RPV Honors Veterans

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes hosted a Veterans Day Breakfast on November 11 from 9-11 a.m. at the Ken Dyda Civic Center. Breakfast was free for veterans and \$10 for non-veterans. Approximately 110 people attended, including 62 veterans.

Guests enjoyed the National Anthem sung by Josephine Joy, a flag ceremony led by Boy Scout Troop 783, patriotic music by the Palos Verdes Symphonic Band, and remarks from Mayor Dave Bradley and Mayor Pro Tem Paul Seo (a U.S. Army veteran). The keynote address was delivered by Dan Smee who served as a U.S. Army medic in the 1980s and again after 9/11. He currently works for the Department of Veterans Affairs and is active in the Wounded Warrior Project. All veterans in attendance received a commemorative Challenge Coin. Posters displaying photos and descriptions of each veteran's service were on display.

The City of Rancho Palos Verdes deeply appreciates the profound service and sacrifice of all veterans.

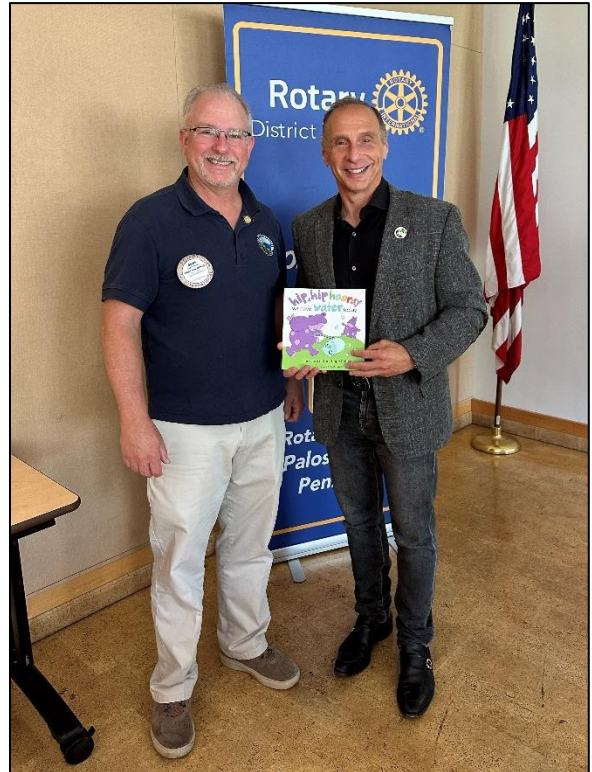


RPV Featured at PVP Rotary Club Meeting

PANO AI Wildfire Cameras Approved at Cal Water Crest Road Property

On November 7, 2025, Planning Division Staff approved the fourth and final PANO AI camera on an existing American Tower monopole at the California Water Services Company Crest Road property, which is anticipated to be installed and operational by the end of this month. Please click [here](#) to view a copy of the permit. In 2022, the City signed an agreement with Pano AI, which is a company that installs cameras that use artificial intelligence to detect wildfires. The cameras are installed in high vantage points and scan the area 24/7 for smoke. If a fire is detected, the cameras send an alert to City management and first responder agencies to help quickly address small fires and prevent catastrophic wildfire events. Members and volunteers foster friendships and opportunities to engage while helping one another.



This is an Exercise!

Last Thursday, Rancho Palos Verdes held a functional exercise of our Emergency Operations Center (EOC). About 60 staff members, or half of all City staff, engaged in this exercise, either as a player, observer, or planning team member.



This all-day exercise provided a 48-hour wildfire simulation and tested staff's ability to activate and operate the City's EOC. The exercise tested communication and coordination systems, public information and warning protocols and procedures, and the ability of staff to switch shifts during large scale emergencies.

Many City partners also supported the exercise, including the Area G Disaster Management Area Coordinator; Los Angeles County Fire, Sheriff's, and Animal Care and Control Departments; the Cities of Palos Verdes Estates, Rolling Hills, Rolling Hills Estates, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach, Gardena, Los Angeles, Culver City, and El Segundo; Palos Verdes Peninsula School District; the Peninsula Volunteer Alert Network; the American Red Cross; Coordinators for DLAN, Alert South Bay, and Genasys Systems; and 3 Emergency Preparedness Committee members.

Exercise feedback is actively being collected, analyzed, and incorporated into City planning and readiness documents, facilities, and supply caches.

Exercises like this are critical to ensure that the City is ready to respond to emergencies. The City encourages all residents to practice their own emergency plans to strengthen their personal readiness as well. You can do this by:

1. Picking an emergency you are at risk of experiencing (earthquake, power outage, wildfire, etc.)
2. Imagining how the emergency would play out
3. Acting out your response to the emergency using your emergency plan and supplies (Tip: get other household members involved in the exercise, including animals and children)
4. Updating your emergency supply and plan based on how your exercise goes.

Taking some time out of your regular routine to exercise emergency plans can help identify and address gaps in readiness, reducing the impacts emergencies can have on you and preparing you to respond to anything that comes your way.

Landslide Emergency Stabilization

In response to unprecedented movement of the deep slide plane in the Greater Portuguese Bend-Ancient Altamira Landslide Complex (Landslide Complex), the City installed vertical deep de-watering wells (DDWs) to penetrate the deep slide plane and relieve water pressure. Additionally, the City introduced an emergency winterization program in the form of filling fissures/grabens, lining canyons, and improving drainage.

Status of the Deep Dewatering Wells Program

- The DDWs continue to be monitored and re-drilled or replaced as needed within the current approved budget.
- The total combined water extraction rate of the DDWs is currently at approximately **700 gallons per minute** or approximately **1.0 million gallons per day**.
- Since the start of the DDW program, approximately **381 million gallons** or **1,170 acre-feet** of water have been extracted from certain locations around the toe of the Landslide Complex. Weekly extraction rates are currently influenced by the following circumstances:
 - All DDWs are currently online and extracting water.

Status of Winterization:

Construction work continues this week on winterization measures. The work is anticipated to be complete by end-November / early-December.

Hawthorne Boulevard at Eddinghill/Seamount Left Turn Signal Construction Update

On March 4, 2025, the City Council awarded a construction contract to install a left turn signal arrow for Hawthorne Boulevard at Eddinghill Drive/Seamount Drive. Since that time, the construction contractor has been ordering and acquiring the long lead items like the steel poles, signal heads, and the controllers. The fabrication and acquisition of those items is now nearly complete.

On Monday, October 6, 2025 construction activities began at the intersection. The project will include the following improvements:

- Left-Turn Arrow for both northbound and southbound Hawthorne Boulevard left turns.

- Traffic signal hardware and equipment updates including a new traffic cabinet and signal controller; upgraded traffic signal mast arms to accommodate the new left turn signal heads; upgraded intersection lighting; new illuminated street name signs; and upgraded intersection accessibility curb ramps.

To minimize traffic disruptions, work hours are generally Monday – Friday from 9am to 4pm. Construction is anticipated to be complete by the end of the year.

****UPDATE**** On Tuesday, November 25 and Wednesday, November 26, the new signal poles will be installed. Due to daylight hours, work is anticipated to begin at **7am** for those two days to safely erect and install the new signal poles with a crane. Please use caution while driving through construction zones.

- In addition to routine weekly landscape maintenance at all City parks, the following were completed:
 - Replaced an ADA access door at City Hall.
 - Replaced an ADA stop bump at City Hall.
 - Repaired a ruptured water line at Eastview Park. Water was restored the same day.
 - Graded the entrance to the lower staircase to reduce trip hazards at Ladera Linda Community Park.



STREET LANDSCAPING

- This week, ROW maintenance crews conducted landscape cleaning, weed whacking, and general landscape maintenance along medians and the public right-of-way throughout various City areas. Work locations included:
 - Crest Road center medians and right-of-way
 - Whitley Collins Drive right of way and center median
 - Highridge Road center median
 - Palos Verdes Drive South right-of-way and center median from city limit near 25th Street and La Rotonda to Peppertree Drive
- This week, the irrigation team completed inspections, repairs, and system upgrades at these locations:
 - Replaced broken sprinklers by the large turf area at Ladera Linda Community Park
 - Replaced broken risers and adjusted irrigation timing along Whitley Collins

- In addition to routine tree trimming throughout the City, the Public Works Department regularly inspects trees for structural integrity and safety. Below is the list of trees inspected this week for potential City action, such as trimming or removal:

 - Installed and wired a new speed feedback radar sign along the 6700 block of Eddinghill Drive.
 - Repaired potholes along Palos Verdes Drive South at Schooner Drive and at Terranea Way.
 - Repaired sidewalk deviations along Ganado Drive, Lomo Drive and Freeport Road.
 - Radar street sign along Abbottswood Drive at Briarhurst Drive was adjusted to face the correct direction. A special product was applied to secure screws in place and prevent them from loosening again in the future.

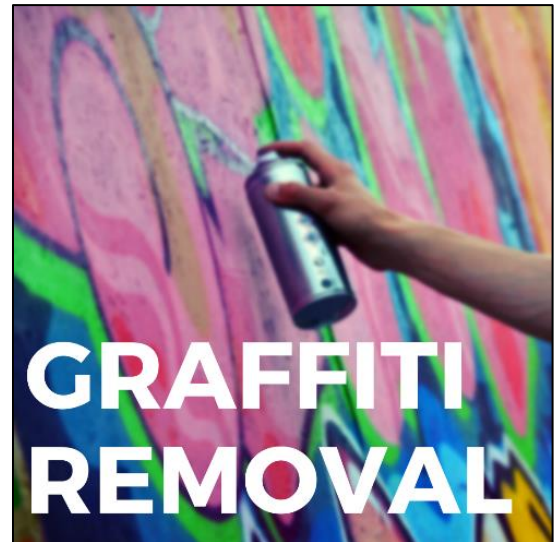

New Multifamily Energy Efficiency Program

A new multifamily energy efficiency program is available through the partnership of the South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG) and SoCalREN. The Multifamily Program is designed to help Multifamily Property Owners and/or Property Managers save money and add value to their property. Through this program, they can:



1. Access consulting: An energy and green building consultant is available to work with them to identify cost-effective upgrade measures and connect them to incentive programs.
2. Get an assessment: Identify the most cost-effective improvements with an energy audit.
3. Make improvements: Purchase and install energy conservation measures.
4. Receive incentives: Program financial incentives that can help offset costs.

REMINDER - 2025 Building Code Adoption

On November 18, the City Council will consider the adoption of an ordinance to update the City's Building Code to the 2025 California Building Standards Code. The adoption of the ordinance is part of a three-year cycle, in which the California Building Standards Commission updates the Uniform Codes that govern construction practices in the State of California. After the State Building Code is published, every City and County throughout the state must adopt these Codes, with an opportunity to include more stringent local amendments based on local geological, topographical and/or climatic conditions.

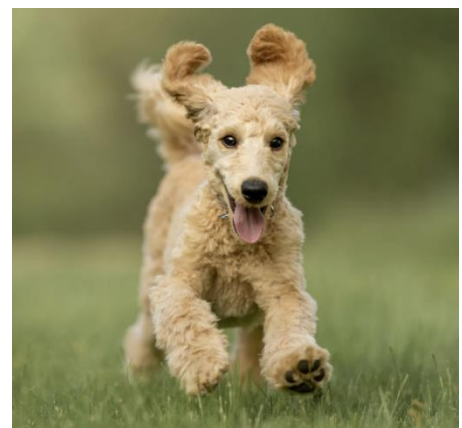
do you choose from so many colors? Well, all we could do was let our gifted energy lead us to crate a one-of-a-kind masterpiece.

Abalone Cove Park / Reserve

On November 6, the coast experienced a high tide of 7.20 feet and low tide of -1.32 ft. These exceptionally high tides are known as King Tides, which occur several times during the winter season. Staff monitored coastal areas, especially areas adjacent to or impacted by land movement to identify and assess potential hazards or maintenance caused by these events. In previous years, these king tides combined with strong gale winds can bend and damage metal signs near coastal trails as well as bring in trash that is then deposited on our local beaches.

The SoCalREN Multifamily Program is funded by SoCalGas (SCG) and Southern California Edison (SCE) ratepayers under the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). The funds are collected by the utilities and distributed by the CPUC.

Are these programs offered in my area?

Programs are available to SCE and SCG ratepayers in the following counties: Los Angeles, Imperial, Inyo, Kern, Kings, Mono, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Tulare, and Ventura.

Do I have to use any specific contractors?

Yes, we offer a list of licensed Trade Allies for you to choose from. If you have a preferred contractor, they must be onboarded (at no cost) as a SoCalREN Trade Ally to complete the installation.

Does new construction qualify for these programs?

Only existing properties can receive the benefits of SoCalREN programs.

Is there a cap on the incentive amount for my project?

For the Multifamily Program, project incentives are based on the energy savings per the Assessment Report. The incentive is capped at 60% or 75% of the total approved project cost. The maximum incentive amount is provided in the Reservation Letter.

For the Small Hard-to-Reach Direct Install Program, incentives are capped at a predetermined rate per measure to help cover 100% of the project cost.

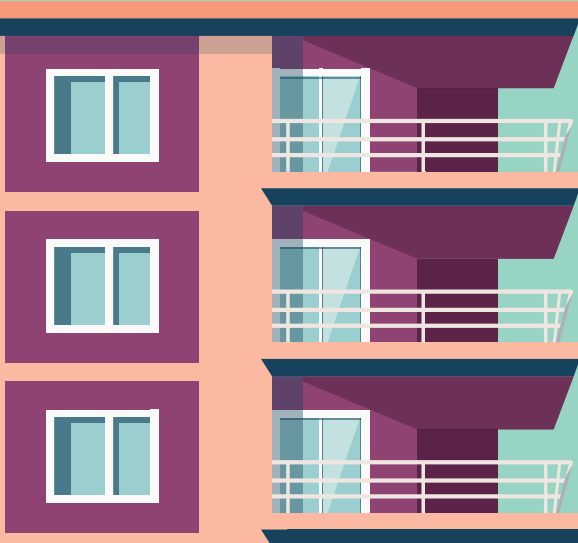

Multifamily Program

- Properties with five or more units can get rebates to help offset the cost of purchasing and installing energy-efficient equipment.
- Energy efficiency incentives* evaluate whole-building energy use and promote integrated upgrades over individual measures.
 - Properties located in Disadvantaged Communities (DACs) will receive: \$0.57/kWh and \$6.00/therm
 - Non-DAC properties will receive: \$0.33/kWh and \$3.50/therm
- Eligible equipment includes:
 - Heat pump water heaters (electric water heaters)
 - High-efficiency gas water heaters/boilers
 - HVAC systems (gas and electric)
 - Pool/Spa heaters and recirculation pumps
 - Smart thermostats
 - Wall furnaces

*Incentive caps apply.

Small Hard-to-Reach Direct Install Program

- Properties with five to 50 units in Southern California's underserved communities can make energy-saving upgrades at no cost.
- The Program provides a single source for financial incentives, information, and technical assistance.
- Eligible equipment includes:
 - Boilers
 - Central storage water heaters
 - Duct sealing
 - Hot water pipe/tank insulation
 - Heat pump water heaters
 - Smart thermostats
- Projects are completed on a first-come, first-served basis until allocated funds are depleted or the Program is terminated.

Upgrade Your Property and Increase Your Savings

Add value to your property, improve tenant comfort, and reduce maintenance costs with the Southern California Regional Energy Network (SoCalREN) Multifamily Program. This Program offers technical assistance and financial incentives when you make energy-saving improvements to your property.

- Include at least three energy efficiency measures.
- Achieve a minimum of 10,000 kWh OR 1,000 therm energy savings.
- Reach project completion and approval within 12 months of the date of reservation.

Frequently Asked Questions

Where does the money for these incentives come from?

The SoCalREN Multifamily Program is funded by SoCalGas and SCE ratepayers under the auspices of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). The funds for this Program are collected by the utilities and distributed by CPUC.

Our tenant spaces are separately metered. Must improvements be installed within the units to qualify for the incentives?

The improvements can be installed in the common areas or in tenant units. There must be at least three energy efficiency measures installed overall, including but not limited to interior lighting, exterior lighting, window replacements, efficient showerheads, faucet aerators, wall insulation, and cool roof(s).

Can I use your incentives to install solar electric?

Solar power generation is not eligible. Solar thermal water heating for domestic hot water or swimming pools is eligible.

Do I have to get a permit for the improvements?

Yes, any improvements requiring a permit by your local municipality must be permitted. For any central air conditioning or heat pump projects, SB 1414 requires proof that the permit has been closed in order to receive the incentive.

Is there a cap on the incentive amount for my project?

Project incentives are based on energy savings per the Assessment Report. The incentive is capped at 60% or 75% of the total approved project cost, based on the Assessment Report. The maximum incentive amount is provided in the Reservation Letter.

Are there income requirements to participate in the Program?

No, there are no income restrictions, but projects located in certain ZIP codes may be eligible for the higher 75% capped incentive amount.

Does the Program offer financing?

No, the program does not offer financing. Contact your Account Manager about financing options available outside of the Program.

Can the incentives be used for new construction?

The incentives do not apply to new construction, only energy efficiency upgrades to existing properties.

Does the Property Owner have to use any specific contractors?

Yes, the installation contractor must be approved for participation in the Program. If your preferred contractor is not already approved for participation, your Account Manager will assist the contractor in completing participation requirements.

Properties located in Disadvantaged Communities (DACs) will receive:

\$0.57/kWh and \$6.00/therm

Non-DAC properties will receive:

\$0.33/kWh and \$3.50/therm
