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CITY MANAGER

Cal Water Update: On April 28, Cal Water announced that crews completed paving on Crenshaw Boulevard for the Palos Verdes Peninsula Water Reliability Project from the Rolling Hills United Methodist Church to Chadwick Lane, including the intersection of Crenshaw Boulevard and Palos Verdes Drive North. Crews are currently striping the newly paved portions of the road. We know nighttime construction on Crenshaw Boulevard hasn't been ideal and we are so thankful for your patience and understanding throughout this work.

As a reminder, there will continue to be smaller, periodic daytime closures along Crenshaw Boulevard, between Crest Road and the Rolling Hills United Methodist Church, until mid-2020 as crews continue finishing work, such as welding, grouting, and restoration. While some sporadic finishing work may continue into the night, all official night work hours are now complete.

Census Response Rate Challenge: Have you completed your 2020 Census? Responses to the census shape decisions about how billions of dollars in federal funds flow into communities each year for the next 10 years for critical services, including health care, emergency response, schools and education programs, and roads and bridges. The COVID-19 pandemic underscores the importance of census data and census participation.

As of April 29, Rancho Palos Verdes has a 68.5% self-response rate, 12.8% higher than the state's average self-response rate and 14.2% higher than the national average, and the second highest response rate of the Peninsula cities behind Palos Verdes Estates.

Partial Reopening of Parks: To provide residents with access to park space during the “Safer at Home” Order, at this time, the City has **partially** reopened five neighborhood parks on a trial basis. Only turf areas and walking paths are open in the following parks:

- Eastview Park (excluding the dog park)
- Frank A. Vanderlip Park
- Fred Hesse, Jr. Community Park
- Ladera Linda Park
- Robert E. Ryan Community Park

The City encourages residents to participate in recreational outdoor activity in their neighborhoods. If you visit these parks, please do so responsibly, be mindful of your interactions and wear a face covering. **All visitors MUST practice physical distancing**, staying 6 feet away from others not in their household. City Staff, Park Rangers and law enforcement are monitoring these areas to ensure compliance with public health directives. Pursuant to the City Council’s March 17 local emergency proclamation, **the City may close these areas if rules are not observed by the public and conditions become unsafe.**


STILL CLOSED

- Parking lots, restrooms, playgrounds, dog parks, basketball and tennis courts, baseball and soccer fields.
- Beaches, open space areas, the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve, and trails

STILL NOT ALLOWED

- Active sports or organized activities
- Group gatherings or activities

The City is considering a comprehensive reopening plan of more of its parks and open space area over the next few weeks that is managed and responsible. To that point, the City recognizes the health and well-being of our residents and employees as a top priority, and is committed to keeping them safe. We urge all residents to follow the “Safer at Home” Order and only leave their homes for essential activities. We also urge the public to diligently practice physical distancing, as it is the most effective tool we have to fight this pandemic. We all must do our part to “flatten the curve.”



Covid-19 Cases: As of April 29, there are 22,485 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across Los Angeles County, including the South Bay, so the public should not think one location is safer than another and everyone should be aware and practice physical distancing. The total includes **58 cases in Rancho Palos Verdes, 37 in Palos Verdes Estates, 13 in Rolling Hills Estates and one in Rolling Hills.** Countywide, 1,056 people have died.

According to the Department of Public Health, **nine deaths have been reported in Rancho Palos Verdes.** The City extends its deepest condolences to the families of these residents.

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For clarification, prior to the launch of the COVID-19 Surveillance Dashboard this week, the Department of Public Health was not providing death data broken down by community, so City Staff was unaware of the true number of deaths in RPV. Without this information from the county, City Staff was only able to share reported deaths if confirmed by the resident's family and/or media reports.

Heat Safety Tips: With the weather warming up and the Safer at Home Order in effect, the Department of Public Health would like to remind everyone that precautions should be taken to avoid heat-related illness, especially by older adults, young children, outdoor workers, athletes, and people with a chronic medical condition, among others, who are especially sensitive to negative health impacts from extreme heat.

Public Health offers the following recommendations during high temperatures:

- Drink plenty of water and keep hydrated throughout the day.
- If you must go out, plan your day to avoid going out during the hottest hours, and wear sunscreen. Wear lightweight, light-colored clothes, and bring a hat or umbrella with you.
- Cars get very hot. Don't leave children or pets in cars, and call 911 if you see a child or pet in a car alone.
- Beware of heat-related illness, like heat stroke and call 911 if you see these symptoms: high body temperature, vomiting, and pale and clammy skin.
- Check on those at risk, like the sick, older adults, pregnant women, and children.
- Avoid working out wearing face coverings or masks not intended for athletic purposes; this means avoiding contact with others while you work out.

L.A. County to Develop Plans to Ease “Safer at Home” Restrictions, Rebuild Economy: On April 28, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors directed the Department of Public Health, the Department of Health Services and other county departments to provide a report with details on measures needed to contain COVID-19 and prerequisites needed to relax the “Safer at Home” Order. The Chief Executive Office and Office of Emergency Management were also directed to develop a plan to engage the business community, nonprofits, city leaders and labor partners in any plans to relax restrictions of the Safer at Home directive. Both reports are due to back to the board within seven days.

Additionally, the board voted to establish a framework to rebuild and revive the economy, including:

- Creating an Economic Resiliency Task Force, comprised of business, industry, labor, and county and city leaders, to develop recommendations that leverage public-private partnerships to improve the economy, create jobs, and return to full employment
- Utilizing County assets to promote neighborhood revitalization, affordable housing, and economic opportunity
- Considering a permanent 501(c)3 County Fund for Los Angeles to raise private capital to support local businesses, employees, and underserved communities.
- Developing a Los Angeles County Works initiative to support a return to full employment through job training, subsidized employment opportunities, and youth employment programs
- Facilitating a working group devoted to fostering innovative ideas and initiatives from County employees, businesses, and labor partners that can streamline contracting and identify cost-savings actions
- Directing the Los Angeles County Office of Education to engage with state and federal Departments of Education and local school districts to create safe environments for youth that enable parents to return to work.

L.A. County Will Send Vote-By-Mail Ballot to Every Voter: On April 28, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a proposal by Supervisors Janice Hahn and Sheila Kuehl to send a vote-by-mail ballot to all eligible L.A. County voters for all elections—starting with the general election this November.

The current “Safer At Home” public health order is set to expire May 15, 2020 but health officials have acknowledged that some form of social distancing will be needed for an extended period of time and that “Safer At Home” orders may be reenacted if deemed necessary to slow the spread of COVID-19. These issues could present challenges for the General Election, including possibly hampering the recruitment of election workers or making it difficult for in-person voting locations to meet capacity demands while ensuring

social distancing.

The measure was passed unanimously Tuesday and will mean that the County of Los Angeles will send mail-in-ballots to every eligible voter in all elections starting with the November 3, 2020 General Election.

In addition, the Registrar-Recorder will take appropriate measures to align in-person voting options for the General Election with guidance from the Department of Public Health to ensure the safety of both voters and election workers.

Governor Newsom Announces Initiatives to Support Older Californians During COVID-19 Pandemic: Last week, Governor Gavin Newsom announced a series of initiatives to support vulnerable older Californians who are isolating at home during California's stay at home order. California is launching a first-in-the nation meal delivery program, a partnership to make wellness check-in calls, and the expansion of Friendship Line California to help combat social isolation. These actions will support the approximately 1.2 million Californians over the age of 65 who live alone.

Governor Newsom Announces Additional Relief for Californians Impacted by COVID-19: Last week, Governor Gavin Newsom announced that most private student loan servicers have agreed to provide payment and other relief to borrowers, including more than 1.1 million Californians with privately held student loans. He also signed an executive order to stop debt collectors from garnishing COVID-19-related financial assistance.

The federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act provided much-needed relief for students with federal loans, including the suspension of monthly payments, interest, and involuntary collection activity until September 30, 2020. However, the CARES Act did not address millions of student loan borrowers with federal loans that are not owned by the U.S. government as well as loans made by private lenders. The initiative announced today gives direct help to those borrowers.

\$484 Billion Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act Signed into Law: Last week, Congress passed and President Trump signed into law the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act to provide additional COVID-19 relief to small businesses and hospitals. The bill provides an additional \$310 billion in funding for the PPP; adds \$50 billion to the U.S. Small Business Administration's Disaster Loans Program; increases disaster grants by \$10 billion; and offers \$75 billion to hospitals and health care workers for necessities like personal protective equipment.

New COVID-19 Symptoms Added to CDC List: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has added the following six symptoms to its list of COVID-19 symptoms: chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell.

These are in addition to previously known symptoms of fever, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing.

When to Seek Medical Attention

If you have any of these emergency warning signs* for COVID-19, get medical attention immediately:

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion or inability to arouse
- Bluish lips or face

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*This list is not all inclusive. Please consult your medical provider for any other symptoms that are severe or concerning to you.

Call 911 if you have a medical emergency: Notify the operator that you have, or think you might have, COVID-19. If possible, put on a cloth face covering before medical help arrives.

South Bay Fiber Network (SBFN) Update: A service agreement with Race Communications, the operator of the South Bay Fiber Network has been finalized and will be presented to the City Council during the May 5, 2020 meeting for approval. With the signed contract, all necessary permits secured and the construction already scheduled for early May, it is expected that the City Hall will be fully connected to the SBFN within a couple of months. A high speed capacity broadband network will allow the South Bay cities to embrace the digital economy, smart city initiatives, integrated utilities and next-generation economic development. When this project is complete RPV City Hall will be connected to an ultra-fast Internet circuit and be able to utilize a 1Gb/s speed for a below-market price of \$1,000/month. The SBCCOG issued its first SBFN Newsletter called "Connect" that provides a big picture update on the overall progress in terms of both construction and connection to the SBFN. FINANCE

Small Business Financial Assistance Plan Update: On April 8, 2020 the City of Rancho Palos Verdes began implementing the City Council-approved Small Business Financial Assistance Plan in an effort to provide relief and promote the general welfare of the City's small business community experiencing negative financial impacts stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Small Business Financial Assistance Plan is comprised of two pieces: a one-time refund of the 2020 business license tax and a community development block grant (CDBG) stimulus.

Since the implementation on April 8, the City has received 14 requests for business license tax refunds. We encourage businesses in need of assistance to visit <http://www.rpvca.gov/1284/Financial-Assistance> for information on the program and to submit a request. Businesses that apply will receive a confirmation email from staff. If an application is approved a check will be mailed directly to the business at the address on file. To date, the City has received 14 business license tax refund requests.

The CDBG stimulus approved by the City Council authorized the use of \$116,500 in Community Development Block Grant funds to provide loans and grants to low and moderate-income owners of businesses with five or fewer employees. These funds could be used for short-term working capital for operating expenses to retain jobs and support service delivery. In the coming weeks City staff will provide more details of the small business loan program and how to apply.

Taxpayers Should Be Aware of Coronavirus-Related Scams: Taxpayers should be on the lookout for IRS impersonation calls, texts and email phishing attempts about the coronavirus or COVID-19 Economic Impact Payments. These scams can lead to tax-related fraud and identity theft.

Here's what taxpayers should know:

- The IRS will not call, email or text you to verify or request your financial, banking or personal information.
- Watch out for websites and social media attempts to request money or personal information. The official website is IRS.gov.
- Don't open surprise emails that look like they're coming from the IRS or click on attachments or links.
- Taxpayers should not provide personal or financial information or engage with potential scammers online or over the phone.
- Forward suspicious emails to phishing@irs.gov, then delete.
- Go to [IRS.gov](https://www.irs.gov) for the most up-to-date information.

Here's what people should know about the Economic Impact Payments:

- The IRS will automatically deposit Economic Impact Payments into the bank account taxpayers provided on their 2019 or 2018 tax return for a direct deposit of their tax refund.

- Those without a direct deposit account on file may be able to provide their banking information online through a new secure tool, Get My Payment.
- Anyone who is eligible for an Economic Impact Payment and doesn't provide direct deposit information will receive a payment mailed to the last address the IRS has on file.
- The IRS does not charge a fee to issue the payment.

Scammers may:

- Ask an individual to sign over their Economic Impact Payment check to them.
- Ask for verification of personal or banking information.
- Suggest that they can get someone tax refund or Economic Impact Payment faster by working on their behalf.
- Issue a bogus check, often in an odd amount, then tell a person to call a number or verify information online in order to cash it.

PUBLIC WORKS

Capital Improvement Workshop: On Monday, April 27, the City Council conducted a virtual (“Zoom”) workshop to consider the City’s Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for the upcoming 2020-21 fiscal year. During the workshop, staff presented a status of projects in the 2019-20 budget and made a number of recommendations for the 2020-21 fiscal year and beyond. Recommendations included deferring non-essential projects to future years to address the downturn in the economy in light of the COVID-19 health crisis and funding essential public safety projects based on the projected revenues for FY20-21 without relying on reserves. Several members of the public participated in the meeting including Chairman Don Swanson of the Infrastructure Management Advisory Committee. The City Council provided staff direction on the proposed projects for further consideration at its May 19 meeting. Traffic Safety Committee (TSC) Meeting: The TSC held a special virtual (“zoom”) meeting on April 28. One item on the agenda, the proposed Palos Verdes Drive East roadway widening project, attracted several participants and listeners. After hearing residents and further discussions, the TSC approved staff’s recommendation which consists of widening the Palos Verdes Drive East roadway between Bronco Drive and Upper Headland Drive and constructing a decomposed granite pedestrian/equestrian path between Bronco Drive and Sunnyside Ridge Road which will connect to the recently constructed trail. This project is tentatively scheduled to be considered by the City Council at its May 19 meeting.

Brush Clearing Event Continues: The EDCO bi-annual Citywide brush clearing continues. The total of excess brush collected from the Monday and Tuesday routes was 12.56 tons. It appears that residents are utilizing their time “safer at home” by removing excess weeds, brush, tree branches, etc. from their property in anticipation of the summer months with the hope of preventing or reducing the chances of brush fire. Staff thanks EDCO for offering this free extra service to residents. On Saturday, May 2, the excess brush from the Wednesday route will be collected.

Recycling Events Cancelled: Staff sent reminders, via social media and breaking news, that the Document Shredding Event and the Household Hazardous Waste/Electronic Waste Roundup (HHW) events previously scheduled on 5/2/20 and 5/30/20 respectively, have been cancelled. At this time, the next scheduled document shredding event is on Saturday, October 17. However, the County has notified staff that there will be no HHW roundup event in PV until 2021.

Maintenance Activities: This week Public Works continues its regularly scheduled maintenance in City parks, medians, and beaches, removing trash, debris, and tending to the landscape throughout the City and the parks. The landscape crew finished working along Crest Rd. and the right-of-way along Miraleste Dr. and 1st street and are now working along the Palos Verdes Drive East median. Landscapers also finished working along Palos Verdes Drive South between Terranea Way and Hawthorne Blvd. and Sea Cove Dr. and Terranea Way. Currently, the landscaping crew is working along Forrestal Dr. The irrigation technician made repairs along Calle Entradero, Hesse Park, and City Hall. In the right-of-way, Public Works painted 125 feet of red curb along Palos Verdes Drive West near Via Laredo to help improve

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traffic flow and safety. Public Works also continued its tree trimming efforts along Western Ave. focusing on Palm tree trimming and inspection this week. The Public Works graffiti abatement program is ongoing. Public Works responded to and removed graffiti from sixteen locations this week.



During the Citywide closures this week, Public Works and the Parks Department staff continued to work closely to keep COVID-19 closure barriers up and tamper-free to help reduce unauthorized entry to City parks and open spaces. Public Works continues to respond to emergency calls during regular business hours and after hours. On Western Ave., while trimming the main arterial trees, Public Works found a split palm tree, which was removed before becoming a safety issue (see photo below). On Rue Langlois, residents reported a significant water leak down a hillside that was creating mud and debris to slide down the hill. Public Works responded and found a resident's irrigation line had broken on Rue Valois. Public Works worked with the resident to identify the leak. Lastly, over the weekend, the Public Works Department received reports of illegal tree cutting in the City right-of-way on Palos Verdes Drive East and Via Frascati. Several trees were trimmed without authorization. Public Works responded and stopped any further trimming from taking place.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Approval of Minor Modification Request for Landscape Plan Revisions at 5500 Palos Verdes Drive South: On April 20, the Interim Director of Community Development issued a Notice of Decision (Attached) approving Minor Modification No. 1 that modifies a Planning Commission-approved project and landscape plan at 5500 Palos Verdes Drive South (Case No. ZON2017-00115). The proposed landscape revisions include the rearrangement of plant palettes and the decrease of plant densities at the recommendation of the Los Angeles County Fire Department. A copy of the Notice of Decision was provided to interested parties including the Palos Verdes Peninsula Land Conservancy and other State Wild Life Agencies.

Residential Fire on Grayslake Road: On Friday, April 24, the City was informed of a residential fire on the 26900 block of Grayslake Road that involved a small kitchen fire with no structural damage to report.

Peafowl Management Program Update: On April 21, 2020, the City Council authorized a one-year suspension of Peafowl trappings throughout the City. Green Hills Memorial Park Update: Pursuant to Condition No. 31 of City Council-approved Resolution No. 2020-03, Green Hills is required to submit maps to the Director of Community Development at least 30-days prior to recordation with the Los Angeles County Recorder's Office. On April 21, 2020, Green Hills submitted several maps for various areas of the property that will be submitted to the County for recordation after May 21, 2020. RECREATION & PARKS

Coordinated Planning Efforts to Reopen Parks: Recreation, Parks, and Open Space staff will be participating in the April 30 and May 7 meetings held by the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation to discuss plans on reopening trails and related park facilities. These meetings will convene key stakeholders and land managers as they work to develop restrictions and requirements needed to safely reopen trails and parks in a manner that abides by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health COVID-19 orders. Forty-one agencies have been invited to participate in these meetings. Some specific topics the meetings will cover are preliminary criteria for re-opening trails and parks, and developing preliminary reopening plans. Individual agencies and land managers will likely have plans and timelines that differ due to different management factors. However, it is helpful for all agencies to collaborate and share information on strategies as agencies' develop their plans. The Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation will be working with the Department of Public Health to review the recommendations and restrictions in the plans.

Partial Reopening of 5 City Parks: As reported under the City Manager heading, this past weekend, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes partially re-opened walking paths and turf areas at five select parks for passive activities. The majority of park amenities, including buildings, playgrounds, dog parks, parking lots, restrooms, game courts, and ballfields, continue to be closed until at least May 15. Additionally, all beaches, reserves in the Palos Verdes Nature Preserve and other open space locations, including trails, staging areas, and viewpoints, continue to be closed until at least May 15. All park programming continue to be cancelled until at least May 15. This includes all recreational activities, indoor and outdoor sports leagues, instructional courses, and group sessions/private events and City special events.

This past week, Recreation and Parks Staff, Open Space Management and Park Rangers continued to enforce closures in multiple areas, including trailheads, parks and preserve.

South Bay Fiber Network

April Newsletter 2020

Project Highlights

As our nation, state, and local communities work through the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic, work on the South Bay Fiber Network moved forward. Seen as an “essential” utility, American Dark Fiber and its sub-contractors, HP Communications and Race Communications, continue their work, to complete the South Bay Cities Council of Governments’ work orders for the construction of the “core ring” and connection of the first of group of charter cities and agency members to the network.

Welcome to the Network!

On April 2nd, the City of El Segundo became the very first of the 15 South Bay cities to connect to the SBFN! Taking advantage of the great pricing for IT service, the City signed on for 10 GB rather than just 1 GB. City staff stated that “It was too good a deal not to sign-up for the extra bandwidth.”

Interestingly, not a shovel of dirt was lifted to make this happen. Rather, it was as simple “cross-connect” at Equinix (one of the SBFN’s POPs). Said the ADF engineer who plugged in El Segundo, “it was as simple as pulling fiber from one box to another.”

CONSTRUCTION STATUS

Shovels are in the ground and the permitting and construction of the network is well underway. HP Communications reports that 100% of permits for Phase 1 of the project have been secured and approximately 50% of permits for the second phase are in-hand. HP Teams are working safely and fast to complete all the right of way builds followed by lateral connections to the SBFN sites. The “core ring” that is the backbone of the network will be operational in May and the first group of city and agency laterals will all be operational by early July.



CONNECTION STATUS

Anticipation for connection to the new network continues as each city and agency works through their budget and approval process to complete their respective service level agreements with Race Communications—the SBFN’s ISP service provider. To date, all SBFN entities have been contacted and nine contracts have been signed for a total of \$13,500 towards the network’s monthly revenue goals —well on the way towards the total SBCCOG goal of \$35,000 per month service contracts. As Race continues its outreach efforts and support of each agency’s service contract process, it also continues its work to schedule and deploy the IT equipment at each site location. This new hardware will “light” the circuits that will connect SBFN members to the network.

El Segundo has already joined the SBFN and, as the “core ring” is completed, we can expect a rolling wave of lateral connections—beginning in May through early July—to different sites across the South Bay.

COVID-19 STATUS

While our South Bay communities “shelter safely” at home,

work on the SBFN continues. Telecommunications projects, like this one, are considered as an “essential” service which makes sense given the extraordinary IT capacity needed for city workers and local residents to efficiently work from home. Working under these emergency conditions requires, as Nick Goldman, President of HP Communications says, “a safety first mentality.” You can be sure that our SBFN work crews are doing their best to keep safe by wearing masks and working at safe distances from one another.



APPLICATIONS STATUS

Connection to the SBFN offers a new digital era for cities and public agencies. Opportunities for “Digital Innovation” are in development and the SBCCOG is leading the way. Come this summer, SBFN members can look forward to “IT Lunch & Learn” forums as well as the roll-out of Metro RIITS and LA County’s IEN programs on the network.

 - Artemisia California (California Sagebrush)


