### **RPVtv's "Around the Peninsula" Features the Boys & Girls Clubs of the L.A. Harbor**

In the latest edition of RPVtv's "Around the Peninsula," host Liz Brown Swanson travels to San Pedro and explores L.A. County's biggest Boys & Girls Club operation gearing up to reopen the doors at seven sites for summer camp. L.A. Harbor Boys & Girls Clubs Executive Director Mike Lansing and his team share the challenges of serving thousands of youths and families in need during the pandemic and highlight the club's nationally-recognized College Bound program. ### **RPV Could Receive \$20,000 in Monsanto PCB Class Action Settlement**

On July 7, the City was notified that Rancho Palos Verdes is among 2,500 government entities across that country that could receive funds from a pending \$550 million class action settlement with the Monsanto Company for alleged pollution. According to court documents, Rancho Palos Verdes could receive \$20,000 in settlement funds.

Between the 1930s and 1977, the Monsanto Company ("Monsanto") manufactured industrial chemicals called polychlorinated biphenyls ("PCBs") that were used as insulating fluids in electrical equipment in power plants, industries, and large buildings, as well as being present in sewer lines and storm drain facilities. In 1979, two years after Monsanto stopped manufacturing PCBs, the Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") banned PCBs in the United States. The EPA found that PCBs were a suspected cause of birth defects and cancer in animals and other harmful effects in the immune, reproductive, and nervous systems in humans.

In 2015, cities began to file lawsuits against Monsanto, the sole producer of PCBs, alleging that PCBs contaminated storm water, wastewater systems, water bodies, sediment, natural resources, fish and wildlife. In June 2020, 13 government entities filed a motion to approve a \$550 million class action settlement with Monsanto to resolve the ongoing litigation. The settlement also provides funds for a proposed class of 2,528

other government entities that the parties believe were similarly impacted by the PCB contamination. The settlement funds are intended to go toward the protection of local waterways and the mitigation and monitoring of PCBs.

The settlement agreement is awaiting approval before Judge Fernando M. Olguin in the Central District of California. If approved, a class of 2,528 governmental entities nationwide may be eligible for payouts from the settlement fund.

### **Letter Opposing SB 902**

Following last night's authorization by the City Council, today, Staff sent a letter to Senator Scott Wiener opposing SB 902 (see attachments). The bill would allow, but not require, local governments to adopt zoning ordinances that bypass CEQA review for housing developments of up to 10 units per parcel, at a height specified in the ordinance, if the parcel is located in a "transit-rich" area, a "jobs-rich" area, or an urban infill site. Although provisions that would allow by-right construction of duplexes, triplexes and fourplexes in single-family zones have been removed, the City opposes the bill because it could negatively impact residents of neighboring cities that rezone parcels for such projects, among other concerns. Staff will continue to monitor this bill.

### **Letters Opposing AB 2167 and SB 292**

Following last night's authorization by the City Council, today, Staff sent a letter to Assemblymember Tom Daly opposing AB 2167, as well as a letter to Senator Susan Rubio opposing SB 292 (see attachments). These bills would make it easier for insurance companies to raise rates on homeowners in areas at high risk for wildfires by circumventing consumer protections and processes established by Proposition 103. Staff will continue to monitor these bills.

### **Letter Regarding School Reopening Plans**

Following last night's authorization by the City Council, today, Staff sent a letter to state and county officials concurring with the myriad concerns with local and statewide school reopening plans raised by Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified Superintendent Dr.

Alex Cherniss and other superintendents throughout Los Angeles County (see attachments). The letter recognized the challenges of bringing students and teachers back to school in a manner that is safe to reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19, but noted that many of the guidelines are likely to be unattainable, especially since schools lack the funding and resources needed to implement them. Staff will continue to monitor local and statewide school reopening plans.

## League of California Cities Priority Bills

On July 6, the League of California Cities shared a list of priority bills from the remainder of the Legislative session (see attachments). The State Assembly was scheduled to return July 13 from its summer recess. However, it was announced that due to Assembly staff and Assemblymember Autumn Burke testing positive for COVID-19, the Assembly will be delaying its return and will be adjusting its committee hearings schedule. The League will provide updates as they become available. The Legislature has to adjourn by August 31, so this will create additional compaction of the Assembly's schedule to conduct its business. Staff will continue to monitor these bills, with particular interest in those pertaining to housing and wildfire prevention. Brief summaries and links to the full text of these bills are included in the attached list from the League.

## Census Response Rate Challenge

As of July 6, **Rancho Palos Verdes has a 75.3% self-response rate**, 12.2% higher than the state's average self-response rate and 13.4% higher than the national average. RPV has the second highest response rate of the Peninsula cities behind Palos Verdes Estates.

## COVID-19 Cases

As of July 7, there were 120,539 confirmed cases of COVID-19 across Los Angeles County (population 10.17 million), including the South Bay, so the public should not think one location is safer than another and everyone should be aware and practice physical distancing. The total includes 156 cases in Rancho Palos Verdes (population 41,731), 57 in Palos Verdes Estates (population 13,190), 26 in Rolling Hills Estates (population 8,066) and three in Rolling Hills (population 1,874). Countywide, 3,579 people have died.

According to the Department of Public Health, 12 deaths have been reported in Rancho Palos Verdes. The City extends its deepest condolences to the families of these residents.

### **Coronavirus Relief Fund (CARES Act) Allocations for Cities and Counties**

On July 1, the City was notified that the California Department of Finance issued an application for cities to receive direct allocations from \$500 million in Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding. Funds are to be used by October 30, 2020 and are applicable for eligible COVID-19 expenses incurred starting on March 1, 2020. Governor Newsom signed the state budget on June 29, which included \$500 million of CARES Act funding for cities — \$225 million for cities with populations greater than 300,000 and \$275 million for cities with populations less than 300,000. Each city will receive a minimum amount of \$50,000. In order to receive the monies, the City submitted a certification form (see attachments) of adherence to federal guidance, the state's stay-at-home requirements and other health requirements as directed in gubernatorial Executive Order N-33-20, any subsequent executive orders or statutes, and all California Department of Public Health orders, directives, and guidance issued in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency.

## Emergency Preparedness



### Wildfire Preparedness Webinar

Today, Staff attended the first in a series of webinars on wildfire preparedness hosted by the League of California Cities.

Malibu City Manager Reva Feldman and Santa Rosa City Manager Sean McGlynn discussed measures cities can take to establish and approve plans to prepare for a wildfire emergency in the COVID-19 environment. The session covered:

- Creating a new and early messaging plan to change residents' behaviors
- Establishing local supply chains to get PPEs and safety gear
- Designing shelter plans to account for social distancing
- Checking to see what fire prevention resources and programs are still available after COVID-19
- Identifying emergency plan and response challenges due to the pandemic



## **Emergency Preparedness Tip**

### **Ready! Set! Go!**

Using these three words, you can prepare your own Wildfire Action Plan and be prepared should a wildfire threaten your home.

#### **Ready!**

You can help protect your property by creating defensible space around your home. That means removing brush for a minimum of 100 feet. Be sure there are no tree limbs hanging over your house and the roof and gutters are free of leaves, pine needles and other debris. Make sure ornamental shrubbery is set back from the sides of your home and that leaves under them are cleared away. One of the most common dangers in a wildfire is free-falling embers landing in these places and igniting your home.

Replace shake-shingle roofs with tile or other fire-resistant materials. Use fire-safe building materials when constructing or remodeling your home and plant fire-resistant landscaping.

Assemble emergency supplies and prepare a list of the things you want to take with you if you need to evacuate. Remember to think about things like cash, medications, phone chargers, computers and food for your pets. Plan your escape routes; you should know at least two different ways out of your neighborhood.

#### **Set!**

If a wildfire threatens your neighborhood, act immediately. Back your vehicle into the driveway with the hood (front) facing the street. Next, roll up the windows, and load your vehicle with everything you want to take with you. Make certain your valuables are either in your vehicle, or are safely stored in a (fireproof) safe.

Remove flammable materials from around your house. This includes patio furniture, firewood, decorations and anything else that could catch fire. Then monitor the news and your fire department's website for information regarding the fire.

#### **Go!**

In the past, the Los Angeles Fire Department and other city agencies suggested residents await evacuation instructions prior to leaving their homes. The latest information

suggests that you should not wait to be told to leave. Go early! If you've followed the suggestions noted here as well as related publications on the subject, you've already done what you can to protect your home and property. Firefighters need room in which to work. By leaving, you give them the best chance to protect your property.

## FINANCE DEPARTMENT

### Small Business Financial Assistance Plan Update

On April 8, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes implemented the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan in an effort to provide relief and promote the general welfare of the City's small business community experiencing negative financial impacts stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic. The Small Business Financial Assistance Plan provides a one-time refund of the 2020 business license tax.



On June 2, the City Council received a status report on the Small Business Financial Assistance Plan. As a result of the low response, the City Council expressed a desire to increase the number of eligible small businesses by removing the limitation that a small business must have a “brick-and-mortar” location in order to be eligible to receive a refund.

Since the implementation on April 8 and the changes on June 2:

- the City has received 18 requests for business license tax refunds
- 10 of the 18 requests were not eligible for the program
- eight refunds totaling \$2,841 have been issued to date

submit a request. Businesses that apply will receive a confirmation email from Staff. If an application is approved, a check will be mailed directly to the business at the address on file.

## May Treasurer's Report

The May Treasurer's Report was presented to the City Council on July 7. The overall cash balance of the City totaled \$66,028,324, with more than \$32.9 million (50%) invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). The City has more than \$5.9 million (9%) of the total cash balance with Bank of the West



and over \$4.2 million (6%) with Malaga Bank. Additionally, the City has \$22.75 million (35%) held in Certificates of Deposit (CD) and Treasury Bills and \$0.1 million (less than 1%) in a money market account with Vining Sparks, our investment brokerage firm. The City's securities are held by the Bank of New York and are FDIC-insured.

In summary, the City's General Fund has over \$23.1 million (35%) in cash balance, and the Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) Fund has over \$25.5 million (39%) in cash balance. The remaining cash balances are in the Equipment Replacement Fund with over \$2.6 million (4%) over \$1.2 million (2%) in the 1911 Act Fund, over \$0.8 million (1%) in the Habitat Restoration Fund, over \$1.1 million (2%) in the Quimby Fund, and over \$11.4 million (17%) in Other Restricted Funds.

## Employee Compensation Reports

To provide greater transparency for the public regarding compensation and benefits received by City employees, the Finance Department prepares two employee compensation reports annually based on wages paid in a calendar year.

The first report is required by the California State Controller's Office (SCO) under the Government Compensation in California Program. The report captures Medicare wages and benefit information for all compensated employees, commissioners, and elected officials. The report is due to the State of California every year by April 30.



The second report, the Employee Compensation and Benefit Analysis, is a comprehensive report established by the City Council in 2013. Since then, the City has continued to prepare this report and it has expanded to include the goal of capturing all types of pay and benefits, not just Medicare wages. The compensation report includes employee information, wages, auto allowances, overtime, declined health insurance, bonuses, severance, vacation buyouts, pension contributions, health insurance, ancillary insurance, and retirement health savings. Additionally, the report includes accounting of all leave time earned during the year. The Finance Department prepares this report in February once W-2 forms have been issued.

Furthermore, to validate the report, the City's auditor, White Nelson Diehl Evans, conducts an Agreed-Upon Procedure audit in March-April and issues an audit report in May. Once the audit report has been issued, the Finance Department takes the report to the City Council for approval. Since 2013, the City has continued to receive audit reports with no exceptions noted (meaning clean audits). On June 2, the City Council received and filed the compensation report and audit report for calendar year 2019.

On June 15, as part of the final process of the annual report, on behalf of the City Council, the City Manager sent the City's in-house compensation report to SCO. The purpose of this letter is to express the City's appreciation of SCO's extensive efforts to ensure transparency on compensation. Additionally, the letter expressed the City's desire for SCO to examine the City's methodologies in preparing the compensation report. The letter advocated that SCO's efforts could bolster statewide reporting by capturing all other pay and benefits that the City pays for, not just wages that are subject to Medicare. ## PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

### ALPR Cameras

The installation of automated license plate recognition (ALPR) cameras on five new streetlight poles along Western Avenue (Phase 1) is complete and the cameras are operational.

The ALPR cameras for Phase 2 have been installed at all 12 existing streetlight poles. At this time, only half have been powered and calibrated. The City and SCE are working to have the remaining installations powered, calibrated and completed.



### Rebate for Streetlights

This week, the City received a rebate check of \$208,102.20 from SCE related to the City's conversion of 1,450 acquired streetlights to LED (light emitting diode) fixtures. The energy savings alone was expected to pay for the cost of the new fixtures over time, but the received rebate covers more than 40% of the cost of the new fixtures. The City

completed the purchase of the streetlights in June 2019, and the conversion to LED fixtures was completed in December 2019.

## **Maintenance Activities**

This week, Public Works continued its regularly scheduled maintenance, trash pickup and general irrigation repairs at all City parks and facilities. Roadway brush clearance continued in the right-of-way as well. Landscape maintenance continues along Palos Verdes Drive South from Abalone Cove to Terranea Way. Median crews continued working along Crest Road East.

The Public Works Department responded to the following emergency requests:

- Power loss at PVIC. Power was re-established with the emergency generator.
- A sewer issue on Figtree Road over Fourth of July weekend.
- A broken branch was cleared on Longhill Drive.
- Twenty-one graffiti removal cases were addressed during the holiday week.

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

## **Community Development Department's Workload Analysis**

The workload of the four divisions in Community Development Department is being tracked to monitor activity levels in light of the current conditions and to assess staffing levels. Attached are four charts: one for each of the four divisions (Building, Planning, Code and View). These charts show some of the key measures of workload for each group by month starting in January 2020. The two largest divisions (Building & Safety and Planning) show a large drop in cases starting near the time of the temporary closure of City Hall (March 15). With regard to the Planning Division, case numbers and fees began to increase between May and June, which can be attributed to increased submittal activity since City Hall reopened on May 18. For the Building Division, new cases have not rebounded, but inspection requests and fees have increased. For the View Restoration and Code Enforcement divisions, the total numbers are minimal each month that while this data is helpful, it is not easy to draw any conclusions. Staff will continue to monitor and update this report monthly and respond to maintain service levels.

## **Short-Term Rental Monitoring Update**

On April 3, Host Compliance began monitoring short-term rentals in the City. Host Compliance is the City's contract company used for monitoring violations of the prohibition of short-term rentals. The City has issued 28 Notice of Violation letters to non-compliant property owners as a result of the monitoring services. To date, seven properties continue to be non-complaint. Staff will issue administrative citations to all non-compliant properties and continue to provide monthly monitoring updates.

## **LAX/Community Noise Roundtable Virtual Meeting July 8**

Tonight, Los Angeles World Airports (LAWA) staff will host the next Roundtable Virtual Meeting at 6:30 p.m. The meeting focus is addressing noise concerns caused by passenger jets arriving and departing from Los Angeles International Airport (LAX).


## Going Forth on the Fourth


The City of Rancho Palos Verdes opposes SB 902, the latest incarnation of legislation attempting to impose dense, multi-unit housing on our communities. Though we agree with the removal of provisions that would allow by-right construction of duplexes, triplexes and fourplexes in single-family zones, we remain concerned that this bill will negatively impact cities that do not elect to use the zoning tool it creates. If a neighboring city were to rezone a parcel for a project of up to 10 units along the city border, our residents would be impacted, but would be unable to voice their concerns via the CEQA review process. Like SB 50, this bill fails to take into account real differences between California cities and a multitude of other needs and factors – such as geological and fire hazard concerns affecting our City.

Additionally, SB 902 leaves “jobs-rich areas” to be determined by the Department of Housing and Community Development and the Office of Planning and Research. More specificity is needed to meaningfully understand where these projects could be built.

Finally, in light of the COVID-19 pandemic, we do not believe this is the time for legislation designed to increase population density. Investigation and analysis is needed into the potential health risks – to everybody – of any such proposed legislation, including potential impacts on community transmission.

For these reasons, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes opposes SB 902.

**Environmental Quality****California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)****AB 3279 (Friedman) California Environmental Quality Act. Administrative and Judicial Procedures.**

This measure would revise CEQA litigation procedures by:

- Reducing the deadline for a court to commence hearings from one year to 270 days;
- Provide that a lead agency may decide whether a plaintiff prepares the administrative record; and
- Authorizes a court to issue an interlocutory remand, if certain findings are made.

League Position: Pending

**Climate Change****AB 3256 (E. Garcia) Economic Recovery, Wildfire Prevention, Safe Drinking Water, Drought Preparation, and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2020.**

This measure would put a \$6.980 billion bond for a wildfire prevention, safe drinking water, climate resilience, drought preparation, and flood protection program on the November 2020 ballot for voter approval.

League Position: Support

**SB 45 (Allen) Wildfire Prevention, Safe Drinking Water, Drought Preparation, and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2020.**

This measure would put a \$5.51 billion bond for wildfire prevention, safe drinking water, drought preparation, and flood protection programs on the November 2020 ballot for voter approval.

League Position: Support

**Emergency/Disaster Preparedness and Response****AB 2178 (Levine) Emergency Services.**

This measure would amend the California Emergency Services Act to additionally include “deenergization,” defined as a planned public safety power shutoff, within those conditions constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency. Similar to [SB 862](#) (Dodd).

League Position: Support

**SB 378 (Wiener) Electrical Corporations. Deenergization Events. Procedures. Allocation of Costs. Reports.**

This measure would require electrical corporations, such as Pacific Gas and Electric, Southern California Edison, and San Diego Gas and Electric, to collect more data on their equipment and ensure that costs accrued by local governments and customers during a utility-initiated power shutoff are recovered in a timely manner. This measure would also establish a civil penalty imposed on electrical corporations during a deenergization event as determined by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC). Electrical corporations must also notify cities and counties as early as possible of any utility-initiated power shutoff, and provide all specific local information.

League Position: Support

**SB 862 (Dodd) Planned Power Outage. Public Safety.**

This measure would amend the California Emergency Services Act to additionally include a deenergization event within a sudden and severe energy shortage constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency.

This measure would also require electrical corporations to:

- Include protocols that deal specifically with access and functional need individuals;
- Coordinate with local governments to establish community resource centers;

- Perform any necessary electrical upgrades to ensure that a mobile backup generator can be located at a community resource center during a deenergization event; and
- Is similar to [AB 2178](#) (Levine).

League Position: Support

**[SB 1099](#) (Dodd) Emergency Backup Generators. Critical Facilities. Order for Abatement. Stipulations.**

This measure would require air districts to develop stipulations for an order of abatement that would allow permitted facilities to use backup generators exceeding hour limits, if facilities choose to enter into a stipulated order of abatement (SOA) with the local air district. This measure would dictate some terms of that SOA, including reporting of use, and a schedule for replacing older polluting generators with the cleanest, feasible, applicable technology that is economically feasible.

League Position: Pending

**[SB 1185](#) (Moorlach) Emergency Backup Generators. Emergency Variance. Operation during Deenergization Events.**

This measure would require a facility permittee, when applying for an emergency variance from backup generator runtime rules, to demonstrate they are using the cleanest, feasible, available backup power source. This includes, but not limited to, natural gas-powered generators.

League Position: Oppose\* (letter pending)

Energy and Utilities

**[SB 350](#) (Hill) The Golden State Energy Act.**

This measure would authorize the creation of a non-profit public benefit corporation, Golden State Energy (GSE), to acquire the Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) Corporation under specified circumstances, including in the event PG&E does not emerge from Chapter 11 bankruptcy. This bill would provide specified actions should PG&E not emerge from bankruptcy or have its CPUC-issued license revoked. The Governor signed this bill on June 30.

League Position: Watch

**[SB 1312](#) (McGuire) Electrical Corporations. Deenergization.**

This measure would propose a number of requirements related to reducing wildfire risks and proactive power shutoffs by electric investor-owned utilities (IOUs). Including:

- Requiring a revision to the CPUC Rule 20 tariff to underground overhead electric lines in high fire threat areas; and
- Directing the CPUC to oversee the IOU's efforts on new requirements including specified reporting, ability to assess fines and penalties, notification requirements, and requiring specified fire risk mitigation capital expenditures by the electric IOUs by certain dates.

League Position: Support

Solid Waste and Recycling

**[AB 1672](#) (Bloom) Solid Waste. Nonwoven Disposable Products.**

This measure would require labels indicating a product should not be flushed on specified nonwoven disposable products.

League position: Support\* (letter pending)

**[SB 54](#) (Allen)/[AB 1080](#) (Gonzalez) Solid Waste. Packaging and Products.**

These identical measures would direct the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) to establish a comprehensive framework to address plastic pollution and waste by:

- Adopting regulations by Jan. 1, 2024 that require producers, which includes the people who manufacture single-use packaging or priority single use products, to achieve a 75 percent reduction of waste generated from single-use packaging and priority single-use plastic products in the California market by 2030;
- Requiring producers to source reduce single-use packaging and priority single-use products to the maximum extent feasible;

- Requiring producers to make single-use packaging and priority single-use products recyclable or compostable by 2030; and
- Developing criteria, via an implementation plan with stakeholder input, to determine which packaging materials qualify to be labeled as recyclable or compostable. This implementation plan will also include the development of incentives and policies to encourage in-state manufacturing using recycled material generated in California as a way to shift towards a more circular economy.

League Position: Support

### Water Quality

#### **SB 1044 (Allen) Firefighting Equipment and Foam. PFAS Chemicals.**

This measure would prohibit the use of firefighting foam containing perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) chemicals, except where federally required, and would require notification of the presence of PFAS in the protective equipment of firefighters.

League Position: Support

## **Community Services**

### Disaster Preparedness and Community Resiliency

#### **AB 2213 (Limón) Office of Emergency Services: Model Guidelines.**

This measure would require the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) to develop model guidelines for local governments and other local entities active in disasters to identify, type, and track community resources that could assist in responding to or recovering from disasters.

League Position: Support

#### **SB 1196 (Umberg) Price Gouging.**

This measure would amend the crime of price gouging. Specifically, the measure would provide that if the person, contractor, business, or other entity did not charge a price for the goods or services immediately prior to the proclamation or declaration of emergency, it may not charge a price that is more than 50 percent greater than either the amount that the seller paid for the goods or, if the seller did not purchase the goods, the seller's costs in selling or providing the goods or services.

League Position: Watch

### Parks and Recreation

#### **SB 217 (Portantino) Recreational and Organizational Camps.**

This measure would make significant changes to how organized and recreational camps operate. Specifically, this measure would:

- Require an organized camp and a recreational camp to obtain a license from the local agency of the jurisdiction where the camp is located before operating a camp;
- Establish a procedure for a camp to submit an application to a local agency for a license and would authorize a local agency to charge an application fee in a specified amount;
- Require the local agency to inspect a camp for compliance with these provisions before issuing a license to operate;
- Impose specified requirements on specific camp activities including, among others, riflery, archery, horseback riding, climbing, swimming, and scuba diving;
- Require each camp to obtain specified certifications before offering high-risk activities; and
- Authorize a local agency to levy a civil penalty on each camp that fails to comply with the requirements of the bill, in an amount not to exceed \$200 per day until the local agency finds the camp is in compliance.

### Tobacco, E-Cigarettes, and Vaping

### **SB 793 (Hill) Flavored Tobacco Products.**

This measure would:

- Prohibit a tobacco retailer from selling a flavored tobacco product;
- Create a violation of this prohibition an infraction punishable by a fine of \$250 for each violation;
- State the intent of the Legislature that these provisions not be construed to preempt or prohibit the adoption and implementation of local ordinances related to the prohibition on the sale of flavored tobacco products; and
- Exempt shisha tobacco for use in hookahs.

League Position: Watch

## **Public Safety**

### **AB 66 (Gonzalez) Police. Use of Force.**

This measure would establish clear standards on the use of rubber bullets and other “less lethal” weapons by law enforcement for crowd control and would also ban the use of tear gas by all California law enforcement agencies.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 1196 (Gipson) Peace Officer. Use of Force.**

This measure would prohibit law enforcement agencies in California from authorizing the use of the carotid artery restraint or a chokehold.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 1314 (McCarty) Law Enforcement Use of Force Settlements and Judgements: Reporting.**

This measure would require municipalities to annually post on their internet websites specified information relating to use of force settlements and judgements, including amounts paid, broken down by individual settlement and judgment, premiums paid for insurance against use of force settlements or judgements, and information on bonds used to finance such payments.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 1472 (Stone) Personal Rights. False Reports to Law Enforcement.**

This measure would make false reports to police, including 911 calls, a violation of the Ralph Civil Rights Act when made falsely or in reckless disregard of the truth. This bill would also allow for civil action against persons who make false police reports or claims, regardless of discriminatory motive.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 1506 (McCarty) Police Use of Force.**

This measure would allow local law enforcement agencies and district attorneys to more regularly request the Attorney General to launch a formal review of situations where an officer used force that resulted in death or harm. Under the measure, the Department of Justice would have to review the incident and, upon its conclusion, could pursue prosecution should that force be found unwarranted.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 1550 (Bonta) Discriminatory Emergency Calls.**

This measure would authorize a person to bring civil action against any responsible party, who, motivated by a person’s protected status, knowingly causes a peace officer to encounter the person with the intent to infringe upon the person’s rights or cause the person to feel harassed, humiliated, or embarrassed. The measure outlines the various types of damages a prevailing plaintiff may recover from a responsible party. Additionally, it would make a false report that is deemed a hate crime punishable as a misdemeanor or a felony.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 2122 (Rubio, Blanca) Unlawful Cannabis Activity. Enforcement.**

This measure would allow local government agencies to impose a civil penalty on persons aiding and abetting unlicensed commercial cannabis activity of up to \$30,000 for each violation.

League Position: Support

**AB 2532 (Irwin) Firearms. Gun Violence Restraining Orders.**

This bill would add both a district attorney and city attorney to the list of persons authorized to request the issuance or renewal of a gun violence restraining order.

League Position: Pending

**AB 2617 (Gabriel) Firearms. Prohibited Persons.**

This measure would specify that any person who owns or possesses a firearm, and is subject to an out-of-state issued gun violence restraining order (GVRO), is prohibited from having custody or control of, or attempting to purchase or receive, a firearm or ammunition for a five-year period, commencing upon the expiration of the existing GVRO.

League Position: Support

**AB 3330 (O'Donnell) Cannabis. Advertising and Marketing. Penalties.**

This measure would prohibit a person from collecting a fee or any other form of compensation for advertising or marketing the sale or provision of unlicensed cannabis products.

League Position: Support

**SB 629 (McGuire) Public Peace. Media Access.**

This measure would ensure access to closed off areas by members of the media during a demonstration, march, protest or rally, and would establish misdemeanor liability for an officer who assaults a journalist or obstructs their ability to gather or process news.

League Position: Pending

## **Revenue & Taxation**

**SB 217 (Portantino) Recreational and Organizational Camps.**

This measure would make significant changes to how organized and recreational camps operate. Specifically, this measure would:

- Require an organized camp and a recreational camp to obtain a license from the local agency of the jurisdiction where the camp is located before operating a camp;
- Establish a procedure for a camp to submit an application to a local agency for a license and would authorize a local agency to charge an application fee in a specified amount;
- Require the local agency to inspect a camp for compliance with these provisions before issuing a license to operate;
- Impose specified requirements on specific camp activities including, among others, riflery, archery, horseback riding, climbing, swimming, and scuba diving;
- Require each camp to obtain specified certifications before offering high-risk activities; and
- Authorize a local agency to levy a civil penalty on each camp that fails to comply with the requirements of the bill, in an amount not to exceed \$200 per day until the local agency finds the camp is in compliance.

League Position: Pending

**SB 1049 (Glazer) Local Ordinances. Short-term Rentals.**

This measure would authorize a city to impose a fine of up to \$5,000 for a violation of a short-term rental ordinance. This measure would also define "short-term rental" for these purposes as a residential property that is rented to a visitor for fewer than 30 days through a centralized online platform where the rental is advertised and payments for the rental are securely processed.

League Position: Support if Amended

**SB 1441 (McGuire) Local Prepaid Mobile Telephony Services Collection Act.**

This measure would remove the sunset on local governments' ability to collect Utility User Taxes from retail sales of prepaid wireless telecommunication products and services and would assist the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration with administration of the program.

League Position: Support

## **Transportation, Communications, Public Works**

### **AB 326 (Muratsuchi) Vehicles. Motorized Carrying Devices.**

This measure would require local governments to allow “motorized carrying devices” to operate in the public right-of-way, including sidewalks and city streets. The bill would allow for these devices to be as large as the average person, weigh up to 85 pounds, and go as fast as eight miles per hour.

League Position: Pending

### **AB 1286 (Muratsuchi) Shared Mobility Devices. Agreements.**

This measure would prohibit shared mobility device providers (such as Lime and Bird) from waiving the legal rights and remedies of their users, require them to maintain general liability insurance coverage, and have prior authorization from the jurisdictions where they wish to operate.

League Position: Support/Co-Sponsor

### **SB 431 (McGuire) Mobile Telephony Service Base Transceiver Station Towers. Communications Infrastructure. Performance Reliability Standards.**

This measure would require CPUC and Cal OES to develop and implement performance reliability standards for “cell towers” and other infrastructure for providing mobile telephony service located within a commission-designated Tier 2 or Tier 3 High Fire Threat District.

League Position: Support

### **SB 794 (Jackson) Emergency Services. Telecommunications.**

This measure would authorize cities to enter into agreements with their own social services departments and/or public utility or to utilize its own records to automatically enroll their residents into the city- or county-operated public emergency warning system. The measure would require local governments exercising this authority to provide an opt-out for residents that do not wish to be enrolled in the system.

League Position: Support

### **SB 865 (Hill) Excavations. Subsurface Installations.**

This measure would strengthen safe excavation practices by increasing collaboration between excavators and operators, requiring data sharing amongst key stakeholders, and moving the Dig Safe Board to the Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety. Entities that violate the requirements of SB 865 would face civil penalties.

League Position: Support

### **SB 1130 (Gonzalez) Telecommunications. California Advanced Services Fund.**

This measure would require the CPUC to develop, implement, and administer the California Advanced Services Fund program to encourage deployment of 21st century-ready communications. The bill would provide that the goal of the program is to approve funding for infrastructure projects that will provide high-capacity, future-proof infrastructure to unserved areas or unserved high-poverty areas.

League Position: Support

## **Governance, Transparency, and Labor Relations**

### **AB 664 (Cooper) Workers’ Compensation. Injury. Communicable Disease.**

This measure would define “injury,” for certain state and local firefighting personnel, peace officers, certain hospital employees, and certain fire and rescue services coordinators who work for Cal OES to include being exposed to or contracting, on or after Jan. 1, 2020, a communicable disease, including COVID-19, that is the subject of a state or local declaration of a state of emergency that is issued on or after Jan. 1, 2020. The bill would create a conclusive presumption, as specified, that the injury arose out of and in the course of the employment. The bill would apply to injuries that occurred prior to the declaration of the state of emergency.

The bill would also exempt these provisions from the apportionment requirements.

League Position: Watch

### **AB 2473 (Cooper) Public Investment Funds.**

This measure would exempt specified records from disclosure under the California Public Records Act regarding an internally managed private loan made directly by a public investment fund, including quarterly and

annual financial statements of the borrower or its constituent owners, unless the information has already been publicly released by the keeper of the information.

League Position: Support

**AB 2999 (Low) Employees. Bereavement Leave.**

This measure would enact the Bereavement Leave Act of 2020. The bill would require an employer to grant an employee up to 10 business days of unpaid bereavement leave upon the death of a spouse, child, parent, sibling, grandparent, grandchild, or domestic partner, in accordance with certain procedures, and subject to certain exclusions. The bill would prohibit an employer from interfering with or restraining the exercise or attempt to exercise the employee's right to take this leave. This bill would authorize an employee who has been discharged, disciplined, or discriminated against for exercising their right to bereavement leave to file a complaint with the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement or bring a civil action against their employer for reinstatement, specified damages, and attorney's fees.

League Position: Oppose

**AB 3216 (Kalra) Employee Leave. Authorization.**

This measure would revise and recast provisions under the Moore-Brown-Roberti Family Rights Act, or California Family Rights Act, to make it an unlawful employment practice for any employer to refuse grant a request by an employee, with qualified employment service, to take up to 12 workweeks of unpaid protected leave during any 12-month period for family care and medical leave, including birth of the employee's child or adoption, to care for the employee's own medical condition, or for a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner, as specified. The bill would also make it an unlawful business practice for an employer to refuse to grant an employee up to 12 workweeks of leave in a 12-month period for emergency leave, as defined.

League Position: Oppose

**SB 1159 (Hill) Workers' Compensation. COVID-19. Critical Workers.**

This measure would, until an unspecified date, define "injury" for a critical worker, as specified, to include illness or death that results from exposure to COVID-19 under specified circumstances. The bill would create a disputable presumption, as specified, that an injury that develops or manifests itself while a critical worker is employed arose out of and in the course of the employment.

League Position: Note Concerns

**SB 1173 (Durazo) Public Employment. Labor Relations. Employee Information.** This measure would generally authorize an exclusive representative to file a charge of an unfair labor practice with the Public Employment Relations Board, as specified, alleging a violation of the requirements to provide employee information. Current law requires public employers to provide certain labor representatives with the names and home addresses of newly hired employees, as well as their job titles, departments, work locations, telephone numbers, and personal email addresses, within 30 days of hire or by the first pay period of the month following hire. Current law also requires the public employers to provide this information for all employees in a bargaining unit at least every 120 days, except as specified.

League Position: Oppose

## **Housing, Community and Economic Development**

### **Planning and Zoning**

**AB 1279 (Bloom) Housing Developments. High-resource Areas.**

This measure would require the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) to designate areas in this state as high-resource areas by Jan. 1, 2021, and every five years thereafter. In any area designated as a high-resource area, this measure would require cities, at the request of a developer, to allow up to fourplexes in single-family zones and up to 100 units per acre in commercial zones. These projects shall receive ministerial approval (use by-right).

League Position: Watch

**AB 2345 (Gonzalez) Planning and Zoning. Density Bonus.**

This measure would greatly expand Density Bonus law and allow developers to receive up to five concessions and incentives from local governments and up to 50 percent more density.

League Position: Oppose Unless Amended

**AB 3040 (Chiu) Local Planning. Regional Housing Need.**

This measure would create a voluntary program to incentivize local governments to allow four units per parcel, by-right, in exchange for additional credit towards the city or county's share of the regional housing need allocation for each site identified under these provisions. The measure would prohibit the cumulative credit received by a city or county from exceeding more than 25 percent of the total units needed to meet its regional housing needs allocation.

League Position: Support in Concept.

**AB 3107 (Bloom) Planning and Zoning. Housing Developments.**

This measure would require, notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of a city's or county's general plan, specific plan, zoning ordinance, or regulation, a housing development in which at least 20 percent of the units have an affordable housing cost or affordable rent for lower income households shall be an allowable use on a site designated in any element of the general plan for commercial uses.

League Position: Watch

**SB 474 (Stern) Very High Fire Severity Zones. Development.**

This measure would prohibit the construction of a new development project within a very high fire hazard severity zone or a state responsibility area. Development projects include residential dwellings, including, but not limited to, mobilehomes, accessory dwelling units, and junior accessory dwelling units, of one or more units or a subdivision of land for the purpose of constructing one or more residential dwelling units, and projects for commercial, retail, or industrial use.

League Position: Watch

**SB 1085 (Skinner) Density Bonus Law. Housing for Lower-income Students.**

This measure would require a city or county to grant additional incentives or concessions for a project that contains a specified percentage of units for moderate income rental housing and lower income student housing developments.

League Position: Oppose Unless Amended

**SB 1120 (Atkins) Subdivisions. Tentative Maps.**

This measure would build off the Accessory Dwelling Unit law allowing for at least three units per parcel to further encourage development in single-family neighborhoods by creating a ministerial approval process for duplexes and lot splits that meet local zoning, environmental and tenant displacement standards.

League Position: Support if Amended

**SB 1299 (Portantino) Housing Development. Incentives. Rezoning of Idle Retail Sites.**

This measure would, upon appropriation by the Legislature, require HCD to administer a program to provide incentives in the form of grants allocated as provided to local governments that rezone idle sites used for a big box retailer or a commercial shopping center to instead allow the development of workforce housing.

League Position: Support

**SB 1385 (Caballero) Local Planning. Housing in Commercial Zones.**

This measure, the Neighborhood Homes Act, would deem a housing development project, as defined, an authorized use on a neighborhood lot that is zoned for office or retail commercial use under a local agency's zoning code or general plan. The measure would require the density for a housing development under these provisions to meet or exceed the density deemed appropriate to accommodate housing for lower income households according to the type of local jurisdiction, including a density of at least 20 units per acre for a suburban jurisdiction.

League Position: Watch

## Homelessness

### **ACA 10 (Bonta) Personal Rights. Right to Housing.**

This measure would declare that the fundamental human right to housing exists in this state. The measure would declare this right is exclusively enforceable by a public right of action. The measure would specify the shared obligation of state and local jurisdictions to respect, protect, and fulfill this right through progressively implemented measures, consistent with available resources, within an aggressive but reasonable time frame.  
League Position: Watch

### **AB 3269 (Chiu) State and Local Homelessness Plans.**

This measure, upon appropriation by the Legislature, would require the Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council to conduct, or contract with an entity to conduct, a statewide needs and gaps analysis to identify, among other things, state programs that provide housing or services to persons experiencing homelessness and funding required to move persons experiencing homelessness into permanent housing. This measure would also state the intent of the Legislature that each state and local agency aim to reduce homelessness within its jurisdiction by 90 percent by Dec. 31, 2028.  
League Position: Watch

### **AB 3300 (Santiago) Homelessness Grant Funds.**

This measure would appropriate, commencing with the 2020–21 fiscal year and every fiscal year thereafter, without regard to fiscal year, \$2 billion from the General Fund to HCD for the purpose of providing local jurisdictions and other specified entities with ongoing grant funds to sustain or expand efforts to address their immediate and long-term homelessness challenges. The measure would require \$1.1 billion to be distributed to counties and continuums of care, \$800 million to be distributed to cities with a population of at least 300,000, and \$100 million to nonprofit housing developers for specified purposes relating to the provision of housing. The measure would require the method of allocation to be based on a formula that considers specified data.  
League Position: Watch

## Mitigation Fees/Development Fees

### **AB 1484 (Grayson) Mitigation Fee Act.**

This measure would prohibit a local agency from imposing a housing impact requirement adopted by the local agency on a housing development project unless specified requirements are satisfied by the local agency, including that the housing impact requirement be roughly proportional in both nature and extent to the impact created by the housing development project.  
League Position: Oppose

## Miscellaneous

### **SB 795 (Beall) Affordable Housing and Community Development Investment Program.**

This measure would invest \$2 billion annually for 5 years into the immediate construction of affordable housing units and programs that address and prevent homelessness. Additionally, this measure would create two new programs administered by the Governor’s Office of Business and Economic Development to help local governments with their economic recovery and natural disaster preparedness.

Of the \$2 billion, \$1.15 billion shall be used to construct affordable housing, spur economic development and create jobs through infrastructure and employment programs. Funds will be distributed as follows:

- 1) Multi-family Housing Program-\$500 million (25 percent);
- 2) Infill Incentive Grant Program-\$300 million (15 percent);
- 3) Local Housing Trust Fund Matching Grant Program-\$200 million (10 percent);
- 4) Cal Home Program-\$75 million (3.75 percent);
- 5) Joe Serna, Jr. Farmworker Housing Grant Fund-\$75 million (3.75 percent)



  - b. Use the funds in accordance with all applicable provisions of subdivision (d) of Control Section 11.90 of the Budget Act of 2020.
  - c. Report on expenditures and summarize regional collaboration and non-duplication of efforts within the region by September 1, 2020, and return any funds that are unspent by October 30, 2020 (unless extended by the Department of Finance based on reported expenditures to date), and repay the state for any cost disallowed after federal review.
  - d. Retain records to support reported COVID-19 eligible expenditures and participate in audits as outlined by the federal government and State.

Dear Ms. Yee:

On behalf of the City Council, I am writing to you to express our desire that your office examine the methodologies for salary analysis the City of Rancho Palos Verdes has adopted for reporting personnel salary costs. While we are all appreciative of the extensive efforts your office put into place to ensure greater transparency and ease of research in the public's new-found awareness of public salary concerns, the City Council believe that your efforts could be bolstered by an additional layer of review via inclusion of gross income, not merely the Medicare taxable income (box 5 of an employee's W-2) to be reported. Furthermore, the City takes additional steps to ensure that the report meets the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. On May 11, 2020 the City's independent audit firm White Nelson Diehl Evans LLP performed an agreed upon procedures engagement and issued an audit report without any exceptions (clean audit).

I have taken the liberty to attach for your review the 2019 Employee Compensation & Benefit Analysis prepared by our Finance Department, which illustrates the total compensation received by City of Rancho Palos Verdes employees. The analysis report captures all forms of pay and City-paid benefits including wages, allowances, overtime, declined health insurance, bonus, severance, vacation buy out, pension contributions, health insurance, ancillary insurance, and retirement health savings. In addition, the analysis includes an accounting of all leave time earned during 2019.

I am available at your discretion to discuss our impetus for having delved more deeply into the world of employee compensation, and would be happy to collaborate with your office.

Thank you for your continued efforts to bring greater openness and transparency to the arena of public compensation. We hope our contribution will be seen as a model, going forward, of presenting the most complete compensation picture possible so that the public

may be better informed of how their tax dollars are being expended in terms of public employee salaries.


