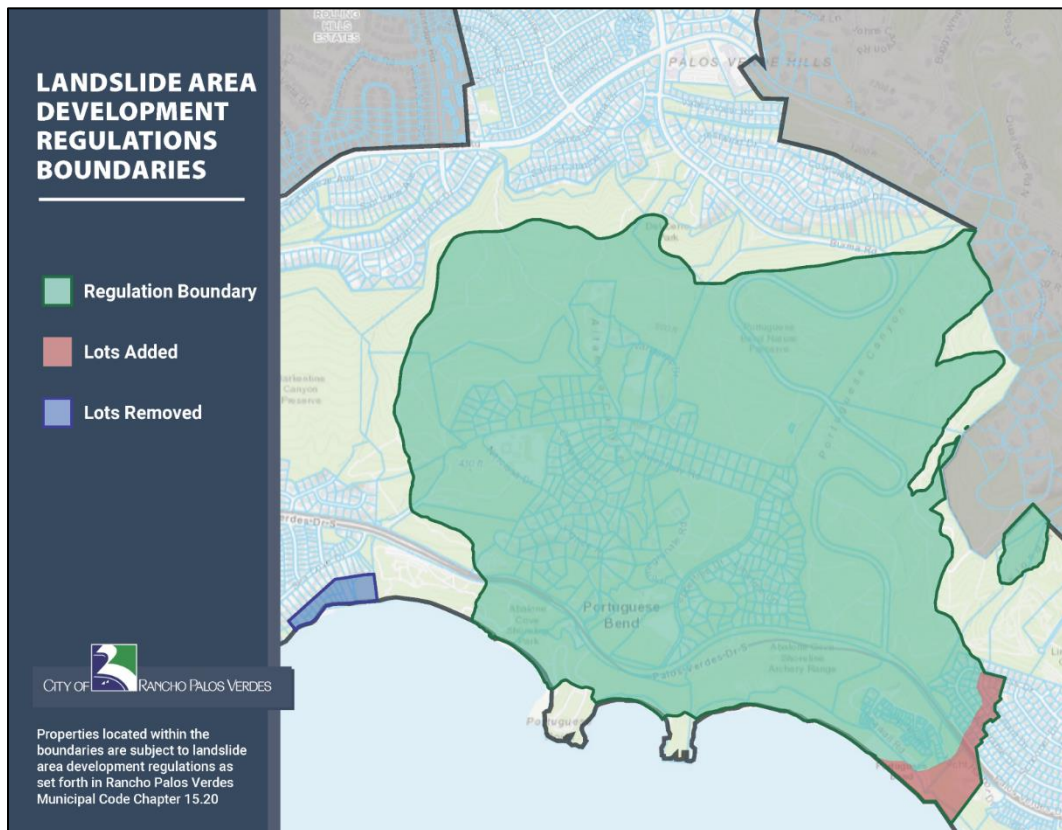
August 5, 2025 City Council Meeting Highlights

- To deter dangerous driving, the Council voted to lower the speed limit along the stretch of Palos Verdes Drive East known as the “Switchbacks” from 40 mph to 35 mph, and to enhance traffic signage. The Council will revisit the speed limit reduction in six months to assess its effectiveness.
- The Council introduced an ordinance amending the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code to permanently prohibit new residential construction in the landslide area, including home additions, due to unprecedented land movement.
- Property owners would be permitted to replace, restore, and repair development within its existing footprint.
- The ordinance would also expand the boundaries of the landslide complex to take in eight properties that were not subject to the City’s Landslide Moratorium: seven in the Seaview neighborhood, and one in the Portuguese Bend Beach Club.
- If approved on second reading at the August 19 meeting, the development regulations would take effect 30 days later.
- Finally, the Council moved to initiate the process to form a new geological hazard abatement district to help mitigate the Portuguese Bend Landslide, the largest of RPV’s ancient landslides.

Land Movement Updates

August 5, 2025, City Council Meeting Discussion Highlights

At last night's meeting, the City Council introduced an ordinance amending the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code to permanently prohibit new residential construction in the landslide area, including home additions. Property owners would be permitted to replace, restore, and repair development within its existing footprint. Additionally, the boundaries of the landslide complex would be updated to correspond with the expanded limits of recent land movement, taking in eight additional properties: seven in the Seaview neighborhood, and one in the Portuguese Bend Beach Club.

Now that the ordinance was introduced for first reading, it will have a second reading and vote at the August 19 City Council meeting. If approved, the new development regulations would take effect 30 days later. Learn more about the proposed regulations by reading [Frequently Asked Questions](#) on the City website.

During the meeting, the Council also moved to initiate the process of potentially forming a new geological hazard abatement district (GHAD) to help mitigate the Portuguese Bend Landslide, the largest of RPV's ancient landslides. This approach could bolster landslide mitigation efforts, as GHADs — separate government agencies from the City — are not subject to the same regulatory requirements, enabling them to work with more speed and flexibility. The next step is for the City to issue a Request for Proposals to retain a geologist to prepare an engineer's report, which would lead to the development of a Plan of Control, a document that describes the landslide hazards and a plan for abatement. Once the report is completed, the City would hold public meetings and go through the Proposition 218 public protest process to potentially establish the new GHAD.

L.A. County Backs AB 986

On August 5, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, led by Supervisor Janice Hahn, voted unanimously to support [AB 986](#), Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi's landslide legislation. The bill would amend the California Emergency Services Act to include landslides as a natural disaster that may be eligible for disaster assistance, giving affected communities, such as Rancho Palos Verdes, a clearer path to declare emergencies and take action to protect public safety and infrastructure.

"There is no question about it — the land movement that has devastated neighborhoods in Rancho Palos Verdes and displaced families absolutely is a local emergency, and state law should recognize it as such," Supervisor Hahn said in a statement. "Right now, cities impacted by landslides are forced to respond to these crises with one hand tied behind their back. That has to change."

The City thanks Supervisor Hahn for her continued advocacy and support for the City and residents impacted by the landslide, including her \$5 million grant in October 2024 supporting homeowners and the City's remediation efforts. After passing the Assembly floor in June, and the Senate Governmental Organization Committee in July, the bill is now set for hearing in the Senate Appropriations Committee on August 18.



RPV and Sakura City Celebrate Five Years as Sister Cities

Earlier this week, Mayor Pro Tem Paul Seo, Councilmembers George Lewis, Barbara Ferraro, Steve Perestam, and Staff enjoyed cross-cultural festivities at Hesse Park celebrating the five-year anniversary of the formation of RPV's sister city partnership with Sakura City, Japan.

This in-person and virtual event brought together both cities. Sakura City unveiled a mile marker sign pointing to Rancho Palos Verdes, and RPV gifted Sakura City a wood vase designed by woodturning artist Joe Devinny, whose work is displayed at the Palos Verdes Art Center.

Building on a bond established over 20 years ago by middle school students, Rancho Palos Verdes and Sakura City made their cross-cultural friendship official by becoming sister cities in August 2020. In the years since, both cities have shared their cultures and traditions through programming and visits.

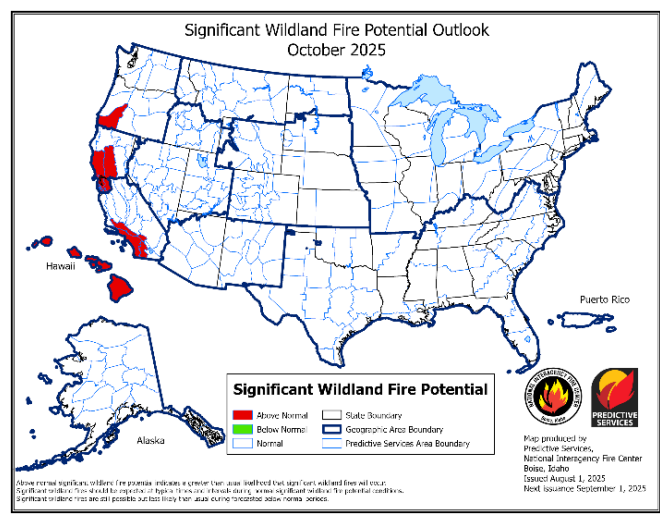
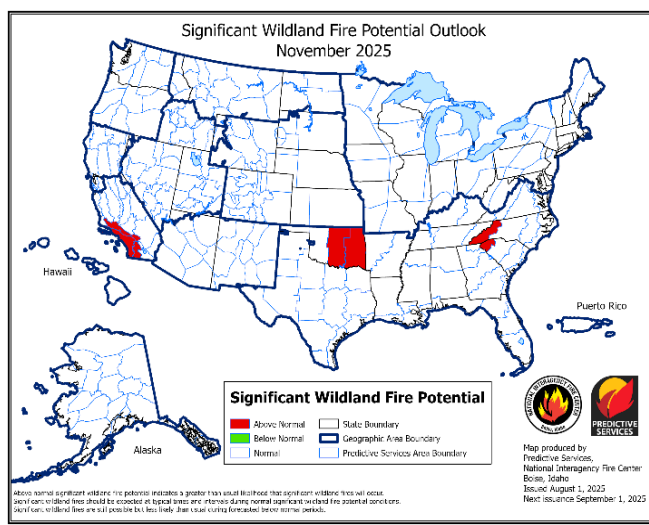

What will you do if you must evacuate during an emergency?

We cannot prevent all disasters, but we can prepare! Having a plan is critical when you need to act quickly to protect yourself and your loved ones. If you receive an Evacuation Order and must leave the area immediately, will you be ready to go? Answer the questions below to help you make your plan and be prepared.



How will you be notified? Get information about evacuation routes and resources by **signing up for Alert South Bay at** <https://alertsouthbay.com/> or text “alertrpv” to 888-777.



Where can you go? Identify at least 2 places outside of your area that you can stay at if you must evacuate. Make sure you have plans for your animals too!

Check out www.PVPReady.gov to learn your evacuation zone and get up to date information about the zone status and emergency information (evacuation routes and emergency facilities will be posted on the map during active emergencies)



How will you get there? Have a backup plan if you are unable to use your regular transportation and keep gas tanks at least halfway full. *Gas stations may be closed during a disaster!*



What do you need to take with you? Consider what you will need while you are evacuated and make an easy-to-carry kit with these supplies (ex. water/snacks, cash, medicine, clothes, sturdy shoes, important documents, etc.).



What else will you need? Consider your household’s unique needs such as comfort and entertainment items for children, supplies for animals, and back up pharmacies and medical services (ex. dialysis) in locations you may evacuate to.

Practice your plan at least twice a year with everyone in your household, including animals and children. This can make evacuations easier and less stressful and helps ensure your plans and supplies are adequate to meet your household’s needs.

Job Openings and Labor Turnover – June 2025

On July 29, 2025, the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) released the June 2025 data from the Job Openings and Labor Turnover Survey (JOLTS). This monthly report includes estimates of the number and rate of job openings, hires, and separations and provides insights into the current labor market.

As reported, the number of job openings totaled 7.4 million for the month ending June 2025, with little change from June's 7.8 million job openings. At 4.4 percent, the job

opening rate changed very little compared to May. Within the month of June, hires and separations both slightly decreased at 5.2 million and 5.1 million, respectively.

In June, the number of job openings decreased most noticeably in accommodation, food services, health and social assistance. The number of job openings increased in retail trade, information, and state and local government education.

June 2023 - June 2025

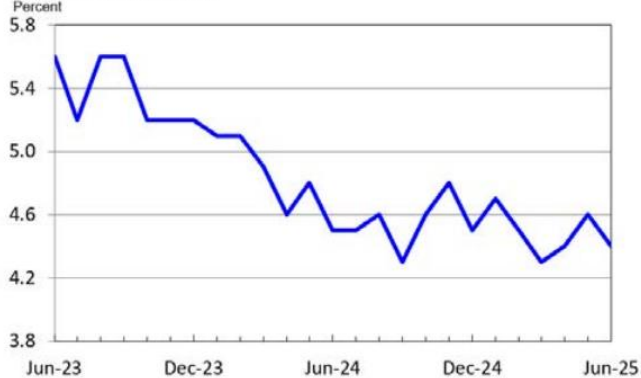
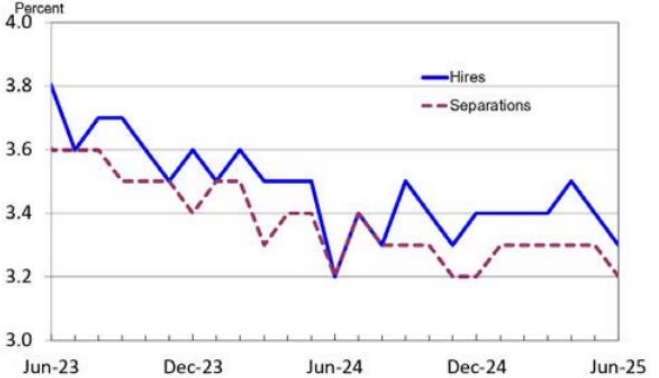


Chart 2. Hires and total separations rates, seasonally adjusted,

Landslide Emergency Stabilization

In response to unprecedented movement of the deep slide plane in the Greater Portuguese Bend-Ancient Altamira Landslide Complex (Landslide Complex), the City installed vertical deep de-watering wells (DDWs) to penetrate the deep slide plane and relieve water pressure.

Additionally, the city performed emergency winterization measures in the form of filling fissures/grabens, lining canyons, and improving drainage.

Status of the Deep Dewatering Wells Program

- The DDWs continue to be monitored and re-drilled or replaced as needed within the current approved budget.
- The total combined water extraction rate of the DDWs is currently at approximately **625 gallons per minute** or **0.90 million gallons per day**.
- Since the start of the DDW program, approximately **303 million gallons** or **924 acre-feet** of water have been extracted from certain locations around the toe of the Landslide Complex. Overall extraction rates have recently decreased due to the reasons described below:
 - DDW-5 has been shut down for pump maintenance and is expected to be back in service within the next week.
 - DDW-8 has sheared due to land movement. Re-drilling began this week and is expected to be completed by next week.

Status of Winterization

Field reconnaissance by geologists is scheduled over the week to develop winterization plans for 2025-2026.

Palos Verdes Drive South in Landslide Area

This week, Wayfarers Chapel is continuing maintenance work on their slope adjacent to Palos Verdes Drive South in the landslide area. The work generally consists of removing material to stabilize the slope.



Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts - Palos Verdes Drive South Pipeline Replacement Project

The sewer service in Rancho Palos Verdes is provided by both Los Angeles County Public Works and the City. Wastewater from these systems flows into transmission pipelines operated by the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County (LACSD), a regional agency serving 5.5 million residents in 78 cities. LACSD operates two above-ground 14-inch transmission pipelines along Palos Verdes Drive



South, which carry sewage from across the Palos Verdes Peninsula to treatment facilities in Carson.

Ongoing land movement in the Portuguese Bend Landslide Complex has damaged these pipelines and caused leaks requiring emergency repairs. In response, LACSD has launched a project to replace the existing rigid steel pipes with more flexible High-Density Polyethylene (HDPE) pipes. Construction began several months ago and is now expected to be completed by the end of the summer.



Staff are coordinating closely with LACSD to limit traffic disruptions along Palos Verdes Drive South.



City Council Meeting: Palos Verdes Drive East Traffic Update – August 5

On August 5, 2025, the City Council received an update on traffic measures along Palos Verdes Drive East (PVDE) from Crest Road to Palos Verdes Drive South (PVDS) and speeding enforcement on the stretch of the roadway known as the “switchbacks.” Based on staff recommendations, the Council approved the reduction of the speed limit from 40 miles per hour (mph) to 35 mph for the segment of PVDE from Ganado Drive to PVDS.



The Council directed staff to install supplemental speed advisory signs (as determined by the traffic engineer) on PVDE from Crest Road to PDVS. Additionally, staff was directed to report back to Council within six-month after the implementation of the approved traffic measures.

 - Replaced damaged tiles in the building hallway at Hesse Park
 - Repaired two water fountains at Hesse Park
 - Repaired walls in the building hallway at Point Vicente Interpretive Center
 - Cleaned and brought back online the bollard lights at Point Vicente Interpretive Center
 - Welded and repaired the entrance gate at Ladera Linda Community Park

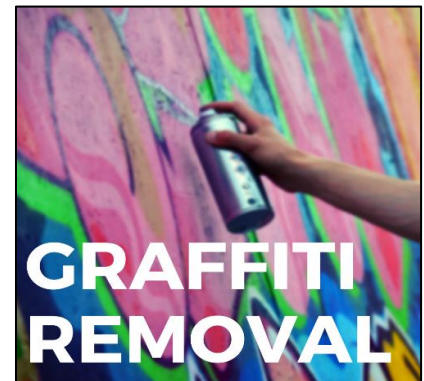

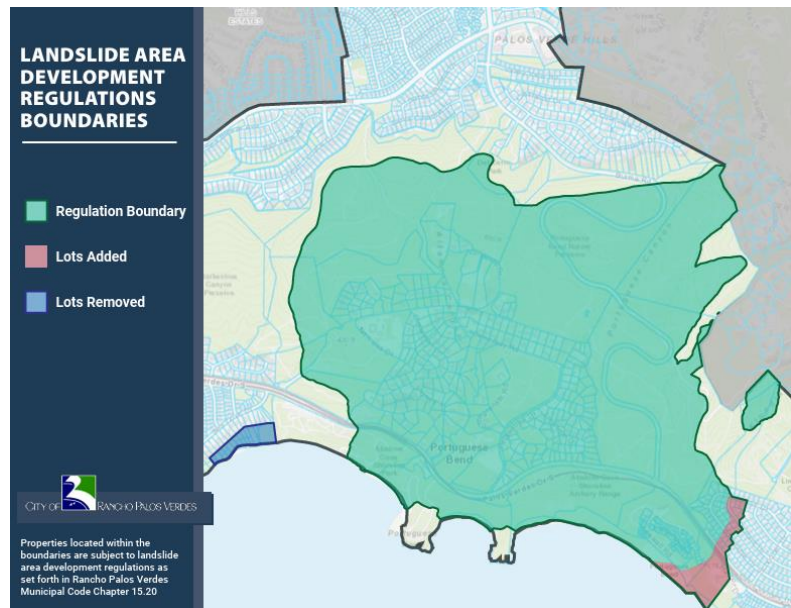


- No emergencies were reported during this period. However, the Public Works team remains available 24/7 to respond to any City-related emergencies.

Landslide Area Development Regulations Update

On August 5, 2025, the City Council introduced an ordinance amending the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code to permanently prohibit new residential construction in the landslide area, including home additions. Property owners would be permitted to replace, restore, and repair development within its existing footprint. Additionally, the boundaries of the landslide complex were updated to correspond with the expanded limits of recent land movement as noted in the reference map.



The code amendments will be presented to the City Council on August 19, 2025 for a second reading and adoption. The ordinance would be in effect 30 days after adoption. The intent is to have permanent regulations in place prior to the expiration of the current moratorium on October 2, 2025.

Planning Division Monthly Activity Report

The Planning Division's Monthly Activity Report for July 2025 summarizes the Division's activities during this past month regarding new applications received and Staff, Planning Commission, and City Council decisions rendered. As indicated in the attached report, the division received 55 new applications and rendered decisions on 11 applications for July 2025.

Building and Safety Division Monthly Activity

The Building and Safety Division's Monthly Activity Report for July 2025 reports on 1) a summary of the new cases received delineated by application type; 2) the number of permits issued; 3) the amount of fees collected; 4) the number of inspections performed; and 5) the number of new plan checks submitted. As indicated in the attached report, the division issued 238 permits and performed 750 inspections.

Code Enforcement Division Monthly Activity

The Code Enforcement Division's Monthly Activity Report for July 2025 reports on 1) violations by category; 2) the number of closed cases by violation with median processing times; and 3) illegal sign abatement. As indicated in the attached report, the division conducted 78 field inspections and brought 44 cases to closure.
