He'll be attending his first Emergency Preparedness Committee meeting on March 19, and will be quickly taking on a number of important initiatives, including a Peninsula-wide preparedness drill, coronavirus (COVID-19) response and implementation of the new Alert SouthBay/Everbridge emergency notification system. Ring Security Device Subsidy Match Program: The City has partnered with Ring to provide a total discount of \$100 on select Ring devices for first-time program participants who are residents of RPV. Alert SouthBay Registration - Everbridge Emergency Communication Notification System: The City of Rancho Palos Verdes has launched Alert SouthBay, an emergency communication notification system, a multi-jurisdictional coordinate approach to emergency management with 12 other South Bay cities. Everbridge will act as the City's primary vehicle for emergency communication, as well as public-safety related messaging: ranging from road closures due to water main breaks or police activity, to critical emergency communications such as Shelter in Place or Evacuation notifications.



The City encourages all residents and members of the Rancho Palos Verdes community to opt-in and register for Everbridge. There are three easy methods for registering:

- Text to 888-777 with the message “alertsrb” (one word), which returns a link to register for Everbridge
- Download the free Everbridge app on an iOS or Android device from the App Store or Google Play Store

Status of SB 2 Planning Grant Application: On February 27, the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) advised Staff that our application for an SB 2 planning grant (filed last November) was preliminarily approved. As a reminder, our application requested \$160,000 to establish a mixed-use over zone and development standards to encourage the development of housing in the City’s commercial zones. HCD expects the rest of its internal review process to take several more weeks, after which the City will be asked to execute a standard grant agreement. Staff will report back once our proposal receives final HCD approval.

MPA Collaborative Meeting: On February 27, the City hosted a meeting of the Los Angeles County Marine Protected Area (MPA) Collaborative, one of a network of 14 groups that work to help educate the public about state-designated MPAs.

The collaborative is made up of marine scientists, conservation groups, government agencies, members of the fishing community and other stakeholders who develop ways to bring awareness to four MPAs off the Los Angeles County coast, as well as regulations banning or limiting fishing activity within them. Two of the MPAs are in Rancho Palos Verdes (see map below).



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The Point Vicente State Marine Conservation Area extends westward from Long Point at Terranea Resort, around Point Vicente to the northerly boundary of the Point Vicente Interpretive Center. The Point Vicente SMCA is a “no take” area, meaning that no fishing activity is permitted.

The Abalone Cove State Marine Conservation Area extends eastward from Long Point at Terranea Resort to Portuguese Point at Abalone Cove Shoreline Park. Within the Abalone Cove SMCA, only the recreational fishing of pelagic finfish, Pacific bonito and white sea bass (by spearfishing) and market squid (by hand-held dip net) is permitted, as well as the commercial fishing of coastal pelagic species and Pacific bonito (by round haul net) and swordfish (by harpoon).

At last week’s meeting, the City’s Park Rangers received pamphlets and other written materials to help educate the public about RPV’s MPAs and made connections with members of the collaborative who observe and collect data on coastal and marine resource use.

The collaborative also discussed an upcoming **MPA Compliance Workshop** that will be held **March 26 from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. and the Point Vicente Interpretive Center** (see attachments). Members of the public are invited to discuss issues affecting compliance with local MPA rules and recommend local solutions.

Detectives Seek Potential Victims of Package Theft Suspect: Detectives from the Lomita Sheriff’s Station are seeking potential victims of a 33-year-old man suspected of carrying out a string of recent package thefts in Rancho Palos Verdes, Rolling Hills Estates and elsewhere in the South Bay (see attachments).

The suspect was arrested Thursday, February 27 with the assistance of Torrance police after Lomita detectives tied him to the crimes using security camera footage and witnessed him commit several more thefts in the South Bay, according to the Lomita Sheriff’s Station.

Stolen packages and property were located in the suspect’s tan 1996 Toyota Corolla as well as his residence, authorities said.

Detectives have released security camera images of the suspect — who is described as 5 feet 11 inches tall and weighing 190 pounds — his vehicle, and photos of recovered stolen property.

Call for Nominations for Metro South Bay Service Council: The South Bay Cities Council of Governments (SBCCOG) is seeking nominations to fill three expiring seats and one vacant seat on the Metro South Bay Service Council (see attachments).

The Metro South Bay Service Council is comprised of nine members nominated by the SBCCOG and appointed by Metro’s Board of Directors. The boundaries of the South Bay region include the SBCCOG cities, with the addition of the Watts/Willowbrook and LAX areas

of the City of Los Angeles. The nominees must either live or work within the South Bay region boundaries.

Update on 2019 Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19): The City of Rancho Palos Verdes is receiving regular updates from the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health regarding the circumstances around the 2019 Novel Coronavirus. The City has a [website spotlight](#) for the latest information along with reminders for good public health hygiene, and has shared this information to residents through Nextdoor.

As of March 3, there remains only one confirmed case of the coronavirus in Los Angeles County. The individual is a non-resident who presented themselves at the Los Angeles International Airport upon arrival from Wuhan City, China, was screened, isolated and taken to a hospital for medical treatment.

The CDC and Los Angeles County Department of Public Health have deemed the threat to the general public is still low. Please be aware that the infection could spread in the County, but that the County is very well prepared for that time. The City encourages the community to be prepared for changes to public events and regular public activities, and reminds that the best and only reliable information should be located from the CDC or the County website. Los Angeles County Sheriff Department Updates: The Los Angeles County Sheriff Department (LASD) continues to contract with and serve the City of Rancho Palos Verdes through the Lomita Sheriff Station. LASD Recruitment Unit is hosting its inaugural Women's Symposium on Thursday, March 19 from 4 PM to 8 PM at the Industry Hills Expo Center. For more information, please visit their Facebook event: <https://www.facebook.com/events/2290185297948235/>. The Sheriff Body-Worn Camera Project is continuing in its implementation. The current timeline suggests that the Sheriff stations will become equipped and upgraded to receive body cameras as early as summer 2020, and ongoing from then for each station. With regards to contract costs, the current estimated Deputy Sheriff Service Unit Rate is set to increase by 5% - 5.5%, upon finalization from the auditor controller. Total Sheriff Contract costs are expected to increase due to liability cost increases of 11% - 11.5%. With an increase in the Sheriff Service Unit Rate and liability costs, total contract costs are projected to increase by 5.5% - 6%.

Statewide Sales Tax Trends:

Restaurants and Hotels

FY19-20: Projected 2.5% growth – ↓ from 2.9% in July 2019

FY20-21: Projected 2.1% growth – ↑ from 2.0% in July 2019

Restaurant traffic has remained sluggish as low unemployment is making hiring and retention extremely difficult while food service options intensify competition within categories.

Restaurant operators increase menu prices as labor costs and lease rates continue to rise. In the short-term, the rising menu prices offset the slowing traffic stabilizing restaurant sales tax revenue.

Food and Drugs

FY19-20: Projected 1.9% growth – ↓ from 2.7% in July 2019

FY20-21: Projected 1.5% growth – ↓ from 2.0% in July 2019

Customers routinely express the desire to shop locally. Grocery chains are meeting this demand by establishing same day deliveries for online alcohol purchases and partnering with companies to establish micro-fulfillment centers. Pharmacies, also sensitive to purchaser preferences, are embracing technology in various ways. Artificial intelligence is being used more to create drugs while specialty medication and 3-D printed prescriptions become more common. Recent healthcare megamergers will impact this industry in 2020 and beyond. Taxes from this group will also grow as more cannabis businesses are licensed and become operational at the local level.

PUBLIC WORKS

ALPR Cameras Update: The installation of the Automatic License Plate Recognition (ALPR) Cameras (Phase 1) along Western Avenue is on-going. The five street light poles, which are needed for this project, have been delivered and are scheduled to be installed within the next couple of weeks. Subsequently, the cameras will be installed on these poles.

SCE Utility Undergrounding: Two Undergrounding Utility District projects are scheduled to be advertised by Southern California Edison (SCE) this month, utilizing the Rule 20A funding. These undergrounding utility districts are at: Palos Verdes South (between La Rotonda Drive and southern City limits) and Crenshaw Boulevard (between Crest Road and Valley View Road). SCE anticipates work to start by early summer 2020.

Palos Verdes Drive East Street Widening Project (Bronco Drive to Sunnyside Ridge): In response to Council input at its February 18th meeting, Staff is working on refining the breadth and scope of this project. The refined plans will be presented to the public at an outreach meeting on Tuesday, March 10, 2020, at the City Hall Community Room. The proposed improvements will occur along Palos Verdes Drive East and consist of widening PVDE between Bronco Drive and Upper Headland Drive and a new pedestrian/equestrian trail between Bronco Drive and Sunnyside Ridge. Notices announcing the outreach meeting were mailed to residents and interested parties on March 3, 2020.

Traffic Signal Installation at Via Rivera and Hawthorne Boulevard Update: Based on the City Council decision at the February 18th meeting, the Notice to Proceed for the engineering design services associated with the traffic signal installation at Via Rivera and Hawthorne Boulevard was issued on February 27, 2020, to Willdan Engineering.

Maintenance Activities: This week Public Works maintenance continues its regularly scheduled maintenance in City parks, medians, and beaches. PW landscaping crews focused this week on the right-of-way along Crest Rd from Hawthorne Blvd. to Sea Terrace Ave. Crews also completed working along Western Ave. and de-weeding that main arterial. Landscaping crew is now working along PVDS. Median crew also completed working along Trailriders Dr. and completed de-weeding on the medians along Hawthorne Blvd. from PVDS to northern City Limit. Mulch was also laid down on Calle Entradero to help prevent weed growth. PW also continues to focus on eliminating pests in City parks by utilizing all methods at its disposal. Irrigation repairs were done at Abalone Cove, Hawthorne Blvd., Calle Entradero and Ryan Park.

In the right-of-way, PW installed several signs and replaced missing or damaged signage on Highridge Rd., Indian Peak Rd. , Fond Du Lac Rd., Palos Verdes Drive South, and Crestridge. PW also made repairs to damaged sidewalks to improve pedestrian safety on Crestridge Rd., Flaming Arrow Dr. and Via Rivera. Parking lot maintenance paint stripping was completed at Ladera Linda Park.

Lastly, the PW Department continues to respond to emergency calls during regular business hours and after hours. Several sewer emergencies in the Portuguese Bend area were addressed and repaired this week. On Narcissa Dr., the last repair to a damaged main sewer lateral was completed, and the system was put back online with no issues. PW also responded

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
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to a resident on Narcissa Dr. in need of service. PW staff replaced the resident's sewer grinder pump within 24 hours of notification. Finally, on Fig Tree Rd., PW replaced that resident's sewer manhole cover after it had cracked.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Green Hills Memorial Park Improvements: On February 27, 2020, Green Hills' staff notified City Staff that several improvements to the drainage behind the Pacific Terrace Mausoleum were completed. This was in response to several neighbor concerns expressed during the recent City Council Compliance review meeting on February 21, 2020. To address the concerns about drainage and mildew, Green Hills added enclosed downspouts to capture the water draining from the mausoleum and connected the downspouts to an enclosed pipe, as seen in the photograph below:



Additionally, Green Hills has stated that they have switched to battery powered landscaping equipment to address neighbors' concerns regarding exhaust from the previously used gasoline powered equipment. Green Hills has also installed new security devices that alert them to activity on top of the mausoleum, so that they can be more proactive in monitoring this sensitive area.

City-Wide Wildlife Camera Program: Beginning Spring 2020, Code Enforcement Staff will be implementing a new Wildlife Camera program as an added tool to the Coyote Management Plan tool chest. As part of this effort, Staff purchased two Wildlife cameras also called "Critter Cams" that monitor coyote activity in certain hotspots throughout open space areas and private properties. The "Critter Cams" allow Staff to monitor coyote movement, behaviors, and composition of alleged coyote packs based on sightings that have been identified to pose a potential threat. The data collected could be used to identify aggressive coyotes and to assist in determining whether future trapping is warranted. Las Candalistas' Spring Fundraiser at the Point View Property: On April 23rd, Las Candalistas will hold their annual Spring Fundraiser at the Catalina View Events Garden located at 6001 Palos Verdes Drive South (Case No. PLSU2020-0004). The attached public notice will be

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mailed to the property owners within a 500' radius of the event location providing a 15-day comment period.

LAX/Community Noise Roundtable Meeting on March 11: The next Roundtable meeting is scheduled on Wednesday, March 11 beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Los Angeles International Airport's (LAX) Clifton A. Moore Administration Building, which is located at 1 World Way. While the meeting focus is addressing passenger jet noise concerns from communities such as Rancho Palos Verdes, residents may attend these meetings and voice their concerns directly to representatives from the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), which has jurisdiction over the airspace. RE: Call for Nominations for Metro South Bay Service Council

The South Bay Service Council has been in existence since 2003 and has been extremely successful. The dedicated people on our council have worked with Metro staff to make changes in service to improve efficiency and coordination of transit services provided by the Metro.

Service Council terms are staggered with 3 of the 9 positions expiring June 30 every year. The 3 members whose terms are expiring this June are: Ralph Franklin, Meighan Langlois and Luis Duran.

Elected officials can hold no more than 4 seats on the Service Council. Gardena Councilman Dan Medina who is serving on the Service Council as an elected official will be leaving public office in April so there will be one additional spot to fill his unexpired term. The seat held by Councilman Medina will be for the one year remaining on his term.

With this memo, the SBCCOG is opening nominations to fill the 3 expiring seats for a 3 year term and the 1 seat which is being vacated for a 1 year term. Those members whose terms are expiring can be nominated again. There are no term limits. The boundaries of the South Bay region include the SBCCOG cities with the addition of the Watts/Willowbrook and LAX areas of L.A. City. The nominees must either live or work within the South Bay region boundaries.

The remainder of this memo outlines the issues related to how the SBCCOG will nominate and recommend Service Council members to the Metro Board with the assistance of each of our member cities and the county. **This memo also initiates the nomination period for you to send the names of prospective candidates to the**

SBCCOG @ jacki@southbaycities.org with a short bio and reason why they should be selected. The deadline for nominations is Friday, March 20, 2020 @ 5:00 pm.

PURPOSE OF THE METRO SERVICE COUNCILS

To improve bus service; increase agency accessibility and responsiveness; promote greater coordination; create a more efficient and customer focused structure for the delivery of bus service. Key principles are to bring service decisions to the local level; localize control; maintain a single point of contact for route level service issues; streamline the decision-making process; and support agency policies, plans and safety initiatives.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE SERVICE COUNCIL MEMBERS

The Service Councils shall oversee the planning and implementation of service within their area. Their responsibilities include: meeting attendance as well as responding to meeting notices to ensure quorums, calling and conducting public hearings for sector bus lines within our region; approval and evaluation of Service Council programs; implementing service changes; reviewing and developing policy recommendations for Metro Board approval; ensuring compliance with all Metro policies and procedures and legal agreements (e.g. collective bargaining agreements, Consent Decree); providing input into the Service Council Director performance review; and participating in quarterly meetings with the Metro Chief Executive Officer, Deputy Chief Executive Officer, and other Service Councils' Representatives. In the South Bay, there is also a requirement that members of the Council ride transit each month and report their experiences.

Metro is in the midst of releasing the NextGen Bus Plan to the public. The Service Councils will convene public hearings regarding proposed major service changes in June 2020; then, in August 2020, the South Bay Cities Service Council will be responsible for reviewing the service proposals and voting to approve, modify, or deny changes to regional bus service on approximately 40 bus routes.

MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS

Members of the Council must reside or work within the Service Council boundaries; they may be elected officials and/or private citizens. The members of the Council should reflect a broad spectrum of interests and geographic areas of the Service Council region. Metro has set a requirement that at least 50% of the Council members must be consumers of transit service. A regular public transit user is defined as one normally using public transit multiple times each month. The SBCCOG has also historically considered not only transit users, but also businesses that have an employee transportation program, transit operator representatives, or others who hold positions or have some background that would otherwise provide some familiarity with public transit.

Metro strives to appoint Service Council members reflective of the demographics of the respective region. For your reference, the 2016 American Community Survey demographics of the South Bay Service Council region are:

The gender makeup of the Council is seven (7) men and two (2) women. This equates to 77.7% male and 22.2% female whereas Los Angeles County is 49.7% male and 50.3% female.

Membership is not transferable or assignable and is for a 3 year staggered term. Service Councils can have up to 9 members. Council members receive a meeting stipend of \$100 per meeting for a maximum of two meetings per month. They also receive a Metro badge that provides them unlimited use of Metro Bus and Rail services.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Service Council members are required to comply with Metro’s rigorous Code of Conduct. Provisions include: any one doing business with the Metro must register as a lobbyist and Council members may not accept gifts aggregating more than \$10 in a calendar month from a Metro registered lobbyist, lobbying firm or lobbyist employer. The full text of the Code of Conduct is available upon request. Service Council members are also required to complete an annual Form 700 Annual Statement of Economic Interests and to complete biennial AB 1234 Ethics training for local officials.

SBCCOG TIMETABLE

With the distribution of this memo, the SBCCOG nomination process for South Bay Service Council is started. The schedule for nominations is as follows:

- Friday, March 20 Nomination deadline
- Monday, April 13 Steering Committee will review nominations and forward their recommendations to the SBCCOG Board
- Thursday, April 23 SBCCOG Board will approve nominations to send to Metro Board
- Thursday, June 25 Metro Board ratifies South Bay Service Council members
- Friday, July 10 South Bay Service Council members are sworn in

SPECIFIC CONSIDERATIONS FOR SOUTH BAY SERVICE COUNCIL COMPOSITION

The SBCCOG Board of Directors has previously stated a strong preference that transit users or those familiar with the South Bay transit services be city council members and in no case shall elected officials represent a majority of the Board. Since other Service Councils have elected officials on their boards, the South Bay Service Council should include at least some elected officials in order to have the same “status” before the Metro Board as the other Service Councils. A mix of tenures on the Council at any given time has also served to preserve the historic or institutional memory of the Council.

Some other factors that were previously discussed for inclusion are the participation of:

- Our municipal operators – Gardena, Torrance, Redondo Beach & L.A. City
- Our community operators – Carson, PV Transit, Lawndale, Municipal Area Express

- Community members (Metro South Bay Citizens' Advisory Committee representatives? members from the Metro or municipal operators' Passenger Advisory Committees?)
- Cities with the most transit riders – Inglewood, L.A. City
- Employers in the South Bay that have transportation programs
- A City Manager, the COG, etc.
- A city Public Works Director/Transportation staff
- A senior transit user
- A School District Transportation representative
