Tips to Stay Safe in the Heat

- Drink lots of water and wear loose-knit clothing.
- Check up on relatives and neighbors, especially if they have pre-existing health conditions or are sensitive to heat. Let them know the heat is coming and the ways to stay safe.
- Young children and pets should never be left unattended in vehicles under any circumstances.
- Take extra precautions if you work, exercise, or spend time outside. When possible, reschedule strenuous activities to the early morning or evening, or until this period of extreme heat is over.

Know the difference between [heat exhaustion and heat stroke](#). Heat stroke is a life-threatening emergency. Anyone overcome by heat should be moved to a cool and shaded location, and then immediately call 9-1-1.

August 19, 2025 City Council Meeting Highlights

- The Council adopted an ordinance amending the RPV Municipal Code to permanently prohibit new residential construction in the landslide area, including home additions. Property owners will be permitted to replace, restore, and repair development within its existing footprint.
- The new regulations will go into effect on September 18, 2025.
- City staff gave the latest updates on the landslide emergency.
- Since June, land movement has decelerated by an average of 25% in the Abalone Cove Landslide, 24% in the Portuguese Bend Landslide, and by 25% in areas just outside the historical boundaries of these landslides, referred to as Upper Altamira.

- The Klondike Canyon Landslide continues to see no measurable movement since mid-October 2024.
- The Abalone Cove Landslide Abatement District's 10 deep dewatering wells, in combination with six shallow wells, removed 6.8 million gallons of groundwater in July.
- Finally, the Council renewed for 60 days the local emergencies in the landslide area and the temporary prohibition of motorcycles and bicycles along a two-mile stretch of Palos Verdes Drive South.

August 19 City Council Meeting Highlights

At last night's meeting, the City Council adopted an ordinance amending the Rancho Palos Verdes Municipal Code to permanently prohibit new residential construction in the landslide area, including home additions. Property owners will be permitted to replace, restore, and repair development within its existing footprint. The new regulations will go into effect on September 18, 2025.

City geologist Mike Phipps presented the [latest land movement data](#), stating that the 25% deceleration in the Abalone Cove Landslide from June to August is a very promising indication of the effectiveness of the Abalone Cove Landslide Abatement District's 10 deep dewatering wells.

The Council authorized City staff to apply for FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) funding for the \$40 million, long-term Portuguese Bend Landslide Remediation Project, which would require a 25% non-federal match of \$10 million.

Finally, the Council extended by 60 days the local emergency declarations in the landslide area and the temporary prohibition of bicycles, motorcycles, and other similar wheeled vehicles from an approximately 2-mile stretch of Palos Verdes Drive South.

AB 986 Update

On August 18, the Senate Appropriations Committee voted to place Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi's landslide legislation, [AB 986](#) — which would amend the California Emergency Services Act to include landslides as a natural disaster that may be eligible for disaster assistance — on the suspense file. Bills are placed on the suspense file for further analysis if they are determined to cost \$50,000 or more to the state's General Fund, or \$150,000 or more to a special fund. The Appropriations Committee has until August 29 to advance AB 986 to the Senate Floor for a vote. If it does not leave the suspense file, the bill would be dead for this year.

Council Honors Cal Water Scholarship Winner

At last night's meeting, the Council honored RPV resident Daniel Diercks, one of 13 recipients of California Water Service Group's Scholarship Program, which honors rising stars who have chosen higher education to better themselves and their communities. A third-year psychology student at UCLA, he hopes to become a doctor in clinical psychology to help people through difficult life circumstances.



Extreme Heat for Los Angeles County

There is a heat wave this week for Los Angeles County and a heat advisory issued for RPV. Residents should take the following steps to avoid heat related illness.

- ✓ Stay indoors, in a place with air conditioning, like a library, mall, or City cooling center (see page 4 for locations).
- ✓ Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing and a hat.
- ✓ AVOID high energy activities or reschedule them to the coolest time of the day (early morning or evening).
- ✓ Drink plenty of water, especially if exercising or working, and avoid alcohol, caffeine, hot/heavy meals, and salt tablets (unless recommended by a physician).
- ✓ Check yourself, family, and neighbors for signs of heat related illness.

Back To School Emergency Preparedness

Now that the kids are back at school, it is a great time to make sure that everyone knows what to do if an emergency happens.

Start by asking yourself the following questions. If you don't have a family emergency plan use the answers to these questions to make one!

1. How will family members be alerted if an emergency happens?

Consider different types of emergencies, different times and dates that an emergency can occur, and where each family member may be in each scenario.

2. How should you respond during different emergencies to stay safe?

For example, during an earthquake you should Drop, Cover, and Hold On. The goal is to avoid/protect yourself against anything that can fall on you, or that you can fall into.

3. How will you get in contact with family members to make sure they're okay?

Consider ways to connect if the cell phones aren't working and remember that, during disasters, text and data will work better than phone calls and out of area calls will work better than local calls.

4. Where will you meet if you can't get a hold of each other?

Schools often have emergency plans to help reunify families during school hours, but you should also consider scenarios when children are not in school. Pick a safe, familiar location where you can reunite after an emergency and make sure everyone knows how to get there from the locations that they frequent the most.

5. Where will your family go if you must evacuate?

Think about how you will get there, what supplies you will need while evacuated, and what you will need when you return. How will you get needed medicine? Where will pets/animals stay?

FAC Meeting Recap

In the latest meeting of the Finance Advisory Committee (FAC) held on August 14th, several key items were discussed.

Debt Management Policy Update

The Committee reviewed the latest draft of the City's Debt Management Policy, which was originally adopted in 2015 to provide a framework for issuing and managing municipal debt. The policy has been under review since August 2024, with prior draft updates presented in December 2024 and February 2025. The current revisions are intended to modernize the policy, align it with best practices, and provide greater flexibility while maintaining fiscal discipline.

Updates include: (1) calculating the City's 5% debt limit using a three-year average of General Fund revenues, with limited exceptions up to 10% for non-voter-approved debt and 15% combined with voter-approved debt if dedicated repayment sources are identified; (2) formally incorporating loans and installment obligations as financing tools, requiring affordability analysis and full Council approval; and (3) prohibiting interest rate swaps while limiting other non-traditional financial products to cases where they provide a clear financial benefit, mitigate risk, and are approved at a public meeting.

The policy also includes language on emergency borrowing, which may be considered only in the event of a declared local, state, or federal emergency that significantly impacts City operations or creates unanticipated financial obligations. Even in such cases, borrowing would be considered only if necessary, after reserves and other available resources have been evaluated. Any short-term borrowing would require a defined repayment plan and approval by the FAC and City Council. In addition, the revisions strengthen competitive selection requirements for financial institutions and debt service providers, requiring written justification and Council approval for any

exceptions.

The FAC recommended forwarding the finalized version of the policy to City Council for consideration, pending legal review by the City Attorney's office. Following that review, the policy will return to the FAC for final input before being presented to Council.

Other FAC items

The Committee also received an update on the potential formation of a joint subcommittee with the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) and recommended updating its FY2025–26 Workplan to include a framework for a financial plan.

FAC also received presentations from staff on the Treasury Report and a financial update on the Greater Portuguese Bend Landslide Complex.

The next FAC meeting is scheduled for September 11th in the Community Room at the Ken Dyda Civic Center, 30940 Hawthorne Blvd.

The Employment Situation – July 2025

On August 1st, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that total nonfarm payroll employment had a small increase of 73,000 jobs in the month of July, and the unemployment rate was little changed at 4.2 percent with the number of unemployed people at 7.2 million.

Among the unemployed, new entrants included 985,000 people. This is an increase of 275,000 in July. New entrants are unemployed people who are looking for their first job.

In July, notable job gains occurred in industries such as state health care and social assistance. Notably, job growth continued in health care services and hospitals at an increase of 34,000 jobs and 16,000 jobs, respectively. Employment numbers have declined in the federal government by 12,000 in July and are down by 84,000 since January, based on this latest report.


In July, the average hourly earnings for all nonfarm payrolled employees rose by 12 cents or 0.3 percent, to \$36.44. Private-sector production and nonsupervisory employees saw an average hourly earnings increase of 0.3 percent, to \$31.34. For a broader view, Chart 1 illustrates the trend and current unemployment rate through July 2025.

Landslide Emergency Stabilization

In response to unprecedeted movement of the deep slide plane in the Greater Portuguese Bend-Ancient Altamira Landslide Complex (Landslide Complex), the City installed vertical deep de-watering wells (DDWs) to penetrate the deep slide plane and relieve water pressure.

Additionally, the City performed emergency winterization measures in the form of filling fissures/grabens, lining canyons, and improving drainage.

Status of the Deep Dewatering Wells Program

- The DDWs continue to be monitored and re-drilled or replaced as needed within the current approved budget.
- The total combined water extraction rate of the DDWs is currently at approximately **505 gallons per minute** or approximately **0.75 million gallons per day**.
- Since the start of the DDW program, approximately **313 million gallons** or **958 acre-feet** of water have been extracted from certain locations around the toe of the Landslide Complex. Overall extraction rates have recently decreased due to the reasons described below:
 - DDW-5 has sheared due to land movement. Geologists are evaluating the potential for redrilling.
 - DDW-8 redrill was completed last week and brought back into service on 8/15/2025.
 - DDW-9A has sheared due to land movement. Redrilling began on 8/15/2025

Status of Winterization

Field reconnaissance by geologists has been completed and is being used to develop winterization plans for 2025-2026.

Palos Verdes Drive South in Landslide Area

This week, Wayfarers Chapel is continuing maintenance work on their slope adjacent to Palos Verdes Drive South in the landslide area. The work generally consists of removing material to stabilize the slope.



Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts - Palos Verdes Drive South Pipeline Replacement Project

The sewer service in Rancho Palos Verdes is provided by both Los Angeles County Public Works and the City. Wastewater from these systems flows into transmission pipelines operated by the Sanitation Districts of Los Angeles County (LACSD), a regional agency serving 5.5 million residents in 78 cities. LACSD operates two above-ground 14-inch transmission pipelines along Palos Verdes Drive South, which carry sewage from across the Palos Verdes Peninsula to treatment facilities in Carson.

Ongoing land movement in the Portuguese Bend Landslide Complex has damaged these pipelines and caused leaks requiring emergency repairs. In response, LACSD has launched a project to replace the existing rigid steel pipes with more flexible High-Density Polyethylene (HDPE) pipes.

Construction began several months ago and is now expected to be completed by the end of the summer.

Staff are coordinating closely with LACSD to limit traffic disruptions along Palos Verdes Drive South.







Materials related to an item on an agenda submitted after distribution of the agenda packet are available for public inspection at the front counter of the Planning Division Lobby at City Hall, which is located at 30940 Hawthorne Boulevard, Rancho Palos Verdes during normal business hours, and electronically on the City's website at www.rpvca.gov/agendas.

Public Correspondence:

We highly encourage written materials regarding Planning Commission agenda items be submitted no later than 4:00 P.M. the Monday prior to a Planning Commission meeting to allow the Planning Commission Members ample time to review and consider the issues raised prior to making decisions at the Planning Commission meeting. Please keep in mind that it is difficult for Planning Commission Members to carefully review materials submitted after that deadline or at the meeting. Written materials, including emails, submitted to the city are public records and may be posted on the City's website. Accordingly, you may wish to omit personal information from your written materials or oral presentation as it may become part of the public record regarding an agenda item. In addition, City meetings may be televised and may be accessed through the City's website at www.rpvca.gov/agendas.

Public Participation:

Participants must speak from the podium using the lectern microphone; comments are to be directed to the Planning Commission and not to the staff or the public; repetition should be avoided; and reading a submission that has been copied or contained in the agenda will be discouraged. Virtual participation is also offered please visit www.rpvca.gov/participate.

Public Comments:

The Planning Commission may limit the public input on any item based on the number of people requesting to speak, the length of the agenda, or the business of the Planning Commission.

Conduct at the Planning Commission Meeting:

Pursuant to GC 54957.95: (a)(1) In addition to authority exercised pursuant to Sections 54954.3 and 54957.9, the presiding member of the legislative body conducting a meeting or their designee may remove, or cause the removal of, an individual for disrupting the meeting. (2) Prior to removing an individual, the presiding member or their designee shall warn the individual that their behavior is disrupting the meeting and that their failure to cease their behavior may result in their removal. The presiding member or their designee may then remove the individual if they do not promptly cease their disruptive behavior. This paragraph does not apply to any behavior described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (b)(1) means engaging in behavior during a meeting of a legislative body that actually disrupts, disturbs, impedes, or renders infeasible the orderly conduct of the meeting and includes, but is not limited to, one of the following: (A) A failure to comply with reasonable and lawful regulations adopted by a legislative body pursuant to Section 54954.3 or any other law. (B) Engaging in behavior that constitutes use of force or a true threat of force.(2) "True threat of force" means a threat that has sufficient indicia of intent and seriousness, that a reasonable observer would perceive it to be an actual threat to use force by the person making the threat.

Time Estimates:

The time noted next to an agenda item is only an estimate of the amount of time that will be spent during the meeting on that particular item. Accordingly, these estimates should not be relied on in determining when a matter will be heard, especially since agenda items are often re-ordered during a meeting and may be discussed at any time.

Continuation of Meeting:

The Planning Commission will adjourn its meetings on or before 11:00 p.m. and will not consider new business items after 10:15 p.m., unless a majority of the Planning Commission members who are present affirmatively vote either to extend the meeting after 11:00 p.m. or to consider new business after 10:15 p.m. If the meeting ends before all items listed on the agenda are completed, any unfinished business will be continued to the next succeeding day that is not a holiday, at a location to be determined.

Closed Session:

Please be advised that, pursuant to the Ralph M. Brown Act, "a person may not disclose confidential

information that has been acquired by being present in a Closed Session . . . to a person not entitled to receive it, unless the legislative body authorizes disclosure of that confidential information." (Gov. Code § 54963(a).) "[C]onfidential information" means a communication made in a Closed Session that is specifically related to the basis for the legislative body of a local agency to meet lawfully in Closed Session . . ." (Gov. Code § 54963(a).) Please be further advised that any "violation of [Government Code § 54963] may be addressed by the use of such remedies as are currently available by law, including, but not limited to: (1) injunctive relief to prevent the disclosure of confidential information prohibited by this section; (2) disciplinary action against an [public or city official] who has willfully disclosed confidential information in violation of this section; (3) referral of a member of a legislative body who has willfully disclosed confidential information in violation of this section to a grand jury." (Gov. Code § 54963(c).)
