The purpose of the Community Development Department is to ensure the orderly physical development of the community by upholding the goals and policies of the City's General Plan through the issuance of land use entitlements and permits for improvements and development of private property. From the preservation of views to wildlife management, the Community Development Department tackles a wide range of issues that impact the quality of life of the City's residents and businesses.

The Community Development Department's Planning, Building and Safety, Code Enforcement and View Restoration Divisions work together to further interpret and implement the City's municipal code regulations. City Staff works closely with project stakeholders and interested parties through the development review process to ensure that a proposed project complies with applicable Zoning, Subdivision and Building Code requirements while remaining compatible with neighborhood character.

The Community Development Department also coordinates with local and state agencies on issues facing the region including housing, transportation, coastal development and sustainability efforts.

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LANDSLIDE MOVEMENT UPDATE



As we head into what is forecasted to be another wet winter, the City of Rancho Palos Verdes continues to see promising signs of progress as we navigate the Portuguese Bend landslide emergency. Thanks to highly productive dewatering wells that have relieved water pressure by removing tens of millions of gallons of groundwater, the average rate of land movement slowed to 3.3 inches per week by late October 2024. At its most destructive peak over the summer, movement averaged up to 13 inches per week in some areas. While we are hopeful that this

significant deceleration will continue, the landslide complex as a whole is still moving approximately 25 times faster than it was in October 2022. To prepare for the winter months, the City implemented a multi-pronged "winterization" strategy consisting of filling fissures, lining the Altamira, Kelvin, Portuguese, Ishibashi, Paintbrush, and Klondike Canyons with a protective material to prevent rainwater from getting into the ground, and repaving vulnerable streets in the Seaview neighborhood.

The City continues to urge Southern California Edison and SoCalGas to restore electricity and natural gas to the hundreds of residents who have been without service since the summer as soon as it is safe to do so. About \$1.9 million in emergency relief grants has been distributed to impacted residents who can seek up to \$10,000 to cover critical expenses such as purchasing supplies, home repairs, temporary housing and other related costs due to land movement or utility interruptions. This program was made possible by \$5 million from Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn, which included \$2.8 million for individual assistance, and \$2.2 million to help the City's ongoing landslide response and stabilization efforts.

City Staff and the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services are reviewing applications submitted for the historic Voluntary Property Buyout Program announced in October 2024. Established with \$42 million in funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, the program is intended to help eligible homeowners in the landslide area relocate to safer areas by offering a fair market value for their properties based on pre-disaster appraisals. Properties acquired by the City through this program will be permanently converted to open space and de-restricted, protecting the community from future redevelopment risks in these vulnerable areas.

While the landslide crisis dominated local headlines in 2024 and took a heavy toll on our community, this emergency has brought out the best in us and made us stronger than ever. We are #RPVTogether.

December 2024: There will be no trash collection on Wednesday, December 25 and a one-day service delay for the remainder of the week (for example, Thursday routes will be collected Friday)



January 2025: There will be no trash collection on Wednesday, January 1 and a one-day service delay for the remainder of week routes.

Questions? Call EDCO at 310.540.2977 or www.rpvrecycles.com. Please place all containers at the curb no later than 7 am on your collection day.

Regulations for hours for trash containers placement and storage: Containers cannot be placed at the curb until after 4 pm the day before collection day. Empty carts must be removed no later than 10 pm on collection day.

Empty containers cannot be left on the curb overnight. Containers must be stored on the side or back of the property, at a location that is substantially screened from view. Proper care and placement of your container helps keep your neighborhood attractive and aesthetically pleasing. Tell us about your prior work experience.

PREPPING FOR THE HOLIDAYS



Tips from the expert himself.

The winter months are a time of joy and celebration, but when the right safety steps aren't taken when cooking and decorating, they can become tragic. Avoid a disaster this holiday season by following these safety tips:

1. When cooking, you should avoid wearing loose or dangling clothing, never leave cooking food un-attended or near small children or pets and keep anything flammable away from cooking surfaces and heat sources.
2. When decorating, you should choose decorations that are flame resistant, replace any light strings that are worn or broken, and plug all outdoor decorations into circuits with a ground fault circuit interrupter to avoid potential shock. Remember to place Christmas trees at least 3 feet away from heat sources, like fireplaces and space heaters, and in a location where they do not block exits.
3. When using candles, you should keep them at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn, on a sturdy surface, and turn them off when you leave a room. Consider using flameless candles, which look and smell like real candles, but do not add the risk of a house fire.

GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS: ANNUAL BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL AND UPDATES

What business is it of yours? Good question, but if it is your business and it's in RPV, you need a business license.

Business License Renewal Process

Business license renewal applications are due prior to commencing operations and expire each December 31. In mid-December, City staff will send the 2025 business license renewal applications to all currently licensed businesses. This application should be completed and returned with payment to City Hall by January 31, 2025. Upon receiving a completed renewal application and license tax payment, a 2025 Business Tax Certificate will be viewable/printable on the e-Trakit online portal. Penalties will be assessed on any license application received on or after February 1, 2025, at 5% for each month delinquent up to 50% of the total license tax. No extensions or waivers of the penalty amount will be granted.



How Do I COMPLETE A BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL?

The renewal application is easy, takes only minutes to finish, and can be completed in one of three ways:

- 1) **Online:** File on-line by going to the City's website at <https://etrakit.rpvca.gov/ETRAKIT/>.
- 2) **By mail:** Return the application and your check made payable to "City of Rancho Palos Verdes" to the following address:

- 3) **In person:** You can also pay your renewal in person at City Hall, within the Community Development Department.

GREEN CORNER



CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

Recycling your Christmas tree is easy. Curbside tree collection will take place on your collection day from December 26, 2024, through January 15, 2025.

- Please remove all decorations including ornaments, tinsel, lights, and tree stand.
- Flocked trees are acceptable and will be recycled.
- Trees longer than 6 feet must be cut in half.

If you live in a multi-family complex, please contact your management company or HOA for the designated tree drop-off location.



SB 1383 MANDATORY ORGANIC WASTE DISPOSAL REDUCTION

SB 1383 is a state law that requires every resident and business to recycle organic waste in an effort to reduce methane emissions.

Residents and multi-family complexes must recycle all organic waste, including paper, cardboard, yard materials, food scraps, and food-soiled paper by placing them in their organic (green) bin. Residents can request a Kitchen Caddie from EDCO to conveniently transfer food scraps from the kitchen to the organics cart or compost pile. Multi-family complexes are also required to arrange for organic and recycling services (paper, bottle, aluminum, cardboard, etc.) If you are not recycling your organic or your other recyclable items, you must contact EDCO at 310.540.2977 to arrange for services now.



All businesses are required to arrange for organic waste and recycling services. If you are an owner or manager of a business that is currently required to recycle organics, and do not do so, please contact your hauler immediately and/or your management company to arrange for organic waste recycling services. HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE AND ELECTRONIC WASTE PROGRAM



The Household Hazardous Waste and Electronic Waste Collection Program (HHW) gives Rancho Palos Verdes residents a legal and cost-free way to dispose of unwanted household chemicals that cannot be disposed of in regular trash collection.

Household Hazardous Waste can be disposed of at the Gaffey S.A.F.E. Center. They are open to LA County residents every Saturday and Sunday from 9 am to 3 pm. To dispose of old paint, expired medicines, automotive oil, used electronics, and more, go to the Gaffey Safe Center located at 1400 N. Gaffey, San Pedro.
