below to help you be prepared:

- 1. Sign up for alerts.** Don't be blindsided when disaster strikes; make sure you are informed about local emergencies by signing up for AlertSouthBay.com or texting AlertSB to 888-777.
- 2. Know your zone.** Visit [PVPReady.gov](https://www.pvpready.gov) to learn what evacuation zone you are in. If you ever receive an evacuation order for your zone, leave immediately and follow emergency instructions provided by AlertSouthBay, including evacuation routes.
- 3. Make a Plan and Practice It.** Walk through different emergency scenarios as you develop your plan. Make sure everyone in your household knows what to do, including children. Some questions to think about include: Where will you go if you need to evacuate, shelter in place, or reunite with family? How will you get where you need to be? What needs will your household have? What resources are available in your community? How will you communicate with loved ones? Where can you find information if cellphones and internet stop working?
- 4. Get emergency supplies ready for three days or more.** Think about what you will need to survive during a disaster – food, water, clothes, hygiene items, first aid kit, portable charger, etc.
- 5. Harden your home.** To prevent wildfires from spreading to your house, keep flammable debris, like dead leaves, at least 30 feet from your structure. If you're building or renovating your home, use fire-resistant materials. To reduce the impacts of earthquakes, bolt large appliances, secure cabinet doors, and consider home modifications if your house was built before 1978.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes will hold its General Municipal Election on November 5, 2024, for two City Council member seats. The City Council candidate nomination period opened on July 15, 2024, and closed on August 9, 2024. At the close of the filing period, the following five residents qualified as candidates for the November election: George Lewis, Steve Perestam, Michele Carbone, Jeff Chen and David Chura.

LAST DAY TO REGISTER

Monday, October 21, 2024, is the last day to register to vote in the November 5 election. You will need to re-register if you have moved to a new address, changed your name, or changed your political party affiliation. You can register to vote online by visiting the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk's website at <https://www.lavote.gov/home/voting-elections/voter-registration/register-to-vote/register> Voter registration forms are available at City Hall, any post office, and your local library. It is important that your voter registration application be filled out completely and be postmarked or hand-delivered to the Los Angeles County elections office no later than October 21.

Your vote is important. Your vote is your voice. Be heard. VOTE!

city officials dialoguing with residents on a regular basis, finetuning ideas, and implementing them quickly. To me, it was clear that the "rubber met the road" on the city level, and I saw it as government at its best.

Tell us about your past work and educational experiences.

I was a newspaper photojournalist right after I graduated from USC, working in places like Denver, Detroit, and Phoenix. When newspapers began struggling, I switched gears to pursue a master's in public policy at USC. After graduation, I worked at LA County Public Health, and then made the permanent switch to city government working for Bellflower, Huntington Beach, and now RPV.

Many of our residents may have a general idea of what a City Manager does but may not know as much about a Deputy City Manager's duties. Tell us about your role and how you and City Manager Ara Mihanian work together?

The DCM role can vary from city to city. In RPV, my role is to support City Manager Mihanian on various issues, while guiding and supporting the amazing staff in the City Administration Department. That work includes Human Resources, City Clerk's Office, Information Technology, Government and Community Relations, RPVtv, and Public Safety matters.

What qualities and attributes should an effective Deputy City Manager possess?

DCMs come from all walks of life, but there are some common threads like the ability to pivot, stay calm, and learn from your mistakes. To me,

these are important since the job often deals with issues that don't come with a handbook.

What are some of the biggest strengths of Rancho Palos Verdes?

Without a doubt, the strength of Rancho Palos Verdes is its staff and City Council. Everyone here embraces an "all hands-on deck" mentality that comes from a deep commitment and passion to serving the community. That's also helped create a family-like culture that I have really enjoyed being a part of.

What would you like the residents of RPV to know about you?

I love cities, and I want more kids to love them too. I'd like to write a textbook about local government, so young people can learn about the impact that cities have on their day to day lives – from the minute they turn on the faucet in the morning to the last mile they bike home. The more you understand the world around you, the more you can engage with it.

How do you enjoy spending time away from work?

Some days will be very low-key with a visit to the library and pickleball with the family. Other days, we'll be hiking and eating pho afterwards. I like every day to be different.

Favorite book, movie, type of music/sport etc.?

I love rock climbing. My husband and I used to climb Joshua Tree and Yosemite, but we took a long hiatus after we had kids. Now that they're older, we're beginning to visit the climbing gym and rediscovering our love for the sport.

Discounts Available: EDCO offers various discounts to customers:

- 1) Customers 65 and older are eligible for a 10% senior citizen discount (a one-time only application is needed for a new senior citizen customer).
- 2) If you pay for trash services a year in advance (discount available only with the July-Sept invoice) you are eligible for a 5% annual pre-payment discount.
- 3) Low-income customers may qualify for a 5% discount (same household income criteria as CARE). These discounts are not exclusive and may be combined. For more information contact EDCO at 310.540.2977 or check the City's website at: rpvca.gov/trash.

Public Safety Reimbursement Program

This initiative offers financial assistance to residents and homeowners' associations (HOAs) wishing to invest in security cameras and other public safety equipment.

What the Program Offers:

The City provides a reimbursement for half of the cost of a new public safety purchase, up to \$2,000 for neighborhoods and up to \$100 for individuals. Neighborhoods are eligible to reapply for reimbursements annually, but individuals are limited to a one-time reimbursement.

Permit Fee Waivers: The City will waive permit fees related to the installation of approved security equipment, helping to reduce the overall cost of your safety investment. Please note that it is the responsibility of the neighborhood, individual, or vendor to complete any necessary permits before installation.

How to Apply:
