April 1, 2025 City Council Meeting Highlights

- The Council received an update on a proposed Point Vicente Interpretive Center Museum Annex that would house the Palos Verdes Historical Society's collection of artifacts.
- The Council took no action on the proposal. It is the City's understanding that a major donor has withdrawn support, so there is no funding at this time. In addition, the National Park Service has raised questions about whether the proposed Annex would comply with deed restrictions over the site.
- The Council considered setting a base fee for seven future EV charging stations at Ladera Linda Community Park but opted first to have City staff explore upgrading infrastructure to support faster, Level III charging stations.
- The City received a \$76,370 U.S. Department of Energy grant for the charging stations, which will be the first at any City-owned facility.

RPV Submits Federal Earmark Requests for EOC, Dewatering Wells

Earlier this week, the City submitted requests for federal earmark funding to Senator Alex Padilla, Senator Adam Schiff, and Rep. Ted Lieu for two City projects: a new Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at the Ken Dyda Civic Center, and a permanent power source for the City's deep dewatering wells in the landslide area.

Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS)/Community Project Funding (CPF) is part of the appropriations process for Fiscal Year 2026 and allows members of Congress to request direct funding for projects that benefit the communities they represent. CDS/CPF is separate from federal grants and funding apportioned by formula.

The City requested \$7 million to construct a fully-equipped and ready-for-use EOC, located near the City Hall at the Ken Dyda Civic Center. The site already includes a helipad and helopod, which are used by neighboring cities for emergency services, as well as an open field used by the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District for evacuations. The planned EOC will improve the site with new safety infrastructure to include the EOC building a command center, evacuation infrastructure, and space for emergency supplies storage and staging.

This new EOC will not only benefit the residents of Rancho Palos Verdes but will also provide regionally important benefits as well. Currently, none of the four cities situated on the Palos Verdes Peninsula have a "hot" EOC. All EOCs currently in use by these communities are regarded as "warm" — partially set up — or "cold" — requiring full set up to use, creating significant gaps in the region's emergency preparedness and response capabilities. The proposed EOC will bridge that gap, preparing the City to safeguard their residents against any number of crises.

Separately, the City requested \$2.1 million for the installation of permanent electrical infrastructure to sustainably power the City's deep dewatering wells (DDWs) which were installed to stabilize the Greater Portuguese Bend Landslide Complex. Currently, these wells are operated by diesel generators, which are costly, labor intensive, and leave an undesirable air emissions footprint. So far, the DDWs have extracted over 175 million gallons of groundwater, significantly slowing the rate of land movement. This project is vital for the continuation of this effective mitigation effort, sustainably powering this operation and preparing the City for any potential future crises in the area.

Staff will monitor the City's applications for these highly competitive funding programs.

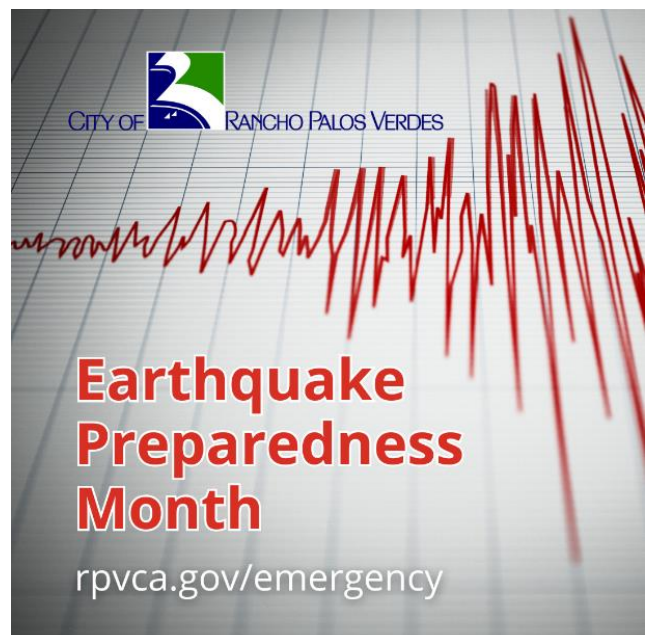

Earthquake Preparedness Month

April is Earthquake Preparedness Month in California. Take the following steps to keep your family safe during an earthquake:

1. KNOW WHAT TO DO:
 - **STOP in a location where nothing can fall on or under you.** If you are indoors or near objects that could fall on you, drop to the floor. If in a wheelchair or walker, lock it. If driving or biking, slowly stop in a safe location.



- **COVER your neck and head.** Go under a sturdy surface (ex. desk) when possible if you are indoors.
- **HOLD on until the shaking stops.** Do not run or use elevators and proceed with caution, especially as you exit buildings. Expect hazards, such as aftershocks, fires, tsunamis, broken glass, hazardous spills, and/or building damage to occur after a major earthquake.

2. GET EMERGENCY ALERTS AND WARNINGS

- **Download the MyShake App** at <https://myshake.berkeley.edu/> to receive an alert a few seconds before major shaking occurs, which could give you time to get out of harm's way.
- **Sign up for Alert SouthBay** at www.alertsouthbay.com to receive local emergency alerts and information that can help guide your response and recovery when the shaking stops.

3. TAKE STEPS TO REDUCE HAZARDS IN YOUR HOME

- **Move heavy items to lower shelves**
- **Avoid hanging mirrors or heavy frames where you frequently sit/lay** (ex. above your bed, couch).
- **Secure cabinets, frames, mirrors, and heavy items** like TVs, bookshelves, refrigerators, and water heaters.
- **Strengthen/modify unreinforced masonry buildings**, soft/weak first story construction, balconies, attics, ceilings, chimneys, room additions, and cripple walls.
- **Bolt/secure your home's foundation**, especially if your home was built before 1980 or is a mobile home.

Job Openings and Labor Turnover – February 2025

On April 1, 2025, the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) released the February 2025 data from the Job Openings and Labor Turnover Survey (JOLTS). This monthly report includes estimates of the number and rate of job openings, hires, and separations and provides insights into the current labor market.

As reported, the number of job openings totaled 7.6 million for the month ending

February 2025, with little change from January 2025. At 4.5 percent, the job opening rate changed very little compared to January. Within the month of February, hires and separations held at 5.4 million and 5.3 million, respectively.

At 7.6 million, the number of job openings for February did not change much from January. Even though overall quits were little changed at 3.2 million, state and local government/ education saw an increase of quits at +28,000, up from the previous month.

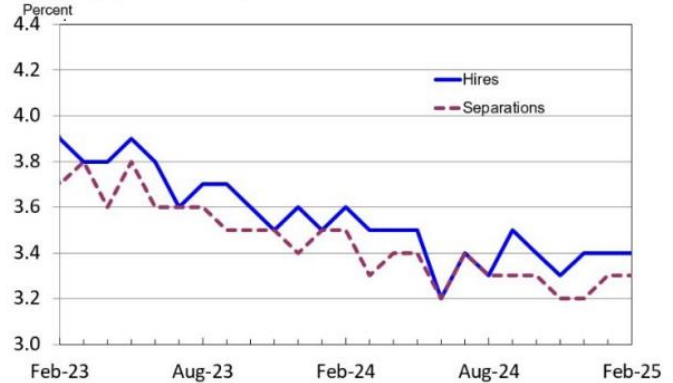

Landslide Financial Assistance Grant Program – Update

As of April 2, 2025, the City has received over **231 applications** and has disbursed payments for **221 completed** and verified applications (**\$2.2M**). Applications will continue to be reviewed and processed as they are received.

Portuguese Bend Landslide Emergency Stabilization Project Update

In response to unprecedented movement of the deep slide plane in the Greater Portuguese Bend-Ancient Altamira Landslide Complex (Landslide Complex), the city installed vertical deep de-watering wells (DDWs) to penetrate the deep slide plane and relieve water pressure.

Additionally, the City performed emergency winterization measures in the form of filling fissures/grabens, lining canyons, and improving drainage.

Status of the Deep Dewatering Wells Programs

- Work is complete for all DDWs as well as the associated test boreholes and monitoring wells funded by the City Council.
- The total combined water extraction rate of the DDWs is currently at approximately **660 gallons per minute** or **0.95 million gallons per day**.
- Since the start of the DDW program, approximately **187 million gallons**, or **573 acre-feet** of water have been extracted from certain locations around the toe of the Landslide Complex.
- Water extraction rates are currently lower than recent averages due to slip plane movement impinging on some wells.
- The re-drilling of DDW-1, DDW-3, and DDW-5 are complete
- DDW-4 was replaced with a new DDW ("4a") due to land movement pinching off the well to the extent that a re-drill was not possible.
- DDW-6 is being evaluated and may need to be re-drilled in the near future.

- DDW-11 experienced pump failure because of an insufficient water flow rate to keep the pump cooled. Based on the low production rate of this DDW, the City's geologists are advising that this well should not be re-drilled, but rather re-located, should additional funding become available.

All DDWs will continue to be monitored for pinching/shearing and re-drilling plans will be developed as needed.

Status of Winterization

All planned winterization activities are completed. Monitoring of winterized areas will continue, including assessments after rain events, and adjustments made in preparation for future rain events, to the extent possible within the current approved budget.

Update on the Hesse Park Community Center Roof Replacement Project

Due to a forecast of rain for the week of March 31, the start of construction for the Hesse Park Community Center Roof Replacement Project has been delayed. A new start date is being determined and is expected to be on or around April 7, 2025.

The project will replace the aging roof and skylights at the Hesse Park Community Center. During the winter storms in early 2024, sections of the roof leaked and damaged interior areas of the building, including sensitive equipment used to facilitate public

meetings and events. Public Works staff made temporary repairs to the building and further determined through a detailed assessment that the roof, including all 17 skylights, was nearing the end of its useful service life; and a full replacement would be needed soon. Subsequently, a heavy wind event in January 2025 damaged some of the temporary repairs made in 2024, as well as some skylights.

The work will be divided into two phases. The first phase is the roof replacement with a duration of approximately 4-5 weeks. Due to the time required to fabricate and deliver the replacement skylights, a second phase to replace the existing skylights is scheduled to start and be completed in June. The work is not anticipated to disrupt normal operations of the facility, including City Council meetings. No construction work will be done during weekends. The project is being constructed in a way that minimizes any impact on parking or access to the facility, the nearby playground, and other park amenities.

Prepare for the Citywide Brush Clearing

The spring season brush-clearing event begins on Saturday, March 29, and will continue for four consecutive Saturdays. Each week a different area of RPV is serviced. The goal of the event is to assist homeowners' to dispose (free of charge) excess brush, shrubs, hedges, tree branches, and bushes to comply with the Los Angeles County Fire Department's fire safety guidelines. In addition, human crews are performing brush clearance throughout the City as part of the 2025 fuel modification program.

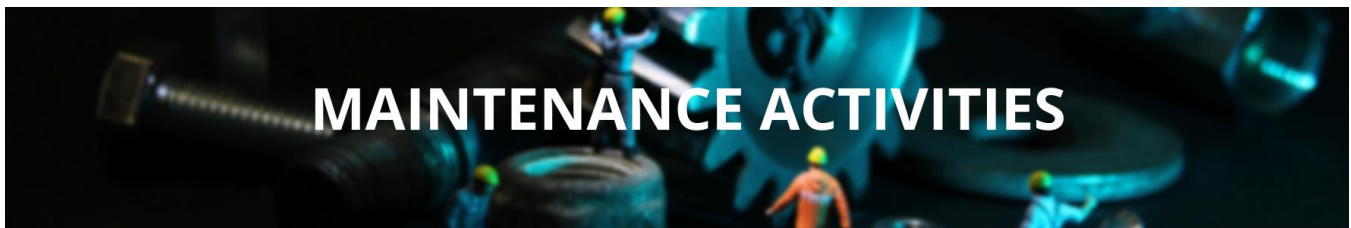

 - Repaired and restored the rusted handrails at the Pointe Vicente Interpretative Center.

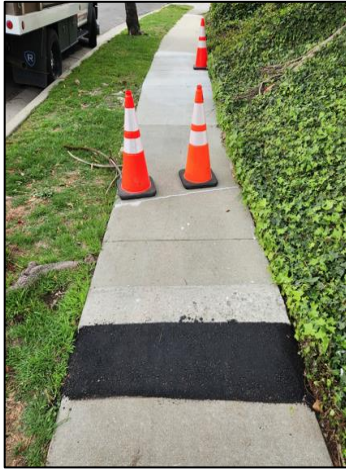

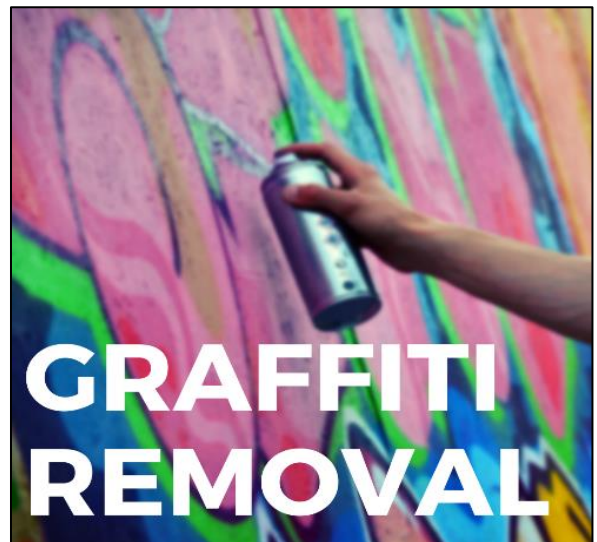


- The Public Works Department performed the following infrastructure repairs in the public right-of-way:

Graffiti Removal

- 24 graffiti incidents were reported and removed this week.

- During this period, the Public Works Department emergency on-call team addressed two separate emergencies:
 - The grinder pump at 11 Figtree failed, and staff quickly restored service to the affected resident.
 - A blockage at the Ken Dyda Civic Center was discovered, which caused reduced sewer flow. The PW team worked with contractors to clear the

obstruction and restore the system to full capacity.

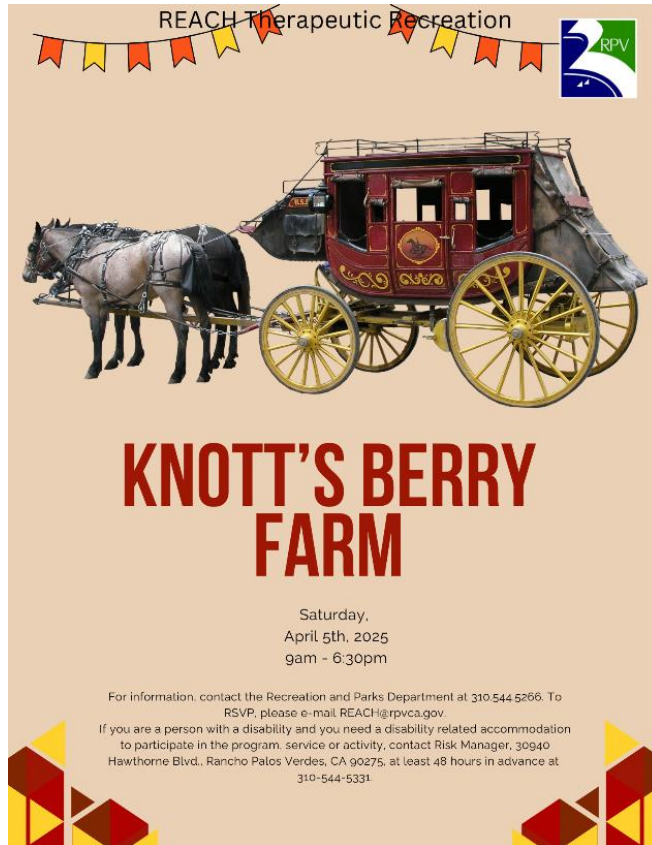
REACH Back at LMU for More “Special Games”

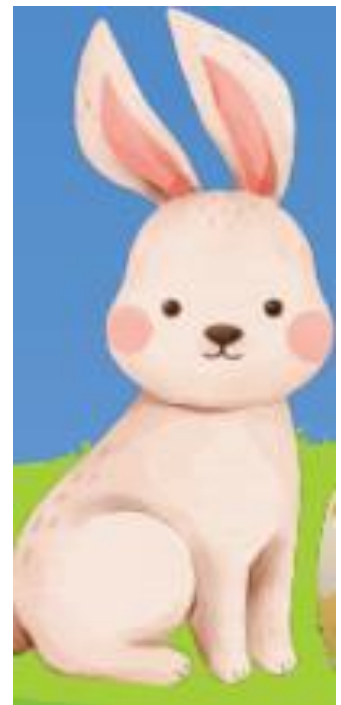
